## TITANS VISIT CARDINALS IN LATE SUNDAY AFTERNOON KICKOFF



Tennessee Titans (0-4) vs. Arizona Cardinals (2-2)

Sunday, Oct. 5, 2025 • 3:05 p.m. CDT • State Farm Stadium • Glendale, Ariz. • TV: CBS/WTVF-5

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Titans (0-4) play their second of three consecutive road games this week, traveling to play the Arizona Cardinals (2-2) at State Farm Stadium (capacity 65,000). Kickoff is scheduled for 1:05 p.m. MST/3:05 p.m. CDT on Sunday, Oct. 5.

The Titans have played at State Farm Stadium only one other time in the regular season, which ended with a 12-7 Cardinals victory on Dec. 10, 2017. In only 12 all-time meetings, the Cardinals lead the series 8-4.

### THE BROADCAST

This week's contest will be regionally televised on CBS, including Nashville affiliate WTVF NewsChannel 5, as well as on Paramount+ in the Nashville market. The broadcast team includes play-by-play announcer **Spero Dedes**, analyst **Adam Archuleta** and reporter **Aditi Kinkhabwala**.

### TITANS LOOKING FOR ROAD WIN

The Titans visited the AFC South rival Houston Texans last week. In a game that was 6-0 at the beginning of the fourth quarter, the Texans ultimately prevailed 26-0.

No. 1 overall draft pick **Cam Ward** started for the fourth consecutive week, joining **Marcus Mariota** (2015) as the franchise's only quarterbacks to log starts in each of the first four games of their rookie seasons. His statistical totals this season include 64 completions on 125 passes for 614 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions.

The defensive effort at Houston featured a 17-tackle performance by second-year linebacker **Cedric Gray**. The 2024 fourth-round draft pick set a career high and became the team's second player since 2020 (**Daryl Worley** on Dec. 1, 2024) to reach 17 tackles in a game. Only one other NFL player in 2025 has made 17 tackles in a game (18 by Miami's **Jordyn Brooks**, Sept. 29).

Additionally, defensive tackle **Jeffery Simmons** contributed four tackles for loss, a sack and four quarterback pressures. His four tackles for loss are the most by any Titans player since the beginning of the 2008 campaign.

Following this week's game, the Titans will finish their three-game road swing with the franchise's first game at Las Vegas on Oct. 12.

### THE CARDINALS

The Cardinals will have three extra days to prepare for the Titans after hosting the Seattle Seahawks last week on Thursday Night Football. After tying the score at 20-20 in the final minute against the Seahawks, they lost the game on a 52-yard field goal as time expired. It was the second consecutive week the Cardinals suffered a defeat on a field goal with no time remaining—a 35-yarder the previous week gave the San Francisco 49ers a 16-15 win over the Cardinals.

Arizona is led by head coach **Jonathan Gannon**, who was in the role of defensive assistant/quality control as a member of the Titans coaching staff in 2012 and 2013. He was hired by the Cardinals in 2023 and led the team from four wins in his initial season to eight wins in 2024.

Cardinals general manager **Monti Ossenfort** also spent time with the Titans. Prior to being hired by Arizona in 2023, he served in Tennessee as the director of player personnel from 2020 to 2022.

Cardinals quarterback **Kyler Murray** was the No. 1 overall draft choice in 2019. The two-time Pro Bowl selection has started each of the team's first four games of 2025 and passed for 742 yards and six touchdowns with three interceptions. He has an additional 148 rushing yards through four contests.

## WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

### WR ELIC AYOMANOR

- Enters the week with 12 receptions for 151 yards and two touchdowns. He needs three receptions to become the team's fourth player since 1999 with 15 or more receptions in the team's first five games of his rookie season. He would join **Kendall Wright** (27 in 2012), **Kenny Britt** (19 in 2009) and **Tajae Sharpe** (18 in 2016).
- With one touchdown catch, he can become the franchise's first rookie since the 1970 merger to have three touchdown receptions in the team's first five games of a season.
- Needs two receptions to become the team's first rookie since **Tajae Sharpe** (2016) to record at least two receptions in each of the first five games of his rookie season.

### LB CODY BARTON

- Scheduled to play in his 100th NFL game (regular season).

### S QUANDRE DIGGS

- Scheduled to play in his 150th NFL game (regular season).
- Needs one interception to join five other active NFL players—**Harrison Smith**, **Kevin Byard III**, **Xavien Howard**, **Darius Slay** and **Jalen**

**Ramsey**—to reach 25 for his career. With 24 interceptions entering the game, Diggs is tied with **Jordan Poyer** and **Jessie Bates III** for the sixth-most interceptions among active players.

### LB CEDRIC GRAY

- With 15 tackles, he will join **Azeez Al-Shaair** (Oct. 8-15, 2023) as the team's only players since 1999 with 15 or more tackles in consecutive games. Gray led the team with 17 tackles last week at Houston.

### S SAMANI HOOKER

- With 12 career interceptions, he needs one more to tie **Jason McCourty** (13) for the eighth-highest career total for the franchise during its "Titans era" (1999–present).

### WR VAN JEFFERSON

- Needs 100 receiving yards to reach 2,000 for his career (1,900).

### RB TONY POLLARD

- Scheduled to play in his 100th NFL game (regular season).
- Needs one more rushing touchdown to reach 30 for his career.
- Needs 39 rushing yards to reach 5,000 for his career (4,961).

### WR CALVIN RIDLEY

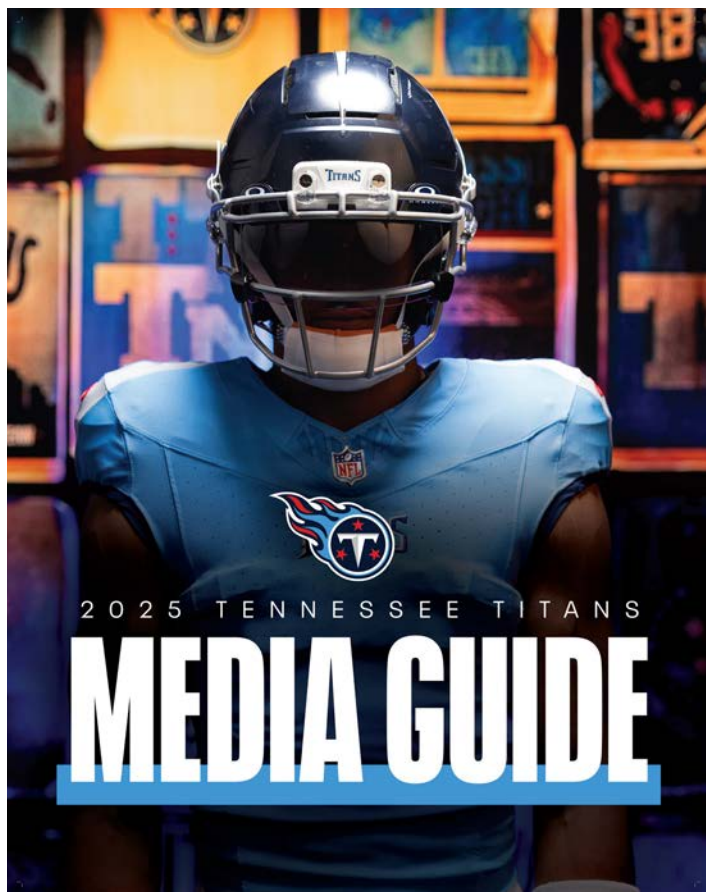
- Needs two receptions to reach 400 career receptions.

### K JOEY SLYE

- Scheduled to play in his 100th NFL game (regular season).
- Enters the game with 10 field goals in the first four weeks. With three field goals, he will join **Ryan Succop** (13 in 2018) and **Nick Folk** (13 in 2023) as the only players in franchise history with 13 or more field goals in the first five games of a season.

### QB CAM WARD

- Slated to join **Marcus Mariota** as the only rookie quarterbacks in franchise history to start the first five games of a season. Mariota started the first five games as a rookie in 2015 before missing the team's sixth game.

## SERIES HISTORY

Of all opponents that have been in existence since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, the Cardinals have played the fewest games against the Titans. The two teams have met 12 times, with the Cardinals holding an 8-4 lead, including a current three-game winning streak over the Titans.

There have been just five Titans-Cardinals games (2005, 2009, 2013, 2017 and 2021) between the clubs in their current incarnations—the Cardinals played in St. Louis from 1960-87 (they played in Chicago prior to that), and the Titans were the Houston Oilers (1960-96) and Tennessee Oilers (1997-98) prior to taking their current name and opening Nissan Stadium in 1999.

Most recently, the Titans and Cardinals opened the 2021 regular season at Nissan Stadium. Cardinals outside linebacker **Chandler Jones** recorded five of the team's six sacks on defense, while quarterback **Kyler Murray** totaled five touchdowns—four passing and one rushing. The Cardinals won by a final score of 38-13.

The prior two visits by the Cardinals to Nissan Stadium produced a pair of the most dramatic finishes in the stadium's history. On Dec. 15, 2013, the Titans erased a 17-point deficit in the final four minutes of the fourth quarter, only to watch **Jay Feely** win it for the Cardinals in overtime with a 41-yard field goal.

Prior to that, on Nov. 29, 2009, the Titans needed a late 99-yard touchdown drive to clinch a 20-17 victory against the Cardinals. Led by quarterback **Vince Young**, the Titans converted three times on fourth down on the game-winning drive, including a 10-yard touchdown pass from Young to **Kenny Britt** with no time remaining on the clock.

The Titans have made only one trip to State Farm Stadium, which opened in Glendale, Ariz., in 2006. On Dec. 10, 2017, **Phil Dawson's** four field goals were enough for the Cardinals to secure a 12-7 win.

On Nov. 1, 1970, in the first-ever matchup between the Oilers and Cardinals, the Cardinals won by a score of 44-0. It stood as the largest shutout loss in the history of the Oilers and Titans until 2009 and began a three-game winning streak for the Cardinals against the Oilers (1970, 1974 and 1979). The Oilers then won consecutive games (1985 and 1988) before exchanging victories in the 1990s (Cardinals won in 1994, Oilers in 1997).

The Cardinals were founded in 1898, making the team the United States' oldest professional football franchise still in existence. In 1920, they became a charter member of the National Football League (then the American Professional Football Association). They share a distinction with the Chicago Bears of being the only two of 11 charter members still operating today. The Cardinals have played as the Morgan Athletic Club, the Normals, Racine Cardinals, Chicago Cardinals, St. Louis Cardinals, Phoenix Cardinals and Arizona Cardinals.

Billy Volek starts at quarterback instead of Steve McNair (back injury) ... Volek passes for 198 yards, one touchdown and one interception but departs the game in the fourth quarter with a concussion ... Matt Mauck finishes for the Titans at quarterback ... The Titans score the game's first 10 points, including a 38-yard touchdown reception by Brandon Jones, but the Cardinals answer with 20 consecutive points ... The Cardinals seal the victory with a 34-yard touchdown pass from Josh McCown to Larry Fitzgerald.

### 2009 Week 12 • Nov. 29, 2009 • Cardinals 17 at TITANS 20

The Titans cap a late 99-yard touchdown drive with a game-winning, 10-yard touchdown pass from Vince Young to Kenny Britt with no time remaining ... The Titans converted three times on fourth down on the game-winning drive ... Young passes for 387 yards, and Chris Johnson rushes for 154 yards, including an 85-yard touchdown ... Matt Leinart starts at quarterback for the Cardinals in place of an injured Kurt Warner.

### 2013 Week 15 • Dec. 15, 2013 • CARDINALS 37 at Titans 34 (OT)

Jay Feely's 41-yard field goal in overtime ends the Titans' comeback attempt ... The Titans score 17 points in the final four minutes of regulation to send the game to overtime ... Ryan Fitzpatrick passes for 402 yards and four touchdowns, while Kendall Wright catches 12 passes for 150 yards ... Michael Preston records two touchdown receptions ... Arizona cornerback Antoine Cason recovers a muffed kickoff and intercepts two passes, including one for a touchdown and one to set up the score in overtime ... Rashard Mendenhall rushes for a pair of touchdowns for the Cardinals.

### 2017 Week 14 • Dec. 10, 2017 • Titans 7 at CARDINALS 12

The Titans take a 7-0 lead after a six-yard touchdown run by Derrick Henry but are kept scoreless for the remainder of the game ... The Cardinals score 12 unanswered points in the second half on four field goals by Phil Dawson ... The Titans defense records eight sacks on Cardinals quarterback Blaine Gabbert ... A fake punt by the Titans (direct snap to Eric Weems) is stuffed for no gain by the Cardinals to set up one of Dawson's field goals ... Marcus Mariota is intercepted twice by the Cardinals.

### 2021 Week 1 • Sept. 12, 2021 • CARDINALS 38 at Titans 13

The Cardinals score the game's first 17 points ... Cardinals quarterback Kyler Murray passes for 289 yards and four touchdowns and rushes for another 20 yards and one touchdown ... Ryan Tannehill is sacked six times, including five sacks by Cardinals outside linebacker Chandler Jones, who also causes two fumbles ... The Cardinals force three turnovers and outgain the Titans 416 yards to 248 ... Derrick Henry is limited to 58 yards on 17 carries.



# TITANS-CARDINALS: THE LAST MEETING

2021 Week 1: Titans 13, Cardinals 38  
Sunday, Sept. 12, 2021 • 12:00 p.m. CT • Nissan Stadium



In Week 1 of the 2021 season, the Titans hosted Arizona for the third-ever matchup between the two clubs at Nissan Stadium. Tennessee fell 38-13 to the Cardinals in the team's home opener.

Arizona built a 10-point lead in the first quarter and never relinquished the advantage. First, Cardinals K **Matt Prater** converted a 34-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead. On the ensuing Tennessee possession, QB **Ryan Tannehill** was strip-sacked by Cardinals OLB **Chandler Jones** and the ball was recovered by Cardinals DL **Corey Peters** and returned to the Titans' one-yard line. Cardinals QB **Kyler Murray** eventually tossed a five-yard touchdown pass to Cardinals WR **DeAndre Hopkins**, as Arizona went ahead, 10-0.

In the second quarter, Murray connected with Hopkins for a 17-yard touchdown as the Cardinals extended the lead, 17-0. However, the Titans responded and got on the board with an 11-play, 75-yard scoring drive. Tannehill connected with WR **A.J. Brown** and TE **Anthony Firkser** for first-down receptions, and also tossed a 39-yard pass to WR **Chester Rogers** on a flea flicker playcall to move the sticks. Ultimately, Tannehill ran the ball into the end zone for a one-yard touchdown, but the extra point attempt failed, 17-6.

Before the first half concluded, Arizona found the end zone on a 12-play scoring drive that saw Murray toss first-down passes to Cardinals WRs **Rondale Moore** and **Christian Kirk**. The drive culminated in Murray running in a two-yard touchdown as Arizona took a 24-6 lead into halftime.

Tennessee opened up the second half by capitalizing on a turnover. S **Kevin Byard** intercepted Murray and returned the ball 12 yards to give the Titans possession at the Arizona 32-yard line. Tannehill tossed a 19-yard pass to Brown, which was followed by a 13-yard touchdown to Brown, as Tennessee cut the lead, 24-13.

Arizona replied on their following possession with a six-play scoring drive that included first-down catches by Moore and Hopkins. Ultimately, Murray connected with

Kirk for a 26-yard strike and a 31-13 Arizona advantage. Later in the third quarter, Tannehill was strip sacked by Jones and the ball was recovered by Cardinals LB **Markus Golden**. Arizona capitalized on the turnover as Murray linked up with Kirk for an 11-yard touchdown to make it 38-13. The Titans were unable to mount a comeback in their home opener and fell to the Cardinals by a score of 38-13 in their first loss of 2021.

**Jonathan Gannon** enters his third season as head coach of the Cardinals after two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator of the Philadelphia Eagles. In 2024, he helped Arizona double their win total from the year prior, finishing with eight wins despite facing one of the toughest schedules in the league (played nine games against 2024 playoff games).

Gannon boasts 17 years of experience in the NFL, spending time with the Indianapolis Colts (2018-20), Minnesota Vikings (2014-17), Titans (2012-13), St. Louis Rams (2009-11) and Atlanta Falcons (2007) in his career.

Since he took over, Gannon's Cardinals have been among the league's best at protecting the football and avoiding penalties, recording 12 games with no turnovers since 2023 and finishing the 2024 season with the second fewest penalties (92). Down the stretch in 2024, the Cardinals defense was stout, allowing 19.6 points per game after Week 7 and the fewest total touchdowns (20) and passing touchdowns (10) in the NFL during that span.

As the Eagles' defensive coordinator, Gannon helped Philadelphia to a league-high 99 sacks over his two seasons at the post, en-route to a Super Bowl berth in 2022. That season, the Eagles became the first team ever to have four different players record at least 10 sacks in the same season. During his tenure leading the Eagles defense (2021-22), the team ranked third in total defense (315.1 yards allowed per game), third in pass defense (200.4 yards allowed per game) and fourth in total return touchdowns (seven).

Under Gannon, multiple defenders reached career-bests. Outside linebacker **Haason Reddick** notched a career-high 16 sacks, safety **C.J. Gardner-Johnson** nabbed a personal best six interceptions and linebacker **T.J. Edwards** registered 159 tackles, the most for an Eagle since 1992.

LAST WEEK VS. THE TEXANS

Week 4: Titans 0, Texans 26  
Sunday Sept. 28, 2025 • 12:00 p.m. CDT • NRG Stadium



In Week 4 of the 2025 season, the Titans traveled to division rival Houston Texans and fell by a score of 26-0. It was the first time the team has been shut out since 2019.

The Titans started the game with the ball. QB Cam Ward connected with WR Elic Ayomanor for a 33-yard gain to bring the Titans to the Texans 28-yard line. However after two incomplete passes and a five-yard run by RB Tony Pollard the Titans were forced to settle for a 41-yard field goal attempt by K Joey Slye which was wide right and no good.

The Texans took over and constructed an 11-play, 40-yard drive that culminated in a field goal by K Ka'imi Fairbairn to take an early 3-0 lead with 4:49 left in the first.

Another Fairbairn field goal on the Texans next drive made it 6-0 with 13:28 left in the second quarter.

Later in the second quarter, DT Jeffery Simmons tackled RB Woody Marks for a one-yard loss and the OLB Arden Key took down QB C.J. Stroud for a six-yard sack to force a third-and-17 which the Texans did not convert.

The Titans took over at their own 23-yard line with 1:48 left in the half. Ward drove the Titans down to the Houston 29-yard line on four completions for 44 yards to four different pass catchers. But the drive halted and Slye was off-target on the 43-yard attempt to keep the score 6-0 heading into the half.

The Texans opened the second half with a missed field goal of their own.

Tennessee was forced to punt on their next possession and Houston took over at their own 18-yard line. Despite facing second-and-33 due to penalties, Stroud found WR Nico Collins for a 37-yard gain to extend the drive. The Texans stretched the lead on a 12-yard touchdown pass from Stroud to Marks to make it 12-0 after the two-point conversion failed.

Ward was intercepted on the next Titans drive and the Texans cashed that in for another touchdown just six plays later on a 24-yard pass from Stroud to WR Jayden Higgins to extend their lead 19-0 with 9:26 left in the game.

Facing fourth-and-one on their own 31-yard line, the Titans were unable to convert and the Texans took over. Houston took advantage of the field position. Marks extended the lead to 26-0 with an 18-yard touchdown run to cap off the victory for the Texans and drop the Titans to 0-4.

## NOTES FROM LAST WEEK'S GAME



## TEAM NOTES

- The Titans played their first of three consecutive road games. They will travel to play the Arizona Cardinals in Week 5 and then to the Las Vegas Raiders in Week 6.
- Eight rookies played in the game, including starts by quarterback **Cam Ward** and wide receivers **Elic Ayomanor** and **Chimere Dike**. It marked the third time in four games in 2025 that at least eight rookies have participated for the team.
- Two players made their team debut: tackle **Brandon Crenshaw-Dickson** (NFL debut) and linebacker **Curtis Jacobs**.
- The Titans allowed the Texans to score six points on a pair of field goals in the first half, marking the lowest first-half point total by a Titans opponent since the Titans shut out the Jaguars in the first half on Dec. 8, 2024. That was also the last time the Titans did not allow their opponents to score a touchdown in the first half.
- Seven players ended with at least five tackles: **Cedric Gray** (17), **Cody Barton** (nine), **Jeffery Simmons** (five), **Amani Hooker** (five), **Quandre Diggs** (five), **Jalyn Armour-Davis** (five) and **Roger McCreary** (five). The team finished with 74 combined tackles, their highest mark in a game this season.
- The Titans were penalized one time in the first half. It was the team's lowest penalty total in the first half since a zero-penalty first half against Green Bay on Sept. 22, 2024.
- The Titans were penalized four times in the game, representing their fewest penalties through the first four games of 2025.

## WR ELIC AYOMANOR

- Recorded a team-high 44 receiving yards on a pair of receptions.
- Hauled in a 33-yard pass in the first quarter. It was his longest career reception to date.
- Became the team's first player with at least two receptions in each of the first four games of his rookie season since **Tajae Sharpe** (first five games) in 2016.
- Joined Carolina's **Tetairoa McMillan** and Tampa Bay's **Emeka Egbuka** as the NFL's only rookie wide receivers with at least two receptions in every game in 2025.
- Became the team's fourth player since 1999 with 12 or more receptions in the team's first four games of his rookie season, joining **Kendall Wright** (18 in 2012), **Kenny Britt** (17 in 2009) and **Tajae Sharpe** (16 in 2016).

## CB JALYN ARMOUR-DAVIS

- Made five tackles, tying his career-best.

## LB CODY BARTON

- Registered nine tackles.

- Logged his 21st career game with nine or more tackles.

## S QUANDRE DIGGS

- Started and recorded five tackles and a pass defended.

## WR CHIMERE DIKE

- Returned six kickoffs for a 23.5-yard average (long of 29).
- Became the NFL's first rookie since **Chad Morton** of the New Orleans Saints in 2000 with at least four kickoff returns in each of the first four games of his rookie season.

## LB CEDRIC GRAY

- Collected 17 tackles – a career-high, the most for a Titans defender this season, and the most tackles for a Titans defender since **Daryl Worley** had 17 at Washington on Dec. 1, 2024. Gray's previous career-high was 11 tackles at Indianapolis on Dec. 22, 2024.
- His 17 tackles tied for the highest figure by a Titans player since 2020 (Worley). It was the 11th time since 2000 (press box statistics) in which a Titans defender registered 15 or more tackles in a game.
- Through the early slate of games in Week 4, Gray's 17 stops at Houston were the most of any defender in the NFL during a single game in the 2025 season. The last NFL player to register 17 tackles in a game was Philadelphia's **Oren Burks** on Jan. 5, 2025.
- Added a tackle for loss and a quarterback hit.

## CB MARCUS HARRIS

- Registered two special teams tackles on punt coverage.

## P JOHNNY HEKKER

- Averaged 42.6 gross yards and 39.6 net yards on five punts with two punts placed inside the 20.

## S AMANI HOOKER

- Registered five tackles.

## LB CURTIS JACOBS

- Made his Titans debut.

## DE SEBASTIAN JOSEPH-DAY

- Recorded four tackles and a quarterback hit.

## OLB ARDEN KEY

- Notched his first sack of the season in the second quarter, taking down C.J. Stroud to force a third-and-17. It was his first sack since Dec. 1, 2024 at Washington.
- Added two tackles and a quarterback hit.

## RB TONY POLLARD

- Led the team with 64 rushing yards on 14 carries and added a team-high three receptions for 12 yards.
- Rushed for a 21-yard gain in the second quarter. It was his longest run since a 21-yarder against Jacksonville on Dec. 8, 2024.
- Tallied his third game in 2025 with at least 76 scrimmage yards.

## WR CALVIN RIDLEY

- Totaled 30 yards on a pair of receptions.
- Converted a third-and-six with a 22-yard catch in the second quarter.
- Registered his 23rd reception of 20-plus yards since the start of the 2024 season. Through the early afternoon games of September 28, his total tied for third in the NFL.



## NOTES FROM LAST WEEK'S GAME

### DT JEFFERY SIMMONS

- Produced five tackles, one sack, four tackles for loss and four quarterback pressures.
- Logged his second sack of the season (33.5 career) in the first quarter, dropping C.J. Stroud for a loss of three yards. It was his fifth career sack against the Texans, his highest career total against any opponent.
- Became the only Titans player with at least four tackles for loss in a game since the beginning of the 2008 season.
- His four tackles for loss were a career-best. He joined three other NFL players in 2025 to record four or more tackles for loss in a single game: **Tuli Tuipulotu** (five on Sept. 28), **Myles Garrett** (four on Sept. 7) and **Derwin James Jr.** (four on Sept. 21). He joined the same four players as the only players in 2025 with five tackles, four tackles for loss and a sack in a game.
- According to NFL NextGenStats, Simmons sacked Stroud 2.09 seconds after the ball was snapped, the fastest sack in the NFL since the beginning of the 2024 season. His get-off time was recorded at 0.32 seconds, the fastest time by a defensive tackle in 2025.

### HEAD COACH BRIAN CALLAHAN

#### *Opening Statement:*

Obviously, disappointed in the result of that game. We didn't really do anything well enough. You miss two field goals, and you are in a potential 6-6 ball game. We couldn't get much momentum on offense. We couldn't possess the ball, put our defense in some tough spots down the stretch and didn't answer in those spots, either. So all the way around, not good enough.

#### *On why they decided not to take shots to the end zone in situations before the end of the first half*

Yeah, we hadn't really completed much down the field at that point and it was a third-and-12 and a pass rush is ripping and they're 30-something yards from the end zone. Those aren't really high percentage style throws or plays, so that's usually what the reason is. We didn't earn a right to take a shot to the end zone. It's third and 12, so you try to be smart and not put the quarterback in harm's way and kick the field goal.

#### *On why not a shot for a first down instead of shot at the end zone instead*

Yeah, it is what it is, and those are the calls we make.

#### *On if this is an accurate reflection of the coaching staff when you continuously come up short*

I mean, I think it's a reflection of all of us not doing anything well enough at this point. That's players, that's coaches, that's everybody. We haven't found a way to win a game in a while, and I think that reflects on all of us.

#### *On his thoughts on what the issue was*

Hard to say. Hard to find a rhythm. I thought we ran the ball okay in spots. Still ended up getting in some long yardage, things that were hard for us to overcome. We couldn't possess the ball. That was the hard part. We couldn't really take control of the offensive rhythm. We missed some throws. I think Cam's (Ward) doing some good things but he had some tough moments in this game. That's still a really good defense, you know? And we didn't play well enough against them.

#### *On why they were not able to get the Texans offense off the field*

Yeah, you can't give up those plays in those spots. You're playing way behind the sticks. That should be advantage defense and then you got to make those plays and you can't give those up. You can't give up a second-and-23 for a first down. You got them backed up. You got them where you want them. You earned that spot and then to give that up was disappointing. So you get them in spots like that and give up big plays, that's not going to win many football games for you.

#### *On if the team showed him fight today*

Oh, yeah. They fought. Not playing well and not fighting are two different things. We didn't play well enough, but I don't think I would question the way those guys went and played the game. They fought their tails off for the entirety of the

game, so you guys can make whatever conjecture you want, but I don't see any effort issues in terms of how they're playing the game. We're not playing it well enough, that's certainly part of it, but they went out and played hard today. I don't have any qualms about how they came out and played.

#### *On L'Jarius Sneed's play*

Yeah, those are the - when you talk, you got to back it up. Didn't do that today. That's a decision a guy makes and he's got to live with that, too. That's on them. They want to talk, then you got to back it up and didn't do a good enough job of that today. That happens and that's a personal thing for some guys.

#### *On what the frustration is like and how to keep that from overwhelming the team*

Like I said before, there's nobody that puts more pressure and eats more frustration than I do on where we're at. I don't need any help with that usually. I put enough of it on myself, so we just got to turn around and keep fighting. There's nobody who comes in to save you. All we got is the guys that are in there and we got to keep trying to find a way to get better and play better football.

#### *On how it went with Bo Hardegree calling plays*

Yeah, operationally, it was solid. I think we didn't have any real issues with calls getting in or issues on the play collect or anything like that. But ultimately when you score zero points, that's not good enough.

#### *On if he is concerned at all about just the whole situation of the coaching staff and their status after this game*

No. No. Again, like I said before, I show up and do my job and we do it as hard as we can. We work our tails off and we try to do everything we can to put ourselves in a position to win and we haven't. That's just the reality of our jobs in the league. So, no, I don't think about it.

#### *On what is keeping him in a good mindset despite the losses*

What keeps me there is the guys in the locker room and the coaches and the coaching staff. My job is to try to lead and leading is hard. It's hard right now but that's my job. My job is to try to continue to fight and continue to help wherever I can help and to continue to keep pushing our guys to keep getting better. That's the only thing you can do when you're in a spot like this is just keep coming out, keep swinging. None of it's been good enough. We all know that. That's something that you just got to keep fighting through and you have to find a way to break through at some point.

#### *On if he thinks that mindset has stuck*

I'm just going to compose myself here before I say something I regret but, yes, I think this team is resilient. I think it is relentless. We haven't played good enough football and I think those are two very distinct, different things. We have to execute at a better level. We have to coach better. That's really all I can say.

#### *On what is it that makes him believe the team is resilient and will continue to fight*

All I know is what I see every day. They show up. They work. We work in practice.



## SELECT TITANS POSTGAME QUOTES

I did not anticipate a result like that coming up in a game. The attitude, the energy, the things they do during the week, there's nothing that would point to that there's any kind of lack of those things and we fought our tails off in the game and, again, we're not playing well enough. We're not executing things at a high enough level to win. It's certainly not for lack of intent and lack of effort and lack of focus. We're trying to do all the things we need to do to win a football game. Everything during the week, the guy's work. There are no ifs, ands, or buts about it. We had one of our best Thursday practices of the week so it's hard to stomach that when you practice the way we practice, and you show up in a game that looks like that.

#### ***On what this weekend has been like for him coming back home***

Honestly, I'm just trying to get a football win. That's it.

#### ***On how he feels about his performance today***

Ass.

#### ***On anything in particular that went wrong for him today.***

Getting stuck past the 50 [yard line]. Interceptions, incompletions, penalties, not helping the defense out. Just not good enough to win.

#### ***On if today's homecoming is ruined***

No, that doesn't ruin anything for me. They see me a lot in the offseason. They're just trying to come show their support and really just try to be there for me. Just trying to get the ball rolling.

#### ***On if there was anything the Texans were doing in particular to cause today's outcome***

Not really. They did everything they showed on film. The biggest switch up they had when they went more cover two on third down. They showed everything they did on film. A good defensive line, a good back end. We just didn't play well enough.

#### ***On his interception pass that looked like he left his feet and went sidearm***

No matter if I throw off platform or sidearm, I just have to be more accurate with the football. I wasn't accurate enough, he was coming in, I threw it on his backside shoulder. I can't do that. I know he'll make that play for me next time, but I shouldn't have put him in that situation.

#### ***On his feelings regarding if he had any accuracy problems***

Not really. Some of them got to be throwaways in some situations. Some of them were just me not putting the ball where it needs to go.

#### ***On what's not going right with this offense***

Everything, from interception to penalty to an incompleteness by me, a bad ball. Once we passed the 50, we're just not extending the drive. So if we are keeping it a buck right now, we ass. We're 0-4. At this point, we have nothing to lose. We dropped a quarter of our games and we've yet to do anything yet. We have to lock in, especially myself. Offensive line from the defensive line from the special teams to all three phases, we have to play together. We have not played together this year yet and that's just something that we want to preach about it every day, every day, we got to do better, and we're doing that, but it has to show up on Sundays. It hasn't showed up yet, but it's got to show up next week.

#### ***On if he challenges guys in the locker room to get better week to week***

Yeah, we all challenge each other. I challenge those guys, they challenge me every day, especially in practice. If it looks good in practice, it's not looking good right now on Sundays. We got to make it look good in practice and on Sundays. So no matter how many good weeks of practice we have, we have to have a good game on Sunday. Four weeks straight, we ain't did it offensively. At some point we have to help the defense out. We're down 6-0 halftime, end up getting the ball back, we're still down 19-0. They give up a touchdown. We're still in the ball game and we're not helping the defense out. So we're not doing enough offense.

#### ***On is this the most frustrating period he can recall football-wise***

I would say no. I had a lot of frustrations in my past, whether it was high school to college, but I just want to win. When's the last time Tennessee won? I don't know. I'm trying to win. Everybody in this locker room, we want to win and we have to win. That's really what it comes down to. No matter how we got to do it. At some point, we have to turn the tide and we have to start winning games.

#### ***On is there something he could bring from whatever those more frustrating moments were to this and apply it to move forward for himself personally***

Really just continue to have urgency, and that's everybody. Especially myself. As a whole, the offense. That's the biggest problem right now in my head. We're not helping the defense out and whether defense gives up a touchdown here or there, we're still not doing enough to help those guys out. They're playing their ass off for us every Sunday and we're not doing our part. It all comes down to us locking in. From myself having bad incompletions to not taking completions to not getting the ball out, from us having a penalty or if it's a drop on receiver, everybody knows. Everybody's got their one job and everybody's got to do their one of eleven. We just got to go get it.

#### ***On what he is seeing when looking at film from the last three games that is not being done from an execution standpoint***

I would say, honestly, just not being consistent. That falls into the execution standpoint and whether I have a bad ball, whether I need to throw it away but also the biggest thing is every time we get in a long situation or get back on track situation, the drive always ends. NFL is hard to play on second-and-long. It's hard to play on third-and-long. That's the biggest thing. We have to execute plays every play. It can't just be if we get a big run or a big pass or a spurt. We got to just be consistent.

#### ***On what is it about the coaching staff that's maintaining your faith***

It's nothing about the coaching staff. At the end of the day, they put together a good plan for us. We're not executing as players. Offensively, like, we just have to make the plays. At the end of the day, every pass concept is winnable verse man or zone. No matter what they got to. I got to get through the progression. I got to put the ball in the receiver's hands. At the end of the day, they got to make plays, too.

#### ***On what gives him the confidence that the plan is good or the plan will work when he hasn't felt or seen the results yet***

Because it's there. I'm watching the film on the sideline. It's there. It's just whether it's a bad play by me or a bad play by one of the eleven, it's just not clicking when it needs to click. It has to click every drive and it's not doing that yet. The biggest thing is the urgency. I think up front, those guys, they were gritty today. The run game and the pass game, they went against a good defensive line up there. From an offense standpoint, we just have to be consistent. It's four games and we're 0-4. Why? Because we're inconsistent.

#### ***On if he feels he you needs to assert his leadership even more on this team given the circumstances and where the team is?***

I don't think that. I always assert it when I think the time is necessary, but we're not doing our job as a unit. We're not doing our job and at some point it's got to change. I hope it changes next week. We're going to try to change it next week, but that needs to be the message. We have to change it one play at a time. If it doesn't change, we're just going to keep on getting these same results. We have to win games.





# 2025 TITANS SCHEDULE NOTES

## SEASON NOTES

- **PLAYOFF OPPONENTS:** The Titans have six total games against five playoff teams from last season. They have home games against Kansas City, Houston, Los Angeles Chargers and Los Angeles Rams and road contests at Houston and Denver. Four of those six games are against 2024 division winners: Houston twice (AFC South), Kansas City (AFC West) and the Los Angeles Rams (NFC West). The six games against reigning playoff clubs matches the total from last year. Prior to the 2024 season, the last time the Titans had six or fewer games against reigning playoff clubs was the 2020 campaign when they had five such games.
- **TV BREAKDOWN:** Excluding their Week 18 matchup with the Jaguars, which has yet to be assigned a broadcasting network, the Titans are currently scheduled for 10 games on CBS and six games on FOX. Due to the NFL's flex scheduling, some contests could be moved to a different network from the one appearing on the initial schedule.
- **TOP DRAFT PICKS:** The Titans selected Cameron Ward with this year's first overall pick. The team will face four of the next five selected players from the draft in Travis Hunter (second overall – Jacksonville), Will Campbell (fourth overall - New England Patriots), Mason Graham (fifth overall – Cleveland) and Ashton Jeanty (sixth overall - Las Vegas).
- **HEAD COACHING EXPERIENCE:** There are seven NFL head coaches who were hired by their teams this offseason, and the Titans will face four of them: New Orleans' Kellen Moore, Jacksonville's Liam Coen, Las Vegas' Pete Carroll and New England's Mike Vrabel. The Titans will also face off against two of the top five longest tenured coaches: Kansas City's Andy Reid (third-longest tenure – 13 years) and the Los Angeles Rams' Sean McVay (fifth-longest tenure – nine years).
- **THREE GAMES BASED UPON 2024 FINISH:** Every NFL team has two intraconference games and one interconference matchup based on the previous year's standings. As a result of the Titans' fourth-place AFC South finish in 2024, they host the AFC East's fourth-place New England Patriots and the NFC South's fourth-place New Orleans Saints, and they visit the AFC North's fourth-place Cleveland Browns. Overall, the Titans' strength of schedule is .450 (130-159) based upon their opponents' combined 2024 record, the 29th most difficult schedule out of 32 NFL teams.
- **TIME (ZONE) TRAVEL:** The Titans will play in every continental United States time zone at least twice during the 2025 regular season. They will stay in the Central time zone for 10 matchups, including every home contest as well as at Houston. The Titans have three trips to the Eastern time zone (at Cleveland, at Jacksonville and at Indianapolis). The farthest they will travel is Santa Clara, Calif., to face the 49ers (Pacific time zone). Tennessee will visit Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas for the first time to face the Raiders on the franchise's first trip to the state of Nevada. Other road trips include Glendale, Ariz., to meet the Cardinals and Denver, Colo., to face the Broncos (both in the Mountain time zone). This is the first time since 2019 in which the team will play in every continental U.S. time zone.
- **ORIGINAL AFL TEAMS:** This season, the Titans will face off against five of the other seven original AFL teams: Kansas City Chiefs (formerly Dallas Texans), New England Patriots (Boston Patriots), Los Angeles Chargers, Las Vegas Raiders (Oakland Raiders) and Denver Broncos.

## WEEK-BY-WEEK NOTES

- **WEEK 3 (H) & WEEK 8 (A) vs. INDIANAPOLIS COLTS:** The Titans look to end the Colts' four-game winning streak in the rivalry. Prior to the Colts' streak, the Titans won five consecutive matchups in the series from 2020-22. Colts third-year head coach Shane Steichen served as the offensive coordinator of the Philadelphia Eagles at the same time that Titans defensive coordinator Dennard Wilson was on the Eagles staff as defensive backs coach (2021) and defensive backs coach/defensive passing game coordinator (2022), culminating with Philadelphia's appearance in Super Bowl LVII.
- **WEEK 4 (A) & WEEK 11 (H) vs. HOUSTON TEXANS:** The reigning AFC South champion Texans have won the division the last two years. The two teams have split the season series in six of the last eight

years, including last year when the Titans captured a 32-27 victory at Houston in November before falling at home in the season finale, 23-14. The Titans have a slight advantage in the series, leading 24-22 in 46 matchups since 2002. The Texans offense will feature first-time offensive coordinator Nick Caley calling plays for third-year quarterback CJ Stroud.

- **WEEK 5 at ARIZONA CARDINALS:** The Cardinals and Titans meet for the first time since 2021 and for the 12th time in history. Arizona holds an 8-4 lead over the Titans in the series. With only 12 games between the two franchises, the Cardinals rank as the second-least frequent opponent in Titans/Oilers history (Carolina Panthers, seven total meetings). This will be the Titans' first visit to Phoenix since the 2017 season and only the second visit to State Farm Stadium, which originally opened in 2006. The Titans look to snap a three-game losing streak against the Cardinals.
- **WEEK 6 at LAS VEGAS RAIDERS:** In a clash between two of the original members of the American Football League, the Titans trek to Nevada for the first time in franchise history when they take on the Las Vegas Raiders at Allegiant Stadium. The last time Tennessee traveled to face the Raiders was 2019, the franchise's final season in Oakland before it relocated to Las Vegas in 2020. Tennessee put up 21 unanswered points in the second half to defeat the Raiders 42-21. The Raiders hold a 30-22 advantage in the all-time series, including wins in all four postseason meetings. The Titans have won the last two meetings, most recently a 24-22 win in September of 2022 at Nissan Stadium in Nashville.
- **WEEK 7 vs. NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS:** The Titans will host New England for the first time since Mike Vrabel became New England's head coach after spending six seasons (2018-23) at the Titans helm. The Titans hosted the Patriots last season and won 20-17. Outside linebacker Harold Landry III signed with the Patriots during the 2025 offseason after spending his first seven NFL seasons with the Titans and rising to eighth in franchise history in career sacks (50.5). In addition to Vrabel, the Patriots staff includes several other former Titans coaches, including current Patriots defensive coordinator Terrell Williams.
- **WEEK 9 vs. LOS ANGELES CHARGERS:** The Titans and Chargers meet for the fourth consecutive season. Most recently, the Chargers captured a 27-17 victory when the Titans traveled to SoFi Stadium in 2024. The last time the Titans hosted the Chargers, Tennessee won 27-24 in overtime on Sept. 17, 2023. The Titans have won the last three matchups at Nissan Stadium dating back to 2013. The rivalry dates back to the inaugural 1960 AFL season, with the Chargers owning a 30-19-1 lead in the series. The two franchises met in the first two AFL Championship games (1960-61), with the Houston Oilers capturing the title on both occasions.
- **WEEK 10 (BYE):** The Week 10 bye comes five weeks later than the Week 5 bye the Titans had in 2024. Week 10 marks the latest bye the Titans have had since the 2021 season, when their bye was Week 13.
- **WEEK 12 vs. SEATTLE SEAHAWKS:** Two second-year head coaches meet for the first time in the regular season when Seattle's Mike Macdonald and Tennessee's Brian Callahan lead their teams. The clubs held joint practices and played a preseason game in Nashville during the 2024 preseason. Seattle pulled out a 20-17 victory during their last visit to Nissan Stadium on Christmas Eve in 2023. The only postseason matchup between the franchises came in the 1988 Wild Card round when the Oilers defeated the Seahawks 23-20 in overtime. This year's game could feature two newly-acquired quarterbacks with Tennessee's Cameron Ward, taken with the first overall draft pick in 2025, and Seattle's Sam Darnold, the 2025 unrestricted free agent addition for the Seahawks and former number three overall selection in 2018.
- **WEEK 13 (H) & WEEK 18 (A) vs. JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS:** The annual Titans-Jaguars series heads into its 31st season since the Jaguars' inaugural 1995 campaign. This year, the contest could feature the top two draft picks of the 2025 class: Titans quarterback Cameron Ward and wide receiver/cornerback Travis Hunter, who the Jaguars drafted with the second-overall pick after trading up. The Titans, who lead the all-time series 35-26 (including postseason), look to regain the momentum in the series after being swept by the Jaguars in 2024.



- **WEEK 14 at CLEVELAND BROWNS:** The Titans travel to Cleveland to face the Browns in the 70th meeting between the teams, including the postseason. The Browns hold a 37-32 lead in the all-time series, winning the most recent matchup 27-3 when Tennessee last visited Huntington Bank Field in September 2023. The only playoff game between the two teams came in the Wild Card round of the 1988 postseason, with the Oilers pulling out a 24-23 victory on the road in Cleveland.
- **WEEK 15 at SAN FRANCISCO 49ERS:** The Titans travel to Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara, Calif., for the second time in the venue's history and the first time since 2017. The teams last met in 2021 for a 20-17 Titans win on a Thursday night at Nissan Stadium in Nashville. The 49ers hold a 9-6 lead in the all-time series. Quarterback Brock Purdy enters his fourth NFL season with the 49ers, who are also led by the 2023 AP Offensive Player of the Year, running back Christian McCaffrey.

- **WEEK 16 vs. KANSAS CITY CHIEFS:** The Titans host the Kansas City Chiefs for the first time since 2021, when the Titans won by a final score of 27-3. The series between two original AFL rivals dates back to 1960, with the Chiefs holding a 28-24 edge in the series. Titans first-year general manager Mike Borgonzi spent the past 16 years with the Chiefs organization, most recently serving as Kansas City's assistant general manager.
- **WEEK 17 vs. NEW ORLEANS SAINTS:** The Titans will host the Saints and first-year head coach Kellen Moore when New Orleans travels to Nashville for the first time since 2021. The last two meetings between the two teams have been decided by a total of three points, with the Saints winning 16-15 in the 2023 season opener at the Caesars Superdome and the Titans winning 23-21 in November 2021 at Nissan Stadium. The Titans hold a 9-7-1 record in the all-time series.

### WHAT TO LOOK FOR – TEAM

- The Titans franchise (496 all-time wins) needs four wins to reach 500 all-time wins, including the regular season and postseason.

### LS MORGAN COX

- Enters 2025 ranked sixth in the NFL in career games played among active players (233 entering 2025).
- By appearing in all 17 contests in 2025, he will reach 250 career games. Prior to 2025, 56 players have reached the mark during the Super Bowl era (1966–present).

### P JOHNNY HEKKER

- Needs 37 punts in 2025 to reach 1,000 for his career (963 entering 2025). He would join 26 other players who reached the mark prior to 2025.
- Can record his 11th career season with a net punting average of at least 42.0 yards. His 10 such seasons entering 2025 are more than any other NFL player.

### S AMANI HOOKER

- Needs three interceptions (12 entering 2025) to become the seventh player in the franchise's "Titans era" (1999–present) to reach 15 career interceptions.

### OLB ARDEN KEY

- Can record his third consecutive season with at least six sacks since joining the team in 2023.

### WR TYLER LOCKETT

- Enters 2025 as one of five NFL players with at least 500 receiving yards in each of the past 10 seasons, along with **DeAndre Hopkins**, **Amari Cooper**, **Mike Evans** and **Travis Kelce**.
- Needs 39 receptions (661 entering 2025) to reach 700 for his career.
- Needs 406 receiving yards (8,594 entering 2025) to reach 9,000 for his career.

### TE CHIG OKONKWO

- Can join **Frank Wycheck** (six consecutive seasons) and **Delanie Walker** (five) as the only tight ends in franchise history to record at least 50 receptions in three consecutive seasons.
- Can join **Frank Wycheck** (seven consecutive seasons) and **Delanie Walker** (five) as the only tight ends in franchise history to record at least 450 receiving yards in four consecutive seasons.
- Can become the franchise's fourth player to begin his NFL career with four consecutive seasons in which he posted at least 30 receptions and 400 receiving yards. He would join **Ernest Givins** (nine straight seasons), **Charlie Hennigan** (six) and **Kendall Wright** (four). Okonkwo already became the first franchise tight end to do so in the first three seasons of his career.

### RB TONY POLLARD

- Needs 300 rushing yards in 2025 to reach 5,000 for his career (4,700 rushing yards entering 2025).
- Can notch his fourth consecutive season with at least 1,000 rushing yards.

- Looks to extend his streak to five consecutive seasons with at least 1,000 scrimmage yards.
- Joins **Derrick Henry** as the NFL's only players entering 2025 holding an active streak of three consecutive seasons with at least 1,300 scrimmage yards.

### WR CALVIN RIDLEY

- Needs 625 receiving yards to reach 6,000 for his career (5,375 entering 2025).
- Needs 12 receptions in 2025 to reach 400 for his career (388 entering 2025).
- Can record his third consecutive 1,000-yard receiving season and the fourth such total season of his career.

### DT JEFFERY SIMMONS

- Can record his fifth consecutive season with at least five sacks. He would join **Ray Childress** (nine consecutive seasons), **Jurrell Casey** (seven), **William Fuller** (six) and **Sean Jones** (six) as the only Titans/Oilers players to do so since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982.
- Needs 8.5 sacks (31.5 entering 2025) to become the 12th player in franchise history to reach 40 career sacks.

### CB L'JARIUS SNEED

- Can record his fifth career season with at least two interceptions.

### G KEVIN ZEITLER

- Needs two appearances in 2025 to reach 200 career games (198 games entering 2025) and three starts to reach 200 career starts (197 entering 2025).
- Can record his 11th consecutive season with at least 15 starts.

**Chad Brinker** serves as president of football operations for the Titans. He joined the Titans in 2023 as assistant general manager before being promoted to his current position in 2024. In his role, Brinker provides executive leadership and direct oversight for the entire football staff, reporting directly to Titans controlling owner **Amy Adams Strunk**.

Since his arrival in Tennessee, Brinker's progressive approach has led to several initiatives aimed at moving the organization forward. He spearheaded the club's extensive search for a new general manager in 2025, resulting in the hiring of **Mike Borgonzi**. Brinker was also a pillar in the team's comprehensive search for head coach **Brian Callahan** in 2024. Additionally, he reshaped and refined the foundation of the team's analytics department from the ground up, while building and executing the 2024 and 2025 offseason strategies for player acquisitions in both free agency and the draft.

An NFL personnel veteran, Brinker embodies core strengths focused in executive leadership, strategic operations, financial analysis, and talent evaluation. His dual background in football operations merged with a business acumen gained from an MBA at Northwestern University's Kellogg School of Management further developed his skills as a team builder and strategic leader both on and off the field.

Prior to joining the Titans, Brinker spent 13 years with the Green Bay Packers in a variety of roles as a talent evaluator and strategic counselor to Packers leadership. In his initial season with the Packers, he collected his first Super Bowl championship when the team defeated the Pittsburgh Steelers in Super Bowl XLV.

Throughout his experience with the Packers, he served as a pro and college scout; led strategy for unrestricted free agency and undrafted free agent processes; handled player contracts, salary cap administration, and roster management; and advised the general manager and executive vice president of football operations on team needs in free agency and drafts, always with an eye on long-term vision. The Packers won the NFC North Division eight times and drafted 13 Pro Bowl Players during his tenure.

Brinker also owns corporate business experience with two Fortune 100 companies in the pharmaceutical and medical device industries. He serves as an executive council member on the Freed-Hardeman University President's Council and has shared his expertise as a guest lecturer in the Sports Marketing program at Freed-Hardeman and the Sports Administration program at his alma mater, Ohio University.

A native of Martins Ferry, Ohio, Brinker first entered the NFL in 2003 as an undrafted free agent running back with the New York Jets. He holds two degrees from Ohio University, including a master's degree in sports administration, where he was a two-sport athlete and a two-time All-Mid-American Conference selection at running back. He was also selected as Ohio University's Male Athlete of the Year in 2003.

Brinker and his wife, Rachelle, have three children. In addition to prioritizing time with his family, he enjoys reading, teaching, traveling, and spending time outdoors.

**Mike Borgonzi** was named the 15th general manager in franchise history on Jan. 17, 2025.

Borgonzi arrived in Tennessee with 16 years of experience with the Kansas City Chiefs. For the last four seasons, he served as Kansas City's assistant general manager.

"Mike's experience speaks for itself: he has been part of the core team that delivered five AFC championships and three Super Bowls over the past six seasons," said Titans Controlling Owner **Amy Adams Strunk**. "It's the type of standard I want to build here in Tennessee. I know we have a lot of work ahead of us, and I'm excited for Mike to get started."

"During Mike's 16 years in the league, he has been a key part of transforming the Chiefs from a two-win team to a three-time Super Bowl champion," said Titans President of Football Operations **Chad Brinker**. "During our meetings, he articulated a clear plan to build a championship standard in Nashville through consistency, discipline, and hard work. I've admired him for many years and I'm thrilled to add him to the team as our general manager."

In Borgonzi's first offseason in Tennessee, the Titans acquired several veteran free agents. Among the most notable signings were tackle **Dan Moore Jr.** (previously with Pittsburgh); guard **Kevin Zeitler** (Detroit); linebacker **Cody Barton** (Denver); outside linebacker **Dre'Mont Jones** (Seattle); wide receivers **Van Jefferson** (Pittsburgh) and **Tyler Lockett** (Seattle); safety **Xavier Woods** (Carolina); punter **Johnny Hekker** (Carolina); and kicker **Joey Slye** (New England).

In April, Borgonzi led the process that concluded with the selection of Miami (Fla.) quarterback **Cam Ward** with the first overall pick in the 2025 NFL Draft. The team's nine total draft choices also included UCLA outside linebacker **Oluwafemi Oladejo** (second round), Penn State safety **Kevin Winston Jr.** (third round), Florida wide receiver **Chimere Dike** (fourth round), Texas tight end **Gunnar Helm** (fourth round), Stanford wide receiver **Elic Ayomanor** (fourth round), Sacramento State offensive lineman **Jackson Slater** (fifth round), California cornerback **Marcus Harris** (sixth round) and Michigan running back **Kalel Mullings** (sixth round).

During Borgonzi's time in Kansas City, he contributed to 12 playoff seasons (2010, 2013, 2015-24) and 10 AFC West titles (2010, 2016-24). Borgonzi helped construct a roster that won the AFC five times (2019-20, 2022-24) and captured three Super Bowl championships (2019, 2022-23) over a six-season span.

From 2017 to 2024, Borgonzi worked under Chiefs general manager **Brett Veach**. As the assistant general manager from 2021 through 2024, he supervised and directed the college and professional scouting operations while closely supporting and advising Veach with the club's roster management and player acquisition via the NFL Draft, free agency, waiver claims and trades. During his four seasons as assistant general manager, the Chiefs built a league-best 52-16 regular-season record (.765). In the same four-year span, 10 different Kansas City players earned a combined 23 Pro Bowl selections: tackle **Orlando Brown Jr.** (2021-22), wide receiver **Tyreek Hill** (2021), center **Creed Humphrey** (2022-24), defensive tackle **Chris Jones** (2021-24), tight end **Travis Kelce** (2021-24), quarterback **Patrick Mahomes** (2021-23), safety **Tyrann Mathieu** (2021), guard **Trey Smith** (2024), guard **Joe Thuney** (2022-24) and punter **Tommy Townsend** (2022).

The Chiefs entered the 2024 postseason after capturing their ninth consecutive AFC West crown. They tied the Detroit Lions for the NFL's best record at 15-2, setting a franchise record for wins in a regular season and securing the AFC's top seed. Twenty original Chiefs draft picks started at least six games for the team during the 2024 regular season. Kansas City had five players voted to the Pro Bowl, marking the seventh consecutive year in which it had at least five players earn the honor.

Prior to his promotion to assistant general manager, Borgonzi served as director of football operations (2018-20), director of player personnel (2017), co-director of player personnel (2015-16), assistant director of pro scouting (2013-14), pro personnel scout (2011-12) and manager of football operations (2010). He joined the Chiefs in 2009 as the club's college scouting administrator.

Before landing in the NFL with the Chiefs, Borgonzi spent the 2007 and 2008 seasons at Boston College, where he was the assistant recruiting coordinator. He also coached tight ends at Amherst College in 2002 before working in the financial sector in Boston for several years.

A native of Everett, Mass., Borgonzi graduated from Brown University, where he was a four-year starter at fullback and was a three-time All-Ivy League selection.

He and his wife, Jill, have a son, Joseph, and a daughter, Nina. His brother, Dave, has served as the linebackers coach for the Indianapolis Colts and Chicago Bears and currently serves as the linebackers coach for the Dallas Cowboys.

# HEAD COACH BRIAN CALLAHAN

**Brian Callahan** was named head coach of the Titans on Jan. 24, 2024, becoming the 20th head coach in franchise history.

During his first season as head coach, Callahan guided a team that underwent significant personnel changes. In Week 1, 11 players started for the team who were added during the offseason—five players on offense and six on defense. Two of those players on offense, running back **Tony Pollard** (1,079 rushing yards) and wide receiver **Calvin Ridley** (1,017 receiving yards), went on to produce 1,000-yard seasons rushing and receiving, respectively.

All seven members of the Titans' 2024 draft class saw action in at least seven games as rookies. First-rounder **JC Latham** was the NFL's only rookie in 2024 to start 17 games at left tackle, while second-rounder **T'Vondre Sweat** appeared in every game and led all rookie defensive linemen in defensive snaps (667). Fifth-round cornerback **Jarvis Brownlee Jr.** was one of five NFL rookie defensive backs to start at least 14 games in 2024.

Defensively, the Titans finished Callahan's first season ranked second overall (311.2 opponent yards per game) and second in passing defense (177.3) despite a unit that suffered significant injuries. The starting secondary of safety **Quandre Diggs** (eight games played), safety **Amani Hooker** (14 games played), cornerback **L'Jarius Sneed** (five games played) and cornerback **Chidobe Awuzie** (eight games played) missed a combined total of 33 games.

Callahan, who at age 40 became the second-youngest head coach in Titans/Oilers history behind **Jeff Fisher** (36), arrived in Tennessee with 18 years of coaching experience and 14 years of NFL coaching experience, including the previous five seasons as the offensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals.

During his time in Cincinnati, Callahan served under head coach **Zac Taylor** and was part of two AFC North titles, two AFC Championship appearances and a Super Bowl berth. He also helped guide quarterback **Joe Burrow** from the No. 1 overall draft pick in 2020 to multiple single-

season franchise records by his second year and Pro Bowl honors within three years.

Over Callahan's final three seasons in Cincinnati (2021-23), the Bengals offense ranked in the NFL's top 10 in several categories: sixth in scoring (24.9), seventh in passing (250.8 yards per game), seventh in red-zone efficiency (61.5 percent), 10th in third-down percentage (41.0) and sixth in time of possession (31:00).

From the time Burrow entered the NFL in 2020 through the 2023 campaign, he recorded the league's seventh-best passer rating (98.6) and tied for the third-best completion percentage (68.0). His 270.8 passing yards per game in that period ranked fifth.

Additionally, Cincinnati's offense under Callahan featured a trio of 1,000-yard wide receivers in **Ja'Marr Chase** (2021-23), **Tee Higgins** (2021-22) and **Tyler Boyd** (2019). Chase quickly emerged as one of the NFL's top wide receivers after being drafted in the first round in 2021. He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl nods and became the eighth player in NFL history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first three career seasons, including 1,216 yards on a career-high 100 receptions in 2023. Boyd's statistical highlights included 1,046 receiving yards in 2019, while Higgins contributed 1,091 yards in 2021 and 1,029 yards in 2022.

Bengals running back **Joe Mixon** exceeded 1,000 scrimmage yards four times in five seasons with Callahan as his offensive coordinator. From 2019 through 2023, he joined **Christian McCaffrey** and **Aaron Jones** as the NFL's only players with at least 4,500 rushing yards (4,618) and 1,500 receiving yards (1,556). Mixon was named to the Pro Bowl in 2021.

In 2023, Burrow was limited to 10 total games due to multiple injuries. Backup **Jake Browning** stepped into the lineup, and in the first action of his career, he registered a season passer rating of 98.4—qualifying as the seventh-best number in the NFL.

In 2022, the Bengals ranked seventh in the NFL in points per game (26.1), eighth in total offense (360.5 yards per game) and fifth in passing offense (265.0). Burrow earned his first career Pro Bowl selection while setting single-season franchise records for completions (414) and touchdown passes (35). The third-year signal caller also placed fifth in the NFL with 4,475 passing yards. The team's new-look offensive line came together during the season and did not allow more than two sacks in any of the final eight games of the regular season.

En route to an appearance in Super Bowl LVI, the 2021 Bengals ranked seventh in passing offense (259.0 yards per game) and tied for seventh in points per game (27.1). Burrow, after returning from a knee injury suffered in 2020, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and established single-season Bengals records for passing yards (4,611) and passer rating (108.3). Chase was named the AP Offensive Rookie of the Year after posting a team-record 1,455 receiving yards, while Mixon placed third in the NFL in rushing yards (1,205).

In 2020, Callahan helped develop Burrow as a rookie despite facing the challenges associated with the COVID-19 pandemic, including the cancellation of all in-person NFL offseason programs. Before a knee injury ended his rookie campaign in Week 11, Burrow's 264 completions were the most ever by an NFL quarterback through his first 10 career games, while his 2,688 passing yards were fifth.

Callahan joined the Bengals after spending 2018 as the quarterbacks coach for the Oakland Raiders. Under his tutelage, Raiders quarterback **Derek Carr** passed for a then-career-high 4,049 yards and led the AFC with a 68.9 completion percentage.

From 2016 to 2017, Callahan was the quarterbacks coach for the Detroit Lions. Working with **Matthew Stafford**, he helped the veteran

finish third in passing yards (4,446) and fourth in passing touchdowns (29) in 2017, while posting a then-career-best 99.3 passer rating. In 2016, Stafford's eight game-winning drives were the most by a quarterback in a season since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

Callahan broke into the NFL with the Denver Broncos in 2010 and served in multiple roles for the franchise through 2015. He began as a coaching assistant (2010) before transitioning to offensive quality control coach (2011-12), offensive assistant coach (2013-14) and finally offensive assistant/quarterbacks coach (2015). In 2013, Broncos quarterback **Peyton Manning** won the Associated Press NFL MVP award after completing a league-record 55 touchdown passes. Callahan's tenure in Denver was capped by the team's victory in Super Bowl 50 following the 2015 campaign. Before reaching the NFL, Callahan spent time at his alma mater, UCLA, as a graduate assistant in 2006 and 2007. He then spent two years (2008-09) as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for Junipero Serra High School in San Mateo, Calif.

As a former walk-on quarterback at UCLA, he appeared in 13 games as a holder on PATs. He earned a bachelor's degree in sociology in 2006 and added a master's in education in 2008.

Born in Champaign, Ill., Callahan attended De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif., where he was a part of the school's national-record 151-game winning streak and a No. 1 national ranking.

He and his wife, Allyson, have a son, Ronan, and a daughter, Norah. He is the son of longtime NFL coach **Bill Callahan**, the current Titans offensive line coach.

## YOUNGEST COACHES, FRANCHISE HISTORY

**Brian Callahan** began his tenure as the 20th head coach in Titans/Oilers history on at Chicago on Sept. 8, 2024.

Callahan was 40 years and 90 days old upon his first regular season contest on the Titans sideline. Born June 10, 1984, in Champaign, Ill., he was the seventh-youngest of the 32 head coaches in the NFL in 2024. The only younger head coaches than Callahan were Seattle's **Mike Macdonald** (37), New England's **Jerod Mayo** (38), the Los Angeles Rams' **Sean McVay** (38), Minnesota's **Kevin O'Connell** (39), Indianapolis' **Shane Steichen** (39) and Houston's **DeMeco Ryans** (40).

Callahan became the organization's third head coach to take over the team at age 40 or younger. **Jeff Fisher** grabbed the reins during the 1994 season at age 36 years and 269 days. He served 17 seasons in the role and was inducted into the franchise's Ring of Honor in 2021. **Lou Rymkus**, the first head coach in Oilers history, began his tenure in 1960 at 40 years and 310 days. He helped the team win the first American Football League championship.

### JOHN FASSEL SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

- Fassel joined the Titans in 2025 after spending the previous five seasons with the Dallas Cowboys.
- After Fassel's arrival in Dallas in 2020, the Cowboys improved from the league's bottom-ranked kick return and punt coverage units to top five marks in both categories during his tenure.
- Under Fassel's direction in 2024, second-year kicker Brandon Aubrey connected on a franchise-record 40 field goals, tying for the third-highest total in NFL history. The Cowboys also ranked second in the league with 1,091 kickoff return yards, led the NFL with an NFL-record 32.1 kickoff return average, and were the only team to return multiple kickoffs for touchdowns. Aubrey and second year returner KaVontae Turpin received AP All-Pro honors.
- In 2023, Cowboys punter Bryan Anger led the NFC with a 51.4 gross average.
- Before his time in Dallas, Fassel served as special teams coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams for eight seasons from 2012-19. During those eight seasons, the Rams led the NFL in net yards per punt (43.3) and ranked second in gross yards per punt (46.9). Fassel helped Los Angeles to a Super Bowl berth during the 2018 season. In 2013, Fassel oversaw a punt team that set the single-season NFL record for net punting average (46.0), led by punter Johnny Hekker.
- Fassel joined the Rams after three seasons (2009-11) with the Oakland Raiders as special teams coordinator. He began his NFL coaching career as an assistant special teams coach with the Baltimore Ravens.
- Prior to his NFL career, Fassel was the head coach and assistant athletic director at New Mexico Highlands University. His coaching career also included stops at Idaho State (2001) and with the Amsterdam Admirals of NFL Europe (2000) and Bucknell University (1999, 2002).
- The Anaheim, Calif., native played wide receiver at Weber State. He signed as an undrafted free agent with the Colts following his college playing career.
- Fassel is the son of the late NFL coach Jim Fassel.



- At the University of Colorado, Holz was a three-year letter winner (2004-06) as a wide receiver and holder.

### DENNARD WILSON DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

- Wilson arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 12 years of NFL coaching experience, including nine seasons leading defensive back units.
- In 2024, Wilson's first season as an NFL defensive coordinator, the Titans ranked second overall in total defense (311.2 opponent yards per game) and second in passing defense (177.3). The unit tied for the fifth-fewest first downs allowed per game (18.5) and tied for the fifth-fewest opponent yards allowed per play (5.2).
- Prior to joining the Titans, Wilson spent the 2023 campaign as the defensive backs coach with the Baltimore Ravens, working with head coach John Harbaugh and defensive coordinator Mike Macdonald. The defense ranked first in points allowed (16.5 per game), sixth overall (301.4 yards allowed per game), sixth in pass defense (191.9 yards per game), first in sacks (60) and third in interceptions (18). Second-year safety Kyle Hamilton earned All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.
- Before he joined the Ravens, Wilson spent two seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles, where he served as defensive passing game coordinator/defensive backs (2022) and a defensive backs coach (2021). In 2022, the Eagles ranked first in the NFL in pass defense (179.8 yards per game) en route to an appearance in Super Bowl LVII.
- Wilson spent four total seasons (2017-20) with the New York Jets—initially as defensive backs coach (2017-18) and then passing game coordinator/defensive backs (2019-20). While there he oversaw the development of safeties Jamal Adams and Marcus Maye.
- Wilson's initial NFL coaching job was with the St. Louis/Los Angeles Rams under head coach Jeff Fisher. He began his tenure with the Rams as a defensive quality control coach (2012-14) and then spent two years as the defensive backs coach (2015-16).
- From 2008 to 2011, he was employed by the Chicago Bears as a pro scout.
- The Upper Marlboro, Md., native was a three-year starter and team captain as a corner and safety at the University of Maryland. He entered the NFL in 2004 as a rookie free agent with Washington.



### NICK HOLZ OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

- Holz (pronounced "HOLTS") arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 11 years of NFL coaching experience and 16 total years of coaching experience.
- In 2024, Holz helped direct a Titans offense that featured running back Tony Pollard (1,079 rushing yards) and wide receiver Calvin Ridley (1,017 receiving yards), who produced 1,000-yard seasons rushing and receiving, respectively.
- He joined the Titans after spending the 2023 campaign as the passing game coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars. Working in an offense that featured quarterback Trevor Lawrence, he helped the unit rank ninth in passing (242.7 yards per game) and 13th in points scored (22.2 points per game). Calvin Ridley posted 1,016 receiving yards and eight touchdowns, while Evan Engram led all NFL tight ends with 114 receptions for 963 yards.
- Before his stint in Jacksonville, Holz was the offensive coordinator for UNLV in 2022, which followed 10 campaigns with the Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders (2012-21). With the Raiders, he served in a variety of roles on offense, mostly focused on wide receivers. He served on the staff of three different Raiders head coaches and worked with a notable list of offensive minds, including Greg Knapp, Greg Olson, Bill Musgrave and Jon Gruden.
- Prior to joining the Raiders, Holz was an assistant at Stanford under head coach Jim Harbaugh (2008-10) and David Shaw (2011). As an assistant quarterbacks coach, he helped Andrew Luck earn first-team All-American honors and finish as the runner-up in Heisman Trophy voting two times.
- Holz began his collegiate coaching career in 2007 at Nebraska, where he served as offensive quality control coach and video intern for the Cornhuskers under head coach Bill Callahan.



### BEN BLOOM OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS

- Bloom arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 15 years of experience coaching in the NFL. He was hired after spending the previous four campaigns with the Cleveland Browns.
- In 2024, Bloom helped outside linebackers Harold Landry III (9.0 sacks) and Arden Key (6.5) rank first and second in sacks on the team, respectively, and combine for 15.5 sacks. Key's total tied a career high. Landry was one of three NFL players in 2024 that recorded at least 70 tackles and 15 tackles for loss (Andrew Van Ginkel and Brian Burns).
- During his most recent stint with the Browns, Bloom served as senior defensive assistant in 2020, run game coordinator in 2021 and 2022, and defensive line coach in 2023. He broke into the NFL with the Browns from 2009 to 2010 and then worked nine seasons on the Dallas Cowboys staff (2011-19) before heading back to Cleveland.
- In 2023, Bloom worked with Browns defensive end Myles Garrett, who was named the AP Defensive Player of the Year after leading the Browns and tying for seventh in the NFL with 14 sacks. As a unit, the Browns led the NFL in total defense (270.2 opponent yards per game), passing defense (164.7) and third-down defense (29.1 percent).
- Bloom was the linebackers coach for the Cowboys in his final two seasons with the organization (2018-19) and was instrumental in Leighton Vander Esch and Jaylon Smith earning Pro Bowl honors.
- Prior to entering the NFL, Bloom spent four years in the college coaching ranks, lastly as the assistant defensive line coach at Harvard University.

### FRANK BUSH LINEBACKERS

- Bush rejoined the Titans as linebackers coach in 2024, beginning his third coaching stint with the franchise that also drafted him as a player in 1985. Prior to 2024, he spent 39 total NFL seasons as a player (1985-86), scout (1987-91) and coach (1992-present).
- In 2024, Bush helped newcomer Kenneth Murray Jr. lead the defense with 95 total tackles. Bush's group was forced to overcome a significant number of games missed due to injuries to Murray (three games), Jack Gibbens (seven), Otis Reese IV (four) and Chance Campbell (17) while also absorbing the midseason trade of starter Ernest Jones IV.
- From 2021 to 2023, Bush coached the Atlanta Falcons linebackers. In his final season there, his platoon was part of an overall unit that ranked eighth in passing defense (202.9 opponent yards per game), third in third-down efficiency (33.8 percent) and fourth in red-zone efficiency (45.3 touchdown percent).
- Prior to joining Atlanta's staff, Bush spent two seasons (2019-20) with the New York Jets as assistant head coach defense/linebackers coach and was promoted to defensive coordinator for the final four games of the 2020 season.
- Prior to joining the Jets, Bush served two seasons with the Dolphins as the team's assistant head coach/linebackers coach (2017-18).
- Returning to the Oilers/Titans organization in 2011, Bush spent two seasons in Tennessee (2011-12) and helped a trio of young linebackers—Akeem Ayers, Colin McCarthy and Zach Brown—earn starting roles.
- Bush also coached for the St. Louis/Los Angeles Rams (2013-16), Arizona Cardinals (2004-06) and Denver Broncos (1995-03). In his time with Denver, Bush earned two Super Bowl rings (XXXII and XXXIII).
- The Athens, Ga., native was a three-year starter at North Carolina State and was selected in the fifth round by the Oilers in the 1985 NFL Draft. A starter at linebacker as a rookie, Bush earned All-Rookie honors before an injury in his second season and subsequent diagnosis of a narrow spinal canal forced an early end to his playing career.
- Following his on-field career with the Oilers, he joined the team as a college scout for five seasons (1987-91) before transitioning to the coaching staff, initially as the team's linebackers coach (1992) and then as the defensive quality control/linebackers coach (1993-94).



### BILL CALLAHAN OFFENSIVE LINE

- Callahan was hired by the Titans as offensive line coach in 2024, arriving with 46 years of coaching experience, including 25 years in the NFL.
- He previously spent a total of six seasons as a head coach with the Oakland Raiders (2002-03) and the University of Nebraska (2004-07), in addition to part of one season as an interim head coach with the Washington Commanders (2019).
- In 2024, Callahan helped develop first-round pick JC Latham, who started all 17 games at left tackle. Second-year left guard Peter Skoronski also started every game, while right guard Dillon Radunz established a career high with 15 starts.
- Prior to joining the Titans, Callahan spent 22 seasons coaching offensive lines and seven years as an offensive coordinator. Those teams went to the playoffs 11 times. He helped his side of the ball finish with the No. 1 ranked rushing offense in 2000 (Raiders) and 2009 (Jets), as well as the top ranked passing offense in 2002 (Raiders). In the process, 14 offensive linemen under his tutelage were selected to a total of 35 Pro Bowls.

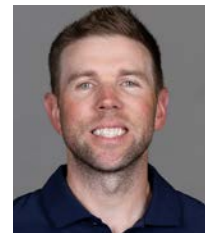


- When he joined the Titans, it marked the first time that he and his son, Titans head coach Brian Callahan, were employed by the same organization.
- Before venturing to Tennessee, he spent four years as the offensive line coach for the Cleveland Browns (2020-23). During that span, the Browns qualified for the playoffs twice and ranked third in the NFL with an average of 139.6 rushing yards per game.
- Callahan was on Washington's coaching staff from 2015 to 2019, working mostly with the offensive line and serving as interim head coach for the final 11 games in 2019.
- Callahan spent six seasons with the Oakland Raiders from 1998 to 2003, first as offensive coordinator before becoming the 13th head coach in Raiders history in 2002. The 2002 squad set a franchise record for total offense with an NFL-best 6,237 yards and led the NFL in passing yards (4,689) en route to an appearance in Super Bowl XXXVII. He became the fourth rookie head coach in NFL history to earn a Super Bowl berth.
- His time in the NFL also includes stints with the Dallas Cowboys (2012-14), New York Jets (2008-11) and Philadelphia Eagles (1995-97).
- Callahan served as head coach at the University of Nebraska from 2004 to 2007. He led the Cornhuskers to a Big 12 Conference Championship Game appearance in 2006 and two bowl invitations in his four seasons.
- His collegiate coaching experience also involved stops at Illinois (1980-86), Northern Arizona (1987-88), Southern Illinois (1989) and Wisconsin (1990-94).
- The Chicago, Ill., native started at quarterback for three seasons (1975-77) at Illinois Benedictine (Iisle, Ill.), where he earned honorable-mention All-America honors in 1976 and 1977.

### BO HARDEGREE QUARTERBACKS

- Hardegree was hired by the Titans in 2024 after spending two campaigns (2022-23) with the Las Vegas Raiders.
- In 2024, Hardegree aided the development of second-year quarterback Will Levis, while veteran Mason Rudolph started five games, his highest total in a season since 2019.
- A Jackson, Tenn., native and University of Tennessee product, Hardegree arrived at the Titans with 16 total years of coaching experience and 10 seasons coaching in the NFL.
- Hardegree joined the Raiders as quarterbacks coach in 2022 and was promoted to interim offensive coordinator for the final nine games of 2023. Under Hardegree's tutelage as an offensive coordinator, fourth-round rookie Aidan O'Connell passed for 1,905 yards and 11 touchdowns while posting the third-best passer rating (83.9) among all qualifying 2023 rookies.
- With the Patriots in 2021, Hardegree played a key role in the development of Patriots first-round pick Mac Jones, who led all rookie quarterbacks with 3,801 passing yards and 22 touchdowns.
- Prior to joining the Patriots, Hardegree logged two years with the New York Jets (2019-20) and three seasons as quarterbacks coach of the Miami Dolphins (2016-18).
- After beginning his coaching career at Duke (2008-10), he was on the staff at Louisiana State (2011-13) before his initial NFL stints with the Denver Broncos (2014) and Chicago Bears (2015).
- At the University of Tennessee, Hardegree played quarterback and was a member of SEC Eastern Division championship teams in 2004 and 2007.

- Jackson returned to the Titans in 2024 as secondary/safeties coach after previously serving on the staff as assistant secondary coach in 2016 and 2017.
- A former Houston Oilers draft pick, Jackson played nine seasons in the NFL—all with the Oilers/Titans from 1991 to 1999.
- In 2024, Jackson helped the Titans finish second in passing defense (177.3) and seventh in opponent passing yards per attempt (6.80). The unit was forced to overcome significant time missed due to injuries to the starting secondary of safety Quandre Diggs (nine games missed), safety Amani Hooker (three), cornerback L'Jarius Sneed (12) and cornerback Chidobe Awuzie (nine).
- Prior to rejoining the Tennessee coaching staff, Jackson spent two seasons with the Atlanta Falcons (2022-23). He began his tenure in Atlanta as a senior offensive assistant and transitioned to coaching the secondary in 2023. He was part of a staff in 2023 that helped the Falcons place eighth in passing defense (202.9 opponent yards per game), third in third-down efficiency (33.8 percent) and fourth in red-zone efficiency (45.3 touchdown percent). Safety Jessie Bates III was selected to the Pro Bowl and earned second-team AP All-Pro honors.
- Jackson served as the secondary/cornerbacks coach for the Cincinnati Bengals in 2020 and 2021.
- His coaching stops also include time with the Buffalo Bills (2001-03), Washington Commanders (2004-11), Detroit Lions (2013) and New York Jets (2018-19).
- Jackson recorded 14 interceptions and nine sacks in his NFL career. In his final season, he helped the Titans make an appearance in Super Bowl XXXIV.
- The Houston, Texas, native was a four-year starter at Purdue University.

- Randy Jordan arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 21 total years of coaching experience in addition to a nine-year NFL playing career as a running back.
- Under Jordan's direction in 2024, running back Tony Pollard ranked third in the AFC and tied for 12th in the NFL with a career-best 1,079 rushing yards on a career-high 260 carries. Both numbers led the team, as did his five rushing touchdowns. With an additional 238 yards on 41 receptions, he produced a team-high 1,317 scrimmage yards—the second-best total of his career.
- Prior to joining the Titans, Jordan spent 10 seasons (2014-23) as the running backs coach for the Washington Commanders and added the title of senior offensive assistant in 2023.
- The Commanders ranked seventh in the NFL in 2023 with an average of 4.43 rushing yards per attempt. Second-year running back Brian Robinson Jr. surpassed the 1,000-yard scrimmage mark (1,101) for the first time in his career and also led the club with nine total touchdowns.
- Before joining Washington, Jordan spent two years (2012-13) as the running backs coach at his alma mater, the University of North Carolina. Giovani Bernard produced one of the best seasons in UNC history in 2012, averaging 122.8 rushing yards per game to lead the ACC.
- Jordan coached running backs at Texas A&M for four seasons from 2008 to 2011.
- His first collegiate coaching position was at the University of Nebraska, where he served as the running backs coach for the Cornhuskers under head coach Bill Callahan from 2004 to 2007.
- Jordan began his coaching career with the Oakland Raiders as a special teams assistant midway through the 2003 season.
- As a running back in the NFL, Jordan appeared in 122 career games with the Raiders (1993, 1998-02) and Jacksonville Jaguars (1995-97), accumulating 152 rushing attempts for 574 yards and seven touchdowns, as well as 58 receptions for 596 yards and two scores.



- A native of Manson, N.C., Jordan attended the University of North Carolina under head coach Mack Brown from 1989 to 1992.

- Oden arrived at the Titans in 2025 with nearly 30 seasons of coaching experience, specializing in NFL secondaries since 2006. He came to Tennessee after spending the previous four seasons (2021-24) with the New York Jets as the senior defensive assistant/cornerbacks coach.
- In 2024, Oden helped the Jets rank third in the NFL in total yards allowed (5,334) and fourth in passing yards allowed (2,961).
- In each season from 2022 to 2024, the Jets defense ranked in the top five league-wide in yards allowed, and Oden helped cornerback Sauce Gardner to consecutive first-team All-Pro selection in his first two seasons (2022-23).
- Prior to his time with the Jets, Oden served one season (2020) as secondary/cornerbacks coach with the San Francisco 49ers.
- His NFL coaching career began as a defensive assistant with the Texans in 2004 before rising to assistant secondary coach with New Orleans in 2006. He received his first positional coaching post as secondary coach with the Saints in 2011. He also served on the staff with the Jaguars (2012), Buccaneers (2013), Lions (2014-17), Dolphins (2018-19) and 49ers (2020).
- During his time in the NFL, Oden has coached several Pro Bowl defensive backs including Gardner (Jets), cornerbacks Xavien Howard (Dolphins) and Darelle Revis (Buccaneers) and safety Roman Harper (Saints). Oden helped guide the 2009 Saints to the league's fourth-best passing defense and a victory in Super Bowl XLIV.
- He started his coaching career in 1997 as an assistant defensive backs coach at Millersville University before making stops at Boston College (1997), Army (1998-99), East Carolina (2000-02) and Eastern Michigan (2003).
- The Cleveland, Ohio, native played at Baldwin-Wallace College from 1992-95 and was a Division III All-American linebacker in 1994.

- Rocker returned to the Titans in 2024 with 32 previous years of coaching experience, including six in the NFL and three with the Titans. He coached the Titans defensive line from 2011 to 2013.
- In 2024, defensive tackle Jeffery Simmons was named to the Pro Bowl after tallying five sacks and a career-high 76 tackles. Meanwhile, Rocker helped develop second-round nose tackle T'Vondre Sweat. Sweat appeared in all 17 games with 16 starts and earned All-Rookie honors from Pro Football Focus and Pro Football Writers of America.
- Prior to rejoining the Titans, Rocker spent three seasons as the defensive line coach for the Philadelphia Eagles (2021-23). In that period, the Eagles tied for third in the NFL with 142 total sacks and earned three consecutive postseason berths.
- In 2023, Rocker was part of an Eagles playoff team that ranked 10th in the league in rushing defense (103.4 opponent yards per game), while defensive end Josh Sweat registered his third consecutive season with at least 6.5 sacks. Meanwhile, defensive tackle Fletcher Cox started 15 games and notched five sacks in his 12th NFL season.
- In 2022, Rocker was a member of an Eagles coaching staff that guided the team to an NFC title and an appearance in Super Bowl LVII. The Eagles fielded the league's second-ranked total defense (301.5 yards per game) and registered the third-most sacks (70, tied) in NFL history.
- Prior to joining the Eagles' coaching staff, he served on the staffs at South Carolina (2020), the University of Tennessee (2017-19) and Georgia (2014-16).

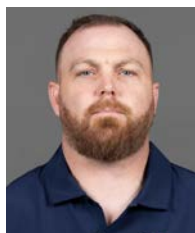
- In 2012, during his first stint with the Titans, the defense produced the 10th-most sacks (39) in the league, while defensive end Derrick Morgan enjoyed a breakout year. The prior campaign, Rocker led a young group that included Karl Klug, who ranked first among rookie defensive tackles with seven sacks, as well as rookie Jurrell Casey.
- Returning to his alma mater, Rocker coached the defensive line at Auburn for two years (2009-10) following stints at Mississippi (2008) Arkansas (2003-07), Cincinnati (2002), Troy State (1997-01) and West Alabama.
- The Atlanta, Ga., native and former Auburn defensive tackle was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2004. A two-time All-American, he was honored with the Lombardi Award (nation's top college football player) and Outland Trophy (nation's top interior lineman) in 1988, becoming the first player in SEC history to earn both accolades.
- He was selected by Washington in the third round (66th overall) of the 1989 NFL Draft and played two seasons before sustaining a knee injury. He concluded his professional career with the Orlando Thunder of the World Football League in 1991.

### TRAVIS SMITH

- Smith joined the Titans in 2025 as defensive run game coordinator after three seasons with the Chicago Bears as defensive line coach.
- In 2024, Smith's 14th NFL season, he coached a front line that helped Chicago rank in the top 10 in turnover margin at plus-eight.
- In 2023, the Bears finished first in rushing yards allowed per game (86.4) and total rushing yards allowed (1,468). Despite being acquired via trade in Week 9, defensive lineman Montez Sweat led the team in sacks (six) and was selected to the Pro Bowl.
- Prior to his time in Chicago, Smith spent a decade rising up the defensive coaching ranks with the Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders. After starting as a defensive assistant with the team in 2012, he spent four total seasons as a defensive quality control coach (2015-16, 2018-19) and led the outside linebackers in 2017 before assisting with the defensive line from 2020-21.
- While with the Raiders, Smith helped guide outside linebacker Khalil Mack and defensive end Maxx Crosby from rookies in 2014 and 2019, respectively, to All-Pro performers. Smith worked extensively with the linebackers and helped tutor Mack through a four-year Raiders stint that included 68 tackles for loss and Defensive Player of the Year honors in 2016. Crosby was drafted in 2019 and was selected to his first of four straight Pro Bowls in 2021, Smith's final season with the team as assistant defensive line coach.
- Smith spent 2011 as an offensive technical intern at the University of Colorado after a year as tight ends and defensive line assistant coach at Santa Monica (Calif.) Junior College.
- He is a native of Walnut Creek, Calif., and played linebacker and fullback collegiately from 2004 to 2009 at Cal Poly, where he also served as an undergraduate assistant coach.



### LUKE STOCKER

#### TIGHT ENDS

- Stocker joined the coaching staff in 2023 following 11 years in the NFL as a player.
- He initially joined the Titans staff as an intern during the 2023 offseason and then earned a full-time role as offensive assistant. In 2024, he was promoted to assistant tight ends coach before taking over the room in 2025.
- During the 2024 season, he helped coach a group of tight ends that included Chig Okonkwo, Josh Whyle and Nick Vannett. Okonkwo ranked second on the team and led the Titans tight ends with 52 receptions. His 479 receiving yards ranked third on the team and led the team's tight ends, and he had two touchdown receptions.
- With Stocker working with the Titans tight ends in 2023, Okonkwo finished second on the team in receptions (54) and receiving yards (528),



which were career highs.

- As a player, Stocker was signed by the Titans as a free agent during the 2017 campaign and stayed with the club through 2018, head coach Mike Vrabel's first season in Tennessee. He also returned for training camp in 2021. In 19 games with the Titans (13 starts), he totaled 16 receptions for 177 yards and two touchdowns, while serving in a key role as a blocker in the running game.
- A fourth-round pick by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the 2011 NFL Draft, Stocker spent six-plus seasons with the Buccaneers until joining the Titans. He later appeared in games for the Atlanta Falcons (2019-20) and Minnesota Vikings (2021). In 142 career games, he registered 91 starts and 85 receptions for 705 yards and five touchdowns. He also participated in two playoff games with the Titans in 2017.
- The Berea, Ky., native attended the University of Tennessee (2007-10), where he tied a then-school record with 52 career games played, totaling 85 receptions for 956 yards and eight touchdowns.

### TYKE TOLBERT

#### WIDE RECEIVERS

- Tolbert joined the Titans in 2024 with 30 prior years of coaching experience, including 21 seasons in the NFL.
- He has coached wide receivers with the Arizona Cardinals (2003), Buffalo Bills (2004-09), Carolina Panthers (2010), Denver Broncos (2011-17), New York Giants (2018-21) and Chicago Bears (2022-23).
- In 2024, Titans wide receiver Calvin Ridley's 15.9-yard receiving average ranked fifth in the NFL among qualifiers. Only Ridley and Philadelphia's A.J. Brown accumulated at least 60 receptions (64) and 1,000 receiving yards (1,017) while averaging at least 15.0 yards per catch. Also, Nick Westbrook-Ikhine established a career high and ranked second on the Titans with 497 receiving yards on 32 catches (15.5 avg.), and his team-best nine touchdown receptions also gave him the best finish of his career and tied for the ninth-highest total in the NFL.
- Prior to his time in Tennessee, Tolbert coached eight different wide receivers to 16 total 1,000-yard seasons: Anquan Boldin (2003), Eric Moulds (2004), Lee Evans (2006, 2008), Demaryius Thomas (2012-16), Eric Decker (2012-13), Emmanuel Sanders (2014-16), Odell Beckham Jr. (2018) and DJ Moore (2023). The grouping of Boldin (2003), Thomas (2012-16) and Sanders (2014, 2016) combined for eight Pro Bowls under Tolbert's direction.
- Tolbert's two years as wide receivers coach in Chicago also included the title of pass game coordinator. Most recently in 2023, he helped Moore tie for second in the NFL in receptions of at least 25 yards (16). Moore, in his first season in Chicago, also ranked sixth in receiving yards (1,364).
- Tolbert's first professional coaching experience was with the NFL's Bill Walsh Minority Internship Program. He first interned with the Lions during training camp in 1997 before interning again in 2001 with the Cardinals.
- Before establishing himself in the NFL, Tolbert began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Louisiana State (1994) before moving on to Northeast Louisiana (1994, 1995-97), Ohio University (1995), Auburn (1998), Louisiana-Lafayette (1999-01) and Florida (2002).
- The Conroe, Texas, native was a wide receiver and three-year letterman at Louisiana State University (1986-90).



### DYLAN AUTENRIETH

- Dylan Autenrieth is in his first season with the Titans and his first season in the NFL in 2025.

- McCoy arrived in Tennessee in 2025 as senior offensive assistant, bringing 22 years of NFL experience to the coaching staff.
- Prior to joining the Titans, he had six combined seasons (2009-12, 2017, 2018) as an NFL offensive coordinator in addition to four campaigns (2013-16) as the head coach of the San Diego Chargers.
- From 2022 to 2024, he served as the quarterbacks coach for the Jacksonville Jaguars. While in Jacksonville, he helped quarterback Trevor Lawrence register consecutive 4,000-yard passing seasons in 2022 (4,113) and 2023 (4,016). During those two seasons, Lawrence's 8,129 passing yards ranked fifth in the NFL, and his 46 touchdown passes ranked 10th. In 2024, injuries limited Lawrence to 10 games, during which time he passed for 2,045 yards and 11 touchdowns.
- McCoy began his NFL coaching career in 2000 with the Carolina Panthers, working in a variety of roles on the offensive staff through 2008. He went to Denver in 2009 and spent four seasons as the Broncos offensive coordinator. His tenure in Denver overlapped for three seasons (2010-12) with current Titans head coach Brian Callahan. Later, following his four-year stint in San Diego, he returned to Denver as offensive coordinator (2017) and then took the offensive coordinator post with the Arizona Cardinals for one season (2018).

"The new stadium will host the world's largest events, as well as serve as a community hub for our local neighbors. We're excited to have a partner like Nissan embark on this journey with us as we look towards the future."

The partnership will feature dedicated areas in the new stadium for brand experiences and displays, innovative technology integration, and involvement in Titans broadcast platforms. Nissan also will support a to-be-determined program in the Titans' ONE Community philanthropic platform, which reaches Nashville's most underrepresented and marginalized communities with a focus on three areas – Opportunity, Neighborhoods and Education.

"Nissan Stadium is a centerpiece of the Nashville skyline and has become a household name in Middle Tennessee. ## #1 • QB CAM WARD

6-2, 219, Rookie, Miami (Fla.)

Quarterback **Cam Ward** was selected by the Titans with the first overall pick in the 2025 NFL Draft. He became the first No. 1 overall pick for the franchise since running back **Earl Campbell** in 1978.

In five college seasons, Ward played for three different schools: Incarnate Word (2020-21), Washington State (2022-23) and Miami (2024). In 57 career games—all starts—he completed 1,516 of 2,330 passes for 18,184 yards, and his 158 touchdown passes set an NCAA Division I (FBS/FCS) record. He also totaled 399 rushes for 473 yards and 20 touchdowns.

During his graduate campaign at Miami, he started all 13 games and led the Hurricanes to a 10-3 record, giving them their first 10-win season since 2017. He earned first-team Associated Press All-America honors and was a Heisman finalist after establishing Miami's single-season records for passing yards (4,313), touchdowns (39) and completion percentage (67.2 percent, 305-for-454), while throwing only seven interceptions. He received the 2024 Davey O'Brien Award, recognizing the nation's top quarterback, and was named ACC Player of the Year, ACC Offensive Player of the Year and first-team All-ACC.

At Washington State in 2023, Ward started all 12 games and completed 324 of 486 passes for 3,732 yards and 25 touchdowns with seven interceptions. He also accounted for eight rushing touchdowns. At the conclusion of the season, he received All-Pac-12 Conference honorable mention for the second consecutive season.

Ward arrived at Washington State as a junior in 2022. He started all 13 games in his first season with the Cougars and completed 320 of 497 passes for 3,231 yards and 23 touchdowns with nine interceptions. He added five rushing touchdowns.



In 2021, Ward was a sophomore at Incarnate Word, where he was named Southland Conference Offensive Player of the Year, FCS All-American second team and a Walter Payton Award Finalist after leading UIW to Southland Conference Championship, a 10-3 record and into the second round of the FCS playoffs. His statistics included 384 completions on 590 attempts for 4,648 yards, 47 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. He set program records for single game passing yards (610), single-game passing touchdowns (seven), career passing touchdowns (71) and career passing yards (6,908).

As a freshman in 2020, Ward started in all six games at Incarnate Word during the spring season (2021) that resulted from the COVID-19 outbreak. He completed 183 of 303 passes for 2,260 yards and 24 touchdowns and was named the Jerry Rice Award winner, given to the top FCS freshman.

Ward is a native of West Columbia, Texas.

### 2025 Game Notes:

➤ **At Denver (9/7)**, completed 12 of 28 passes for 112 yards in his NFL debut. Joined Marcus Mariota (2015) as the only rookie quarterbacks in franchise history to start a season opener. Became the 13th rookie starting quarterback in franchise history and the first since Will Levis in 2023. Became the 20th quarterback in the common draft era (since 1967) to be selected with the first pick in the NFL Draft and start in Week 1 of his rookie season. On his first NFL pass attempt in the first quarter, converted a third-and-10 with a short pass to Tony Pollard that went 29 yards. It led to a Titans field goal to cap their first drive.

➤ **Against the L.A. Rams (9/14)**, completed 19 of 33 passes for 175 yards and one touchdown (82.3 passer rating), and he added four rushing attempts for eight yards. In the first half, his statistics included 10 completions, 17 attempts, 123 yards, one touchdown, no interceptions and a 100.9 passer rating. He also rushed for two first downs in the first half. In the first quarter, he delivered a 26-yard pass to Calvin Ridley, and he added a 21-yarder to Ridley in the second quarter. Rushed for three yards and a first down on fourth-and-one in the second quarter. With a nine-yard toss across the field to Elic Ayomanor late in the second quarter, he completed his first career touchdown pass.

➤ **Against Indianapolis (9/21)**, completed 23 of 38 passes for 219 yards with one touchdown and one interception, and added three rushing attempts for 12 yards. In the first quarter, he found Chig Okonkwo for a 22-yard completion and Calvin Ridley on a 27-yarder. In the third quarter, he led a 13-play, 73-yard touchdown drive, during which he completed five passes for 32 yards on six attempts. On a 16-play, 77-yard touchdown drive, he threw an eight-yard touchdown pass to Elic Ayomanor on fourth-and-goal in the fourth quarter. On the drive, Ward completed eight-of-11 passes for 80 yards.

➤ **At Houston (9/28)**, while joining Marcus Mariota (2015) as the only rookie quarterbacks in franchise history to start the first four games of a season, completed 10-of-26 passes for 108 yards with one interception. He added 22 yards and a first down on two rushing attempts. In the first quarter, he found Elic Ayomanor for a 33-yard completion, his longest career completion to date. In the second quarter, he converted a third-and-six with a 22-yard pass to Calvin Ridley.

## #10 • QB BRANDON ALLEN

6-2, 209, 9th Year/1st with Titans, Arkansas

**Brandon Allen** is in his ninth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 14, 2025.

Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Allen appeared in 18 games with 10 starts in his NFL career, completing 166 of 293 passes for 1,810 yards and 11 touchdowns. After being drafted by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the sixth round (201st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, he also spent time with the Los Angeles Rams (2017-19), Denver Broncos (2019), Cincinnati Bengals (2020-22) and San Francisco 49ers (2023-24).

With the 49ers, he saw action in three games with one start in 2024. He was 17-of-30 passing for 199 yards with one touchdown.

Allen's most extensive action came with the Cincinnati Bengals, where he signed as a free agent in 2020 and worked with current Titans head coach **Brian Callahan**. He saw action in 12 games with six starts in Cincinnati and completed 110 of 179 passes for 1,096 yards with seven touchdowns.

The Fayetteville, Ark., native started 38 games over five seasons (2011-15) at the University of Arkansas and completed 583 of 1,016 passes for 7,463 yards with a school-record 64 touchdowns.

## #8 • QB WILL LEVIS

6-4, 229, 3rd Year/3rd with Titans, Kentucky

Quarterback **Will Levis** is in his third season in 2025. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (33rd overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft after the Titans traded up to select him.

Levis will spend the 2025 campaign on injured reserve due to a shoulder injury.

During his first two NFL seasons, Levis totaled 21 starts. In franchise history, only **Warren Moon** (30), **Vince Young** (28) and **Marcus Mariota** (27) started more games at quarterback than Levis within their first two NFL seasons. Levis' career numbers through his first two campaigns included 339 completions, 556 attempts, 3,899 yards, 21 touchdowns and 16 interceptions.

In 2024, Levis finished with a team-high 301 pass attempts, 190 completions, 2,091 yards, 13 touchdowns and 81.4 passer rating. His 63.1 completion percentage qualified for the 10th-best mark in franchise history. He added 183 rushing yards on 45 attempts.

In his debut season, Levis recorded starts in all nine games in which he appeared, becoming the third rookie quarterback in franchise history to start at least nine games. Only Young (13 starts in 2006) and Mariota (12 starts in 2015) preceded him in the accomplishment. Levis' rookie passing totals included 255 attempts, 149 completions, 1,808 yards, eight touchdowns and four interceptions. His 84.2 passer rating was the second best in franchise history by a rookie quarterback (91.5 by Mariota in 2015), and the number also ranked first in NFL history among second-round quarterbacks in their rookie season (minimum 200 attempts). Levis had an additional 57 yards and a touchdown rushing.

Prior to entering the NFL, Levis spent two seasons at the University of Kentucky after transferring from Penn State. In four combined college seasons, he appeared in 39 games with 26 starts. He completed 479 of his 738 passes (64.9 percent) for 5,876 yards with 46 touchdowns and 25 interceptions. He also rushed for 742 yards and 17 touchdowns.

At Kentucky, Levis went 17-7 as a starter, tying Terry Wilson for the second-most quarterback wins since 1993. The two-time team captain completed 418 of 636 passes for 5,233 yards with 43 passing touchdowns and 11 rushing scores for the Wildcats. His six 300-yard passing games were the fourth-most in school history.

As a senior in 2022, he started 11 games at quarterback and connected on 185 of 283 passes for 2,406 yards with 19 passing scores, while ranking fourth in the SEC in pass efficiency (151.9). He finished fifth in the SEC with 19 passing scores.

As a junior in 2021, he transferred from Penn State to Kentucky and started in all 13 games, helping to lead UK to 10 wins for the fourth time in school history. He totaled 3,203 yards total offense, becoming the seventh player in school history to reach 3,000 yards of total offense in a season. He was 233-of-353 passing for 2,826 yards and 24 touchdowns, and he also registered 107 rushes for 376 yards and a team-high tying nine rushing touchdowns.

Running back **Tony Pollard** is in his seventh NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2025. The Memphis native was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 14, 2024.

During his first year with the Titans, Pollard ranked third in the AFC and tied for 12th in the NFL with a career-best 1,079 rushing yards on a career-high 260 carries. Both numbers led the team, as did his five rushing touchdowns. With an additional 238 yards on 41 receptions, he produced a team-high 1,317 scrimmage yards—the second-best total of his career.

Prior to joining the Titans, Pollard spent five seasons (2019-23) with the Dallas Cowboys, who selected him in the fourth round (128th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft. During his time in Dallas, he appeared in 79 games with 23 starts, totaling 3,621 rushing yards and 23 touchdowns on 762 carries. With an additional 176 receptions for 1,319 yards and five receiving touchdowns, he reached 1,000 scrimmage yards in each of his final three years in Dallas while also returning 63 kickoffs for 1,500 yards, including one return for a score.

In 2023, his first season as the lead running back in Dallas, Pollard started all 17 games for the first time in his career and led the team with 1,005 rushing yards on a career-high 252 carries (4.0 avg.) with six touchdowns.

In 2022, he set career marks with 193 carries for 1,007 yards and nine scores, averaging 5.2 yards-per-carry to rank third in the NFL and earn his first Pro Bowl nod.

At the University of Memphis, he played in 40 games at running back and wide receiver, amassing 2,233 yards and 18 touchdowns on offense. He also averaged 30.1 yards per kickoff return and tied an NCAA record with seven kickoff returns for touchdowns.

➤ **Against the L.A. Rams (9/14)**, rushed for a team-high 92 yards on 20 attempts (4.6 avg.). It was his 27th career game with at least 90 scrimmage yards.

➤ **Against Indianapolis (9/21)**, carried the ball 16 times for 45 yards and a touchdown. In the third quarter, he scored his first touchdown of the season and the 29th rushing touchdown of his career on a one-yard plunge. Added two receptions for 14 yards.

➤ **At Houston (9/28)**, led the team with 64 rushing yards on 14 carries and added a team-high three receptions for 12 yards. In the second quarter, he rushed for a 21-yard gain, his longest run since a 21-yarder against Jacksonville on Dec. 8, 2024.

## 1,000 YARDS IN YEAR 1 WITH THE TITANS

In his first season with the Titans, running back **Tony Pollard** notched his third consecutive 1,000-yard rushing campaign while also setting a career high with 1,079 rushing yards. In his final two seasons with the Dallas Cowboys, the Memphis native rushed for a then-career-best 1,007 yards in 2022 and 1,005 yards in 2023.

Pollard became the fifth player in Titans/Oilers history with 1,000 rushing yards in his first season with the organization. The first four were **Earl Campbell** (1978), **Eddie George** (1996), **Chris Johnson** (2008) and **DeMarco Murray** (2016).

## CONSISTENCY FROM 2022-2024

In addition to his 1,079 rushing yards in 2024, Tony Pollard accounted for 238 receiving yards out of the backfield. With 1,317 total scrimmage yards, Pollard registered his third consecutive season in which he accounted for at least 1,200 scrimmage yards and at least five scrimmage touchdowns. He did so in each of his final two seasons with the Dallas Cowboys prior to signing with the Titans as an unrestricted free agent.

Pollard was one of only five NFL running backs with 1,200 scrimmage yards and five scrimmage touchdowns in each of the 2022, 2023 and 2024 campaigns. The others on the list were Baltimore's **Derrick Henry**, Houston's **Joe Mixon**, Philadelphia's **Saquon Barkley** and Pittsburgh's **Najee Harris**.

Running back **Tyjae Spears** is in his third NFL season. He was selected by the Titans in the third round (81st overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft.

In 2024, Spears appeared in 12 games with one start. His totals included 312 yards and four touchdowns on 84 rushing attempts, and he added 30 receptions for 224 yards and a touchdown.

As a rookie, Spears did not miss a game and registered one start. He carried the ball 100 times for 453 yards and two touchdowns, and he added 52 receptions for 385 yards and one score. His 838 scrimmage yards ranked seventh in franchise history among rookie running backs, and the total also placed fourth among rookie running backs in 2023 behind Atlanta's **Bijan Robinson**, Detroit's **Jahmyr Gibbs** and Miami's **De'Von Achane**. Spears became the franchise's first rookie running back with at least 50 receptions since **Sid Blanks** in 1964 (56).

Spears spent four years at Tulane (2019-22) prior to entering the NFL. He appeared in 33 games with 20 starts at running back for the Green Wave, totaling 2,910 yards and 31 touchdowns on 427 carries with an additional 48 receptions for 564 yards and three scores. He ended his career as the school's all-time leader in yards per carry (6.8), tied for second in 100-yard rushing games (15), tied for third in rushing touchdowns (31), fourth in rushing yards per game (85.6) and sixth in rushing yards (2,910) and total touchdowns (34). His 6.8 yards per carry from 2019 to 2022 ranked second in the FBS behind only Alabama-Birmingham running back **DeWayne McBride's** 7.3-yard average (minimum 400 attempts).

As a junior in 2022, he started all 14 games for the Green Wave, totaling 1,581 yards and 19 touchdowns on 229 rushing attempts and adding 22 receptions for 256 yards and two touchdowns. He tied for the national lead with 21 total touchdowns and tied for third in the country with 19 rushing touchdowns, a total that ranked second in Tulane single-season history. His 1,581 rushing yards led the conference and made up the Green Wave's all-time second-highest single-season total. His nine 100-yard rushing games included eight consecutive such efforts to finish the season. He was named the American Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year and also earned first-team All-AAC honors. His efforts helped Tulane earn a 12-2 record and win an American Athletic Conference title.

Tight end **Gunnar Helm** was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (120th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft.

During his career at the University of Texas, Helm participated in 54 games with 26 starts from 2021 to 2024. He recorded 79 receptions for 1,022 yards and nine touchdowns in his college career.

As a senior in 2024, he started all 16 games and recorded a career-high and team-leading 60 receptions for 786 yards and seven touchdowns. His play earned him second-team All-SEC honors, and he was a semifinalist for the John Mackey Award, presented to the nation's most outstanding tight end. Helm helped the Longhorns advance to the semifinals of the College Football Playoff.

As a junior in 2023, he appeared in 14 games with six starts, totaling 14 receptions for 192 yards and two touchdowns. He was voted honorable mention All-Big 12 and also named Academic All-Big 12 second team.

He is a native of Englewood, Colo.

Tight end **Chig Okonkwo** (pronounced "CHIGG oh-KAHN-kwoh") is in his fourth NFL season in 2025. He was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (143rd overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.

Through his first three seasons, Okonkwo led the team's tight ends with 138 receptions for 1,457 yards and six touchdowns. During that time, he did not miss a game, appearing in 51 contests with 30 starts. His career yardage total through 2024 ranked second among all tight ends drafted in 2022, trailing only **Trey McBride** (2,236).

Okonkwo became the fifth tight end in franchise history to register three or more seasons with a minimum of 30 receptions and 450 receiving yards per season. He joined **Frank Wycheck** (1995–2001), **Delanie Walker** (2013–2017), **Dave Casper** (1980–1982) and **Alvin Reed** (1968–1970).

In 2024, Okonkwo tied his career high with 11 starts, matching his 2023 total. He ranked second on the team and led the Titans tight ends with 52 receptions. His 479 receiving yards ranked third on the team and led the team's tight ends, and he had two touchdown receptions.

Okonkwo started 11 games in 2023 and finished the season with 54 receptions for 528 yards and one touchdown. He ranked second on the team in receptions and receiving yards.

During his rookie season, Okonkwo appeared in all 17 games with eight starts and totaled 32 receptions for 450 yards (14.1 avg.) and three touchdowns. His yardage total ranked second on the team. He also tied for fifth on the team with seven special teams tackles. He was named to the Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie team.

Okonkwo's 450 receiving yards in 2022 established a new record for franchise rookie tight ends, surpassing **Ben Troupe's** 329 yards in 2004. Okonkwo tied **Chris Dressel** (32 receptions in 1983) for the third-best reception total among all Titans/Oilers rookie tight ends, trailing only **Bo Scaife** (37 in 2005) and Troupe (33 in 2004), and he became the second rookie tight end in franchise history with at least three touchdown catches, joining Dressel (four in 1983).

The Powder Springs, Ga., native appeared in 37 games with 20 starts over four seasons (2018-21) at Maryland and caught 77 passes for 717 yards and eight touchdowns. He added three carries for 72 yards and three touchdowns, including a career-long rush of 54 yards.

As a senior in 2021, he started all 13 games and posted career-high marks with 52 catches for 447 yards and a team-leading five touchdowns. His 52 receptions ranked second in Terrapins history for a single season by a tight end, behind only Wycheck (58 in 1990). Okonkwo's 447 receiving yards were the most by a Terps tight end in a season since **Vernon Davis** (871 in 2005).

He sat out the 2020 season with myocarditis due to COVID-19. Prior to then, he saw action in 12 games (four starts) as a freshman and 12 games (three starts) as a sophomore.

### 2025 Game Notes:

- **At Denver (9/7)**, started and totaled three receptions for 19 yards. Converted a third-and-13 with a 14-yard grab in the third quarter.
- **Against the L.A. Rams (9/14)**, totaled 35 yards on four receptions, which tied for the team lead. He recorded a 14-yard catch in the first quarter. Surpassed the 1,500-yard receiving mark for his career (1,511).
- **Against Indianapolis (9/21)**, led the offense with five receptions and 66 receiving yards. On Dec. 29, 2024 at Jacksonville, Titans tight end **Chig Okonkwo** played in his 50th career game for the team without having missed a game in his first three seasons. Within his first 50 games, Okonkwo accumulated 138 receptions for 1,457 yards and six touchdowns.

In franchise history, he ranked fourth for receptions in a tight end's first 50 games with the club. Only **Delanie Walker** (234 receptions), **Frank Wycheck** (166) and **Willard Dewveall** (141) had more than Okonkwo, and each of those previous players joined the club as veterans from other organizations.

Okonkwo's receiving yardage total was the sixth-best figure among franchise tight ends within their first 50 games with the team.

Wide receiver **Elic Ayomanor** was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (136th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft.

Ayomanor attended Stanford from 2022 to 2024. He saw action in his final two seasons there, appearing in 24 games with 23 starts. He led the Cardinal in receptions and receiving yards in both campaigns, totaling 125 receptions for 1,844 yards and 12 touchdowns in that span.

In 2024, he started all 12 games and was named second team All-ACC from the coaches after leading all Stanford receivers with 63 receptions for 831 yards. He recorded six receiving touchdowns, tied for the most by a Cardinal wideout, and he was the Cardinal's leading receiver in seven of the 12 games. In the ACC, he finished seventh in receptions and tied for ninth in receiving touchdowns. He was honored with the team's Tommy Vardell Award, given to an academic junior or senior who best epitomizes excellence in both academics and athletics, as well as Stanford's Deswarte-Eller Award, presented to the team's most outstanding sophomore player.

As a redshirt freshman in 2023, he appeared in all 12 games, making starts at wide receiver in the final 11 games. He paced the Stanford offense with 62 receptions for 1,013 yards and six touchdowns and was named the team's Irving S. Zeimer Award recipient, given to the team's offensive most valuable player. He ranked seventh in the Pac-12 in receiving yards and yards per catch (16.3), while ranking fifth in yards per game (84.4).

In a game at Colorado (Oct. 13), he amassed career highs with 13 catches for 294 yards and three receiving scores, setting the Stanford program record for receiving yards in a game.

A native of Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada, he spent his initial year of high school in Canada before one year at The Peddie School (Hightstown, N.J.) and two years at Deerfield (Mass.) Academy.

- **At Denver (9/7)**, started at wide receiver in his NFL debut. Totaled 13 yards on a pair of receptions.
- **Against the L.A. Rams (9/14)**, totaled 56 yards on four receptions, which tied for the team lead and included a touchdown. Wide receiver **Chimere Dike** was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (103rd overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft.

The Waukesha, Wis., native played four seasons (2020-23) at Wisconsin before transferring to Florida for his final season (2024). In five total seasons, he appeared in 57 games with 42 starts and tallied 139 receptions for 2,261 yards and 11 touchdowns. He added 14 rushing attempts for 99 yards and one touchdown, and additionally, he recorded 26 punt returns for 300 yards and 20 kickoff returns for 472 yards.

In 2024, Dike was named a team captain for the Gators during his first and only season with the team. He led the team in catches (42) and ranked second with a career-high in receiving yards (783) and touchdown catches (two). In SEC play, he averaged a league-leading 16.5 yards per punt return. He was one of 23 players in the FBS to contribute four punt returns of 20-plus yards.

In Dike's final season at Wisconsin, he started in 11 games and finished with 19 receptions for 328 yards and one touchdown. He added 12 punt returns for 108 yards and 11 kickoff returns for 249 yards.

As a junior in 2022, he started all 13 games for the Badgers and led the team with 47 catches, 689 receiving yards and six touchdown catches. His six scores tied for seventh in the Big Ten and were the most for a Badger wide receiver since 2019.

➤ **At Denver (9/7)**, made his NFL debut. Totaled 144 yards with a 36.0-yard average on four kickoff returns and added a 12-yard punt return. Gained nine yards on his first NFL rushing attempt in the second quarter. Recorded a 71-yard kickoff return in the second quarter to set up a Titans field goal. It was the Titans' longest kickoff return since Darius Jennings returned a kickoff 94 yards for a touchdown on Sept. 9, 2018 at Miami. His 71-yard kickoff return was the longest by a Titans rookie since Marc Mariani's 73-yarder at Dallas on Oct. 10, 2010. His 144 kickoff return yards made up the highest single-game total for a Titans player since Darrynton Evans (145) on Dec. 27, 2020 at Green Bay.

➤ **Against the L.A. Rams (9/14)**, totaled 37 yards on two punt returns, including a 21-yard long. He also returned five kickoffs for 83 yards (16.6 avg.), caught two passes resulting in a net loss of one yard, and added nine rushing yards on two attempts.

➤ **Against Indianapolis (9/21)**, registered his first NFL start at wide receiver. He totaled 162 kickoff return yards on six attempts (27.0 average), accumulating the most kickoff return yards in a game by a Titans player since Leon Washington's 209 kickoff return yards at Denver on Dec. 8, 2013. His 35-yard kickoff return in the first quarter helped set up a field goal. Also totaled three yards on two rushing attempts and two yards on three receptions.

➤ **At Houston (9/28)**, returned six kickoffs for a 23.5-yard average (long of 29). He became the NFL's first rookie since Chad Morton of the New Orleans Saints in 2000 with at least four kickoff returns in each of the first four games of his rookie season.

Wide receiver **Van Jefferson** is in his sixth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 14, 2025.

Jefferson has previously played for the Los Angeles Rams (2020-23), Atlanta Falcons (2023) and Pittsburgh Steelers (2024). In 78 games prior to his arrival in Tennessee, he totaled 137 receptions for 1,876 yards and 12 touchdowns.

As a member of the Steelers in 2024, he appeared in 17 games for the second consecutive season. He registered 24 catches for 276 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

His breakout season came in 2021 for the Rams, recording 50 receptions for 802 yards and six touchdowns while starting all 17 contests. His receiving and yardage totals ranked third on the team that would go on to win Super Bowl LVI. During the team's championship run, Jefferson started all four postseason games, tallying nine catches for 102 yards.

Jefferson entered the NFL as a second-round selection (57th overall) by the Rams in the 2020 NFL Draft. As a college player, he spent two seasons at Ole Miss before playing his final two years at the University of Florida. Over his four years of college, he posted 175 receptions for 2,159 yards and 16 touchdowns in 48 total games.

Wide receiver **Tyler Lockett** is in his 11th NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans. He was signed by the Titans as a free agent on April 28, 2025.

Prior to his arrival in Tennessee, Lockett played in 161 games with 134 starts as a member of the Seattle Seahawks (2015-24), who selected him in the fifth round (69th overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft. During his tenure in Seattle, he posted 661 receptions for 8,594 yards and 61 touchdowns. He departed as the franchise's second all-time leader in receptions, yards and touchdowns, trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famer **Steve Largent**.

Lockett also became a decorated return specialist with the Seahawks. His return totals for Seattle included 145 punt returns for 1,078 yards and one touchdown and 127 kickoff returns for 3,188 yards and two scores. As a rookie in 2015, he was named to the Pro Bowl as a returner and added first-team Associated Press All-Pro recognition. He earned second-team AP All-Pro recognition in 2016 and 2017.

Lockett was a member of six playoff teams during his time in Seattle. His Seahawks postseason totals included 29 receptions for 510 yards and two touchdowns in seven games.

From 2019 to 2022, Lockett amassed at least 70 receptions and 1,000 yards in four consecutive seasons, matched during that stretch only by Chiefs tight end **Travis Kelce**. He achieved a career high with 100

receptions in 2020, followed by a career-high 1,175 receiving yards in 2021.

In 2024, Lockett played in 17 games for the second straight year, registering 49 catches for 600 yards and two scores in his final year in Seattle.

As a college player, the Tulsa, Okla., native was the first Kansas State player to earn an All-American honor in each of his four seasons with the team (2012-14). He set several school records including career receptions (249), receiving yards (3,710) and receiving touchdowns (29). He finished as Kansas State's all-time top kickoff returner in attempts (77) and yards (2,196).

Wide receiver **Calvin Ridley** is in his seventh NFL season and his second season with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 15, 2024.

During the 2024 campaign, Ridley led the Titans offense with 64 receptions and 1,017 receiving yards and caught four touchdown passes. His 15.9-yard receiving average in 2024 ranked fifth in the NFL among qualifiers. Only Ridley and Philadelphia's **A.J. Brown** (67 receptions for 1,079 yards, 16.1 avg.) accumulated at least 60 receptions and 1,000 receiving yards with an average of at least 15.0 yards per catch. Ridley also rushed for 55 yards and a touchdown.

Ridley's 2024 season was his third career 1,000-yard receiving season (2020 and 2023), and it was the franchise's 12th 1,000-yard receiving season during its "Titans era" (1999 to present). He became the ninth player in NFL history to have at least one 1,000-yard receiving season with three different teams, joining **Brandin Cooks** (four teams), **Brandon Marshall** (four), **Amari Cooper** (three), **DeAndre Hopkins** (three), **Irving Fryar** (three), **Randy Moss** (three), **Terrell Owens** (three) and **Tony Martin** (three). Ridley became the first player in NFL history to secure his first three 1,000-yard receiving seasons with three different teams.

Prior to joining the Titans, Ridley appeared in 66 NFL games with 52 starts. He was originally drafted by the Atlanta Falcons with the 26th overall pick of the 2018 NFL Draft and was traded to the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2022. His statistical totals with the Falcons and Jaguars included 324 receptions for 4,358 yards and 36 touchdowns.

In 2023, Ridley started a career-high 17 games for the Jaguars and led the team with 1,016 yards and eight receiving touchdowns on 76 catches.

From 2018 through 2020, no member of the 2018 draft class had more receptions or touchdown catches than Ridley, who totaled 217 grabs and 26 scores for the Falcons during that span. His 3,061 receiving yards ranked second in his draft class behind only **DJ Moore's** 3,156. Ridley's 90 receptions and 1,374 yards in 2020 were career highs.

As a rookie in 2018, Ridley played in all 16 games and accumulated 64 receptions. He led all rookie receivers in the NFL with 821 receiving yards and a team-high 10 receiving touchdowns, including an NFL-rookie record six receiving scores in the team's first four games. He was named to the All-Rookie team by the Professional Football Writers of America.

A native of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Ridley attended the University of Alabama, where he played in 44 games over three seasons (2015-17). He finished his career second in Crimson Tide history with 224 receptions and 19 receiving touchdowns. He also ranked third with 2,781 receiving yards, while totaling eight career 100-yard receiving games to tie for third in the Alabama record books.

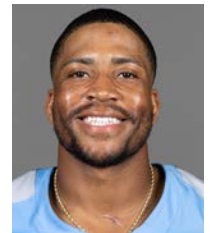

Lloyd Cushenberry III is in his sixth NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 14, 2014.

Cushenberry was voted a permanent team captain prior to the 2024 season. He then started the first eight games at center before landing on injured reserve for the remainder of the season.

Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Cushenberry played his first four NFL seasons with the Denver Broncos after the team selected him in the third round (83rd overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft.

JC Latham is in his second NFL season. He was drafted by the Titans with the seventh overall pick in the first round of the 2024 NFL Draft.

As a rookie, Latham finished the season with 17 starts at left tackle, joining **Jack Conklin** (2016), **Chance Warmack** (2013) and **Michael Roos** (2005) as the franchise's only rookie offensive linemen in the "Titans era" (1999–present) to start every game. He was the first to do so exclusively at left tackle. Pro Football Focus named him to its All-Rookie team.

Latham did not miss an offensive snap during his rookie season. He led all rookie offensive linemen and ranked third among all rookies in 2024 with 1,032 offensive snaps. Only Chicago quarterback **Caleb Williams** (1,052) and Denver quarterback **Bo Nix** (1,040) played more offensive snaps than Latham among the 2024 rookie class.

Prior to entering the NFL, Latham spent three seasons at the University of Alabama, where he appeared in 41 total games, including 27 consecutive starts at right tackle to conclude his collegiate career. He was credited with allowing only four sacks during his time with the Tide.

**Dan Moore Jr.** is in his fifth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans on March 13, 2025.

Prior to joining the Titans, Moore spent the previous four seasons (2021-24) with the Pittsburgh Steelers. He started 66 total games—all at left tackle—protecting the blind side for all but two contests during his time in the Steel City. During that span, Moore ranked third in the NFL in offensive snaps (4,109) played by tackles, trailing only **Penei Sewell** (4,328) and **Jawaan Taylor** (4,135).

In each of Moore's four seasons with the Steelers, running back **Najee Harris** surpassed 1,000 rushing yards. In 2023, the Steelers offensive line allowed only 36 sacks, which ranked ninth in the NFL.

Moore was drafted by the Steelers in the fourth round (128th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft after attending Texas A&M University. The Beaumont, Texas, native appeared in 44 games with 37 starts for the Aggies, including starts at left tackle in each of the final 36 games of his collegiate career.

**Peter Skoronski** is in his third NFL season. He was selected by the Titans with the 11th overall pick in the first round of the 2023 NFL Draft.

During his first two seasons, Skoronski started 31 games at left guard. After missing three of the first four games during his rookie season due to an appendectomy, he started the next 30 games through the end of the 2024 campaign. In 2024, he did not miss a snap.

As a rookie in 2023, Skoronski started 14 games at left guard and helped running back **Derrick Henry** finish second in the NFL with 1,167 rushing yards. He was one of nine NFL rookie offensive linemen in 2023 to register 14 or more starts, and he joined **Nicholas Petit-Frere** (2022), **Jack Conklin** (2016), **Chance Warmack** (2013), **Michael Roos** (2005) and **Jacob Bell** (2004) as the only rookie offensive linemen to record at least 14 starts for the franchise during its "Titans era" (1999–present).

During a three-year career at Northwestern University, Skoronski started all 33 games at left tackle without missing a game. He earned second-team All-Big Ten honors as a freshman and first-team recognition in each of the next two seasons. He became the first offensive lineman in program history to earn two All-Big Ten first-team awards.

As a junior in 2022, he was named the Rimington-Pace Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year—the first ever by a Northwestern lineman—after starting all 12 games at left tackle. He was the first player in school history to become a unanimous first-team All-American and was named first-team All-Big Ten by coaches and media. He finished as a finalist for the 2022 Outland Trophy.

When the Titans drafted Skoronski, he became Northwestern's highest draft selection since guard **Chris Hinton** went to Denver with the fourth pick in 1983, and he was the 11th player in program history to be picked in the first round.

His grandfather, **Bob Skoronski Sr.**, was a left tackle for the Green Bay Packers, playing nine total seasons with the franchise. He was a permanent offensive captain for the Packers under **Vince Lombardi** and played on five NFL championship teams. In 1976, he was inducted into the Packers Hall of Fame. **Bob Skoronski Jr.**, Peter's father, was an All-Ivy League football player at Yale.

Kevin Zeitler is in his 14th NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 13, 2025.

Prior to his arrival in Tennessee, Zeitler appeared in 198 games with 197 starts in 13 total seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals (2012-16), Cleveland Browns (2017-18), New York Giants (2019-20), Baltimore Ravens (2021-23) and Detroit Lions (2024). From the time he entered the NFL in 2012 through the 2024 campaign, he played more offensive snaps (12,443) than any other offensive lineman in the league.

In 2023, he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time after starting 15 contests in his final season with the Ravens. Then, in 2024, he was a 16-game starter at right guard for the Lions.

Zeitler also arrived in Tennessee with significant playoff experience. He accumulated seven total starts over four playoff seasons with the Bengals (2012-15) and two postseasons with the Ravens (2022-23). Additionally, he contributed to Detroit's 2024 division championship but was inactive during the playoffs due to injury.

Zeitler entered the NFL with the Bengals as first-round selection (27th overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft. As a rookie, he was named to the Pro Football Writer's Association All-Rookie team.

At the University of Wisconsin, Zeitler played in 43 career games with 36 starts in four seasons (2008-11). He helped the Badgers to consecutive Big Ten titles and Rose Bowl berths in his junior and senior campaigns, and as a senior, he earned first-team All-Big Ten honors.

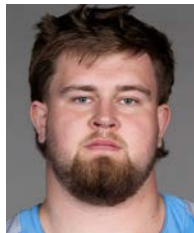

Defensive lineman **Sebastian Joseph-Day** is in his seventh NFL season and his second season with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 20, 2024.

During the 2024 campaign, Joseph-Day registered 17 games played for the first time in his career. His first year in Tennessee concluded with 44 tackles, 2.5 sacks, 14 quarterback pressures, three tackles for loss and one pass defended for the NFL's second-overall ranked defense.

Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Joseph-Day totaled 71 games played and 68 starts for the Los Angeles Rams (2018-21), Los Angeles Chargers (2022-23) and San Francisco 49ers (2023). His statistical totals during that time included 230 tackles, 11 sacks, one interception, five passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

In 2023, Joseph-Day started the first 14 games of the season with the Chargers and collected 32 tackles, three sacks and 25 quarterback pressures. After being released by the Chargers, he was signed by the 49ers as a free agent on Dec. 27 and saw action as a reserve in the final two regular season contests, amassing five tackles. He then appeared as a reserve in all three of the 49ers' postseason contests and registered three tackles, including a tackle in Super Bowl LVIII.

Joseph-Day originally entered the NFL as a sixth-round pick (195th overall) of the Rams in 2018. After not seeing game action his entire rookie campaign, he totaled 38 starts and six sacks over the next three seasons with the Rams, culminating with an appearance in the Rams' Super Bowl LVI victory. He then joined the Chargers during the 2022 offseason and played in 30 regular season games with the club before heading to San Francisco.

The Stroudsburg, Pa., native played five seasons at Rutgers, where he amassed 90 total tackles, 3.5 sacks, two passes defended, two forced



fumbles and one fumble recovery.

#### 2025 Game Notes:

- **At Denver (9/7)**, started and notched five tackles and recovered a fumble caused by a Jeffery Simmons strip sack in the second quarter. The turnover yielded three points for the Titans after a Joey Slye field goal on the ensuing possession. It was his second career fumble recovery.

## #98 • DT JEFFERY SIMMONS

Defensive lineman **Jeffery Simmons** completed is in his seventh NFL season in 2025. He was selected by the Titans in the first round (19th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft.

During his first six seasons, Simmons earned three Pro Bowl berths (2021-22, 2024), was a four-time team captain (2021-24), and was nominated two times for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award (2023-24). During that span, he appeared in 84 games with 82 starts, accumulating 316 tackles, 31.5 sacks, 24 passes defensed, five forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries. He was second on the defense in sacks during that span behind only **Harold Landry III** (46).

Simmons missed only one game in 2024. His 16 starts made up the second-highest total of his career through six seasons behind his 17 starts in 2021. Among his season totals, he set career highs with 76 tackles and two forced fumbles, and he added five sacks and a team-high 42 quarterback pressures. He was rewarded with his third Pro Bowl invitation.

Simmons' 76 tackles ranked second on the Titans in 2024. It was the best number for any defensive lineman for the organization in its "Titans era" (1999 to present), topping defensive end **Kyle Vanden Bosch's** previous mark of 75 tackles in 2006 (press box statistics). Among NFL defensive linemen in 2024, Simmons finished second in tackles behind Carolina's **A'Shawn Robinson** (80).

The 2024 campaign marked Simmons' fourth consecutive season

with at least five sacks. His 31.5 career sacks through 2024 ranked 13th in franchise history and sixth for the organization during its "Titans era" (1999 to present).

In 2023, although he was limited to 12 games and finished the season on injured reserve, he managed to register 5.5 sacks, marking his third consecutive season to reach that number or higher. He added 44 tackles, 38 quarterback pressures, 11 tackles for loss, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and one pass defensed. For the first time in his career, he received the honor of the team's nomination for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award.

In 2022, Simmons appeared in 15 games and anchored a unit that ranked first in the NFL in rushing defense (76.9 opponent rushing yards per game). En route to his second consecutive Pro Bowl appearance, he totaled 53 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 43 quarterback pressures, nine tackles for loss, one forced fumble and a career-high seven passes defensed, which tied for the fourth-best mark among all NFL defensive linemen. Simmons and Arizona's **J.J. Watt** were the NFL's only players in 2022 with at least seven sacks and seven passes defensed.

Before the start of the 2021 season, Simmons was named a team captain for the first time in his career, and he went on to become one of six players on the roster to start all 17 games. He was named to his first career Pro Bowl and added Associated Press second-team All-Pro honors after setting career highs in several categories, including sacks (8.5), tackles (54), quarterback pressures (58), tackles for loss (12) and passes defensed (six). He led the squad in pressures and placed third in sacks. Among all defensive tackles in the NFL, his 8.5 sacks ranked sixth. In the divisional playoffs, he set a franchise postseason record with three sacks.

In 2020, Simmons appeared and started in 15 games. With three defensive fumble recoveries, he tied **Chase Young** for the most in the NFL in 2020 and was the first Titans defender with three fumble recoveries in a season since 2005, when linebacker **Brad Kassell** accomplished the feat. Simmons ranked second on the team with 19 quarterback pressures and added 49 tackles, three sacks, three tackles for loss, five passes defensed and one forced fumble. In the franchise's "Titans era" (since 1999), he became the first player to post at least three fumble recoveries, three sacks and five passes defensed in the same season. He also had three tackles and a tackle for loss in one playoff contest.

Simmons began his rookie season on the non-football injury list due to a knee injury he suffered during training in February 2019. He missed the first six games of the season before joining the 53-man roster in Week 7.

His rookie totals included 40 tackles, two sacks, two tackles for loss, 14 quarterback pressures and one pass defensed in nine games (seven starts). He added four tackles, three quarterback pressures and a fumble recovery in three playoff contests.

During a three-year career as a defensive tackle at Mississippi State, Simmons appeared in 38 contests with 28 starts. He finished his career ranked sixth in school history with 32.5 tackles for loss. He also tied for sixth in MSU annals with five forced fumbles and tied for fourth with three blocked kicks. His totals also included 163 tackles, seven sacks, seven passes defensed and two defensive touchdowns.

He was a first-team All-SEC selection as a sophomore and junior and was one of two players in the nation to be named a Bednarik Award Semifinalist in both 2017 and 2018.

Simmons and Heyward were the only interior defensive linemen in the league to accomplish the feat.

As a junior in 2018, Simmons was named second-team All-American after totaling 63 tackles, 17 tackles for loss and two sacks. His 17 tackles for loss led the team, ranked fourth in the SEC and were the third-most in single-season school history.

During his sophomore season (2017), he set a career high with five sacks and added 12 tackles for loss. With three total blocked kicks and punts, he became the first SEC player since 2004 to lead the nation in the category.

Simmons is a native of Macon, Miss.

Defensive tackle **T'Vondre Sweat** is in his second NFL season. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (38th overall) of the 2024 NFL Draft.

As a rookie, Sweat appeared in all 17 games with 16 starts. His totals for the NFL's second-ranked overall defense included 51 tackles, one sack, four tackles for loss, one pass defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. He earned All-Rookie honors from Pro Football Focus and Pro Football Writers of America.

Sweat became the franchise's first rookie defensive lineman to start 16 games in a season since defensive end **Jevon Kearse** (16) in 1999, and he was the NFL's first interior defensive lineman to start at least 16 games in a rookie season since **Dexter Lawrence** (16) with the New York Giants in 2019.

During his five-year career at the University of Texas, Sweat appeared in 62 games with 17 starts. He finished his collegiate career with 128 tackles, 17.5 tackles for loss, five sacks, 14 passes defended, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries and one blocked extra point.

In 2023, Sweat's final collegiate campaign, he played in all 14 games with eight starts. His 45 tackles, 18 solo tackles, eight tackles for loss, two sacks, four pass breakups and one blocked kick all established career highs, and he added a two-yard touchdown reception on offense. His efforts

earned him the 2023 Outland Trophy, which is presented to the nation's top interior lineman. He also garnered unanimous first-team All-American, Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year and unanimous first-team All-Big 12 honors. He was the fifth Texas defensive tackle to be a unanimous All-American.

As a senior in 2022, Sweat played in all 13 games with nine starts and established a then-career high with 30 tackles and added 2.5 tackles for loss, seven quarterback hurries and four pass breakups. He was named honorable mention All-Big 12 by the league's coaches.

Linebacker **Cody Barton** is in his seventh NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 13, 2025.

After Barton was selected in the third round (88th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft by the Seattle Seahawks, he spent four seasons in Seattle, followed by one season each in Washington (2023) and Denver (2024). During the first six years of his career, he recorded 43 starts in 95 games played. His statistics during that time included 419 tackles, 3.5 sacks, 31 quarterback pressures, 10 tackles for loss, five interceptions, 14 passes defended, three forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

In 2024, Barton played in all 17 games with 14 starts at linebacker for the Broncos, who finished the season in the playoffs. He recorded 104 tackles, two tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks, five passes defended, two interceptions, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. He appeared in the final seven games of the season and totaled 14 tackles on defense while ranking third on the team with eight tackles on special teams. Outside linebacker **Dre'Mont Jones** is in his seventh NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed as an unrestricted on March 14, 2025.

Jones joined the Titans after six combined seasons with the Denver Broncos (2019-22) and Seattle Seahawks (2023-24). In that span, he played in 90 games with 52 starts and totaled 210 tackles, 30.5 sacks, one interception, 40 stops for loss, three forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Additionally, he blocked a pair of field goals.

The Broncos selected Jones in the third round (71st overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft. Outside linebacker **Arden Key** is in his eighth NFL season and his third campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 20, 2023.

In 2024, he participated in the first 16 games of the season with a career-high 15 starts. When he was inactive for the season finale, it ended his streak of 75 consecutive games played. His 6.5 sacks in 2024 tied his career high (2021) and ranked second on the team, and he also established career highs with 42 total tackles and 11 tackles for loss. He added 38 quarterback pressures, one pass defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

In 2023, Key appeared in 17 games for the third consecutive season and registered nine starts—the most since starting 10 times in 2018 as a rookie with Oakland. He ranked second on the team with a career-high 57 quarterback pressures, and his six sacks provided the second-best total of his career. He added 30 tackles, four tackles for loss, two passes defended and two forced fumbles.

Key originally entered the NFL as a third-round pick (87th overall) of the Oakland Raiders in 2018 and spent his first three campaigns with the organization. Outside linebacker **Oluwafemi Oladejo** (pronounced "oh-loo-wah-FEH-me oh-luh-DAY-jo") was selected by the Titans in the second round (52nd overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft.

After playing two seasons at the University of California (2021-22), Oladejo finished his collegiate career with two seasons at UCLA (2023-24). He began college as an off-the-ball linebacker before transitioning to the edge position during his senior campaign at UCLA. With 46 games played and 27 starts over his four combined seasons, he totaled 238 total tackles, 24 stops for loss, six sacks, a forced fumble and three fumbles recoveries.

As a senior at UCLA in 2024, Oladejo started two games at inside linebacker before moving to the edge spot. He recorded starts in all 12 games on the season and logged 57 total tackles, 13.5 tackles for loss, 4.5 sacks and two pass breakups. His 13.5 stops for loss, 4.5 sacks and six quarterback hurries led the team. After the season, he was named the Kenny Clark Award winner for the team's most outstanding defensive lineman.

Cornerback **Roger McCreary** is in his fourth NFL season in 2025. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (35th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.

During his first three seasons, McCreary appeared in 47 games with 35 starts. He ranked second for the team with 15 total passes defended, while his 21 tackles for loss led the team's defensive backs and ranked third for the defense. His 220 tackles from 2022 to 2024 tied for the NFL's fourth-highest total among cornerbacks. He and the New York Jets' **D.J. Reed** (220) trailed only Buffalo's **Taron Johnson** (252), San Francisco's **Deommodore Lenoir** (246) and Indianapolis' **Kenny Moore II** (236). McCreary's three-year totals also included two interceptions and three sacks.

In 2024, McCreary saw action in 15 games with seven starts, primarily as the nickel defensive back. He ranked second on the team with 12 tackles for loss, which tied Cincinnati Bengals cornerback **Mike Hilton's** total for the most in the NFL among defensive backs. McCreary added 50 total tackles, one sack and one pass defended.

In 2023, McCreary ranked third on the team and led all Titans defensive backs with 86 tackles. Among all NFL cornerbacks, his 86 tackles tied Las Vegas' **Nate Hobbs** for the third-highest total behind Johnson (98) and Indianapolis' **Kenny Moore II** (93). McCreary finished third on the Titans defense with 85 tackles, ranked second on the defense with eight passes defended, and added one interception, two tackles for loss and one quarterback pressure.

During four seasons at Auburn (2018-21), McCreary appeared in 43 games with 23 starts and posted 135 tackles, five interceptions, 35 passes defended, 10 stops for loss, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries.

As a senior in 2021, McCreary started 12 games at cornerback for the Tigers and collected a career-best 49 tackles, an interception, a sack, two stops for loss and a team-best 16 passes defended. He was a first-team All-America selection by The Athletic, Associated Press, ESPN and Reese's Senior Bowl.

Cornerback **L'Jarius Sneed** is in his sixth NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was acquired by the Titans in a trade with the Kansas City Chiefs on April 1, 2024.

Sneed started five games before missing the remainder of the season due to a quad injury. He was placed on injured reserve on Nov. 23. His statistics prior to the injury included 23 tackles and two tackles for loss.

Sneed spent four seasons with the Chiefs after they selected him in the fourth round (138th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft. During that time, he tallied 10 interceptions, 40 passes defended and 6.5 sacks in 57 games. He and Harrison Smith were the only two NFL players from 2020 to 2023 to record at least 10 interceptions and 6.5 sacks.

Sneed also arrived in Tennessee with 13 games of postseason experience. He helped the Chiefs win two Super Bowls (LVII, LVIII), and his seven passes defended tied for third in the postseason from 2020 to 2023. He became one of five NFL players from 2000 to 2023 with at least 75 tackles, two sacks and seven passes defended in the postseason, joining **Ray Lewis**, **James Farrior**, **Brian Dawkins** and **Rodney Harrison**.

In 2023, he started 16 games at cornerback and amassed 78 tackles, two interceptions, a career-best 14 passes defended and a fumble recovery. Three-time Pro Bowl safety **Quandre Diggs** is in his 11th NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2025. He re-signed on Aug. 7, 2025 after initially joining the Titans as a free agent on Aug. 6, 2024.

Diggs was limited to eight games in 2024 due to a foot injury. Prior to being placed on injured reserve, he tallied 42 tackles.

Before arriving in Tennessee, Diggs totaled nine seasons between his time with the Detroit Lions (2015-19) and Seattle Seahawks (2019-23). He was originally drafted by the Lions in the sixth round (200th overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft and later traded to the Seahawks during the 2019 campaign. His career totals with the Lions and Seahawks included 137 games played, 112 starts, 24 interceptions, 56 passes defended, 574 tackles, one sack, five forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. He was named to three consecutive Pro Bowls from 2020 to 2022.

In 2023, Diggs started every game for the Seahawks for the fourth consecutive season. He totaled a career-high 95 tackles to go along with one interception and five passes defended.

From 2017 through 2022, Diggs was the NFL's only player to record at least three interceptions every season. He set a career benchmark with five interceptions in 2020 and matched the number in 2021.

Diggs started a total of eight games in his first two years in Detroit. In his third season, he registered 11 starts before starting 16 games for the first time in 2018.

A native of Houston, Texas, Diggs played cornerback at the University of Texas, where he never missed a game in four seasons, appearing in 52 games with 49 starts. Safety **Amani Hooker** is in his seventh NFL season in 2025. He was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (116th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft.

During his first six seasons, Hooker's totals included 12 interceptions, 31 passes defended and 315 tackles in 80 games (51 starts). Only **Kevin Byard** had more interceptions for the team from 2019 through 2024.

In 2024, Hooker appeared in 14 games. He led the Titans defense with a career-best five interceptions, and he tied for the team lead with a career-high nine passes defended. Safety **Xavier Woods** is in his ninth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as a free agent on March 14, 2025.

Woods arrived in Tennessee with eight years of NFL experience, including four seasons with the Dallas Cowboys (2017-20), one season with the Minnesota Vikings (2021) and three seasons with the Carolina Panthers (2022-24). During that span, he appeared in 123 games with 111 starts and totaled 616 tackles, 13 interceptions, 47 passes defended, 11 stops for loss, one sack, five forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries.

Playing in Carolina in 2024, Woods did not miss a defensive snap and led the league in the category with 1,152, according to TruMedia. He set a career best with 119 tackles and tied his career high with three interceptions.

Long snapper **Morgan Cox** is in his 16th NFL season and his fifth campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 19, 2021.

In 2024, Cox handled all of the team's long snapping duties for the fourth consecutive season. With 68 consecutive games played in his first four seasons with the Titans, he finished the 2024 campaign with the longest active streak of games played for the team. It was the 12th time in his career he appeared in every game for his team.

With Cox serving as the team's long snapper, kicker **Nick Folk** led the NFL in field goal percentage for the second consecutive season in 2024. Folk connected on 21 of 22 field goals for an NFL-best rate of 95.5 percent. Meanwhile, punter **Ryan Stonehouse** ranked third in the NFL with an average of 50.6 yards per punt attempt. Also in 2024, Cox was a finalist for the NFL's Bart Starr Award for the second consecutive year.

Cox finished the 2024 season with a career total of 233 games played. He ranked 10th among all active NFL players, and his total also moved him past **Reggie White** (232 games) for the fourth-most NFL games played by a former University of Tennessee Volunteer behind tight end **Jason Witten** (271 NFL games), quarterback **Peyton Manning** (266) and punter **Dustin Colquitt** (255).

In 2023, Cox's efforts helped Folk lead the NFL in field goal accuracy (96.7 percent) and helped Stonehouse lead the NFL for a second consecutive season in gross punting average (53.1).

In 2022, Cox was named to his fifth career Pro Bowl. He has more Pro Bowl appearances than any other player at his position since the league began naming long snappers to the Pro Bowl in 2004.

His steady play in 2022 helped Stonehouse, a rookie, lead the league and set a new NFL record with a 53.1-yard gross punting average. Stonehouse also finished fourth in the NFL and set a rookie record with a 44.0-yard net average. Meanwhile, kicker **Randy Bullock** made 17 of 20 field goals (85.0 percent) and made all 28 extra point attempts.

In 2021, Cox handled all of the team's long snapping duties in 17 regular season games and one postseason game. He helped Bullock finish ninth in franchise history with 120 points in a single season, including three game-winning field goals (Sept. 19 at Seattle, Oct. 31 at Indianapolis and Dec. 23 against San Francisco). He also snapped for punter **Brett Kern**, who had the league's third-best ratio of punts inside the 20 to touchbacks (18:1).

In his first 11 seasons, Cox appeared in 165 regular season games for the Baltimore Ravens, serving as the team's primary long snapper after entering the NFL as an undrafted free agent in 2010. He was selected to four Pro Bowls and was a part of five playoff teams in Baltimore, totaling 10 postseason games played.



In 2020, he earned his fourth career Pro Bowl selection. He helped kicker **Justin Tucker** record his fifth consecutive season with at least 130 points, tying the NFL record of consecutive seasons with 130-plus points. Tucker connected on 26 of 29 field goals (89.7 percent) and was 52 of 53 on extra points (98.1 percent). Cox also snapped on all 51 of **Sam Koch's** 51 punts, as Koch was the NFL's only punter to place at least 20 punts (22) inside in the 20-yard line and have no more than one touchback.

A native of Collierville, Tenn., Cox played 38 games in three seasons (2007-09) as the primary long snapper at the University of Tennessee.

Four-time Pro Bowl punter **Johnny Hekker** is in his 14th NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 13, 2025.

In 13 seasons before arriving in Tennessee, Hekker played in 212 games and punted 963 times for a 46.8-yard gross average (45,052 yards) with 378 punts placed inside the 20-yard line and a 42.9 career net punting average. A member of the NFL 2010's All-Decade team, Hekker is a six-time All-Pro with four first-team selections (2013, 2015-17) and two second-team selections (2014, 2018). He was named to the Pro Bowl following the 2013, 2015, 2016 and 2017 seasons.

Hekker has climbed near the top of several all-time NFL leaderboards during his career. In 2016, he established the NFL single-season record with 51 punts inside the 20 (51 in 2016), and in the same season, he established an NFL record (since broken) with a 46.0 net punting average. Hekker ended the 2024 campaign ranked fifth all-time in career net average (42.9) and tied for 11th all-time in gross average (46.8).

Hekker entered the league as a rookie free agent with the St. Louis Rams in 2012. The Oregon State product spent his first 10 NFL campaigns with the club and helped the Rams conclude the 2021 campaign with a win Super Bowl LVI before signing with the Carolina Panthers as a free agent in 2022.

In 2024, his last season with the Panthers, Hekker saw action in all 17 games and punted 73 times for 3,338 yards (45.7 gross avg.) with 24 punts placed inside the 20-yard line and a 41.9 net punt average.

He is a native of Bothell, Wash.

**2025 Game Notes:**

➤ **At Denver (9/7)**, made his Titans debut and averaged 49.4 yards and 41.0 net yards on eight punts with two punts placed inside the 20. In his 17th career game with eight or more punts, his 49.4-yard gross average ranked fifth in his career in a game with eight or more punts. His gross average also ranked ninth in franchise history for a player in a game with eight or more punts.

➤ **Against the L.A. Rams (9/14)**, averaged 50.0 gross yards and 47.2 net yards on five punts with two punts placed inside the 20. In the first quarter, he pinned the Rams on their 10-yard line with a 48-yard punt, and in the second quarter, he pinned the Rams on their four-yard line with a 44-yard punt. Through two games, he placed three total punts inside the opponent's 10-yard line, which tied for the most by a Titans player through the first two games of a season (Brett Kern in 2011 and 2013) since 2000.

➤ **Against Indianapolis (9/21)**, recorded a 52-yard punt on his only attempt.

➤ **At Houston (9/28)**, averaged 42.6 gross yards and 39.6 net yards on five punts with two punts placed inside the 20.

Kicker **Joey Slye** is in his seventh NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 24, 2025.

Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Slye appeared in 95 games over six seasons with the Carolina Panthers (2019-20), Houston Texans (2022), San Francisco 49ers (2022), Washington Commanders (2022-23) and New England Patriots (2024). The Virginia Tech product has also spent time with the N.Y. Giants and Jacksonville Jaguars. From 2019 to 2024, he made 147 field goals on 180 attempts and added 163 extra points on 182 attempts.

In 2024, Slye played in all 17 games for the Patriots and connected on 26 of 33 field goal attempts and 25 of 26 extra point attempts for a total of 103 points. At San Francisco on Sept. 29, 2024, he set a Patriots record and established his career long with a 63-yard field goal at the end of the second quarter. It tied for the fourth-longest field goal in NFL history.

In his final season in Washington (2023), Slye saw action in all 17 games and handled all kickoffs, field goals and extra points for the Commanders. He connected on 19 of 24 field goals and 32 of 35 extra points for 89 points. Also had 64 touchbacks on 69 kickoffs.

The North Stafford, Va., native attended Virginia Tech (2014-17), where he played four seasons and made 78 of 108 field goal attempts (72.2 percent) and 169 of 172 extra point attempts (98.3 percent).



### 2025 Game Notes:

➤ **At Denver (9/7)**, converted on all four field goal attempts in his Titans debut, including makes of 50, 39, 42 and 35 yards. It was Slye's sixth career game with four or more made field goals. His first attempt as a member of the Titans was a 50-yarder that he made in the first quarter. Joined Nick Folk (Sept. 10, 2023 at New Orleans) and Ryan Succop (Sept. 7, 2014 at Kansas City) as the team's only kickers with four or more field goals in a Week 1 game in the franchise's "Titans era" (since 1999).

➤ **Against the L.A. Rams (9/14)**, made all four field goal attempts, connecting from 55, 37, 57 and 35 yards. He added an extra point. Kicked two of the 10 longest field goals in franchise history in the game. Joined Brandon Aubrey (2024), John Kasay (1996) and Nick Lowery (1985) as the only NFL players since the 1970 merger to make four field goals in each of the first two weeks of a season. Became the first player in franchise history to record two field goals of 55-plus yards in the same game. At the time, his 55-yard field goal in the second quarter tied (four previous) for the fifth-longest field goal in franchise history. Drilled a 37-yard field goal as time expired in the first half. Recorded a 57-yard field goal in the third quarter, the second-longest in franchise history. The only field goal from a longer distance was Rob Bironas' 60-yard game-winner against Indianapolis on Dec. 3, 2006. Increased his career total to 10 field goals of 55 yards or longer. For the first time in his career, he recorded back-to-back performances with four field goals, and for the first time in his career, he reached three consecutive games with at least three field goals made. He connected on a trio of field goals in the 2024 season finale with the Patriots before making four field goals in Week 1 of 2025 at Denver. In his first two games with the Titans, he connected on all eight field goal attempts with makes in six of the team's eight quarters played in 2025. His eight field goals established a new franchise high for any Titans/Oilers kicker in the first two games of a season, breaking the mark of seven field goals by Nick Folk in 2023.

➤ **Against Indianapolis (9/21)**, made two of his four attempts, connecting from 57 and 42 yards and missing from 64 and 62 yards, the latter of which was blocked. In the first quarter, he made a 57-yard field goal to tie the second-longest field goal in franchise history, which he made in the previous game against the L.A. Rams (Sept. 14). He joined Jake Elliott (2025), Brandon Aubrey (2024), Greg Zuerlein (2022) and Brett Maher (2019) as the NFL's only kickers to have a field goal of at least 57 yards in two consecutive games. Slye joined Rob Bironas (2009) as the team's only kickers in the "Titans era" (since 1999) to register three consecutive games with at least one field goal of 50-plus yards, and also became the only franchise kicker other than Bironas (four) with three career field goals of 55-plus yards. He was credited with a career-high two special teams tackles.

FROM AIRPORT TO NISSAN STADIUM (APPROXIMATELY 15 MINUTES):

## NISSAN STADIUM MEDIA WILL CALL/MEDIA ENTRANCE

The media will call window and media entrance are located in the northwest corner of Nissan Stadium near Gate 6. The media will call window opens three hours prior to kickoff.

## FIELD MEDIA VESTS

All members of the media with field access during the game must wear a media vest. Still and video photographers will be issued tan vests, while team-affiliated photographers and videographers (scoreboard, social, coaches' shows, etc.) will be issued gray vests. Additionally, media with in-game field access will be issued an armband. All vests and armbands must be obtained prior to each game at the check-in table. **Vest check-in is located on the third-floor landing near the press box.** All vests must be returned at the conclusion of the game to Titans personnel or to the vest check-in table.

## NISSAN STADIUM PRESS BOX INTERNET ACCESS

Wireless internet access is available free of charge in the Nissan Stadium press box. The login information will be available upon arrival in the press box. A limited number of ethernet lines also are available. Accessing the wireless network works the same in the Nissan Stadium press box as it does in most areas with free connectivity. Titans staff may be able to assist in a limited manner, but you should first contact your company's I.T. department with any questions.

## FROM NISSAN STADIUM PRESS BOX TO INTERVIEW ROOMS

Take the press box elevator (Level 3) to field level (Level 1). The Titans interview room is immediately on the right. Turn left and continue straight along the concourse to reach the visiting team's interview room (white line).

## POSTGAME POLICIES

Reporters with press box credentials will not be allowed on the field during pregame activities or during the game itself. Press box credentials do NOT provide access to the field at the two-minute warning in the fourth quarter. Media will be allowed to gather in the Titans interview room to watch the end of the game or remain in the press box to make the short walk down to service level at the conclusion of the game. Interviews with Titans players are not permitted on the field following the game. The press conference will begin approximately 10 minutes following the conclusion of the game and will be held in the interview room across from the Titans locker room. Key players also will be brought to the interview room. Simultaneously, the locker room will open to credentialed media members with a working function. The press conference audio will be played live over the press box speakers.

## POSTGAME QUOTES

Quotes from each team's head coach and key players will be transcribed and distributed throughout the Nissan Stadium press box following the game. The quotes also will be available at [www.TennesseeTitans.com/media](http://www.TennesseeTitans.com/media).

## POOL REPORTS

Pool reporters are assigned by the Pro Football Writers of America. Requests for pool reports with game officials must be made in advance through the home team's media relations. Interviews will be conducted virtually. Pool reports will be recorded, transcribed and then distributed in the press box.
