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TITANS-SEAHAWKS SUPPLEMENTAL NOTES

INTERCONFERENCE CLASHES: The Titans enter this week's game hoping to improve their 2023 record against NFC opponents to 3-2. They won previous contests against the Atlanta Falcons (Oct. 29) and Carolina Panthers (Nov. 26) and lost at the New Orleans Saints (Sept. 10) and Tampa Bay Buccaneers (Nov. 12). Having finished their games with the NFC South, this week's matchup with the NFC West's Seattle Seahawks is a result of each club's second-place divisional finish during the 2022 season.

Since Mike Vrabel arrived in Tennessee in 2018, he has guided the Titans to a 17-9 record against NFC foes. Their .654 interconference winning percentage ranks fourth in the NFL behind the Baltimore Ravens (.808), Kansas City Chiefs (.778) and Buffalo Bills (.741).

In the same stretch, the Seahawks rank fourth in the NFC and ninth in the NFL with a .600 interconference winning percentage (15-10).

THE 2022 TIGHT END CLASS: In his second NFL season, Titans tight end Chig Okonkwo ranks second on the team behind DeAndre Hopkins with 43 receptions and 395 receiving yards.

Okonkwo was selected by the Titans in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft with the 143rd overall pick. Among the 19 tight ends in his draft class, the former Maryland Terrapin ranks second with 845 career receiving yards and fourth with 75 receptions, and he is tied for second with 40 receiving first downs.

Okonkwo is averaging 11.3 yards per reception to begin his career. That not only leads all qualifying tight ends in his draft class but also ranks seventh among all NFL tight ends since the beginning of the 2022 campaign.

AUTRY LEADING SACK SURGE: Highlighted by **Denico Autry's** two sacks last week, the Titans defense totaled four sacks against the Texans. The performance gave the defense a total of 41 sacks in 2023, which puts them in a tie for eighth place in the NFL with three games remaining.

In the past four contests, the Titans have been especially effective in bringing down opposing quarterbacks. Since Week 12, when they defeated the Carolina Panthers, the Titans have totaled 16 sacks to tie the San Francisco 49ers and Indianapolis Colts for the third-highest number in the NFL. Only the Miami Dolphins (17) and Denver Broncos (17) have more during the same span.

Autry, who increased his season total to 11 sacks, also leads the Titans with five sacks over the past four weeks. His recent performance is tied with Chicago's **Montez Sweat** for fourth in the league and just a half sack behind the three leaders, who are tied with 5.5 sacks: Cincinnati's **Trey Hendrickson**, Indianapolis' **Samson Ebukam** and Houston's **Jonathan Greenard**.

Autry can accomplish the following this week:

- With one more sack, he would own the organization's 10th individual season with 12 or more sacks since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982. He would register the franchise's sixth individual 12-sack season in its "Titans era" (1999–present), joining Jevon Kearse (14.5 in 1999), Jason Babin (12.5 in 2010), Kyle Vanden Bosch (12.5 in 2005; 12 in 2007) and Harold Landry III (12 in 2021).
- > A two-sack performance would give him back-to-back games with two sacks for the second time in his career (2018).
- A two-sack performance also would give him 13 sacks in 2023, which would be second only to Jevon Kearse (14.5 in 1999) for the most single-season sacks for the franchise in its "Titans era" (1999–present).

TEAM SACK PACE: In addition to **Denico Autry's** career-high 11 sacks, outside linebacker **Harold Landry III** has 8.5 sacks this season and is approaching a double-digit total for possibly the second time in his career (12 in 2021). Defensive tackle **Jeffery Simmons** (5.5) and outside linebacker **Arden Key** (five) together account for 10.5 more of the team's 41 total sacks.

As a whole, the defense is on pace to finish with one of its best sack totals in the franchise's "Titans era," which began in 1999. Through the first 14 games of a season, its 41 sacks are the third most in that span and the most since 2000, when the squad had 49 sacks through 14 games.

TITANS AND SEAHAWKS AMONG TOP LATE-SEASON RUSHING TEAMS SINCE 2018: On Sunday, the Titans will play in their 30th regular season game in the months of December and January since head coach **Mike Vrabel's** first season in 2018. In those months, the Titans have fielded one of the league's top rushing attacks, as has their Week 16 opponent, the Seattle Seahawks, who are led by head coach **Pete Carroll**.

The Titans and Seahawks are two of the top three teams in the NFL in both rushing yards per December/January game and yards per rush in those games over the past six seasons. The Titans have rushed for 153.2 yards per contest to rank second in the NFL behind the Baltimore Ravens (189.5), while Seattle's 147.5 rushing yards per game rank third. Meanwhile, the Seahawks (5.1) and Titans (5.0) rank second and third, respectively, in yards per rushing attempt, trailing only the Ravens (5.4).
