GIANTS AT PATRIOTS

The New York Giants travel to New England in Preseason Week 4 to play the Patriots on Thursday, Aug. 29. Kickoff is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. in Gillette Stadium. The Giants trail the regular season series that began in 1970, 6-4. This preseason finale marks the 15th consecutive time the two teams have closed out the preseason against each other.

The Giants are 2-0 in the postseason series, beating the Patriots in Super Bowl XLII, 17-14, and in Super Bowl XLVI, 21-17.

The two teams last met on Nov. 15, 2015 in MetLife Stadium when the Patriots beat the Giants, 27-26.

The Patriots are 3-0 coming off a 10-3 victory over the Carolina Panthers in Preseason Week 3, a 22-17 win over the Tennessee Titans in Week 2 and a 31-3 win over the Detroit Lions in Week 1.

NEWARK HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL EDUCATIONAL FORUM

This past Friday, the Giants partnered with the Newark Bronze Shields to engage Newark's youth in an educational program centered around college preparedness. The Newark Bronze Shields is an African American police organization in Newark, NJ comprised of over 300 members committed to the success of Newark and the surrounding areas. The organization hosts several events throughout the year to help improve police and citizen relationships and uplift youth.

All six Newark public high school football teams were invited to attend the educational forum in advance of the upcoming school year and college application process. Panelists for the forum included Darrick Brown (Director of Football Academics for Rutgers), Andre Hollis (Principal of Weequahic High School), Roger Leon (Newark Public Schools Superintendent), and three Giants players: Antoine Bethea, Dalvin Tomlinson, and Michael Thomas.

Shabazz High School, Barringer High School, and West Side High School football teams were each surprised with \$10,000 equipment grants. These three grants completed the Giants' financial support of all six programs over the past two years.

23rd YEAR IN NFL

2nd YEAR WITH GIANTS

A 20-year NFL coaching veteran, Shurmur joined the Giants after a two-year stint with the Minnesota Vikings, including the last 27 games as offensive coordinator. In 2017, he was named the NFL Assistant Coach of the Year by the Pro Football Writers Association.

2018 SEASON: Led the Giants to a 5-11 season. The Giants ranked 2nd in kickoff return yards (1097), 5th in total tackles (1101), 6th in field goals made (32), 7th in total interceptions (16), and 9th in receiving yards (4405).

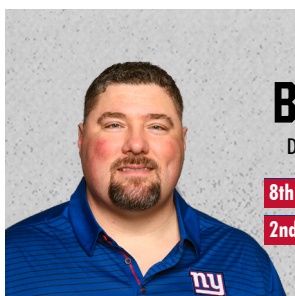

28th YEAR IN NFL

2nd YEAR WITH GIANTS

A 32-year coaching veteran, Shula is in his 28th season as an NFL assistant, he also served four years as the head coach of the University of Alabama (2003-2006).

2018 SEASON: In Shula's first season as the Giants' offensive coordinator, the Giants scored 369 points (246 the previous season). The 123-point increase was the Giants' largest from one season to the next in 85 years.

2018 SEASON: In Bettcher's first year with the team in 2018, the defense improved across the board in the NFL rankings in yardage allowed, including total yards (31st to 24th), rushing yards (27th to 20th), and passing yards (31st to 23rd). The unit also registered 30 sacks, three more than the previous season, and the Giants' 21 takeaways and 16 interceptions were also higher than the team's 2018 totals.

2018 SEASON: In McGaughey's first season leading the Giants' special teams, Aldrick Rosas had one of the finest seasons by a kicker in Giants history, making 32 of 33 field goal attempts and 31 of 32 extra point ties. Rosas' .970 field goal percentage was a Giants record. Punter Riley Dixon also set a franchise record with a 41.8-yard net average on 71 punts. The Giants finished 2nd in the NFL in kickoff coverage (20.4 yd avg).



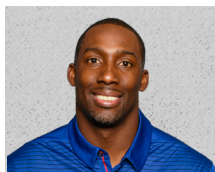

Head Coach Pat Shurmur Conference Call

August 23, 2019

Opening Statement: Nothing really to add to what I spoke about last night, so let's use our time. If you've got questions, I'd be happy to answer them for you.

Q: Are you guys considering starting Daniel Jones in Week 1?

A: I think what we're doing is, and I've said it all along, Eli's our starter and we're getting Daniel ready to play. I think he's done a good job in the preseason, as I've mentioned all along. He's getting better, and he's going to continue to do that so that at whatever time we need him to play, he'll be ready.

Q: So you're not ready to say for sure that Eli will be your starter in Week 1?

A: I just said Eli's the starter. Didn't I just say that? Excuse the fact that I had to repeat it, but I felt like I just said that. It's all good.

Q: A while ago, you were asked about how you teach this team to win, and I've noticed throughout the preseason you've been a little bit more willing to take chances. I know the results don't count for anything, but I'm just wondering if that's a way you're showing this team how to win, by showing them that you're not afraid to take chances, make mistakes, and hence they shouldn't be afraid to put it out there and make a mistake at this point.

A: Yeah, I don't know about taking chances, but I think we want to have an aggressive mindset. Actually, last year I think we were the second-most in terms of teams that went for it on fourth down, so I don't think that's taking chances, I think it's trying to be aggressive. I tried to use the timeouts that way yesterday before the half—we took a timeout on third down, trying to preserve time because I wanted to get a two-minute drill and if they kicked a long field goal and missed it, then we would've had the ball. Then, they made it, but then I still used a timeout, which forced them to kick a long field goal just so we could work on those types of things. I thought it was smart to go for two yesterday. So, I don't know, I think it's important as a coach to present an aggressive mindset, and we as a staff think that way, but I think it's more of just the mindset of being aggressive and less about just flat-out trying to take chances.

Q: Can you talk about Corey Ballentine's overall performance last night, and maybe some of the things he needs to clean up on?

A: I thought he competed well, I think he had over 40 snaps, I guess, on defense. Very competitive, he had a couple of nice pass breakups. He did give up a couple plays in the passing game, but he was matched up man-to-man, but I do think he was tighter in coverage this week than he was last week, but he's also a very sure tackler. Some of the tackles he made along the sideline were very sure in terms of the ball was completed certainly in the zone, and then he kind of was the first responder on the play and made the tackle, so he's making really good progress and we're pleased with the path that he's on.

Q: Was Corey (Ballentine) supposed to provide help for Jabrill Peppers on the touchdown to the tight end?

A: It was both. Certainly, Jabrill needs to be a little tighter, but then certainly Corey should back him up on that.

Q: What about Jon Halapio makes him the clear number one over Spencer at center?

A: I feel like we have two starting centers. I think Pio has done a really nice job and I feel like we really have six guys there, if you think of it in terms of two centers. We are going to need both of them at some point, for whatever reason we need help at guard, Pio can play guard, Spencer can play center. I'm happy with all of that and I don't really think of it in the way that you do.

Q: Oshane Ximines had two sacks last night, each of them with kind of a different move. Is that what you saw when you drafted him and you talked about being able to use counter moves?

A: Yes, I think so. I think as he plays more he will develop more of that. He probably was as disruptive as he's been in the preseason. He's just getting used to playing, I think he is one of the guys that he can find a way to the quarterback. We were pleased with some of the rushes he had last night. He was a little better in the run game as well. Much like my answer with regard to Corey Ballentine, I think we are seeing that type of progress from X-Man.

Q: Will it be tougher to make cuts this year than it was last year?

A: I think so. I think that's a good thing. You want competition within the groups. A year ago, we cut from 90 to 53 and

there was only a couple guys that ended up on other rosters. I sort of feel like this year we may end up cutting more guys that are going to be attractive to maybe another team, which tells me that our 90 is better, and also tells me the players are embracing what we are talking about. The goal is to either make our team or somebody else's. I believe in our team, I love our team, I love what our team is trying to do. It's going to be much tougher for me this year when we get to that point, having to say goodbye to some players that I am very fond of. I'm just hopeful that they are available if we need them or somewhere they can go on and keep their career going.

Q: Has Kyle Lauletta played dramatically better football now than last year? If he is doing that, what is he doing?

A: He's playing better each week. I don't know how to phrase it, but he's doing some really good things with the reps that he's getting. He made some good plays again last night. I am pleased with his progress, and I think he's making good progress as well. It's a credit to him.

Q: Any other injuries of note come out of the game?

A: I haven't heard. We didn't get home until 3 o'clock so the training room start opened up a little later. I don't know of anything. Anybody specific that you know of that you're asking about?

Q: No.

A: Jonathan Anderson has his knee—we have to get that checked out. Rod Smith, I think it's a fancy word they call that, the adductor, he's getting that checked out. There is always something that shows up. We aren't anticipating that there is anything bad.

Q: You always feel with your quarterbacks you need to be able to get them outside on bootlegs and things like that. One year working with Eli Manning—do you think he can do even more of that this year because he is more familiar and maybe in better shape?

A: I believe in moving the pocket. If you are going to be effective running the ball, you have to do that to help control the edges. I did it a lot last year. I think it's safe to say, Eli even ran more bootlegs, to use your term, than he did since he was at Ole Miss in one year. I really don't think it comes down to the condition of the quarterback. I don't think it comes down to their ability to run. All quarterbacks should be able to fake a run and then get to the perimeter and make a throw. That will always be a part of what we do. They are in every game plan, and it's safe to say I'll call a bootleg or two, or ten, in each game.

Q: Are you concerned about your linebacker depth? Who do you think is standing out at linebacker?

A: I'm not concerned about our depth. I thought Ryan Connelly did a good job yesterday, he made three tackles. As he's going along, he's getting more and more comfortable within the scheme. For the most part, Tae Davis played well. He had the one where he kind of got behind in coverage and missed the tackle, but he's done a good job. B.J. Goodson has done a nice job, (Nate) Stupar is sort of a backup linebacker that has a huge impact on special teams. All that being said—that's what's going on behind (Alec Ogletree) Tree until he gets back, which will be very soon. He'll be ready to go, certainly, by Week One. I feel better about that group this year than last year, if that's what you're asking.

Opening Statement: Today is Wednesday in our world. By going Thursday to Thursday, we have a full week, so we were doing Wednesday things like we would normally do in a normal game week. Tomorrow then would be Thursday and so on as we get ready to play the Patriots. With that, I'll try to answer your questions.

Q: Is that more of the focus this week? Getting into the routine rather than camp?

A: A little bit. It's still camp. It's sort of camp scheduling but what we're practicing out there, today we did a lot of first and second down and base down type stuff. Tomorrow we'll focus more on third down and some red zone. Then on the final day, we'll do more red zone and then review all the others.

Q: You guys claimed punter Johnny Townsend last week. Do you have an open competition at punter or is that still Riley's (Dixon) job?

A: We're just going to see what he can do. We're just kicking tires there. At this time of the year, this is a good time to do it. You get to see some live punts in preseason games.

Q: Any update on (Jonathan) Anderson?

A: He was out there today. He was moving around. I think he's okay. He's a little sore from the game. There were a handful of guys out there that are a little bit sore from the game, but they were out there.

Q: Is Sam Beal getting close?

A: He was out there today for the first time. He's closer. We'll just have to see where he's at as we move forward.

Q: Would you like to see him play Thursday? Is that a possibility?

A: I'd like to see them all play. We'll just have to see where he's at. It would be good for him to play if he's healthy enough. But we don't want to put him out there too soon.

Q: Is it frustrating? Do you feel like you want to see him out there? He hasn't played in the last two years.

A: I'm not frustrated by it. Obviously, being able to compete through training camp... He's a second-year player, but last year was like year zero. This is year one. The work that he would have gotten had he been healthy would have been very beneficial.

Q: What would you like to see from him going forward?

A: I'd like to see him get healthy and get on the field. That's what I'd like to see.

Q: How did (DeAndre) Baker look today, and how encouraging was it to see him (on the practice field)?

A: It was good. He was out there again. I think for the most part he looked pretty good. He needs to get his sea legs back. We'll see how he responds here in the afternoon after being out there, and we'll see how much more we can give him tomorrow.

Q: Next week, do you expect to be as active on waivers as you were last year once the cuts are done?

A: I wouldn't speculate on that. I would imagine no. We obviously flipped this roster quite a bit last year. We certainly like a lot of the players that we have on our roster this year. I've mentioned it all along, I think we're going to have to make some tough decisions at some positions. Guys that have really competed and really earned a chance to be here.

Q: When you look back at the Bengals game, did Will Hernandez just have a bad game?

A: I don't know. I think when I look at the Bengals game, we made enough plays to win the game in total. But there were many coachable moments for all of the players that competed in that game.

Q: How would you evaluate Darius Slayton from the Bengals game?

A: He did a good job. It was a good first step. Again, he's another young player that would have benefited with all of the work he would have gotten up until that point. But it was a good first step.



Q: When you see Oshane (Ximines) have a game like he did against the Bengals, does that sort of bump him closer to getting more involved in the rotation opposite somebody like Lorenzo (Carter)? Or are there still some things he needs to build on?

A: He's in the rotation. We're looking for guys to be disruptive and get pressure on the quarterback, which he displayed an ability to do.

Q: I'll give you an opportunity to tell us what you're going to do at quarterback on Thursday, but then also ask has Eli gotten enough work? He's your starter, he's only played three series, has he gotten enough live work for your liking?

A: Yeah, I think he has. He won't play on Thursday, so I'll give you that right there. I think he has. He's done a lot of really good stuff out here. He's much more comfortable with what we want to do on offense this year than last year. I feel like as he gets the work he needs in practice, the game work he's gotten will help him be ready for the Cowboys. Is that what you need? So, he won't play in the game.

Q: So Daniel (Jones) will start?

A: Daniel will start, yeah.

Q: Have you decided if you're committed to keeping two or three quarterbacks? Last year, you told us you wanted a veteran backup. Does that change with how well Daniel has played?

A: We'll have to see how we do that. The rest of the roster is dependent on that as well. I've said it all along, I'd keep four (quarterbacks). I'd keep five if the roster would allow for it, because I think quarterback development in our league is primary. You can only develop by playing and practicing. I'm fond of having lots of quarterbacks around. That's just my feeling. But we'll just have to see how it plays out when we get to the final 53 (man roster).

Q: I'm sure at some point you sat down with Kyle Lauletta, whether it was going all the way back to the spring until now, and put together what you want to see from him. What has he shown you in training camp and in the preseason games?

A: I think he's had a really good camp. Much better than a year ago. I think he's improving. I like the way he has competed. There's been a lot of conversation about the guy we picked this year (Daniel Jones). There are many ways guys could go with that, but he's come out every day, competed and gotten better. It's a credit to him.

Q: I know it's not your team, but any thoughts on Andrew Luck's announcement last night?

A: I was a little surprised like anybody. I've always enjoyed watching him play. He's a tough, competitive guy. For whatever reason, he feels like he just can't go anymore. That's a tough decision to make. I don't know him well enough to comment beyond that, but I wish him well.

He's played at a high level and took a lot of hits. They've added up on him, and he's no longer playing.

Q: Does that make it all the more incredible to you that your quarterback has not missed a game due to injury in 16 years?

A: I think that's unique to Eli. I've been around a lot of quarterbacks that have had a few injuries, and some that had a lot, like Sam Bradford. Yeah, that's part of Eli's charm is that he can stay out there game after game. Being available and being able to play is huge.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Michael Thomas didn't watch television last night. His cell phone was buzzing, but he chose to ignore it. Then he woke up this morning to find that dozens of people were trying to contact him.

"I had texts from everybody, from Colts players, to NFLPA, to teammates here, family back home, Stanford people, you see it all over Twitter," Thomas said. "So, first thing I do is reach out to my guy."

That would be Andrew Luck, Thomas' former high school rival, Stanford teammate and inseparable friend. The Indianapolis Colts quarterback announced his retirement last night at age 29. The news stunned almost everyone connected to the NFL, including players, coaches, reporters, and fans. But not Luck's inner circle, including Thomas.

"Not shocked," said Thomas, a special teams Pro Bowler last year who is beginning his second season with the Giants. "Not even that he's been talking about it. If he's making that decision, then it's the best decision. One hundred percent, 100 percent, that's my brother. I know exactly where he's at mentally and for him to make that decision, I support it 100 percent."

"To everybody else, I could see how it could be a shock, to get to wake up to that it was a shock. But once I realized and I reached out to him, it makes sense. Big picture, it wasn't a shock."

Thomas said he both texted and called Luck.

Thomas and Luck have known each other since they were 14-years-old. They faced each other as high school football opponents in Houston, the former at Nimitz High School in Houston, the latter at Stratford. "I went 2-2 against his high school," Thomas said. "He was a special player."

They became friends when they attended at football camp at the University of Texas following their sophomore year.

"Our sophomore year, we were both on varsity, and for Texas high school football, that is rare," Thomas said. "It was kind of admiration at first, and then we saw each other in basketball season. It wasn't until that summer going to a UT football camp we were both there and we recognized each other. I was actually at receiver, and he was at quarterback, and he's throwing me passes and we are lighting it up. We kind of got a little bond there, and we said, 'We'll

see you in the season' and we were both balling that year. It kind of took off from there. In our junior years, he was almost committed to Stanford and Stanford was recruiting me."

After playing wide receiver in high school, Thomas envisioned becoming Luck's top target in college. But soon after arriving on campus, then Stanford coach Jim Harbaugh moved him to the secondary. But that didn't diminish the two players' friendship.

"He is probably one of the most genuine people you have ever met, you find out he is one of the best teammates you could ask for," Thomas said. "Loving, caring, would call you on a random offseason day just to say hey. We've had some very real conversations, (he's) always supportive of you and vice versa, I have been very supportive of him. I understand where he's at right now and I wish him nothing but the best."

Thomas is entering his seventh NFL season. He has played against most of the league's very best quarterbacks and insists Luck is as good as any of them.

"He's one of the best to do it, especially in our era," Thomas said. "You are not going to look at Andrew and not respect his game, or not put him up there as one of the best quarterbacks up there. There are not too many things you can do to fool him. He takes risks but at the same time he tries to put his teams in the best situations. It's hard for you as a DB to anticipate things with him because he has all the perfect mechanics, looking you off and can put the ball anywhere he wants to put it. He had a hell of a career, a hell of a ride. You hate to see injuries, like with any position, you can think of many guys where if it wasn't for him getting hurt he could have been X, Y, and Z. I've got nothing but the best for his next chapter."

Although he played five years in the AFC for the Miami Dolphins, Thomas did not face Luck in a game until last Dec. 23, when the Giants visited Indianapolis.

"It was funny," he said. "We were talking in-between plays, commercial timeouts. He said the same thing, smiling, talking like, 'Shut up, Mike, you don't know the call.' It's funny, man. I'd say, 'I got you Andrew, throw me a pick, throw me a pick.' It's cool because how often can you say somebody you've known since you were a teenager and played with him in college, you're now getting a chance to play against him in the NFL, at the highest level?"

That sentiment was particularly poignant today after the

announcement that Luck will play no more games.

"Absolutely, just to be able to say that you've done it," Thomas said. "There are so many other players across the league who I was either teammates with or knew of, played against in college, or I played against them in high school, or are from my same area, it's the same thing. So, nothing but respect."

Thomas is confident Luck is at peace with his decision.

"I think he'll be in a great place," Thomas said. "Whatever decision he makes, he won't say, 'Ah regrets, I miss it.' If he's made that decision, then he'll be in a great place."

*Giants coach Pat Shurmur was also asked today about Luck's abrupt departure from the NFL.

"I was a little surprised like anybody," Shurmur said. "I've always enjoyed watching him play. He's a tough, competitive guy. For whatever reason, he feels like he just can't go anymore. That's a tough decision to make. I don't know him well enough to comment beyond that, but I wish him well."

While Luck has dealt with a variety of injuries — he missed the entire 2017 season after undergoing shoulder surgery — Giants quarterback Eli Manning is entering his 16th season and has never missed a game because of injury.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Eli Manning's preseason is finished.

Coach Pat Shurmur today confirmed that the 16-year veteran quarterback will not play in the Giants' preseason finale Thursday against the defending Super Bowl champion in Foxborough — where they will return exactly six weeks later for a Thursday night regular-season game.

Rookie Daniel Jones will start for the first time.

The Giants and Patriots will meet in the preseason finale for the 15th consecutive year. This is the fifth consecutive year and seventh time overall Manning will not participate. He last played in the game in 2014.

After Thursday, Manning will have missed 13 of the Giants' 65 preseason game during his record tenure with the team. Ten of those absences will have been due to a coach's decision.

Manning played just 28 snaps in three series this month — the Giants' first offensive possessions in victories against the Jets, Chicago and Cincinnati. He completed nine of 13 passes for 86 yards and one touchdown for a passer rating of 113.0.

Shurmur said that is enough work to prepare Manning for the regular-season opener in Dallas on Sept. 8.

"I think he has," Shurmur said. "He's done a lot of really good stuff out here. He's much more comfortable with what we want to do on offense this year than last year. I feel like as he gets the work he needs in practice, the game work he's gotten will help him be ready for the Cowboys."

Jones, the first-round draft choice who is the top backup behind Manning, has excelled in a reserve role, completing 25 of 30 throws (83.3%) for 369 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions for a rating of 140.1.

"Second-year pro Kyle Lauletta has been another impressive young quarterback. He has connected on 15 of 22 passes for 206 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions for a rating of 128.2.

As a rookie fourth-round draft choice last year, Lauletta completed 17 of 35 passes (48.6%) for 194 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions. His passer rating was

51.4. he did not complete any of his five passes in his only regular-season appearance, in Washington on Dec. 9.

"I think he's had a really good camp. Much better than a year ago," Shurmur said. "I think he's improving. I like the way he has competed. There's been a lot of conversation about the guy we picked this year (Jones). There are many ways guys could go with that, but he's come out every day, competed and gotten better. It's a credit to him."

*Cornerback DeAndre Baker, the last of the Giants' three first-round draft choices this year, participated in practice team drills today for the first time since spraining his knee on Aug. 11. Baker had worked in individual drills for the last week.

"It was good," Shurmur said. "He was out there again. I think for the most part he looked pretty good. He needs to get his sea legs back. We'll see how he responds here in the afternoon after being out there, and we'll see how much more we can give him tomorrow."

*Another corner, Sam Beal, has had very limited work because of a hamstring injury, but was on the field today taking part in individual drills.

"He was out there today for the first time," Shurmur said. "He's closer. We'll just have to see where he's at as we move forward."

"It feels good," Beal said. "Getting my feet back under me is a good thing."

Does Beal feel an urgency to return to do more before the Giants must cut 36 players from their roster by Saturday?

"No," he said. "I trust my athletic ability and I trust the trainers to get me out there as soon as they can. I'm ready."

Beal spent the entire 2018 season on injured reserve after undergoing shoulder surgery following his selection in the third round of the supplemental draft and has yet to appear in a game for the Giants.

"I'm not going back on IR," Beal said. "I'm not. I'll be killed before I go back there."

Would Shurmur like to see Beal play in New England?

"I'd like to see them all play," he said. "We'll just have to see where he's at. It would be good for him to play if he's healthy enough. But we don't want to put him out there

too soon.

"I'm not frustrated by it. Obviously, being able to compete through training camp - he's a second-year player, but last year was like year zero. This is year one. The work that he would have gotten had he been healthy would have been very beneficial. ... I'd like to see him get healthy and get on the field. That's what I'd like to see."

The Giants' preseason record remains perfect. Their performance Thursday night wasn't.

Dropped passes, a lost fumble, and too many penalties — though just five were accepted — were all part of a 25-23 victory against the Cincinnati Bengals in Paul Brown Stadium. The Giants improved to 3-0 this month, with one more game — next week at New England — before the regular-season opener in Dallas on Sept. 8.

"I thought the guys competed hard like they did the first two weeks," coach Pat Shurmur said. "It was probably just a little bit sloppier than I think we would all have liked to see. But the one good thing about this game is we played everybody, and we got a chance to evaluate everybody doing what they do. That will help us as we move forward here picking our 53 (man roster)."

Several players stated their case to be on that roster, including wide receiver Brittan Golden, who caught two passes for 59 yards and returned a punt 68 yards for a touchdown (though he fumbled the ball away when he next fielded a punt); tight end Garrett Dickerson (two catches for 30 yards), and rookie receiver Darius Slayton (an acrobatic 27-yard catch to set up a touchdown in his first action). The Giants had five sacks, including two by third-round draft choice Oshane Ximines. Corey Ballentine started at corner and tied for the team lead with seven tackles (five solo). Rod Smith and Jon Hilliman each scored on one-yard runs.

But the best news for Shurmur and Co. continues to be the outstanding play of the Giants' top two quarterbacks, 16-year veteran Eli Manning and first-round rookie Daniel Jones.

For the third week in a row, Manning played only the game's first series. He completed four of eight passes for 41 yards, numbers that would have been much better had Cody Latimer not dropped two passes, including one in the end zone that forced Aldrick Rosas to score the game's first points with a 41-yard field goal.

"He did a good job," Shurmur said of Manning. "He did a really good job."

In his three brief stints — which is likely to be his full body of work for the preseason — Manning has hit nine of 13 passes for 86 yards and one touchdown.

"I feel like we've had good practices, and in the last two

preseason games, I've made some plays and done some good things," Manning said. "I just have to continue to work and get ready. (I'll need to) watch this film, look at it, make some adjustments and work on those things this week. I don't know how much we'll play in this last preseason game, but (I'll) keep working hard, make some improvements and get ready for Dallas."

Jones, meanwhile, continues to post impressive numbers. He completed nine of 11 passes for 141 yards. In three games, only five of his 30 passes have not found their intended target, and none were caught by the opposing team. That's an 83.3 completion percentage, which is attention-grabbing even in the preseason. He has thrown two touchdown passes and his passer rating is a striking 140.1.

He demonstrated a new element to his game vs. the Bengals, the ability to shake off a brutal hit and near turnover to throw one of his best passes of the summer. Jones was hammered by linebacker Carl Lawson on his third possession and fumbled (the ball was recovered by Golden). On the very next snap, Lawson again charged full speed at Jones, who stood strong in the pocket and threw a terrific pass to the left side to fellow rookie Slayton, who was stopped at the one-yard line. Smith scored the Giants' first touchdown two plays later.

"That's something that coach (Mike) Shula (the offensive coordinator) and coach Shurmur talked about a lot, just having the next play mentality," Jones said. "I was just trying to give Darius a chance there. He made a heck of a play."

Shurmur liked how his young quarterback responded to Lawson's legal assault.

"You take hits, you know?" Shurmur said. "He came to the sidelines and I said, 'That was a good one.' He said, 'Well, I'm sure I'll get hit harder than that at times.' He was fine. I think he did a good job. He got us into the end zone. He made some really good throws. He has a good feel for a couple of the deep balls he threw, when the defender was in close proximity, giving the receiver a chance at the ball. Those are two of the results on a couple of his deep balls. But he sees things well. He moved forward in his progress of being ready to play. Each week he does things. He's into it. I adjust on the run quite a bit and he can handle it, which is fun when you're calling plays and trying to make adjustments to attack what you see on defense. He can handle it."

That has become very evident. And Manning and Jones

both playing at a high level is good for the Giants.

*Tight end Evan Engram saw his first action of the pre-season when, like Manning, he played only the first series. Engram caught one pass for nine yards. Why did he play and not Saquon Barkley?

"I thought Evan needed it a little bit more," Shurmur said, "just because (we wanted him to get) the confidence of being out there and because I wanted to."

*Linebacker Jonathan Anderson hurt his knee and will be evaluated Friday.

The following Giants players did not play: Barkley (coach's decision); wide receivers Golden Tate (concussion) and Sterling Shepard (thumb); cornerbacks DeAndre Baker (knee), Antonio Hamilton (groin) and Sam Beal (hamstring); linebacker Alec Ogletree (calf); and offensive linemen Chad Wheeler (back) and George Asafo-Adjei T (concussion).

*Without Barkley, the Giants rushed for 56 yards on 26 carries, the same 2.2-yard average they posted in the opener vs. the Jets.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — No Pat Shurmur interaction with the media would be complete without a quarterback question, even though the queries and his response don't change. So let's get this out of the way early, as Shurmur did today when the first inquiry on his conference call was whether he is considering starting Daniel Jones in the season opener at Dallas on Sept. 8.

"I think what we're doing is, and I've said it all along, Eli (Manning) is our starter and we're getting Daniel ready to play," Shurmur said. "I think he's done a good job in the preseason, as I've mentioned all along, he's getting better, and he's going to continue to do that so that at whatever time we need him to play he'll be ready."

Strangely, that answer elicited this follow-up: "So you're not ready to say for sure that Eli will be your starter in Week 1?"

"I just said Eli's the starter," Shurmur said. "Didn't I just say that? Excuse the fact that I had to repeat it, but I felt like I just said that. It's all good."

That includes the performances of both quarterbacks, who excelled last night in a 25-23 preseason victory against the Bengals in Cincinnati and have played well in the Giants' 3-0 August.

Manning played only the first series, as he has in each game, and completed four of eight passes for 41 yards. He would have hit six passes had Cody Latimer held onto two balls that were in his hands. In three games, Manning has completed nine of 13 passes for 86 yards and one touchdown.

Jones stepped in and played another superb game, which is why Shurmur keeps fielding questions about his readiness to start. He shook off a hard sack and completed nine of 11 throws for 141 yards, improving his preseason numbers to 25 completions in 30 attempts (83.3%) for 369 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions.

Because he was drafted sixth overall, plays quarterback, and is throwing the ball so well, Jones has cast a shadow over the rest of the Giants' rookie class. But he is far from the only newcomer performing impressively in August.

Defensive lineman Dexter Lawrence has started every game, and while he has just one tackle, he has demon-

strated the strength, quickness and instincts that will make him a force up front.

Cornerback DeAndre Baker missed his second game with a knee injury, but should soon return as the starting left cornerback, a position he took over soon after his arrival in May.

Third-round draft choice Oshane Ximines, the outside linebacker from Old Dominion, has executed a variety of moves while posting a team-leading 3.0 sacks, including 2.0 last night.

"I think as he plays more he will develop more of that," Shurmur said. "He probably was as disruptive as he's been in the preseason. He's just getting used to playing, I think he is one of the guys that he can find a way to the quarterback. We were pleased with some of the rushes he had last night. He was a little better in the run game as well."

Fourth-round selection Julian Love has been solid as a nickel corner and at safety. He has five tackles (two solo) and has broken up two passes.

Linebacker Ryan Connelly, a fifth-round choice, contributed three tackles while starting his second game in place of Alec Ogletree (calf).

"I thought Ryan Connelly did a good job yesterday," Shurmur said. "As he's going along, he's getting more and more comfortable within the scheme."

The second fifth-round choice, wide receiver Darius Slayton, debuted last night with a sensational 27-yard reception on a throw from Jones.

With Baker and Antonio Hamilton (groin) sidelined, sixth-round choice Corey Ballentine started against the Bengals at left corner and tied for the team lead with seven tackles (five solo).

"I thought he competed well, I think he had over 40 snaps (42) on defense," Shurmur said. "Very competitive, he had a couple of nice pass breakups. He did give up a couple plays in the passing game, but he was matched up man-to-man. I do think he was tighter in coverage this week than he was last week, but he's also a very sure tackler. Some of the tackles he made along the sideline were very sure in terms of the ball was completed certainly in the zone, and then he kind of was the first responder on the play and made the tackle, so he's making really good progress and we're pleased with the path that he's on."

Tackle George Asafo-Adjei (sixth round) has not played because of a concussion, and defensive tackle Chris Slayton (seventh round) has played 55 snaps and has five tackles in three games.

*After the release earlier this week of wide receiver Da'Mari Scott, the Giants have 89 players on their roster. A week from tomorrow, they must reduce that number to the regular-season limit of 53 players.

Shurmur said the cuts this year will be more difficult than those he made last season.

"I think that's a good thing," Shurmur said. "You want competition within the groups. A year ago, we cut from 90 to 53 and there were only a couple guys that ended up on other rosters. I sort of feel like this year we may end up cutting more guys that are going to be attractive to maybe another team, which tells me that our 90 is better, and also tells me the players are embracing what we are talking about. The goal is to either make our team or somebody else's. I believe in our team, I love our team, I love what our team is trying to do. It's going to be much tougher for me this year when we get to that point, having to say goodbye to some players that I am very fond of. I'm just hopeful that they are available if we need them or somewhere they can go on and keep their career going."

How good was Giants' 2019 NFL Draft class? It's not just Daniel Jones lighting up the preseason

The jump from college to the NFL is supposed to be difficult.

Especially coming from a non-Power Five college program.

Especially for a non-first- or second-round draft pick.

First-round pick Daniel Jones might be the talk of the NFL preseason, but Giants rookies Oshane Ximines and Corey Ballentine — both Senior Bowl alumni — also are making it look easy.

Case in point: After Ximines came through the middle on his first sack Thursday against the Cincinnati Bengals, he blew untouched off the edge on the second. He gobbled up the quarterback by the time before offensive tackle even realized he missed a blocking assignment.

"I don't think I had one in college that easy," said Ximines, who had 33 sacks at Old Dominion, "but I figure I'll take it."

Ximines didn't cross his hands to form an "X" — the nickname given to the third-round pick by Giants general manager Dave Gettleman and coach Pat Shurmur — after either of his two sacks against the Bengals like he did one week earlier to celebrate the first of his career. His mind was focused elsewhere from a key pregame talk.

"Gettleman came by my locker and was like, 'Pay attention to the little things and the sacks will come,'" Ximines said. "That's something I really paid attention to. That's all I did: Technique-work, having your footwork right, being in the right stance, reading your keys, things like that."

Ximines' teammates were ribbing him in the locker room afterward about his sack celebration — a surefire sign even they are excited for what could be in store on a defense in major need of a pass rush.

"I didn't want people to get tired of it," Ximines said sheepishly. "I'm going to keep it going. It seems like the fans like it, my teammates like it, and it brings good energy to the locker room. I don't think it's hurting anybody."

The Giants finished second-to-last in the NFL in sacks last

season and only Markus Golden has more than six in his career on the starting defense. Ximines is set to rotate in at outside linebacker behind Golden and Lorenzo Carter.

"He probably was as disruptive as he's been in the preseason," Shurmur said. "He's just getting used to playing. I think he is one of the guys that he can find a way to the quarterback. We were pleased with some of the rushes he had. He was a little better in the run game as well."

Gettleman might want to see if one of his pep talks lift another player who could turn his 2019 draft class into a home run by going from adding depth to starting.

Ballentine, a sixth-round pick, started in place of injured cornerbacks DeAndre Baker (rookie first-round pick), Sam Beal and Antonio Hamilton. He had a diving one-hand pass break-up to force a punt on the opening series, after the Giants defense allowed points on the first drive in each of the first two preseason games.

"It was a great step as a defense toward being more consistent, being disciplined and getting off the field," Ballentine said. "I'm able to play faster now that I'm getting more reps and seeing things I haven't seen before. When I see them again in the future, I'll be able to play it better."

Ballentine played a team-high 42 defensive snaps against the Bengals and led the way with seven tackles.

"Some of the tackles he made along the sideline were very sure, in terms of the ball was completed certainly in the zone," Shurmur said, "and then he kind of was the first responder on the play and made the tackle. So, he's making really good progress."

Ballentine and safety Jabrill Peppers allowed tight end C.J. Uzomah to get behind them for a 26-yard touchdown in the second quarter. Ballentine called it a "miscommunication."

"He had a couple of nice pass breakups," Shurmur said. "He did give up a couple plays in the passing game, but he was matched up man-to-man. I do think he was tighter in coverage this week than he was last week. Certainly, Jabrill needs to be a little tighter, but then certainly Corey should back him up."

If they are going to start side-by-side in Week 1, what needs to change?

"It comes with time of us playing together," Ballentine said. "I don't think it was necessarily anyone's fault. It's something we have to clean it up."

Giants receiver Brittan Golden impressed with rookie QB Daniel Jones' accuracy

As a wide receiver, Brittan Golden said his task is to catch the football no matter what. If it's high or low, behind or in front of him, he needs to pull it in.

"Our job is to track it down wherever it is," the fifth-year wide receiver said. "At the end of the day we have to make the catch."

And then there are some that require so little effort that they barely qualify as work. Passes that land right in outstretched hands, hitting receivers in stride. Like, say, the pass that rookie quarterback Daniel Jones threw to Golden in Week 2 of the preseason on a third-and-5 from the Giants' 42. Golden was able to catch it in stride as he streaked across the defense and that allowed him to turn upfield for what became a 27-yard gain to set up a field goal.

That pass? Golden chuckled about that one.

"It was pretty perfect," he said.

Jones has made some really spectacular throws so far. His two touchdown passes were placed perfectly, against the Bears he zipped a 40-yard dart down the left sideline for Cody Latimer, and against the Bengals he had a terrific one where he looked off the defense to his left and came back to his right to hit Golden for a gain of 35 yards. His 27-yard pass to the pylon for Darius Slayton helped set up the 1-yard touchdown run against the Bengals.

But it's the passes that may not seem all that impressive that could wind up being the most important. Any quarterback who comes into the league as a first rounder should be able to make an occasional dynamic play. Some of them may also be able to make such remarkable ones seem routine.

The real key to a quarterback's success in the NFL, though? It is making the routine seem routine, like a third-and-5 crossing route that goes for 27.

"It's kind of standard for him," Golden said. "He came in his first day here in the spring and he's been accurate and great, throwing the ball well. It's hard to find a rookie who is like that and he's been perfect since he came in."

Jones has had a lot of "pretty perfect" passes this summer. Although he came into the league with his accuracy one of the big question marks in his arsenal from college — his career completion percentage at Duke was 59.9 — it's been one of the highlights of his brief pro tenure. He's completed 25 of his 30 passes so far and his 83.3 completion percentage is third-best among all NFL quarterbacks with at least 15 attempts this preseason.

"He's an accurate passer," Pat Shurmur said. "That's not easy to be able to find a guy to be able to do that. That's what he is."

It was pointed out to Shurmur after this most recent preseason game against the Bengals that Jones does not throw a lot of incompletions.

"That's a good thing, right?" the coach asked.

It is.

Forget the ugly plays (for now). Here are 2 plays by Giants offensive line that show turning a corner

CINCINNATI — Eli Manning nodded his head in agreement.

Manning knows better than any empirical data could prove that third-and-short and fourth-and-1 have been disproportionately troublesome downs for the Giants over the latter part of his 15-year career.

But, for statistical sake, the Giants have not ranked higher than No. 10 in the NFL in any season since 2012 in the percentage of runs on third or fourth down with two yards or less to gain that achieved a first down or touchdown, according to Football Outsiders.

So, when Manning was asked if it was promising to see the Giants remade starting offensive line win on two second chances in those situations, he understood it was more than just a meaningless preseason play or two. The first allowed the continuation of a 15-play scoring drive in a 25-23 win against the Cincinnati Bengals.

"We had a good drive, a long drive," Manning said. "We converted on some third downs, on a fourth down. We did some good things, but some overall things we can make adjustments to."

With running back Saquon Barkley — who showed as a rookie he can move the chains in those situations without much help — sitting on the bench, the Giants were stuffed on a third-and-1. They went right back to Wayne Gallman on fourth-and-1 for a two yards to set up a field goal.

Center Jon Halapio and right guard Kevin Zeitler essentially buried Josh Tupou into the ground as Gallman churned his legs up the the middle.

"It's a huge confidence-booster," Halapio said. "If you really put it into perspective, we're really just trying to get one yard. If we can't get one yard, and get stuffed, that shoots down our confidence."

The starting line — Nate Solder, Will Hernandez, Halapio, Zeitler and Mike Remmers — still was in the game when backup quarterback Daniel Jones led a touchdown drive. They played a preseason-high 31 snaps together.

After Rod Smith was stopped on first-and-goal, the Giant went back to a power play. Hernandez pulled to his right

and threw a block in the same alley as fullback Eli Penny, allowing Smith to sneak across the goal line after bouncing off of Hernandez.

"Put it on our backs," Halapio said. "We want to be in those situations to run the ball, where our coaches and our teammates know they can count on us up front to get that one yard."

It wasn't all good for the offensive line. There more noticeable plays than those two because they were bad. Really bad.

Hernandez committed three penalties — two were declined because of the result of the play — in his limited action against potential future Hall of Fame defensive tackle Geno Atkins. It was a reminder that, despite playing more than 1,000 snaps as a rookie, Hernandez still is learning on the job.

"I just tried to tell him, 'Play your game,'" Halapio said. "He did a good job with it. Even if he messed up, he kept chugging away. He never got into his feelings. He was like 'F' it, and moved on to the next play."

And, on the Jones-led scoring drive, he was crunched when both Solder and Remmers were beat to the outside on the same play. He fumbled but shook the buzzing and made a 27-yard sideline throw to Darius Slayton on the very next play.

"We had some issues and we kept hurting ourselves in many ways, but we were able to overcome," Zeitler said. "I think that's an invaluable lesson on the ability to keep going. That's the story of the game."

Zeitler, who was acquired in an offseason trade with the Browns, "had no idea" the Giants have struggled in short-yardage situations in the past. Remmers, a free-agent signing, likely doesn't, either.

Ah, the beauty of the fresh start.

"Those are big-time things," Zeitler said. "There are always going to be a couple of those in a game. You never know how or when, but if you can get it done that's huge."

Dave Gettleman tip helps lead to Oshane Ximines' bust out

Before Thursday's game, as he was making the rounds in the visitors' locker room at Paul Brown Stadium, Dave Gettleman stopped by the locker occupied by Oshane Ximines, a rookie outside linebacker the Giants general manager deemed worthy of the 95th-overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft.

The message imparted was short and succinct: Worry about the little things and the sacks will come.

"That's something I really pay attention to," Ximines said. "That's all I did."

What Ximines did was put together his first breakout spurt of the preseason with two sacks in the second quarter of a 25-23 victory over the Bengals.

"He probably was as disruptive as he's been in the preseason," coach Pat Shurmur said Friday. "He's just getting used to playing, I think he is one of the guys that he can find a way to the quarterback. We were pleased with some of the rushes he had. He was a little better in the run game as well."

It sure looks as if the NFL game is starting to make sense for Ximines, who arrived as a third-round pick with serious pass rush credentials from a level of competition — Old Dominion — that allows for a healthy dose of skepticism.

The two sacks against the Bengals gave Ximines three in the past two games, evidence that, yes, indeed, things are starting to click for him.

"I'm not going to say that because this don't even count," Ximines said. "I'm just focused on getting better for next week. And making sure I'm ready for Dallas when the time comes."

There is not enough time for Ximines to vault into a starting spot for the Sept. 8 regular-season opener against the Cowboys. He does not have to make such a move in order to make a dent in the defensive rotation and, perhaps, a dent in Cowboys quarterback Dak Prescott. The coaching staff's hope is that Ximines can fill an immediate role on third downs, screaming off the edge as a situational pass rusher. It could happen as early as Week 1.

Not long after Ximines was selected on the second day of

the draft, Gettleman detailed what he liked best about the player. It was not that Ximines set a school record with 33 sacks, it was how he did it, with moves and countermoves more advanced than most. This was no one-trick pony.

Ximines showed this on his assault on the Bengals. On his first sack, he dropped Ryan Finley after slithering through the offensive line from an interior rush position. It is not something the 254-pound Ximines is supposed to specialize in and served as evidence as to the pass rush maturity he possesses. When defensive coordinator James Bettcher made the call to see what the rookie could do with it, the results were promising. Lorenzo Carter from the outside came crashing in as well, opening up a lane for Ximines to cruise through.

"I had an inside move, that's what coach Betch called up and I just tried to take my inside step and get vertical as quick as possible," Ximines said.

"When you do an inside move as an edge rusher it helps your game even more because the offensive tackle is always going to be a little worried about that. It kind of opens up your game for you."

The second sack was textbook speed and anticipation. Ximines beat tackle O'Shea Dugas so decisively at the snap that Ximines figured it must have been a missed assignment by the Bengals lineman, who barely got into his pass set before he was looking back and watching his quarterback get thrown to the turf.

"Just got freed up off the edge, I always try to get off with that juice and I was able to come and make a play," Ximines said. "He stepped down and I feel like he was supposed to have me, but nobody blocked me so I'm going to go tackle the quarterback."

In other words, your confusion up front isn't my problem.

"Hey, I ain't got nothing to do with that, that's between him and his coach and whatever they got going on," Ximines said.

"I don't think I had one in college that easy, but I'll take it."

These were the big things that came about because of the little things Gettleman reminded Ximines to focus on beforehand. Getting his technique, footwork and his stance right, reading his keys.

"It doesn't feel like I'm back in college yet," he said, "but it does feel good to get home."

How Giants rookie with 'crazy potential' leaned on teammates to stay sharp after training camp setback

Giants rookie wide receiver Darius Slayton reached back to make an impressive catch on a pass thrown slightly behind him by Daniel Jones, before turning upfield and picking up some yards after the catch during Monday's practice.

It was the type of athletic catch the Giants hoped their fifth-round pick would be making all summer — and into the season. But this was his first week back on the field since injuring his hamstring during camp's first practice.

"I'm always happy to make any play," Slayton said after Monday's practice. "It's important that I come back and do things like that to keep it fresh in everybody's mind that I can still play ball and that I can still make plays. I definitely feel like continuing to do things like that consistently would be really good."

Not being able to show the coaches what he was capable of made the month of July a tough one for Slayton.

"I definitely was pretty sick those first two days after I hurt myself," Slayton said. "Because I knew how I was coming off the spring. I feel like now that I get my physical back, I can get my mind and my body on the same page, and feel like I can play my best ball."

Before he steps onto the field for his first NFL game, and even before getting back on the practice field last week, Slayton relied on several veteran teammates to help him through the struggle of his injury absence. And all while mastering the intricacies of the Giants' offense.

Fellow wide receiver Bennie Fowler saw something special in Slayton from the first practice of OTAs this spring. "Slay's a very talented guy," Fowler told NJ Advance Media on Tuesday. "I haven't seen a guy as a receiver come in like that in a long time. His potential is through the roof. It's crazy, and you can see it."

Slayton expects to make his debut Thursday night at the Bengals in preseason Week 3 — his first chance to show everybody how the potential he flashed at Auburn translates to the NFL.

After catching 79 passes for 1,605 yards and 11 touchdowns in three seasons as a starter in college football's toughest conference, the SEC, Slayton blazed through the 40-yard dash in 4.39 seconds at the NFL Scouting Combine. That

tied for 11th among all prospects and sixth among receivers.

"You can't teach speed," Fowler said.

Slayton isn't just a potential deep-threat replacement for Odell Beckham. He is also a refined route runner.

"Usually, you're either fast or you're a route-runner," Fowler said. "He's got a combination of both. You saw his routes in OTAs, and that was some NFL-type stuff he was doing out there."

Giants head coach Pat Shurmur called Slayton the most improved player from rookie minicamp to the end of OTAs this spring.

Unfortunately for Slayton and the Giants, his injury delayed his chance to build some momentum and climb up the depth chart at wide receiver, which has seen a summer's worth of adversity.

Despite being unable to practice, Slayton made a point to attach himself to veterans like Fowler, Cody Latimer, Russell Shepard and tight end Evan Engram, to absorb as much of the Giants' scheme as possible.

"We sit next to each other in the receiver meeting room," Fowler said. "I'll help him with the plays, help him understand certain concepts, explain how something should look and 'you should know who's getting the ball,' help him with the terminology."

Typically, young players struggle to make the team if they have a prolonged injury absence in camp. But Slayton has been an exception to that, according to Shurmur.

"He made great strides in the spring," Shurmur said. "I anticipate when he comes back that he's going to continue to do that."

NY Giants vs. Bengals: Daniel Jones takes big hit, keeps on ticking in another strong game

CINCINNATI - It was another "Welcome to the NFL, kid" moment for Daniel Jones, and in some ways, the Giants' rookie quarterback surprised by how quickly he got up.

Bengals defensive end Carl Lawson beat Nate Solder and crushed Jones from his blind side, pummeling the former Duke star into the turf as the ball squirted away. The Giants recovered the fumble, but there's no question Jones felt the hit.

What Jones did next checked off yet another box in his maturation in the second quarter of the Giants' eventual 25-23 preseason victory over the Bengals on Thursday night.

On the very next play, Jones showed tremendous poise to stand in a collapsing pocket long enough to uncork a great throw to Darius Slayton 27 yards downfield near the goal line. He gave his fellow rookie a chance to make a play, and Slayton, making his preseason debut, did just that, contorting his body to secure the catch in front of a defender.

"I was just trying to give him a chance to make a play," Jones said. "I thought he did an incredible job making that catch, he kinda hung there in the air for a little bit, I asked him what his vertical was, but yeah, it was a really good play by him, a 1-on-1 opportunity on a third-and-long situation, so trying to give him a chance to make a play."

That Jones-to-Slayton hook-up was made even more impressive considering what happened on one play earlier. Two plays later, Rod Smith bulled his way into the end zone for a touchdown to cap the 7-play drive.

Jones completed 9 of 11 passes for 141 yards. In three preseason games, the No. 6 overall pick was 25 of 30 (83.3 percent) for 369 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions. That's a passer rating of 140.1.

"You can ask me all you want about why I like him," Giants coach Pat Shurmur said of Jones. "I think it's time to start asking the people that didn't like him what they think, quite frankly."

Eli Manning played one series, marching 15 plays with a good mix of runs and passes, but a pair of drops by Cody Latimer short circuited the drive, leading the Giants to settle for a 41-yard Aldrick Rosas field goal.

Oshane Ximines makes noise

The X-Man is starting to make some noise. Oshane Ximines, the third-round rookie from Old Dominion, picked up his first preseason sack last week. He followed that performance with two more sacks in the second quarter, adding three tackles.

Corey Ballentine, Dexter Lawrence shine early

Rookies Corey Ballentine and Dexter Lawrence got the start and made splash plays in the first quarter. Lawrence knocked down a pass and created good penetration in the backfield, while Ballentine was opposite Janoris Jenkins at cornerback and played extremely well. Ballentine finished with a pair of pass breakups and seven tackles, including one for loss.

The Giants were without DeAndre Baker, Sam Beal and Antonio Hamilton at corner.

Will Hernandez has his hands full

This was not an easy assignment for Will Hernandez, who had to go toe-to-toe with seven-time Pro Bowl defensive tackle Geno Atkins. Hernandez committed three penalties - only one was accepted - but a battle with Atkins could end up being exactly the kind of tuneup the Giants' second-year left guard needed in an exhibition setting.

Overall, the interior of the line with Hernandez, center Jon Halapio and right guard Kevin Zeitler controlled the pocket and opened holes for Wayne Gallman in the ground game.

Tight end coverage woes continue

The faces change, the matchups continue to be exploited. Tae Davis struggled at times in coverage, and then Andy Dalton beat Jabrill Peppers with a touchdown pass when he found tight end C.J. Uzomah for a 26-yard touchdown.

Saquon Barkley DNP, Evan Engram debuts

Evan Engram should make his preseason debut Thursday night against the Bengals, while the Giants remain cautious with Saquon Barkley, who is unlikely to play until Week 1 of the regular season against the Cowboys.
