TITANS FACE GIANTS IN FIRST ROAD TEST OF 2026

Tennessee Titans (0-2) at New York Giants (1-1)

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Titans (0-2) play their first road game of the regular season this week, as they travel to New York to battle the Giants (1-1). Kickoff at MetLife Stadium (capacity 82,500) is scheduled for 1 p.m. EDT/noon CDT on Sunday, Sept. 27.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

The contest will be regionally televised on CBS, including Nashville affiliate WTVF NewsChannel 5, as well as on Paramount+ in the Nashville market. The broadcast team includes play-by-play announcer **Andrew Catalon**, analyst **Logan Ryan** and reporter **A.J. Ross**.

LAST WEEK AGAINST PHILADELPHIA

In Week 2, the Titans hosted the Philadelphia Eagles. Titans second-year quarterback **Cam Ward** led a go-ahead drive late in the fourth quarter, but Eagles signal caller **Jalen Hurts** responded with a two-minute drive that culminated in a game-winning touchdown pass to wide receiver **Darius Cooper** with nine seconds remaining in regulation. The Eagles won, 24-20.

Ward, making his 19th career start, was 13-of-20 passing for 183 yards and a 94.4 passer rating, and he also rushed for a pair of touchdowns for the first time in his career. He has not thrown an interception in his past six contests, including the final four games of 2025 and the first two weeks of 2026.

On the defensive side, safety **Amani Hooker** and cornerback **Marcus Harris** contributed interceptions against the Eagles. Defensive tackle **Jeffery Simmons** recorded a sack and a team-high seven quarterback pressures, including a pressure that contributed to Harris' interception.

FAMILIAR FACES

The Titans have several coaches and players with close ties to the Giants. Offensive coordinator **Brian Daboll** was the Giants head coach from 2022 to 2025, while position coaches **Carmen Bricillo** (offensive line) and **Shea Tierney** (quarterbacks) also served on the Giants staff. Titans special teams coordinator **John Fassel's** father, **Jim Fassel**, was the Giants head coach from 1997 to 2003. Wide receiver **Wan'Dale Robinson**, center **Austin Schlottmann**, tight end **Daniel Bellinger** and cornerback **Cor'Dale Flott** were all signed by the Titans this offseason after previously playing for the Giants.

On the opposite sideline, the current Giants coaching staff consists of some recognizable faces from their time with the Titans. Among those are quarterbacks coach **Brian Callahan**, the Titans head coach from 2024 to 2025, and defensive coordinator **Dennard Wilson**, who served in the same capacity on Callahan's staff.

THE GIANTS

Giants head coach **John Harbaugh** arrived in New York during the 2026 offseason following an 18-year run with the Baltimore Ravens. He compiled 180 regular-season victories with the Ravens to move into 14th all-time in the NFL, while his 13 postseason wins are tied for seventh most all-time.

After defeating the division-rival Dallas Cowboys in their opener, the Giants traveled to Los Angeles for a Monday night matchup with the Rams in Week 2. Against the Rams, second-year quarterback **Jaxson Dart** exited with a knee injury in the first quarter and did not return. He was replaced by 12-year veteran **Jameis Winston**, but the Rams never trailed in the contest and prevailed by a final score of 28-6.

Dart, who was the 25th overall pick and the second quarterback selected in the 2025 NFL Draft behind Ward, notched his 14th career start prior to leaving the contest.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

TITANS FRANCHISE

- The Titans' next win will be the franchise's 500th all-time victory, including regular season and postseason games.

TITANS ROOKIES

- The Titans rookie class has totaled six starts through two weeks—two each by wide receiver **Carnell Tate**, right guard **Fernando Carmona Jr.** and linebacker **Anthony Hill Jr.** With three more starts by rookies this week, the nine total starts would equal the 2025 class for the most for the club through three games of a season in the "Titans era" (1999 to present).

DL JORDAN ELLIOTT

- Scheduled to appear in his 100th NFL regular season game.

TE GUNNAR HELM

- Has caught at least one pass in each of the first 18 games he has played in his NFL career.

LB ANTHONY HILL JR.

- After totaling 26 tackles in the first two games of 2026—16 against the Jets and 10 against the Eagles—a 12-tackle performance this week would give him more tackles in the first three games of a season than any other Titans player since 2000. In that span, linebacker **Akeem Ayers** holds the mark for the Titans after accumulating 37 tackles through three games in 2012 (GSIS statistics).
- With at least 10 tackles this week, he will be the first Titans player to begin a season with three consecutive 10-tackle performances since the start of the 2000 season (GSIS statistics).

S AMANI HOOKER

- With 13 career interceptions, he needs one more to pass **Jason McCourty** (13) and tie **Cortland Finnegan** (14) for the seventh-highest career total for the franchise during its "Titans era" (1999–present).

RB TONY POLLARD

- With 5,881 career rushing yards entering the game, he needs 119 more to reach 6,000.
- With 2,260 rushing yards as a member of the Titans, Pollard ranks 14th in franchise history. He will pass **Allen Pinkett** (2,324) for 13th place with 65 more yards, and he will pass **LenDale White** (2,349) for 12th place with 90 more yards.

WR WAN'DALE ROBINSON

- Can increase his streak to 45 consecutive individual games with at least one reception.

DT JEFFERY SIMMONS

- With 43.5 career sacks entering the game, he needs two more to eclipse **Derrick Morgan** (44.5) and **Ted Washington** (45.0) for 10th on the franchise's all-time sack list. He would move into fourth place in sacks during the team's "Titans era" (1999 to present) behind only **Jevon Kearse** (52.0), **Jurrell Casey** (51.0) and **Harold Landry III** (50.5).

G PETER SKORONSKI

- Has a team-best active streak of 49 consecutive starts entering the week.

QB CAM WARD

- Enters the contest with one interception, 11 touchdown passes and four rushing touchdowns in his past 11 games, including the final nine games of 2025.
- Enters the contest with a streak of six consecutive games without an interception, including the final four games of 2025.
- Can join **Warren Moon** (1984), **Jake Locker** (2013) and **Marcus Mariota** (2019) as the franchise's only quarterbacks to start the first three games of a season without throwing an interception.
- Can record his eighth consecutive game with either a passing touchdown or a rushing touchdown.

SERIES HISTORY

This week's game marks the 14th meeting between the Titans and Giants. The Giants lead the series 7-6, dating back to Sept. 16, 1973, when the Giants defeated the Houston Oilers 34-14 in the season opener at Yankee Stadium.

Of all opponents that have been in existence since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, the Giants, Arizona Cardinals and Tampa Bay Buccaneers have played the Oilers/Titans the fewest amount of times—13 games each. The Titans franchise has faced the Chicago Bears, Detroit Lions and Philadelphia Eagles 14 times each.

After the Giants won the first five matchups between the franchises, the Titans/Oilers won the next five battles. The streak included a 10-6 Oilers win in 1997, a 28-14 win in 2000, a 32-29 overtime victory in 2002, a come-from-behind 24-21 win in 2006 and a 29-10 decision in 2010.

The Giants took back the series momentum in 2014 with a 36-7 victory at Nissan Stadium and added a 21-20 victory at Nissan Stadium in 2022.

The Titans and Giants have met twice at MetLife Stadium, most recently on Dec. 16, 2018. On that date, the Titans won 17-0 to record the franchise's first shutout since 2000 and only the fourth road shutout in team annals. **Derrick Henry** rushed for 170 yards and two touchdowns, while the Titans defense registered two turnovers and three sacks.

Despite their infrequent meetings, the Titans have enjoyed two of their most dramatic finishes since the team moved to Tennessee against the Giants. On a cold and windy day at the Meadowlands on Dec. 1, 2002, **Steve McNair** helped force overtime with a touchdown pass and a two-point conversion in the final seconds of regulation, and **Joe Nedney** sealed the win when he connected on a 38-yard field goal. **Eddie George** rushed for 64 yards to pass **Earl Campbell** as the all-time rushing leader in franchise history.

In 2006, rookie quarterback **Vince Young** led arguably one of the greatest comebacks in NFL history against the Giants. Down 21-0 with less than 10 minutes remaining in the fourth quarter, the Titans rallied to score touchdowns on three consecutive drives and then won the game on a 49-yard field goal by kicker **Rob Bironas**. It tied for the second-biggest comeback in NFL history with 10 minutes to go in the fourth quarter and was the largest comeback in NFL history (fourth quarter or otherwise) led by a rookie quarterback.

The Titans pull off one of the most dramatic comebacks in franchise history after trailing 21-0 with less than 10 minutes remaining ... Led by rookie quarterback Vince Young, they score touchdowns on three consecutive drives and then win on a 49-yard field goal by kicker Rob Bironas with six seconds on the clock ... Two of the four scoring drives result from interceptions by Pacman Jones ... It ties for the second-biggest comeback in NFL history with 10 minutes to go in the fourth quarter and is the largest fourth-quarter comeback in franchise history.

2010 Week 13 • Sept. 26, 2010 • TITANS 29 at Giants 10

Chris Johnson rushes for 125 yards and two touchdowns, and the Titans defense forces three crucial turnovers in the team's first game at MetLife Stadium ... The Titans score 19 unanswered second-half points, including a 13-yard touchdown pass from Vince Young to Kennry Britt ... Defensive tackle Sen'Derrick Marks and cornerback Jason McCourty each notch their first career interception ... McCourty's interception and cornerback Alterraun Verner's fumble recovery occur with the Titans backed up against their own end zone.

2014 Week 14 • Dec. 7, 2014 • GIANTS 36 at Titans 7

The Giants force three turnovers and register eight sacks ... Titans quarterback Zach Mettenberger is knocked out of the game for the second consecutive week with a shoulder injury ... The Giants score the game's first 30 points as Eli Manning passes for 260 yards and rookie Odell Beckham Jr. records 130 receiving yards ... The Titans' only touchdown comes on a 23-yard interception return by Marqueston Huff ... Josh Brown boots five field goals for the Giants ... Rookie Andre Williams rushes for 131 yards and a score.

2018 Week 15 • Dec. 16, 2018 • TITANS 17 at Giants 0

In a cold, steady rain, the Titans record their first shutout since Dec. 25, 2000 ... Derrick Henry follows a 238-yard rushing performance the previous week with 170 yards and two touchdowns on a career-high 33 carries at New York ... Henry scores on one-yard carries in the first and third quarters ... The Titans defense limits Saquon Barkley to a 2.2-yard rushing average (14 carries for 31 yards) and limits Eli Manning to a 54.1 passer rating ... The Titans get a key interception by safety Kevin Byard deep in Titans territory in the third quarter.

2022 Week 1 • Sept. 11, 2022 • GIANTS 21 at Titans 20

The Giants take the lead for the first time with 1:06 remaining in the fourth quarter, when Saquon Barkley catches a pass for a two-point conversion ... Barkley's conversion follows a one-yard touchdown pass from Daniel Jones to fullback Chris Myarick ... The Titans drive in the final minute, but Randy Bullock's 47-yard field goal sails wide left as time expires ... Barkley rushes for 194 yards and a touchdown and adds 30 receiving yards ... Ryan Tannehill completes two touchdown passes to running back Dontrell Hilliard ... The Titans defense records five sacks and two takeaways.



TITANS-GIANTS: THE LAST MEETING



2022 Week 1: Titans 20, Giants 21
Sunday, Sept. 11, 2022 • 3:25 p.m. CT • Nissan Stadium



In Week 1 of the 2022 season, the Titans hosted the New York Giants and fell by a score of 21-20. Despite limiting the Giants to two third-down conversions on 10 attempts and racking up five sacks in the contest, Tennessee was unable to mount a late-game comeback.

The Titans got on the board on their opening possession with a five-play scoring drive that was jumpstarted by a 46-yard punt return by WR **Kyle Philips**. Tennessee began the possession at the Giants' 45-yard line, and QB **Ryan Tannehill** connected with WR **Treyton Burks** for a 20-yard pass before connecting with RB **Dontrell Hilliard** for a seven-yard score. Tennessee took an early 7-0 lead.

In the second quarter the Titans extended their lead. Tannehill tossed first-down passes to TE **Geoff Swaim**, Hilliard and WR **Nick Westbrook-Ikhine**, which put K **Randy Bullock** in position to successfully make a 46-yard field goal, 10-0 Titans. On the ensuing New York possession, Giants QB **Daniel Jones** was strip-sacked by DT **Jeffery Simmons**, and the ball was recovered by OLB **Bud Dupree** at the Giants' 42-yard line. Tennessee capitalized on the turnover with a 23-yard field goal, 13-0 Titans.

New York got on the board in the third quarter with help from Giants RB **Saquon Barkley** who contributed a 68-yard rush to flip field position. Ultimately, Barkley ran a four-yard touchdown into the end zone, but the extra point snap was botched and recovered by Tennessee, 13-6 Titans.

Later in the third quarter, New York tied the score 13-13 as Jones connected with Giants WR **Sterling Shepard** for a 65-yard touchdown. However, Tennessee responded on the ensuing possession with a 75-yard scoring drive. Aided by a 20-yard catch by Philips and a 27-yard gain by Burks, Tannehill was able to connect with Hilliard for a 23-yard score and a 20-13 Titans advantage.

New York took the lead in the fourth quarter as a 73-yard scoring drive culminated in a one-yard touchdown pass from Jones to Giants FB **Chris Myarick**. New York elected to go for two, and the conversion attempt was successful as Jones connected with Barkley on a shovel pass for a 21-20 lead with just over a minute remaining in regulation.

Tennessee rallied to attempt a game-winning score, taking the ball down into Giants territory, but Bullock's field goal attempt sailed wide left as the Titans fell at home.

John Harbaugh is in his 29th season in the NFL and his 19th as a head coach in 2026. He was named the head coach of the New York Giants on Jan. 20, 2026.

From 2008 to 2025, he led the Baltimore Ravens to 12 postseason appearances and six division titles. Harbaugh compiled a record of 180-113 (.614) and led four different Ravens teams to the AFC Championship game, including a 28-13 victory over the New England Patriots that catapulted Baltimore to Super Bowl XLVII. In that game, Harbaugh led the Ravens to a 34-31 victory over the San Francisco 49ers.

Entering 2026, Harbaugh's 180 regular-season victories ranked 14th in NFL history, while his 13 postseason wins are tied for the seventh-most. Overall, his 194 wins (regular season and playoffs) are the 13th-most all-time. Harbaugh also owns eight road playoff wins, the most in league history.

During Harbaugh's tenure as head coach (2008-25), Baltimore averaged a league-leading 139.8 rushing yards per game, 10 more than the next closest team. Harbaugh produced offenses that finished in the top 10 in total yards five times during his tenure, including 2024, when the Ravens set a franchise record, averaging 424.9 total yards per game. Baltimore has also finished among the top five in points per game three times since 2019, when they led the NFL, averaging 33.2 points per game.

In nine of Harbaugh's 18 seasons as head coach, the Ravens ranked among the top three teams in fewest points allowed. Baltimore allowed 19.4 points per game from 2008 to 2025, the fewest in the NFL. Also in that span, the Ravens allowed 96.6 rushing yards per game, the fewest in the NFL and the only team under 100 yards.

From 2008 to 2025, Baltimore boasted a league-leading 22 players with first-team All-Pro honors. Those 22 players combined for 37 first-team selections. Quarterback **Lamar Jackson** earned the honor three times (2019, 2023, 2024) and earned Associated Press NFL Most Valuable Player twice (2019, 2023). Linebacker **Terrell Suggs** earned AP Defensive Player of the Year in 2011.

Harbaugh began his NFL coaching career in 1998 as a special teams coordinator for the Philadelphia Eagles, a position he held for nine seasons before leading the Eagles secondary in 2007.

From 1989-96, Harbaugh served at the University of Cincinnati, recruiting and working with special teams, tight ends, outside linebackers and running backs.

He began his coaching career in 1984, serving as a graduate assistant under his father, Jack, at Western Michigan. In 1987, he coached tight ends at Pittsburgh before spending the 1988 season at Morehead State working with defensive backs, special teams and strength and conditioning.

Philadelphia Eagles 24, Tennessee Titans 20

In Week 2 of the 2026 season, the Titans hosted the Philadelphia Eagles and lost in the final seconds to fall to 0-2 to start the season. After the Titans offense began the game with a quick three-and-out, the Eagles took over at their own 28-yard line. QB Jalen Hurts then marched the Eagles down to the Tennessee eight-yard line by converting three third downs and a fourth down. Facing another third down, S Amani Hooker intercepted a pass from Hurts in the end zone and raced 92 yards down the field to set up first-and-goal at the Philadelphia 10-yard line. A five-yard run by RB Tony Pollard, an incompletion and a four-yard scramble by QB Cam Ward put the Titans at the one-yard line on fourth down. Ward snuck in to make it 7-0 with 4:22 left in the first quarter. The Eagles responded quickly with an 11-play, 65-yard touchdown drive capped off by a two-yard touchdown run from RB Tank Bigsby to tie it at 7-7 with 12:49 left in the second quarter. Philadelphia extended its lead with a 14-play, 81-yard drive that culminated in a 22-yard touchdown pass from Hurts to WR DeVonta Smith to make it 14-7 with 1:49 left in the half. Back-to-back explosive plays including a 28-yard completion from Ward to WR Elic Ayomanor and then a 27-yard catch-and-run by RB Tyjae Spears put the Titans in scoring range. K Joey Slye made it 14-10 with a 37-yard field goal going into halftime. Midway through the third quarter, a 58-yard field goal by K Jake Elliott gave the Eagles a 17-10 lead. The Titans responded with a 12-play, 69-yard touchdown drive and capped it off with a one-yard touchdown run by Ward, who dove into the left front corner of the end zone to make it 17-17 with 57 seconds left in the third quarter. Ward connected with WR Calvin Ridley twice on the drive for 35 yards. Later in the fourth quarter, the Titans got a big play on defense, as DT Jeffery Simmons closed in on Hurts who lofted a ball up which led to a CB Marcus Harris interception at the six-minute mark. With the game tied at 17-17, the Titans put together a 10-play drive, highlighted by a 41-yard catch, and hurdle, from Ayomanor and a 27-yard run by Spears. Slye gave the Titans a 20-17 lead with a 33-yard field goal with 1:56 left on the clock. The Eagles then drove 65 yards down the field with no timeouts and scored on a three-yard touchdown pass from Hurts to WR Darius Cooper with nine seconds left. The Hail Mary attempt fell incomplete and the Titans dropped to 0-2.

NOTES FROM LAST WEEK'S GAME

TEAM NOTES

- The Titans opened the season with back-to-back home games for the first time since doing so in 2010. Next, the Titans will go on the road in three of the next four weeks, beginning with a trip to New York to play the Giants on Sunday, Sept. 27 (noon CT).
- For the second consecutive week, the Titans played the second-hottest game at Nissan Stadium, which opened in 1999, and the second-hottest game – home or away – in the franchise's "Titans era," which also began in 1999. The temperature at kickoff against the Eagles was 92 degrees. The only higher kickoff temperature for the Titans since the beginning of 1999 was 93 degrees at Nissan Stadium on Sept. 15, 2019, when they played the Indianapolis Colts. The humidity against the Eagles was 49 percent, and the heat index at kickoff was 98 degrees. In Week 1 against the Jets, the kickoff temperature at Nissan Stadium was 90 degrees, which at the time ranked second for the franchise in its Titans era.
- For the second consecutive week to begin the season, the Titans used three rookie starters: first-round wide receiver **Carnell Tate**, second-round linebacker **Anthony Hill Jr.** and fifth-round right guard **Fernando Carmona Jr.**
- Three players made their Titans debut: rookie running back **Nick Singleton** (NFL debut), linebacker **Owen Pappoe** and cornerback **Jaylon Jones**.
- The Titans won the turnover battle with a plus-two margin, getting two interceptions on defense without committing a turnover. Safety **Amani Hooker** and cornerback **Marcus Harris** each registered interceptions.
- It was the Titans' first game with multiple interceptions since Sept. 7, 2025 at Denver.
- The Titans rushed for 122 yards on 29 total carries against Philadelphia, outgaining the Eagles (89 rushing yards) on the ground by 33 yards.
- The Titans defense limited the Eagles to 89 rushing yards on 32 carries for an average of 2.8 yards per carry.
- The Titans defense tallied eight tackles for loss, tied for the most by the team in a game since the beginning of the 2025 season.
- The Titans offense converted six of their 13 third-down attempts. The 46.2 percent rate on third down was the unit's second-highest rate since the beginning of the 2025 season (52.94 percent against Kansas City on Dec. 21, 2025).
- Three Titans recorded receptions of at least 25 yards: **Elic Ayomanor** (41 and 28 yards), **Tyjae Spears** (27 yards) and **Calvin Ridley** (25 yards).

WR ELIC AYOMANOR

- Started at wide receiver and led the team with 69 receiving yards on two receptions.
- Had a 28-yard reception in the second quarter and a 41-yard reception in the fourth quarter. It was his first career game with two receptions of over 25 yards.
- His 41-yard reception was the longest of his career.

DL JORDAN ELLIOTT

- Registered his first start in a Titans uniform and posted a tackle.

DL JOHN FRANKLIN-MYERS

- Totaled two tackles, including a sack, with three quarterback pressures.
- In the fourth quarter, he was credited with the first sack of his Titans career when he forced **Jalen Hurts** out of bounds for no gain. Franklin-Myers increased his career total to 35 sacks.

LB CEDRIC GRAY

- Saw his first action of the season and totaled four tackles, including a tackle for loss.

CB MARCUS HARRIS

- Posted six tackles, one tackle for loss and an interception. He was the first Titans defensive back to reach those numbers in a game since safety **Amani Hooker** against Indianapolis on Oct. 13, 2024.
- Recorded the first interception of his career on a **Jalen Hurts** pass in the fourth quarter.

TE GUNNAR HELM

- Started at tight end and recorded two receptions for 13 yards.
- Extended his streak to 18 consecutive games with at least one reception to begin his career.

LB ANTHONY HILL JR.

- Led the team in tackles for the second consecutive week, accumulating 10 tackles against the Eagles.
- Totaled an NFL-high 26 tackles in the first two weeks of the season and the first two games of his NFL career. He had 16 tackles in the season opener against the Jets.
- Tied **Keith Bulluck** (2006) for the most total tackles (26) by a Titans player through the first two games of a season since the beginning of 2000 (GSIS press box statistics).
- Since the beginning of 2000, the only NFL rookie with more tackles in the first two games of a season was Indianapolis Colts linebacker **Shaquille Leonard** with 28 in 2018.

S AMANI HOOKER

- Totaled six tackles, an interception and a quarterback pressure.
- Nabbed his first interception of the season in the first quarter, picking off a **Jalen Hurts** pass in the end zone and returning the ball 92 yards to Tennessee's 10-yard line. The Titans scored on a one-yard run by **Cam Ward** four plays later.
- With his 13th career interception, Hooker tied **Jason McCourty** for the eighth-highest career total for the franchise during its "Titans era" (1999–present).
- The 92-yard interception return was the longest of **Amani Hooker's** career, the sixth-longest interception return in franchise history, and the longest interception return by a Titans player since **Jordan Babineaux's** 97-yarder for a touchdown at Cleveland on Oct. 2, 2011.

DE JACOB MARTIN

- Tallied a sack and six quarterback pressures.
- Notched his first sack as a member of the Titans to end an Eagles drive in the third quarter. He took down **Jalen Hurts** for an 11-yard loss on third down, improving his career total to 27.5 career sacks.

RB TONY POLLARD

- Started at running back and led the team with 64 rushing yards on 14 attempts.
- Had a 13-yard run to convert a third-and-one in the second quarter.
- Recorded a season-long 18-yard run in the fourth quarter.

WR CALVIN RIDLEY

- Started at wide receiver and finished with two receptions for 35 yards.
- Recorded a 25-yard gain on his first reception of the season in the third quarter.

- With his sack against Philadelphia, he moved to within one sack of tying **Derrick Morgan** (44.5) for 11th place on the franchise's all-time sack list, and fourth among players in the franchise's "Titans era" (1999 to present).
- Simmons recorded 13 total pressures in the first two games of the season, which set a career high and was the most by a defensive tackle since San Francisco's **Javon Hargrave** recorded 13 in the first two weeks of 2023.
- Led all NFL interior defensive linemen in total pressures (13) through the first two weeks of the season (through Sunday, Sept. 20).
- His 13 quarterback pressures were the most by a Titans player at any position since **Arden Key** recorded 15 in the first two weeks of 2023.

RB NICK SINGLETON

- Made his NFL debut.
- Rushed four times for 10 yards.

G PETER SKORONSKI

- Appeared in his 50th career game and made his 50th career start.

K JOEY SLYE

- Made a 37-yard field goal on the final play of the first half and added a 33-yarder in the fourth quarter. He was also good on both extra point attempts.


RB TYJAE SPEARS

- Finished with a team-high 70 yards from scrimmage (41 rushing, 29 receiving).
- Had a 27-yard run in the fourth quarter, the second-longest rush of his career.
- Recorded a 27-yard reception in the second quarter to help set up a Titans field goal.
- Reached the 2,000-yard plateau for career scrimmage yards (2,015).

WR CARNELL TATE

- Started at wide receiver and led the team with three receptions for 27 yards.

CB ALONTAE TAYLOR

- Totaled five tackles, including a team-high two tackles for loss.

- Averaged 50.8 yards on four punts, including one punt inside the 20.
- Notched a 65-yard punt in the first quarter.

QB CAM WARD

- Completed 13 of 20 passes for 183 yards and a 94.4 passer rating.
- Ward's 94.4 passer rating was the third best of his 19-game career in a contest with at least 20 attempts.
- Added two rushing touchdowns. Finished with seven rushing yards on four attempts.
- Scored the Titans' first touchdown of the contest with a one-yard run on fourth-and-goal in the first quarter.
- Capped a 12-play, 69-yard drive with his second rushing touchdown of the contest on a one-yard carry in the third quarter. It was his first career game with multiple rushing touchdowns and gave him four career rushing scores.
- Ward became the first Titans quarterback with multiple rushing touchdowns in a game since **Ryan Tannehill** had a pair at Houston on Jan. 3, 2021.
- Connected with **Elic Ayomanor** for a 41-yard completion in the fourth quarter.

HEAD COACH ROBERT SALEH

Only injury, (Fernando) Carmona. He's dealing with, I think, a shoulder. We'll get him checked in the morning.

You guys were asking for third-and-longs during the week and more situations. You got the interception out of one, but they converted quite a big deal of them. What did you think of that?

Yeah. First half wasn't good enough. Thought we played really well in the second half, minus that last drive. But you're right. We had a lot of opportunities in the first half to get off the field, a lot of things that we can improve on.

How big of a killer was that Calvin (Ridley) penalty?

All the way throughout the entire game that was my message to the team that felt like we outplayed them. And there's certain moments in the entire game where execution reigned supreme, being disciplined reigned supreme, and they were the more—they executed better in critical moments.

How hard is it to lose a game like this?

It sucks. Whether you lose by 100 or in the last second, it doesn't matter; they all suck.

At the end of the first half, was the mindset to go for three there? Because you called one play, and it seemed like you had 30 something seconds left. You could have taken a couple of shots toward the end zone maybe.

It was third and really long, and finish the half with the ball, finish the half with points. Last thing we wanted to do was—that was my call. Last thing we wanted to do is have the clock stop, kick a field goal and they have time to go get three points of their own.

You guys as an operation offensively have to account at all for how many opposing fans were here?

No. I think it was pretty manageable. We were able to stay within our cadence.

What keyed that final drive for them in your eyes?

It's going to come down to execution. When we watch it, like I said, they executed and we didn't.

What did you make of Cam Ward's performance overall today?

I thought offense as a whole improved as the game went on. Like I said, I thought the second half was really good. Credit Jalen Carter made a really good play on what we thought we had a really good play right there, and Jalen just blew it up on that first-and-goal from the nine. But, no, I thought our offense improved as the game went on.

Was that feeling going into the locker room kind of similar to last week where you would've bet these would come out stronger?

I thought last week was going to play out like this week where we came out and controlled the tempo of the game, and our offense was able to possess the ball and defense was able to get some three-and-outs. Like I said, overall I thought we really outplayed them, but they executed better than we did in the final minutes.

Do you come out of this encouraged?

No. There's no moral victories. There's going to be things that we've got to improve on. Like I told our team, we're going to be sick when we watch this tape, because we should be 1-1 right now. But we're not, and that's credit to Philly. They executed.

The one big touchdown drive in the second half seemed like really found something there. How hard is it, obviously proved difficult to kind of get the ball back and sustain that. What do you guys need to do when you find that to kind of find a way to...

Philly is one of the best defenses in the league, and to be able to do those things consistently against a team like that is difficult. It just is. I do think, like I've told you, we're going to get better every week. We're going to find more consistency every week. And we're going to be better at executing every week. I've got a lot of faith in the group we have. Like I said, we've got a really cool young group of guys. They're getting better every week. They're learning something new every week. And the consistency will come; the execution will come. But, yeah, you'd love to go down and score every single time. But like I said, Philly, they get paid on that side, too.

How personally do you take this loss with the game-winning drive coming with the defense on the field?

No, for sure. I take it personal regardless, dude. Like whether the offense stalled or whatever it is. A loss is a loss. We win as a team; we lose as a team. I'm just sick at the way we lost in terms of all of it was right at our fingertips. But like I said, it comes down to execution, and definitely could have called a couple things better.

It wasn't every drive, especially in the second half, but for a large part of the game it kind of felt like there was a disconnect with the secondary as a whole, especially when you guys were in the zone. Is that a fair assessment?

Yeah. We just got to understand situations and execute better. Like I said, one of the third-and-longs we're playing a cover-2 principle, and we're playing low on the down instead of high. Same thing happened in the two-minute situation. The deep over that scored a touchdown. Again, there's simple principles that we need to be better at in executing and understanding how teams attack us. I think as our players grow in the system, they're going to learn that what they see every week is the same. It's the same thing every week. They might change the formation, they might change the look. We call it window dressing, but at the end of the day, the distribution of routes are always going to be the same. And our players, as they learn the system, will start figuring out how to play all those.

What was it like to watch Amani Hooker's interception and almost return it all the way and how much of a spark did that provide?

It was awesome. I thought Amani (Hooker) did a really nice job in terms of understanding the route distribution, because it is a split decision that he has to make. And there's a lot of moving parts in that, one where the MIKE linebacker has got to play fast and be decisive so Amani can get the read he needs. And then Amani just slides into that next window and intercepted it. So really well-executed play in that regard.

How does a guy go from being invisible the way Calvin Ridley was through a game and a half to making two big plays on that biggest drive you've had?

I don't have that answer. You go out and you play, and you work as hard as you can, and you play as hard as you can, and you execute the way you need to execute, and when your number is called, your number is called. And that would be my explanation.

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Pass rush seemed better in the second half. Was that an adjustment that you made? Was it guys just being fresher and able to go or what?

A little bit of both. Understanding what they were trying to do protection wise, changing some of our looks, changing some of the fronts. But at the end of the day, you still got to win your one-and-one. I thought Jacob (Martin) showed up a lot in the second half. I know Jeffery (Simmons), he saved us on the second interception to Marcus (Harris). I think he took a little air off the ball, which allowed Marcus to fall underneath it. No, I thought, look, it's a four-quarter game, 60 minutes, and like I said, I thought the second half we played really well, minus the last five minutes.

QUARTERBACK CAM WARD

Cam, how frustrating is it to have to take the field goal there at the end instead of finding the end zone?

It's frustrating, for sure. We want to end every drive with a touchdown. That's our goal each and every time that we step on the field is to get a touchdown. And for us not to be able to help the defense in that situation, we take that upon ourselves. But it was another opportunity to get better at. We ran the ball in the situation, things to get better from a run-scheme standpoint, as far as, getting a hat on a hat, myself carrying out the fakes to help it out. But I think it's just another opportunity for us to get better in that situation.

How do you balance the idea of something to build on versus a moral victory?

It's not a moral victory. It's a loss, and that's all it comes down to. But, with every game, even last week, there's good, there's bad. But we got to be a mentally tough team. We got to be able to play four quarters of football, overtime if we need to. We just got to continue to go in the right direction every outing.

Across the board, what encouraged you about today, and what areas kept it from coming up short?

I think what encouraged me the most was that we were able to get some explosive offense. The O-line did a fantastic job as far as protecting myself. I think there were times where I shouldn't have left the pocket so early just because of how well they protected it. I think the O-line had a great day. There's things that they can get better at as well. I'm sure they'll tell you. But I think we got done what we wanted to get done, at least as far as a couple explosive plays. We ran the ball extremely well. We had some key plays in the pass game, which we need. But we all got to be better. I had a missed touchdown to Elic (Ayomanor) on the interception that (Amani) Hooker had. We ended up scoring that drive, but there's things that we continue to get better at. We're going against a good team next week, trying to win.



Do games like this stick with you longer than last week, as far as being in a position where you feel you could have won?

Every game sticks with you. I got games that stick with me since high school and college. And it's really all the bad plays, because that's really the only thing—if you play football, you remember. Honestly, you remember more bad plays than good plays. We're supposed to make good plays. We're supposed to do our job. But I think the urgency is there. The communication is there. Now it just comes down to us winning, us playing all four quarters of football. And I'm proud to be on this team. Proud to be one of the leaders in the locker room. I'm looking forward to all of us taking this under the chin, getting better and preparing for next week.

How do you get to more of the stuff that made that good drive so, good, where you hit Calvin (Ridley) a couple times and were really efficient? What is it about that drive that worked so well, and how do you sustain it later and get to it earlier?

Everybody did their job. Starts up front. We got a hat on a hat in the run game. That helped us out a lot in the pass game. Receivers, they were very physical in the run game. They made plays in the pass game. There's plays that they want back, for sure, in the pass game. It's also a play that I want back. So, it's really just limiting all the little things. That way we can play efficient each and every play.

Did you guys have to change anything from an operational standpoint, given the number of opposing fans in the stadium?

Not really. Had to be a little bit louder. Had to go on silent down the stretch on third downs a little bit. But whatever comes with it, we've got to adjust to it. So that really doesn't play a factor in anything, just how can we get better each and every play.

What was it about the two-minute drill at the end of the first half? It did seem to kind of put you in a good rhythm that lasted for most of the second half.

I just think that's when it clicked for us. I think that's when we were able to get in a rhythm. We were able to be on the field a little bit. I think we had the ball early in the game, and that's on me. That's on the entire offense having three-and-outs and not being effective on plays. So, I think we really honed in on the little details that got us going.

Did you have the opportunity to talk to Jalen (Hurts), and if so, what did he say to you?

Yeah, I did after the game. Just wished me the best of luck. Said he respected me. I respect him as well for what he's accomplished in his journey. Both some Texas guys. So, we're just looking to be the best for our team. He's a great quarterback.

What improvements do you think you made from last week to this week?

I just think we had a better showing. We had a better showing running the ball. We had a better pass game. But I think personally, I just think the operation from this week to last week stayed the same. I think we were in and out of the huddle fast. But I think just something that got better from week-to-week is continuing to stay in the pocket. I still didn't do as much as I really wanted to today, but that's also something I continue to get better at.

What does Elic Ayomanor do that makes himself a comfortable downfield target?

He works hard. He shows up every day at the same time I show up, and we watch every clip of film together. Every time I need a receiver to catch the ball, he's there for me. He doesn't make no excuses. And everything that Elic (Ayomanor) is about to get this year, whether it's yards, touchdowns, awards, anything, he deserves it. He's a hard worker. He's a great teammate. Never points the finger at anybody. But he's going to be the reason why we're able to win games down the stretch.

Do you leave here today feeling better about where things are right now, even after a loss?

I leave here with another loss. That's the only thing that matters. Either you

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win or you lose. We didn't win today, but there's good in it. There's also bad in it as well, both sides of the ball. But it's another opportunity. It's still early in the season. We're trending in the right direction. We just got to make it happen next week, try to get a win against a good team and have to hope that springs us going forward.

Is there anything foundationally that you feel like you built on today that maybe you didn't in the past year or going into last week and then coming into this game?

I would say just having the big key for us this game in the quarterback room was making it a completion game. They have a great rush. They have some good guys in the back end. And so, for us, it was more the quarterback room, to get the ball out, help the O-line, try to stay in the green, try to have positive plays, not play so much third-and-long or second-and-long like we got in today. But that was an improvement for not only myself, but the whole offense, is staying effective on early downs. And I think that's what led us to playing better today.

What happened on the sack on the last drive, and did the mindset change after that from going for seven to maybe just knowing that you needed to get three?

We tried to have a little naked. They made a good play on defense, ended up getting a sack. And for us, it was more second-down, third-down call, more of us trying to get something back so we can get an opportunity to try to get seven. Didn't go that way, but we put ourselves in a situation to take the lead.

Do you have a good view of Elic Ayomanor's hurdle, and what did you think of that play?

I had a great view of it. All I had to do was get him the ball, the space was wide and it was a great play call by Dabs (Brian Daboll). That man's an athlete. So, I'm pretty sure that's not the last hurdle we'll see from him.

LINEBACKER CEDRIC GRAY

How did it feel getting back into the mix and finally getting to put your hands on somebody?

It felt good. I was excited to play today, have fun today. Obviously, we didn't have the result that we wanted, but it was just good to be back out there with my brothers.

On the plays that you were in, you guys just weren't able to try to get home. But in the second half it seemed like you guys were able to get some consistent pressure. Was that something that's encouraging for you on the second level?

Yeah, I mean, I think throughout the game, and you're going to see throughout the season, that everything is just going to get better. The pass rush, the coverage, the run defense, everything is going to get better as the game goes on. We got to figure out what they're doing and everything will just start to get better.

How much of that is the identity of this team? You guys are figuring it out as you go along.

Yeah, I mean, I think our identity is being fast and violent. And I think we showed that. I think we just got to be a little bit more consistent in the different things that we're doing schematically.

When they got the ball back to go back out there, I think they had 41 yards of offense up until that last drive. How confident were you guys in getting that stop?

I think we were pretty confident going out there. Like I said, obviously we didn't get the job done. We'll look at the film, and we just got to go back and clean those things up. So, when we're in that situation again, we can capitalize.

CORNERBACK MARCUS HARRIS

In the secondary, all of a sudden when Jeff Simmons made Jalen Hurts have to put a little bit more loft under the pass, you were able to just kind of corral it.

Yeah, rush and coverage working together. Just playing my key, playing fast, doing what my coaches told me, put me in good position to make that play.

How disappointing at the end to not be able to nail this one down when you had it?

Yeah, it definitely hurts. It definitely hurts, but time to get back to the drawing board. 17 games, two down. We got to get in the win column next week.

How does it make you feel defensively with your team knowing that you hung with the Eagles and almost pulled this around with a good comeback?

Yeah, I think we can hang with any team. I don't think there's no surprise that the game was that close for us. We know what we have in this locker room, we just got to execute and come back to work and finish.

SAFETY AMANI HOOKER

In spite of your great interception, and the Titans comeback, the team fell short. What are you feeling right now?

Just frustrated that we couldn't finish the game off. Coming out here, I felt that early on in the game, we let them move the ball pretty good. Coming out second half, we were playing good defense, but we just need to find a way to get off the field and win.

Defenses always want to be on the field with the game on the line. How disappointed were you with that ending?

Very disappointed. I mean it comes down to the details. Knowing the situations, and knowing how we want to play things in those situations. Like I said before, I felt like we had good game, but we need to find a way to come out and put it away.

The interception, was that something you saw in film?

Yeah, I mean, something we've seen from many teams and it was a similar play that a lot of teams run. So just kind of being in the league for a while, I kind of recognized some of the formations and they just ended up throwing it where I wanted it to go, and I was able to get some yards out of it.

Given what they did offensively in the first half, what type of adjustments did you make? What does that tell you about where you guys can be?

Coming in at halftime, making those adjustments, being coachable, having guys that can take coaching and then applying it right away to the second half. And I felt like we just did a good job of communicating. That was the emphasis this week of being on the same page and communicating. And it showed in the second half, we just have got to find a way to get off that field.

On that last drive, did you feel them start to roll or what's kind of mentality that they pick up?

I mean the mentality is don't let them get in field goal range. And then, once they're in field goal range, 'It's all right well, we already gave that up.' Now, it's protect the end zone. So that's just something that we've just got to make sure that we emphasize all week. That every situation has a different technique with how we want to play things.

Overall, what positives can you take from an effort like this against a good football team like Philly?

Just how the margin of error is in this league, and the window is very small. We have a lot of young guys on the team. Some guys that don't know how to win in the NFL. And this shows you that the margin is very small, and what it takes to win.

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RUNNING BACK TONY POLLARD

It looked like the holes were there for you, how effective was the offense able to be when there was time?

I feel like we did a good job when we were needed the most. Our offense stepped up, we made plays when we needed to. At the end of the game we finished out, took the lead. But still, we feel like we can do more. Maybe if we come out with a touchdown, we are in overtime, then we can find a way to pull it out, but we've just got to find a way in these tight games. This is what the league is.

Do you think there is something to learning how to win games like this and will the younger guys on the team benefit from experiencing this?

Definitely. I mean, this is the NFL, so you can come in and you can expect adversity. Every game, there is going to be adversity, you are going to face some type of adversity. The other guys, they get paid, too, to make plays. We got to do a good job of regrouping, getting things together, and going out there and getting it done.

How close do you feel like you are to getting it done?

Well, I feel like we are getting close, especially in that second half. The run game starts to get going, the offense slowly started moving the ball downfield, and we started getting some kind of production. But you got to find a way to do everything.

How confident were you with the defense in the second half?

We were very confident. The defense, they were great for us today. They did a great job getting the ball back, you know, being opportunistic out there, making plays for us and setting us up in position to get points. Like I said, we just got to find a way.

No one likes moral victories, but do you think everyone is going to come out of here feeling better about things?

I wouldn't say a moral victory, but it's a lot that we can learn from. It's a lot that we can get better from, a lot that we did good and can take from and move forward with. But at the end of the day, these games are going to be tight. This is what the league is, and we just got to find a way to be better.

What did you make of the way Nick Singleton ran the ball?

Nick (Singleton) looked great. That's what we expected from him, to go out there and do what he does every day at practice, make the plays and just be ready for the opportunity.

DEFENSIVE TACKLE JEFFERY SIMMONS

Defenses obviously want to be on the field with the game on the line. How disappointing was it to give up that final drive?

It's very disappointing, man. I mean, situational football, two-minute, we've got to be at our very best. I mean, for one, we kind of know who they want to get the ball to. That's when you have to mentally strain to just do your job. Everyone, whoever is on the field has got to do their job. We need to go back and watch it, but man, it's simple. We didn't do our job. Easy completions, the ball coming out and finding guys and especially that last play is just like—as players, we have to be also smart in situations like that. You've got to kind of know what they're going to try to run. There's no such thing as moral a victory, but man, we're just one play away. Like it's a lot of positives that came out of today. No one, I mean absolutely no one outside of the building gave us a chance. I mean that ball game came down to the end. That's a good football team. And like I said, no one gave us the chance and it just came down to two-minute execution and we didn't execute good enough when the game really mattered.

Jeff, do you come out encouraged from all this? I mean, like you said, nobody gave you guys a shot. But moral victories, how are you kind of looking at this?

Back to the drawing board, I'm ready to get back to work. We got a road game. New York's a pretty good football team. It's like, do we hang our cleats up going into Week 3? We got a long season ahead. So you see the



response we got coming out of last week's game. Need a little more sense of urgency. We came into this week excited for another opportunity. We got another opportunity in Week 3 and that's going to be my message to the team. We've just got to get back to the drawing board and fix the little things, especially when the game really matters. When it comes down to the small details, especially in the critical part of the game. We talk about situational football, and that's what it came down to today. And we just got to get back to the drawing board, just do the little things right.

How big of a jump do you think you guys took? You got two turnovers, a few quarterback sacks, stuff that you didn't have last week.

Step in the right direction. That's why I said it's a lot of—each and every game, win or lose, it's going to be a lot good and bad. And that was a big positive coming into this game. We knew we wanted to come into this game and affect the quarterback. Keep Jalen (Hurts) in the pocket. I think we did a hell of a job of that. And then we hit him a couple of times today too as well. So force him into the two interceptions that he had. So it's a step in right direction. I challenged our D line to affect the game way more than what we did last week. I think we're on the right track.

SAFETY KEVIN WINSTON JR.

A great second half adjustment for the Titans, to get back in the game, and take the lead.

It means nothing, if you don't finish. So, our biggest thing is right now, we've got improvement, and to make sure that improvement goes throughout the whole game, and we finish that way. Right now, the focus is making sure we finish, and we've got to make sure we are on the details, and make sure from now on, that we finish how we want to.

Can you take any positives from the way you guys performed today against a pretty good football team?

Yeah, I'll always take positives. Like I said, we're trying to be up there with the best, to beat the best teams, and beat the good teams. We're not trying to just hang around. We're trying to be the best. So that's what we're chasing right now, and we got to make sure that we do the detailed things to make sure we come off with a win in a game like that.

(Amani) Hooker was saying that this game, kind of epitomizes how there's always a thin margin for error in this league. Was that kind of, you know, on display today?

That's exactly what it was. This game—between who wins and who loses, is that thin margin of error. We had a couple times with us, that margin of error, we came up on the bad side of it. We have got to make sure that we do the right things, get on the small things, the details, to make sure that we're on the right side of them.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2026

WHAT TO LOOK FOR – TEAM

- The Titans franchise (499 all-time wins) needs one win to reach 500 all-time wins, including the regular season and postseason.

WR ELIC AYOMANOR

- After tallying 41 receptions for 515 yards and four touchdowns as a rookie in 2025, he can join **A.J. Brown** (2019-20), **Jerry Levias** (1969-70), **Bill Groman** (1960-61) and **Charlie Hennigan** (1960-61) as the only players in franchise history to reach 40 receptions, 500 receiving yards and four touchdown catches in each of his first two NFL seasons.

LS MORGAN COX

- Enters 2026 ranked sixth in the NFL in career games played among active players (250 entering 2026).
- Will reach 100 consecutive NFL games played by appearing in the team's first 10 games of the 2026 season.
- Enters 2026 with a team-best active streak of 85 consecutive games played with the Titans.

WR CHIMERE DIKE

- After leading the NFL with a 17.3-yard punt return average in 2025, he can become the franchise's first player to lead the league in punt return average in consecutive seasons. The only other player in team annals to lead the NFL multiple times in punt returns is **Billy "White Shoes" Johnson** (1975 and 1977).
- Can become the franchise's first player since **Earl Campbell** (1978-79) to be named first-team Associated Press All-Pro in each of his first two NFL seasons.
- Can become the franchise's first player since **Chris Johnson** (2008-09) to be named to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two NFL seasons.

DL JOHN FRANKLIN-MYERS

- Can register his seventh consecutive season with at least 15 games played.
- Can notch his third consecutive campaign with at least seven sacks (7.0 in 2024 and 7.5 in 2025).

LB CEDRIC GRAY

- After totaling 160 tackles in 2025, he can become the franchise's first player in its "Titans era" (1999 to present) with 150 or more tackles in back-to-back seasons.

TE GUNNAR HELM

- After he had 44 receptions in 2025, which set a franchise record among rookie tight ends, Helm needs 45 receptions in 2026 to break **Ben Troupe's** franchise record (88) for the most receptions in a tight end's first two NFL seasons.

S AMANI HOOKER

- Needs three interceptions in 2026 (12 entering 2026) to become the seventh player in the franchise's "Titans era" (1999–present) to reach 15 career interceptions.
- Will reach 100 career games played with four appearances in 2026.

T DAN MOORE JR.

- Can record 16 or more starts for the sixth consecutive season to begin his career.

RB TONY POLLARD

- Needs 218 rushing yards to reach 6,000 for his career (5,782 rushing yards entering 2026).
- Can notch his fifth consecutive season with at least 1,000 rushing yards.
- Joins **Derrick Henry** as the NFL's only players entering 2026 holding an active streak of four consecutive seasons with at least 1,000 rushing yards.
- Can notch his third consecutive season as a member of the Titans with at least 1,000 rushing yards. He would join **Chris Johnson** (six), **Eddie George** (five), **Earl Campbell** (four) and **Derrick Henry** (three) as the franchise's only players to accomplish the feat.
- Looks to extend his streak to six consecutive seasons with at least 1,000 scrimmage yards.
- Joins running backs **Derrick Henry** and **Saquon Barkley** and wide receiver **Amon-Ra St. Brown** as the NFL's only players entering 2026 holding an active streak of four consecutive seasons with at least 1,200 scrimmage yards.

WR CALVIN RIDLEY

- Enters the 2026 season with 405 receptions for 5,678 yards, averaging 14.0 yards per reception. He joins **Mike Evans**, **A.J. Brown**, **DK**

Metcalf, **Courtland Sutton** and **Justin Jefferson** as the NFL's only active players with at least 400 receptions and an average of at least 14.0 yards per catch.

- Needs 322 receiving yards to reach 6,000 for his career (5,678 entering 2025).
- Can record his fourth career 1,000-yard receiving season.

WR WAN'DALE ROBINSON

- Looks to register his third consecutive season with 90-plus receptions after a career-high 93 catches in 2024 and 92 catches in 2025. He was one of five players to reach the 90-reception mark in both 2024 and 2025, along with **Amon-Ra St. Brown**, **Ja'Marr Chase**, **Trey McBride** and **Jaxon Smith-Njigba**.
- Can log back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons after totaling a career-high 1,014 yards in 2025.

DT JEFFERY SIMMONS

- Enters the 2026 season with 42.5 career sacks. With 10 more sacks, he will move past **Jevon Kearse** (52.0) as the team's sack leader in the franchise's "Titans era" (1999 to present).
- With 10 sacks in 2026, he will join **Sean Jones** (1990-91) and **Jevon Kearse** (1999–2001) as the only Titans/Oilers players since 1982 to reach double-digit sacks in consecutive campaigns.
- Needs 7.5 sacks (42.5 entering 2025) to become the ninth player in franchise history to reach 50 career sacks and the seventh such player to do so since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982.
- Can record his sixth consecutive season with at least five sacks. He would join **Ray Childress** (nine consecutive seasons), **Jurrell Casey** (seven), **William Fuller** (six) and **Sean Jones** (six) as the only Titans/Oilers players to do so since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982.
- Will reach 100 career games played with his first appearance of 2026.
- His 99 career games played with the Titans are the most among all current players on the team entering 2026.

G PETER SKORONSKI

- Enters 2026 with a team-best active streak of 47 consecutive starts.
- Can notch his third consecutive season without missing an offensive snap.

K JOEY SLYE

- Slye connected on 28 field goals in 2025, his first season in Tennessee. If he reaches the number again in 2026, he will join **Rob Bironas** (2007-08) as the only players in franchise history with 28 or more field goals in back-to-back campaigns.
- Can log his third consecutive season and fifth total season with 100 or more points.

CB ALONTAE TAYLOR

- Shares with **Riq Woolen** a league-best active streak of four consecutive seasons with at least 11 passes defended entering 2026.
- Can appear in all 17 games for the fourth consecutive campaign.

P TOMMY TOWNSEND

- Enters 2026 as one of four active players who have averaged 47.0 yards per punt in each of the last five seasons, joining **Logan Cooke** (six consecutive seasons), **Bryan Anger** (five) and **AJ Cole** (five).
- Enters the 2026 season with a career net punting average of 42.8 yards, tying **Blake Gillikin** for fourth in NFL history (since 1976; minimum of 250 career punts) behind only **Logan Cooke** (43.4), **Jack Fox** (43.1) and **Michael Dickson** (42.9).
- Can notch his third consecutive season with at least 30 punts inside the 20. He is the NFL's only player with at least 30 punts inside the 20 in each of the past two campaigns.

QB CAM WARD

- Can record his second consecutive season with 3,000-plus passing yards. As a rookie in 2025, he became the first rookie in franchise history with 3,000 passing yards (3,169).
- Can join **Warren Moon** (1989-91), **Steve McNair** (2001-03), **George Blanda** (1963-64), **Marcus Mariota** (2016-17) and **Ryan Tannehill** (2020-21) as the only quarterbacks in franchise history with 3,000 passing yards in consecutive seasons.
- Enters 2026 with one interception and 10 touchdown passes in his past nine games.

2026 TITANS SCHEDULE NOTES

SEASON NOTES

- **FAREWELL SEASON:** With the opening of the new Nissan Stadium set for 2027, this season will mark the farewell season at the current Nissan Stadium. The Titans will open the campaign with a home game against the New York Jets in Week 1, and the team will close out its final regular season in the current building in Week 17 against the Pittsburgh Steelers. The Titans have already played more games at Nissan Stadium than any other venue in the franchise's history entering 2026. Including regular season and postseason games, the team has appeared 224 times at Nissan Stadium (119-105), one more than the 223 total contests at the Astrodome (116-105-2) from 1968 to 1996.
- **PLAYOFF OPPONENTS:** The Titans have six total games against four playoff teams from last season. They have home games against Houston, Jacksonville, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh and road contests at Houston and Jacksonville. Four of those games are against 2025 division winners: Jaguars twice (AFC South), Pittsburgh (AFC North) and Philadelphia (NFC East). This is the third consecutive year in which the Titans will have six games against reigning playoff clubs.
- **TV BREAKDOWN:** Excluding their Week 18 matchup at Houston, which has yet to be assigned a broadcasting network, the Titans are currently scheduled for 10 games on CBS and six games on FOX. Due to the NFL's flex scheduling, some contests could be moved to a different network from the one appearing on the initial schedule.
- **TOP DRAFT PICKS:** The Titans selected Carnell Tate with the fourth overall pick in this year's draft. The team is slated to face seven of the top-11 players selected in this year's draft, including Fernando Mendoza (first overall – Las Vegas), David Bailey (second overall – N.Y. Jets), Arvell Reese (fifth overall – N.Y. Giants), Sonny Styles (seventh overall – Washington), Spencer Fano (ninth overall – Cleveland), Francis Mauigoa (10th overall – N.Y. Giants) and Caleb Downs (11th overall – Dallas). Tate, Reese, Styles and Downs were teammates at Ohio State University.
- **HEAD COACHING EXPERIENCE:** Robert Saleh was one of 10 NFL head coaches who were hired by their teams this offseason, and the Titans will face five of the others: New York Giants' John Harbaugh, Baltimore's Jesse Minter, Cleveland's Todd Monken, Las Vegas' Klint Kubiak and Pittsburgh's Mike McCarthy. It is the first time since 2022 the Titans will face five-or-more head coaches in their first season with their team.
- **THREE GAMES BASED UPON 2025 FINISH:** Every NFL team has two intraconference games and one interconference matchup based on the previous year's standings. As a result of the Titans' fourth-place AFC South finish in 2025, they host the AFC East's fourth-place New York Jets, and they visit the AFC West's fourth-place Las Vegas Raiders and the NFC North's fourth-place Detroit Lions. Overall, the Titans' strength of schedule is .476 (137-151-1) based upon their opponents' combined 2025 record, the eighth lowest out of 32 NFL teams.
- **NEW YORK TIES:** The Titans will face off against both the New York Jets and Giants this season with multiple ties to each franchise. Head coach Robert Saleh was the head coach of the Jets from 2021-24, while offensive coordinator Brian Daboll was head coach of the Giants from 2022-25. In addition to Saleh and Daboll, several current Titans players and coaches have also spent time with the New York franchises.
- **OFFENSIVE LEADERS:** The revamped Titans defense under head coach Robert Saleh will face two of the top-five offenses from last season in the Dallas Cowboys (second – 391.9 yards per game) and Detroit Lions (fifth – 373.2).
- **TIME (ZONE) TRAVEL:** The Titans will stay in the Central time zone for 10 matchups in 2026, including every home game and their two trips to Texas against the Cowboys and the Texans. They will double their trips to the Eastern time zone from three in 2025 to six in 2026 (at N.Y. Giants, Baltimore, Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Jacksonville and Detroit). Outside of a preseason visit to San Francisco, the farthest Tennessee will fly is to Las Vegas, their second trip to Nevada in two seasons after never playing there before 2025. The Titans will not play in the Mountain time zone.

WEEK-BY-WEEK SCHEDULE NOTES

- **WEEK 3 at NEW YORK GIANTS:** On Sept. 27, the Titans will travel to the Meadowlands to take on the Giants, who have never beaten Tennessee at MetLife Stadium (0-2). The Giants hold a 7-5 all-time series lead on the Titans. The previous meeting between the clubs was in Week 1 of the 2022 season, a 21-20 Giants comeback win. The series has also provided a memorable Titans comeback, when Tennessee rallied from a 21-point deficit in the fourth quarter to defeat New York 24-21 in 2006. Titans offensive coordinator Brian Daboll spent the previous four seasons (2022-25) as the head coach of the Giants. Other first-year Titans coaches who spent the 2025 season on the Giants staff include Carmen Bricillo, Marquand Manuel and Shea Tierney. The Titans also signed former Giants' players Daniel Bellinger, Cor'Dale Flott, Wan'Dale Robinson and Austin Schlottmann during the 2026 offseason. Giants passing game coordinator/quarterbacks coach Brian Callahan and defensive coordinator Dennard Wilson formerly served as Titans head coach and defensive coordinator, respectively.
- **WEEK 4 at BALTIMORE RAVENS:** The Titans will travel to Baltimore for the first time since 2020 and face off against running back Derrick Henry, who joined the Ravens in 2024 after an eight-year career with the Titans. Henry ranks second in Titans/Oilers history in rushing yards (9,502) and attempts (2,030) while holding a franchise record with 90 career rushing touchdowns. The Titans and Ravens have developed a heated rivalry over the course of 27 all-time meetings since the series originated in 1996, highlighted by five postseason contests — most recently a 20-13 Ravens Wild Card victory on Jan. 10, 2021.
- **WEEK 5 (H) & WEEK 18 (A) vs. HOUSTON TEXANS:** The Titans and Texans rivalry enters its 25th season. The two teams have split the season series in six of the last nine years. The Titans will look to take the lead in the series as it currently sits tied at 24 wins apiece. Head coach DeMeco Ryans and quarterback C.J. Stroud enter their fourth year together. The Texans have reached the playoffs the previous three seasons but have fallen short in the divisional round each year.
- **WEEK 6 (A) & WEEK 15 (H) vs. INDIANAPOLIS COLTS:** The Titans look to end the Colts' six-game winning streak in the rivalry. Prior to the Colts' streak, the Titans won five consecutive matchups in the series from 2020-22. Titans' defensive coordinator, Gus Bradley, spent three seasons as the Colts defensive coordinator from 2022-24, including two years under current Colts head coach Shane Steichen. The two coaches spent four years together (2017-20) with the Chargers as Steichen climbed the ranks from offensive quality control to quarterbacks coach to offensive coordinator while Bradley served as defensive coordinator.
- **WEEK 7 vs. CLEVELAND BROWNS:** Cleveland visits Nissan Stadium for the first time since Dec. 6, 2020, when the Browns left with a 41-25 victory. Overall, Cleveland holds a 37-33 lead in the all-time series dating back to 1970. Last season, the Titans captured a victory at Cleveland while Tony Pollard rushed for a career-high 161 yards, Jeffery Simmons totaled 1.5 sacks and James Williams Sr. blocked a punt.
- **WEEK 8 at CINCINNATI BENGALS:** The Titans lead the all-time series against the Bengals, 41-38-1. From 2021 to 2024, the Bengals visited Nissan Stadium every year and claimed three out of the four matchups, including the 2021 divisional playoff game. This will be the first time the Titans travel to Cincinnati since 2020. The Bengals are led by seventh-year quarterback Joe Burrow and eight-year head coach Zac Taylor.
- **WEEK 9 (BYE):** This season marks the first time since 2014 the Titans have had a Week 9 bye. It comes one week earlier than the Week 10 bye the Titans had in 2025.
- **WEEK 10 (H) & WEEK 12 (A) vs. JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS:** The Titans and Jaguars will play two games in a three-week span, as the Jaguars defend their divisional crown. In 2025, the Jaguars went 13-4 to win the AFC South for the first time since 2022. The Titans, who lead the series 34-28 including the postseason, look to regain the momentum in the series after being swept the past two seasons. Titans defensive coordinator Gus Bradley served as head coach of the Jaguars from 2013-16. During that time, Titans head coach Robert Saleh was the linebackers coach.

2026 TITANS SCHEDULE NOTES

- **WEEK 11 at DALLAS COWBOYS:** In Week 11, the Titans and Cowboys will meet for the 17th time as the Titans travel to AT&T Stadium for the first time since a 28-14 Monday Night Football victory in November 2018. Tennessee has won both of its regular season games at the site, which opened in 2009. Of the 14 new additions to the Titans coaching staff in 2026, three (Dave Borongni, Taniel Smart and Aaron Whitecotton) coached for Dallas in 2025. Special teams coordinator John "Bones" Fassel joined the Titans in 2024 after five years with the Cowboys. The Titans also acquired defensive lineman Solomon Thomas in a trade with Dallas in March.
- **WEEK 13 vs. WASHINGTON COMMANDERS:** The Titans will face the Commanders in Week 13. In 2024, the teams also met in Week 13 in the nation's capital. The Titans lead the all-time series, 8-7, and have won two of the last three meetings. Washington coach Dan Quinn succeeded Titans defensive coordinator Gus Bradley as defensive coordinator of the Seahawks in 2013 after Bradley was hired to be the head coach of the Jaguars. Head coach Robert Saleh served as quality control coach under both Bradley and Quinn in Seattle from 2011-13, ending the 2013 season with a victory in Super Bowl XLVIII.
- **WEEK 14 at DETROIT LIONS:** For the second time since 2024, the Titans will make the trip to Detroit to take on the Lions, and they look to win their seventh game against Detroit in eight matchups. The Titans currently hold a 10-4 lead in the all-time series. Head coach Robert Saleh is a native of Dearborn, Mich., a suburb of Detroit. This will be his first time visiting Detroit as a head coach. Since the Lions hired Dan Campbell as head coach in 2022, their 45 regular season wins are the fourth-most in the NFL.
- **WEEK 16 at LAS VEGAS RAIDERS:** For the second consecutive year, the Titans will travel to Las Vegas to take on the Raiders. This year, the contest could feature the top overall pick from the last two drafts in Titans quarterback Cam Ward and Raiders quarterback Fernando Mendoza, who the Raiders took first overall in 2026. The Titans, who trail in the series 22-31, look to regain momentum after dropping last year's contest in their first ever trip to Allegiant Stadium. Former Titans interim coach Mike McCoy currently serves as the assistant head coach of the Raiders, while former offensive coordinator Nick Holz is the offensive pass game coordinator.
- **WEEK 17 vs. PITTSBURGH STEELERS:** In the final regular season game at the current Nissan Stadium, the Titans will face off against the Steelers, who are led by new head coach Mike McCarthy. It will be Pittsburgh's first visit to Nissan Stadium since 2020. McCarthy takes over the reins in Pittsburgh following former head coach Mike Tomlin's resignation following 19 seasons at the helm. The Titans look to snap a five-game losing streak against the Steelers dating back to 2014. In franchise history, the Titans/Oilers have played the Steelers more than any other opponent.

GENERAL MANAGER MIKE BORGONZI

Mike Borongni was named the 15th general manager in franchise history on Jan. 17, 2025.

Borongni arrived in Tennessee after 16 years with the Kansas City Chiefs, helping to build the franchise into a perennial contender and three-time Super Bowl winner. During his final four seasons in Kansas City, Borongni served as Assistant General Manager.

Tasked with building a foundation for sustained success in Tennessee, Borongni directed a significant overhaul of the Titans roster from the time he arrived through the end of his second offseason on the job. Entering training camp in 2026, only 17 of the 91 players on the team (as of July 15) were with the club before he was named GM.

The additions included an eight-man class from the 2026 NFL Draft. Borongni took wide receiver **Carnell Tate** with the fourth overall pick, and on the same night, he traded back into the first round to draft defensive end **Keldric Faulk** at No. 31. It marked only the second time in the franchise's "Titans era" (1999 to present) that the team had multiple first-rounders. The class also included linebacker **Anthony Hill Jr.** in the second round and five more players on Day 3: guard **Fernando Carmona Jr.** (Round 5), running back **Nick Singleton** (5), defensive tackle **Jackie Marshall** (6), center **Pat Coogan** (6) and tight end **Jaren Kanak** (7).

The 2026 draft followed an active period of signings and trades, when the Titans targeted several key veterans to raise the talent level and provide leadership. From the day the NFL's unrestricted free agent signing period began to the start of the draft, a total of 21 free agents joined the Titans. The haul included wide receiver **Wan'Dale Robinson** (formerly of the New York Giants), tight end **Daniel Bellinger** (Giants), punter **Tommy Townsend** (Houston Texans), defensive lineman **John Franklin-Myers** (Denver Broncos) and cornerbacks **Alontae Taylor** (New Orleans Saints) and **Cor'Dale Flott** (Giants). Two additional veterans—defensive end **Jermaine Johnson II** (New York Jets) and defensive tackle **Solomon Thomas** (Dallas Cowboys)—were acquired in trades.

Borongni capped the 2026 offseason by awarding defensive tackle **Jeffery Simmons** with a multi-year contract extension, securing the four-time Pro Bowler's tenure in Tennessee for the foreseeable future.

The Titans' first Borongni-led draft in 2025 featured nine selections, including quarterback **Cam Ward** with the first-overall selection. All nine of the draftees appeared in at least six games as rookies, and six members of the group started at least five games. The Titans draft class accumulated 64 combined starts in 2025, which ranked second in the NFL (75 by Cleveland) and was the largest total for the franchise in the Titans era.

Ward, who was voted a team captain as a rookie, started all 17 games, and his 3,169 passing yards eclipsed **Marcus Mariota's** previous franchise rookie record (2,818 passing yards in 2015). With 15 touchdowns and seven interceptions on 323-of-540 passing, Ward's 1.3 percent interception rate was the best single-season mark in franchise history by all qualifying quarterbacks, breaking **Ryan Tannehill's** franchise mark of 1.5 percent in 2020.

Another draft pick, fourth-round wide receiver **Chimere Dike**, was named to the Pro Bowl as a returner and added first-team Associated Press All-Pro honors as a punt returner. Dike led the NFL with 2,427 all-purpose yards, which ranked third all-time for the franchise and first all-time among all NFL rookies. His 17.3-yard punt return average broke **Billy "White Shoes" Johnson's** franchise record (15.4) that stood since 1977, and he also posted a franchise-best 1,588 kickoff return yards.

During Borongni's time in Kansas City, he contributed to 12 playoff seasons (2010, 2013, 2015-24) and 10 AFC West titles (2010, 2016-24). Borongni helped construct a roster over a five-season span that won the AFC five times (2019-20, 2022-24) and captured three Super Bowl championships (2019, 2022-23).

In his final eight seasons in Kansas City (2017-24), Borongni worked under Chiefs General Manager **Brett Veach**. As the Assistant General Manager from 2021 through 2024, he supervised and directed the college

and professional scouting operations while closely supporting and advising Veach with the club's roster management and player acquisition via the NFL Draft, free agency, waiver claims and trades. During his four seasons as Assistant General Manager, the Chiefs built a league-best 52-16 regular-season record (.765). In the same four-year span, 10 different Kansas City players earned a combined 23 Pro Bowl selections: tackle **Orlando Brown Jr.** (2021-22), wide receiver **Tyreek Hill** (2021), center **Creed Humphrey** (2022-24), defensive tackle **Chris Jones** (2021-24), tight end **Travis Kelce** (2021-24), quarterback **Patrick Mahomes** (2021-23), safety **Tyrann Mathieu** (2021), guard **Trey Smith** (2024), guard **Joe Thuney** (2022-24) and Townsend (2022).

In 2024, the Chiefs captured their ninth consecutive AFC West crown. They tied the Detroit Lions for the NFL's best record at 15-2, setting a franchise record for wins in a regular season and securing the AFC's top seed. Twenty original Chiefs draft picks started at least six games for the team during the 2024 regular season. Kansas City had five players voted to the Pro Bowl, marking the seventh consecutive year in which it had at least five players earn the honor.

Prior to his promotion to Assistant General Manager, Borgonzi served as Director of Football Operations (2018-20), Director of Player Personnel (2017), Co-Director of Player Personnel (2015-16), Assistant Director of Pro Scouting (2013-14), Pro Personnel Scout (2011-12) and Manager of Football Operations (2010). He joined the Chiefs in 2009 as the club's College Scouting Administrator.

Before landing in the NFL with the Chiefs, Borgonzi spent the 2007 and 2008 seasons at Boston College, where he was the Assistant Recruiting Coordinator. He also coached tight ends at Amherst College in 2002 before working in the financial sector in Boston for several years.

A native of Everett, Mass., Borgonzi graduated from Brown University, where he was a four-year starter at fullback and was a three-time All-Ivy League selection.

TITANS HEAD COACH ROBERT SALEH

The Tennessee Titans hired **Robert Saleh** as the 22nd head coach in franchise history on Jan. 22, 2026.

Saleh arrives in Tennessee with 21 seasons of NFL coaching experience: six seasons with the Houston Texans (2005-10), three with the Seattle Seahawks (2011-13), three with the Jacksonville Jaguars (2014-16), five total seasons over two stints with the San Francisco 49ers (2017-20, 2025), and four campaigns as the head coach of the New York Jets (2021-24). During his time in the NFL, he has been a part of nine top-10 defenses, and in his nine seasons as a defensive coordinator or head coach, his team has finished in the top five in total defense on five occasions.

In 2025, Saleh returned to the San Francisco 49ers for his second stint as defensive coordinator under head coach **Kyle Shanahan**. With the roster decimated by injuries, including season-ending injuries to All-Pro defensive lineman **Nick Bosa** and All-Pro linebacker **Fred Warner**, the 49ers went 12-5 during the regular season and progressed to the Divisional Round of the playoffs.

As the head coach of the Jets, Saleh guided four different players in their first four years in the NFL to Associated Press First-Team All-Pro honors (cornerback **Sauce Gardner**, defensive lineman **Quinnen Williams** and returner **Braxton Berrios**) and/or Pro Bowl appearances (Gardner, Williams and linebacker **Jermaine Johnson II**). The Jets defense finished in the top 10 in multiple categories over the 2022 and 2023 seasons, including first in passing yards allowed per game (178.9) and opponent yards per play (4.7), second in total defense (301.7), and sixth in opponent yards per rush (4.1). The unit also tallied 93 sacks and 29 interceptions during that time, tied for the eighth and 10th-most, respectively, in the NFL.

The 2023 Jets featured a pair of first-team Associated Press All-Pros in Gardner and linebacker **Quincy Williams**, as well as three Pro Bowl selections in Gardner, Johnson II and Quinnen Williams. The Jets also won four games after trailing in the fourth quarter, tying for the second-most such victories in the NFL. Defensively, the Jets finished in a tie for first place in opponent yards per play (4.6) and ranked second in passing yards allowed per game (168.3), third in total defense (292.3) and tied for eighth



in takeaways (27). The Jets held opponents to seven points or less in 10 of their 17 games, which was tied for the most such games in the NFL. Meanwhile, the Jets offense gained 4,566 total yards in 2023, with 64.1 percent of those yards coming from rookie and second-year players, the second-most in the NFL. Saleh saw second-year running back **Breece Hall** register career highs in rushing yards (994), receiving yards (591), yards from scrimmage (1,585) and total touchdowns (nine).

In 2022, Saleh led a roster that featured two first-team AP All-Pro selections (Gardner and Quinnen Williams), a second-team All-Pro (linebacker **C.J. Mosley**) and four Pro Bowl selections (special teamer **Justin Hardee**, Gardner, Mosley and Quinnen Williams). He also oversaw the development of the NFL's Offensive and Defensive Rookies of the Year in wide receiver **Garrett Wilson** and Gardner, making the Jets the third team in NFL history to have both rookie players win the honor. Wilson led all rookie wide receivers in receptions (83) and receiving yards (1,103), while Gardner led the NFL in passes defended (20). The Jets improved their win total by three games, which marked the sixth-largest win improvement in the NFL in 2022. The club boasted a defense that tied for first in opponent yards per play (4.8) and finished third in passing defense (189.4), fourth in scoring defense (316) and fourth in total defense (311.1).

In his first year as head coach of the Jets, the 2021 team was led by rookie quarterback **Zach Wilson** (2,519 passing yards), rookie running back **Michael Carter** (639 rushing yards) and rookie wide receiver **Elijah Moore** (538 receiving yards). The Jets were just the second team since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to be led by rookies in passing yards, rushing yards and receiving yards.

Before taking the helm in New York, Saleh logged four seasons (2017-20) in his first stint as the defensive coordinator for the 49ers. During that span, the 49ers defense ranked third in passing yards allowed per game (211.4), fourth in total defense (323.6) and opponent yards per play (5.1) and sixth in opponent yards per rush (4.1).

In 2020, despite injuries to key players throughout the year, the 49ers defense held top-five marks in passing yards allowed per game (207.9, fourth), third-down defense (35.5 percent, fourth), total defense (314.4, fifth) and opponent yards per play (5.0, tied for fifth). The unit also ranked tied for sixth in opponent yards per rush (4.0) and seventh in opponent rushing yards per game (106.4). The defense was led by Warner, who earned first-team AP All-Pro honors and a Pro Bowl selection after registering a team-high 125 tackles to go along with a sack, two interceptions, six passes defended, one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries.

In 2019, Saleh was named Coordinator of the Year by Sporting News after leading the 49ers defense to a second-place finish in total defense – 281.8 yards allowed per game – which was the fewest total yards allowed per game by the team since 1997 (250.8). San Francisco placed first in the NFL in passing yards allowed per game (169.2), the fewest passing yards allowed per game in the NFL since 2009 (153.7 by the Jets). It marked the first time San Francisco led the NFL in passing defense since 1987 (165.6). The 49ers tied for second in the NFL in third-down percentage allowed (33.3) and tied for fifth in the NFL in sacks (48), the most by the team in a single season since 1998 (51). San Francisco also ranked seventh in

opponent completion percentage (61.3) and opponent quarterback rating (83.0).

Bosa, a rookie in 2019, played in all 16 games (14 starts) and registered 47 tackles, nine sacks, one interception, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries and two passes defended. He was named Defensive Rookie of the Year by the Associated Press and the PFWA, and Rookie of the Year by Sporting News and PFWA, as well as the NFL's Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year. He was also named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team and was named a starter in the Pro Bowl. With defensive linemen **Arik Armstead** (10.0), Bosa (nine), **DeForest Buckner** (7.5) and **Dee Ford** (6.5), the 49ers were the only team in the NFL to have four or more players with at least 6.5 sacks in 2019. Rookie linebacker **Dre Greenlaw** was named to the PFWA All-Rookie team. The secondary was led by cornerback **Richard Sherman**, who registered three interceptions (one returned for a touchdown) and was named second-team All-Pro.

In 2018, the 49ers defense registered 37 sacks, the most by the team in a single season at the time since 2013 (38). The defense ranked among the top dozen teams in the league in rushing yards per play allowed (4.09, seventh), opponent completion percentage (63.5, 10th), yards per play allowed (5.42, 11th) and net passing yards per game allowed (233.3, 11th). San Francisco was one of six teams (Baltimore Ravens, Buffalo Bills, Detroit Lions, Indianapolis Colts & New England Patriots) to allow fewer net yards per game, rushing yards per game and passing yards per game than in 2017. The 2018 San Francisco defense was anchored by Buckner, who led the team with a career-high 12 sacks and was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. His 12 sacks were the most by a 49ers defender since 2012 (19.5 by **Aldon Smith**). Warner started all 16 games as a rookie and led the team with 123 tackles, ranking 12th in the NFL and third among all rookies.

In 2017, Saleh spearheaded a 49ers defensive unit that allowed 5.28 yards per play, which was a 0.62 yards-per-play improvement from 2016 and the third-largest improvement in the NFL from 2016 to 2017 behind Cleveland (0.76) and the Jets (0.72). The defense also held its opponents under 100 yards rushing seven times. From Weeks 12-16, the 49ers' streak of holding each of their five opponents under 100 yards rushing was tied for the longest streak in the NFL over that span (Arizona). The 49ers defense was among the league leaders at getting into the opponent's backfield on running plays, finishing tied for fifth in the NFL by forcing 53 rushes for negative yardage. Over the final eight weeks of the year, San Francisco

ranked second in the NFL in rushing yards allowed (640) and tied for fourth in yards per carry allowed (3.62).

Saleh joined San Francisco after three years (2014-16) as the linebackers coach of the Jaguars. In 2016, Saleh's linebackers helped the Jacksonville defense rank fifth in passing yards allowed (215.3) and sixth in opponent rushing average (3.82). Team captain **Paul Posluszny** started all 16 games at middle linebacker and led the club in tackles for the second consecutive season. According to Jaguars team statistics, linebacker **Telvin Smith Sr.** registered 118 tackles while starting all 16 games at outside linebacker for the first time in his career. Smith's 350 career tackles from 2014 through 2016 were the most by a Jaguars player in his first three NFL seasons.

In 2015, the Jaguars defense allowed 3.68 yards per rushing attempt, which was the fifth-lowest rushing average allowed in the NFL. Posluszny led the squad and ranked fifth in the NFL with 133 tackles, according to GSIS statistics, while tying with Smith for the team lead with 13 tackles for loss.

Under Saleh's guidance, Smith stepped into the starting lineup in 2014 and ranked third among all rookies with 99 tackles. Smith led the team with two fumble recoveries while ranking second with nine tackles for loss. After a season-ending injury to Posluszny midway through the year, **J.T. Thomas** stepped in and set a career high in tackles along with two interceptions.

Prior to Jacksonville, Saleh spent three seasons (2011-13) as a defensive quality control coach for the Seahawks. During that period, he was responsible for assisting the defensive staff with day-to-day duties with a focus on the linebackers. Working under linebackers coach **Ken Norton Jr.**, Saleh aided in the development of **K.J. Wright**, **Bobby Wagner** and Super Bowl XLVIII MVP **Malcolm Smith**.

Before joining the Seahawks, Saleh totaled six seasons with the Texans, serving as a coaching intern (2005), defensive assistant (2006-08) and assistant linebackers coach (2009-10). While there, Saleh oversaw the growth of the Texans linebackers, including AP Defensive Rookie of the Year performances by **DeMeco Ryans** (2006) and **Brian Cushing** (2009). In 2009, the Pro Bowl duo of Ryans and Cushing were the only teammates to each rank among the league's top 10 tacklers.

Saleh's coaching career began with three seasons in the collegiate ranks. He launched his career at Michigan State University as an offensive assistant/tight ends coach (2002) and defensive assistant/defensive line coach (2003). He then spent one season (2004) as a defensive assistant/defensive line coach at Central Michigan University before a brief stint at the University of Georgia as a defensive assistant/linebackers coach (2005).

A native of Dearborn, Mich., Saleh attended Northern Michigan University, where he was a four-year starter at tight end.

He and his wife, Sanaa, have eight children: sons Adam, Zane, Michael, Sam, Jacob and Robert Jr., and daughters Mila and Ella.

ASSISTANT COACHES

JOHN FASSEL ASSISTANT HEAD COACH/ SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

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- Fassel joined the Titans in 2025 after spending the previous five seasons with the Dallas Cowboys.
- In 2025, Titans rookie Chimere Dike was named first-team AP All-Pro and earned a Pro Bowl invitation after tying for the NFL lead and setting a franchise record with a 17.3-yard punt return average. Additionally, Joey Slye made a team-record nine field goals of at least 50 yards.
- Under Fassel's direction in 2024, Cowboys second-year kicker Brandon Aubrey connected on a franchise-record 40 field goals, tying for the third-highest total in NFL history.
- In 2024, the Cowboys ranked second in the league with 1,091 kickoff return yards, led the NFL with an NFL-record 32.1 kickoff return average, and were the only team to return multiple kickoffs for touchdowns.
- Before his time in Dallas, Fassel served as special teams coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams for eight seasons from 2012-19, where the Rams led the NFL in net yards per punt (43.3) and ranked second in gross yards per punt (46.9).
- Helped Los Angeles to a Super Bowl berth during the 2018 season.
- From 2005 to 2007, Fassel was Baltimore's assistant special teams coach and helped the team to top-10 finishes in punt and kick return average from 2006 to 2007.
- Prior to his NFL career, Fassel was the head coach and assistant athletic director at New Mexico Highlands University.
- His coaching career also included stops at Idaho State (2001) and with the Amsterdam Admirals of NFL Europe (2000) and Bucknell University (1999, 2002).
- The Anaheim, Calif., native played wide receiver at Weber State. He signed as an undrafted free agent with the Colts following his college playing career.
- Fassel is the son of the late NFL coach Jim Fassel.



BRIAN DABOLL OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

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- Brian Daboll was hired by the Tennessee Titans as offensive coordinator on Jan. 27, 2026.
- Daboll is entering his 30th year in coaching and his 26th year in the NFL.
- His prior experience includes eight total seasons as an NFL offensive coordinator with the Cleveland Browns (2009-10), Miami Dolphins (2011), Kansas City Chiefs (2012) and Buffalo Bills (2018-21), as well as four years as the head coach of the New York Giants (2022-25).
- Became the first coach to receive both the Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year Award (2022, New York Giants) and the AP NFL Assistant Coach of the Year Award (2020, Buffalo).
- Prior to his time with the Giants, Daboll helped Buffalo earn three consecutive playoff berths, win two AFC East titles and an AFC Championship Game appearance in 2020. He also oversaw the development of Bills quarterback Josh Allen, the seventh overall selection in the 2018 NFL Draft.
- Contributed to five Super Bowl championships during his time with the New England Patriots under head coach Bill Belichick (2000-06, 2013-16) and won a national championship on Nick Saban's staff at the University of Alabama (2017).
- Prior to entering the NFL, he spent the 1997 season as a volunteer assistant at the College of William & Mary before serving two seasons (1998-99) as a graduate assistant for Saban at Michigan State.
- A 1997 graduate of the University of Rochester with a degree in economics, he was a two-year starter at safety for the Yellowjackets.
- Born in Welland, Ontario, Canada.
- Daboll and his wife, Beth, have six children: Mark, Christian, Aiden, Haven, Avery and Luke.

GUS BRADLEY DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

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- Gus Bradley was hired by the Tennessee Titans as defensive coordinator on Feb. 4, 2026.
- Bradley is entering his 37th year in coaching and his 21st year in the NFL.
- Prior to his arrival in Tennessee, Bradley spent time with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2006-08), Seattle Seahawks (2009-12), Jacksonville Jaguars (2013-16), Los Angeles Chargers (2017-20), Las Vegas Raiders (2021), Indianapolis Colts (2022-24) and San Francisco 49ers (2025).
- He reunites with Titans head coach Robert Saleh after the duo previously served on the same staffs with the Seattle Seahawks (2011-12), Jacksonville Jaguars (2014-16) and San Francisco 49ers (2025).
- As a member of the 49ers organization in 2025, Bradley was the assistant head coach of defense while Saleh was the defensive coordinator. The staff led the 49ers to a 12-5 record in the regular season and a playoff berth.
- As Jacksonville's head coach, the defense finished the 2016 season ranked sixth in yards per game allowed (321.7) and fifth in passing yards per game allowed (215.3).
- During his 2012 stint in Seattle, Bradley helped develop defensive lineman Bruce Irvin and linebacker Bobby Wagner in their rookie seasons. Irvin was the 15th overall pick of the 2012 NFL Draft and led all rookies with eight sacks, while Wagner (second round, 47th overall) ranked second among rookies in tackles (140) and fourth in interceptions (three).
- Bradley first entered the NFL coaching ranks with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers where he spent three seasons (2006-08) working under head coach Jon Gruden and defensive coordinator Monte Kiffin as the linebackers coach (2006-07) and defensive quality control coach (2008).
- Prior to his NFL career, Bradley totaled 16 years as a coach in the college ranks. He launched his career at his alma mater, North Dakota State, where he spent two seasons (1990-91) as a graduate assistant, followed by a four-year run as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Fort Lewis College (1992-95). He also briefly served as the head coach at Fort Lewis at the beginning of 1996.
- A native of Zumbrota, Minn., Bradley played at North Dakota State from 1984 to 1988 as a safety and punter.



BEN BLOOM SENIOR DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT

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- Bloom is in his third season with the Titans and his 18th season coaching in the NFL. He arrived in 2024 as outside linebackers coach after spending the previous four campaigns with the Cleveland Browns. He was named senior defensive assistant in 2026.
- During the 2025 campaign, Bloom's outside linebackers unit helped the Titans defense tie for 12th place in the NFL in sacks (42) and tie for seventh over the final 10 weeks of the season (26).
- In 2024, Bloom helped outside linebackers Harold Landry III (9.0 sacks) and Arden Key (6.5) rank first and second in sacks on the team, respectively, and combine for 15.5 sacks.
- During his most recent stint with the Browns, Bloom served as senior defensive assistant in 2020, run game coordinator in 2021 and 2022, and defensive line coach in 2023.
- In 2023, Bloom worked with Browns defensive end Myles Garrett, who was named the AP Defensive Player of the Year after leading the Browns and tying for seventh in the NFL with 14 sacks.
- Prior to entering the NFL, Bloom spent four years in the college coaching ranks, lastly as the assistant defensive line coach at Harvard University in 2008. That followed three years (2005-07) as defensive line/graduate assistant at Tufts University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in history in 2005 and master's in education in 2008.
- A native of Wellesley, Mass., Bloom was a three-year letter winner on the Tufts offensive line.



DAVE BORGONZI LINEBACKERS

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- Borgonzi arrived in Tennessee during the 2026 offseason with 15 years of NFL coaching experience and 20 total years of coaching experience.
- Spent the 2025 campaign as the linebackers coach with the Dallas Cowboys, where he launched his NFL coaching career from 2011 to 2013. His stops also included the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2014-17), Indianapolis Colts (2018-21) and Chicago Bears (2022-24).
- As the linebackers coach in Chicago, Borgonzi helped elevate a Bears defense that was one of the best in the league in 2023. Chicago's 86.4 rushing yards allowed per game and 1,468 total rushing yards allowed on the season were both the fewest in the NFL.
- Was instrumental in the development of T.J. Edwards and Tremaine Edmunds during his time in Chicago. In 2023, Edwards finished seventh in the NFL with 153 tackles, which was third on the Bears single-season tackle list (since 1991).
- While in Indianapolis, the Colts were the only NFL defensive unit to be ranked in the top 10 in scoring defense, run defense and takeaways in each of the 2020 and 2021 seasons.
- Began his NFL coaching career with the Cowboys as a coaching assistant, starting out on the defensive side of the ball, specifically with the secondary (2011-12).
- A native of Everett, Mass., Borgonzi graduated from Amherst College with a degree in law, jurisprudence and social thought.



CARMEN BRICILLO OFFENSIVE LINE

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- Carmen Bricillo was hired by the Titans in 2026 after coaching the New York Giants offensive line in 2024 and 2025. He arrived in Tennessee with seven years of NFL coaching experience after spending 14 campaigns in the college ranks.
- With Bricillo coaching the Giants offensive line in 2025, the team boasted the NFL's fifth-ranked rushing offense, averaging 129.1 rushing yards per game.
- Spent the 2022 and 2023 seasons as the line coach of the Las Vegas Raiders.
- In 2022, Bricillo led an offensive line unit that only allowed 35 sacks, tied for the ninth fewest in the NFL.
- Began his NFL coaching career with the New England Patriots in 2019, serving as a coaching assistant before being promoted to offensive line coach in 2020-21.
- In 2021, Bricillo helped the Patriots finish eighth in the NFL in rushing yards per game (126.5) and sixth in points per game (27.2). Bricillo's line helped Damien Harris set career highs with 202 carries for 929 yards and 15 touchdowns.
- Bricillo's group helped the Patriots finish fourth in the NFL with 146.6 rushing yards per game in 2020, the franchise's highest figure since 1983.
- From 2010-18, Bricillo spent nine years coaching the offensive line at Youngstown State where he coached 15 All-Missouri Valley Conference selections and the Penguins advanced to the 2016 NCAA FCS National Championship Game.
- Bricillo began his collegiate coaching career at his alma mater, Duquesne, as the offensive line coach in 2005.
- Prior to joining the staff at Duquesne, Bricillo spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Indiana (Pa.) Area High School.
- Bricillo is a native of Shelocta, Pa. and earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Duquesne and a master's degree in sports science and coaching from Akron.



ASSISTANT COACHES

TREVOR BROWDER OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

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- Trevor Browder was hired by the Titans into a full-time coaching role as an offensive assistant prior to the start of the 2024 season after initially arriving as a Bill Walsh Diversity Fellow for the 2024 offseason.
- Browder's main duties include assisting with the wide receivers.
- In 2025, he helped rookie wide receivers Chimere Dike and Elic Ayomanor become the third rookie wide receiver duo in NFL history to each record 40 receptions, 400 receiving yards and four receiving touchdowns.
- Prior to joining the Titans, Browder was the senior offensive analyst for the University of Alabama Birmingham. He was promoted after spending the 2023 season as an offensive analyst.
- In 2022, Browder worked as a defensive quality control coach for Indiana University.
- Worked as an offensive graduate assistant for Ball State University (2021) and an offensive student assistant for Marian University (2020).
- Browder began his coaching career at Danville (Ind.) High School coaching wide receivers.
- Browder attended Marian University where he was a two-time MSFA Midwest League Champion and a member of the 2019 NAIA national runner-up team.



DALTON HILLIARD DEFENSIVE BACKS/NICKELS

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- Dalton Hilliard entered the NFL coaching ranks with the Titans in 2026 after spending 11 seasons on college staffs.
- Joined the Titans after a brief stint as the pass game coordinator and defensive backs coach at Colorado State from December 2025 to February 2026.
- From 2022 through the 2025 campaign, he was at the University of Connecticut under head coach Jim Mora, first as secondary coach (2022-23) and then as passing game coordinator/secondary coach (2024-25).
- Hilliard spent the 2021 campaign coaching the secondary at Arkansas State before moving to Connecticut in 2022.
- Spent the 2019 and 2020 seasons at Tennessee-Martin, first serving as the defensive pass game coordinator/cornerbacks coach in 2019 before being elevated to defensive pass game coordinator/secondary coach in 2020.
- Prior to his time at UT Martin, Hilliard was on staff at UCLA, where he served under Chip Kelly in 2018 as a defensive and special teams analyst after spending 2015 through 2017 as defensive graduate assistant under Mora.
- Hilliard graduated with a bachelor's degree in sociology from UCLA in 2013. He added a master's degree from UCLA in higher education and organizational change in 2017.



RANDY JORDAN RUNNING BACKS/BILL WALSH DIVERSITY COACHING FELLOWSHIP COORDINATOR

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- Randy Jordan is in his third season as running backs coach with the Titans, his 14th season coaching in the NFL and his 24th year in coaching. In 2026, he gained the additional title of Bill Walsh diversity coaching fellowship coordinator.
- Under Jordan's direction in 2024, running back Tony Pollard ranked third in the AFC and tied for 12th in the NFL with a career-best 1,079 rushing yards on a career-high 260 carries. Both numbers led the team, as did his five rushing touchdowns.
- Prior to joining the Titans, Jordan spent 10 seasons (2014-23) as the running backs coach for the Washington Commanders and added the



title of senior offensive assistant in 2023.

- The Commanders ranked seventh in the NFL in 2023 with an average of 4.43 rushing yards per attempt.
- Before joining Washington, Jordan spent two years (2012-13) as the running backs coach at his alma mater, the University of North Carolina.
- Jordan coached running backs at Texas A&M for four seasons from 2008 to 2011.
- His first collegiate coaching position was at the University of Nebraska, where he served as the running backs coach for the Cornhuskers under head coach Bill Callahan from 2004 to 2007.
- Jordan began his coaching career with the Oakland Raiders as a special teams assistant midway through the 2003 season.
- As a running back in the NFL, Jordan appeared in 122 career games with the Raiders (1993, 1998-02) and Jacksonville Jaguars (1995-97), accumulating 152 rushing attempts for 574 yards and seven touchdowns, as well as 58 receptions for 596 yards and two scores.
- A native of Manson, N.C., Jordan attended the University of North Carolina under head coach Mack Brown from 1989 to 1992.

CADE KNOX OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT/GAME MANAGEMENT

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- Cade Knox is in his first season with the Titans and his sixth season in the NFL.
- Arrived in Tennessee following a four-year stint as offensive assistant/game manager with the New York Giants.
- Worked under current Titans offensive coordinator Brian Daboll, who was the head coach of the Giants at the time.
- Knox spent the 2020 season with the Giants as a football data and innovation intern.
- He is a 2020 graduate of Harvard University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in psychology. He began his collegiate career with the Crimson at quarterback before moving to wide receiver.
- A native of Phoenix, Ariz., he was an all-section honorable mention quarterback and defensive back at Brophy College Prep.



GREG LEWIS WIDE RECEIVERS

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- Greg Lewis is in his first season with the Titans and his 12th season coaching in the NFL following an eight-year NFL playing career (2003-10).
- He joined the Titans after a three-year stint as wide receivers coach with the Baltimore Ravens.
- Lewis' three seasons with the Ravens (2023-25) coincided with wide receiver Zay Flowers's who totaled 237 receptions, ranking 11th in the NFL with 3,128 receiving yards and 13th in the league with 30 receptions of 25-plus yards.
- Among all wide receiver rooms in 2024, Lewis' unit led the NFL in yards per reception (15.5) and finished second in yards after the catch per reception (5.9).
- Prior to his time with the Ravens, Lewis worked with the Chiefs running backs (2021-22) and wide receivers (2017-20).
- Helped the Chiefs to a victory in Super Bowl LVII in 2022.
- In 2021, Lewis guided a Chiefs rushing attack that posted the NFL's No. 7 yards-per-carry average (4.5) and also converted third-down rushes into first downs at the NFL's second-highest clip (69.8 percent).
- Lewis' first full-time NFL coaching job was as an offensive assistant with the New Orleans Saints in 2015, and in 2016 he was the wide receivers coach with the Philadelphia Eagles.
- Enjoyed an eight-year NFL playing career with the Philadelphia Eagles (2003-08) and Minnesota Vikings (2009-10), totaling 152 receptions for 1,992 yards (13.1 avg.) and eight touchdowns in 116 career games.



ASSISTANT COACHES

MARQUAND MANUEL DEFENSIVE BACKS/SAFETIES

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- Marquand Manuel is in his first season with the Titans and his 14th season coaching in the NFL following an eight-year NFL playing career as a safety.
- Joined the Titans after a one-year stint with the New York Giants where he was a secondary coach/pass game coordinator, helping cornerback Cor'Dale Flott set career highs with 14 starts and 11 passes defended.
- Served as the defensive backs/safeties coach for the New York Jets from 2021 through 2024. Over his final three seasons with the club, the Jets defense ranked in the top five in fewest passing yards allowed per game, including the second-best mark in the NFL in 2023 (168.3).
- Manuel guided a Jets safeties group in 2023 that recorded 10 interceptions, the second-most in the NFL.
- Before his time with the Jets, Manuel was the defensive backs coach for the Philadelphia Eagles in 2020.
- Served as the defensive coordinator of the Atlanta Falcons from 2017 to 2018 after spending the 2015 and 2016 seasons as the secondary coach/senior defensive assistant on staff.
- Began his NFL coaching career as a special teams assistant with the Seattle Seahawks in 2012.
- In his three seasons in Seattle, the team appeared in two Super Bowls, including Super XLVIII, when Seattle defeated the Denver Broncos by a final score of 43-8.
- A native of Miami, Fla., Manuel was a three-year starter at the University of Florida where he served as a leader on the Gators' SEC Championship team in 2000 that earned a berth in the Sugar Bowl.



TONY ODEN DEFENSIVE PASS GAME COORDINATOR/ CORNERBACKS

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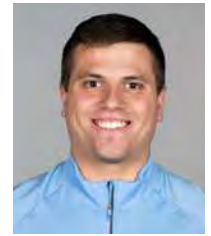
- Tony Oden is in his second season with the Titans, his 23rd NFL coaching season and his 31st overall season in coaching.
- Was hired by the team in 2025 as defensive pass game coordinator/cornerbacks coach and retains the title for 2026.
- In his first season with the Titans, eight different players started at least one game at cornerback, led by Darrell Baker Jr. and Jalyn Armour-Davis, who each started 10 contests.
- From 2021 through 2024, Oden served with the New York Jets as senior defensive assistant/cornerbacks coach, during which time Robert Saleh served as the head coach of the Jets.
- In each season from 2022 to 2024, the Jets defense ranked in the top five league-wide in yards allowed.
- During the 2022 season, Oden helped cornerback Sauce Gardner earn NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year, first-team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.
- Prior to his start with the Jets, Oden spent the 2020 season as the defensive backs/cornerbacks coach in San Francisco.
- During his four seasons in Detroit (2014-17) as the defensive backs/cornerbacks coach, Oden helped the Lions finish with 58 interceptions, the ninth-most in that span.
- Before Detroit, Oden spent the 2013 season with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as secondary/cornerbacks coach, as the Buccaneers defense finished third in the league with 21 interceptions.
- Spent time in Jacksonville (2012) and New Orleans (2006-11), helping the Saints to a Super Bowl XLIV victory and finishing 2010 with the fourth-best passing defense in the NFL.
- Coached eight seasons in the college ranks: Eastern Michigan University (2003), East Carolina University (2000-02), West Point (1998-99), Boston College (1997) and Millersville (1996).
- As a player, Oden was a four-year linebacker at Baldwin-Wallace College, where he earned first-team Ohio Athletic Conference honors twice and was a 1994 Division III All-American.



JOHN RUDNICKI OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

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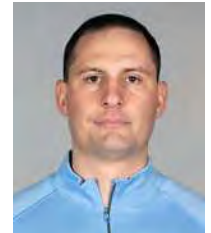
- John Rudnicki is in his first season with the Titans and his first season in the NFL.
- Joined the team in 2026 as offensive assistant after launching his career in the college coaching ranks.
- Rudnicki was previously at South Carolina, first assisting the offensive line in 2023 and 2024 and then transitioning to offensive assistant/running backs coach in 2025.
- In 2022, Rudnicki was a graduate assistant at South Alabama, working with the offensive line.
- The Buffalo, N.Y., native attended the University of Alabama, where he worked four years as an undergraduate student assistant coach, focusing on the offensive line.
- Received his degree in marketing from Alabama in 2021.



AHMED SALEH DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT

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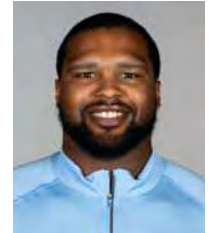
- Ahmed Saleh is in his first season as defensive assistant with the Titans.
- Has previous NFL experience as a Bill Walsh Coaching Fellow with the San Francisco 49ers (2021) and Green Bay Packers (2024).
- Prior to joining the Titans in 2026, he spent two seasons at Wayne State University.
- Was hired by Wayne State in 2024 as a defensive and special teams assistant, and in 2025, he became the associate head coach/linebackers coach/special teams coordinator.
- During the 2025 campaign, Saleh coached six Academic All-GLIAC linebackers, including Quincy Salter and Gavin Troy, who earned spots on the GLIAC All-Academic Excellence Team.
- Saleh went to Wayne State after coaching safeties at Northern Michigan in 2023.
- Was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Dearborn (Mich.) Fordson High School in both 2017 and 2022.
- Spent two seasons (2018-19) as a defensive graduate assistant coach at Colorado State University working with the defensive backs and linebackers, and two seasons (2020 and 2021) as the special teams coordinator and defensive backs coach at Madonna University.
- The Dearborn, Mich., native attended Michigan State University, where he spent two years as a defensive student assistant coach and graduated with a bachelor's degree in psychology in 2016. He received his master's degree in business administration from Central Michigan in 2019.



TANZEL SMART ASSISTANT DEFENSIVE LINE

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- Tanzel Smart is in his first season as assistant defensive line coach with the Titans and his second season in coaching.
- The former defensive lineman played in the NFL from 2017 through 2023.
- Joined the Titans after breaking into coaching with the Dallas Cowboys in 2025 as a defensive assistant/quality control coach.
- Was selected by the Los Angeles Rams in the sixth round (189th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft.
- During his playing career, he appeared in 41 career games with four starts, recording 31 tackles and a pass breakup in his career.
- In 2020, he spent time with the Buffalo Bills and Cleveland Browns after three seasons with the Rams (2017-19), where he started four of his 31 games played.
- As a rookie in 2017, he achieved career highs with 16 games played, four starts and 14 total tackles.
- The Baton Rouge, La., native was a four-year letterman and two-time

first-team All-American Athletic Conference selection at Tulane, playing in 48 games with 36 starts at defensive tackle. He finished his collegiate career with 191 tackles, 41 tackles for loss and 9.5 sacks.

RAYNA STEWART

ASSISTANT SPECIAL TEAMS

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- Rayna Stewart returned to Tennessee in 2025 after three seasons as the special teams assistant with the Cowboys.
- He is in his 10th season coaching in the NFL following a five-year playing career he began in 1996 as a fifth-round draft pick with the Houston Oilers.
- In 2025, he helped the Titans finish in the NFL's top 10 in punt return average (second at 16.6 yards per return), opponent kickoff return average (seventh, 24.9) and opponent net punting average (second, 37.1).
- During his time in Dallas from 2022 through 2024, Stewart worked with current Titans special teams coordinator John Fassel, helping the Cowboys field goal unit connect on 90 percent of its attempts, the fourth-best mark in the NFL.
- Assisted in the development of first-year kicker Brandon Aubrey throughout the 2023 season and led the league in field goals made (36), ranked third in field goal percentage (94.7) and first in kicking points (157).
- Stewart went to Dallas after three seasons in Green Bay in a similar capacity, first as the special teams quality control coach (2019-20) and then as the assistant special teams coach (2021).
- In 2021, Packers kicker Mason Crosby made 25-of-34 (73.5 percent) field goals and converted 49-of-51 extra points, leading the team in scoring (124 points) for the 13th time in his career.
- Was part of a staff in 2019 that saw Crosby connect on 22-of-24 field goal attempts (91.7 percent), matching Jan Stenerud's 1981 single-season franchise record.
- Spent four seasons (2015-18) at Vanderbilt, first as director of player development (2015-17) and then as special teams quality control coach (2018).
- From 2009 to 2010, Stewart was a member of the Titans coaching staff for the first time, working primarily with the linebackers and defensive linemen as a defensive quality control coach.
- Stewart played collegiately at Northern Arizona, where he was a two-time All-American cornerback and set the school record for passes defended in a season, posting 19 in both 1994 and 1995.



LUKE STOCKER

TIGHT ENDS

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- Luke Stocker is in his fourth season coaching with the Titans and his second campaign as the team's tight ends coach.
- Following an 11-year NFL playing career, he initially joined the Titans staff as an intern during the 2023 offseason and then earned a full-time role as offensive assistant.
- In 2025, rookie tight end Gunnar Helm totaled 44 catches for 357 yards and two touchdowns, tallying at least one reception in every game he played. Among franchise rookie tight ends, Helm had the most receptions in team history and ranked second in receiving yards behind Chig Okonkwo's 450 receiving yards in 2022. Among members of the 2025 NFL rookie tight end class, Helm tied for fifth in receptions and placed sixth in receiving yards.
- Spent part of his professional career with the Titans as a free agent during the 2017 campaign and stayed with the club through 2018.
- Was a fourth-round pick by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the 2011 NFL Draft and spent six-plus seasons with the Buccaneers before joining the Titans.
- Appeared in games for the Atlanta Falcons (2019-20) and Minnesota Vikings (2021). In 142 career games, he registered 91 starts and 85



receptions for 705 yards and five touchdowns.

- Attended the University of Tennessee where he tied a then-school record with 52 career games played and graduated with a degree in sport management.

SHEA TIERNEY

QUARTERBACKS

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- Shea Tierney is in his first season with the Titans, his 12th season in the NFL and his 16th total season in coaching.
- Joined the Titans after four seasons with the New York Giants.
- During his time with the Giants (2022-25), he coached the team's quarterbacks and during his final two seasons in New York, he owned the title of offensive passing game coordinator.
- Eight different players started at quarterback during Tierney's time with the Giants, with Daniel Jones' 32 starts topping the list.
- In 2024, the Giants started three different quarterbacks for the second consecutive year in Daniel Jones, Tommy DeVito and Drew Lock.
- In Week 17 of the 2024 season, Lock led the Giants to a win over the Colts and became just the fifth player in NFL history with at least 300 passing yards, four passing touchdowns, one rushing touchdown and a 155 passer rating in a single game.
- In 2023, Tierney led a position group that cycled through three starting quarterbacks in Jones, Tyrod Taylor, and DeVito.
- In 2022, Tierney's first year with the Giants, Jones had the best season of his career, setting a Giants' single-season completion percentage record of 67.2 and leading the team to its first postseason berth in six years and an NFC Wild Card victory in Minnesota.
- Prior to joining the Giants, he spent four years working with Titans' offensive coordinator Brian Daboll on the Buffalo Bills' staff, the first two as an offensive assistant and the last two as the assistant quarterbacks coach.
- Tierney joined the Bills in 2018 after spending the previous two seasons as an offensive analyst for the University of Alabama, which was 27-2 when he was on the staff.
- Got his first NFL experience with the Philadelphia Eagles as a football analyst/coaching intern from 2013 to 2015.
- Broke into coaching as an offensive graduate assistant at North Carolina State from 2011 to 2012.



AARON WHITECOTTON

DEFENSIVE RUN GAME COORDINATOR/ DEFENSIVE LINE

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- Aaron Whitecotton is in his first season with the Titans and his 14th season coaching in the NFL.
- Was hired in 2026 as defensive run game coordinator/defensive line following one season with the Dallas Cowboys.
- In 2025, the Cowboys defense ranked second in the NFL with 82 quarterback hits, according to Pro Football Focus, and the unit was fourth in the league with a 52.6 percent quarterback pressure rate, per Stats Perform.
- While with the Jets from 2021 to 2024, Whitecotton developed several defensive linemen into premier pass rushers, including Will McDonald (10.5 sacks in 2024), Quinnen Williams (29.5 sacks from 2021-24) and Bryce Huff (10.0 sacks in 2023).
- During the 2022 season, Whitecotton oversaw a Jets defensive line that recorded 45 sacks on the year, the seventh-most in the NFL and a significant improvement from its 33 team sacks in 2021.
- Prior to joining the Jets, he worked as the assistant defensive line coach with the San Francisco 49ers in 2020 after a three season stint in Buffalo (2017-19) where he spent his final two years as the assistant defensive line coach.
- Entered the NFL in 2013 with the Jacksonville Jaguars and spent three seasons (2013-15) as a defensive assistant working primarily with the defensive line.



ASSISTANT COACHES

- Began his coaching career at his alma mater, Myers Park (N.C.) High School before moving to the college ranks for one year as a defensive assistant at New Mexico State (2012).
- Played center at South Carolina from 2000-01 before transferring to UNC-Charlotte and earning his undergraduate degree in political science.

ISAAC WILLIAMS

ASSISTANT OFFENSIVE LINE

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- Isaac Williams is in his first season with the Titans and his fifth season coaching in the NFL.
- Hired in 2026 as assistant offensive line coach following four seasons as assistant offensive line coach with the Pittsburgh Steelers.
- Was the assistant offensive line coach during his time with the Steelers (2022-25).
- In 2024, only the Eagles and Ravens ran the ball at a higher percentage than the 52.1 percent the Steelers posted that season.
- Williams worked with three offensive linemen who were selected in the 2024 NFL Draft: tackle Troy Fautanu in the first round, center Zach Frazier in the second and guard Mason McCormick in the fourth.

- Has also coached at Millsaps College, Clinton (Miss.) High School and Sumner Hill (Miss.) Junior High School.
- Was a four-year starting offensive lineman and three-time captain at Alcorn State University (2008-11), earning all-conference honors as a junior and senior.
- Played one season as a center and defensive end with the Arena Football League's Laredo Rattlesnakes in 2013, helping the Rattlesnakes to the AFL's best record.
- Graduated with honors and earned his bachelor's degree in nutrition and dietetics from Alcorn State in 2012, adding his master's degree in education leadership from the University of Northern Colorado in 2017.

We pride ourselves on collaborating with organizations who love this city and state as much as we do, and for the past 40 years, Nissan has invested more than \$10.5 billion statewide, serving as a great example of an outstanding corporate steward and community advocate. We look forward to the continued positive impact of this relationship for the Titans organization and the City of Nashville."

"Since 2015 our fans and organization have called our home 'Nissan Stadium,' and we are proud to continue that tradition in the new stadium as we deepen and expand our relationship with them," said Titans Chief Revenue Officer Adam Nuse. "The new stadium will host the world's largest events, as well as serve as a community hub for our local neighbors. We're excited to have a partner like Nissan embark on this journey with us as we look towards the future."

The partnership will feature dedicated areas in the new stadium for brand experiences and displays, innovative technology integration, and involvement in Titans broadcast platforms. Nissan also will support a to-be-determined program in the Titans' ONE Community philanthropic platform, which reaches Nashville's most underrepresented and marginalized communities with a focus on three areas – Opportunity, Neighborhoods and Education.

"Nissan Stadium is a centerpiece of the Nashville skyline and has become a household name in Middle Tennessee. It is important for Nissan to keep our name on the new stadium," said Jérémie Papin, chairperson, Nissan Americas. "As more people come to Nashville both to visit and to live in this wonderful city, Nissan Stadium is true showcase for our brand and for the career opportunities we've offered here for more than four decades. This partnership sends a strong message about the bright future for Nissan, the Titans, Nashville and the State of Tennessee."

Nissan's ever-growing footprint in Tennessee includes vehicle and powertrain manufacturing facilities in Smyrna and Decherd respectively, along with its North American headquarters in Franklin. Nissan is home to more than 11,000 employees across all three locations.

"Nissan has been a strong partner to middle Tennessee for four decades, and I'm thrilled that the Titans have united with a partner that invests in our community and its people," said Nashville Mayor Freddie O'Connell. stadium's opening in 2027."

The new Nissan stadium will be built on the east side of the current stadium campus, along Nashville's East Bank. Quarterback **Cam Ward** was selected by the Titans with the first overall pick in the 2025 NFL Draft. He became the first No. 1 overall pick for the franchise since running back **Earl Campbell** in 1978.

As a rookie, Ward was voted a team captain prior to the season. He started all 17 games, and his final statistics included 323 completions, 3,169 yards, 15 touchdowns and seven interceptions on 540 attempts with a passer rating of 80.2. He broke **Marcus Mariota's** franchise rookie record (2,818 passing yards in 2015) for passing yards in a season. He also rushed for 159 yards and two touchdowns on 39 attempts.

With 17 starts, he set a franchise record for starts by a rookie quarterback and joined **Ryan Tannehill** (2021) as the only Titans quarterbacks with 17 starts in a season since the NFL schedule went to 17 games in 2021. Previously during the 16-game schedule era from 1978 to 2020, six Titans/Oilers quarterbacks combined for 10 total seasons with 16 starts: **Warren Moon** (three), **Steve McNair** (three), **Dan Pastorini**, **Ken Stabler**, **Matt Hasselbeck** and Tannehill.

Ward's 540 attempts in 2025 were not only more than any other rookie in the organization's history, but also more than every quarterback in franchise annals in a season other than **Warren Moon**, who had 655 attempts in 1991 and 584 attempts in 1990.

On 540 attempts, Ward threw only seven interceptions. His 1.3 interception percentage stands as the best single-season mark in franchise history by all qualifying quarterbacks. He broke **Ryan Tannehill's** franchise record of 1.5 percent in 2020. Over the final nine games of the season, Ward threw only one interception. His 1.3 percent interception rate also tied for the third-best mark in the NFL among qualifiers in 2025 behind Atlanta's **Michael Penix Jr.** (1.1) and Chicago's **Caleb Williams** (1.2).

Prior to entering the NFL, Ward played for three different schools over five college seasons: Incarnate Word (2020-21), Washington State (2022-23) and Miami (2024). In 57 career games—all starts—he completed 1,516 of 2,330 passes for 18,184 yards, and his 158 touchdown passes set an NCAA Division I (FBS/FCS) record. He also totaled 399 rushes for 473 yards and 20 touchdowns.

During his graduate campaign at Miami, he started all 13 games and led the Hurricanes to a 10-3 record, giving them their first 10-win season since 2017. He earned first-team Associated Press All-America honors and was a Heisman finalist after establishing Miami's single-season records for passing yards (4,313), touchdowns (39) and completion percentage (67.2 percent, 305-for-454), while throwing only seven interceptions. He received the 2024 Davey O'Brien Award, recognizing the nation's top quarterback, and was named ACC Player of the Year, ACC Offensive Player of the Year and first-team All-ACC.

At Washington State in 2023, Ward started all 12 games and completed 324 of 486 passes for 3,732 yards and 25 touchdowns with seven interceptions. He also accounted for eight rushing touchdowns. At the conclusion of the season, he received All-Pac-12 Conference honorable mention for the second consecutive season.

Ward arrived at Washington State as a junior in 2022. He started all 13 games in his first season with the Cougars and completed 320 of

497 passes for 3,231 yards and 23 touchdowns with nine interceptions. He added five rushing touchdowns.

In 2021, Ward was a sophomore at Incarnate Word, where he was named Southland Conference Offensive Player of the Year, FCS All-American second team and a Walter Payton Award Finalist after leading UIW to Southland Conference Championship, a 10-3 record and into the second round of the FCS playoffs. His statistics included 384 completions on 590 attempts for 4,648 yards, 47 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. He set program records for single game passing yards (610), single-game passing touchdowns (seven), career passing touchdowns (71) and career passing yards (6,908).

As a freshman in 2020, Ward started in all six games at Incarnate Word during the spring season (2021) that resulted from the COVID-19 outbreak. He completed 183 of 303 passes for 2,260 yards and 24 touchdowns and was named the Jerry Rice Award winner, given to the top FCS freshman.

Ward is a native of West Columbia, Texas.

2026 Notes:

➤ **Against N.Y. Jets (9/13)**, started at quarterback, joining **Marcus Mariota** (2015-16) as the only quarterbacks in franchise history to start Week 1 in each of their first two NFL seasons. He finished with 140 yards on 19-of-32 passing and added four rushes for 21 yards. In the fourth quarter, he connected with **Elic Ayomanor** for an 11-yard touchdown.

➤ **Against Philadelphia (9/20)**, completed 13 of 20 passes for 183 yards and a 94.4 passer rating. His passer rating was the third best of his 19-game career in a contest with at least 20 attempts. He added two rushing touchdowns, finishing with seven rushing yards on four attempts. He scored the Titans' first touchdown of the contest with a one-yard run on fourth-and-goal in the first quarter and then capped a 12-play, 69-yard drive with his second rushing touchdown of the contest on a one-yard carry in the third quarter. It was his first career game with multiple rushing touchdowns and gave him four career rushing scores. Ward became the first Titans quarterback with multiple rushing touchdowns in a game since **Ryan Tannehill** had a pair at Houston on Jan. 3, 2021. His four passes of 25-plus yards in the game matched a career high (**Ayomanor** for 28 and 41 yards, **Tyjae Spears** for 27 yards, and **Calvin Ridley** for 25 yards). He increased his streak to six consecutive games without an interception, including the final four games of 2025, while also increasing his streak to 173 consecutive passes without an interception, second in the franchise record books behind only **Marcus Mariota's** 205 consecutive passes without an interception from 2018 to 2019. Over an 11-game span, including the final nine games of 2025, his totals included one interception, 11 touchdown passes and four rushing touchdowns.



ROOKIE QBs, FRANCHISE HISTORY

First-overall draft pick **Cam Ward** was the 13th rookie starting quarterback in the history of the Titans/Oilers franchise. He became the first rookie quarterback in franchise annals to start at least 14 games, surpassing **Vince Young's** previous mark of 13 starts as a rookie in 2006. Additionally, Ward passed **Marcus Mariota** (2,818 passing yards in 2015) for the most passing yards in franchise history by a rookie.

Mitchell Trubisky is in his 10th NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2026. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 12, 2026.

Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Trubisky totaled nine NFL seasons with the Chicago Bears (2017-20), Buffalo Bills (2021, 2024-25) and Pittsburgh Steelers (2022-23). During that span, he appeared in 82 regular season games with 57 starts and completed 1,244 of 1,933 passes for 13,028 yards with 78 touchdowns and an 86.9 passer rating.

In his second stint in Buffalo from 2024 to 2025, he served as a backup to Josh Allen, appearing in 13 total games. In his final season with the Bills, his numbers included 25-of-35 passing for 313 yards and four touchdowns with no interceptions.

Trubisky was selected by the Bears with the second-overall pick of the 2017 NFL Draft. Over the next four seasons, he appeared in 51 games with 50 starts.

In 2018, he recorded his first of two consecutive 3,000-yard passing seasons and was named to his first career Pro Bowl after completing 289 of 434 passes for 3,223 yards with 24 touchdowns and 12 interceptions. The Bears went 12-4 in the regular season to win the NFC North.

As a rookie in 2017, he started 12 games set the then-franchise rookie records for completions (196) and passing yards (2,193), finished second in attempts (330), and tied for third in touchdown passes (seven).

The Mentor, Ohio, native played in 34 games with 13 starts in three seasons at the University of North Carolina. He finished his Tarheels career ranked fifth in passing touchdowns (41), sixth in passing yards (4,762) and seventh in total offense (5,201).

Running back **Tony Pollard** is in his eighth NFL season and his third campaign with the Titans in 2026. The Memphis native was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 14, 2024.

In 2025, Pollard was voted a team captain for the first time in his career. He led the Titans in rushing for the second consecutive season with 242 carries for a career-high 1,082 yards and five touchdowns. It was the second consecutive season in which he set a career high in rushing (1,079 yards in 2024).

Pollard became the fourth player in Titans/Oilers history to rush for 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons with the club, joining **Earl Campbell** (1978-81), **Eddie George** (1996-00) and **Chris Johnson** (2008-13). With his fourth consecutive 1,000-yard rushing season, including his final two campaigns in Dallas, he joined **Derrick Henry** as the NFL's only running backs to rush for 1,000 yards every season from 2022 to 2025.

Pollard's durability continued through seven NFL campaigns, during which time he never missed more than two games in a season. He started all 17 games in 2025, marking the second time in his career (2023) that he started every week. Over a three-season span (2023-25), Pollard missed only one total game (2024).

During his first year with the Titans, Pollard ranked third in the AFC and tied for 12th in the NFL with a then-career-best 1,079 rushing yards on a career-high 260 carries. Both numbers led the team, as did his five rushing touchdowns. With an additional 238 yards on 41 receptions, he produced a team-high 1,317 scrimmage yards—the second-best total of his career.

Prior to joining the Titans, Pollard spent five seasons (2019-23) with the Dallas Cowboys, who selected him in the fourth round (128th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft. During his time in Dallas, he appeared in 79 games with 23 starts, totaling 3,621 rushing yards and 23 touchdowns on 762 carries. With an additional 176 receptions for 1,319 yards and five receiving touchdowns, he reached 1,000 scrimmage yards in each of his final three years in Dallas while also returning 63 kickoffs for 1,500 yards, including one return for a score.

In 2023, his first season as the lead running back in Dallas, Pollard started all 17 games for the first time in his career and led the team with 1,005 rushing yards on a career-high 252 carries (4.0 avg.) with six touchdowns.

In 2022, he set career marks with 193 carries for 1,007 yards and nine scores, averaging 5.2 yards-per-carry to rank third in the NFL and earn his first Pro Bowl nod.

At the University of Memphis, he played in 40 games at running back and wide receiver, amassing 2,233 yards and 18 touchdowns on offense. He also averaged 30.1 yards per kickoff return and tied an NCAA record with seven kickoff returns for touchdowns.

- **Against N.Y. Jets (9/13)**, rushed seven times for 35 yards.
- **Against Philadelphia (9/20)**, led the team with 64 rushing yards on 14 attempts, including a 13-yard run to convert a third-and-one in the second quarter and a season-long 18-yard run in the fourth quarter.





RUSHING & SCRIMMAGE YARDS, 2021-26

Since the start of the 2021 season, **Tony Pollard** has been one of the NFL's most productive running backs, ranking in the top 10 in rushing yards during that time.

In 2021, Pollard totaled 719 yards on the ground as a member of the Dallas Cowboys, followed by 1,007 yards in 2022 and 1,005 yards in 2023. He arrived in Tennessee in 2024 and set a then-career high with 1,079 rushing yards before breaking that mark with 1,082 rushing yards in 2025.

Running back **Tyjae Spears** is in his fourth NFL season in 2026. He was selected by the Titans in the third round (81st overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft.

In 2025, he appeared in 13 games with one start and totaled 72 rushing attempts for 283 yards and two touchdowns. He added 45 receptions for 264 yards for a total of 547 scrimmage yards. It was his third consecutive season with at least 500 scrimmage yards to begin his career.

In 2024, Spears appeared in 12 games with one start. His totals included 312 yards and four touchdowns on 84 rushing attempts, and he added 30 receptions for 224 yards and a touchdown.

As a rookie, Spears did not miss a game and registered one start. He carried the ball 100 times for 453 yards and two touchdowns, and he added 52 receptions for 385 yards and one score. His 838 scrimmage yards ranked seventh in franchise history among rookie running backs, and the total also placed fourth among rookie running backs in 2023 behind Atlanta's **Bijan Robinson**, Detroit's **Jahmyr Gibbs** and Miami's **De'Von Achane**. Spears became the franchise's first rookie running back with at least 50 receptions since **Sid Blanks** in 1964 (56).

Spears spent four years at Tulane (2019-22) prior to entering the NFL. He appeared in 33 games with 20 starts at running back for the Green Wave, totaling 2,910 yards and 31 touchdowns on 427 carries with an additional 48 receptions for 564 yards and three scores. He ended his career as the school's all-time leader in yards per carry (6.8), tied for second in 100-yard rushing games (15), tied for third in rushing touchdowns (31), fourth in rushing yards per game (85.6) and sixth in rushing yards (2,910) and total touchdowns (34). His 6.8 yards per carry from 2019 to 2022 ranked second in the FBS behind only Alabama-Birmingham running back **DeWayne McBride's** 7.3-yard average (minimum 400 attempts).

As a junior in 2022, he started all 14 games for the Green Wave, totaling 1,581 yards and 19 touchdowns on 229 rushing attempts and adding 22 receptions for 256 yards and two touchdowns. He tied for the national lead with 21 total touchdowns and tied for third in the country with 19 rushing touchdowns, a total that ranked second in Tulane single-season history. His 1,581 rushing yards led the conference and made up the Green Wave's all-time second-highest single-season total. His nine 100-yard rushing games included eight consecutive such efforts to finish the season. He was named the American Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year and also earned first-team All-AAC honors. His efforts helped Tulane earn a 12-2 record and win an American Athletic Conference title.

He is a native of Ponchatoula, La.

- Julius Chestnut was signed by the Titans as an undrafted free agent on May 13, 2022.
- In 2025, he appeared in all 17 games for the second consecutive season. He led the team and set a career high with 17 special teams tackles, which were the most by a Titans player since Tim Shaw had 19 in 2010 (GSIS tackle statistics). His 17 special teams tackles were the most for any NFL running back since Austin Ekeler had 17 with the Chargers in 2017. Additionally, he contributed 40 rushing yards on 11 attempts, as well as three kickoff returns for 81 yards (27.0 avg.).
- In 2024, he appeared in all 17 games and set career highs with 22 carries and 102 rushing yards. He added two receptions for 11 yards, as well as 13 kickoff returns for 337 yards and a 25.9-yard average.
- In 2023, Chestnut was limited to three games after suffering a season-ending injury. He registered a pair of special teams tackles.
- In 2022, he appeared in six games as a rookie. He rushed for 12 yards on nine attempts and added 41 yards on three catches. He also ranked second on the team with 10 kickoff returns for 215 yards (21.5 avg.).

6-6, 255, 5th Year/1st with Titans, San Diego State
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Tight end **Daniel Bellinger** is in his fifth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 12, 2026.

Bellinger was originally selected by the New York Giants in the fourth round (112th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft. He spent his first four seasons with the club and totaled 88 receptions for 934 yards and four touchdowns over 62 games played.

In Bellinger's final season in New York, he appeared in 16 games with 10 starts and recorded 19 receptions for 286 yards with two touchdowns. His 15.1-yard receiving average was the best of his career through four seasons.

In 2024, he played in all 17 games for the second consecutive season and totaled eight starts. He tallied 14 receptions for 125 yards.

As a rookie in 2022, he caught 30 passes for 268 yards and two touchdowns as part of a playoff club. He started both postseason contests, contributing 21 yards and a touchdown on three receptions.

The Las Vegas, Nev., native attended San Diego State University, where he played in 43 games with 32 starts over four seasons (2018-21). His career totals included 68 receptions for 771 yards with five touchdowns.

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Tight end **Gunnar Helm** was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (120th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft.

As a rookie, he appeared in the first 16 games of the season with 10 starts before missing the finale due to injury. He amassed 44 catches for 357 yards and two touchdowns during the campaign, tallying at least one reception in every game he played. Among franchise rookie tight ends, he had the most receptions in team history and ranked second in receiving yards behind **Chig Okonkwo's** 450 receiving yards in 2022. Among members of the 2025 rookie tight end class, Helm tied for fifth in receptions and placed sixth in receiving yards.

During his career at the University of Texas, Helm participated in 54 games with 26 starts from 2021 to 2024. He recorded 79 receptions for 1,022 yards and nine touchdowns in his college career.

As a senior in 2024, he started all 16 games and recorded a career-high and team-leading 60 receptions for 786 yards and seven touchdowns. His play earned him second-team All-SEC honors, and he was a semifinalist



for the John Mackey Award, presented to the nation's most outstanding tight end. Helm helped the Longhorns advance to the semifinals of the College Football Playoff.

As a junior in 2023, he appeared in 14 games with six starts, totaling 14 receptions for 192 yards and two touchdowns. He was voted honorable mention All-Big 12 and also named Academic All-Big 12 second team.

#5 • WR ELIC AYOMANOR

6-2, 206, 2nd Year/2nd with Titans, Stanford

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Wide receiver **Elic Ayomanor** was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (136th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft.

As a rookie, Ayomanor contributed 41 receptions for 515 yards and four touchdowns. He ranked fifth on the team in receptions, second in receiving yards, and tied for first in touchdown catches. Among all rookie NFL wide receivers, Ayomanor, who was the 19th wide receiver drafted in 2025, ranked ninth in receiving yards and tied for 11th in touchdown receptions. He became the sixth rookie in Titans/Oilers history to reach 40 receptions, 500 receiving yards and four receiving touchdowns, joining **Bill Groman** (1960), **Charlie Hennigan** (1960), **Jerry LeVias** (1969), **Kendall Wright** (2012) and **A.J. Brown** (2019).

Ayomanor attended Stanford from 2022 to 2024. He saw action in his final two seasons there, appearing in 24 games with 23 starts. He led the Cardinal in receptions and receiving yards in both campaigns, totaling 125 receptions for 1,844 yards and 12 touchdowns in that span.

In 2024, he started all 12 games and was named second team All-ACC from the coaches after leading all Stanford receivers with 63 receptions for 831 yards. He recorded six receiving touchdowns, tied for the most by a Cardinal wideout, and he was the Cardinal's leading receiver in seven of the 12 games. In the ACC, he finished seventh in receptions and tied for ninth in receiving touchdowns. He was honored with the team's Tommy Vardell Award, given to an academic junior or senior who best epitomizes excellence in both academics and athletics, as well as Stanford's Deswarte-Eller Award, presented to the team's most outstanding sophomore player.

As a redshirt freshman in 2023, he appeared in all 12 games, making starts at wide receiver in the final 11 games. He paced the Stanford offense with 62 receptions for 1,013 yards and six touchdowns and was named the team's Irving S. Zeimer Award recipient, given to the team's offensive most valuable player. He ranked seventh in the Pac-12 in receiving yards and yards per catch (16.3), while ranking fifth in yards per game (84.4).

In a game at Colorado (Oct. 13), he amassed career highs with 13 catches for 294 yards and three receiving scores, setting the Stanford program record for receiving yards in a game.

A native of Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada, he spent his initial year of high school in Canada before one year at The Peddie School (Hightstown, N.J.) and two years at Deerfield (Mass.) Academy.

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Wide receiver **Chimere Dike** was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (103rd overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft.

As a rookie, he led the NFL with 2,427 all-purpose yards, which included 1,588 kickoff return yards, 398 punt return yards, 423 receiving yards and 18 rushing yards.

He was named to the Pro Bowl as the AFC's starting returner, becoming the franchise's sixth rookie to be named to the Pro Bowl since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger and the first since returner **Marc Mariani** in 2010. The others to do so were running back **Earl Campbell** (1978), defensive end **Jevon Kearse** (1999), quarterback **Vince Young** (2006) and running back **Chris Johnson** (2008).

Dike also earned first-team Associated Press All-Pro honors as a punt returner. He was the franchise's fourth rookie since the merger to earn first-team AP All-Pro honors, joining Campbell (1978), Kearse (1999) and tackle **Jack Conklin** (2016).

Dike's 2,427 all-purpose yards in 2025 ranked third in franchise history for a single season behind **Derrick Mason's** 2,690 all-purpose yards in 2000 and Johnson's 2,509 yards in 2009. The number established the all-time NFL rookie record for all-purpose yards and was the highest in a season by any NFL player since 2011, when **Darren Sproles** set the NFL record with 2,696 all-purpose yards.

Dike returned 23 punts for 398 yards and two touchdowns. His 17.3-yard average tied for the NFL lead with New England's **Marcus Jones** while also breaking the franchise single-season record, which was held for 48 years by **Billy "White Shoes" Johnson**. Dike averaged nearly two yards per return more than Johnson's mark of 15.4 yards in 1977 (35 for 539 yards).

Dike also returned 62 kickoffs for a franchise-record 1,588 yards, averaging 25.6 yards per attempt. He ranked second in the NFL in kickoff return yards in 2025 behind Dallas' **KaVontae Turpin** (1,814). His 1,588 kickoff return yards put him in third place in NFL history among rookies, trailing only the Raiders' **Chris Carr** (1,752 in 2005) and Arizona's **Josh Scobey** (1,684 in 2003).

With a punt return average of 17.3 yards and a kickoff return average



of 25.6 yards, Dike became the NFL's first player since Detroit's **Jack Christiansen** in 1952 (21.5 punt return average and 25.6 kickoff return average) to qualify with an average 17.0-plus yards per punt return and 25.0-plus yards per kickoff return in a season.

On offense, Dike's rookie contributions included finishing second on the squad with 48 receptions, ranking third with 423 receiving yards, and tying for the team lead with four touchdown catches. His six total touchdowns led the Titans.

The Waukesha, Wis., native played four seasons (2020-23) at Wisconsin before transferring to Florida for his final season (2024). In five total seasons, he appeared in 57 games with 42 starts and tallied 139 receptions for 2,261 yards and 11 touchdowns. He added 14 rushing attempts for 99 yards and one touchdown, and additionally, he recorded 26 punt returns for 300 yards and 20 kickoff returns for 472 yards.

In 2024, Dike was named a team captain for the Gators during his first and only season with the team. He led the team in catches (42) and ranked second with a career-high in receiving yards (783) and touchdown catches (two). In SEC play, he averaged a league-leading 16.5 yards per punt return. He was one of 23 players in the FBS to contribute four punt returns of 20-plus yards.

In Dike's final season at Wisconsin, he started in 11 games and finished with 19 receptions for 328 yards and one touchdown. He added 12 punt returns for 108 yards and 11 kickoff returns for 249 yards.

As a junior in 2022, he started all 13 games for the Badgers and led the team with 47 catches, 689 receiving yards and six touchdown catches. His six scores tied for seventh in the Big Ten and were the most for a Badger wide receiver since 2019.

2026 Game Notes:

➤ **Against N.Y. Jets (9/13)**, recorded one reception for seven yards and also returned three kickoffs for 62 yards.

#0 • WR CALVIN RIDLEY

6-1, 190, 8th Year/3rd with Titans, Alabama

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Wide receiver **Calvin Ridley** is in his eighth NFL season and his third season with the Titans in 2026. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 15, 2024.

Ridley was named a team captain for the first time in his career in 2025. However, his campaign came to a premature end due to injury. He appeared in seven of the first 10 games of the season before landing on injured reserve for the team's final seven contests. His season totals included 17 receptions for 303 yards (17.8 avg.).

During his first season in Tennessee, Ridley led the Titans offense with 64 receptions and 1,017 receiving yards and caught four touchdown passes. His 15.9-yard receiving average in 2024 ranked fifth in the NFL among qualifiers. Only Ridley and Philadelphia's **A.J. Brown** (67 receptions for 1,079 yards, 16.1 avg.) accumulated at least 60 receptions and 1,000 receiving yards with an average of at least 15.0 yards per catch. Ridley also rushed for 55 yards and a touchdown.

Ridley's 2024 season was his third career 1,000-yard receiving season (2020 and 2023), and it was the franchise's 12th 1,000-yard receiving season during its "Titans era" (1999 to present). He became the ninth player in NFL history to have at least one 1,000-yard receiving season with three different teams, joining **Brandin Cooks** (four teams), **Brandon Marshall** (four), **Amari Cooper** (three), **DeAndre Hopkins** (three), **Irving Fryar** (three), **Randy Moss** (three), **Terrell Owens** (three) and **Tony Martin** (three). Ridley became the first player in NFL history to secure his first three 1,000-yard receiving seasons with three different teams.

Prior to joining the Titans, Ridley appeared in 66 NFL games with 52 starts. He was originally drafted by the Atlanta Falcons with the 26th overall pick of the 2018 NFL Draft and was traded to the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2022. His statistical totals with the Falcons and Jaguars included 324 receptions for 4,358 yards and 36 touchdowns.

In 2023, Ridley started a career-high 17 games for the Jaguars and led the team with 1,016 yards and eight receiving touchdowns on 76 catches.

From 2018 through 2020, no member of the 2018 draft class had more receptions or touchdown catches than Ridley, who totaled 217 grabs and 26 scores for the Falcons during that span. His 3,061 receiving yards ranked second in his draft class behind only **DJ Moore's** 3,156. Ridley's 90 receptions and 1,374 yards in 2020 were career highs.

As a rookie in 2018, Ridley played in all 16 games and accumulated 64 receptions. He led all rookie receivers in the NFL with 821 receiving yards and a team-high 10 receiving touchdowns, including an NFL-rookie record six receiving scores in the team's first four games. He was named to the All-Rookie team by the Professional Football Writers of America.



A native of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Ridley attended the University of Alabama, where he played in 44 games over three seasons (2015-17). He finished his career second in Crimson Tide history with 224 receptions and 19 receiving touchdowns. He also ranked third with 2,781 receiving yards, while totaling eight career 100-yard receiving games to tie for third in the Alabama record books.

2026 Game Notes:

➤ **Against Philadelphia (9/20)**, started at wide receiver and finished with two receptions for 35 yards. He recorded a 25-yard gain on his first reception of the season in the third quarter.

RECEIVING AVERAGE SINCE 2024

During his first three seasons in Tennessee, **Calvin Ridley** ranks among the league leaders in receiving average. From 2024 to 2025, his two-year totals included 1,320 yards on 81 receptions for an average of 16.3 yards per catch.

In 2024, Ridley caught 64 passes for 1,017 yards, resulting in a career-best 15.9-yard receiving average. His average ranked fifth in the NFL among qualifiers. Only Ridley and Philadelphia's **A.J. Brown** (67 receptions for 1,079 yards, 16.1 avg.) averaged at least 15.0 yards per catch while also tallying at least 60 receptions and 1,000 receiving yards.

In 2025, Ridley's participation was limited due to injuries. However, he averaged 17.8 yards per catch, hauling in 17 passes for 303 yards.

1,000 REC YARDS WITH THREE TEAMS

Calvin Ridley has registered a 1,000-yard receiving season with three different NFL teams. He first hit the plateau as a member of the Atlanta Falcons in 2020 (1,374 yards), and in 2023, he hit 1,000 yards (1,016) while playing for the Jacksonville Jaguars. He posted 1,017 receiving yards for the Titans in 2024.

In NFL history, only eight players previously had a 1,000-yard receiving season with three different teams. **DeAndre Hopkins** was the most recent member to join the group after accomplishing the feat with the Titans in 2023.

Ridley became the first player in NFL history to secure his first three 1,000-yard receiving seasons with three different teams.

#4 • WR WAN'DALE ROBINSON

5-8, 185, 5th Year/1st with Titans, Kentucky

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Wide receiver **Wan'Dale Robinson** is in his fifth NFL season and his first season with the Titans in 2026. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 12, 2026.

Prior to his arrival in Tennessee, he played in 54 NFL contests over four seasons with the New York Giants, who selected him in the second round (43rd overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft. During that time, he tallied 268 catches for 2,465 yards with nine touchdowns. Among all players in Giants history, only **Odell Beckham Jr.** (313) had more receptions in his first four NFL seasons than Robinson did.

In his final season in New York, Robinson saw action in 16 games. He finished the year with a team-high 92 catches and single-season career highs in receiving yards (1,014) and receiving touchdowns (four). His 92 receptions gave him the NFL's ninth-highest total in 2025. The number ranked sixth in franchise history, and Robinson joined Beckham as the only players in franchise history with 90 or more catches in multiple seasons. Robinson was one of five NFL players to record 90-plus receptions in 2024 and 2025. Additionally, Robinson tied for ninth in the NFL with 11 receptions of 25-plus yards and tied for ninth with 25 receptions on third down.

In 2024, he saw action in all 17 games for the first time in his career with seven starts. His career-best 93 receptions ranked him 13th in the NFL, and he led the league with 34 third-down receptions.

A native of Frankfort, Ky., Robinson played in 31 games with 24 starts in three collegiate seasons (two at Nebraska and one at Kentucky). He caught 195 passes for 2,248 yards with 10 receiving touchdowns in his career.

As a junior at Kentucky in 2021, he was named second-team All-SEC after playing in all 13 games and setting career highs with a then school-record 104 receptions, 1,334 yards and seven touchdowns.

2026 Game Notes:

➤ **Against N.Y. Jets (9/13)**, made his Titans debut and led the team with five receptions for 38 yards. He moved past the 2,500 career receiving yards mark (2,503).

➤ **Against Philadelphia (9/20)**, caught a nine-yard pass to extend his streak to 44 consecutive games with at least one reception.

RECEPTIONS FROM SLOT, 2024-26

Since the start of the 2024 season, Titans wide receiver **Wan'Dale Robinson** is at the top of the leaderboard in receptions out of the slot by a wide receiver.

From 2024 through 2025, Robinson totaled a league-high 113 catches from the slot, and he was one of only five NFL receivers to top 1,000 yards on catches from the slot in that period, joining **Jaxon Smith-Njigba**, **Amon-Ra St. Brown**, **Josh Downs** and **Ladd McConkey**. Among players at all positions, only Arizona Cardinals tight end **Trey McBride** (115) had more receptions from the slot than Robinson from 2024 to 2025.

#14 • WR CARNELL TATE

6-2, 192, Rookie, Ohio State

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Wide receiver **Carnell Tate** was selected by the Titans with the fourth overall pick in the 2026 NFL Draft.

The No. 4 pick was the highest selection used by the Titans franchise to draft a wide receiver in the common draft era (1967-present). The previous high pick for a Titans/Oilers wideout was fifth overall for **Corey Davis** in 2017. Tate became the first player picked in the first round by the Titans out of Ohio State since running back **Eddie George** in 1996 (14th overall).

Tate joined an extensive list of recent Ohio State wide receivers selected high in the draft. He extended the school's streak to five consecutive seasons (six total players) with a wide receiver drafted in the first round, joining **Garrett Wilson** (10th by New York Jets in 2022), **Chris Olave** (11th by New Orleans in 2022), **Jaxon Smith-Njigba** (20th by Seattle in 2023), **Marvin Harrison Jr.** (fourth by Arizona in 2024) and **Emeka Egbuka** (19th by Tampa Bay in 2025).

During his three-year career at Ohio State (2023-25), Tate saw action in 39 games with 27 starts. He finished his career with 121 receptions for 1,872 yards and 14 touchdowns. Over the course of his career, he had at least one reception in 37 of the 39 games in which he played.

In 2025, he started 11 games and totaled 51 receptions for 875 yards (17.2 avg.) and nine touchdowns. He took home second-team Associated Press All-American and first-team Academic All-American honors.

He is a native of Chicago, Ill.

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Fernando Carmona Jr. was drafted by the Titans in the fifth round (142nd overall) of the 2026 NFL Draft.

Prior to reaching the NFL, Carmona totaled five seasons in college football, starting 49 of 50 games. He spent three seasons (2021-23) at San Jose State before going to Arkansas for his final two years (2024-25). He totaled 37 starts at left tackle before making the transition to left guard for the final 12 games of his college career.

He finished his college career with 49 consecutive starts.

As a senior at Arkansas in 2025, he made the transition to left guard and started all 12 games. He helped pave the way for six games with 500-plus yards of total offense and was named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.

He is a native of Las Vegas, Nev.



#55 • T JC LATHAM

6-6, 342, 3rd Year/3rd with Titans, Alabama

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JC Latham is in his third NFL season in 2026. He was drafted by the Titans with the seventh overall pick in the first round of the 2024 NFL Draft.

In 2025, Latham moved to right tackle, where he started 13 games. He was in the lineup every game for the final 12 contests after missing four of the first five weeks due to injury.

With 30 starts in his first two NFL seasons, Latham joined **Jack Conklin** (32 from 2016-17), **Chance Warmack** (32 from 2013-14), **Michael Roos** (32 from 2005-06) and **Peter Skoronski** (31 from 2023-24) as the franchise's only offensive linemen in its "Titans era" (1999 to present) to accomplish the feat. He did so all before his 23rd birthday (Feb. 8, 2026). Among NFL offensive linemen under 23 at the end of the 2025 regular season, Latham had the most career starts.



As a rookie, Latham notched 17 starts at left tackle, joining **Jack Conklin** (2016), **Chance Warmack** (2013) and **Michael Roos** (2005) as the franchise's only rookie offensive linemen in the "Titans era" (1999–present) to start every game. He was the first to do so exclusively at left tackle. Pro Football Focus named him to its All-Rookie team.

Latham did not miss an offensive snap during his rookie season. He led all rookie offensive linemen and ranked third among all rookies in 2024 with 1,032 offensive snaps. Only Chicago quarterback **Caleb Williams** (1,052) and Denver quarterback **Bo Nix** (1,040) played more offensive snaps than Latham among the 2024 rookie class.

Prior to entering the NFL, Latham spent three seasons at the University of Alabama, where he appeared in 41 total games, including 27 consecutive starts at right tackle to conclude his collegiate career. He was credited with allowing only four sacks during his time with the Tide.

As a junior in 2023, Latham was a second-team All-American and a first-team All-SEC selection at right tackle. He recorded 41 knockdown blocks and allowed only two sacks.

A native of Oak Creek, Wis., Latham attended IMG Academy for the final two years of high school. He began his high school career as a defensive lineman before finishing as one of the nation's top left tackle prospects.

STARTS BEFORE 23RD BIRTHDAY

In his first two NFL seasons, **JC Latham** started 30 of the Titans' 34 games—all before his 23rd birthday on Feb. 8, 2026.

As a rookie in 2024, the first-round pick started every game at left tackle. With 17 starts before his 22nd birthday, he ranked second in franchise history for starts before turning 22. He finished behind only former defensive tackle **Randy Starks**, who registered 21 starts before celebrating his 22nd birthday in 2005. Among all NFL players in 2024, Latham was the only one under age 22 to log 17 starts.

Then, in 2025, Latham moved to right tackle and registered 13 starts. By increasing his total to 30 games played and 30 starts, he ranked fifth in franchise history in total games before a player's 23rd birthday and second in total starts before a player's 23rd birthday. Only Starks (31) had more starts for the organization before turning 23.

Dan Moore Jr. is in his sixth NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2026. He was signed by the Titans on March 13, 2025.

During his first season in Tennessee, Moore started 16 games at left tackle. It was the fifth time in five NFL seasons he logged 16 or more starts at left tackle. His 82 total starts from 2021 through 2025 ranked third in the NFL among offensive tackles, trailing only Atlanta's **Jake Matthews** (85) and Detroit's **Penei Sewell** (83).

Prior to joining the Titans, Moore spent the previous four seasons (2021-24) with the Pittsburgh Steelers. He started 66 total games—all at left tackle—protecting the blind side for all but two contests during his time in the Steel City. During that span, Moore ranked third in the NFL in offensive snaps (4,109) played by tackles, trailing only **Penei Sewell** (4,328) and **Jawaan Taylor** (4,135).

In each of Moore's four seasons with the Steelers, running back **Najee Harris** surpassed 1,000 rushing yards. In 2023, the Steelers offensive line allowed only 36 sacks, which ranked ninth in the NFL.

Moore was drafted by the Steelers in the fourth round (128th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft after attending Texas A&M University. The Beaumont, Texas, native appeared in 44 games with 37 starts for the Aggies, including starts at left tackle in each of the final 36 games of his collegiate career.

Austin Schlottmann is in his eighth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2026. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 12, 2026.

During his first seven NFL seasons, Schlottmann (pronounced SHLOAT-man), appeared in 85 games with 18 starts, registering starts at both center and right guard. After being signed by the Denver Broncos as a rookie free agent in 2018 and remaining in Denver through 2021, he also spent time with the Minnesota Vikings (2022-23) and the New York Giants (2024-25).

In 2025, Schlottmann established a career high with 17 games played and matched a career high with four starts—all at center.

The Brenham, Texas, native attended Texas Christian University (2014-17), where he appeared in 51 games with 29 starts over four seasons. As a senior in 2017, he was an honorable mention All-Big-12 Conference selection after starting all 14 games (eight at center; six at right guard).

Peter Skoronski is in his fourth NFL season in 2026. He was selected by the Titans with the 11th overall pick in the first round of the 2023 NFL Draft, and in August 2026, he received a multi-year contract extension from the team.

During his first three seasons, Skoronski started 48 games at left guard. After missing three of the first four games during his rookie season due to an appendectomy, he started the next 47 games through the end of the 2025 campaign. In 2024 and 2025, he did not miss an offensive snap.

Through 2025, Skoronski's 48 starts were the most for the team in its "Titans era" (1999 to present) by a player before his 25th birthday (July 31, 2026). His streak of 47 consecutive starts at the conclusion of 2025 made up the team's longest active streak.

As a rookie in 2023, Skoronski started 14 games at left guard and helped running back **Derrick Henry** finish second in the NFL with 1,167 rushing yards. He was one of nine NFL rookie offensive linemen in 2023 to register 14 or more starts, and he joined **Nicholas Petit-Frere** (2022), **Jack Conklin** (2016), **Chance Warmack** (2013), **Michael Roos** (2005) and **Jacob Bell** (2004) as the only rookie offensive linemen to record at least 14 starts for the franchise during its "Titans era" (1999–present).

During a three-year career at Northwestern University, Skoronski started all 33 games at left tackle without missing a game. He earned second-team All-Big Ten honors as a freshman and first-team recognition in each of the next two seasons. He became the first offensive lineman in program history to earn two All-Big Ten first-team awards.

As a junior in 2022, he was named the Rimington-Pace Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year—the first ever by a Northwestern lineman—after starting all 12 games at left tackle. He was the first player in school history to become a unanimous first-team All-American and was named first-team All-Big Ten by coaches and media. He finished as a finalist for the 2022 Outland Trophy.

When the Titans drafted Skoronski, he became Northwestern's highest draft selection since guard **Chris Hinton** went to Denver with the fourth pick in 1983, and he was the 11th player in program history to be picked in the first round.



His grandfather, **Bob Skoronski Sr.**, was a left tackle for the Green Bay Packers, playing nine total seasons with the franchise. He was a permanent offensive captain for the Packers under **Vince Lombardi** and played on five NFL championship teams. In 1976, he was inducted into the Packers Hall of Fame. **Bob Skoronski Jr.**, Peter's father, was an All-Ivy League football player at Yale.

He attended Maine South High School in Park Ridge, Ill.

Defensive lineman **John Franklin-Myers** is in his ninth NFL season and his first season with the Titans in 2026. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 12, 2026.

Prior to his arrival in Tennessee, Franklin-Myers appeared in 114 games with 83 starts and amassed 200 tackles, 34 sacks, 251 quarterback pressures, an interception, seven passes defended, two forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

He was originally selected by the L.A. Rams in the fourth round of the 2018 NFL Draft and spent his rookie NFL campaign with the club. In 2019, he was claimed off waivers by the N.Y. Jets and spent the next five seasons with the organization. After being traded to the Denver Broncos in 2024, he spent the next two seasons with the team before signing with the Titans in 2026.

In 2025, Franklin-Myers played in 16 games with 15 starts for the Broncos. It marked his sixth consecutive season with at least 15 games played and his fifth consecutive season with at least 15 starts. He posted 25 tackles, including a career-best 7.5 sacks, and added 39 quarterback pressures and six tackles for loss.

The Greenville, Texas, played four seasons (2014-17) at Stephen F. Austin where he totaled 130 tackles, 17.5 sacks, 37.5 tackles for loss, two fumble recoveries and five forced fumbles in 41 games (33 starts). He completed his collegiate career ranked fifth on Stephen F. Austin's all-time career tackles for loss list and finished ninth in program history in career sacks.

2026 Notes:

- **Against N.Y. Jets (9/13)**, started in his Titans debut and recorded three tackles.

Defensive lineman **Jeffery Simmons** is in his eighth NFL season in 2026. He was selected by the Titans in the first round (19th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft. During the 2026 offseason, he received a multi-year contract extension.

During his first seven seasons, Simmons earned four Pro Bowl berths (2021-22, 2024-25), was a five-time team captain (2021-25), earned first-team Associated Press All-Pro honors (2025), second-team All-Pro honors (2021-22), and was nominated three times for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award (2023-25). During that span, he appeared in 99 games with 97 starts, accumulating 383 tackles, 42.5 sacks, 27 passes defended, eight forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries.

From 2019 through 2025, Simmons was second on the Titans defense in sacks behind only outside linebacker **Harold Landry III** (46). In franchise history, Simmons' 42.5 sacks were 12th overall and fifth in the organization's "Titans era" (1999 to present). Additionally, his total ranked sixth among all NFL interior defensive linemen.

With at least five sacks every season from 2021 to 2025, Simmons joined **Ray Childress** (nine consecutive seasons), **Jurrell Casey** (seven), **William Fuller** (six), and **Sean Jones** (six) as the only players for the franchise to record five consecutive seasons with at least five sacks since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982.

In 2025, Simmons appeared in 15 games with 15 starts. He earned Pro Bowl and AP All-Pro honors after ranking first in the NFL among interior defensive linemen in solo tackles (39), tackles for loss (17), sacks (11.0), sack yards (79.0), quarterback pressures (60), pressure rate (14.5 percent) and forced fumbles (tied - three). His sacks, sack yards, tackles for loss and forced fumbles all set career highs, despite missing two games due to injury.

From 2016 through 2025, only two NFL interior defensive linemen recorded at least 65 tackles, 11 sacks, 17 tackles for loss and three forced fumbles in a single season: **Aaron Donald** (2021) and Simmons (2025).

Simmons missed only one game in 2024. His 16 starts made up the second-highest total of his career through six seasons behind his 17 starts in 2021. Among his season totals, he set career highs with 76 tackles and two forced fumbles, and he added five sacks and a team-high 42 quarterback pressures. He was rewarded with his third Pro Bowl invitation.

Simmons' 76 tackles ranked second on the Titans in 2024. It was the best number for any defensive lineman for the organization in its "Titans era" (1999 to present), topping defensive end **Kyle Vanden Bosch's** previous mark of 75 tackles in 2006 (GSIS/press box statistics). Among NFL defensive linemen in 2024, Simmons finished second in tackles behind Carolina's **A'Shawn Robinson** (80).

In 2023, although he was limited to 12 games and finished the season on injured reserve, he managed to register 5.5 sacks, marking his third consecutive season to reach that number or higher. He added 44 tackles, 38 quarterback pressures, 11 tackles for loss, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and one pass defended. For the first time in his career, he received the honor of the team's nomination for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award.

In 2022, Simmons appeared in 15 games and anchored a unit that ranked first in the NFL in rushing defense (76.9 opponent rushing yards per game). En route to his second consecutive Pro Bowl appearance, he totaled 53 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 43 quarterback pressures, nine tackles for loss, one forced fumble and a career-high seven passes defended, which tied for the fourth-best mark among all NFL defensive linemen. Simmons and Arizona's **J.J. Watt** were the NFL's only players in 2022 with at least seven sacks and seven passes defended.

Before the start of the 2021 season, Simmons was named a team captain for the first time in his career, and he went on to become one of six players on the roster to start all 17 games. He was named to his first career Pro Bowl and added Associated Press second-team All-Pro honors after setting career highs in several categories, including sacks (8.5), tackles (54), quarterback pressures (58), tackles for loss (12) and passes defended (six). He led the squad in pressures and placed third in sacks. Among all defensive tackles in the NFL, his 8.5 sacks ranked sixth. In the divisional

playoffs, he set a franchise postseason record with three sacks.

In 2020, Simmons appeared and started in 15 games. With three defensive fumble recoveries, he tied **Chase Young** for the most in the NFL in 2020 and was the first Titans defender with three fumble recoveries in a season since 2005, when linebacker **Brad Kassell** accomplished the feat. Simmons ranked second on the team with 19 quarterback pressures and added 49 tackles, three sacks, three tackles for loss, five passes defended and one forced fumble. In the franchise's "Titans era" (since 1999), he became the first player to post at least three fumble recoveries, three sacks and five passes defended in the same season. He also had three tackles and a tackle for loss in one playoff contest.

Simmons began his rookie season on the non-football injury list due to a knee injury he suffered during training in February 2019. He missed the first six games of the season before joining the 53-man roster in Week 7.

His rookie totals included 40 tackles, two sacks, two tackles for loss, 14 quarterback pressures and one pass defended in nine games (seven starts). He added four tackles, three quarterback pressures and a fumble recovery in three playoff contests.

During a three-year career as a defensive tackle at Mississippi State, Simmons appeared in 38 contests with 28 starts. He finished his career ranked sixth in school history with 32.5 tackles for loss. He also tied for sixth in MSU annals with five forced fumbles and tied for fourth with three blocked kicks. His totals also included 163 tackles, seven sacks, seven passes defended and two defensive touchdowns.

He was a first-team All-SEC selection as a sophomore and junior and was one of two players in the nation to be named a Bednarik Award Semifinalist in both 2017 and 2018.

As a junior in 2018, Simmons was named second-team All-American after totaling 63 tackles, 17 tackles for loss and two sacks. His 17 tackles for loss led the team, ranked fourth in the SEC and were the third-most in single-season school history.

During his sophomore season (2017), he set a career high with five sacks and added 12 tackles for loss. With three total blocked kicks and punts, he became the first SEC player since 2004 to lead the nation in the category.

Simmons is a native of Macon, Miss.

In the second quarter, he forced Jalen Hurts out of bounds for a one-yard loss to notch his first sack of the season, which gave him a career total of 43.5 sacks. In the fourth quarter, he pressured Hurts on third down to help force an interception by Marcus Harris. He moved to within one sack of tying Derrick Morgan (44.5) for 11th place on the franchise's all-time sack list, and fourth among players in the franchise's "Titans era" (1999 to present). In the first two games of the 2026 season, he recorded 13 total pressures to set a career high and give him the most quarterback pressures by a defensive tackle since San Francisco's Javon Hargrave recorded 13 in the first two weeks of 2023. His 13 quarterback pressures in Weeks 1 and 2 were the most by a Titans player at any position since Arden Key recorded 15 in the first two weeks of 2023.

Defensive tackle **Solomon Thomas** is in his 10th NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2026. He was acquired by the Titans in a trade with the Dallas Cowboys on March 12, 2026.

Prior to his arrival in Tennessee, he appeared in 131 games with 36 starts and posted 239 tackles, 18.5 sacks, 138 quarterback pressures, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.

Linebacker **Cody Barton** is in his eighth NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2026. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 13, 2025.

Barton was named team captain prior to the start of his first campaign in Tennessee. He then registered 17 starts for the first time in his career and never came off the field when the Titans were on defense, participating in 100 percent of the defensive snaps (1,009). He led the team with career highs of three interceptions and 11 passes defended, and his season statistics also included 81 tackles (tied for second on the team), one sack, eight quarterback pressures and four tackles for loss (tied career high).

Within the NFL in 2025, Barton and Jacksonville's **Foye Oluokun** tied for the lead among linebackers in passes defended (11). No NFL player in his first or second NFL campaign in 2025 had more tackles than Gray. Additionally, Gray tied **Stephen Tulloch** (2010) for the Titans' second-highest single-season tackle total since 2000, trailing only **Azeez Al-Shaair's** 163 tackles in 2023 (GSIS tackle statistics).

As a rookie in 2024, spent the first seven games on injured reserve before being activated on Oct. 28, 2024. He appeared in the final seven games of the season and totaled 14 tackles on defense while ranking third on the team with eight tackles on special teams. His eight special teams tackles tied for the seventh-best total among rookies in 2024, and over the final seven weeks of the season, he led the rookie class and tied for second overall in the NFL (Oren Burks, Jeremy Reaves) behind only Pittsburgh's Miles Killebrew (nine).

In four seasons at the University of North Carolina, he played in 51 games with 37 starts and recorded 369 tackles, 30 tackles for loss, 8.5 sacks, five interceptions, 13 passes defended, six forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries. He was a two-time first team All-ACC selection and a 2023 Butkus Award semifinalist.

As a senior in 2023, he played and started in 12 games and posted a team-best 121 tackles in addition to five sacks, 11 stops for loss, seven quarterback pressures, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, an interception and four passes defended. He was named first-team All-ACC by the league and the Associated Press. He recorded five double-digit tackle games and ranked second in the ACC with 121 tackles.

Gray is a native of Charlotte, N.C.

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Anthony Hill Jr. was selected by the Titans in the second round (60th overall) of the 2026 NFL Draft.

Prior to entering the NFL, Hill played three seasons (2023-25) at the University of Texas. He saw action in 40 games with 32 starts over three seasons (2023-25) with the Longhorns and finished his career with 249 tackles, 31.5 tackles for loss, 17 sacks, eight forced fumbles and three interceptions.

As a junior in 2025, he started 10 games and recorded 69 tackles, seven tackles for loss, four sacks, two interceptions, three forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. He was named a second-team All-American by the Associated Press, AFCA and FWAA. He also was a finalist for the Butkus Award and a semifinalist for the Chuck Bednarik Award, and he was selected to the coaches' All-SEC second team.

As a sophomore in 2024, Hill started all 16 games and led the team with 113 tackles and 16.5 tackles for loss en route to being named a second-team All-American by the Associated Press, AFCA, Sporting News and Walter Camp.

He became the first NFL rookie with 16 tackles and two passes defended in a game since at least 2000; the first NFL player with 16 tackles and two passes defended in a Week 1 game since at least 2000; and the first NFL player with 16 tackles and two passes defended in a game since Dec. 10, 2023, when Chicago Bears safety Jaquan Brisker had 17 stops and two passes defended against Detroit. Hill's two passes defended also made him the first Titans rookie to have two or more passes defended in his first game action since Adoree' Jackson had two against the Las Vegas Raiders on Sept. 10, 2017. In the first half, he totaled 11 tackles and two passes defended, becoming the first NFL player to have at least 10 tackles and two passes defended in any first half since Dec. 24, 2006, when Colts cornerback Marlin Jackson had 12 tackles and two passes defended in the first half against Houston. His 11 tackles in the first half were the most by a Titans rookie in his debut first half since at least 2000 (according to Tru Media). On the first play of the game from scrimmage, which also was his first career play, he was credited with a tackle of running back Breece Hall. Later in the first quarter, he tallied his first career pass defended on a pass intended for tight end Mason Taylor. In the second quarter, he added a pass defended on third down on a pass intended for running back Braelon Allen, resulting in the Jets settling for a field goal.



➤ **Against Philadelphia (9/20)**, led the team in tackles for the second consecutive week, accumulating 10 tackles against the Eagles. In the first two weeks of the season, he totaled an NFL-high 26 tackles, which also tied him with Keith Bulluck (2006) for the most total tackles (26) by a Titans player through the first two games of a season since the beginning of 2000 (GSIS press box statistics). Since the beginning of 2000, the only NFL rookie with more tackles in the first two games of a season was Indianapolis Colts linebacker Shaquille Leonard with 28 in 2018.

During his first seven seasons, Hooker's totals included 12 interceptions, 39 passes defended and 396 tackles in 96 games (67 starts). Only **Kevin Byard** had more interceptions for the team from 2019 through 2025.

Long snapper **Morgan Cox** is in his 17th NFL season and his sixth campaign with the Titans in 2026. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 19, 2021.

In 2025, Cox was voted a team captain for the third consecutive season and handled all of the team's long snapping duties for the fifth consecutive season. With 85 consecutive games played in his first five seasons with the Titans, he finished the 2025 campaign with the longest active streak of games played for the team. It was the 13th time in his career he appeared in every game for his team.

Cox also appeared in his 250th career game (regular season) in the 2025 season finale, becoming the 64th all-time NFL player to do so. He ranked ninth among all active NFL players, and his total also gave him the fourth-most NFL games played by a former University of Tennessee Volunteer behind tight end **Jason Witten** (271 NFL games), quarterback **Peyton Manning** (266) and punter **Dustin Colquitt** (255).

Cox worked with new battery mates in 2025 in punter **Johnny Hekker** and kicker **Joey Slye**. Hekker averaged 46.8 gross yards per punt to tie for 11th place in franchise history and 40.3 net yards per punt, which tied for ninth place in team annals. Slye delivered on 28 of 35 field goals, including four of the eight longest field goals in franchise history (58, 57, 57 and 56 yards). Also in 2025, Cox was a finalist for the NFL's Bart Starr Award for the third consecutive year.

In 2024, Cox's consistency helped kicker **Nick Folk** lead the NFL in field goal percentage for the second consecutive season. Folk connected on 21 of 22 field goals for an NFL-best rate of 95.5 percent. Meanwhile, punter **Ryan Stonehouse** ranked third in the NFL with an average of 50.6 yards per punt attempt.

In 2023, Cox's efforts helped Folk lead the NFL in field goal accuracy (96.7 percent) and helped Stonehouse lead the NFL for a second consecutive season in gross punting average (53.1).

In 2022, Cox was named to his fifth career Pro Bowl. He garnered more Pro Bowl appearances than any other player at his position since the league began naming long snappers to the Pro Bowl in 2004.

His steady play in 2022 helped Stonehouse, a rookie, lead the league and set a new NFL record with a 53.1-yard gross punting average. Stonehouse also finished fourth in the NFL and set a rookie record with a 44.0-yard net average. Meanwhile, kicker **Randy Bullock** made 17 of 20 field goals (85.0 percent) and made all 28 extra point attempts.

In 2021, Cox handled all of the team's long snapping duties in 17 regular season games and one postseason game. He helped Bullock finish ninth in franchise history with 120 points in a single season, including three game-winning field goals (Sept. 19 at Seattle, Oct. 31 at Indianapolis and Dec. 23 against San Francisco). He also snapped for punter **Brett Kern**, who

Kicker **Joey Slye** is in his eighth NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2026. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 24, 2025.

During the 2025 season, Slye made 28 field goals on 35 attempts and added 26 extra points on 27 attempts for a total of 110 points. It was the fourth time in his career that he went over the 100-point mark. His totals included a team-record nine field goals of at least 50 yards, breaking **Stephen Gostkowski's** record of seven such field goals in 2020. In only one season, Slye booted four of the eight longest field goals in franchise history (58, 57, 57 and 56 yards).

Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Slye totaled six seasons with the Carolina Panthers (2019-20), Houston Texans (2022), San Francisco 49ers (2022), Washington Commanders (2022-23) and New England Patriots (2024). The Virginia Tech product has also spent time with the N.Y. Giants and Jacksonville Jaguars.

In 2024, Slye played in all 17 games for the Patriots and connected on 26 of 33 field goal attempts and 25 of 26 extra point attempts for a total of 103 points. At San Francisco on Sept. 29, 2024, he set a Patriots record and established his career long with a 63-yard field goal at the end of the second quarter. It tied for the fourth-longest field goal in NFL history.

In his final season in Washington (2023), Slye saw action in all 17 games and handled all kickoffs, field goals and extra points for the Commanders. He connected on 19 of 24 field goals and 32 of 35 extra points for 89 points. Also had 64 touchbacks on 69 kickoffs.

The North Stafford, Va., native attended Virginia Tech (2014-17), where he played four seasons and made 78 of 108 field goal attempts (72.2 percent) and 169 of 172 extra point attempts (98.3 percent).

2026 Notes:

- **Against N.Y. Jets (9/13)**, connected on a 42-yard field goal in the first quarter to give Tennessee its first points of the contest.
- **Against Philadelphia (9/20)**, made a 37-yard field goal on the final play of the first half and added a 33-yarder in the fourth quarter. He was also good on both extra point attempts.

had the league's third-best ratio of punts inside the 20 to touchbacks (18:1).

In his first 11 seasons, Cox appeared in 165 regular season games for the Baltimore Ravens, serving as the team's primary long snapper after entering the NFL as an undrafted free agent in 2010. He was selected to four Pro Bowls and was a part of five playoff teams in Baltimore, totaling 10 postseason games played.

In 2020, he earned his fourth career Pro Bowl selection. He helped kicker **Justin Tucker** record his fifth consecutive season with at least 130 points, tying the NFL record of consecutive seasons with 130-plus points. Tucker connected on 26 of 29 field goals (89.7 percent) and was 52 of 53 on extra points (98.1 percent). Cox also snapped on all 51 of **Sam Koch's** 51 punts, as Koch was the NFL's only punter to place at least 20 punts (22) inside in the 20-yard line and have no more than one touchback.

A native of Collierville, Tenn., Cox played 38 games in three seasons (2007-09) as the primary long snapper at the University of Tennessee.

Punter **Tommy Townsend** is in his seventh NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2026. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 12, 2026.

Townsend entered the NFL in 2020 as an undrafted free agent with the Kansas City Chiefs and spent his first four seasons with the club, contributing to a pair of Super Bowl title runs in 2022 and 2023. Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Townsend spent the 2024 and 2025 campaigns with the Houston Texans. In each of his first six NFL seasons, his team won at least one postseason game.

In 2025, Townsend saw action in all 17 contests for the fourth consecutive year. He punted 72 times for an average of 47.6 yards and a net average of 41.6 yards. He placed 30 punts inside the 20.

During the 2022 season in Kansas City, Townsend averaged 50.4 yards per punt with a net average of 45.6 yards. His punting average and net average both established Chiefs single-season records. In addition to being named September AFC Special Teams Player of the Month, he was voted to the Pro Bowl and earned first-team Associated Press All-Pro honors.

The Orlando, Fla., native played at the University of Florida from 2016 to 2019. In 26 college games, he recorded 93 punts for a 44.8-yard average with 44 kicks placed inside the 20-yard line. He set the Gators record for most yards by a punter in a single game (432, nine punts) and the seventh-longest punt (71 yards; twice). He began his career at the University of Tennessee and redshirted before transferring to Florida.

Townsend's older brother, Johnny, punted at Florida in college and then spent time in the NFL with the Raiders, Ravens, Chiefs and Titans in between 2018 and 2021. He appeared in three games for the Titans in 2021, punting 11 times for 465 yards with two kicks placed inside the 20-yard line.

2026 Notes:

➤ **Against Philadelphia (9/20)**, averaged 50.8 yards on four punts, including one punt inside the 20. He delivered a 65-yard punt in the first quarter.

- The Titans signed Michael Carter as a free agent on April 1, 2026. Carter spent the entire offseason and training camp in Tennessee before being added to the team's practice squad following the preseason.
- Carter has played in 61 games with 27 starts for the New York Jets and Arizona Cardinals since being selected in the fourth round (107th overall) by New York in 2021. DIRECTIONS TO NISSAN STADIUM

FROM AIRPORT TO NISSAN STADIUM (APPROXIMATELY 15 MINUTES): Take I-40 West toward Nashville/Memphis to I-24 West (before downtown). Exit at James Robertson Parkway (Exit 48). Turn left at first light (Interstate Drive). Turn right on Woodland Street. Nissan Stadium will be on the left. Follow signs to parking lot ("M" lot on northwest corner/river side of stadium).

FIELD MEDIA VESTS

All members of the media with field access during the game must wear a media vest. Still and video photographers will be issued tan vests, while team-affiliated photographers and videographers (scoreboard, social, coaches' shows, etc.) will be issued gray vests. Additionally, media with in-game field access will be issued an armband. All vests and armbands must be obtained prior to each game at the check-in table. **Vest/arm-band check-in is located on the third-floor landing near the press box.** All vests must be returned at the conclusion of the game to Titans personnel or to the vest check-in table.

NISSAN STADIUM PRESS BOX INTERNET ACCESS

Login information will be available upon arrival in the press box. A limited number of ethernet lines also are available.

FROM NISSAN STADIUM PRESS BOX TO INTERVIEW ROOMS

Take the press box elevator (Level 3) to field level (Level 1). The Titans interview room is immediately on the right. Turn left and continue straight along the concourse to reach the visiting team's interview room (white line).

POSTGAME POLICIES

Reporters with press box credentials will not be allowed on the field during pregame activities or during the game itself. Press box credentials do NOT provide access to the field at the two-minute warning in the fourth quarter. Media will be allowed to gather in the Titans interview room to watch the end of the game or remain in the press box to make the short walk down to service level at the conclusion of the game. Interviews with Titans players are not permitted on the field following the game. The press conference will begin approximately 10 minutes following the conclusion of the game and will be held in the interview room across from the Titans locker room. Key players also will be brought to the interview room. Simultaneously, the locker room will open to credentialed media members with a working function. The press conference audio will be played live over the press box speakers.

POSTGAME QUOTES

Quotes from each team's head coach and key players will be transcribed and distributed throughout the Nissan Stadium press box following the game. The quotes also will be available at www.TennesseeTitans.com/media.

POOL REPORTS

Pool reporters are assigned by the Pro Football Writers of America. Requests for pool reports with game officials must be made in advance through the home team's media relations. Interviews will be conducted virtually. Pool reports will be recorded, transcribed and then distributed in the press box.

EXITING NISSAN STADIUM

FROM NISSAN STADIUM PRESS BOX TO STADIUM EXIT: Cross the press box catwalk to the third floor lobby. If less than two hours have elapsed since the end of the game, take the stairs or elevator one floor down to Level 2. Exit through the doors and walk right to get to the "M" or "G" lot. **If more than two hours have elapsed since the end of the game,** take the elevator down to Level 1. Proceed through the lower concourse and exit through the security checkpoint at the loading dock.

FROM NISSAN STADIUM TO AIRPORT (APPROXIMATELY 15 MINUTES): Take I-24 East toward Chattanooga to I-40 East toward Knoxville. The airport is at Exit 216A.

NISSAN STADIUM PARKING, MEDIA WILL CALL AND MEDIA ENTRANCE

The media will call window and media entrance are located in the northwest corner of Nissan Stadium near Gate 6. The media will call window opens three hours prior to kickoff. Photographers' vests can be picked up near the entrance to the press box on Level 3.



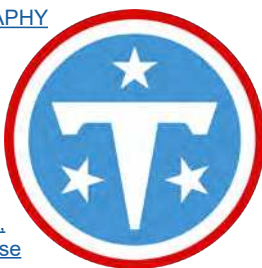

On March 12, 2026, the Tennessee Titans revealed new logos and uniforms, marking an exciting moment for the organization that honors the team's deep roots and celebrates its home in Nashville and the state of Tennessee.

More than just a new look, the uniform and logo embody the spirit of the organization – its rich history dating back to 1960, heritage, and home. The design was inspired by the voices and passion of Titans fans, players, alumni, and neighbors.

"We are incredibly proud to unveil this new look for the Tennessee Titans," said Titans controlling owner **Amy Adams Strunk**. "Our uniforms and logo represent the strength of our history, the passion of our fans, and the bold future we're building together. Today is about honoring over 65 years of our organization while confidently stepping into the next chapter, and I couldn't be more excited for our players, our city, and our fans to wear this identity with pride."

The team's new primary logo, The Shield, remains true to the Titans identity, featuring strong colors of Titans blue, white, and red, and the team's familiar tri-stars. A secondary mark, The Football, gives a cultural nod to city and state and offers fans a fresh way to show their Titans pride. The letters "T" and "N" are blended in a vertical arrangement commemorating both the state's postal abbreviation and the city of Nashville, TN. An array of other marks, including a handcrafted script wordmark, also adorn the team's new logo slick.

The team uniform features some of the organization's most iconic aspects of its heritage and brings them into its present and future.

- At home in Nashville, the Titans primary jerseys will don the distinctive Titans blue, with "TITANS" emblazoned across the chest. The chest font draws inspiration from traditional woodblock printmaking – a tribute to the city's creative spirit – while the numbers echo classic collegiate design.

- On the road, white jerseys will carry the "TENNESSEE" name, ensuring the team represents the state everywhere they play.
- The Tennessee Tri-Star can be found in navy in the tab at the back of the uniform and on the side panel underneath the arm.
- Inside every jersey, a simple "WE" tag is stitched, a rallying cry for the team that emphasizes a "we over me" mentality.
- The iconic stripe of the team's past was infused with Nashville's deep roots in music and is now the 6-String Stripe, represented on the pants, sleeve, and helmet.

"From the beginning, we approached this process with tremendous care and pride, knowing how much the Titans identity means to our fans and to the state of Tennessee," said Titans President and CEO **Burke Nihill**. "Every element of these uniforms was thoughtfully considered – from the Titans blue and Tri-Star to the new 6-String Stripe that celebrates Nashville's deep musical roots. We wanted to honor the history that defines this franchise while creating something that reflects who we are today and where we're going. The result is a uniform that represents our team, our city, and our state with authenticity and pride."



TITANS UNVEIL NEW LOGO AND UNIFORMS



THE HELMET

Our primary logo, "The Shield" adorns the side of the helmet, while the 6-String Stripe runs down the center. The helmet's clean, white shell is paired with an all-white face mask.



THE CHEST PLATES

The Titans primary wordmark, stitched prominently across the center of the chest, announces our name in a bold, serif font inspired by Tennessee woodblock type and classic athletics. Rendered in a sans-serif typeface, our away jersey proudly represents our home state everywhere we play.



THE STRIPE

The "6-String Stripe" infuses the iconic stripe from our past with Nashville's deep roots in music. This stripe is featured prominently along the pants, sleeve, and helmet.



THE NAMEPLATE

The nameplate uses a roster font that is an extension of the woodblock-inspired wordmark.



THE NUMBERS

Inspired by collegiate-style block numbers, our classic jersey numbers stand out in white on our primary home jersey and in Titans blue while we're away, both accented with red outlines.



THE ACCENTS

Navy continues in the 6-String Stripe, the collar tab, the Tri-Star vents at the side panels, the Nike Swoosh, and the 3D helmet bumpers.



THE TAB

The collar tab features the Tennessee Tri-Star, proudly honoring the three Grand Divisions of our home state. Inside the collar tab is the word, "WE," representing the team's "We Over Me" mentality.
