TITANS-BRONCOS SUPPLEMENTAL NOTES

WALKER MOVES FURTHER UP LIST FOR CONSECUTIVE GAMES WITH A RECEPTION: Last week against the Bills, tight end **Delanie Walker** had one reception for 10 yards. It extended his streak to 82 consecutive games played with a reception—every game in which he has participated since he joined Tennessee in 2013.

Walker's current streak tied former Oilers wide receivers **Ernest Givins** (1988–1993) and **Charlie Hennigan** (1960–1966) for the second-longest streak of its kind in franchise history. With at least one catch this week at Denver, Walker's streak would be longer than all others in team annals besides tight end **Frank Wycheck's** 99 consecutive games with a reception from 1996–2002.

Walker began his career with the San Francisco 49ers (2006–2012), and he finished his time in San Francisco with at least one reception in his final seven games. That gives him 89 consecutive games played with one or more catches.

Walker's current streak leads all NFL tight ends and ranks sixth overall in the NFL.

TITANS RECORD 17 SACKS IN FIVE GAMES: The Titans defense has accumulated 17 sacks through five games, which is tied for the NFL's fourth-best total. The defense is led by second-year outside linebacker **Harold Landry III's** four total sacks.

Tennessee has nine different players with at least one sack. In addition to Landry, outside linebacker **Cameron Wake** (2.5), cornerback **Logan Ryan** (2.5), defensive tackle **Isaiah Mack** (1.5), inside linebacker **Jayon Brown** (one), defensive tackle **Jurrell Casey** (one), outside linebacker **Sharif Finch** (one), outside linebacker **Reggie Gilbert** (one) and defensive lineman **DaQuan Jones** (one) have contributed a sack. The unit also has one team sack, and inside linebacker **Rashaan Evans** has 0.5 sacks.

The Titans are one of five NFL teams with a league-leading nine players with a sack. They are joined by the Philadelphia Eagles, New Orleans Saints, New England Patriots and Carolina Panthers.

In the "Titans era" (1999–present), the current team has more sacks than all but one Titans club through five weeks of a season. In 2010, the Titans began the season with 22 total sacks through five games.

The 2010 team also has the claim on the most sacks for the Titans through six games with a total of 24, followed by 18 sacks from the Titans of 2000, 2005, 2008, 2013 and 2016.

TITANS AMONG LEADERS IN 40-YARD PASSING PLAYS: In last week's game, tight end **Jonnu Smith** caught a pass from **Marcus Mariota** and turned it into a 57-yard gain. It was the Titans' sixth passing play of at least 40 yards in 2019, and they have at least one such play in four of their five contests.

The Titans are tied with the Dallas Cowboys for second place in the NFL in 40-yard passes. They trail only the Kansas City Chiefs, whose eight such plays lead the league.

BROWN’S AVERAGE AMONG NFL’S BEST: Rookie wide receiver **A.J. Brown** is one of the primary reasons the Titans are among the leaders in 40-yard passing plays, accounting for three such receptions. Through the first five games of his rookie season, the second-round pick totaled 12 catches for 250 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

Brown’s average of 20.8 yards per catch ranks second in the NFL among qualifying players (minimum two receptions per team game). The only player with a higher average is his former Ole Miss teammate **DK Metcalf**, who is averaging 22.2 yards per reception as a rookie with the Seattle Seahawks.

Among only rookies, Brown is tied for sixth place in receptions, ranks fourth in receiving yards, and is tied for third in touchdown receptions.
