TITANS TRAVEL TO MIAMI FOR MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL



Tennessee Titans (0-3) at Miami Dolphins (1-2)

Monday, Sept. 30, 2024 • 7:30 p.m. EDT/6:30 p.m. CDT • Hard Rock Stadium • Miami Gardens, Fla. • TV: ESPN & WSMV-4

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Titans (0-3) return to Miami this week for their second Monday Night Football game at Hard Rock Stadium (64,992) within a 10-month span. Kickoff against the Dolphins (1-2) is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. EDT/6:30 p.m. CDT. The two teams last played in front of a national Monday

night audience on Dec. 11, 2023. In a thrilling comeback led by

then-rookie quarterback **Will Levis**, the Titans scored 15 points in 51 seconds, erasing a 14-point deficit to win 28-27. They became the first NFL team since the Oakland Raiders in 1976 (vs. Pittsburgh) to win in

regulation after trailing by 14 or more points with less than three minutes to go in the fourth quarter.

The Titans own a 26-19 all-time record on Monday Night Football, including nine wins in their past 12 appearances. Against the Dolphins, they are 3-0 in Monday night games.

THE BROADCAST

This week's game will be nationally televised on ESPN. In Nashville, fans also can watch on WSMV Channel 4. The game will be streamed on ESPN+ and NFL+, which offers access to local games and all primetime games on phones and tablets. More information on ways to watch NFL games <u>can be found here</u>. The broadcast team for Monday night includes play-by-play announcer **Chris Fowler**, analysts **Louis Riddick** and **Dan Orlovsky**, reporter **Laura Rutledge**, and rules analyst **Jerry Bergman**.

The Titans Radio Network and Nashville flagship 104.5 The Zone carry all Titans action across the Mid-South with the "Voice of the Titans" **Mike Keith**, analyst **Dave McGinnis**, sideline reporter **Ramon Foster**, executive producer/gameday host **Rhett Bryan** and co-host **Amie Wells**.

Additionally, Westwood One will broadcast the game to a national radio audience. Play-by-play announcer **J.P. Shadrick** and analyst **Ross Tucker** have the call.

LAST WEEK AGAINST THE PACKERS

In Week 3, the Titans played at home for the second consecutive week, hosting the Green Bay Packers at Nissan Stadium. The Packers used three takeaways and eight sacks on defense and 188 rushing yards on offense to secure a 30-14 victory.

Levis, making his 12th career start, completed 26 of 34 passes for 260 yards. He threw for a pair of touchdowns: a one-yarder to tight end **Nick Vannett** and an 11-yarder to wide receiver **DeAndre Hopkins**.

On defense, the Titans generated three sacks. Inside linebacker Kenneth Murray Jr. set a career high with a pair of sacks, and defensive tackle Jeffery Simmons added another.

THE DOLPHINS

The Dolphins opened the season with a victory against the Jacksonville Jaguars, followed by a loss at the hands of the Buffalo Bills. Last week at Seattle, they made their first road appearance of the season and fell by a final score of 24-3.

Featuring quarterback **Tua Tagovailoa** and wide receiver **Tyreek Hill**, the Dolphins produced the NFL's top-ranked overall offense (401.3 total yards per game) and passing offense (265.5) in 2023. However, Tagovailoa is currently on injured reserve after leaving the Bills contest with a concussion.

With Tagovailoa out for a minimum of four games, quarterback **Skylar Thompson** registered his third career start last week at Seattle. He passed for 107 yards before leaving the contest in the third quarter with an injury of his own. His replacement was **Tim Boyle**, who finished the game with 79 passing yards.

Head coach **Mike McDaniel** is in his third campaign with the Dolphins. In 2023, he led his team to an 11-6 record and its second consecutive playoff appearance.



SERIES HISTORY

This week the Titans and Dolphins will renew a rivalry that began in 1966, when the Dolphins entered the American Football League. The Titans are 19-21 all-time against Miami, including a playoff victory in 1978.

Nine of the last 12 Titans-Dolphins meetings in the regular season have been played at Hard Rock Stadium, most recently on Monday night, Dec. 11, 2023. By scoring 15 points in a span of 51 seconds in the fourth quarter, the Titans came back from a 14-point deficit and won by a final score of 28-27. It was the first time in franchise history that the Titans won in regulation after trailing by 14 or more points with less than three minutes to go in the fourth quarter, and the Titans became the first team to accomplish the feat since 1976 (Oakland vs. Pittsburgh on Sept. 12, 1976). **Will Levis** became the NFL's first rookie quarterback in the history of Monday Night Football to record a 300-yard passing game (327).

Prior to the 2023 meeting, the last time the teams met in South Florida ended as the longest game in NFL history. On Sept. 9, 2018, two lightning delays turned the season opener at Hard Rock Stadium into a 7-hour, 8-minute affair that Miami, led by then-Dolphins quarterback **Ryan Tannehill**, ultimately won 27-20.

It was not the first Titans-Dolphins game significantly impacted by a weather event. On Sept. 11, 2004, another season opener between the clubs was played in South Florida on Saturday, a day early due to the approaching Hurricane Ivan. The Titans won by a final score of 17-7.

The last time Nissan Stadium hosted the Titans and Dolphins was Jan. 2, 2022. Using 132 rushing yards and a touchdown by running back **D'Onta Foreman**, the Titans never trailed in the contest and won by a final score of 34-3. The victory secured the Titans' second consecutive AFC South title.

The Dolphins began play in 1966 as the AFL's first expansion franchise. Playing the Dolphins twice a year from 1966-69, the Oilers won five of eight games before 1970, when the Oilers moved to the newly-formed AFC Central Division and the Dolphins began play in the AFC East.

The teams have met in the postseason just once. In 1978, the Oilers defeated the Dolphins 17-9 at the Orange Bowl for Houston's first playoff win since 1961. The Oilers continued their postseason play on the road, winning at New England before falling to Pittsburgh in the AFC Championship Game.

Earlier in the 1978 season, the Oilers and the Dolphins were featured in a memorable Monday Night game, a 35-30 Oilers win that included four rushing touchdowns by **Earl Campbell**.

With two delays during the game due to lightning, the 7-hour, 8-minute contest is the longest in NFL history ... Miami's Ryan Tannehill completes two touchdown passes to Kenny Stills, including a 75-yarder ... Each team has a kickoff return touchdown in the fourth quarter, including Darius Jennings (94 yards) for the Titans ... The Titans lose Marcus Mariota, Taylor Lewan and Delanie Walker with injuries ... Reshad Jones notches two of the Dolphins' three interceptions.

2021 Week 17 • Jan. 2, 2022 • Dolphins 3 at TITANS 34

The Titans never trail and limit the Dolphins to a field goal in the second quarter, clinching the AFC South title on a 36-degree, rainy afternoon at Nissan Stadium ... The Titans defense forces two turnovers, registers four sacks and never allows the Dolphins inside the red zone ... D'Onta Foreman rushes for a career-high 132 yards on 26 carries, including a 21-yard touchdown, as the Titans total 198 rushing yards ... Ryan Tannehill passes for 120 yards, including touchdown connections with tight ends Geoff Swaim and Anthony Firkser ... Dolphins quarterback Tua Tagovailoa is 18-of-38 passing for 205 yards with an interception.

2023 Week 14 • Dec. 11, 2023 • TITANS 28 at Dolphins 27

The Titans erase a 14-point deficit with less than three minutes remaining in the fourth quarter to win on Monday Night Football ... Will Levis directs the comeback and passes for 327 yards and a touchdown after being victimized by Miami's Zach Sieler for a pick-six early in the first quarter ... Derrick Henry is limited to 34 rushing yards but rushes for two touchdowns ... DeAndre Hopkins leads the Titans with 124 yards on seven catches, including a touchdown ... The Dolphins break a 13-13 tie in the fourth quarter by scoring consecutive touchdowns after Tennessee fumbles ... Levis then

by scoring consecutive touchdowns after Tennessee fumbles ... Levis then directs two consecutive touchdown drives, and the Titans defense caps the win with Harold Landry III's third sack of Tua Tagovailoa in the fourth quarter.

TITANS-DOLPHINS: THE LAST MEETING



Week 14: Titans 28, Dolphins 27 Monday, Dec. 11, 2023 • 8:15 p.m. EST • Hard Rock Stadium



In Week 14 of the 2023 season, the Titans traveled to Miami for a prime time matchup against the Dolphins and staged a thrilling comeback to win by a score of 28-27 in the final minutes.

After the Titans started the game going three and out, the Dolphins took over at their own 28-yard line. QB Tua Tagovaila drove Miami down the field with four passes for 48 yards to four different receivers. On the Titans two-yard line, facing second-and-goal, DL Jaleel Johnson knocked the ball loose from Tagovailoa and DL TK McLendon Jr. recovered it at the seven-yard line. However, just three plays later, QB Will Levis was intercepted by DL Zach Sieler at the Titans' five-vard line and returned it for a touchdown for the Dolphins to take an early 7-0 lead.

In the second quarter, the Titans strung together a 14-play, 86-yard drive that culminated in a RB Derrick Henry one-yard touchdown run. The drive featured a 22-yard reception by WR Chris Moore as well as a unsportsmanlike conduct penalty on LB Bradley Chubb to set the Titans up at the Miami 12-yard line. Levis rushed it 11 yards before Henry found the end zone to tie the game. The Dolphins then drove down to the Titans 30-yard line before being forced to try a field goal.

DL Denico Autry blocked the attempt to keep the score tied at 7-7 with 1:51 left in the half.

After trading punts, the Titans started a drive at their own 21-vard line with 28 seconds remaining. The Titans drove 69 yards in six plays including two completions to WR DeAndre Hopkins for 22 yards and 45 yards to bring the Titans to the Dolphins 10-yard line. After two incompletions, K Nick Folk hit the 28-yard field goal as time expired in the first half to give the Titans their first lead of the game at 10-7.

Miami tied the game on the opening possession of the second half with an 11-play, 77-yard drive that ended with a 20-yard field goal from K Jason Sanders after Tennessee stopped Miami's offense at the two-yard line.

With 5:53 remaining in the third quarter, Titans drove 60 yards to the Dolphins five-yard line. Levis found WR Nick Westbrook-Ikhine for what originally was called a touchdown but was later overturned as the Titans settled for a 23-yard field goal by Folk to take the 13-10 lead.

Miami answered with a 31-yard field goal by Sanders to tie the game at 13-13 with 12:37 left in the fourth.

After a muffed punt by DB Eric Garror was recovered at the Tennessee seven-yard line, RB Raheem Mostert scored on a five-yard touchdown run to give the Dolphins a 20-13 lead.

On the very next play, Levis tried to pitch the ball to Henry but the ball fell free and was recovered by the Dolphins at the Titans 12-yard line. Mostert scored three plays later on a five-yard run to make it 27-13 with 4:34 remaining in the game.

The Titans responded with a touchdown less than two minutes later. Levis drove the team nine plays for 75 yards with six completions to four different receivers before finding Hopkins for

the three-yard score. The Titans went for two and Levis found Westbrook-Ikhine in the end zone to make it 27-21 with 2:40 remaining in the game.

The Tennessee defense forced a three and out to give the offense the ball back at their own 36yard line. Two completions for 52 yards later, the Titans were at the Miami 12-yard line. RB Tyjae Spears ran it six yards before Henry finished the drive off with his second touchdown of the day. The Tennessee defense got one more stop after sacking Tagovailoa on fourth-and-two to seal the prime time road victory for the Titans.



TITANS DEFENSE

If the Titans defense holds its opponent under 200 net passing yards for the fourth consecutive game, it will be the team's first time doing so in each of the first four games of the season since 1986 (five games).

S JAMAL ADAMS

> Needs three tackles to reach 500 career tackles (currently 497).

S QUANDRE DIGGS

- Enters the game with a streak of 70 consecutive games started, which is tied (Patrick Queen at 70; Daron Payne at 69 going into Monday, Sept. 23) for the third-longest active streak among NFL defensive players behind only Kevin Byard (124) and Maxx Crosby (79).
- Needs one interception to join seven other active NFL players to reach 25 for his career. Diggs is tied with **Jordan Poyer** (24) for the eighthmost interceptions among active players.

RB TONY POLLARD


Needs one rushing touchdown to reach 25 for his career.

- In 22 career games against Miami, Folk is 39 of 47 on field goals and 43 of 44 on extra point attempts.
- On 9/23/12 at Miami went a perfect three-for-three on field goals and twofor-two on extra point attempts. Made the game-winning 33-yard field goal in overtime for the N.Y. Jets.

WR DeANDRE HOPKINS

- On 10/25/18 against Miami, Hopkins finished with a team-high six receptions for 82 yards and two touchdowns for the Houston Texans.
- On 12/11/23 at Miami, Hopkins led the team with seven receptions and 124 receiving yards with a touchdown. Set up the Titans field goal just before halftime with an acrobatic, 45-yard catch down to the Miami 10-yard line late in the second quarter. Got the Titans to within one score with a three-yard touchdown grab in the fourth quarter. Kickstarted the Titans' game-winning touchdown drive with a 36-yard reception late in the final stanza.

OLB ARDEN KEY

 On 12/11/23 at Miami, Key notched two tackles, including a sack and a team-high-tying six quarterback pressures.

OLB HAROLD LANDRY III

On 12/11/23 at Miami, Landry recorded five tackles, including a career-best three sacks and a team-high-tying six quarterback pressures. Notched the team's first three-sack performance in the regular season since Jeffery Simmons (three) in 2021. Sealed the victory with a three-yard sack of Tua Tagovailoa on fourth-and-two with less than 30 seconds remaining in the contest. Was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts.

QB WILL LEVIS

On 12/11/23 at Miami, Levis completed 23 of 38 passes for 327 yards with touchdown and an interception. Engineered his first career NFL gamewinning drive. He got the Titans within one score with three-yard touchdown toss to DeAndre Hopkins in the fourth quarter and made it a six-point game at 27-21 with a two-point conversion pass to Nick Westbrook-Ikhine in the corner of the end zone in the fourth quarter. Levis then kickstarted the Titans' game-winning touchdown drive with a 36-yard connection to Hopkins late in the final stanza. In the process, Levis became the first NFL rookie quarterback to pass for 300 or more yards on Monday Night Football. Became the franchise's first rookie starting guarterback to win a primetime game since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger. Rushed four times for 15 yards. The Titans became the first team to win a game in regulation after trailing by 14-plus points with less than three minutes remaining in the fourth quarter since the Oakland Raiders against the Pittsburgh Steelers on Sept. 12, 1976 (Raiders trailed 28-14 and won 31-28). It was the first time in Titans/ Oilers history the team accomplished the feat.

RB TONY POLLARD

On 9/22/19 against Miami, Pollard tallied his first career 100-yard outing and touchdown, finishing the game with 103 rushing yards and a score for the Dallas Cowboys.

RB TYJAE SPEARS

On 12/11/23 at Miami, Spears notched career-highs with six receptions for 89 receiving yards. Rushed seven times for 29 yards. Finished with 118 scrimmage yards—the first game of his career with at least 100 scrimmage yards.

Mike McDaniel was named the 11th head coach in Dolphins history in February 2022 after one season as offensive coordinator for the 49ers.

In 2023, McDaniel became the third head coach in franchise history to lead the team to the playoffs in his first two seasons. On the way to 11 wins, Miami produced the league's top-ranked offense in yards (401.3 per game), passing offense (265.5 yards per game) and yards per carry (5.1). Quarterback Tua Tagovailoa led the league with 4,624 passing yards, and wide receiver Tyreek Hill set a personal best with 1,799 receiving yards.

In 2022, his first year as head coach, Miami finished with a 9-8 record and earned a playoff berth for the first time since 2016. Multiple Dolphins reached new career milestones, including Hill, tackle Terron Armstead, linebacker Bradley Chubb, and cornerback Xavien Howard earning Pro Bowl honors. As the offensive play-caller, McDaniel helped the Miami offense finish top 10 in the NFL for the first time since 1995, averaging 364.5 yards per game (6th), and 6.14 yards per play (2nd). Defensively, Miami ranked fourth in run defense, allowing 103 rushing yards per game.

Prior to Miami, McDaniel spent five seasons with the 49ers (2017-22), beginning as the run game specialist in 2017 before being promoted to run game coordinator in 2018 and then to offensive coordinator in 2021. As offensive coordinator, the 49ers finished seventh in total offense (375.5 yards per game) while advancing to the NFC Championship game. During his time as run game coordinator, the 49ers were fifth in the league in rushing with 127 yards per game, and advanced to Super Bowl LIV in 2019.

McDaniel spent the 2015 and 2016 seasons as an offensive assistant with Cleveland. In 2016, Atlanta led the league in scoring (33.8 points per game), advanced to Super Bowl LI, and quarterback Matt Ryan earned AP NFL MVP honors.


Before Atlanta, he spent one season (2014) as wide receivers coach for the Browns and two in the same role for Washington (2011-12), his first position coaching job. In 2013, McDaniel served as running backs coach for the Sacramento Mountain Lions of the United Football League.

A native of Aurora, Colo., McDaniel's first NFL coaching positions came in 2006-08 as an offensive assistant with the Texans and in 2005 as a coaching intern with the Broncos.

- Dolphins assistant quarterbacks coach Chandler Henley was a quality control coach for the Titans from 2018-20.
- Dolpins offensive assistant Jonathan Krause played wide receiver for the Titans in 2016.

- Titans linebackers coach Frank Bush worked with the Dolphins from 2017-18 as an assistant head coach/linebackers.

- Titans wide receiver Calvin Ridley is a native of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., and attended Monarch (Coconut Creek, Fla.) where he was ranked as the nation's top-ranked wide receiver by ESPN, 247Sports and Rivals.
- Titans offensive lineman JC Latham prepped at IMG Academy in Bradenton, Fla., for his junior and senior high school seasons. He would finish as the nation's top-ranked offensive lineman in his class.
- Titans wide receiver Nick Westbrook-Ikhine attended Lake Mary (Fla.) High School where he was named first team all-state, all-district and All-Central Florida as a senior after he recorded 84 receptions for 1,853 yards and 21 touchdowns.
- Other Titans players with Florida hometowns include: offensive tackle Nicholas Petit-Frere (Tampa) and outside linebacker Jaylen Harrell (Tampa).
- Titans general manager Ran Carthon attended Key West High School in Key West, Fla. He then played running back at the University of Florida, totaling 1,353 career rushing yards over four seasons. He was part of the Gators' 2000 SEC Championship team.
- Titans defensive line assistant Clinton McMillan, a native of Oviedo, Fla., played four seasons at the University of Florida, appearing in 48 career games at defensive tackle for the Gators. In his coaching career, McMillan worked as a senior analyst (defense) for Florida State University.

NOTES FROM LAST WEEK'S GAME

TEAM NOTES

- The kickoff temperature at Nissan Stadium was 87 degrees. It tied for the fourth-hottest kickoff temperature (Sept. 19, 2010 vs. Pittsburgh) for a Titans game at Nissan Stadium, which opened in 1999, and the hottest temperature for a Titans home game since Sept. 15, 2019 against Indianapolis, when the venue's record temperature of 93 degrees was reached at kickoff. The heat index for the Titans-Packers game was 90 degrees.
- Only two penalties totaling 15 yards were enforced against the Titans. The two penalties were the fewest by the Titans in a game since being flagged two times at Green Bay on Nov. 17, 2022, and the 15 penalty yards were the fewest by the Titans in a game since Dec. 31, 2023, when the team had 15 penalty yards (three penalties) at Houston.
- The Titans offense scored touchdowns on both of its red-zone opportunities, while the Titans defense limited the Packers offense to one touchdown on three trips inside the 20.
- The Titans offense scored a touchdown on its opening drive of the game for the first time in 2024, marching 70 yards on 10 plays on a series that took 5 minutes and 10 seconds. Will Levis completed a one-yard touchdown pass to Nick Vannett to cap the series.
- The Packers offense had 190 net passing yards against the Titans defense, marking the third consecutive game that the Titans held its opponent under 200 net passing yards. It is the team's first time doing so in each of the first three games of a season since 2014.
- With three sacks against the Packers—two by linebacker Kenneth Murray Jr. and one by defensive tackle Jeffery Simmons—the Titans registered their third consecutive game with at least two sacks. It marked the sixth time in the franchise's "Titans era" (1999 to present) that the team began the season with two or more sacks in the team's first three games.

S JAMAL ADAMS

Registered his first start in a Titans uniform. Totaled three tackles.

WR TYLER BOYD

- Totaled 33 yards on three receptions.
- Converted a third-and-nine with a 20-yard grab in the first quarter.

CB JARVIS BROWNLEE JR.

Totaled two tackles, including a tackle for loss.

WR TREYLON BURKS

Caught one pass for a nine-yard gain.

S QUANDRE DIGGS

- Tied for second on the team with eight tackles.
- Extended his streak to 70 consecutive games started. He entered the week tied (Patrick Queen, Daron Payne) for the third-longest active streak among NFL defensive players behind only Kevin Byard (123) and Maxx Crosby (78).

T JAELYN DUNCAN

Registered his first start of the season (sixth career) as an extra offensive lineman with the offense opening the game in jumbo formation.

S AMANI HOOKER

- Totaled five tackles.
 - Led the team and established a career high with two tackles for loss.

WR DeANDRE HOPKINS

Led the team with six receptions and 73 receiving yards, including a touchdown.

- Scored his first touchdown of the season and the 79th touchdown reception of his career on an 11-yard pass from Will Levis in the third quarter.
- Hauled in a 20-yard pass in the third quarter.
- Notched his 80th career game in which he totaled at least six receptions.
- Extended his active streak to 165 consecutive games with a reception every game he has played since he entered the NFL. He owns the third-longest such streak to begin a career in NFL history behind only Marvin Harrison (190 consecutive games) and Keyshawn Johnson (167).

WR JHA'QUAN JACKSON

- Averaged 12.0 yards on two punt returns and averaged 28.0 yards on three kickoff returns.
- Registered a 33-yard kickoff return in the third quarter.

LB ERNEST JONES IV

- Appeared in his 50th career game.
- Led the defense with 13 tackles. It was the second consecutive week in which he led the defense in tackles.
- Registered his fourth career game with 13 or more tackles.

OLB ARDEN KEY

Led the defense with five quarterback pressures and added three tackles.

OLB HAROLD LANDRY III

Posted four tackles and two quarterback pressures.

QB WILL LEVIS

- In his 12th career start, he completed 26 of 34 passes for 260 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions. His 26 completions were a career high.
- His 76.5 completion percentage established a new career high (minimum of 20 pass attempts). It was the second consecutive week in which he set a career high in completion percentage with a minimum of 20 attempts (67.9 vs. the New York Jets).
- His 76.5 completion percentage tied Ken Stabler (Sept. 28, 1980 at Cincinnati) for fourth place in franchise history in a game in which a quarterback attempted at least 34 passes. Only Steve McNair (79.4 against Jacksonville on Nov. 4, 2001), Warren Moon (78.9 against Detroit on Nov. 5, 1989) and Neil O'Donnell (77.5 against Cleveland on Sept. 19, 1999) have had a higher completion percentage for the franchise in games with at least 34 attempts.
- His 92.8 passer rating ranked second in his career in a game with at least 20 attempts.
- Tallied his third career game with two or more touchdown passes.
- On the team's opening offensive series, he completed a 23-yard pass to Josh Whyle on the first play of the game, added a 20-yard pass to Tyler Boyd, and completed a one-yard touchdown pass to Nick Vannett.
- Completed a screen pass for 29 yards to Tyjae Spears in the third quarter, and later on the same drive, he completed an 11-yard touchdown pass to DeAndre Hopkins.

LB KENNETH MURRAY JR.

- Tied for second on the team with eight tackles.
- Set a career high with two sacks.
- Sacked Malik Willis for a 10-yard loss in the second quarter and later in the second quarter took Willis down for no gain to record his second sack. His first two sacks of the season gave him seven in his career.

TE CHIG OKONKWO

Totaled 15 yards on a pair of receptions.

HEAD COACH BRIAN CALLAHAN

Injury-wise, the only one was Chido (Awuzie), he left with a groin, did not return. We'll see what that looks like next week. End of the day, I've not done a good enough job. We're an 0-3 football team, I'm an 0-3 head coach. It's embarrassing and disappointing. I've got to be a lot better than I've been and this is frustrating and unfortunate and not what I thought we were capable of to start the season. At the end of the day, can't continue to have turnovers like that on offense, even though-we hand seven more points to another team and they did a great job possessing the football. Only got three possessions in the first half and we scored on one of them, we threw interception for a pick six on the other, and the other two, we went three-and-out. We're not consistent enough anywhere offensively, we allowed too many explosives on defense. We still haven't got a turnover. I think we're probably going to be dead last in the turnover margin by a long shot at this point. And that's going to lose you a lot of football games in the NFL, we're not good enough on either side there. We don't protect it well, we don't take it away. We allowed too many yards rushing. We had some tackling issues early. We settled down and then had to get in a drop back situation at the end of the game in the second half as we didn't find much success on the ground versus a good front. And the eight sacks was a result. So ultimately not good enough anywhere.

So Nicholas Petit-Frere (being replaced) was not injury related? It was not.

What happened on Will Levis' pick six? Just got stuck looking too long over there?

I mean, it wasn't really late. Jaire (Alexander) jumped it. He made a nice play. That's an All-Pro corner, and he jumped the route and took a chance on it and made a really nice play. Timing-wise, it wasn't anything wrong with it. He just sat on it, and that happens sometimes. So that's not something I'm mad at Will (Levis) about. I thought everything there was fine, he just made a good play.

Eight sacks, sometimes they overloaded, other times, it was other things. From your perspective, what was going on there?

Everything. We tried to keep guys in to help. We tried to keep seven and eight in protection. Some of it was good, some of it didn't work as well. We lost some one-on-ones, and that's ultimately what happened a few times. We got ourselves into some third-and-longs in a spot where I didn't feel like just calling a quick game on third-and-14 just to get the ball out. I was trying to be competitive. The game wasn't over. And so, we were in some tough spots for pass protection in general, when you're in third-and-12, and 13, and 14. It's difficult. Tried to call a couple of screens and those didn't get off. But yeah, it's frustrating.

Second week in a row Jeffery Simmons has had a penalty that cost you

seven points. Were those both discipline issues?

I don't think so. I was surprised that they called that. I haven't seen that call very often. Again, they call what they call and see how they see it. But, yeah, that was a big momentum shift. We had them off the field with a missed field goal. That's what it is. We can't have—those are critical penalties. That's two weeks in a row. Again, I can't attribute those to discipline. I was surprised it got called and it is what it is. But those are the mistakes that we're making right now, and we just can't quite find a way to create ourselves a break. In this league, you make your own breaks, and we haven't made any of them. And that's a hard thing to swallow.

In two years here and his time here, Malik Willis has never has looked anything close to that. What's it say about your defense that he's capable of looking like that?

Yeah. Malik (Willis) did a nice job. Tip of the cap to Malik and that offensive coaching staff. We let them get in a position in the game that was beneficiary to them, and they made a couple of nice throws. Malik's a very capable quarterback, I think you guys saw his improvement here over the course of training camp. He is capable and they had him in a good spot most of the game. They didn't have to do a lot. They ran the ball well and he made a couple of big throws, which again, every NFL quarterback should be able to make. He did a nice job. So, we didn't do a good enough job.

That fourth down play at the start of the third quarter, was that designed for Will Levis to keep it or did something break down?

It was a roll pass, and it was a little high-low. He had a shot to come back—we call it low-high-low, where you take the low first, check the high and come back. Tony (Pollard) was there, he made a decision, thought he could get it. I couldn't quite tell where he was at where I was standing. I was behind the play. But yeah, I felt like we had—I thought we had a chance on the first one, too. They called timeout right at the snap. I thought that one was going to be a good play. And they called timeout right as we were stopping the ball, unfortunately. So, I was trying to get a spark, I was trying to get us going. I didn't want to just punt the ball. Once I saw I was fourth-and-one and a half, I felt like that was a distance we can go for it. And it was aggressive, but we needed something to get moving and get back in the game. Our defense did a decent job, they held up and only gave up three. So I don't regret it. I don't regret the call. Just a missed opportunity.

You saw a lot of missed tackles. How much of a factor did that end up being? It was huge in the first half. Just felt like we never really had the ball early. They

chewed up a bunch of yards and clock with some missed tackles. Certainly, too many rushing yards, too many missed tackles, I think, at the end of the day for us to—for a team that we knew was going to play like that, just didn't come out and execute well enough. We had a good week of practice. I was confident in how these guys looked and the plan looked and felt really good about where we were coming into the game, and so far, O for. And that's not something that I

How much did Malik Willis' ability to convert on third downs especially in the first half hurt you guys and the defense?

Yeah, those are critical. You get them in a third down situation. He did a few with his legs. He did a nice job. That's what he's done. That's how he's played well the league is using his legs and doing that, and he did a good job. We couldn't get off the field and it allowed them to chew up clock and chew up time and, again, they did a nice job.

The pick-six, would you categorize that as being aggressive and trying to make a play or a stupid mistake?

I think that was just normal. That was just a normal throw. We just threw a hitch route to the boundary and Jaire (Alexander) jumped it. Those things happen, and if you feel like the corner's that aggressive to it, you can move on. But that wasn't a stupid mistake at all, actually. Will (Levis) did some really good things in this game, I thought. We just got to do more of it, and we got to do a better job protecting him.

You're still firmly put on him being your quarterback?

Yeah. There's nothing—we got to play better around him. Again, I'm not going to overreact to an interception. Those things happen. Guys throw picks. We just can't give it to their team. We keep giving up points the other way. It's killer. It's hard to overcome. We've not played a complete game at any phase at any point yet. We're capable of way better than what we put on the field the last three weeks. No one's coming to save us, so we've got to figure it out.

Even though not everybody is putting it all on Will Levis, what do you say to him with all the turnovers that have happened over the first three games? We got to get fixed, whatever that looks like. However that looks, it doesn't really matter. We can't lead the league in turnovers at the quarterback position and expect to win a lot of games. So that part has got to get better.

When you go down the laundry list of all the issues that you brought up and you said not really good enough anywhere, as a head coach, where do you start at trying to get this thing back on the right track?

We've got to do the fundamental things right. We've got to tackle well. We've got to protect the football. We've got to find a way to take it away. We've got to pass protect better than we have. Our defense has played pretty good through three weeks. But they had some moments today that I don't think is up to their standards. So, it's fundamental things. It's staying in gaps, and making tackles, and protecting the football and we'll start there and hopefully that looks better.

Where do you think the gap has been between the Nicholas Petit-Frere you saw making progress in training camp and the guy who's struggled these last couple of weeks?

I don't know. I don't know what the disconnect is. I felt like he had a pretty good camp, was in a good spot and, thus far has not been good enough. Game was tough, game script-wise. Got out of hand a little bit. They got their pass rush going. It's a really good defensive front. We knew what they were capable of doing in the pass rush and we put ourselves in a bad spot as well. That makes it hard when they know you've got to drop back and they're up to scores. They get the pin back and play. That's the that's a dream scenario for them with the way that they're playing football, and they did a great job, and we didn't. So that's about the best I can answer it.

Where do you go from here at right tackle?

We'll see what JD (Jaelyn Duncan) can do. We'll come back and we'll see where we can get better. But at the end of the day, JD came in—I don't know, it was a tough spot to go in, so we'll see. But yeah, I think it's—that job is not solidified by any stretch.

QUARTERBACK WILL LEVIS

What did you feel like happened on the pick six early, was that just a good play by the defense there?

I'd just call it a good play.

With (Jaire) Alexander sitting on that, did you not see him, or did not you think he was going to...?

I thought he had enough access to–I threw it on time. I thought, putting it on the outside shoulder, I think, I'll watch the film, but maybe I could have done a better job of just seeing him stay put and throw it over his head. But quick game, we're trying to take the easiest hitch there. And I thought I had it and obviously didn't.

When you look at today, how much do you give credit to them for making plays? How much again on this team for not doing its job well enough and

making mistakes?

It's a great defense. Obviously, the unscouted looks, I feel like played into their advantage a little bit today. We weren't ready for a couple of those things. I got to be able to do a better job reacting to a couple of those things. They're masking a couple of those looks. We were running man plays into zone. I just got to be better of when those things happen of finding the completions and knowing where our options are. But I haven't watched it yet, obviously, and we'll see kind of if there were things that I had missed or could have done better in those areas. But I'll give credit to them. But we definitely didn't do our job on offense to the best of our ability.

How frustrated are you with yourself that this team hasn't been able to get over the hump yet?

Yeah, I'm this team's quarterback. Every time we take the field and succeed or are defeated, I feel like it's on me. So it's—at least I am a big part of that and I know that. And I have to make sure that I bring my A-game every Sunday to not put our team in tough spots like I have in these few games with the few plays I've made with turning the ball over. And it's tough. I can only look inwardly as to what I can do and then also just do my best to rally everybody else around me. But yeah, it's tough. I'm the quarterback of an 0-3 football team, that's not something that anyone ever wants to say.

Will (Levis), during the week you mentioned needing to rewire your brain. What does that process look like and how can you streamline that this season?

Yeah, it's not like anything that I feel like I can actually like talk to a sports psychologist and fix it like that. It's just getting better. It's just getting better and trusting my process and how I approach my preparation for a game. I think throughout this past week I did a good job with me and my coaches of adding that layer of preparation in, of just getting the extra mental reps of situational football and just things that you can maybe remind yourself before certain plays and situations to not put your team in a worse spot. So yeah, just continuing to work on that and getting better in that area.

Will (Levis), the challenge to get any kind of comfort or rhythm when the pressure is like it was today, especially in the second half?

I just got to react to it and just play with what I have. And obviously it's not going to be a clean pocket every time, I know that. And I've got confidence in those guys to give me the time that I need. But it's making me better, too, though. It's knowing that when there is something in your face and you can't read it out with the timing that you need to get back to the checkdown. I feel like there were a couple of plays today that were like that, that were good to see just because you need to make those type of plays when those things happen, and you can save them essentially. And I think those are plays last year where I might have just been holding on to the ball and taking the sack where we improved a little bit there, I guess. But yeah, it's something that we all got to get better on. I know those guys up front take a lot of pride in what they do, and they want to come in next week and show that they're better than what they put on tape today.

On the scoring drives, it seemed like you found a rhythm. What are some that you liked or plays that were called that you were more comfortable with?

No I think just our openers, we were very comfortable with them. We knew kind of how that first drive was going to look if we were going to get it going. And it was great. It was great for us to respond to their opening score and go down and make it happen. I think that the other one was just like we were able to just kind of start dropping back and throwing a little more. And that was fun just to be able to kind of read things out and take what they give me. A few concepts we had up were dialed up, so that was nice. And I think I just could have done a better job of that towards the end. I was just kind of pressing and trying to get a big run. Yeah, it sucks. But I feel like those two drives were a lot of fun and I got to do more of that.

Are you surprised at all by just the defense today? They've stopped the run fairly well throughout the two games and clearly not able to do that today with (Malik) Willis?

They played well offensively on Green Bay. Malik (Willis) played a good game; he didn't turn the ball over and they ran the ball pretty well. We only had I think 18 plays in that first half and that's credit to them to be able to maintain that possession and run the ball well. And on us we're handing it to them with turnovers. We're last in the league in turnovers. No turnovers on our end. You're not going to win football games when it's like that.

Brian Callahan without hesitation said you're the quarterback moving forward. But he also said that they can't continue to lose games with that amount of turnovers. So for you personally, where are you at confidence wise as well as a sense of urgency to get things turned around to maintain your position?

Yeah, I'm still confident. He said it again in the locker room like it's just something

needs to click with this team and we're just waiting for it. I think our week of practice and how we handled ourselves this week, we had an excellent week of practice, we really thought that this was going to be our turning point. And it sucks that it wasn't. But we're going to keep working every day to try to make it happen next week. We recuperate on the bye week and then have a great last 14 weeks of the season.

Do you feel at all like you're maybe pressing, trying too hard to make things happen?

Not until that last pick. I mean, down a couple of scores, I'm trying to get an explosive. I don't know—just don't throw it, take whatever the completion. But no, I didn't feel like I was pressing at any point other than that play maybe.

Were you impressed by Malik's (Willis) play and did you get a chance to talk to him?

Yeah, I just saw him right afterwards and we talked. And I was. I think that obviously they did some things that our defense wasn't 100 percent prepared for. And that's on him for being able to execute those things and put the ball in play. And like I said, just protect the football. So, happy for him. When he got in there last week, I was pumped for him. And then obviously just rooting for him other than when he plays us. So, it was great to see him afterwards—him and Sean (Clifford) who it's kind of a cool little reunion for me.

WIDE RECEIVER DeANDRE HOPKINS

What, if anything, you guys focus on, you can't fix everything at the same time. How do you figure your way out of this?

I think everybody's got to take accountability in their job. Simple as that. We lose as a team, not one person.

How frustrating is it though with some of the offensive struggles you guys have had the first three weeks?

Oh man 0-3 is obviously, not good. But it's a long season, man. I don't think anybody in his locker room is giving up.

Does this feel like an 0-3 team?

I feel like we lost today. So, we've got to go back and go to back to the chopping board, just try to get a win put together.

As a veteran, how do you kind of keep morale up after the start that you guys have had?

I mean, a lot of teams have started 0-3, 0-4. Obviously, it's hard to fight your way back into it. But we haven't played a lot of division games, if any. So, I think, let's wait until January to ask that question.

As a veteran player, how do you keep the other guys on the offense from getting frustrated with the three-and-outs, the sacks and turnovers?

As a veteran, I just kind of learn to sometimes sit back and allow people to selfevaluate themselves. You don't want to go out there and make anyone feel bad about playing bad because it could be me one day, it could be someone else, it could be, it's 11 people on the field as an offense. So, you just kind of sit back and let coaches coach. I think everyone knows that they can do better. So, we're 0-3, I could be better. Yeah. I think everybody can do better. It's a team loss.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKER HAROLD LANDRY III

It wasn't the homecoming that you wanted for Malik Willis. I know today didn't go as you wanted. But what's your assessment of the day? We just didn't play good enough again. We just have to play better as a team. Everybody included. That's pretty much it. Just flat out, we just all have to play better.

You spent all summer watching Malik Willis do his thing, so he didn't surprise you much did he with his ability in a game situation?

No, it was less about them, and more about us not doing our thing, to be honest. We just didn't play well enough.

Anything particular? Or was it a team effort?

They didn't do nothing crazy offensively. We just didn't do our thing, that we know we can do. It was literally just that, to be honest. We are a much better team than what we're putting out there right now. We just have to stick together and find a way to overcome this.

Will you look forward to 'righting the ship' next week, on Monday Night Football?

Yeah man, this is the NFL. The clock don't stop. We just got to come in, make the corrections, and keep it moving.

LINEBACKER KENNETH MURRAY JR.

Did they do anything you guys weren't expecting on film this week, or anything like that?

No, not really. I think early on, the Q-runs were definitely a factor. We had a scramble, and then he pulled it on a zone read. I feel like we were playing well inside the tackle box, keeping the runs limited. But early on, I feel like it was those two that kind of got us a little bit. And then we were just playing catch-up ball after that.

How tough is it when you have a quarterback seemingly dead to rights on third-and-long, and he evades a couple of tackles. and makes a first down? It's extremely tough. And I think, we just have to be better. Me personally, I need to be better. Everyone on this defense needs to be better. Today was not our standard. So, whatever it takes, we need to figure out how to be better.

For the most part, you guys hung your hat on efficiency, the first couple of weeks. This game, you gave up six plays of over 20 yards, as a defense. I imagine you take it personally.

This is not our standard, and so, we need to figure this shit out. We can't be a defense where a couple of weeks we're good, and then we give up six explosive plays, that's just not us. We need to figure it out and go back to the drawing board.

Does this feel like an 0-3 team?

I mean, it sucks. The reality is the reality. We're 0-3 right now, so we've got to scratch, claw, bite, whatever we need to do to get a win, so we can get this thing rolling. That's the mentality right now.

OFFENSIVE LINEMAN DILLON RADUNZ

Eight sacks are unacceptable, but what can you do in a week's time or so that you could do to eliminate some of the errors that kept cropping up? Eliminate all any and all schematics sacks as far as any mentals. And then as far as physically, just the three practices we do have and then before and after practice just working on the technique to make sure we're not giving those sacks up, all those preventable sacks. We've got to be able to obviously prevent them. So doing all that in this week's time is going to be huge, especially in preparing for a Monday night game. And yeah, we got to go out there and we got to show this show this team that we can protect Will (Levis).

CORNERBACK L'JARIUS SNEED

Does this feel like an 0-3 team?

We definitely don't feel like that. Just we didn't get turnovers as a defense to get our offense back out. And we didn't stop them when we needed to.

I assume, as a defense, you'd agree, that this is the worst outing that you've guys have had? They had six plays of 20+ yards or more. What were they doing today, that you guys couldn't stop?

Man, it's nothing that we didn't go over. Anything they did in the game, we had gone over in time, for the week. Just us, as a defense, we started slower than they did, and gave them momentum. When we first come out on the field, we have to start fast. It's just us, as a defense, we started slow, and gave them the momentum.

How do you explain a slow start. You're at home, facing the Packers, and a guy who used to be here?

You know, you have to come right out and punch them in the mouth. You can't come out relaxed. You have to send a message on the first play. I don't think we did that as a defense today. Malik (Willis) did what he did.

How do you make sure you guys do that going forward?

Go back to the film. Go back to the drawing board. As a defense, we'll get together and go over the mistakes that were made, and know what it takes.



SEASON NOTES

- PLAYOFF OPPONENTS: The Titans have six total games against five playoff teams from last season. They have home games against Green Bay and Houston and road contests at Miami, Buffalo, Detroit and Houston. Four of those six games are against 2023 division winners: Houston twice (AFC South), Buffalo (AFC East) and Detroit (NFC North). The six games against reigning playoff clubs are the fewest for the Titans since they had five such games entering the 2020 campaign.
- TV BREAKDOWN: Excluding their Week 18 matchup with the Texans, which has yet to be assigned a broadcasting network, the Titans are currently scheduled for nine contests on CBS, six games on FOX, and one game on ESPN. Due to the NFL's flex scheduling, some contests could be moved to a different network from the one appearing on the initial schedule.
- TIME (ZONE) TRAVEL: Besides a trip to Los Angeles to face the Chargers in Week 10, the Titans stay in either the central time zone (10 games) or eastern time zone (six) for the duration of 2024, including the preseason. Other than Los Angeles, the farthest west they travel is Houston.
- HIGH NOON: During the regular season, 14 of the Titans' 16 games prior to Week 18 are scheduled for Sundays at noon CT.
- FIRST-YEAR COACHES: Brian Callahan is one of eight NFL head coaches in their first season with their current team. He and the Titans face three of the others, all within a five-week span: Jerod Mayo's New England Patriots, Jim Harbaugh's Los Angeles Chargers, and Dan Quinn's Washington Commanders. Additionally, the Titans go against the Seattle Seahawks and new head coach Mike Macdonald in the second week of the preseason.
- QUARTERBACKS 1-2-3: The 2024 NFL Draft featured quarterbacks in the top three selections, beginning with Caleb Williams going first to Chicago, followed by Jayden Daniels to Washington and Drake Maye to New England. The Titans face each of those teams this season, in addition to the Minnesota Vikings, who drafted J.J. McCarthy with the 11th overall selection.
- DIVISIONAL WAITING GAMES: The Titans must wait until Week 6 against Indianapolis to play their first AFC South matchup of 2024. It is their longest wait for a divisional game since 2010 (Week 6 at Jacksonville). However, the Titans conclude 2024 with divisional games in five of the final seven weeks, including three consecutive division battles to conclude the schedule.
- THREE GAMES BASED UPON 2023 FINISH: Every NFL team has two intraconference games and one interconference matchup based on the previous year's standings. As a result of the Titans' fourth-place finish in 2023, they host the AFC North's fourth-place Bengals, and they visit the fourth-place Chargers from the AFC West and the Washington Commanders from the NFC East. Overall, the Titans' strength of schedule is .491 (142-147) based upon their opponents' combined 2023 record, which is tied for the 21st most difficult schedule out of 32 NFL teams.
- FACING TOP OFFENSES AND DEFENSES: The Titans face four of the NFL's top 10 offenses from last season: Miami (No. 1 overall offense), Buffalo (No. 4), Detroit (No. 3) and Minnesota (No. 10). They also contend with four of the top 10 defenses from 2023: the New York Jets (No. 3 overall defense), Miami (No. 10), Buffalo (No. 9) and New England (No. 7).

WEEK-BY-WEEK NOTES

- WEEK 4 at MIAMI (MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL): The Titans trek to South Florida for a rematch of a 2023 Monday night thriller (Dec. 11), when quarterback Will Levis engineered a comeback victory for Tennessee. The Titans scored 15 points in a span of 51 seconds, erasing a 14-point deficit to win 28-27. They became the first NFL team since the Oakland Raiders in 1976 (vs. Pittsburgh) to win in regulation after trailing by 14 or more points with less than three minutes to go in the fourth quarter ... The Titans own a 26-19 all-time record on Monday Night Football, including nine wins in their past 12 appearances ... Featuring quarterback Tua Tagovailoa and wide receiver Tyreek Hill, the Dolphins produced the NFL's top-ranked overall offense (401.3 total yards per game) and passing offense (265.5) in 2023.
- WEEK 5 (BYE): The Titans are set for a bye during the first weekend in October, marking their earliest bye since Week 4 in 2020 ... They enter the year with an eight-game winning streak in contests after the bye, sharing the NFL's best current streak with the Buffalo Bills.
- WEEKS 6 & 16 vs. INDIANAPOLIS: Two second-year quarterbacks— Tennessee's Will Levis and Indianapolis' Anthony Richardson—could meet for the first time in their careers. Richardson's rookie season came to a premature end in a game against the Titans (Oct. 8, 2023), three weeks before Levis made his NFL debut ... Colts second-year head coach Shane Steichen served as the offensive coordinator of the Philadelphia Eagles at the same time that new Titans defensive coordinator Dennard Wilson was on the Eagles staff as defensive backs coach (2021) and defensive backs coach/defensive passing game coordinator (2022), culminating with Philadelphia's appearance in Super Bowl LVII ... First-year Titans general manager Ran Carthon spent the majority of his three NFL seasons as a player (2004-06) with the Colts.
- WEEK 7 at BUFFALO: Two original AFL rivals meet for the sixth time in a seven-year span ... In 50 previous all-time meetings with the Bills, including playoffs, the Titans own a 30-20 record ... The Titans won consecutive home games against the Bills in 2020 and 2021 before the Bills took the most recent matchup at Highmark Stadium on Sept. 19, 2022 ... Buffalo carries a streak of five consecutive playoff seasons and four straight AFC East titles into 2024 ... Bills quarterback Josh Allen enters his seventh NFL season and is one of only two NFL quarterbacks (Patrick Mahomes) who have passed for more than 4,000 yards in each of the past four campaigns.
- WEEK 8 at DETROIT: The Titans make their third all-time appearance at Ford Field, where they are 2-0 with wins in 2008 and 2016 ... The Titans are 10-3 all-time against Detroit, and their current six-game winning streak against the Lions is their longest active winning streak against any opponent. Most recently, the Titans won 46-25 at Nissan Stadium on Dec. 20, 2020 ... New Titans head coach Brian Callahan was the quarterbacks coach for the Lions in 2016 and 2017 ... Led by head coach Dan Campbell and quarterback Jared Goff, the Lions won the NFC North in 2023, marking the organization's first division title since 1993. They advanced to their first NFC Championship game since 1991, ultimately falling to the San Francisco 49ers.
- WEEK 9 vs. NEW ENGLAND: Led by new head coach Jerod Mayo, who attended the University of Tennessee from 2004 through 2007, the Patriots make their first visit to Nissan Stadium in the regular season since Nov. 11, 2018, a game won by the Titans 34-10 ... Mayo takes over the reins in New England after playing and coaching under previous head coach Bill Belichick ... Patriots rookie and former North Carolina Tar Heels quarterback Drake Maye was the third-overall draft pick in 2024 ... Titans quarterback and Madison, Conn., native Will Levis could make his first career appearance against the Patriots.
- WEEK 10 at LOS ANGELES CHARGERS: The Titans and Chargers meet for the third consecutive season ... In their only previous encounter at SoFi Stadium, the Chargers defeated the Titans 17-14 on Dec. 18, 2022 ... Most recently, Tennessee won 27-24 in overtime at Nissan Stadium on Sept. 17, 2023 ... Head coach Jim Harbaugh is in his first season with the Chargers after leading the University of Michigan to a national title in 2023. Harbaugh was the head coach of the San Francisco 49ers from 2011 to 2014 prior to coaching at Michigan. His father, Jack Harbaugh, was the head coach at Western Kentucky University from 1989 to 2002 ... The Titans look for their first road victory

- WEEK 11 vs. MINNESOTA: The Vikings are scheduled to make their third all-time appearance at Nissan Stadium and their first since 2016 ... The most recent Titans-Vikings matchup in the regular season was at Minnesota on Sept. 27, 2020. Then-rookie Vikings wide receiver Justin Jefferson recorded his first career start, touchdown and 100-yard game, but the Titans won 31-30 ... In the 2024 NFL Draft, the Vikings selected Michigan quarterback J.J. McCarthy with the 11th overall pick.
- WEEKS 12 & 18 vs. HOUSTON: The Texans and Titans collectively feature a pair of top quarterbacks from the 2023 rookie class: C.J. Stroud (first round, second overall) and Will Levis (second round, 33rd overall), respectively ... Stroud won the 2023 AP Offensive Rookie of the Year Award, and his teammate, defensive end Will Anderson, was named the AP Defensive Rookie of the Year ... During the 2024 offseason, the Texans signed former Titans defensive end Denico Autry and linebacker Azeez Al-Shaair as unrestricted free agents ... The Titans, who lead the all-time series 23-21 heading into 2024, look to end the Texans' three-game winning streak in the rivalry ... Week 18 marks the fourth time in a six-year span the two rivals conclude the regular season against each other.
- WEEK 13 at WASHINGTON COMMANDERS: The Titans and Commanders clash in 2024 as a result of their respective divisional finishes in 2023 ... The Titans have won the past two contests in the series, including most recently a 21-17 victory at Washington on Oct. 9, 2022 ... During the 2024 offseason, the Commanders hired a new general manager, Adam Peters, and a new head coach, Dan Quinn ... Peters and Titans executive vice president/general manager Ran Carthon previously worked together at the San Francisco 49ers ... Quinn, who was the head coach of the Atlanta Falcons from 2015 to 2020, arrives in Washington following his role as the defensive coordinator of the Dallas Cowboys.
- WEEKS 14 & 17 vs. JACKSONVILLE: The annual Titans-Jaguars series heads into its 30th season since the Jaguars' inaugural 1995 campaign ... The two rivals face each other twice in the month of December ... The Titans won the most recent contest, a 28-20 victory in the 2023 season finale at Nissan Stadium ... During the 2024 offseason, former Jaguars wide receiver Calvin Ridley was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent. In 2023, during his only season with the Jaguars, Ridley started every contest and caught 76 passes for 1,016 yards and eight touchdowns ... New Titans offensive coordinator Nick Holz also arrives from Jacksonville, where he was the Jaguars' passing game coordinator.
- WEEK 15 vs. CINCINNATI: Early in the 2024 offseason, the Titans made Brian Callahan the 20th head coach in franchise history after he spent the previous five campaigns as Cincinnati's offensive coordinator. During his tenure in Cincinnati, Callahan served under head coach Zac Taylor, helping the Bengals to two AFC North titles, two AFC Championship appearances and a Super Bowl berth ... Wide receiver Tyler Boyd spent the first eight seasons of his career with the Bengals before signing with the Titans as a free agent in 2024 ... This is the fourth consecutive season in which the Bengals have visited Tennessee in either the postseason (2021) or regular season (2022-24) ... The Titans took last year's contest on Oct. 1 by a final score of 27-3.

HEAD COACH BRIAN CALLAHAN

> Begins his tenure as the 20th head coach in franchise history.

S JAMAL ADAMS

Needs 3.5 sacks in 2024 (21.5 entering 2024) to reach 25 career sacks. He would become the sixth defensive back to reach the mark since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982, joining Rodney Harrison (30.5), Ronde Barber (28), Brian Dawkins (26), Adrian Wilson (25.5) and Carnell Lake (25).

WR TYLER BOYD

Can record his seventh consecutive season with at least 50 receptions and 500 receiving yards. He is tied for the NFL's seventh-longest such active streak entering 2024.

LS MORGAN COX

- Enters 2024 ranked 10th in the NFL in career games played among active players (216 entering 2024).
- By appearing in all 17 contests in 2024, which would give him 233 career games, Cox would rank fourth in career NFL games among all players from the University of Tennessee. He would trail only Jason Witten (271), Peyton Manning (266) and Dustin Colquitt (255).

S QUANDRE DIGGS

Enters 2024 as the NFL's only player with an active streak of 17 starts and at least one interception in three consecutive seasons.

K NICK FOLK

- Enters 2024 ranked seventh in the NFL in career games played among active players (228 entering 2024).
- Needs 18 field goals to reach 400 for his career. Entering 2024, only 13 players in NFL history previously reached the mark. His 382 career field goals through 2023 ranked 19th in NFL annals.
- Goes into 2024 with an NFL-record streak of 78 consecutive field goals made from under 40 yards. His last miss in that range was a 31-yarder against New England on Oct. 5, 2017, when he played for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

WR DeANDRE HOPKINS

- Enters 2024 with more receptions (928) and receiving yards (12,355) than any other player since he entered the NFL in 2013.
- Needs 72 receptions to reach 1,000 in his first 12 seasons. Only Jerry Rice (1,050), Marvin Harrison (1,042), Larry Fitzgerald (1,018) and Andre Johnson (1,012) have previously reached the mark in their first 12 seasons. Hopkins recorded 928 receptions in his first 11 seasons. Through 2023, only 14 total players in NFL history had reached the 1,000 career reception plateau.
- A 72-reception season also would make Hopkins the second player in NFL history with 1,000 receptions prior to his 33rd birthday, joining Larry Fitzgerald. Hopkins will turn 33 on June 6, 2025.
- Needs 72 receptions, 645 receiving yards and seven touchdown catches in 2024 to become the ninth player in NFL history to total at least 1,000 receptions, 13,000 receiving yards and 85 touchdown catches during his career. Hopkins would join Jerry Rice, Marvin Harrison and Larry Fitzgerald as the only players to reach all three marks within their first 12 NFL seasons.
- Has at least one reception in every game he has played during his career—162 consecutive games entering 2024. With a reception in his first six games of 2024, he will pass **Keyshawn Johnson** (167) for the NFL's second-longest catch streak to begin a career during the Super Bowl era (1966–present). Hopkins' streak of games with a reception to begin his career ranks third behind only Johnson and **Marvin Harrison** (190).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2024

OLB HAROLD LANDRY III

- Enters the 2024 season ranked 11th in franchise history with 41.5 career sacks. With 8.5 sacks in 2024, he would become only the eighth defender in franchise annals to be credited with 50 sacks.
- ▶ With 11 sacks in 2024 (41.5 entering the season), Landry will pass Jevon Kearse (52) for the most sacks by a player in the franchise's "Titans era" (1999-present).

QB WILL LEVIS

- Can become the third player in franchise history to start at least nine games in each of his first two NFL seasons, joining Vince Young and Marcus Mariota.
- Can become the third player in franchise history to average at least 12.0 yards per completion in each of his first two NFL seasons, joining Warren Moon and Marcus Mariota.

TE CHIG OKONKWO

- > Can join Frank Wycheck (six consecutive seasons) and Delanie Walker (five) as the only tight ends in franchise history to record consecutive seasons with at least 50 receptions and 500 receiving yards.
- > Can become the franchise's first tight end to begin his NFL career with three consecutive seasons in which he posted at least 30 receptions and 400 receiving yards.

RB TONY POLLARD

- Needs 60 scrimmage yards in 2024 to reach 5,000 for his career (3,621 rushing yards and 1,319 receiving yards entering 2024).
- Can notch his third consecutive season with at least 1,000 rushing vards.
- > Looks to extend his streak to four consecutive seasons with at least 1,000 scrimmage yards.

WR CALVIN RIDLEY

- > Needs 642 receiving yards in 2024 to reach 5,000 for his career (4,358 entering 2024).
- Needs 76 receptions in 2024 to reach 400 for his career (324 entering) 2024).

DT JEFFERY SIMMONS

- Needs 3.5 sacks in 2024 to reach 30 career sacks (26.5 entering 2024). He would be the franchise's 10th player to do so since individual sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, as well as the organization's sixth player in its "Titans era" (1999-present) to reach 30 sacks.
- Enters 2024 on a streak of three consecutive seasons with at least 5.5 sacks. With 5.5 or more sacks in 2024, he would become the franchise's first player to reach the number in four consecutive seasons since Ray Childress (eight consecutive seasons from 1987-1994).

CB L'JARIUS SNEED

- Can record his fifth consecutive season to begin his career with at least two interceptions.
- Can become the NFL's only player since the beginning of the 2008 season to register three consecutive seasons with at least 11 passes defensed and five tackles for loss. In that span, only Sneed, Chris Harris (2013-2014), Troy Polamalu (2010-2011) and Charles Woodson (2009–2010) have recorded two such consecutive campaigns.

P RYAN STONEHOUSE

- Can become the first player since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to lead the league in gross punting average for three consecutive seasons.
- After averaging an NFL-record 53.1-yards per punt as a rookie in 2022 and then averaging 53.1 yards per attempt in 2023, Stonehouse can become the first player since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to record three career seasons with an average of 50.0 yards per punt. AJ Cole (Las Vegas) could also accomplish the feat in 2023.

GM Ran Carthon Motivated to Turn Titans Around, and Prove Ownership Right

Ran Carthon was named the 14th general manager in franchise history on Jan. 18, 2023. He joined the Titans after spending six seasons with the San Francisco 49ers, including the last two as the team's director of player personnel.

A year after initially joining the franchise, Carthon was promoted to executive vice president/general manager. His duties expanded to include all areas that impact the football team: roster control, team activities and personnel decisions including draft and free agency acquisitions, oversight of head coach Brian Callahan and his coaching staff, scouting, sports medicine, and player engagement.

"Over the past year, Ran has impressed me and our staff with his innovative approach to roster building," said Titans controlling owner Amy Adams Strunk upon Carthon's promotion in 2024. "Ran's exceptional reputation around the league as a talent evaluator and culture builder was a clear competitive advantage during last year's free agency and draft process, as well as our recent search for a head coach. Simply put, Ran Carthon makes the Tennessee Titans a destination for the league's top talent. By expanding his role to include full roster control and oversight of the coaching staff, our organization will now benefit more completely from Ran's unique ability to build and lead a championship-caliber football team."

Shortly after receiving his promotion, Carthon and his staff embarked upon the 2024 offseason. Their efforts resulted in several notable signings in free agency: cornerback Chidobe Awuzie, linebacker Kenneth Murray Jr., defensive lineman Sebastian Joseph-Day, center Lloyd Cushenberry III, running back Tony Pollard, guarterback Mason Rudolph and wide receiver Calvin Ridley. The Titans then used a trade to acquire former Kansas City Chiefs cornerback L'Jarius Sneed before circling back in free agency to add wide receiver Tyler Boyd and safety Jamal Adams. Prior to the start of the 2024 season, another trade brought linebacker Ernest Jones IV to the Titans from the Los Angeles Rams.

During the 2024 NFL Draft, Carthon orchestrated the selection of seven total players. With the seventh overall pick in the first round, the Titans chose Alabama tackle JC Latham, and at No. 38 in the second round, they took Texas nose tackle T'Vondre Sweat.

In his first year with the Titans, Carthon re-worked the roster with several veteran additions who would become key starters for the team in 2023, including wide receiver **DeAndre Hopkins**, outside linebacker Arden Key, linebacker Azeez Al-Shaair, cornerback Sean Murphy-Bunting and offensive lineman Daniel Brunskill in free agency. In his first draft, offensive lineman Peter Skoronski, quarterback Will Levis and running back Tyjae Spears were selected in the first three rounds, respectively. Carthon also used a trade to acquire kicker Nick Folk.

Carthon arrived in Tennessee with a range of experience from multiple teams. In San Francisco, he was the 49ers director of pro personnel for four seasons (2017-20) and then promoted to director of player personnel in 2021, serving in that capacity until joining the Titans. In his role as director of player personnel, Carthon was responsible for evaluating the top college prospects and assisting in the construction of the pro free agent board and evaluations. He joined the 49ers when head coach Kyle Shanahan and general manager John Lynch took over in 2017 and played a part in the team's three playoff appearances, two division titles and an NFC championship in 2019. Additionally, the 49ers had nine players account for 13 total Pro Bowl selections from 2021 (seven selections) to 2022 (six selections)-evidence of the talented roster the personnel staff amassed.

Before joining San Francisco, Carthon spent five seasons (2012-16) with the St. Louis/Los Angeles Rams as their director of pro personnel. He entered the NFL scouting world as a pro scout with the Atlanta Falcons for four years (2008-11).

As a player, Carthon spent three seasons in the NFL (2004-06) primarily with the Indianapolis Colts, after entering the league as an

undrafted college free agent. At the University of Florida, he tallied 1,353 career rushing yards over four seasons and was part of the Gators' 2000 SEC Championship team.

Carthon was raised in an NFL family with his father, **Maurice Carthon**, having a distinguished playing and coaching career. Maurice Carthon played for the Colts and New York Giants, and he coached for New England, the New York Jets, Detroit, Dallas, Cleveland, Arizona and Kansas City.

Following his playing career, Ran Carthon received his bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of Florida in 2008. As a member of the Rams (2013) and 49ers (2018) he was selected to participate in the NFL Career Development Symposium at the Wharton School of Business, and in 2022, he took part in the inaugural NFL coach and front office accelerator program.

Born Arandic Kornell Carthon in February of 1981, in Osceola, Ark., he attended Key West High School in Key West, Fla.

Brian Callahan was named head coach of the Titans on Jan. 24, 2024, becoming the 20th head coach in franchise history.

"This is an exciting time for our franchise, and we're thrilled to have Brian as our head coach," said Titans controlling owner Amy Adams Strunk. "We went through a thorough candidate search and Brian stood out as the best person to lead our football team. I want to thank the other candidates who were part of this process and wish them well moving forward.

"Brian has a track record of success and a range of experience that has prepared him for this opportunity. His football knowledge and his enthusiasm for the game really stand out, and beyond that, we think his ability to lead will make him the ideal fit for our franchise.

"If you look at his history, Brian has been a part of a Super Bowl winning team (Denver, 2015) and another team that advanced to the Super Bowl (Cincinnati, 2021). He's worked in a variety of dynamic offenses with top-flight quarterbacks. At each step of his career, he's shown the flexibility and intelligence to make an impact.

"During his time with the Bengals, he was trusted with a number of responsibilities-offensive design, quarterback development, a contributor to the free agency and draft processes-and showed the ability to be a resource in all of those areas. As we seek sustained success and pursue a championship, Brian has seen firsthand what that looks like, and he is the right person to lead us there.

"To our fans, thank you for your support and for sticking with us. You deserve a championship team, and we're going to get there. I can't wait for you to get to know Brian and his family."

Callahan arrived in Tennessee with 18 years of coaching experience and 14 years of NFL coaching experience, including the previous five

seasons as the offensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals.

During his time in Cincinnati, Callahan served under head coach Zac Taylor and was part of two AFC North titles, two AFC Championship appearances and a Super Bowl berth. He also helped guide guarterback Joe Burrow from the No. 1 overall draft pick in 2020 to multiple singleseason franchise records by his second year and Pro Bowl honors within three years.

Over Callahan's final three seasons in Cincinnati (2021-23), the Bengals offense ranked in the NFL's top 10 in several categories: sixth in scoring (24.9), seventh in passing (250.8 yards per game), seventh in redzone efficiency (61.5 percent), 10th in third-down percentage (41.0) and sixth in time of possession (31:00).

From the time Burrow entered the NFL in 2020 through the 2023 campaign, he recorded the league's seventh-best passer rating (98.6) and tied for the third-best completion percentage (68.0). His 270.8 passing yards per game in that period ranked fifth.

Additionally, Cincinnati's offense under Callahan featured a trio of 1,000-yard wide receivers in Ja'Marr Chase (2021-23), Tee Higgins (2021-22) and Tyler Boyd (2019). Chase quickly emerged as one of the NFL's top wide receivers after being drafted in the first round in 2021. He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl nods and became the eighth player in NFL history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first three career seasons, including 1,216 yards on a career-high 100 receptions in 2023. Boyd's statistical highlights included 1,046 receiving yards in 2019, while Higgins contributed 1,091 yards in 2021 and 1,029 yards in 2022.

Bengals running back Joe Mixon exceeded 1,000 scrimmage yards four times in five seasons with Callahan as his offensive coordinator. From 2019 through 2023, he joined Christian McCaffrey and Aaron Jones as the NFL's only players with at least 4,500 rushing yards (4,618) and 1,500 receiving yards (1,556). Mixon was named to the Pro Bowl in 2021.

In 2023, Burrow was limited to 10 total games due to multiple injuries. Backup Jake Browning stepped into the lineup, and in the first action of his career, he registered a season passer rating of 98.4-qualifying as the seventh-best number in the NFL.

In 2022, the Bengals ranked seventh in the NFL in points per game (26.1), eighth in total offense (360.5 yards per game) and fifth in passing offense (265.0). Burrow earned his first career Pro Bowl selection while setting single-season franchise records for completions (414) and touchdown passes (35). The third-year signal caller also placed fifth in the NFL with 4,475 passing yards. The team's new-look offensive line came together during the season and did not allow more than two sacks in any of the final eight games of the regular season.

En route to an appearance in Super Bowl LVI, the 2021 Bengals ranked seventh in passing offense (259.0 yards per game) and tied for seventh in points per game (27.1). Burrow, after returning from a knee injury suffered in 2020, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and established single-season Bengals records for passing yards (4,611) and passer rating (108.3). Chase was named the AP Offensive Rookie of the Year after posting a team-record 1,455 receiving yards, while Mixon placed

third in the NFL in rushing yards (1,205).

In 2020, Callahan helped develop Burrow as a rookie despite facing the challenges associated with the COVID-19 pandemic, including the cancellation of all in-person NFL offseason programs. Before a knee injury ended his rookie campaign in Week 11, Burrow's 264 completions were the most ever by an NFL quarterback through his first 10 career games, while his 2,688 passing yards were fifth.

Callahan joined the Bengals after spending 2018 as the quarterbacks coach for the Oakland Raiders. Under his tutelage, Raiders quarterback Derek Carr passed for a then-career-high 4,049 yards and led the AFC with a 68.9 completion percentage.

From 2016 to 2017, Callahan was the quarterbacks coach for the Detroit Lions. Working with Matthew Stafford, he helped the veteran finish third in passing yards (4,446) and fourth in passing touchdowns (29) in 2017, while posting a then-career-best 99.3 passer rating. In 2016, Stafford's eight game-winning drives were the most by a guarterback in a season since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

Callahan broke into the NFL with the Denver Broncos in 2010 and served in multiple roles for the franchise through 2015. He began as a coaching assistant (2010) before transitioning to offensive quality control coach (2011-12), offensive assistant coach (2013-14) and finally offensive assistant/quarterbacks coach (2015). In 2013, Broncos quarterback Peyton Manning won the Associated Press NFL MVP award after completing a league-record 55 touchdown passes. Callahan's tenure in Denver was capped by the team's victory in Super Bowl 50 following the 2015 campaign. Before reaching the NFL, Callahan spent time at his alma mater, UCLA, as a graduate assistant in 2006 and 2007. He then spent two years (2008-09) as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for Junipero Serra High School in San Mateo, Calif.

As a former walk-on guarterback at UCLA, he appeared in 13 games as a holder on PATs. He earned a bachelor's degree in sociology in 2006 and added a master's in education in 2008.

Born in Champaign, Ill., Callahan attended De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif., where he was a part of the school's national-record 151game winning streak and a No. 1 national ranking.

He and his wife, Allyson, have a son, Ronan, and a daughter, Norah. He is the son of longtime NFL coach Bill Callahan, the current Titans offensive line coach.

- Anderson arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with four years (2020-23) of NFL coaching experience following a nine-year NFL playing career (2009-17) as a safety and special teams standout.
- Prior to joining the Titans, Anderson spent four years as an assistant special teams coach with

the Cincinnati Bengals alongside head coach Zac Taylor and assistant head coach/special teams coordinator Darrin Simmons. Current Titans head coach Brian Callahan also served on the staff.

- In 2023, Cincinnati's special teams units ranked in the NFL's top 10 in several categories: 10th in punt return average (10.2 yards per return), eighth in opponent punt return average (7.0 yards per return), second in opponent kickoff return average (17.0) and fifth in opponent net punting average (40.2 yards per punt).
- As a player, Anderson was a rotational safety whose impact was felt most on special teams. Over his nine seasons as an NFL player, he spent time with the Minnesota Vikings, Philadelphia Eagles, Indianapolis Colts and Buffalo Bills. He played in 84 career games (seven starts), and recorded 109 tackles, one interception and two forced fumbles on defense, along with 58 stops on special teams.
- Anderson played collegiately at the University of Montana. 

- Rocker returned to the Titans in 2024 with 32 previous years of coaching experience, including six in the NFL and three with the Titans. He coached the Titans defensive line from 2011 to 2013.
- Prior to rejoining the Titans, Rocker spent three seasons as the defensive line coach for the Philadelphia Eagles (2021-23). In that period, the Eagles tied for third in the NFL with 142 total sacks and earned three consecutive postseason berths.
- In 2023, Rocker was part of an Eagles playoff team that ranked 10th in the league in rushing defense (103.4 opponent yards per game), while defensive end Josh Sweat registered his third consecutive season with at least 6.5 sacks. "The new stadium will host the world's largest events, as well as serve as a community hub for our local neighbors. We're excited to have a partner like Nissan embark on this journey with us as we look towards the future."

The partnership will feature dedicated areas in the new stadium for brand experiences and displays, innovative technology integration, and involvement in Titans broadcast platforms. Quarterback **Will Levis** was selected by the Titans in the second round (33rd overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft. He was the fourth quarterback chosen in the draft after the Titans traded up in the second round to select him.



In his debut season, Levis recorded starts in all nine games in which he appeared, becoming the

third rookie quarterback in franchise history to start at least nine games. Only **Vince Young** (13 starts in 2006) and **Marcus Mariota** (12 starts in 2015) preceded him in the accomplishment. Levis' rookie passing totals included 255 attempts, 149 completions, 1,808 yards, eight touchdowns and four interceptions. His 84.2 passer rating was the second best in franchise history by a rookie quarterback (91.5 by Mariota in 2015), and the number also ranked first in NFL history among second-round quarterbacks in their rookie season (minimum 200 attempts). Levis had an additional 57 yards and a touchdown rushing.

Prior to entering the NFL, Levis spent two seasons at the University of Kentucky after transferring from Penn State. In four combined college seasons, he appeared in 39 games with 26 starts. He completed 479 of his 738 passes (64.9 percent) for 5,876 yards with 46 touchdowns and 25 interceptions. He also rushed for 742 yards and 17 touchdowns.

At Kentucky, Levis went 17-7 as a starter, tying Terry Wilson for the second-most quarterback wins since 1993. The two-time team captain completed 418 of 636 passes for 5,233 yards with 43 passing touchdowns and 11 rushing scores for the Wildcats. His six 300-yard passing games were the fourth-most in school history.

As a senior in 2022, he started 11 games at quarterback and connected on 185 of 283 passes for 2,406 yards with 19 passing scores, while ranking fourth in the SEC in pass efficiency (151.9). He finished fifth in the SEC with 19 passing scores.

As a junior in 2021, he transferred from Penn State to Kentucky and started in all 13 games, helping to lead UK to 10 wins for the fourth time in school history. He totaled 3,203 yards total offense, becoming the seventh player in school history to reach 3,000 yards of total offense in a season. He was 233-of-353 passing for 2,826 yards and 24 touchdowns, and he also registered 107 rushes for 376 yards and a team-high tying nine rushing touchdowns.

He is a native of Madison, Conn.

2024 Game Notes:

> At Chicago (9/8), in his first Week 1 start and his 10th career start, completed 19 of 32 passes for 127 yards and a touchdown with two interceptions. He added 36 rushing yards on four carries. In the second quarter, he converted a third-and-15 with a 22-yard pass to Calvin Ridley and tossed a 17-yard touchdown pass to Chig Okonkwo. It was his ninth career touchdown pass.

> Against the New York Jets (9/15), completed 19 of 28 passes for 192 yards with one touchdown and one interception (84.2 passer rating). His 67.9 completion percentage set a career high (min. 20 attempts). He added a career-high 38 rushing yards on four attempts, marking the second consecutive week he posted a career high in rushing. In the first half, he completed 11 of 13 passes, and his 84.6 first-half completion percentage was the second-highest mark of his career (88.9 against Houston, Dec. 17, 2023) through 11 starts. In the second quarter, he converted a third-and-three with a 22-yard pass to Tony Pollard. In the third quarter, his career

long 21-yard rushing attempt converted a third-and-one. Also in the third quarter, he completed a 40-yard touchdown pass to Calvin Ridley for his second touchdown pass of the season.

> Against Green Bay (9/22), completed 26 of 34 passes for 260 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions. His 26 completions were a career high, and his 76.5 completion percentage established a new career high (minimum of 20 pass attempts). His completion percentage also tied Ken Stabler (Sept. 28, 1980 at Cincinnati) for fourth place in franchise history in a game in which a quarterback attempted at least 34 passes behind only Steve McNair (79.4 against Jacksonville on Nov. 4, 2001), Warren Moon (78.9 against Detroit on Nov. 5, 1989) and Neil O'Donnell (77.5 against Cleveland on Sept. 19, 1999). His 92.8 passer rating ranked second in his career in a game with at least 20 attempts. Levis tallied his third career game with two or more touchdown passes. On the team's opening offensive series, he completed a 23-yard pass to Josh Whyle on the first play of the game, added a 20-yard pass to Tyler Boyd, and completed a one-yard touchdown pass to Nick Vannett. In the third quarter, he completed a screen pass for 29 yards to Tyjae Spears, and later on the same drive, he completed an 11-yard touchdown pass to DeAndre Hopkins.

SECOND-ROUND QUARTERBACKS

From the first common draft in 1967 to 2023, there were 63 quarterbacks selected in the second round of the NFL Draft. Among those with at least 200 passing attempts in their rookie season, Titans quarterback **Will Levis** delivered the highest passer rating. Levis was 149-of-255 passing for 1,808 yards with eight touchdowns and four interceptions, amounting to an 84.2 passer rating. The previous leader was **Charlie Batch**, who had an 83.5 passer rating as a rookie with the Detroit Lions in 1998.

Levis' 58.4 completion percentage also ranked as the best of any second-rounder in his rookie campaign. Former Cincinnati Bengals quarterback **Andy Dalton** previously held the top spot with a 58.1 completion percentage as a rookie in 2011.

Mason Rudolph is in his seventh NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 15, 2024.

Rudolph joined the Titans after spending his first six seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers. In 21 games during his time in Pittsburgh, he started at

13 times, throwing for 3,085 yards and 19 touchdowns with a completion percentage of 63.5.

In 2023, Rudolph started three games during the regular season, passing for 719 yards and three touchdowns. He also started Pittsburgh's playoff game at Buffalo.

In 2019, in relief of the injured Ben Roethlisberger, he went 5-3 as Pittsburgh's starter while throwing for 1,765 yards and 13 touchdowns in 10 total games played.

Rudolph was originally drafted by the Steelers in the third round (76th overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft.

In four seasons at Oklahoma State (2014-17), led the Cowboys to a 32-9 record as a starter to become the winningest quarterback in school history. Running back Tony Pollard is in his sixth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans. The Memphis native was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 14, 2024.

Prior to joining the Titans, Pollard spent five seasons (2019-23) with the Dallas Cowboys, who selected him in the fourth round (128th overall) of the

2019 NFL Draft. During his time in Dallas, he appeared in 79 games with 23 starts, totaling 3,621 rushing yards and 23 touchdowns on 762 carries. With an additional 176 receptions for 1,319 yards and five receiving touchdowns, he reached 1,000 scrimmage yards in each of his final three years in Dallas while also returning 63 kickoffs for 1,500 yards, including one return for a score.

In 2023, his first season as the lead running back in Dallas, Pollard started all 17 games for the first time in his career and led the team with 1,005 rushing yards on a career-high 252 carries (4.0 avg.) with six touchdowns.

In 2022, he set career marks with 193 carries for 1,007 yards and nine scores, averaging 5.2 yards-per-carry to rank third in the NFL and earn his first Pro Bowl nod.

At the University of Memphis, he played in 40 games at running back and wide receiver, amassing 2,233 yards and 18 touchdowns on offense. He also averaged 30.1 yards per kickoff return and tied an NCAA record with seven kickoff returns for touchdowns.

> At Chicago (9/8), started in his Titans debut and led the team with 82 rushing yards and a touchdown on 16 carries. He added 12 yards on three receptions to give him 94 scrimmage yards in the contest. 

Running back **Tyjae Spears** was selected by the Titans in the third round (81st overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft.

As a rookie, Spears did not miss a game and registered one start. He carried the ball 100 times for 453 yards and two touchdowns, and he added 52 receptions for 385 yards and one score. His 838



Spears spent four years at Tulane (2019-22) prior to entering the NFL. He appeared in 33 games with 20 starts at running back for the Green Wave, totaling 2,910 yards and 31 touchdowns on 427 carries with an additional 48 receptions for 564 yards and three scores. He ended his career as the school's all-time leader in yards per carry (6.8), tied for second in 100-yard rushing games (15), tied for third in rushing touchdowns (31), fourth in rushing yards per game (85.6) and sixth in rushing yards (2,910) and total touchdowns (34). His 6.8 yards per carry from 2019 to 2022 ranked second in the FBS behind only Alabama-Birmingham running back **DeWayne McBride's** 7.3-yard average (minimum 400 attempts).

As a junior in 2022, he started all 14 games for the Green Wave, totaling 1,581 yards and 19 touchdowns on 229 rushing attempts and adding 22 receptions for 256 yards and two touchdowns. He tied for the national lead with 21 total touchdowns and tied for third in the country with 19 rushing touchdowns, a total that ranked second in Tulane single-season history. His 1,581 rushing yards led the conference and made up the Green Wave's all-time second-highest single-season total. His nine 100-yard rushing games included eight consecutive such efforts to finish the season. He was named the American Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year and also earned first-team All-AAC honors. His efforts helped Tulane earn a 12-2 record and win an American Athletic Conference title.

He is a native of Ponchatoula, La.

Tight end Chig Okonkwo (pronounced "CHIGG oh-KAHN-kwoh") is in his third NFL season in 2024. He was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (143rd overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.



In his first two campaigns, Okonkwo did not miss a game and totaled 19 starts. His two-year statistics included 86 receptions for 978 yards and

four touchdowns. His 11.4-yard receiving average tied for sixth among all NFL tight ends from 2022 to 2023.

Okonkwo started 11 games in 2023 and finished the season with 54 receptions for 528 vards and one touchdown. He ranked second on the team in receptions and receiving yards.

During his rookie season, Okonkwo appeared in all 17 games with eight starts and totaled 32 receptions for 450 yards (14.1 avg.) and three touchdowns. His yardage total ranked second on the team. He also tied for fifth on the team with seven special teams tackles. He was named to the Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie team.

Okonkwo's 450 receiving yards in 2022 established a new record for franchise rookie tight ends, surpassing Ben Troupe's 329 yards in 2004. Okonkwo tied Chris Dressel (32 receptions in 1983) for the third-best reception total among all Titans/Oilers rookie tight ends, trailing only Bo Scaife (37 in 2005) and Troupe (33 in 2004), and he became the second rookie tight end in franchise history with at least three touchdown catches, joining Dressel (four in 1983).

The Powder Springs, Ga., native appeared in 37 games with 20 starts over four seasons (2018-21) at Maryland and caught 77 passes for 717 yards and eight touchdowns. He added three carries for 72 yards and three touchdowns, including a career-long rush of 54 yards.

As a senior in 2021, he started all 13 games and posted career-high marks with 52 catches for 447 yards and a team-leading five touchdowns. His 52 receptions ranked second in Terrapins history for a single season by a tight end, behind only former Titans tight end Frank Wycheck (58 in 1990). Okonkwo's 447 receiving yards were the most by a Terps tight end in a season since Vernon Davis (871 in 2005).



He sat out the 2020 season with myocarditis due to COVID-19. Prior to then, he saw action in 12 games (four starts) as a freshman and 12 games (three starts) as a sophomore.

> At Chicago (9/8), started and caught two passes for 15 yards and a touchdown. He hauled in a 17-yard touchdown pass from Will Levis in the second quarter for his fifth career touchdown reception.

Wide receiver Tyler Boyd is in his ninth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on May 14, 2024.

Prior to joining the Titans, Boyd spent the first eight seasons of his career with the Cincinnati Bengals. He was originally selected by the Bengals in the second round (55th overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft.





During his time in Cincinnati, he played in 120 games with 77 starts, plus an additional seven postseason contests with six starts. His production at the Bengals included 513 career receptions for 6,000 yards and 31 touchdowns, and he departed Cincinnati ranked fourth in franchise history in receptions and seventh in receiving yards.

From 2016 through 2023, Boyd ranked first in the NFL in receptions (390), receiving yards (4,813) and first downs (233) among wide receivers from the slot formation, per Next Gen Stats.

It was his sixth consecutive season with a minimum of 58 receptions and 667 receiving yards, and he was one of only nine NFL players to do so each year from 2018 through 2023. Boyd appeared in all but four contests during that six-year stretch.

In 2019, Boyd achieved career highs with 15 starts, 90 receptions and 1,046 receiving yards during his fourth NFL season.

A native of Clairton, Pa., Boyd attended the University of Pittsburgh, where he played three seasons (2013-15) and was named first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference in each of his final two seasons. He finished his collegiate career as Pittburgh's all-time leader in both receptions (254) and receiving yards (3,361) and finished second at Pitt in career all-purpose yards (5,243), trailing only Tony Dorsett (7,117).

#16 • WR TREYLON BURKS

6-2, 225, 3rd Year/3rd with Titans, Arkansas Click for complete bio

Wide receiver Treylon Burks is in his third NFL season in 2024. He was selected by the Titans in the first round (18th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.

Through his first two seasons. Burks totaled 49 receptions for 665 yards and one touchdown in 22 games (15 starts). That included 16 catches for 221 yards in 2023.



As a rookie, Burks appeared in 11 games with six starts, totaling 33 receptions for 444 yards and one touchdown. His reception total tied for third place on the team, while his yardage total tied for third on the squad. Among NFL rookies in 2022, Burks' 444 receiving yards ranked ninth.

In three seasons (2019-21) at the University of Arkansas, Burks appeared in 32 career games with 30 starts. He totaled 146 receptions for 2,399 yards and 18 touchdowns to go along with 32 rushing attempts for 222 yards and one score. He returned 13 punts for 134 yards (10.3-yard average) and returned 11 kickoff returns for 226 yards (20.5 avg.).

At the conclusion of his collegiate career, he ranked sixth in Razorbacks history in career receptions and receiving yards, and his touchdown reception total tied for fifth all-time. He set an Arkansas record with 10 career 100-yard receiving games, including a school-record six 100yard receiving performances in his final year.

Burks earned All-SEC honors in each of his three seasons: in 2019, second-team All-SEC as a returner and All-Freshman as a receiver: secondteam All-SEC in 2020; and first-team All-SEC in 2021.

The Warren, Ark., native was drafted with the highest pick of any Arkansas player since **Darren McFadden** was taken fourth overall in 2008, and Burks was the first Arkansas wide receiver to be selected in the first round since Matt Jones was taken 21st overall by Jacksonville in 2006.

As a junior in 2021, Burks was named first-team All-SEC after totaling 66 receptions (seventh in the SEC) for 1,104 yards (fourth) and 11 touchdowns (fourth). His 92.0 receiving yards per game ranked third in the SEC behind only Jameson Williams (104.8) and Wan'Dale Robinson (102.6).

As a sophomore in 2020, he was named second-team All-SEC after contributing 51 receptions for 820 yards and seven touchdowns. His 91.1 receiving yards per game ranked third in the SEC behind only Elijah Moore (149.1) and **DeVonta Smith** (142.8).

#10 • WR DeANDRE HOPKINS

6-1, 212, 12th Year/2nd with Titans, Clemson Click for complete bio

Wide receiver **DeAndre Hopkins** is in his 12th NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the team prior to training camp in 2023.



Hopkins entered the league as the 27th overall pick in the 2013 NFL Draft out of Clemson and spent his first seven seasons with the Houston Texans before being traded to the Arizona Cardinals in 2020.

Over NFL 11 seasons, Hopkins established himself as one of the premier receivers in NFL history. Among all players during that 11-year period, he ranked first in receptions (928), first in first-down receptions (642), first in receiving yards (12,355), third in receiving touchdowns (78), and first in receptions of 25-plus yards (113). He has been named to five Pro Bowls (2015, 2017-20) and received AP All-Pro honors four times—first-team All-Pro from 2017 to 2019 and second-team All-Pro in 2020.

From 2013 through 2023, Hopkins surpassed 100 receptions four times, had seven seasons reaching 1,000 receiving yards, recorded three seasons with at least 10 touchdowns, and posted 100 or more receiving yards in a game 42 times. Hopkins was the only NFL player to have 100-plus receptions every season between from 2018 to 2020.

Hopkins became one of 17 players in NFL history to reach 900 receptions, 12,000 receiving yards and 75 touchdown catches during a career. Only five players—Hopkins, **Marvin Harrison**, **Jerry Rice**, **Brandon Marshall** and **Larry Fitzgerald**—reached all three milestones within their first 11 NFL seasons.

He concluded the 2023 season tied with **Antonio Brown** for 21st place in NFL history with 928 career receptions. His 12,355 career receiving yards ranked 23rd all-time, and his 78 touchdown receptions were 35th in history.

Through 2023, he had at least one reception in all 162 career games he played during the regular season. That represents the longest active streak in the NFL at the conclusion of 2023 and the third-longest streak in NFL history to begin a career behind only **Marvin Harrison** (190 consecutive games) and **Keyshawn Johnson** (167).

During the 2022 campaign with the Cardinals, Hopkins finished with a team-high 64 receptions for 717 yards (second on the team) and three touchdowns despite being limited to nine contests. His average of 7.1 receptions per game ranked fourth in the NFL among all players. His three games with 10-plus receptions matched the second most in franchise annals behind **Larry Fitzgerald's** four such performances in 2017.

At the conclusion of his tenure with the Texans (2013-19), Hopkins owned several franchise records, including franchise marks for career receiving average (13.6), receptions in a season (115 in 2018; tied Andre Johnson, 2008), receiving touchdowns in a season (13 in 2017) and receiving first downs in a season (83 in 2015). When he left Houston, he ranked second on the franchise's all-time career charts in receptions (632), receiving yards (8,602) and touchdown catches (54), trailing only **Andre Johnson** in each category.

The Central, S.C., native appeared in 39 games with 32 starts over three seasons (2010-12) at Clemson and totaled 206 receptions for 3,020 yards and 27 touchdowns. He left Clemson ranked first in school history in receiving yards, first in receiving touchdowns, first in 100-yard receiving games (12) and second in receptions. As a junior (2012), he led the team with 82 receptions for 1,405 yards and 18 touchdowns.

Wide receiver Calvin Ridley is in his sixth NFL season and his first season with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 15, 2024.



Prior to joining the Titans, Ridley appeared in 66 NFL games with 52 starts. He was originally drafted by the Atlanta Falcons with the 26th overall pick of the 2018 NFL Draft and was traded to the Jacksonville Jaguars

in 2022. His statistical totals with the Falcons and Jaguars included 324 receptions for 4,358 yards and 36 touchdowns.

In 2023, Ridley started a career-high 17 games for the Jaguars and led the team with 1,016 yards and eight receiving touchdowns on 76 catches.

From 2018 through 2020, no member of the 2018 draft class had more receptions or touchdown catches than Ridley, who totaled 217 grabs and 26 scores for the Falcons during that span. His 3,061 receiving yards ranked second in his draft class behind only DJ Moore's 3,156. Ridley's 90 receptions and 1,374 yards in 2020 were career highs.

As a rookie in 2018, Ridley played in all 16 games and accumulated 64 receptions. He led all rookie receivers in the NFL with 821 receiving yards and a team-high 10 receiving touchdowns, including an NFL-rookie record six receiving scores in the team's first four games. He was named to the All-Rookie team by the Professional Football Writers of America.

A native of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Ridley attended the University of Alabama, where he played in 44 games over three seasons (2015-17. he finished his career second in Crimson Tide history with 224 receptions and 19 receiving touchdowns. He also ranked third with 2,781 receiving yards, while totaling eight career 100-yard receiving games to tie for third in the Alabama record books.

2024 Game Notes:

> At Chicago (9/8), started in his Titans debut and led the offense with 50 receiving yards on three caches. He converted a third-and-15 with a 22yard reception in the second quarter.

> Against the N.Y. Jets (9/15), led the team with 77 receiving yards on four catches, including a touchdown, and added a rushing touchdown. It was his 10th consecutive game with at least three receptions. > Against Green Bay (9/22), caught one pass for nine yards.



Wide receiver **Nick Westbrook-Ikhine** is in his fifth NFL season in 2024. He was originally signed by the Titans as a rookie free agent on May 7, 2020.





From the beginning of his second year in the NFL (2021) through 2023, Westbrook-Ikhine led the Titans in receptions (91), receiving yards (1,243), touchdown catches (10) and receptions for first downs (59).

The 2023 campaign was the third consecutive season for Westbrook-Ikhine with at least 25 receptions, 370 receiving yards and three touchdowns. He registered 28 catches for 370 yards and three scores in 14 games (nine starts) before finishing the season on injured reserve.

In 2022, Westbrook-Ikhine appeared in all 17 games with a careerhigh 13 starts. He posted 25 catches for 397 yards and three touchdowns.



in 2023 to register 14 or more starts, and he joined **Nicholas Petit-Frere** (2022), **Jack Conklin** (2016), **Chance Warmack** (2013), **Michael Roos** (2005) and **Jacob Bell** (2004) as the only rookie offensive linemen to record at least 14 starts for the franchise during its "Titans era" (1999–present).

During a three-year career at Northwestern University, Skoronski started all 33 games at left tackle without missing a game. He earned second-team All-Big Ten honors as a freshman and first-team recognition in each of the next two seasons. He became the first offensive lineman in program history to earn two All-Big Ten first-team awards.

As a junior in 2022, he was named the Rimington-Pace Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year—the first ever by a Northwestern lineman—after starting all 12 games at left tackle. He was the first player in school history to become a unanimous first-team All-American and was named first-team All-Big Ten by coaches and media. He finished as a finalist for the 2022 Outland Trophy.

When the Titans drafted Skoronski, he became Northwestern's highest draft selection since guard **Chris Hinton** went to Denver with the fourth pick in 1983, and he was the 11th player in program history to be picked in the first round.

His grandfather, **Bob Skoronski Sr.**, was a left tackle for the Green Bay Packers, playing nine total seasons with the franchise. He was a permanent offensive captain for the Packers under **Vince Lombardi** and

Defensive lineman **Sebastian Joseph-Day** is in his sixth NFL season and his first season with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 20, 2024.



Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Joseph-Day totaled 71 games played and 68 starts for the Los Angeles Rams (2018-21), Los Angeles Chargers

(2022-23) and San Francisco 49ers (2023). His statistical totals during that time included 230 tackles, 11 sacks, one interception, five passes defensed, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

In 2023, Joseph-Day started the first 14 games of the season with the Chargers and collected 32 tackles, three sacks and 25 quarterback pressures. After being released by the Chargers, he was signed by the 49ers as a free agent on Dec. 27 and saw action as a reserve in the final two regular season contests, amassing five tackles. He then appeared as a reserve in all three of the 49ers' postseason contests and registered three tackles, including a tackle in Super Bowl LVIII.

Joseph-Day originally entered the NFL as a sixth-round pick (195th overall) of the Rams in 2018. After not seeing game action his entire rookie campaign, he totaled 38 starts and six sacks over the next three seasons with the Rams, culminating with an appearance in the Rams' Super Bowl LVI victory. He then joined the Chargers during the 2022 offseason and played in 30 regular season games with the club before heading to San Francisco.

The Stroudsburg, Pa., native played five seasons at Rutgers, where he amassed 90 total tackles, 3.5 sacks, two passes defensed, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

Defensive lineman **Jeffery Simmons** is in his sixth NFL season in 2024. He was selected by the Titans in the first round (19th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft.



During his first five seasons, Simmons appeared in 68 games with 66 starts and earned two Pro Bowl berths. The three-time team captain (2021-

23) accumulated 240 tackles, 26.5 sacks, 20 passes defensed, three forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries. He was third on the defense in sacks during that span behind only **Harold Landry III** (37) and **Denico Autry** (28.5).

In 2023, although he was limited to 12 games and finished the season on injured reserve, he managed to register 5.5 sacks, marking his third consecutive season to reach that number or higher. He added 44 tackles, 38 quarterback pressures, 11 tackles for loss, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and one pass defensed. For the first time in his career, he received the honor of the team's nomination for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award.

In 2022, Simmons appeared in 15 games and anchored a unit that ranked first in the NFL in rushing defense (76.9 opponent rushing yards per game). En route to his second consecutive Pro Bowl appearance, he totaled 53 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 43 quarterback pressures, nine tackles for loss, one forced fumble and a career-high seven passes defensed, which tied for the fourth-best mark among all NFL defensive linemen. Simmons and Arizona's J.J. Watt were the NFL's only players in 2022 with at least seven sacks and seven passes defensed.

Before the start of the 2021 season, Simmons was named a team captain for the first time in his career, and he went on to become one of six players on the roster to start all 17 games. He was named to his first career Pro Bowl and added Associated Press second-team All-Pro honors after setting career highs in several categories, including sacks (8.5), tackles (54), quarterback pressures (58), tackles for loss (12) and passes defensed (six). He led the squad in pressures and placed third in sacks. Among all defensive tackles in the NFL, his 8.5 sacks ranked sixth. In the divisional playoffs, he set a franchise postseason record with three sacks.

In 2020, Simmons appeared and started in 15 games. With three defensive fumble recoveries, he tied **Chase Young** for the most in the NFL in 2020 and was the first Titans defender with three fumble recoveries in a season since 2005, when linebacker **Brad Kassell** accomplished the feat. Simmons ranked second on the team with 19 quarterback pressures and added 49 tackles, three sacks, three tackles for loss, five passes defensed and one forced fumble. In the franchise's "Titans era" (since 1999), he became the first player to post at least three fumble recoveries, three sacks and five passes defensed in the same season. He also had three tackles and a tackle for loss in one playoff contest.

Simmons began his rookie season on the non-football injury list due to a knee injury he suffered during training in February 2019. He missed the first six games of the season before joining the 53-man roster in Week 7.

His rookie totals included 40 tackles, two sacks, two tackles for loss, 14 quarterback pressures and one pass defensed in nine games (seven starts). He added four tackles, three quarterback pressures and a fumble recovery in three playoff contests.

During a three-year career as a defensive tackle at Mississippi State, Simmons appeared in 38 contests with 28 starts. He finished his career ranked sixth in school history with 32.5 tackles for loss. He also tied for sixth in MSU annals with five forced fumbles and tied for fourth with three blocked kicks. His totals also included 163 tackles, seven sacks, seven passes defensed and two defensive touchdowns.

He was a first-team All-SEC selection as a sophomore and junior and was one of two players in the nation to be named a Bednarik Award Semifinalist in both 2017 and 2018.

As a junior in 2018, Simmons was named second-team All-American after totaling 63 tackles, 17 tackles for loss and two sacks. His 17 tackles for loss led the team, ranked fourth in the SEC and were the third-most in single-season school history.

During his sophomore season (2017), he set a career high with five sacks and added 12 tackles for loss. With three total blocked kicks and punts, he became the first SEC player since 2004 to lead the nation in the category.

Simmons is a native of Macon, Miss.

Linebacker Ernest Jones IV is in his fourth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was acquired in a trade with the Los Angeles Rams on Aug. 28, 2024.

Jones spent his first three NFL seasons with the Rams after he was selected in the third round (103rd overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft. In 47 games

with the club, he totaled 33 starts, 316 tackles, 5.5 sacks, 19 tackles for loss, three interceptions, 12 passes defensed and one forced fumble. Among members of the 2021 draft class, only Kansas City's Nick Bolton (352) has more tackles than Jones over the past three campaigns.

As a team captain for the Rams in 2023, Jones appeared and started in 15 games. He was credited with 145 tackles, placing 11th in the NFL and breaking James Laurinaitis' single-season franchise record of 142 total tackles (2011 and 2012). Additionally, he produced a career-high 4.5 sacks, 14 tackles for loss and six passes defensed. From 2019 through 2023, Jones and Roquan Smith (2022) were the NFL's only players to produce at least 145 tackles and 4.5 sacks in a single campaign.

Jones was a member of playoff teams with the Rams in 2021 and 2023. As a rookie, he was a starter and recorded a sack in the Rams' victory over the Cincinnati Bengals in Super Bowl LVI.

The Waycross, Ga., native attended the University of South Carolina, where he appeared in 26 games in three seasons. His statistics with the Gamecocks included 199 tackles, two sacks and two interceptions. He was a Butkus Award semifinalist in 2020.

Outside linebacker **Arden Key** is in his seventh NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 20, 2023.

In 2023, Key appeared in 17 games for the third consecutive season and registered nine starts—the most since starting 10 times in 2018 as a rookie with

Oakland. He ranked second on the team with a career-high 57 quarterback pressures, and his six sacks provided the second-best total of his career. He added 30 tackles, four tackles for loss, two passes defensed and two forced fumbles.

Key originally entered the NFL as a third-round pick (87th overall) of the Oakland Raiders in 2018 and spent his first three campaigns with the organization. He then spent the 2021 campaign with the San Francisco 49ers and the 2022 season with the Jacksonville Jaguars. His statistical totals during his first five NFL seasons included 98 tackles and 14 sacks in 71 games (13 starts).

In 2022, Key played 17 games with three starts for the Jaguars and totaled 27 tackles, 4.5 sacks, 38 quarterback pressures, five tackles for loss and a fumble recovery. His 38 pressures ranked second for the Jaguars, and over the last five weeks of the season, he posted 25 pressures, which ranked second in the league behind Nick Bosa over that time frame. He was a key figure in helping the Jaguars win the AFC South and advance to the divisional round of the playoffs.

In 2021, Key notched a career-best 6.5 sacks to go along with 22 tackles and 25 quarterback pressures in his lone season with the 49ers.

During a three-year career at Louisiana State University, Key totaled 21 sacks and 26.5 tackles for loss. As a sophomore, he earned all-conference honors, while setting the school record for sacks in a season (12.0). He is a native of Atlanta, Ga.

Outside linebacker **Harold Landry III** is in his seventh NFL season in 2024. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (41st overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft after the Titans traded up 16 spots in the second round (57 to 41) in order to take the former Boston College standout.



During his first six NFL seasons, Landry totaled

a team-leading 41.5 sacks. He finished the 2023 season ranked 11th for the franchise in career sacks, and in the organization's "Titans era" (1999– present), his total trailed only **Jevon Kearse** (52), **Jurrell Casey** (51) and **Derrick Morgan** (44.5).

In 2023, Landry played in all 17 games (10 starts) after missing the entire 2022 campaign due to injury. He ranked second on the team with 10.5 sacks, producing his second-best career total (12 sacks in 2021). In doing so, he became the NFL's third veteran player since 1982 to miss an entire NFL season and come back the next year to record at least 10 sacks. The only previous players to do so were a pair of New Orleans Saints: **Joe Johnson** in 2000 (12 sacks) and **Charlie Clemons** in 2001 (13.5 sacks). Landry's 14 tackles for loss led the defense and matched his career high, and his 48 quarterback pressures were third on the squad and were one off his career high in 2021 (49). His statistics also included 70 tackles.

Landry was placed on injured reserve on Sept. 2, 2022, ending his fifth NFL season before Week 1. Prior to the injury, he recorded 64 consecutive games played and 52 consecutive starts.

From the start of his rookie campaign through 2021, Landry's 31 total sacks led the Titans. Other than **Jevon Kearse** (37), Landry produced the highest sack total by a Titans/Oilers player in his first four NFL seasons since individual sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982.

From 2018 to 2021, Landry joined Pittsburgh's **Cameron Heyward** as the NFL's only players to be credited with at least 250 tackles (press box statistics), 30 sacks and two interceptions.

In 2021, Landry was named to his first Pro Bowl after starting all 17 games. He registered his third consecutive season to start every contest, extending his streaks to 64 consecutive games played and 52 consecutive starts. At the conclusion of 2021, his starting streak was the sixth-longest active streak in the NFL among all defensive players.

Landry's 12 sacks in 2021 led the Titans, ranked 10th in the NFL and established a career high. He became the first Titans player to record double-digit sacks in a season since **Brian Orakpo** (10.5) in 2016 and the first Titans player with 12 sacks in a season since **Jason Babin** (12.5) in 2010. Landry tied for second on the squad with 75 tackles, ranked second with a career-high 49 quarterback pressures, led the team with 14 tackles for loss, and added a forced fumble. He joined **Micah Parsons**, **Aaron Donald** and Heyward as the only NFL players in 2021 to post at least 75 tackles and 10 sacks.

Then, in the team's 2021 divisional playoff contest, he recorded 1.5 sacks. He improved his postseason career total to 4.5 sacks, becoming the organization's first player with at least four career postseason sacks since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982.

In 2020, Landry recorded 16 starts for the second consecutive



season. He led the team with 5.5 sacks, a then-career-high 32 quarterback pressures and a then-career-high 10 tackles for loss. He totaled 69 tackles and added one interception and a career-high five passes defensed. In one playoff contest, he led the team with 10 tackles and two sacks.

Landry started all 16 games in 2019 and led the Titans with nine sacks. His 28 quarterback pressures ranked second, and he added 81 tackles, four tackles for loss, one pass defensed, one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. He also started all three postseason games and registered a sack and a team-high eight quarterback pressures.

As a rookie in 2018, he played in 15 games with three starts. His 4.5 sacks tied for third place on the team, and he also tied for second on the defense with 18 quarterback pressures.

In 46 career games playing defensive end for Boston College, Landry totaled 160 tackles, 26 sacks, 47.5 tackles for loss, seven passes defensed, 10 forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and one interception. His 26 career sacks were exceeded in school history by only **Mathias Kiwanuka** (37.5 from 2002-05).

As a senior in 2017, Landry played and started eight games before a season-ending ankle injury ended his year. He finished second on the team with five sacks and totaled 38 tackles, 8.5 tackles for loss and two passes defensed.

In 2016, Landry set the school's single-season record with 16.5 sacks, which led the nation. He added seven forced fumbles, which also led the country, while his 22 tackles for loss ranked fifth nationally and ranked second all-time for the Eagles. His numerous honors included Walter Camp second-team All-America, AP second-team All-America and second-team All-ACC by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association and the league's head coaches.

He is a native of Spring Lake, N.C.

In improving his career total to 44.5 sacks, he tied Derrick Morgan for 10th place on the franchise's all-time sack list. He also tied Morgan for the thirdhighest sack total for the team in its "Titans era" (1999-present), trailing only Jevon Kearse (52) and Jurrell Casey (51). Landry became the first Titans player to total three or more sacks through the first two games of a season since Derrick Morgan accomplished the feat (three sacks) in 2015. > Against Green Bay (9/22), tallied four tackles and two quarterback pressures.

LANDRY'S TRIUMPHANT COMEBACK

In 2021, **Harold Landry III** was named to his first career Pro Bowl, finishing his fourth NFL season with a career-high 12 sacks. Then, poised to follow up on his career year, he suffered a knee injury before the start of the 2022 regular season. It forced him to spend all 17 games on injured reserve.



Cornerback **Chidobe Awuzie** is in his eighth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 14, 2024.



Awuzie arrived in Tennessee with seven years of experience and 86 total games with the Dallas

Cowboys (2017-20) and Cincinnati Bengals (2021-23). His totals during that time included 74 starts, 369 tackles, six interceptions, 62 passes defensed, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

In his three seasons with the Bengals, Awuzie recorded two interceptions and broke up 25 passes, including six passes defensed in 15 games during the 2023 campaign.

Cornerback Roger McCreary is in his third NFL season in 2024. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (35th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.

In his first two seasons, McCreary's totals included two interceptions and 170 tackles in 32 games (28 starts). His 170 tackles from 2022 to 2023 made up the NFL's third-highest total among

cornerbacks, trailing Buffalo's Taron Johnson (187) and former Chiefs cornerback and current Titan L'Jarius Sneed (186).

In 2023, McCreary ranked third on the team and led all Titans defensive backs with 86 tackles. Among all NFL cornerbacks, his 86 tackles tied Las Vegas' Nate Hobbs for the third-highest total behind Johnson (98) and Indianapolis' Kenny Moore II (93). McCreary added one interception, six passes defensed, two sacks, four quarterback pressures, seven tackles for loss and one forced fumble.

As a rookie, McCreary was one of three players on the team to start all 17 games (Kevin Byard, Aaron Brewer), and he became the first Titans rookie cornerback since Adoree' Jackson in 2017 to start every game. Only two other rookie cornerbacks in the NFL-Seattle's Tariq Woolen and the New York Jets' Sauce Gardner-started all 17 games in 2022. McCreary finished third on the Titans defense with 85 tackles, ranked second on the defense with eight passes defensed, and added one interception, two tackles for loss and one quarterback pressure.

During four seasons at Auburn (2018-21), McCreary appeared in 43 games with 23 starts and posted 135 tackles, five interceptions, 35 passes defensed, 10 stops for loss, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries.



As a senior in 2021, McCreary started 12 games at cornerback for the Tigers and collected a career-best 49 tackles, an interception, a sack, two stops for loss and a team-best 16 passes defensed. He was a first-team All-America selection by The Athletic, Associated Press, ESPN and Reese's Senior Bowl.

Cornerback L'Jarius Sneed is in his fifth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was acquired by the Titans in a trade with the Kansas City Chiefs on April 1, 2024.

Sneed spent four seasons with the Chiefs after they selected him in the fourth round (138th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft. During that time, he tallied

10 interceptions, 40 passes defensed and 6.5 sacks in 57 games. He and Harrison Smith were the only two NFL players from 2020 to 2023 to record at least 10 interceptions and 6.5 sacks.

Sneed also arrived in Tennessee with 13 games of postseason experience. He helped the Chiefs win two Super Bowls (LVII, LVIII), and his seven passes defensed tied for third in the postseason from 2020 to 2023. 

Safety **Jamal Adams** is in his eighth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as a free agent on July 11, 2024.

A three-time Pro Bowler (2018-20), Adams totaled seven seasons with the New York Jets (2017-19) and the Seattle Seahawks (2020-23) before arriving in Tennessee. During that time, he registered 493 tackles,

21.5 sacks, four interceptions, including one returned for a touchdown, 36 passes defensed, 50 tackles for loss, seven forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries in 80 starts.



Long snapper Morgan Cox is in his 15th NFL season and his fourth campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 19, 2021.



In 2023, Cox handled all of the team's long snapping duties for the third consecutive season. With 51 consecutive games played in his first three

seasons with the Titans, he finished the 2023 campaign with the longest active streak of games played for the team. His efforts helped kicker Nick Folk lead the NFL in field goal accuracy (96.7 percent) and helped punter Ryan Stonehouse lead the NFL for a second consecutive season in gross punting average (53.1). He was also a finalist in 2023 for the NFL's Bart Starr Award.

In 2022, Cox was named to his fifth career Pro Bowl. He has more Pro Bowl appearances than any other player at his position since the league began naming long snappers to the Pro Bowl in 2004.

His steady play in 2022 helped Stonehouse, a rookie, lead the league and set a new NFL record with a 53.1-yard gross punting average. Stonehouse also finished fourth in the NFL and set a rookie record with a 44.0-yard net average. Meanwhile, kicker Randy Bullock made 17 of 20 field goals (85.0 percent) and made all 28 extra point attempts.

In 2021, Cox handled all of the team's long snapping duties in 17 regular season games and one postseason game. He helped Bullock finish ninth in franchise history with 120 points in a single season, including three game-winning field goals (Sept. 19 at Seattle, Oct. 31 at Indianapolis and Dec. 23 against San Francisco). He also snapped for punter Brett Kern, who had the league's third-best ratio of punts inside the 20 to touchbacks (18:1).

In his first 11 seasons, Cox appeared in 165 regular season games for the Baltimore Ravens, serving as the team's primary long snapper after entering the NFL as an undrafted free agent in 2010. He was selected to four Pro Bowls and was a part of five playoff teams in Baltimore, totaling 10 postseason games played.

In 2020, he earned his fourth career Pro Bowl selection. He helped kicker Justin Tucker record his fifth consecutive season with at least 130 points, tying the NFL record of consecutive seasons with 130-plus points. Tucker connected on 26 of 29 field goals (89.7 percent) and was 52 of 53 on extra points (98.1 percent). Cox also snapped on all 51 of Sam Koch's 51 punts, as Koch was the NFL's only punter to place at least 20 punts (22) inside in the 20-yard line and have no more than one touchback.

A native of Collierville, Tenn., Cox played 38 games in three seasons (2007-09) as the primary long snapper at the University of Tennessee.

Kicker **Nick Folk** is in his 17th NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was acquired by the Titans in a trade with the New England Patriots on Aug. 29, 2023.



At the conclusion of the 2023 season, Folk's 382 career field goals ranked fourth among all active kickers behind only **Matt Prater** (401), **Mason**

Crosby (400) and **Justin Tucker** (395), and Folk's number also ranked 19th in NFL history. His 1,632 total points scored ranked 23rd in league annals. Among all active NFL players at the conclusion of 2023, Folk's 228 career games ranked 10th.

Through 2023, Folk carried an all-time NFL-record streak of 78 consecutive field goals from under 40 yards—a streak going back to 2017. Tucker previously owned the record with 70 straight under-40-yarders from 2016 to 2020.

In his first season in Tennessee, Folk appeared in all 17 games and made 29 field goals on 30 attempts. His career-best 96.7 percent accuracy on field goals led the NFL and tied for the 14th-best single-season mark in NFL history. It also established a new franchise record for a single season, breaking the record of 92.3 percent by **AI Del Greco** (1998) and **Rob Bironas** (2010). Folk's initial season with the Titans also included 28 extra points on 30 attempts. His 115 total points tied for the 13th-best single-season total in franchise history.

In his first 15 NFL seasons prior to joining the Titans, Folk spent time with the Dallas Cowboys (2007-09), New York Jets (2010-2016), Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2017) and Patriots (2019-22). During that time, he connected on 82.9 percent (353 of 426) of his field goal attempts and 96.8 percent of his extra point attempts (458 of 473). He had 10 seasons with at least 100 points, including a league-leading 150 points in 2021 with the Patriots. He registered 11 game-winning field goals in the regular season and one in postseason play.

Over his four years with New England, Folk made 108 of his 121 field goal attempts (89.3 percent) in 57 games. He departed the Patriots in fifth place on the New England all-time field goal list and tied for seventh place on the franchise's all-time scoring list with 440 total points.

In 2022, he played in all 17 games for New England and totaled 128 points on 32-of-37 field goal attempts. He was also 32-of-35 on extra points. Folk became one of six all-time NFL players to have at least five seasons with 30 field goals, joining Tucker (eight), **Stephen Gostkowski** (five), **Robbie Gould** (five), **John Carney** (five) and **David Akers** (five).

Folk established the NFL record for consecutive field goals made under 50 yards with a streak of 64 such kicks from Oct. 5, 2017 to Oct. 16, 2022. He broke the record (56 consecutive) set by **Ryan Succop** of the Titans from 2014 to 2017.

While with the Patriots, he also set the franchise mark for consecutive field goals made (36) during a streak that spanned from 2020 to 2021 and posted the third-highest field goal percentage for a season by a Patriot in 2020 (92.9).

Folk entered the NFL as a sixth-round selection by the Dallas in the 2007 NFL Draft. As a rookie for the Cowboys, he earned a Pro Bowl selection and all-rookie honors.

A native of Sherman Oaks, Calif., Folk attended the University of Arizona, where he earned All-PAC 10 accolades in his final season.

> At Chicago (9/8), made his only field goal attempt, a 40-yarder in the second quarter, and made both of his extra point attempts.

From 2020 to 2021, Nick Folk made 36 consecutive field goals as a member of the New England Patriots. Through the 2023 campaign, Folk's streak was tied for the sixth-longest such streak in NFL history.

Punter **Ryan Stonehouse** is in his third NFL season in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as a rookie free agent on May 13, 2022.



In only two NFL seasons, Stonehouse recorded the top two single-season gross punting averages in NFL history, and he also recorded two of the top three single-season net averages in franchise

history. He became the first punter in NFL annals to lead the league in gross punting average in each of his first two seasons.

In 2023, he appeared in the first 12 games of the season before missing the final five contests on injured reserve. Despite his missed time, he averaged a league-high 53.06 yards per punt, grossing 2,812 yards on 53 attempts. The average qualified as the second-highest figure in NFL history behind his own record-setting 53.10 yards per punt as a rookie in 2022. He also finished sixth in the NFL with a 43.87-yard net punting average, which ranked third in franchise history.

In 2022, Stonehouse finished the season with a gross average of 53.10 yards per punt on 90 total punts (4,779 total yards). In doing so, he broke **Sammy Baugh's** single-season NFL record of 51.40 yards per punt, which was established in 1940 and was never matched among qualifiers (2.5 punts per team game) until Stonehouse's rookie campaign. Stonehouse's mark also surpassed **Brett Kern's** franchise record of 49.7 yards per punt in 2017.

With a net punting average of 44.0 yards per punt in 2022, Stonehouse also established a new NFL record for the highest net average by a rookie punter. He broke the record set by Indianapolis' **Rigoberto Sanchez**, who averaged 42.64 net yards per punt as a rookie in 2017. Stonehouse finished fourth in the NFL in net punting behind veterans **Tommy Townsend** (45.6),

Michael Dickson (44.5) and **Johnny Hekker** (44.1). In franchise history, his net average ranked second for a single season, trailing only Kern's 44.6 net average in 2017.

Stonehouse's 90 punts in 2022 made up the NFL's second-highest total. Only Denver's **Corliss Waitman** (96) had more. The 90 punts by Stonehouse tied **Craig Hentrich's** 1999 number for the fourth-highest total in team annals behind **Rich Camarillo** (96 punts in 1994) and **Cliff Parsley** (93 in 1979; 91 in 1978).

Stonehouse appeared in 53 games over five seasons at Colorado State (2017-21) and set an NCAA career record with a 47.8-yard gross punting average. His career totals included 244 punts for 11,656 yards with 91 punts inside the 20. He totaled 106 punts of 50-plus yards and became the first player in Colorado State history to log 11,000 punting yards in a career.

During his final college season in 2021, Stonehouse appeared in 12 games and averaged 50.9 yards per attempt on 58 punts, including a careerlong 81-yard punt. He placed 27 punts inside the 20-yard line and totaled 32 punts of 50-plus yards en route to being named a second-team All-Mountain West selection and a Ray Guy Award semifinalist.

He is a native of La Verne, Calif.

2024 Game Notes:

> At Chicago (9/8), played in the regular season for the first time since suffering a season-ending knee injury on Dec. 3, 2023. He averaged 53.6 yards on five punts (34.0 net) with one punt placed inside the 20 and one punt blocked.

➤ Against the N.Y. Jets (9/15), averaged 56.5 yards on four punts (38.2 net) with one punt placed inside the 20 and one punt blocked. His 56.5-yard gross average was the fifth-best of his career in a game with four or more punts. He booted a 63-yard punt in the third quarter, and his 59-yarder in the fourth quarter pinned the Jets inside the 20.

> Against Green Bay (9/22), averaged 46.8 yards (43.0 net) on four punts with one punt placed inside the 20. In the fourth quarter, he launched a 57-yard punt to mark his 10th consecutive game with at least one punt of 55-plus yards, extending the NFL's longest such active streak.

NFL RECORD: SINGLE-SEASON AVERAGE

In 1940, Washington's **Sammy Baugh** punted 35 times for 1,799 yards, averaging 51.40 yards per punt. Eighty-two seasons later, the mark still stood as the best qualifying single-season punting average in NFL history, until Titans rookie punter **Ryan Stonehouse** broke the record in 2022.

Stonehouse, an undrafted rookie from Colorado State University, averaged 53.10 yards per attempt on 90 total punts—1.70 yards per punt ahead of Baugh's number.

Then, in his second season, Stonehouse averaged an NFL-high 53.06 yards per punt. His 53 attempts (2,812 yards) qualified him for the single-season charts, and as a result, he owns the top two numbers of all-time in his first two NFL seasons.

Prior to Stonehouse's rookie campaign, Baugh's mark was one of the NFL's longest-held records. In the 2022 NFL Record & Fact Book, only three single-season individual records predated Baugh's punting mark, and all three of those were later tied: most safeties in a season (two by Green Bay's **Tom Nash** in 1932 and subsequently tied 18 times), most fumbles returned for a touchdown in a season (two by Boston's **Harold McPhail** in 1934 and tied 44 times), and most opponent fumbles returned for a touchdown in a season (two by McPhail in 1934 and tied 41 times).

To qualify for the single-season average record, a punter needs a minimum of 2.5 attempts per team game.

> In July 2022, the official ribbon cutting was held at the Jeffery B. Simmons Field House at Noxubee County High School in Macon, Miss. Simmons donated more than \$50,000 to upgrade his former high school's athletic facilities. During the same week, he donated \$75,000 to Starkville (Miss.) Parks and Recreation to be used for a new turf field at the Starkville Sportsplex. The field was also named in his honor.

> Simmons' brother, Dylan Bradley, played football at Southern Miss and then spent time with the Minnesota Vikings. His uncle, Jason Hatcher, played 10 total seasons with the Dallas Cowboys and Washington Commanders.

His grandfather, Bob Skoronski, was a left tackle for the Green Bay Packers, playing nine total seasons with the franchise. He missed two seasons while serving in the U.S. Air Force. He was a permanent offensive captain for the Packers under Vince Lombardi from 1964 to 1968 and played on five NFL championship teams. In 1976, he was inducted into the Packers Hall of Fame. Among all offensive linemen at the 2023 NFL Scouting Combine, Skoronski placed second in the vertical jump (34.50 inches), second in the broad jump (9 feet 7 inches), fifth in the bench press (30 reps) and ninth in the 10-yard split (1.75 seconds).

Spears has worked with a non-profit organization in New Orleans called Son of a Saint, which provides "mentorship, education, recreation, camaraderie, cultural enrichment, emotional support and helping to fill the void for dozens of fatherless young men." > His first job as a teenager was working at Walmart.

4 - P RYAN STONEHOUSE

> Stonehouse comes from a lineage of punters. His father, Paul, was an All-American punter for Stanford. His uncle, John Stonehouse was an All-American punter at Southern California and was signed by the New York Giants as a rookie free agent in 1996. His uncle, Jeff Banks, was a punter at Washington State. His younger cousin, Jack, is a punter at Missouri.

Stonehouse's father, Paul, and uncle, John, used to teach punting at their camp, The Kicking Game, and through private lessons. The camp's website houses testimonials from coaches Bill Walsh, John Robinson, Paul Pasqualoni and Mike Price.

> As a craftsman, Stonehouse built an outdoor kitchen in his home, that is owned by his grandmother, and it is complete with two different cooking areas, a sink, granite countertops, it is made out of wood and brick and is even wired for lighting.

DIRECTIONS TO NISSAN STADIUM

FROM AIRPORT TO NISSAN STADIUM (APPROXIMATELY 15 MINUTES): Take I-40 West toward Nashville/Memphis to I-24 West (before downtown). Exit at James Robertson Parkway (Exit 48). Turn left at first light (Interstate Drive). Turn right on Woodland Street. Nissan Stadium will be on the left. Follow signs to parking lot ("M" lot on northwest corner/river side of stadium).

NISSAN STADIUM MEDIA WILL CALL/MEDIA ENTRANCE

The media will call window and media entrance are located in the northwest corner of Nissan Stadium near Gate 6. The media will call window opens three hours prior to kickoff.

FIELD MEDIA VESTS

All members of the media with field access during the game must wear a media vest. Still and video photographers will be issued tan vests, while team-affiliated photographers and videographers (scoreboard, social, coaches' shows, etc.) will be issued gray vests. Additionally, media with in-game field access will be issued an armband. All vests and armbands must be obtained prior to each game at the check-in table. **Vest check-in is located on the third-floor landing near the press box.** All vests must be returned at the conclusion of the game to Titans personnel or to the vest check-in table.

NISSAN STADIUM PRESS BOX INTERNET ACCESS

Wireless internet access is available free of charge in the Nissan Stadium press box. The login information will be available upon arrival in the press box. A limited number of ethernet lines also are available. Accessing the wireless network works the same in the Nissan Stadium press box as it does in most areas with free connectivity. Titans staff may be able to assist in a limited manner, but you should first contact your company's I.T. department with any questions.

FROM NISSAN STADIUM PRESS BOX TO INTERVIEW ROOMS

Take the press box elevator (Level 3) to field level (Level 1). The Titans interview room is immediately on the right. Turn left and continue straight along the concourse to reach the visiting team's interview room (white line).

POSTGAME POLICIES

Reporters with press box credentials will not be allowed on the field during pre-game activities or during the game itself. Press box credentials do NOT provide access to the field at the two-minute warning in the fourth quarter. Media will be allowed to gather in the Titans interview room to watch the end of the game or remain in the press box to make the short walk down to the field level at the conclusion of the game. Interviews with Titans players are not permitted on the field following the game. The press conference will begin approximately 10 minutes following the conclusion of the game and will be held in the interview room across from the Titans locker room. Key players also will be brought to the interview room. Simultaneously, the locker room will open to credentialed media members with a working function. The press conference audio will be played live over the press box speakers.

POSTGAME QUOTES

Quotes from each team's head coach and key players will be transcribed and distributed throughout the Nissan Stadium press box following the game. The quotes also will be available at www.TennesseeTitans.com/media.

POOL REPORTS

Pool reporters are assigned by the Pro Football Writers of America. Requests for pool reports with game officials must be made in advance through the home team's media relations. Interviews will be conducted virtually. Pool reports will be recorded, transcribed and then distributed in the press box.

FROM NISSAN STADIUM PRESS BOX TO STADIUM EXIT: Cross the press box catwalk to the third floor lobby. Take the stairs or elevator one floor down to Level 2. Exit through the doors and walk right to get to the "M" lot.
