Robert Saleh was hired by the Tennessee Titans as the 22nd head coach in franchise history on Jan. 22, 2026.

Saleh arrives in Tennessee with 21 seasons of NFL coaching experience: six seasons with the Houston Texans (2005-10), three with the Seattle Seahawks (2011-13), three with the Jacksonville Jaguars (2014-16), five total seasons over two stints with the San Francisco 49ers (2017-20, 2025), and four campaigns as the head coach of the New York Jets (2021-24). During his time in the NFL, he has been a part of nine top-10 defenses, and in his nine seasons as a defensive coordinator or head coach, his team has finished in the top five in total defense on five occasions.

In 2025, Saleh returned to the San Francisco 49ers for his second stint as defensive coordinator under head coach Kyle Shanahan. With the roster decimated by injuries, including season-ending injuries to All-Pro defensive lineman Nick Bosa and All-Pro linebacker Fred Warner, the 49ers went 12-5 during the regular season and progressed to the Divisional Round of the playoffs.

As the head coach of the Jets (2021-24), Saleh guided four different players in their first four years in the NFL to first-team Associated Press All-Pro honors (cornerback Sauce Gardner, defensive lineman Quinnen Williams and returner Braxton Berrios) and/or Pro Bowl appearances (Gardner, Williams and linebacker Jermaine Johnson II). The Jets defense finished in the top 10 in multiple categories over the 2022 and 2023 seasons, ranking first in passing yards allowed per game (178.9) and opponent yards per play (4.7), second in total defense (301.7), and sixth in opponent yards per rush (4.1). The unit also tallied 93 sacks and 29 interceptions during that time, tied for the eighth and 10th-most, respectively, in the NFL.

The 2023 Jets featured a pair of first-team Associated Press All-Pros in Gardner and linebacker Quincy Williams, as well as three Pro Bowl selections in Gardner, Johnson II and Quinnen Williams. The Jets also won four games after trailing in the fourth quarter, tying for the second-most such victories in the NFL. Defensively, the Jets finished in a tie for first place in opponent yards per play (4.6) and ranked second in passing yards allowed per game (168.3), third in total defense (292.3) and tied for eighth in takeaways (27). The Jets held opponents to seven points or less in 10 of their 17 games, which was tied for the most such games in the NFL. Meanwhile, the Jets offense gained 4,566 total yards in 2023, with 64.1 percent of those yards coming from rookie and second-year players, the second-most in the NFL. Saleh saw second-year running back Breece Hall register career highs in rushing yards (994), receiving yards (591), yards from scrimmage (1,585) and total touchdowns (nine).

In 2022, Saleh led a roster that featured two first-team AP All-Pro selections (Gardner and Quinnen Williams), a second-team All-Pro (linebacker C.J. Mosley) and four Pro Bowl selections (special teamer Justin Hardee, Gardner, Mosley and Quinnen Williams). He also oversaw the development of the NFL's Offensive and Defensive Rookies of the Year in wide receiver Garrett Wilson and Gardner, making the Jets the third team in NFL history to have both rookie players win the honor. Wilson led all rookie wide receivers in receptions (83) and receiving yards (1,103), while Gardner led the NFL in passes defended (20). The Jets improved their win total by three games, which marked the sixth-largest win improvement in the NFL in 2022. The club boasted a defense that tied for first in opponent yards per play (4.8) and finished third in passing defense (189.4), fourth in scoring defense (316) and fourth in total defense (311.1).

In his first year as head coach of the Jets, the 2021 team was led by rookie quarterback Zach Wilson (2,519 passing yards), rookie running back Michael Carter (639 rushing yards) and rookie wide receiver Elijah Moore (538 receiving yards). The Jets were just the second team since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to be led by rookies in passing yards, rushing yards and receiving yards.

Before taking the helm in New York, Saleh logged four seasons (2017-20) in his first stint as the defensive coordinator for the 49ers. During that span, the 49ers defense ranked third in passing yards allowed per game (211.4),



fourth in total defense (323.6) and opponent yards per play (5.1) and sixth in opponent yards per rush (4.1).

In 2020, despite injuries to key players throughout the year, the 49ers defense held top-five marks in passing yards allowed per game (207.9, fourth), third-down defense (35.5 percent, fourth), total defense (314.4, fifth) and opponent yards per play (5.0, tied for fifth). The unit also ranked tied for sixth in opponent yards per rush (4.0) and seventh in opponent rushing yards per game (106.4). The defense was led by Warner, who earned first-team AP All-Pro honors and a Pro Bowl selection after registering a team-high 125 tackles to go along with a sack, two interceptions, six passes defended, one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries.

In 2019, Saleh was named Coordinator of the Year by Sporting News after leading the 49ers defense to a second-place finish in total defense—281.8 yards allowed per game—which was the fewest total yards allowed per game by the team since 1997 (250.8). San Francisco placed first in the NFL in passing yards allowed per game (169.2), the fewest passing yards allowed per game in the NFL since 2009 (153.7 by the Jets). It marked the first time San Francisco led the NFL in passing defense since 1987 (165.6). The 49ers tied for second in the NFL in third-down percentage allowed (33.3) and tied for fifth in the NFL in sacks (48), the most by the team in a single season since 1998 (51). San Francisco also ranked seventh in opponent completion percentage (61.3) and opponent quarterback rating (83.0).

Bosa, a rookie in 2019, played in all 16 games (14 starts) and registered 47 tackles, nine sacks, one interception, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries and two passes defended. He was named Defensive Rookie of the Year by the Associated Press and the PFWA, and Rookie of the Year by Sporting News and PFWA, as well as the NFL's Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year. He was also named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team and was named a starter in the Pro Bowl. With defensive linemen Arik Armstead (10.0), Bosa (nine), DeForest Buckner (7.5) and Dee Ford (6.5), the 49ers were the only team in the NFL to have four or more players with at least 6.5 sacks in 2019. Rookie linebacker Dre Greenlaw was named to the PFWA All-Rookie team. The secondary was led by cornerback Richard Sherman, who registered three interceptions (one returned for a touchdown) and was named second-team All-Pro.

In 2018, the 49ers defense registered 37 sacks, the most by the team in a single season at the time since 2013 (38). The defense ranked among the top dozen teams in the league in rushing yards per play allowed (4.09, seventh), opponent completion percentage (63.5, 10th), yards per play allowed (5.42, 11th) and net passing yards per game allowed (233.3, 11th). San Francisco was one of six teams (Baltimore Ravens, Buffalo Bills, Detroit Lions, Indianapolis Colts & New England Patriots) to allow fewer net

yards per game, rushing yards per game and passing yards per game than in 2017. The 2018 San Francisco defense was anchored by Buckner, who led the team with a career-high 12 sacks and was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. His 12 sacks were the most by a 49ers defender since 2012 (19.5 by Aldon Smith). Warner started all 16 games as a rookie and led the team with 123 tackles, ranking 12th in the NFL and third among all rookies.

In 2017, Saleh spearheaded a 49ers defensive unit that allowed 5.28 yards per play, which was a 0.62 yards-per-play improvement from 2016 and the third-largest improvement in the NFL from 2016 to 2017 behind Cleveland (0.76) and the Jets (0.72). The defense also held its opponents under 100 yards rushing seven times. From Weeks 12-16, the 49ers' streak of holding each of their five opponents under 100 yards rushing was tied for the longest streak in the NFL over that span (Arizona). The 49ers defense was among the league leaders at getting into the opponent's backfield on running plays, finishing tied for fifth in the NFL by forcing 53 rushes for negative yardage. Over the final eight weeks of the year, San Francisco ranked second in the NFL in rushing yards allowed (640) and tied for fourth in yards per carry allowed (3.62).

Saleh joined San Francisco after three years (2014-16) as the linebackers coach of the Jaguars. In 2016, Saleh's linebackers helped the Jacksonville defense rank fifth in passing yards allowed (215.3) and sixth in opponent rushing average (3.82). Team captain Paul Posluszny started all 16 games at middle linebacker and led the club in tackles for the second consecutive season. According to Jaguars team statistics, linebacker Telvin Smith Sr. registered 118 tackles while starting all 16 games at outside linebacker for the first time in his career. Smith's 350 career tackles from 2014 through 2016 were the most by a Jaguars player in his first three NFL seasons.

In 2015, the Jaguars defense allowed 3.68 yards per rushing attempt, which was the fifth-lowest rushing average allowed in the NFL. Posluszny led the squad and ranked fifth in the NFL with 133 tackles, according to GSIS

statistics, while tying with Smith for the team lead with 13 tackles for loss. Under Saleh's guidance, Smith stepped in the starting lineup in 2014 and ranked third among all rookies with 99 tackles. Smith led the team with two fumble recoveries while ranking second with nine tackles for loss. After a season-ending injury to Posluszny midway through the year, J.T. Thomas stepped in and set a career high in tackles along with two interceptions.

Prior to Jacksonville, Saleh spent three seasons (2011-13) as a defensive quality control coach for the Seahawks. During that period, he was responsible for assisting the defensive staff with day-to-day duties with a focus on the linebackers. Working under linebackers coach Ken Norton Jr., Saleh aided in the development of K.J. Wright, Bobby Wagner and Super Bowl XLVIII MVP Malcolm Smith.

Before joining the Seahawks, Saleh totaled six seasons with the Texans, serving as a coaching intern (2005), defensive assistant (2006-08) and assistant linebackers coach (2009-10). While there, Saleh oversaw the growth of the Texans linebackers, including AP Defensive Rookie of the Year performances by DeMeco Ryans (2006) and Brian Cushing (2009). In 2009, the Pro Bowl duo of Ryans and Cushing were the only teammates to each rank among the league's top 10 tacklers.

Saleh's coaching career began with three seasons in the collegiate ranks. He launched his career at Michigan State University as an offensive assistant/tight ends coach (2002) and defensive assistant/defensive line coach (2003). He then spent one season (2004) as a defensive assistant/defensive line coach at Central Michigan University before a brief stint at the University of Georgia as a defensive assistant/linebackers coach (2005).

A native of Dearborn, Mich., Saleh attended Northern Michigan University, where he was a four-year starter at tight end.

He and his wife, Sanaa, have eight children: sons Adam, Zane, Michael, Sam, Jacob and Robert Jr., and daughters Mila and Ella.

# GUS BRADLEY

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

NFL Coaching Experience: 21

Gus Bradley was hired by the Tennessee Titans as defensive coordinator on Feb. 4, 2026.

Bradley is entering his 37th year in coaching and his 21st year in the NFL. In 2026, he reunites with Titans head coach Robert Saleh after the duo previously served on the same staffs with the Seattle Seahawks (2011-12), Jacksonville Jaguars (2014-16) and San Francisco 49ers (2025).

During Bradley's time in the NFL, he has been a defensive coordinator for 12 total seasons with the Seahawks (2009-12), Los Angeles Chargers (2017-20), Las Vegas Raiders (2021) and Indianapolis Colts (2022-24). Additionally, he was the Jaguars head coach from 2013 to 2016.

As a member of the 49ers organization in 2025 under head coach Kyle Shanahan, Bradley was the assistant head coach of defense while Saleh was the defensive coordinator. The staff led the 49ers to a 12-5 record in the regular season and a playoff berth despite significant injuries to several players, including All-Pro defensive lineman Nick Bosa and All-Pro linebacker Fred Warner.

From 2022 through 2024, Bradley was the defensive coordinator in Indianapolis. The 2024 Colts finished the season tied for the third-most forced fumbles (17) and tied for the fifth-most interceptions (16) in the NFL. Linebacker Zaire Franklin earned Pro Bowl and second-team Associated Press All-Pro honors after leading the NFL with 173 tackles. In 2023, Indianapolis ranked fifth in sacks (51) as defensive lineman DeForest Buckner earned the third Pro Bowl appearance of his career. In Bradley's first season in Indianapolis in 2022, Franklin set then-career highs in tackles (166), passes defended (six), sacks (three) and forced fumbles (three).

Prior to joining the Colts, Bradley spent the 2021 season as the defensive coordinator for the Las Vegas Raiders. Under Bradley, defensive lineman Maxx Crosby and linebacker Denzel Perryman were each named to the Pro Bowl, with Crosby finishing with eight sacks and Perryman registering a team-high 154 tackles.

Bradley went to Las Vegas following four seasons (2017-20) as the defensive coordinator of the Los Angeles Chargers. Over that span, Bradley helped defensive lineman Joey Bosa (2018, 2020-21) and defensive lineman Melvin Ingram III (2018-20) each earn multiple trips to the Pro Bowl.

In 2020, the Chargers defense ranked 10th in the NFL in total defense (343.4) and ninth in passing yards per game allowed (223.6). Bradley's defense held opponents to the sixth-fewest yards per game (313.1) and the fifth-fewest passing yards per game average (200.3) in 2019. In 2018, the Chargers were ninth in the NFL in total defense (333.7) and ninth in passing defense (227.9) as safety Derwin James Jr. earned first-team AP All-Pro honors.

Under Bradley, the 2017 Chargers ranked third in the NFL in points per game allowed (17.0) and passing yards per game allowed (197.3). Cornerback Casey Hayward earned his second consecutive trip to the Pro Bowl.

As Jacksonville's head coach, the defense finished the 2016 season ranked sixth in yards per game allowed (321.7) and fifth in passing yards per game allowed (215.3). In 2015, Jacksonville's offense produced 44 touchdowns, the third-most in team history, as the team scored 376 points. The 2014 Jaguars finished the season with 45 sacks, tying for sixth in the NFL, as the team led the NFL with 12 sack-fumbles and ranked third with 19 total forced fumbles. In his first season in Jacksonville (2013), Bradley helped linebacker Paul Posluszny set career highs with 137 tackles and three sacks.

Before his tenure in Jacksonville, Bradley spent four seasons (2009-12) as the defensive coordinator for the Seahawks. The 2012 Seahawks led the NFL by holding opponents to a franchise-low 15.3 points per game. Bradley's defense held opponents to 306.2 yards per game, which ranked fourth in the NFL, while also finishing 10th in rushing defense (103.1) and sixth in passing defense (203.1). Bradley also coached defensive lineman

Bruce Irvin and linebacker Bobby Wagner in their rookie seasons. Irvin was the 15th overall pick of the 2012 NFL Draft and led all rookies with eight sacks, while Wagner (second round, 47th overall) ranked second among rookies in tackles (140) and fourth in interceptions (three).



Under Bradley, safety Earl Thomas earned first-team AP All-Pro honors and his second-consecutive Pro Bowl nod, while second-year cornerback Richard Sherman earned first-team AP All-Pro honors after leading the team and tying for second in the NFL with eight interceptions.

In 2011, Bradley's defensive unit in Seattle ranked fourth in opponent yards per rush attempt (3.79), fifth in turnover differential (plus-eight), fifth in takeaways (31), seventh in points allowed per game (19.7) and ninth in yards per game (332.2). Bradley's defensive unit also saw three players in their secondary earn Pro Bowl nods in safety Kam Chancellor, cornerback Brandon Browner and Thomas.

Bradley first entered the NFL coaching ranks with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers where he spent three seasons (2006-08) working under head coach Jon Gruden and defensive coordinator Monte Kiffin as the linebackers coach (2006-07) and defensive quality control coach (2008). During Bradley's tenure, linebacker Derrick Brooks earned Pro Bowl nods in 2007 and 2009.

Prior to his NFL career, Bradley totaled 16 years as a coach in the college ranks. He launched his career at his alma mater, North Dakota State, where he spent two seasons (1990-91) as a graduate assistant, followed by a four-year run as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Fort Lewis College (1992-95). He also briefly served as the head coach at Fort Lewis at the beginning of 1996. Bradley returned to North Dakota State later in 1996 and spent the next 10 seasons (1996-05) there in a number of different roles, including linebackers coach (1996), defensive coordinator (1997-99), assistant head coach/defensive coordinator (2000-02, 2005) and assistant head coach/linebackers (2003-04). As NDSU's defensive coordinator in 2005, the Bison led the Great West Football Conference in scoring defense, pass defense, total defense and turnover margin.

A native of Zumbrota, Minn., Bradley played at North Dakota State from 1984 to 1988 as a safety and punter. He was a four-time academic All-North Central Conference selection and a part of three NCAA Division II Football Championships (1984, 1987-88). He earned bachelor's degrees in business administration (1989) and physical education (1990) from North Dakota State as well as a master's degree in athletic administration in 1992.

Bradley and his wife, Michaela, have four children: Carter, Anna, Eli and Ella. Carter played quarterback at the University of South Alabama and has spent time in the NFL with the Las Vegas Raiders and San Francisco 49ers and is currently with the Jacksonville Jaguars.

# BRIAN DABOLL

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

NFL Coaching Experience: 26  
Titans Coaching Experience: 1

Brian Daboll was hired by the Tennessee Titans as offensive coordinator on Jan. 27, 2026.

Daboll is entering his 30th year in coaching and his 26th year in the NFL. His prior experience includes eight total seasons as an NFL offensive coordinator with the Cleveland Browns (2009-10), Miami Dolphins (2011), Kansas City Chiefs (2012) and Buffalo Bills (2018-21), as well as four years as the head coach of the New York Giants (2022-25).

Daboll holds the distinction of being the first coach to receive both the Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year Award (2022, New York Giants) and the AP NFL Assistant Coach of the Year Award (2020, Buffalo). He contributed to five Super Bowl championships during his time with the New England Patriots under head coach Bill Belichick (2000-06, 2013-16) and won a national championship on Nick Saban's staff at the University of Alabama (2017).

In 2025, Daboll helped guide the development of first-round rookie quarterback Jaxson Dart. In the 10 games Daboll served as head coach, Dart registered seven starts, completing 128-of-204 passes for 1,417 yards and 10 touchdowns with three interceptions (93.5 passer rating). Dart, who also rushed for seven touchdowns during that span, was named a finalist for the AP Offensive Rookie of the Year Award.

The 2024 Giants offense set a number of franchise records. Rookie wide receiver Malik Nabers recorded 109 receptions for 1,204 yards and seven touchdowns. His 109 receptions established a rookie record for wide receivers, as well as surpassed the Giants single-season franchise record set by Steve Smith in 2009 (107 receptions). Nabers (1,206 yards) and rookie running back Tyrone Tracy Jr. (1,123 yards) became just the third rookie duo in NFL history to both surpass 1,000 yards from scrimmage. Nabers and third-year wide receiver Wan'Dale Robinson (93 receptions) became the first duo in Giants history to record 90-plus receptions each in a single season, and they were the only pair of teammates to achieve that accomplishment in the NFL in 2024.

In 2023, numerous Giants players suffered injuries that sidelined them for multiple games, including quarterback Daniel Jones and running back Saquon Barkley. Rookie free agent quarterback Tommy DeVito started six games in Jones' absence and won half of them, leading the Giants to victories at Washington and in home games against New England and Green Bay. DeVito was the first Giants rookie quarterback to win three consecutive starts since Phil Simms won four in a row in 1979, and he was only the third undrafted rookie quarterback since the 1970 merger to win three starts in a season, joining Ed Rubbert, who won three strike-replacement games for Washington in 1987, and Pittsburgh's Devlin Hodges in 2019.

Daboll directed one of the most successful debut seasons in Giants history in 2022, capped by his Coach of the Year honors. After the Giants won four games in 2021, Daboll's 2022 team registered nine regular-season victories (9-7-1), the team's first playoff berth in six years, and its first postseason victory in 11 seasons. The Giants defeated the Minnesota Vikings in the NFC Wild Card Round. Daboll was the first Giants coach to be selected Coach of the Year since Jim Fassel in 1997, and he was the fifth Giants coach to be selected Coach of the Year since it was first awarded in 1957.

The Giants offense improved significantly in its first year under Daboll. Their 365 points were 107 more than they scored in 2021, while they averaged 333.9 yards a game, an increase of 46.6 yards per game. One year after averaging 99.3 rushing yards a game and 4.0 yards per carry, they finished fourth in the NFL with 148.2 rushing yards a game and fifth with 4.8 yards a carry. Jones and Barkley had their finest statistical seasons as Giants. Jones' 3,205 passing yards set a career high, as did his 92.5 passer rating, and his 67.16 completion percentage was a Giants' single-season record. With only five total interceptions, a career low, his 1.1 percent interception rate led the NFL and set a franchise record. Barkley was selected to his second Pro Bowl and was one of three players nominated for the NFL



Comeback Player of the Year award. He had then-career-high totals of 295 carries for 1,312 yards – the NFL's fourth-highest total – and rushed for 10 touchdowns. Barkley was also the team's co-leader with 57 receptions and was seventh in the NFL with 1,650 scrimmage yards.

Daboll joined the Giants after spending the previous four seasons as the offensive coordinator of the Bills. He devised the game plans and called the plays for one of the most productive offenses in the NFL, helping Buffalo earn three consecutive playoff berths, win two AFC East titles and an AFC Championship Game appearance in 2020.

Daboll also oversaw the development of Bills quarterback Josh Allen, the seventh overall selection in the 2018 NFL Draft. Allen became the first player in history with 100 passing touchdowns and 30 rushing scores in his first four years. In his last two seasons working with Daboll (2020-21), Allen threw 73 touchdown passes against just 24 interceptions.

During Daboll's final season in Buffalo, the Bills won their second consecutive AFC East crown with an 11-6 record. The offense finished third in the NFL with 28.4 points per game and fifth with 381.9 yards per game. Allen finished sixth in the league with a franchise-record 409 completions, seventh with 36 touchdown passes and eighth with 4,407 yards. His primary target, wide receiver Stefon Diggs, caught 103 passes for 1,225 yards and 10 touchdowns.

Daboll was voted the 2020 AP NFL Assistant Coach of the Year after the Bills finished 13-3 and Allen finished second in NFL MVP voting after setting Buffalo single-season franchise records with 4,544 yards, 37 touchdown passes, a 69.2 completion percentage and a 107.2 passer rating.

After Daboll joined the Bills and Allen was drafted in 2018, their second season together resulted in the offense scoring 45 more points and the team winning four more games in 2019 to earn a wild card berth.

In 2017, Daboll returned to collegiate coaching for the first time in 18 years when he became the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Alabama, which finished 13-1 and earned its 17th national championship. The Crimson Tide averaged 38.8 points and 455.3 yards of total offense in Daboll's one season in Tuscaloosa, where Daboll coached future NFL quarterbacks Jalen Hurts, Tua Tagovailoa and Mac Jones.

Daboll joined the Crimson Tide after a second stint with the Patriots that lasted four years (2013-16). He spent a total of 11 seasons in New England and helped the team win Super Bowls XXXVI, XXXVIII, XXXIX, XLIX and LI.

Daboll was an offensive assistant in 2013 before coaching the Patriots' tight ends for the next three seasons. Under his tutelage, Rob Gronkowski was selected first-team All-Pro in 2014 and 2015. The following season, Gronkowski and Martellus Bennett combined for 80 receptions, 1,241 yards and 10 touchdowns.



In 2012, Daboll served on the Kansas City Chiefs staff as offensive coordinator. The Chiefs finished fifth in the NFL with an average of 149.7 rushing yards a game, highlighted by Pro Bowl running back Jamaal Charles ranking fourth in the NFL with 1,509 yards with five touchdowns and an average of 5.3 yards a carry.

In 2011, Daboll was the offensive coordinator in Miami, which improved from 30th in total offense the year before his arrival to 20th during his one season with the team. The Dolphins team had both a 1,000-yard rusher and 1,000-yard receiver for the first time in franchise history as Reggie Bush ran for 1,086 yards and Brandon Marshall totaled 1,214 receiving yards while catching a team-high 81 passes.

Prior to joining the Dolphins, Daboll served as Cleveland's offensive coordinator during the 2009 and 2010 campaigns. The Browns offense saw dramatic improvement in the second half of the 2009 season. Cleveland scored 11.1 more points per game, was 20.8 percent better in the red zone, converted on 14.7 percent more third downs and averaged 1.9 fewer turnovers per game during the final eight games of the season. The 2010 season saw the Browns improve 12 spots to rank eighth in the NFL in rushing offense, averaging 130.4 yards per game.

Daboll coached quarterbacks during his two seasons with the New York Jets (2007-08). He helped Pro Football Hall of Fame quarterback Brett Favre pick up the Jets offense after the signal-caller came out of retirement. In his one season under Daboll, Favre was named to the AFC Pro Bowl

team and had the second-highest completion percentage of his career (65.7). Daboll also helped the Jets improve from the NFL's 25th-ranked scoring offense in his first season to No. 9 in the following year, averaging 25.3 points per game.

Daboll's first stint in New England began in 2000, which was his first of two seasons as a defensive assistant for head coach Bill Belichick. From 2002-06, he coached the Patriots' wide receivers. Daboll helped Deion Branch earn Super Bowl XXXIX MVP honors in the Patriots' victory against Philadelphia following the 2004 season, as Branch became the first wide receiver to win the honor since San Francisco's Jerry Rice in Super Bowl XXIII after the 1988 season.

Prior to entering the NFL, Daboll began his coaching career with three years in the college ranks. He spent the 1997 season as a volunteer assistant at the College of William & Mary before serving two seasons (1998-99) as a graduate assistant for Saban at Michigan State.

A 1997 graduate of the University of Rochester with a degree in economics, he was a two-year starter at safety for the Yellowjackets and intercepted three passes against Case Western during his junior season.

Daboll was born in Welland, Ontario, Canada, a suburb of Niagara Falls. He was raised by his grandparents and mother in West Seneca, N.Y., and lettered in football at Saint Francis High School in Athol Springs, N.Y.

Daboll and his wife, Beth, have six children: Mark, Christian, Aiden, Haven, Avery and Luke.

# JOHN FASSEL

**ASSISTANT HEAD COACH/SPECIAL TEAMS  
COORDINATOR**

**NFL Coaching Experience: 22**

**Titans Coaching Experience: 2**

John Fassel is in his second season with the Titans and his 22nd season coaching in the NFL. He was hired as special teams coordinator in 2025 and was then promoted in 2026 to assistant head coach/special teams coordinator.

Prior to joining the Titans, Fassel spent five years as special teams coordinator with the Dallas Cowboys (2020-24). He also coordinated special teams for the St. Louis/Los Angeles Rams (2012-19) and Oakland Raiders (2009-11).

In 17 seasons as an NFL special teams coordinator, 12 different players under Fassel – comprised of punters, kickers, long snappers, returners and special teams players – have accounted for a total of 22 Pro Bowl selections. At least one player under his direction has earned a Pro Bowl berth in 13 of his 17 seasons as a coordinator.

During his first season in Tennessee, Fassel guided the Titans to top 10 finishes in punt return average (second at 16.6 yards per return), opponent kickoff return average (seventh, 24.9) and opponent net punting average (second, 37.1).

Fourth-round rookie Chimere Dike earned 2025 first-team Associated Press All-Pro honors and was named to the Pro Bowl after leading the NFL with a 17.3-yard average on punt returns. Dike broke Billy “White Shoes” Johnson’s 1977 franchise record of 15.4 yards per punt return, and he also established a franchise record with 1,588 total kickoff return yards, averaging 25.6 yards per attempt. He was the NFL’s first player since Detroit’s Jack Christiansen in 1952 (21.5 punt return average and 25.6 kickoff return average) to qualify with an average 17.0-plus yards per punt return and 25.0-plus yards per kickoff return in a season.

Fassel’s first year in Tennessee coincided with the arrivals of Dike, kicker Joey Slye and punter Johnny Hekker. Slye made 28 field goals, including a team-record nine field goals of at least 50 yards, breaking Stephen Gostkowski’s record of seven such field goals in 2020. In only one season, Slye booted four of the eight longest field goals in franchise history (58, 57, 57 and 56 yards). Meanwhile, Hekker averaged 40.3 net yards on 78 punts, becoming the franchise’s third all-time punter to record a net average of 40.0 yards or better with at least 75 punts in a season, joining Brett Kern (five times) and Ryan Stonehouse (2022). The 2025 campaign was also Fassel’s first with Titans long snapper Morgan Cox, the team’s special teams captain, who handled all of the team’s long snapping duties for the fifth consecutive season.

Fassel arrived in Dallas in 2020, and from that point through the end of the 2024 campaign, the Cowboys consistently ranked among the NFL leaders in several special teams categories. They were fifth in gross punting average (48.3 yards per punt), fourth in net punting average (43.2 net yards per punt), second in kickoff return average (26.4 yards per return), first in total kick/punt return touchdowns (five), first in field goals made (168) and third in kickoff touchback percentage (74.0).

Three players coached by Fassel in Dallas earned a total of six Pro Bowl selections: punter Bryan Anger (2021 and 2023), returner KaVontae Turpin (2022 and 2024) and kicker Brandon Aubrey (2023 and 2024). Each member of the trio also enjoyed Associated Press All-Pro recognition under Fassel, with Anger taking second-team honors in 2021 and 2023, Turpin garnering first-team honors in 2024, and Aubrey named first-team All-Pro in 2023 and second-team All-Pro in 2024.

In 2024, the Cowboys set an all-time NFL record with an average of 32.1 yards per kickoff return (1,091 yards on 34 returns). Turpin averaged a league-best 33.5 yards per kickoff return and scored touchdowns on a 99-yard kickoff return and a 60-yard punt return. Aubrey ranked second in field goals made (40), including a league-high 14 field goals of 50-plus yards. Meanwhile, the team’s coverage units ranked 11th in opponent kickoff return average (27.1).

The 2023 season marked the second straight year that the Cowboys signed a kicker in the summer prior to preseason, as Dallas added Aubrey, a former



soccer player and USFL kicker, to compete for the kicking job in training camp. Under Fassel, Aubrey set the franchise record for most points in a single season and most points in a first season in NFL history with 157. Aubrey also established the NFL record for consecutive field goals made without a miss to start a career, connecting on 35 straight field goals before his first miss, and led the NFL with 36 made kicks on the year, finishing third in the league with a 94.7 field goal percentage. He became the first Cowboys kicker to win NFC Special Teams Player of the Month (October and December) since Richie Cunningham in 1997 and established a team record with 10 field goals of 50-plus yards on the year, capping off 2023 with a Pro Bowl berth and first-team All-Pro honors.

Anger also had a career year in 2023, earning his second career Pro Bowl nod under Fassel. The punter set single-season franchise records with a 44.9 net average and led the NFL with a 51.4 gross average.

Midway through 2022 training camp, Dallas tried out multiple kickers in Oxnard, Calif., and signed Brett Maher, a veteran kicker who spent 2018 and most of the 2019 season with the Cowboys. Fassel helped Maher have a career season, making 29 of 32 field goals for a career-high 90.6 field goal percentage. Maher’s nine 50-plus yard field goals in 2022 were the second most in a season in team history. He also racked up 137 kicking points, second in franchise history and tied for the third-most in the NFL in 2022. One other valuable addition in training camp was Turpin. The rookie wide receiver/return specialist finished the 2022 campaign fifth in punt return average (10.4) and was the only NFL player with a 50-yard kick return and 50-yard punt return. Turpin earned his first Pro Bowl selection and became the first player in Cowboys history to be named to the Pro Bowl as a return specialist.

In 2021, Fassel’s special teams unit was one of the most effective groups in the NFL, highlighted by a league-high three blocked punts—two of which were recovered for a touchdown. Fassel’s unit also led the NFL with four total blocked kicks (three punts, one PAT) while tallying an NFL-high three special teams touchdowns. Fassel had a major influence in signing Anger in free agency prior to the 2021 season. Under Fassel in 2021, Anger was selected to his first career Pro Bowl after leading the NFL and setting a then-team record with a 44.6 net average, which was also the fourth-highest in NFL history. Anger also established the then-franchise record in gross average (48.4).

In 2020, Fassel helped Dallas secure kicker Greg Zuerlein, a player Fassel coached through his entire tenure with the Rams. Zuerlein was 34-of-41 on field goals and 33-of-36 on extra points, allowing him to set the club record for field goal attempts in a season, tie for the most field goals made and tie for second in single-season points (135). Tony Pollard settled in as the kickoff returner for Dallas, and he tied for second in the league with 32



returns, was fourth with 766 yards and eighth with an average of 23.9 yards-per-return.

In 2019, the Rams special teams unit returned two of the NFL's top specialists in Zuerlein and punter Johnny Hekker. Zuerlein's 24 field goals (24-of-33) tied for fourth in his career, and he connected on all 42 PAT tries. Called on for only 66 punts in 2019, Hekker finished third in the NFL with a 47.4 gross average and seventh with a 42.4 net, along with 22 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line and a long of 71 yards (second-longest of his career).

Fassel's group continued to flourish in 2018 in all four phases of special teams, despite using multiple kickers and returners during the regular season. Cory Littleton blocked a pair of punts and posted an additional deflected punt en route to earning his first career Pro Bowl selection. It marked the ninth Rams special teams Pro Bowl selection since Fassel took over in 2012. Zuerlein converted a 57-yard game-winning field goal in overtime of the NFC Championship game to send the Rams to the Super Bowl, marking the longest game-winning kick in playoff history.

In 2017, four Rams special teamers were named to the Pro Bowl: returner Pharoah Cooper, Hekker, long snapper Jake McQuaide and Zuerlein. Zuerlein led the league in scoring (158 points) despite playing only 14 games before going on the reserve/injured list.

In 2016, Hekker earned his third trip to the Pro Bowl after setting an NFL record with 51 punts downed inside the 20. He also established an NFL record for single-season net punting average (46.0), breaking the previous record that Hekker himself set in 2013. McQuaide became the first long snapper in franchise history to earn a Pro Bowl berth. From 2013-17, Benny Cunningham averaged 27.1 yards-per-kickoff return, a franchise career record. In addition to his special teams duties, Fassel served as interim head coach for the final three games in 2016.

In 2015, Hekker produced one of the best punting seasons in NFL history to earn his second Pro Bowl honor. The fourth-year pro led the NFL in punts (96), gross average (47.9), net average (43.7) and punts downed inside the 20-yard line (41), becoming the first player to lead the league in all three categories since the NFL began tracking punts inside the 20 in 1976.

In Fassel's 2014 campaign, his units finished among the league's best in several categories. As a team, St. Louis was fifth in net punt average (41.8) and second in punt return average (13.0). The team's net punting average was the third-highest ever by a Rams special teams unit. Individually, Tavon

Austin finished fifth in punt return average (11.2) and was an alternate to the Pro Bowl, while Cunningham led the NFC and was fifth in the NFL in kick return average (27.5).

In 2013, Fassel's punt team, led by Hekker, set a single-season NFL record for net punting average (44.2) and was named first-team All-Pro along with his first trip to the Pro Bowl. Zuerlein connected on the first 15 field goal attempts of his career and set a team record with eight field goals from 50-plus yards.

Fassel spent a total of four seasons with the Raiders as assistant special teams coordinator (2008) and special teams coordinator (2009-11). While with the Raiders, his units led the NFL in takeaways, turnover differential and points scored in 2009 and 2010. Under Fassel's tutelage, punter Shane Lechler earned a Pro Bowl spot three consecutive years. In addition, Sebastian Janikowski achieved a single-season career-high 89.7 field goal percentage, missing only three attempts (47, 57 and 66 yards) in 2011. Janikowski also converted the then-third-longest field goal in NFL history, a team-record 61-yarder at Cleveland in December 2009 and tied a then NFL record with a 63-yarder in 2011. Additionally, long snapper Jon Condo earned two Pro Bowl berths.

From 2005 to 2007, Fassel was Baltimore's assistant special teams coach and helped the team to top-10 finishes in punt and kick return average from 2006 to 2007.

From 2003 to 2004, he was the head coach and assistant athletic director at New Mexico Highlands University. Fassel also served six months as the school's interim athletic director and taught undergraduate and graduate courses. He earned a master's degree in athletic administration at Idaho State, where he was a graduate assistant and sports science instructor from 2000 to 2001. In 1999 and 2001, Fassel coached wide receivers and recruited for Bucknell. In Spring 2000, Fassel was the strength & conditioning and wide receivers coach for the Amsterdam Admirals of NFL Europe.

Fassel played wide receiver at Weber State, graduating in 1999 with a degree in exercise science. He signed as a rookie free agent wide receiver with the Indianapolis Colts.

Fassel is the son of late NFL coach Jim Fassel, who guided the New York Giants to the Super Bowl during the 2000 season. John is a triathlete who has finished three Ironman distance triathlons. He and his wife, Elizabeth, have three daughters: Lilah, Avery and Anna.

# BEN BLOOM

SENIOR DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT

NFL Coaching Experience: 18

Titans Coaching Experience: 3

Bloom is in his third season with the Titans and his 18th season coaching in the NFL. He arrived in 2024 as outside linebackers coach after spending the previous four campaigns with the Cleveland Browns, and he became senior defensive assistant in 2026.

During the 2025 campaign, Bloom's outside linebackers unit helped the Titans defense tie for 12th place in the NFL in sacks (42) and tie for seventh over the final 10 weeks of the season (26).

In 2024, Bloom helped outside linebackers Harold Landry III (9.0 sacks) and Arden Key (6.5) rank first and second in sacks on the team, respectively, and combine for 15.5 sacks. Key's total tied a career high. Landry was one of three NFL players in 2024 that recorded at least 70 tackles and 15 tackles for loss (Andrew Van Ginkel and Brian Burns).

During his most recent stint with the Browns, Bloom served as senior defensive assistant in 2020, run game coordinator in 2021 and 2022, and defensive line coach in 2023. He broke into the NFL with the Browns from 2009 to 2010 and then worked nine seasons on the Dallas Cowboys staff (2011-19) before heading back to Cleveland.

In 2023, Bloom worked with Browns defensive end Myles Garrett, who was named the AP Defensive Player of the Year after leading the Browns and tying for seventh in the NFL with 14 sacks. As a unit, the Browns led the NFL in total defense (270.2 opponent yards per game), passing defense (164.7) and third-down defense (29.1 percent).

Garrett was named to the Pro Bowl every season from 2020 to 2023 and was named to the AP All-Pro first team in 2020, 2021 and 2023. He garnered second-team honors in 2022. His 16 sacks in 2021 established the franchise record, and he matched the mark during the following campaign.

In 2021, the Browns finished fifth in the NFL in total defense, allowing 311.5 yards per contest. It was the third time since 1970 the team finished in the top-five and the club's highest finish since 1987.

In 2020, the Browns finished ninth in the league in run defense (110.8 opponent rushing yards per game), a dramatic improvement from 30th place in 2019.

Bloom was the linebackers coach for the Cowboys in his final two seasons with the organization (2018-19) and was instrumental in a pair of young

standouts earning Pro Bowl honors. In 2018, he helped develop first-rounder Leighton Vander Esch, who became the first rookie linebacker in Cowboys history to be named to the Pro Bowl after leading the defense with a franchise-rookie-record 176 tackles. Vander Esch added second-team AP All-Pro honors. Then, in 2019, linebacker Jaylon Smith was selected to his first career Pro Bowl after leading Dallas with a career-high 142 tackles.

In 2016 and 2017, Bloom served on the Cowboys staff as the club's assistant coach/special projects. He advised the head coach on the game plan, personnel group strategies, film and statistical analysis, game management and situational football strategy.

Coaching defensive ends in 2015, Bloom helped DeMarcus Lawrence pace the Cowboys with eight sacks while finishing second on the defense with 31 pressures. Along with Greg Hardy's six sacks, the pass rushing duo accounted for 14 of the club's 31 sacks on the year.

With Bloom working as assistant defensive line/defensive ends coach for the Cowboys in 2014, Jeremy Mincey led the club with six sacks and 39 quarterback pressures.

Bloom initially joined the Cowboys staff in 2011 as defensive quality control/assistant linebackers coach, working alongside linebackers coach Matt Eberflus. He served in that capacity through 2013. DeMarcus Ware and Anthony Spencer earned Pro Bowl berths in 2012 with 11.5 and 11.0 sacks, respectively. Ware also garnered Pro Bowl and first-team All-Pro recognition in 2011 and second-team All-Pro honors in 2012.

In 2009, Bloom's first season with the Browns, he was an assistant in team operations and quality control. He then moved to a defensive assistant role in 2010.

Prior to entering the NFL, Bloom spent four years in the college coaching ranks, lastly as the assistant defensive line coach at Harvard University in 2008. That followed three years (2005-07) as defensive line/graduate assistant at Tufts University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in history in 2005 and master's in education in 2008.

A native of Wellesley, Mass., Bloom was a three-year letter winner on the Tufts offensive line.

He and his wife, Eliot, have a son, Bern, and two daughters, Georgia and Edie.

# DAVE BORGONZI

## LINEBACKERS

NFL Coaching Experience: 16  
Titans Coaching Experience: 1

Dave Borgonzi arrived in Tennessee during the 2026 offseason with 15 years of NFL coaching experience and 20 total years of coaching experience.

He spent the 2025 campaign as the linebackers coach with the Dallas Cowboys, where he launched his NFL coaching career from 2011 to 2013. His stops also included the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2014-17), Indianapolis Colts (2018-21) and Chicago Bears (2022-24).

The 2025 Cowboys defense featured five different inside linebackers who started at least five games: Kenneth Murray Jr., fifth-round rookie Shemar James, Jack Sanborn, DeMarvion Overshown and Marist Liufau. Murray and James ranked first and second on the team with 81 and 80 tackles, respectively, with James' total finishing fifth among all rookie inside linebackers.

As the linebackers coach in Chicago, Borgonzi helped elevate a Bears defense that was one of the best in the league in 2023. Chicago's 86.4 rushing yards allowed per game and 1,468 total rushing yards allowed on the season were both the fewest in the NFL. The Bears became just the seventh NFL team since 1970, and third since 2000, to go from last or second to last in rush defense to the top five the following season. Chicago allowed only one 100-yard rusher during the entire 2023 campaign (Week 18 - Aaron Jones, 111).

While in Chicago, Borgonzi was instrumental in the development of T.J. Edwards and Tremaine Edmunds. In 2023, Edwards finished seventh in the NFL with 153 tackles, which was third on the Bears single-season tackle list (since 1991).

Before Chicago, Borgonzi spent four seasons with the Indianapolis Colts.

While in Indianapolis, the Colts were the only NFL defensive unit to be ranked in the top 10 in scoring defense, run defense and takeaways in each of the 2020 and 2021 seasons. The Colts also finished in the top 10 in the league in run defense and takeaways in all four of Borgonzi's seasons as linebackers coach. Borgonzi helped mentor four-time All-Pro and three-time Pro Bowl linebacker Shaquille Leonard into one of the most productive players at his position.

Prior to his four-year stint with Indianapolis, Borgonzi served as defensive quality control/assistant linebackers coach at Tampa Bay for four seasons (2014-17). In 2016, the Buccaneers defense forced 29 takeaways, the third-highest mark in the league.

Borgonzi embarked on his NFL coaching career with the Cowboys as a coaching assistant, starting out on the defensive side of the ball, specifically with the secondary (2011-12). In 2013, he became an offensive assistant, spending most of his time with the offensive line.

Before the NFL, Borgonzi began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Syracuse University, working with the secondary and defensive line, all while earning his master's degree in education. He then moved on to Harvard, where he served as the defensive backs coach from 2008 to 2010.

A native of Everett, Mass., Borgonzi graduated from Amherst College with a degree in law, jurisprudence and social thought. He was a former inside linebacker at Amherst, starting three seasons. He was named team captain during his senior year.

He and his wife, Alyssa, have a daughter, Gianna, and a son, James. His brother, Mike Borgonzi, serves as the Titans general manager.

# CARMEN BRICILLO

## OFFENSIVE LINE

NFL Coaching Experience: 8  
Titans Coaching Experience: 1

Carmen Bricillo was hired by the Titans in 2026 after coaching the New York Giants offensive line in 2024 and 2025. He arrived in Tennessee with seven years of NFL coaching experience after spending 14 campaigns in the college ranks.

With Bricillo coaching the Giants offensive line in 2025, the team boasted the NFL's fifth-ranked rushing offense, averaging 129.1 rushing yards per game. The line protected rookie quarterback Jaxson Dart, whose 91.7 passer rating led all rookies in 2025 and established a Giants rookie record among qualifiers.

In his first season as the offensive line coach for the Giants, Bricillo led a unit that allowed 48 sacks, the fewest by a Giants team since 2021 (38) and a significant decrease from the 85 allowed in 2023. In Weeks 17 and 18, the Giants line did not allow any sacks, making it the first time since 2021 that the offense did not give up a sack in back-to-back games. The Giants achieved this despite starting 10 different offensive line combinations (tied for the most in the league) throughout the season due to injuries.

Bricillo spent the 2022 and 2023 seasons as the line coach of the Las Vegas Raiders. Only 11 teams allowed fewer sacks in 2023 than the Raiders, whose quarterbacks were sacked 40 times. On Dec. 14, the Raiders set a franchise record for points in a 63-21 victory over the Los Angeles Chargers.

In 2022, despite starting seven different offensive line combinations and not having a consistent front five until Week 5, Bricillo led an offensive line unit that only allowed 35 sacks, tied for the ninth fewest in the NFL. Bricillo's unit helped the Raiders rush for 2,059 yards, their most in a single season since 2011. Raiders rushers were stuffed for a loss or no gain an NFL-low 68 times. Josh Jacobs led the NFL in rushing with 1,653 yards.

Bricillo began his NFL coaching career with the New England Patriots in 2019, serving as a coaching assistant before being promoted to offensive line coach in 2020-21. During Bricillo's three years in New England, the

Patriots earned one AFC East title and two playoff berths.

In 2021, Bricillo helped the Patriots finish eighth in the NFL in rushing yards per game (126.5) and sixth in points per game (27.2). Bricillo's line helped Damien Harris, set career highs with 202 carries for 929 yards and 15 touchdowns. Collectively, the Patriots recorded 24 rushing touchdowns, tied for the third most in franchise history.

Bricillo's group helped the Patriots finish fourth in the NFL with 146.6 rushing yards per game in 2020, the franchise's highest figure since 1983.

From 2010-18, Bricillo spent nine years coaching the offensive line at Youngstown State. During his time with the program, Bricillo coached 15 All-Missouri Valley Conference selections and the Penguins advanced to the 2016 NCAA FCS National Championship Game.

Prior to his time at Youngstown State, Bricillo spent the 2009 season as an offensive assistant at Illinois and worked at Akron as director of video services in 2006 and as a coaching assistant from 2007 to 2008. Bricillo helped with the offensive line at Illinois and worked with the tackles and tight ends as a coaching assistant at Akron.

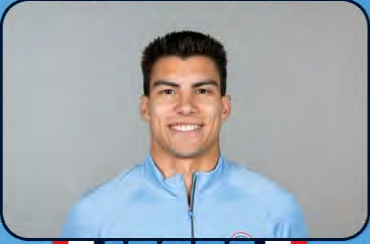
Bricillo began his collegiate coaching career at his alma mater, Duquesne, as the offensive line coach in 2005. The Dukes had a 7-3 record and won a conference title that season, and four of Bricillo's linemen earned all-conference honors.

Prior to joining the staff at Duquesne, Bricillo spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Indiana (Pa.) Area High School.

Bricillo is a native of Shelocta, Pa. He played center at Duquesne, where he was selected first-team all-conference in 1995 and 1996. Bricillo earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Duquesne and a master's degree in sports science and coaching from Akron.

Bricillo and his wife, Megan, have a daughter, Rilyn, and a son, Luca.

# TREVOR BROWDER

## OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

Trevor Browder was hired by the Titans into a full-time coaching role as an offensive assistant prior to the start of the 2024 season after initially arriving as a Bill Walsh Diversity Fellow for the 2024 offseason.

Browder’s main duties include assisting with the wide receivers. The 2025 Titans receiving corps included a pair of fourth-round rookie wideouts: Chimere Dike (48 receptions for 423 yards, four touchdowns) and Elic Ayomanor (41 for 515 yards, four touchdowns). They became the third rookie wide receiver duo in NFL history to each record 40 receptions, 400 receiving yards and four receiving touchdowns. The only previous occasions were 1960, when the Oilers duo of Charlie Hennigan and Bill Groman accomplished the feat, and 1999, when the Cleveland Browns’ Kevin Johnson and Darrin Chiaverini matched it.

In 2024, Titans wide receiver Calvin Ridley recorded his third career 1,000-yard season, leading the offense with 64 receptions and 1,017 receiving yards. Ridley’s 15.9-yard receiving average ranked fifth in the NFL among qualifiers. Only Ridley and Philadelphia’s A.J. Brown accumulated at least 60 receptions and 1,000 receiving yards while averaging at least 15.0 yards per catch in 2024. Also, Nick Westbrook-Ikhine’s team-best nine touchdown receptions tied for the ninth-highest total in the NFL.

Prior to joining the Titans, Browder was the senior offensive analyst for the University of Alabama Birmingham. He was promoted after spending the 2023 season as an offensive analyst.

In 2022, Browder worked as a defensive quality control coach for Indiana University.

Browder also worked as an offensive graduate assistant for Ball State University (2021) and an offensive student assistant for Marian University (2020).

Prior to joining the college ranks, Browder spent four years coaching high school football. From 2019 to 2020, Browder was at his alma mater, Cardinal Ritter (Indianapolis) High School. In 2019, he was the wide receivers and defensive backs coach before transitioning to be the defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach in 2020.

Browder began his coaching career at Danville (Ind.) High School coaching wide receivers.

Browder attended Marian University where he was a two-time MSFA Midwest League Champion and a member of the 2019 NAIA national runner-up team.

# DALTON HILLIARD

DEFENSIVE BACKS/NICKELS

Dalton Hilliard entered the NFL coaching ranks with the Titans in 2026 after spending 11 seasons on college staffs. He joined the Titans after a brief stint as the pass game coordinator and defensive backs coach at Colorado State from December 2025 to February 2026.

From 2022 through the 2025 campaign, he was at the University of Connecticut under head coach Jim Mora, first as secondary coach (2022-23) and then as passing game coordinator/secondary coach (2024-25). During each of Hilliard's final two seasons at Connecticut, the Huskies went 9-4 and earned a bowl berth.

In 2025, Huskies redshirt sophomore cornerback Cam Chadwick tied for 23rd in the country with four interceptions. Chadwick tied a school record with three interceptions in a single game against Alabama-Birmingham.

In his first season in Storrs, Hilliard's secondary collected nine of the team's 13 interceptions on the season, led by cornerback Tre Wortham, who finished with four on the year to rank among NCAA leaders. The UConn defense was 30th in the NCAA in passes intercepted and 24th in turnovers forced.

Hilliard spent the 2021 campaign coaching the secondary at Arkansas State before moving to Connecticut in 2022.

Hilliard spent the 2019 and 2020 seasons at Tennessee-Martin, first serving as the defensive pass game coordinator/cornerbacks coach in 2019 before being elevated to defensive pass game coordinator/secondary coach in 2020. Hilliard's first season with the program saw the Skyhawks rank first in the Ohio Valley Conference in pass defense efficiency while also pacing the league in scoring defense (19.5 points allowed per game).

Prior to his time at UT Martin, Hilliard was on staff at UCLA, where he served

under Chip Kelly in 2018 as a defensive and special teams analyst after spending 2015 through 2017 as defensive graduate assistant under Mora. As a graduate assistant, he spent time gaining experience at each of the linebacker, defensive line and secondary position groups. Additionally, he heavily assisted in recruiting and served as the defensive signal caller on gamedays.

Prior to his time at UCLA, he spent a year as the defensive backs coach and special teams coordinator at Punahou (Hawaii) High School.

Hilliard was a four-year letterman at UCLA, seeing action in 41 games while earning 27 starts. He tallied 114 tackles, 7.5 tackles for loss, four pass breakups, two forced fumbles and an interception in his career with the Bruins. As a senior, he was honored as the team's Tommy Prothro Award for Outstanding Special Teams Player of the Year and one of three Kenneth S. Washington Award winners for Outstanding Senior of the Year.

After his collegiate career, Hilliard signed as an undrafted free agent safety with the Chicago Bears in 2013. Following his stint in the NFL, he played professional football in Italy, leading Seamen Milano to the team's first Italian Super Bowl in 20 years.

Hilliard was born in Chicago, Ill., and moved multiple times during childhood due to his father's service in the United State Marine Corps. He lettered three seasons in his prep career at Punahou High School in Honolulu.

Hilliard graduated with a bachelor's degree in sociology from UCLA in 2013. He added a master's degree from UCLA in higher education and organizational change in 2017.

He is married to Katrina with three daughters: Naiya, Layla and Gianna.

# RANDY JORDAN

**RUNNING BACKS/BILL WALSH DIVERSITY  
COACHING FELLOWSHIP COORDINATOR**  
NFL Coaching Experience: 14  
Titans Coaching Experience: 3

Randy Jordan is in his third season as running backs coach with the Titans, his 14th season coaching in the NFL and his 24th year in coaching. In 2026, he gained the additional title of Bill Walsh diversity coaching fellowship coordinator. Prior to his coaching career, he enjoyed a nine-year NFL playing career as a running back.

Under Jordan's direction in 2025, Titans running back Tony Pollard rushed for a career-best 1,082 yards, marking the second consecutive season in which he set a career high in rushing yards. Pollard ranked sixth in the AFC in rushing yards (13th in the NFL) and became the fourth player in Titans/Oilers history to rush for 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons with the club, joining Earl Campbell (1978-81), Eddie George (1996-00) and Chris Johnson (2008-13).

In 2024, Jordan helped Pollard rank third in the AFC and tie for 12th in the NFL with a career-best 1,079 rushing yards on a career-high 260 carries. Both numbers led the team, as did his five rushing touchdowns. With an additional 238 yards on 41 receptions, Pollard produced a team-high 1,317 scrimmage yards—the second-best total of his career. Jordan also helped in the development of second-year running back Tyjae Spears, who had 536 scrimmage yards (312 rushing and 224 receiving).

Before joining the Titans, Jordan spent 10 seasons (2014-23) as the running backs coach for the Washington Commanders and added the title of senior offensive assistant in 2023.

The Commanders ranked seventh in the NFL in 2023 with an average of 4.43 rushing yards per attempt. Second-year running back Brian Robinson Jr. surpassed the 1,000-yard scrimmage mark for the first time in his career, leading the team with 733 rushing yards to go along with 368 receiving yards for a total of 1,101 scrimmage yards. Robinson also led the club with nine total touchdowns (five rushing and four receiving).

In 2022, Jordan aided the rookie development of Robinson Jr., who played in 12 games and had 205 carries for 797 yards and two rushing scores. Robinson Jr.'s average of 66.4 rushing yards per game was second among NFL rookie running backs. Fellow running back Antonio Gibson had five total touchdowns and reached 3,000 career scrimmage yards.

In 2021, Gibson reached 1,000 rushing yards for the first time in his career. The second-year player under Jordan's tutelage led the NFC with 258 rushing attempts and finished second in the conference with 1,037 rushing yards. He also had a career-high 1,331 scrimmage yards (1,037 rushing, 294 receiving) with 10 touchdowns (seven rushing, three receiving). Gibson's 21 offensive touchdowns in his first two NFL seasons were the most in franchise history, and he was the first Washington player with consecutive 10-touchdown seasons since running back Stephen Davis from 1999 to 2000.

In 2020, Jordan contributed to the development of Gibson in his rookie campaign as well as veteran running back J.D. McKissic. Under Jordan's direction, Gibson's 11 rushing touchdowns were the second most by a rookie in franchise history, and he became only the second Washington player to rush for 11 touchdowns and record 1,000-plus scrimmage yards in their rookie season (Alfred Morris). Gibson and McKissic each finished with over 950 scrimmage yards, marking the second time in franchise history two running backs achieved the feat, and the first time since 1983.

In 2019, Jordan directed a group of running backs that included veterans Adrian Peterson and Chris Thompson. Peterson finished this season with 1,040 scrimmage yards and rushed for five touchdowns. With 211 carries, Peterson became the sixth player in NFL history to tally 200 or more carries at 34 years or older. Thompson paced the Washington backs with 42 receptions for 378 yards, including a pair of seven-reception games (Weeks 1 and 14).

In 2018, Jordan was instrumental in Peterson having his best season since 2015. Peterson finished the season ranked fifth in rushing attempts (251), eighth in rushing yards (1,042) and third in fourth quarter rushing yards (332). Peterson also had the longest touchdown run of his career with a 90-

yarder against the Philadelphia Eagles in Week 13.

In 2017, while overseeing a group that was ravaged by injury, Jordan was called upon to prepare eight different running backs for game action, tied with Arizona for the most in the NFL. The group was particularly efficient as receivers out of the backfield, accounting for 885 receiving yards, the fourth most in the NFL and the most by a group of Washington running backs since 2000 (1,127). Jordan also presided over a breakout 2017 campaign for Chris Thompson, who led the squad in both rushing and receiving yards prior to suffering a season-ending injury in Week 11. Thompson recorded only the sixth season in franchise history with at least 275 rushing yards and at least 500 receiving yards and was one of six NFL players to accomplish the feat in 2017, though Thompson accomplished the feat in 10 games while the other five players all appeared in at least 15 contests.

Jordan's hard-nosed approach to the position was evident in the team's running backs in 2016, a year in which Washington gained 1,058 of its rushing yards after contact, second-most in the NFL. Jordan oversaw the development of rookie free agent Rob Kelley, who ascended to the starting role mid-year and finished the season as the team's leader in rushing attempts (168), rushing yards (704) and rushing touchdowns (six).

In 2015, Jordan oversaw a rotating stable of backs that included workhorse Alfred Morris (202 carries for 751 yards with one touchdown), third-round pick Matt Jones (144 carries for 490 yards with three touchdowns) and Thompson (gained 6.2 yards per carry on 35 attempts). The group also contributed heavily in pass protection, helping decrease the offense's sack total from 58 in 2014 to 27 in 2015.

In his first season in Washington in 2014, Jordan helped Morris earn his second consecutive Pro Bowl berth, making Morris the first Washington running back selected to consecutive Pro Bowls since Stephen Davis in 1999 and 2000. Morris joined Davis as the only backs in team history to record three consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons. Jordan's work was also evident in the play of fullback Darrel Young, who matched his career highs in rushing touchdowns (three) and receiving touchdowns (two) en route to a career-high five total touchdowns in 2014.

Before joining Washington, Jordan spent two years (2012-13) as the running backs coach at his alma mater, the University of North Carolina. In his first season with UNC in 2012, Jordan's Tar Heels averaged 193.8 rushing yards per game, the third most in the Atlantic Coast Conference and the program's highest average since 1994. Tailback Giovani Bernard produced one of the best seasons in UNC history in 2012, averaging 122.8 rushing yards per game to lead the ACC and rank 11th in the nation.

Jordan coached running backs at Texas A&M for four seasons from 2008 to 2011. In 2011, the Aggies averaged 199.1 rushing yards per game, which ranked fourth in the Big 12 Conference. Under Jordan's tutelage, Cyrus Gray was a three-time All-Big 12 performer and exited ranking third in conference history in all-purpose yards.

Jordan's first collegiate coaching position was at the University of Nebraska, where he served as the running backs coach for the Cornhuskers under head coach Bill Callahan from 2004 to 2007. Jordan coached a pair of 1,000-yard rushers in Cody Ross in 2004 and Marlon Lucky in 2007. He oversaw a committee of backs in 2006 that produced nearly 2,400 rushing yards and 26 rushing touchdowns, as an improved effort on the ground helped Nebraska improve from 107th in 2005 to 23rd nationally in rushing offense in 2006.

Jordan began his coaching career with the Oakland Raiders as a special teams assistant midway through the 2003 season.

As a running back in the NFL, Jordan appeared in 122 career games with the Raiders (1993, 1998-02) and Jacksonville Jaguars (1995-97), accumulating 152 rushing attempts for 574 yards and seven touchdowns, as well as 58 receptions for 596 yards and two scores. He holds the distinction of scoring the first touchdown in Jaguars history, a 71-yard reception against Cincinnati in 1995. Also a standout on special teams, he

registered 801 career kickoff return yards on 38 attempts and added 65 career special teams tackles. He was the recipient of the NFL Unsung Hero Award and the Ed Block Courage Award in 2001 and served as special teams captain for Oakland's AFC Championship team in 2002.

A native of Manson, N.C., Jordan attended the University of North Carolina

under head coach Mack Brown from 1989 to 1992. He earned three letters for the Tar Heels, rushing for 1,134 yards and nine touchdowns in his career, including 618 yards and seven touchdowns in 1991. He earned his bachelor's degree in speech communication in 1993.

He and his wife, Romonda, have a daughter, Raven, and two sons, Jalen and Justin.

Cade Knox is in his first season with the Titans and his sixth season in the NFL. He arrived in Tennessee following a four-year stint as offensive assistant/game manager with the New York Giants.

With the Giants, Knox worked under current Titans offensive coordinator Brian Daboll, who was the head coach of the Giants at the time. Among his duties, Knox helped Daboll by using analytics to inform in-game decision-making.

Knox spent the 2020 season with the Giants as a football data and innovation intern.

He is a 2020 graduate of Harvard University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in psychology. He began his collegiate career with the Crimson at quarterback before moving to wide receiver.

A native of Phoenix, Ariz., he was an all-section honorable mention quarterback and defensive back at Brophy College Prep.

# GREG LEWIS

WIDE RECEIVERS

NFL Coaching Experience: 12  
Titans Coaching Experience: 1

Greg Lewis is in his first season with the Titans and his 12th season coaching in the NFL following an eight-year NFL playing career (2003-10). He joined the Titans after a three-year stint as wide receivers coach with the Baltimore Ravens.

Lewis' three seasons with the Ravens (2023-25) coincided with wide receiver Zay Flowers's first three NFL seasons. During that span, Flowers totaled 237 receptions, ranking 11th in the NFL with 3,128 receiving yards and 13th in the league with 30 receptions of 25-plus yards. Flowers earned Pro Bowl honors in 2024 and 2025.

In 2025, Flowers notched his second consecutive 1,000-yard receiving season, establishing career highs with 86 receptions, 1,211 receiving yards and five touchdown catches (tied career high).

Among all wide receiver rooms in 2024, Lewis' unit led the NFL in yards per reception (15.5) and finished second in yards after the catch per reception (5.9). Flowers recorded 74 receptions for a then-career-high 1,059 yards and four scores, en route to becoming the first wideout in franchise history to earn Pro Bowl honors. Rashod Bateman set career highs in receiving yards (756) and touchdowns (nine).

Lewis guided a room in 2023 that included Nelson Agholor, Rashod Bateman, Odell Beckham Jr. and Flowers, who was a rookie. The receivers contributed to an offense that ranked fourth in scoring (28.4 points per game) and No. 6 in total yards (370.4 yards per game). Flowers registered franchise rookie records in receptions (77) and receiving yards (858).

Prior to his time with the Ravens, Lewis worked with the Chiefs running backs (2021-22) and wide receivers (2017-20).

In 2022, he helped the Chiefs to a victory in Super Bowl LVII. Kansas City's rushing attack tied (Chicago and Minnesota) for the NFL's seventh-most rushing touchdowns (18) and posted the league's eighth-highest yards-per-carry average (4.7). Lewis oversaw the development of Isiah Pacheco, who finished fourth in rushing yards (830) and second in rushing touchdowns (five) among rookies. Against the Eagles in the Super Bowl, the Chiefs notched 158 rushing yards and one touchdown on 26 carries.

In 2021, Lewis guided a Chiefs rushing attack that posted the NFL's No. 7 yards-per-carry average (4.5) and also converted third-down rushes into first downs at the NFL's second-highest clip (69.8 percent). Running backs Clyde Edwards-Helaire and Darrel Williams formed one of three NFL tandems (Denver's Melvin Gordon and Javonte Williams; Green Bay's A.J. Dillon and Aaron Jones) to each produce at least 500 rushing yards, four rushing touchdowns and multiple touchdown receptions.

Coaching Kansas City's wide receivers in 2020, Lewis' receivers contributed to an offense that boasted the NFL's most receiving yards (5,005) and yards after the catch (2,461), while tying for the third-most touchdown grabs (40). Wide receiver Tyreek Hill earned All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors during a campaign that saw him tie the Chiefs' single-season record for receiving touchdowns (15), while tallying the NFL's eighth-most receiving yards (1,276). The Chiefs finished as AFC Champions for the second-straight year.

In 2019, Kansas City's wide receivers posted a 14.9 yards-per-reception average (sixth), 1,046 yards after the catch (third) and 21 receiving touchdowns (third), while Mecole Hardman ranked No. 1 in the NFL with an

average of 20.7 yards per reception. Kansas City defeated San Francisco to win Super Bowl LIV.

In 2018, Chiefs wideouts recorded the NFL's third-highest yards-per-reception average (14.4) and second-most touchdown grabs (25) for the league's highest scoring offense (35.3) and best total offense (425.6). Tyreek Hill set a single-season franchise record with 1,479 receiving yards along with 12 touchdowns, which both ranked fourth in the NFL.

In 2017, Kansas City's wide receivers averaged 13.8 yards per reception (sixth) and a league-high 5.8 yards after the catch for the NFL's fifth-best total offense (375.4).

Lewis' first full-time NFL coaching job was as an offensive assistant with the New Orleans Saints in 2015, and in 2016 he was the wide receivers coach with the Philadelphia Eagles.

Lewis was a wide receivers coach at the college level for three total seasons (2012-14) before re-entering the NFL as a coach on a full-time basis. In 2014, he was at the University of Pittsburgh and tutored wide receiver Tyler Boyd, who ranked second in the Atlantic Coast Conference with 1,261 yards, earning a first-team All-ACC honors. Boyd was later selected by the Cincinnati Bengals in the second round (55th overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft.

Coaching the San Jose State wide receivers in 2013, Lewis helped Chandler Jones become a first-team All-Mountain West selection after posting 79 receptions for 1,356 yards and a single-season school-record 15 touchdowns. Tyler Winston finished with 58 receptions for 858 yards, including an FBS freshman-high four 100-yard receiving games, en route to being named Mountain West Freshman of the Year.

Lewis' first year in coaching was in 2012 with the University of San Diego. He led a group of wideouts that totaled 2,287 yards, 182 receptions and 21 touchdowns to help the Toreros finish 8-3 overall, including 7-1 in the Pioneer Football League, and win their second-consecutive league championship.

Also in 2012, Lewis was a Bill Walsh Minority Coaching Fellow with the Philadelphia Eagles during training camp and preseason.

Lewis enjoyed an eight-year NFL playing career with the Philadelphia Eagles (2003-08) and Minnesota Vikings (2009-10). In 116 career games (29 starts), he totaled 152 receptions for 1,992 yards (13.1 avg.) and eight touchdowns. His time with the Eagles was highlighted by a 30-yard fourth quarter touchdown reception in Super Bowl XXXIX. In his first game with the Vikings (Sept. 27, 2009), he made a 32-yard tightrope catch in the back of the end zone with two seconds left to lift Minnesota past the San Francisco 49ers, 27-24, and the catch went on to earn Lewis a share of the ESPY Award for "Best Play" with then-Vikings quarterback Brett Favre.

Lewis appeared in 44 games over four years (1999-2002) as a standout walk-on for the University of Illinois, tallying 103 receptions for 1,456 yards (14.1 avg.) and 12 scores. As a junior in 2001, he helped the Fighting Illini to a 12-2 record, the Big Ten championship and a berth in the Sugar Bowl.

Lewis earned his degree in speech communications from Illinois in 2002.

The Chicago native prepped at Rich South (Richton Park, Ill.) High School, where his No. 8 jersey was retired in 2004.

He and his wife have four children.

# MARQUAND MANUEL

## DEFENSIVE BACKS/SAFETIES

Marquand Manuel is in his first season with the Titans and his 14th season coaching in the NFL following an eight-year NFL playing career as a safety. He joined the Titans after a one-year stint with the New York Giants.

Manuel's role with the Giants in 2025 was secondary coach/pass game coordinator. Seven members of the secondary started at least six contests, including second-year cornerback Dru Phillips, who led the Giants defense with 12 passes defended and tied for the team lead with two interceptions. Cornerback Cor'Dale Flott set career highs with 14 starts and 11 passes defended.

Manuel served as the defensive backs/safeties coach for the New York Jets from 2021 through 2024. Over his final three seasons with the club, the Jets defense ranked in the top five in fewest passing yards allowed per game, including the second-best mark in the NFL in 2023 (168.3).

Manuel guided a Jets safeties group in 2023 that recorded 10 interceptions, the second-most in the NFL. Safety Jordan Whitehead led the club with four interceptions, followed by fellow safeties Ashtyn Davis and Tony Adams, who had three apiece.

Before his time with the Jets, Manuel was the defensive backs coach for the Philadelphia Eagles in 2020.

Manuel served as the defensive coordinator of the Atlanta Falcons from 2017 to 2018 after spending the 2015 and 2016 seasons as the secondary coach/senior defensive assistant on staff. During his time as the defensive

coordinator, Atlanta had two players—outside linebacker Deion Jones and safety Keanu Neal—voted to the 2017 Pro Bowl.

While on Atlanta's staff in 2016, Manuel made a coaching appearance in Super Bowl LI after helping lead Atlanta to an 11-5 regular season record, an NFC South Division title and a first-round bye in the playoffs.

Manuel began his NFL coaching career as a special teams assistant with the Seattle Seahawks in 2012. He later was named a defensive assistant in 2013 and then an assistant secondary coach in 2014. In his three seasons in Seattle, the team appeared in two Super Bowls, including Super XLVIII, when Seattle defeated the Denver Broncos by a final score of 43-8.

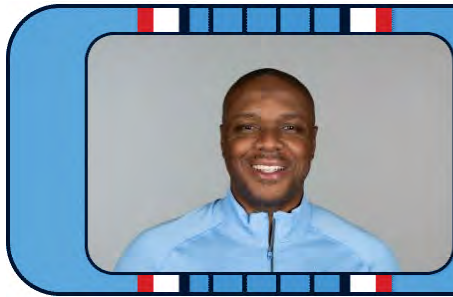
Selected by the Cincinnati Bengals in the sixth round (181st overall) of the 2002 NFL Draft, Manuel played eight seasons (2002-09) in the NFL. He totaled 116 games played with 58 starts and totaled 332 tackles, 16 passes defended and two interceptions during his time with Cincinnati, Seattle, Green Bay, Carolina, Denver and Detroit. He was a starter for the Seahawks against the Steelers in Super Bowl XL.

Manuel attended the University of Florida, where he totaled six interceptions, 308 tackles and eight sacks from 1998 to 2001. A three-year starter for the Gators, he served as a leader on Florida's SEC Championship team in 2000 that earned a berth in the Sugar Bowl.

While at Florida, he earned his bachelor's degree in criminology and law. The Miami, Fla., native has two children: Madison and Marquand II.

# TONY ODEN

DEFENSIVE PASS GAME

Tony Oden is in his second season with the Titans, his 23rd NFL coaching season and his 31st overall season in coaching. He was hired by the team in 2025 as defensive pass game coordinator/cornerbacks coach and retains the title for 2026.

During Oden's first campaign in Tennessee, eight different players started at least one game at cornerback, led by Darrell Baker Jr. and Jalyn Armour-Davis, who each started 10 contests. Additionally, sixth-round draft pick Marcus Harris saw significant playing time as a rookie, appearing in 14 games with five starts. Harris was one of 12 rookie NFL cornerbacks to start at least five games in 2025.

From 2021 through 2024, Oden served with the New York Jets as senior defensive assistant/cornerbacks coach, during which time Robert Saleh served as the head coach of the Jets. In Oden's his final season with the Jets, he helped the team rank third in the NFL in total defense (313.8 opponent yards per game) and fourth in passing defense (192.6 opponent net passing yards per game).

In each season from 2022 to 2024, the Jets defense ranked in the top five league-wide in yards allowed, and Oden helped cornerback Sauce Gardner become the first cornerback since the merger to be named first-team All-Pro in each of his first two seasons (2022-23), while also being selected as a Pro Bowl starter in each of his first two seasons.

In 2023, while Oden coached the trio of Gardner, D.J. Reed and Michael Carter II, the Jets placed second in passing defense (168.3), third in opponent completion percentage (60.0), third in opponent passer rating (76.0) and tied for eighth in interceptions (17).

During the 2022 season, Oden helped Gardner earn NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year, first-team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors, as Gardner became just the third rookie cornerback to start in the Pro Bowl since the merger. Additionally, Gardner became the first rookie in franchise history to receive first-team All-Pro honors. With Oden's guidance, Gardner became the only rookie in the NFL to produce at least one pass defended in each of his first seven games and finished first in the league in passes defended (20). Additionally, Oden guided both Reed and Carter as they set career highs. Reed finished with a career-high 12 passes defended and 80 tackles, the seventh-best figure among all cornerbacks in the NFL, while Carter set career highs in interceptions (two) and passes defended (nine).

In his first season with the Jets (2021), Oden's unit consisted entirely of first- and second-year players, all of which entered the league as fifth-round or later draft choices or undrafted free agents. Bryce Hall, who was a fifth-round pick in 2020, became the first Jets player to start 17 games in a regular season and finished tied for sixth in the league with 16 passes defended, the most by a Jet since 2013. Brandin Echols, a sixth-round selection in 2021, finished tied for sixth among all rookies with nine passes defended and earned Week 15 Rookie of the Week honors following his 20-yard interception touchdown return. Carter, drafted in the fifth round, was one of only three 2021 rookies with at least four passes defended and at least four tackles for loss, joining Jamal Adams, Erik Coleman and Jonathan Vilma as the only Jets to do so in their first season since 2000.

Prior to his start with the Jets, Oden spent the 2020 as the defensive backs/cornerbacks coach in San Francisco. Despite using seven different

starters at cornerback, the 49ers finished fourth in passing defense while also ranking in the top 10 in both completion percentage and passer rating allowed.

In Miami (2018-19), Oden helped a pair of young Dolphins defenders in Xavien Howard and Minkah Fitzpatrick. In 2018, as the defensive backs coach, Howard registered seven interceptions to tie for the league lead, earning his first Pro Bowl appearance. Additionally, Fitzpatrick finished in the top five among all rookie safeties in tackles, interceptions and passes defended.

During his four seasons in Detroit (2014-17) as the defensive backs/cornerbacks coach, Oden helped the Lions finish with 58 interceptions, the ninth-most in that span. Under Oden, cornerback Darius Slay earned his first Pro Bowl selection (2017) after finishing the season with eight interceptions, tied for the most in the league. Additionally, Slay posted 69 passes defended, the most in the league over that span while also finishing in the top five with 14 interceptions.

Before Detroit, Oden spent the 2013 season with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as secondary/cornerbacks coach, as the Buccaneers defense finished third in the league with 21 interceptions. Cornerback Darrelle Revis was selected to the Pro Bowl in his only season with the organization after finishing with a team-high 11 passes defended, two interceptions, two forced fumbles and a sack.

As the secondary coach in Jacksonville in 2012, Oden helped Jaguars cornerback Derek Cox tie a career high with four interceptions, while safety Dawan Landry finished with 100 tackles—one of just eight defensive backs with at least 100 tackles that season.

A member of the New Orleans Saints staff for six seasons (2006-11), Oden was the assistant secondary coach for five years before becoming the secondary coach in 2011. In his time with the Saints, the team won Super Bowl XLIV, finishing 2010 with the fourth-best passing defense in the NFL. In that span, safety Roman Harper earned the only two Pro Bowl selections of his 11-year career.

Beginning his NFL career in Houston, Oden served as a defensive assistant and assistant defensive backs coach for the Texans from 2004 to 2005. In 2004, the Texans registered 22 interceptions to finish fifth in the league.

Before coaching in the NFL, Oden spent eight seasons coaching in the college ranks. He served as defensive backs coach at Eastern Michigan University (2003) after spending three seasons at East Carolina University as the safeties coach (2002), secondary coach (2001) and outside linebackers coach (2000).

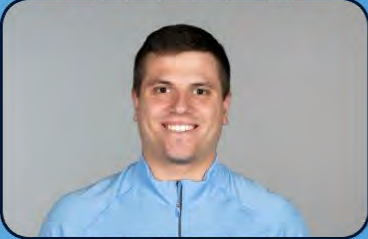
Prior to joining East Carolina, Oden spent two seasons as the assistant defensive backs coach at West Point (1998-99) after launching his coaching career as assistant defensive backs coach at Millersville (Pa.) University in 1996, followed by one season as a graduate assistant working with the wide receivers at Boston College (1997).

As a player, Oden was a four-year linebacker at Baldwin-Wallace College, where he earned first-team Ohio Athletic Conference honors twice and was a 1994 Division III All-American.

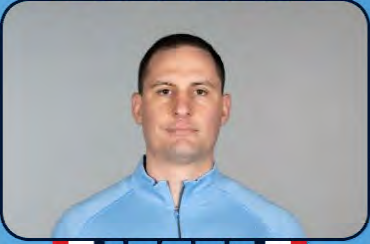
In 2022, Rudnicki was a graduate assistant at South Alabama, working with the offensive line.

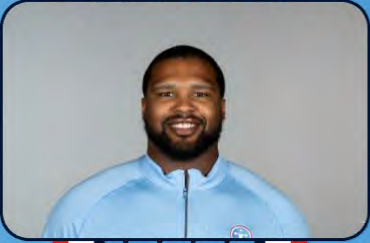

Tanzel Smart is in his first season as assistant defensive line coach with the Titans and his second season in coaching. The former defensive lineman played in the NFL from 2017 through 2023.

Smart, whose first name is pronounced "TAN-zell," joined the Titans after breaking into coaching with the Dallas Cowboys in 2025 as a defensive assistant/quality control coach.

Smart was selected by the Los Angeles Rams in the sixth round (189th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft. During his playing career, he appeared in 41 career games with four starts, recording 31 tackles and a pass breakup in his career.

He spent the 2024 season out of football after a four-year stint with the N.Y.

Jets (2020-23), playing in 10 games for the team as a gameday elevation from the practice squad.

In 2020, he spent time with the Buffalo Bills and Cleveland Browns after three seasons with the Rams (2017-19), where he started four of his 31 games played. He was inactive for the 2018 postseason but was a member of the Rams team that faced New England in Super Bowl LVI.

As a rookie in 2017, he achieved career highs with 16 games played, four starts and 14 total tackles.

The Baton Rouge, La., native was a four-year letterman and two-time first-team All-American Athletic Conference selection at Tulane, playing in 48 games with 36 starts at defensive tackle. He finished his collegiate career with 191 tackles, 41 tackles for loss and 9.5 sacks.

# RAYNA STEWART

ASSISTANT SPECIAL TEAMS

NFL Coaching Experience: 10  
Titans Coaching Experience: 4

Rayna Stewart returned to Tennessee in 2025 after three seasons as the special teams assistant with the Cowboys. He is in his 10th season coaching in the NFL following a five-year playing career he began in 1996 as a fifth-round draft pick with the Houston Oilers.

In 2025, Stewart (first name pronounced “ruh-NAY”) helped the Titans finish in the NFL’s top 10 in punt return average (second at 16.6 yards per return), opponent kickoff return average (seventh, 24.9) and opponent net punting average (second, 37.1). Fourth-round rookie Chimere Dike earned first-team Associated Press All-Pro honors and was named to the Pro Bowl after leading the NFL with a 17.3-yard average on punt returns, breaking Billy “White Shoes” Johnson’s 1977 franchise record of 15.4 yards per punt return, and Dike also established a franchise record with 1,588 total kickoff return yards, averaging 25.6 yards per attempt. Additionally, kicker Joey Slye made a team-record nine field goals of at least 50 yards, breaking Stephen Gostkowski’s record of seven such field goals in 2020. In only one season, Slye booted four of the eight longest field goals in franchise history (58, 57, 57 and 56 yards). Meanwhile, punter Johnny Hekker averaged 40.3 net yards on 78 punts, becoming the franchise’s third all-time punter to record a net average of 40.0 yards or better with at least 75 punts in a season, joining Brett Kern (five times) and Ryan Stonehouse (2022).

During his time in Dallas from 2022 through 2024, Stewart worked with current Titans special teams coordinator John Fassel. During that span, the Cowboys field goal unit connected on 90 percent of its attempts, the fourth-best mark in the NFL. The team also ranked third in the NFL in average kickoff return yardage (27.2) from 2022-24. Cowboys kicker Brandon Aubrey and returner KaVontae Turpin were both multiple-time Pro Bowl selections during Stewart’s time as assistant.

In 2024, Aubrey connected on a Cowboys-record 40 field goals, tying for the third-highest total in NFL history. The Cowboys also ranked second in the league with 1,091 kickoff return yards, led the NFL with an NFL-record 32.1 kickoff return average, and were the only team to return multiple kickoffs for touchdowns. Aubrey and Turpin received AP All-Pro honors.

Stewart assisted with the development of first-year kicker Aubrey throughout the 2023 season. Aubrey led the league in field goals made (36), ranked third in field goal percentage (94.7) and first in kicking points (157). He set NFL records in single-season touchbacks (99), consecutive field goals made without a miss to start a career (35) and set a franchise record for most field goals made in a single season (36). Bryan Anger also set franchise records by averaging 51.4 yards-per-punt and a net average of 44.9 yards in 2023.

In 2022, Cowboys kicker Brett Maher enjoyed a career season, making 29-of-32 field goals for a career-high 90.6 field goal percentage. He also racked up 137 kicking points to establish a then-single-season club record and tie for the third-most in the NFL in 2022. The special teams unit also benefited from the addition of Turpin, who finished the season fifth in punt return average (10.4) and was the only NFL player with a 50-yard kick return and 50-yard punt return. Turpin earned his first Pro Bowl selection and became the first player in Cowboys history to be named to the Pro Bowl as a return specialist.

Stewart went to Dallas after three seasons in Green Bay in a similar capacity, first as the special teams quality control coach (2019-20) and then as the assistant special teams coach (2021).

In 2021, Packers kicker Mason Crosby made 25-of-34 (73.5 percent) field

goals and converted 49-of-51 extra points, leading the team in scoring (124 points) for the 13th time in his career. Punter Corey Bojorquez averaged 46.5 yards-per-punt on 53 punts and had the longest punt in the NFL on the season, an 82-yard bomb that ranked as the second-longest punt in Packers history.

In 2020, Stewart worked with Crosby, who became the first Packer and just the sixth NFL player since 1932 to record a perfect field goal percentage in a season (minimum one attempt per game) by connecting on all 16 of his field goal attempts. Crosby finished the season with an active streak of 18 converted field goals dating back to the 2019 season, the third-longest streak in franchise history.

Stewart was part of a staff in 2019 that saw Crosby connect on 22-of-24 field goal attempts (91.7 percent), matching Jan Stenerud’s 1981 single-season franchise record. Crosby ranked fifth in the league in field goal percentage in 2019, the highest ranking by a Green Bay kicker since Ryan Longwell in 2003 (fourth). JK Scott posted 29 punts inside the 20 on the year, which ranked ninth in the NFL and was the most by a Packer since Tim Masthay recorded 30 in 2012.

Stewart spent four seasons (2015-18) at Vanderbilt, first as director of player development (2015-17) and then as special teams quality control coach (2018). As director of player development, he served as a mentor for players and oversaw a number of programs that helped the student-athletes transition from high school to college and prepare for post-graduate life. In 2018, Stewart helped Parker Thome rank fourth in the SEC with an average of 44.9 yards per punt, tied for the fourth-highest punting average in school history.

Prior to joining the Commodores, Stewart worked for two years as a teacher and head football coach at Whites Creek (Tenn.) High School. Stewart also served as a teacher and coach at Battle Ground (Franklin, Tenn.) Academy for two years before leading the Whites Creek staff.

From 2009 to 2010, Stewart was a member of the Titans coaching staff for the first time. Working primarily with the linebackers and defensive linemen as a defensive quality control coach, he helped defensive linemen Kyle Vanden Bosch and Jason Babin earn Pro Bowl honors in 2009 and 2010, respectively.

Before his first coaching stint with the Titans, Stewart’s titles included graduate assistant at Northwestern University (2007-08), athletic director/head coach at Chicago (Ill.) Hope Academy (2005-06) and assistant coach at Centennial (Tenn.) High School (2001-04). He was a Bill Walsh Diversity Fellow with the Indianapolis Colts during training camp in 2004.

Stewart played collegiately at Northern Arizona, where he was a two-time All-American cornerback and set the school record for passes defended in a season, posting 19 in both 1994 and 1995. He was selected in the fifth round (143rd overall) of the 1996 NFL Draft by the Houston Oilers and played in 71 career games as a defensive back for the Oilers (1996-97), Miami Dolphins (1998) and Jacksonville Jaguars (1999-2000). He finished his NFL career with 77 tackles, four fumble recoveries, two interceptions and a half sack.

A native of Chatsworth, Calif., Stewart earned a bachelor’s degree in advertising from Northern Arizona University and a master’s degree in education administration from Tennessee State University.

Stewart and his wife, Sonia, have four children: ShaRae, Tre, Mycah and Jadyan.

# LUKE STOCKER

## TIGHT ENDS

NFL Coaching Experience: 4  
Titans Coaching Experience: 4

Luke Stocker is in his fourth season coaching with the Titans and his second campaign as the team's tight ends coach. Following an 11-year NFL playing career, he initially joined the Titans staff as an intern during the 2023 offseason and then earned a full-time role as offensive assistant. In 2024, he was promoted to assistant tight ends coach.

Under Stocker in 2025, veteran Chig Okonkwo established career highs with 56 receptions and 560 receiving yards. Okonkwo had Stocker as an assistant or position coach for three of his four seasons with the club, and he departed following the 2025 campaign ranked fifth in franchise history among tight ends with 194 career receptions and sixth among franchise tight ends with 2,017 receiving yards.

Additionally, the 2025 season saw the emergence of rookie tight end Gunnar Helm. The fourth-round pick finished the season with 44 receptions, the most by a rookie tight end in franchise history, surpassing Bo Scaife's 37 receptions in 2005. Helm added 357 receiving yards and two touchdowns. His yardage total was the second most by a rookie tight end in franchise history, trailing only Okonkwo's 450 yards in 2022.

During the 2024 season, Stocker helped coach a group of tight ends that included Okonkwo, Josh Whyle and Nick Vannett. Okonkwo ranked second on the team and led the Titans tight ends with 52 receptions. His 479 receiving yards ranked third on the team and led the team's tight ends, and he had two touchdown receptions.

With Stocker working with the Titans tight ends in 2023, Okonkwo finished second on the team in receptions (54) and receiving yards (528), which were career highs. Stocker also helped the development of Whyle, a fifth-round rookie, as well as veterans Kevin Rader and Trevon Wesco.

Stocker, who attended the University of Tennessee, spent part of his professional career with the Titans. He was signed as a free agent during the 2017 campaign and stayed with the club through 2018. He also returned for training camp in 2021. In 19 games and 13 starts with the Titans, he totaled 16 receptions for 177 yards and two touchdowns, while serving in a key role as a blocker in the running game.

A fourth-round pick by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the 2011 NFL Draft, Stocker spent six-plus seasons with the Buccaneers before joining the Titans. He later appeared in games for the Atlanta Falcons (2019-20) and Minnesota Vikings (2021). In 142 career games, he registered 91 starts and 85 receptions for 705 yards and five touchdowns. He also participated in two postseason games with the Titans following the 2017 campaign.

In his final season as a player with the Vikings in 2021, he played in 12 contests and caught two passes for 12 yards.

Stocker's totals in two seasons with the Falcons included 15 receptions for 116 yards in 31 games with 22 starts. His 13 starts in 2020 tied his career high.

In 2018, his only full season with the Titans, he played in all 16 games and notched 11 starts. He matched a career high with 165 receiving yards with a career-best two touchdowns, while his 15 receptions marked the second-highest total of his career. The Titans ranked seventh in the NFL in rushing offense with 114.4 yards per game, as Derrick Henry emerged with his first career 1,000-yard rushing season (1,059).

Stocker appeared in 80 games with 56 starts during his time in Tampa Bay, which ran from 2011 through Week 12 of the 2017 season. He contributed 52 receptions for 400 yards and three touchdowns with the Buccaneers. In 2012, he set career highs with 16 receptions and 165 receiving yards (later tied in 2018).

A graduate of Madison Southern High School in Berea, Ky., Stocker went on to the University of Tennessee (2007-10), where he tied a then-school record with 52 career games played and graduated with a degree in sport management. He started the final 38 consecutive games of his career with the Volunteers and totaled 85 receptions for 956 yards and eight touchdowns. As a team captain during his senior season, he finished with 39 receptions for 417 yards to rank third on the team in both categories, while adding two touchdowns.

He and his wife, Daine, have three children: son Liam and daughters Collins and Laurel.

# SHEA TIERNEY

## QUARTERBACKS

NFL Coaching Experience: 12  
Titans Coaching Experience: 1

Shea Tierney is in his first season with the Titans, his 12th season in the NFL and his 16th total season in coaching. He joined the Titans after four seasons with the New York Giants.

During his time with the Giants (2022-25), Tierney coached the team's quarterbacks. Additionally, during his final two seasons in New York, he owned the title of offensive passing game coordinator. Titans offensive coordinator Brian Daboll was the head coach of the Giants during Tierney's time there.

Eight different players started at quarterback during Tierney's time with the Giants, with Daniel Jones' 32 starts topping the list. In 2025, rookie Jaxson Dart logged a team-high 12 starts at quarterback, in addition to three starts by Russell Wilson and two starts by Jameis Winston. Dart passed for 2,272 yards and 15 touchdowns with five interceptions in addition to scoring nine rushing touchdowns.

In 2024, the Giants started three different quarterbacks for the second consecutive year in Daniel Jones, Tommy DeVito and Drew Lock. In Week 17, Lock led the Giants to a win over the Colts and became just the fifth player in NFL history with at least 300 passing yards, four passing touchdowns, one rushing touchdown and a 155 passer rating in a single game. DeVito finished the 2024 season owning the second-most consecutive pass attempts (183) without an interception in the NFL, which was also the longest streak by a Giant since the 1970 merger.

In 2023, Tierney led a position group that cycled through three starting quarterbacks in Jones, Tyrod Taylor, and DeVito. DeVito, a rookie free agent, improved enough under Tierney's coaching to start six games, winning three. He led the Giants to victories at Washington and in home games against New England and Green Bay to become the first Giants rookie quarterback to win three consecutive starts since Phil Simms won four in a row in 1979. He was just the third undrafted rookie quarterback since the 1970 merger to win three starts in a season, joining Ed Rubbert, who won three strike-replacement games for Washington in 1987, and Pittsburgh's Devlin Hodges in 2019.

In 2022, Tierney's first year with the Giants, Jones had the best season of his career, setting a Giants' single-season completion percentage record of 67.2 and leading the team to its first postseason berth in six years and an NFC Wild Card victory in Minnesota. Jones threw for 3,205 yards and rushed for a Giants quarterback-record 708 yards to join Philadelphia's Jalen Hurts and Buffalo's Josh Allen as the only NFL quarterbacks with 3,000-plus passing yards and 500-plus rushing yards that season. Jones threw a career-low five interceptions; he led the NFL and set a franchise record by throwing an interception on just 1.1 percent of his passes (five interceptions in 472 attempts). He led the Giants from deficits of 10 or more points to victory three times in the season's first six games, tying him for the highest total by a quarterback in the first six games of a season since 2000.

Prior to joining the Giants, Tierney spent four years working with Daboll on the Buffalo Bills' staff, the first two as an offensive assistant and the last two as the assistant quarterbacks coach. In those two seasons, Allen was one of the NFL's most productive and successful quarterbacks. The Bills were 27-11 combined in the regular season and postseason, won two AFC East titles and advanced to the 2020 conference championship game. In those 38 games, Allen threw for 10,405 yards and 87 touchdowns. He finished second in the NFL Most Valuable Player voting in 2020.

Tierney joined the Bills in 2018 after spending the previous two seasons as an offensive analyst for the University of Alabama, which was 27-2 when he was on the staff. With the Crimson Tide, he worked closely with Billy Napier, the wide receivers coach in Tierney's first season. In his second season at Alabama, Tierney worked under Daboll, who was the offensive coordinator when the Crimson Tide won the 2017 national championship.

Tierney broke into coaching as an offensive graduate assistant at North Carolina State from 2011 to 2012. He then got his first NFL experience with the Philadelphia Eagles as a football analyst/coaching intern from 2013 to 2015.

Tierney is a graduate of Neshaminy High School in Langhorne, Pa., and N.C. State. He and his wife, the former Emily Seng of Macungie, Pa., have a daughter, Jordan, and a son, James.

# AARON WHITECOTTON

DEFENSIVE RUN GAME  
COORDINATOR/DEFENSIVE LINE

NFL Coaching Experience: 14  
Titans Coaching Experience: 1

Aaron Whitecotton is in his first season with the Titans and his 14th season coaching in the NFL. He was hired in 2026 as defensive run game coordinator/defensive line following one season with the Dallas Cowboys.

With Whitecotton as defensive line coach in 2025, the Cowboys defensive line featured several newcomers. Defensive tackle Quinnen Williams was acquired in a trade at midseason and went on to earn Pro Bowl honors. Second-round draft pick Donovan Ezeiruaku started nine games, totaling two sacks and ranking second on the team with nine tackles for loss. Veteran defensive end Jadeveon Clowney, in his 12th NFL season and his first with the club, led the Cowboys with 8.5 sacks and 12 tackles for loss. The 2025 Cowboys defense ranked second in the NFL with 82 quarterback hits, according to Pro Football Focus, and the unit was fourth in the league with a 52.6 percent quarterback pressure rate, per Stats Perform.

While with the Jets from 2021 to 2024, Whitecotton developed several defensive linemen into premier pass rushers, including Will McDonald (10.5 sacks in 2024), Williams (29.5 sacks from 2021-24) and Bryce Huff (10.0 sacks in 2023).

In 2024 Whitecotton helped McDonald, who was in his second NFL season, lead the Jets and tie for 12th in the NFL with 10.5 sacks. He became one-of-nine players since 2019 to register 10.0-plus sacks in a season in either his first or second year.

The 2023 season saw Whitecotton play an integral part of the Jets finishing third overall in total defense, allowing 292.3 yards per game following a fourth overall finish (311.1) in 2022. Under his leadership, the Jets defensive line finished 2023 with 48.0 sacks, tied for the third-most in a single season in franchise history and tied for seventh in the NFL that year.

Whitecotton helped Williams receive first-team All-Pro (2022) and Pro Bowl honors (2022-23). In 2023 under Whitecotton, Williams recorded career-highs in tackles, tackles for loss and pressures.

During the 2022 season, Whitecotton oversaw a defensive line that

recorded 45 sacks on the year, the seventh-most in the NFL and a significant improvement from its 33 team sacks in 2021. The 45 sacks marked the most by a Jets team since 2014 and tied for the fifth-most in a season in a franchise history.

Prior to joining the Jets, Whitecotton worked as the assistant defensive line coach with the San Francisco 49ers in 2020. Despite losing two opening day starters in Week 2, Nick Bosa, the reigning Defensive Rookie of the Year, and Solomon Thomas, the 49ers defense finished fifth in total defense and seventh in rushing defense.

Before his lone season in San Francisco, Whitecotton spent three seasons with Buffalo (2017-19), the last two as the assistant defensive line coach. From 2018-19, the Bills defense allowed just 296.2 yards-per-game, lowest in the NFL over that two-year span.

Whitecotton entered the NFL in 2013 with the Jacksonville Jaguars. He spent three seasons (2013-15) as a defensive assistant working primarily with the defensive line. He was promoted to assistant defensive line coach in 2016, when the Jaguars defense ranked sixth in total defense while a league-high five different defensive linemen each registered at least six tackles for loss.

Beginning his coaching career at his alma mater, Myers Park (N.C.) High School, Whitecotton served as the defensive coordinator, linebackers and defensive line coach in his seven years (2005-11) at the school, before moving to the college ranks for one year as a defensive assistant at New Mexico State (2012).

Whitecotton played center at South Carolina from 2000-01 before transferring to UNC-Charlotte, where he earned his undergraduate degree in political science.

He and his wife, Heather, have four children: daughters Lila James and Lorelei, and sons Jax and Jet.

# ISAAC WILLIAMS

ASSISTANT OFFENSIVE LINE

NFL Coaching Experience: 5  
Titans Coaching Experience: 1

Isaac Williams is in his first season with the Titans and his fifth season coaching in the NFL. He was hired in 2026 as assistant offensive line coach following four seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Williams was the assistant offensive line coach during his time with the Steelers (2022-25). In his final season in Pittsburgh, he helped the offense tie for the ninth-fewest total sacks allowed (31). Right tackle Troy Fautanu, right guard Mason McCormick and center Zach Frazier started all 17 games, but the offensive line was forced to deal with losing starting left tackle Broderick Jones to a season-ending injury after 11 games.

In 2024, only the Eagles and Ravens ran the ball at a higher percentage than the 52.1 percent the Steelers posted that season. Najee Harris led the way with 263 carries for 1,043 yards, marking the running back's fourth consecutive season – and the third with Williams on staff – topping the 1,000-yard mark. Guard Isaac Seumalo was named to his first career Pro Bowl at the conclusion of the 2024 campaign.

Williams worked with three offensive linemen who were selected in the 2024 NFL Draft: tackle Troy Fautanu in the first round, center Zach Frazier in the second and guard Mason McCormick in the fourth. Those selections came one year after the drafting of Broderick Jones in the first round and Spencer Anderson in the seventh.

In 2023, Williams aided a unit that blocked for the tandem of Najee Harris and Jaylen Warren, each of whom eclipsed 1,000 scrimmage yards. Harris and Warren were the fourth duo in franchise history to eclipse 1,000 scrimmage yards in the same season and first since Walter Abercrombie and Earnest Jackson in 1986.

Williams' tenure with the Steelers came after collegiate stints at North

Carolina Central (2021), Morgan State (2018-20) and Northern Colorado (2016-17), where at each stop, he worked with the offensive line.

In 2021, Williams guided an offensive line that helped the NCCU register its first three-game win streak and first winning season since 2017. The Eagles finished second in the Mid-Eastern Atlantic Conference (MEAC) with a 4-1 league record. Williams also tutored a pair of all-conference selections.

Prior to North Carolina Central, Williams spent three seasons working in the MEAC as an offensive line coach/run game coordinator at Morgan State (2018-20). While the Bears did not compete in 2020 due to COVID, Williams developed All-MEAC tackle Joshua Miles in 2019, who participated in the East-West Shrine game and the NFL Scouting Combine. Miles, who was selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the seventh round of the 2019 NFL Draft, was the first Morgan State player drafted since Visanthe Shiancoe in 2003 (N.Y. Giants).

Williams has also coached at Millsaps College, Clinton (Miss.) High School and Sumner Hill (Miss.) Junior High School.

Williams was a four-year starting offensive lineman and three-time captain at Alcorn State University (2008-11). He earned all-conference honors as a junior and senior. Williams then played one season as a center and defensive end with the Arena Football League's Laredo Rattlesnakes in 2013, helping the Rattlesnakes to the AFL's best record.

Williams graduated with honors and earned his bachelor's degree in nutrition and dietetics from Alcorn State in 2012. He added his master's degree in education leadership from the University of Northern Colorado in 2017.
