TITANS-COLTS SUPPLEMENTAL NOTES

TITANS PUT POST-BYE WINNING STREAK ON THE LINE: The Titans head into this week's game with the Indianapolis Colts following their Week 6 bye. They are one of four clubs that shared the NFL's earliest possible open date this season.

Since **Mike Vrabel** arrived as head coach in 2018, the Titans are undefeated in their four games following the bye. After a week off, they won at Dallas in 2018, against Jacksonville in 2019, against Buffalo in 2020 and against Jacksonville in 2021.

The Titans' post-bye winning streak extends prior to Vrabel's arrival. Including wins in 2016 (against Denver) and 2017 (against Baltimore), they have a franchise-best six consecutive victories in games immediately following their bye. It is the second-longest active streak of its kind behind only the Bills' seven straight wins.

HENRY CLOSING IN ON HISTORY: Titans running back **Derrick Henry** goes into Week 7 against Indianapolis needing one touchdown to tie **Eddie George's** franchise record for career touchdowns and two touchdowns to break it. George totaled 74 touchdowns during his career with the organization from 1996 to 2003, reaching the end zone 64 times as a rusher and 10 times as a receiver.

Since entering the NFL as a second-round pick with the Titans in 2016, Henry has scored 73 total touchdowns, including 70 rushing touchdowns and three receiving touchdowns. In the team's most recent game at Washington on Oct. 9, he tied **Earl Campbell** (73 touchdowns, all rushing) for second place in team annals with a two-score performance.

In addition to becoming the first Titans/Oilers player to score 75 touchdowns, Henry has an opportunity to crack the NFL's top 10 for the fewest career games needed to reach 75 touchdowns since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger. Former Chargers running back **LaDainian Tomlinson** was the fastest, arriving at 75 touchdowns in only 72 games. Henry has appeared in 91 career games. If he reaches the end zone twice within the next two contests, he would surpass wide receiver **Randy Moss** for 10th place on the list. Moss hit the 75-touchdown mark in his 94th game.

Additionally, Henry can accomplish the following this week:

- With three rushing touchdowns, he will tie Campbell (73) for the most rushing touchdowns in franchise history.
- He needs 33 receiving yards (967 career) to hit 1,000 career receiving yards. He would join George and **Chris Johnson** as the franchise's only players with 7,000 rushing yards and 1,000 receiving yards.
- Henry is 109 scrimmage yards (8,172 career) from passing **Ernest Givins** (8,280) for fourth place on the franchise's all-time career scrimmage yards list. He would trail only George (12,153), Johnson (9,968) and Campbell (9,292).
- He can record his third consecutive 100-yard rushing game. It would be his 31st career 100-yard rushing game, including regular season (28) and playoffs (three).
- With one rushing touchdown, he would register his fifth consecutive game with at least one rushing touchdown. That would tie the franchise record, which he shares with Campbell (1979 and 1983) and **DeMarco Murray** (2016). Henry previously accomplished the feat in 2019 and in 2020.

TANNEHILL THRIVING IN RED ZONE: The Titans are leading the NFL in red zone efficiency, having scored 12 touchdowns on 13 trips inside the opponent's 20-yard line in 2022—a rate of 92.3 percent. That includes a current streak of 11 consecutive touchdowns in red-zone drives. Their lone red-zone possession without a touchdown resulted in a field goal in the season opener against the New York Giants.

A primary catalyst for their success in the red zone has been the performance of quarterback **Ryan Tannehill**. Inside the opponent's 20, he has completed 13 of 16 passes for a league-leading 81.3 percent. He has 100 passing yards, five touchdowns and no interceptions, amounting to an NFL-best 132.3 passer rating.

Since 2000, the best single-season passer rating in the red zone by any quarterback was 122.4 by then-Philadelphia Eagles quarterback **Nick Foles** in 2013.

SIMMONS, AUTRY, WEAVER LEADING SACK CHARGE: Despite being one of four NFL teams that has played only five games instead of six due to a Week 6 bye, the Titans are the only club with three different players who each have at least 3.5 sacks. Defensive lineman **Denico Autry** and outside linebacker **Rashad Weaver** are tied for the team lead with four sacks apiece, while defensive tackle **Jeffery Simmons** ranks third with 3.5 sacks.

The trio has accounted collectively for at least one sack in each of the Titans' five games this season.

There are 23 NFL teams with either one player or no players who have reached 3.5 sacks this season.
