NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (2-2) vs. INDIANAPOLIS COLTS (1-3)

Thursday, Oct. 4, 2018 • Gillette Stadium (65,878) • 8:20 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will host the Indianapolis Colts in a primetime Thursday Night Football game this week. It begins a stretch of four primetime games in five weeks with two sets of back-to-back primetime games sandwiched around a trip to Chicago.

Next week, the Patriots host Kansas City in a Sunday Night Football game. Then, following the Bears game on Oct. 21, the Patriots travel to Buffalo for Monday Night Football followed by a Sunday Night game vs. Green Bay at Gillette Stadium.

The Patriots have played in back-to-back primetime games 12 times in team history but this is the first time that the Patriots have two sets of back-to-back primetime games in the same season. Pittsburgh and San Francisco also have two sets of consecutive primetime contests in 2018. The last time the Patriots played back-to-back primetime games was in 2015.

Since 2000, only three teams have played more consecutive primetime games than the Patriots - Chicago (14), Dallas (13) and Pittsburgh (13).

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by **FOX** and can be seen locally on **WFXT Channel 25**. **Joe Buck** will handle play-by-play duties with **Troy Aikman** as the color analyst. **Erin Andrews** and **Kristina Pink** will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Richie Zyontz** and directed by **Rich Russo**. The game will also air on **NFL Network** and stream on **Amazon**.

NATIONAL RADIO: Thursday's game will be broadcast to a national audience on **Westwood One**. **Ian Eagle** will call the with game with **Tony Boselli** providing analysis.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 41 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

The New England Patriots and Indianapolis Colts will meet for the first time since Oct. 18, 2015, when New England captured a 34-27 victory at Indianapolis on Sunday Night Football.

The Patriots and Colts will square off on a Thursday night game for the second time. The last time the two played on Thursday was Sept. 9, 2004, when New England hosted Indianapolis in a 27-24 Patriots win.

The two clubs will meet in a regular-season primetime game for the eighth time since 2000 with one Thursday night game, one Monday night game and five Sunday night games.

The two teams share a long rivalry, as the Patriots and the Baltimore/ Indianapolis Colts played twice each year from 1970 to 2001 as members of the AFC East, with the exception of the 1982 strike season.

Since realignment in 2002 with the Colts moving to the AFC South, the teams played in the regular season in every year for 10 straight seasons from 2003 through 2012 with New England with New England holding 6-4 edge. While they did not play in the 2013 regular season, they did face each other in the postseason with the Patriots claiming a 43-22 Divisional Playoff win at Gillette Stadium on Jan. 11, 2014. The rivalry was rekindled with two meetings in 2014, a regular-season game at Indianapolis and the AFC Championship Game at Gillette Stadium, both of which were won by New England. Then the clubs met again in 2015 with New England taking Sunday Night Football victory at Indianapolis.

Overall, this week's game will be the 81st meeting between the two teams. The Patriots lead the series with a 47-28 record in the regular season and a 4-1 record in the postseason.

New England holds an overall record of 29-12 when playing at home against the Colts, including a 8-2 record at Gillette Stadium.

The Patriots own a 4-1 record overall against Indianapolis in the postseason, including a 4-0 record in playoff games played in New England. Three of the five postseason contests were the AFC Championship Game. The Patriots are 2-1 in those contests.

The clubs have clashed in the playoffs following the 2003, 04, 06, 13 and 14 seasons. The Patriots beat the Colts in the 2003 AFC Championship Game, 24-14, at Gillette Stadium, won 20-3 at Gillette Stadium in a 2004 AFC Divisional Playoff, lost in the 2006 AFC Championship Game, 38-34, at Indianapolis, won in the AFC Divisional meeting 43-22 at Gillette Stadium and took a 45-7 decision in the 2014 AFC Championship Game.

The New England Patriots won a rematch of the 2014 AFC Championship Game, defeating the Indianapolis Colts, 34-27, at Lucas Oil Stadium, to improve to 5-0 for the fourth time in team history.

Tom Brady led the Patriots to the victory, passing for 312 yards and three touchdowns, including two in the second half. RB LeGarrette Blount finished with 93 yards rushing on 16 attempts, including a 38-yard touchdown scamper. Blount also scored on an 11-yard touchdown pass, the first touchdown reception of his career. WR Danny Amendola also had a productive day, leading the team with seven receptions for 105 yards.

The Patriots overcame a 21-20 halftime deficit by taking the second half kick and marching 80 yards in a seven-play drive that culminated with a 25-yard touchdown pass from Brady to TE Rob Gronkowski to give the Patriots a 27-21 lead.

The Patriots also took advantage of a bizarre play by Indianapolis at the end of the third quarter. The Colts failed on a fake punt attempt from their own 37-yard line. With most of the Colts players lined up near the right sideline, WR Griff Whalen snapped the ball to S Colt Anderson. He was immediately tackled for a 2-yard loss by RB Brandon Bolden and CB Logan Ryan, allowing the Patriots to take over at the Indianapolis 35-yard line. Six plays later, Brady connected with Blount on an 11-yard touchdown pass for a 34-21 lead early in the fourth quarter.

The Colts made it close when QB Andrew Luck fired an 18-yard touchdown pass to Whalen with 1:19 to go. LB Jamie Collins then jumped over the Indianapolis line and blocked the extra point. Gronkowski recovered the ensuing onside kick attempt, and the Patriots were able to run out the clock to secure the win.

Indianapolis scored on its first possession of the game when QB Andrew Luck threw a 5-yard touchdown pass WR Donte Moncrief on a fourth-down. The Patriots answered with a 10-play, 80-yard drive that was capped with a 12-yard touchdown pass from Brady to WR Julian Edelman.

The Patriots added a field goal early in the second quarter, but Brady was intercepted by Indianapolis S Mike Adams, who returned the pick 14 yards for a touchdown to give the Colts a 14-10 lead.

Indianapolis tried a surprise onside kick, but it was recovered by New England at the 25-yard line to help the team get in position for a 38-yard touchdown run by Blount to make the score 17-14 in the second quarter. Luck led the Colts on an 80-yard drive that ended in a touchdown to give the Colts a 21-17 lead. The Patriots kicked a field goal before the end of the half to close the gap to 21-20 at the break.

The New England Patriots got back in the win column with a 38-7 victory over the Miami Dolphins at Gillette Stadium. The victory was the 300th win overall for Robert Kraft. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and his 432nd game, the fastest any owner has reached the milestone. Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 30 seasons and 501 games, while Al Davis of Oakland accomplished the feat in 31 seasons and 495 games.

QB Tom Brady threw for 274 yards and three touchdowns to improve to 14-0 against Miami at Gillette Stadium in games that he started and finished. The Patriots lost the final game of the season against Miami at Gillette in 2005 when Brady played only the first quarter.

The Patriots contributed on both sides of the ball. The offense produced big plays with a 55-yard touchdown pass from Brady to WR Cordarrelle Patterson, and RB James White with a 22-yard touchdown run and a 14-yard touchdown reception. Rookie RB Sony Michel gained 112 yards on 25 carries for his first 100-yard game and also scored on a 10-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter.

The Patriots defense held Miami to 11 first downs and just 172 total yards of offense. Miami QB Ryan Tannehill was limited to 11 completions on 20 attempts for 100 yards.

After converting a field goal on their first offensive drive of the game for a 3-0 first quarter lead, the Patriots offense generated a 21-point second quarter to take a commanding 24-0 halftime lead. Patterson scored on the 55-yard touchdown pass for a 10-0 lead. Then midway through the second quarter, Tannehill fumbled a snap and LB Kyle Van Noy recovered the ball at the Miami 22-yard line. On the ensuing play, White scored on a 22-yard touchdown run for a 17-0 lead. New England closed out the first half with a 15-play, 85-yard drive that took 5:31 off the clock before Brady connected with WR Phillip Dorsett on a 9-yard touchdown for a 24-0 lead.

The Patriots added touchdown in third quarter with a 14-yard touchdown pass to White and a 10-yard touchdown run by Michel to make it 38-0. Miami scored a touchdown with under three minutes to play to avoid the shutout.

This includes one postseason win after losing the final two games of the 2015 regular season. 





INDIVIDUAL AND TEAM NOTES



ROBERT KRAFT CHAIRMAN 8 CEO

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 25th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the



team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (17), conference crowns (9) and Super Bowl championships (5) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (21) and have the fewest losing seasons (2) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LII was the ninth Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 24 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 19 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. In 2017, Kraft earned his 21st winning season in 24 years of owning the franchise.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

- Since purchasing the team in 1994, Robert Kraft has 30 career postseason wins as an owner, third-most in NFL history behind the Rooney Family in Pittsburgh (36) and the Green Bay Packers (34). The Rooney Family founded the Steelers in 1933 while the Green Bay Packers were founded in 1919.
- Under Robert Kraft's guidance, the 2000-09 Patriots set the NFL record for most wins in a decade in NFL history with 126 overall wins overall. With 11 wins overall in 2018, the Patriots will tie that record for the current decade.

DYNASTY VS. DYNASTY

Of all of the great teams throughout the Super Bowl era, the New England Patriots and the San Francisco 49ers have set a standard of extended excellence above all of the others. The 49ers run of success spanned two decades, while New England's streak is still in progress.

MILESTONE WIN FOR KRAFT

The Patriots victory over the New York Jets on Dec. 21, 2014 was the 250th win under Robert Kraft's tenure. His 250 wins in his first 368 total games tied Chicago's George Halas for the fastest an owner has reached 250 victories.

KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 300 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 300-132 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win five Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 25 times in their 58-year history. Nineteen of those playoff berths have come in the 24 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 20 division crowns, including 15 in the last 17 seasons and 17 of which have come since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994.

- The Patriots are tied with Dallas (5) and San Francisco (5) with five Super Bowl wins and need one more Super Bowl win to tie the Pittsburgh Steelers (6) for the most Super Bowl wins in NFL history.
- The Patriots have played in the most Super Bowls in NFL history with 10 and look to add to that number in 2018.
- The Patriots extended their NFL record by reaching seven straight conference title games (2011-17) and look to add to that total in 2018.
- The Patriots extended their NFL record to nine straight division titles (2009-17) and look to add to that number in 2018.

Super Bowl LII was Belichick's 11th Super Bowl overall, including eight as a head coach and three as an assistant coach.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win five Super Bowl titles. He won more regular-season games (123) and more games overall (136) during a 10-year stretch (2002-11) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 44 consecutive years as an NFL coach are second in NFL history to 45 by Dick LeBeau.

There had been 2,656 games where a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 have recorded 2,647 wins, 7 losses and 2 ties, a winning percentage of .997.

CAREER NOTES

Tom Brady has quarterbacked the Patriots to victories in 198 of his 255 career regular-season starts, compiling a .776 winning percentage and giving him the best record of any quarterback in the Super Bowl era (since 1966). Brady's 155 career wins in his first 200 starts are the most in NFL history. Peyton Manning is second with 136 wins in his first 200 career starts.



WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

- If Brady reaches 30 or more touchdowns passes in 2018, he will become just the fourth player in NFL history with 30 or more touchdown passes in eight seasons, joining Brett Favre (9), Peyton Manning (9) and Drew Brees (9).
- Brady is tied with Peyton Manning, Drew Brees and Aaron Rodgers with four seasons with 35 or more touchdowns and needs to reach that mark in 2018 for his fifth season with 35 or more touchdowns, for the most in NFL history.
- Brady has passed for 4,000 yards nine times in his career and if he reaches 4,000 yards in 2018, he will be the third player to reach ten seasons with 4,000 yards, joining Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (12)
- Brady led the NFL with 36 touchdowns passes in 2015, his fourth time leading the NFL in passing touchdowns. He tied Drew Brees, Len Dawson, Brett Favre, Peyton Manning, Johnny Unitas and Steve Young for most seasons leading the NFL in touchdown passes.
- Brady has 225 career victories (regular season and postseason) and needs two wins to move past Adam Vinatieri (226) for the most wins all-time by an NFL player.
- Brady has 568 touchdowns overall (497 in the regular season and 71 in the postseason) and needs 12 touchdown passes to move past Peyton Manning (579) to become the all-time leader in touchdown passes.
- Brady has thrown touchdowns to 70 different players in his career, tied with Vinny Testaverde for the most TD targets by an NFL QB.
- Brady is third all-time with 497 regular season touchdowns and needs 3 touchdowns to become the third player to reach 500 touchdowns. He would join (Peyton Manning-539) and (Brett Favre-508).
- Brady has 67,077 career passing yards. He needs 2,923 yards to become the fourth QB in NFL history with 70,000 career passing yards.
- Brady has 82 300-yard games and needs eight more to become the third NFL player with 90 300-yard games, joining Drew Brees (111) and Peyton Manning (93).
- Brady is tied with seven other NFL players with two games with six or more touchdowns and needs one 6-TD game to tie Peyton Manning, who had three games with six or more touchdowns.
- Tom Brady has won 30 Player of the Week awards to set the NFL record for the most Player of the Week honors, and he also leads with 10 Player of the Month honors.
- Brady leads the NFL with 55 career games with three touchdown passes and no interceptions.

- Brady has started 255 regular season games at quarterback. If he starts all 16 games in 2018 he will move past Peyton Manning (265) and be second all-time with 267 starts, behind Brett Favre (298).
- Brady has played in 257 regular season games, which is fifth all-time among NFL quarterbacks. If he plays in all 16 games in 2018 he will move into third place all-time with 269 games played among NFL quarterbacks, behind George Blanda (340) and Brett Favre (302).
- Brady is in his 19th season in 2018 with the Patriots. He joins Jim Marshall (19-Minnesota), Bruce Matthews (19-Houston/Tennessee), Darrell Green (20-Washington), Jackie Slater (20-LA Rams) and Jason Hanson (21-Detroit) as the only players with at least 19 seasons played with one NFL team.

Brady led the Patriots to their ninth win of the season in the victory over Miami on Nov. 26, 2017, the most ever by a 40-year old quarterback in the Super Bowl era. Brett Favre turned 40 on Oct. 10, 2009, and led the Vikings to eight wins in their 12-win season after turning 40. Brady also threw four touchdowns in that win over Miami to push his 2017 total to 26 touchdowns, the most in a single season by a 40-year old quarterback. He moved past Favre (25 in 2009 after he turned 40 in October of that year with Minnesota) and Warren Moon (25 with Seattle in 1997).

Brady led the NFL with 4,577 yards passing in 2017 to become the oldest quarterback to lead the NFL. The previous oldest player to lead the league in passing was Fran Tarkenton with 3,468 yards in 1978 at age 38. Brady moved past Warren Moon (1997 with 3,678) for the most passing yards in a single season by a 40-year old quarterback.

FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State, where as a senior, he completed 56 percent of his passes (153-of-275 for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

FATHERLY ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told The Boston Herald. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

UNCONVENTIONAL JOURNEY

Despite a successful three-year lacrosse career at Penn State, Hogan, also a standout football player in high school, said that playing college football was always in the back of his mind. Having redshirted his sophomore year of lacrosse, Hogan had an extra year of athletic eligibility following his fourth academic year at Penn State. As the football itch still lurked in the back of his mind, Chris played his final year of eligibility with the Monmouth (N.J.) football team, and at the end of the season joined some workouts with teammates who were training for the NFL Combine.

"I honestly didn't know if I had what it took to play in the NFL," Hogan wrote in the Players Tribune. "Still, it was one of those things where I didn't want to look back in five years and be like, 'Man, I wish I would've tried'"

Chris did not get invited to compete in the Combine that year but turned heads during a Pro Day at Fordham University. Later that summer, he signed with the San Francisco 49ers as an undrafted free agent.

G TED KARRAS

SCHOOL'S NOT OUT

Although he already owns a bachelor's degree in communications and a master's degree in recreation, sport and tourism from his time at the University of Illinois, Ted Karras hasn't completely given up his notebook for an NFL playbook. Along with teammate Joe Thuney, Karras is pursuing his MBA from Indiana University thanks to an NFLPA program that provides tuition assistance for players while navigating a busy NFL schedule.

"It just seems to be that everyone keeps wanting to pay for my school, so I'm not going to turn it down," Karras told the Boston Globe

Karras and Thuney began their MBA pursuit two weeks after the Patriots Super Bowl LI victory by taking online classes and Skyping with professors from Indiana University's Kelley School of Business up until training camp. They continued their classes in the 2018 offseason.

OL SHAQ MASON

A FAMOUS NAMESAKE

A noted sports fan and basketball enthusiast, Shaq's mother, Alicia McGuire, named him Shaquille Olajuwon Mason in 1993 after her two favorite NBA stars at the time, Shaquille O'Neal and Hakeem Olajuwon. The Tennessee native had the opportunity to meet one of his namesakes at a Memphis Grizzlies game while O'Neal was a member of the Miami Heat, receiving a special meet-and-greet and having his jersey signed.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to seven straight Pro Bowls (2011-17) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the eighth straight season in 2018.

The special teams ace shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eightman rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

OL JOE THUNEY

THUNEY DOES HAVE THE SIZE

An Ohio native, Joe Thuney was told he may not have the size to play offensive line in the Big Ten conference for his hometown Ohio State Buckeyes. Settling on North Carolina State, Thuney went on to become a mainstay on the offensive line while also earning his bachelor's degree in accounting in just three years, added an international studies degree and also minored in Spanish.

Duron Harmon picked off Pittsburgh QB Ben Roethlisberger in the end zone with five seconds to play to secure a 27-24 win on Dec. 17, 2017. It was the fourth time overall that he has picked off a pass in the end zone to secure a win and the second time in the 2017 season. He intercepted Houston QB DeShaun Watson in the end zone as time expired to secure the win on Sept. 24, 2017. He picked off Miami QB Ryan Tannehill in the end zone with nine seconds to play to secure the Patriots 31-24 win on Sept. 18, 2016, and Harmon intercepted a Joe Flacco pass in the end zone with 1:39 left to preserve the Patriots 35-31 lead in an AFC Divisional win vs. Baltimore on Jan. 10, 2015. Ten of his 14 career interceptions have been in the

fourth quarter.

Dont'a Hightower and Russell Maryland (2 national championships at University of Miami and three Super Bowl Championships with Dallas) are the only two players in NFL history with two national championships and two Super Bowl wins.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

Devin McCourty enters 2018 tied with Ty Law for second-most Pro Bowls as a Patriots defensive back with four. Only CB Mike Haynes had more Pro Bowl invites as a Patriots DB with six.

DOUBLE TROUBLE

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots this past offseason for his 10th NFL season. The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels. Shaquill and Shaquem Griffin of the Seattle Seahawks also accomplished this unique occurrence on Kickoff Weekend. New England also had twins on the team last year, with TE Jacob Hollister on the roster and WR Cody Hollister on the practice squad. Jacob is on the roster again this year and Cody is on the non-football/injury list.

Devin and Jason were cornerbacks in the Rutgers secondary from 2005-08. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and was a year behind his brother in eligibility. Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

McCOURTY GOES LONG

McCourty had a 104-yard kickoff return for a touchdown vs. N.Y. Jets (10/21/12), the second longest kickoff return in team history. Ellis Hobbs has the longest in team history with a 108-yard return for a touchdown at N.Y. Jets on Sept. 9, 2007. He was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance.

McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joins Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.



BROTHERS IN ARMS

Devin, along with twin brother Jason McCourty, has seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

- If Stephen Gostkowski leads the NFL in scoring in 2018, he will set the NFL mark for most seasons leading the NFL in scoring with six, moving past Don Hutson (5) and Gino Cappelletti (5). Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in 2008, 2012-14 and 2015.
- In 2015, Gostkowski became the first NFL player with four seasons of 150 or more points. He added his fifth season of 150 or more points in 2017 and can add to that number in 2018.



- Gostkowski (5) needs one more 30-field goal season in 2018 to move out of a tie with David Akers (5), John Carney (5) and Justin Tucker (5) for the most in NFL history with six seasons of 30 or more field goals.

KICKING A CAREER HIGH

Gostkowski made five field goals vs. Cincinnati (10/5/14), setting a new single-game career high. Gostkowski's five field goals tied the second highest single-game total in Patriots history, trailing only Gino Cappelletti's six successful field goals on Oct. 4, 1964. The last time a Patriots player had five field goals in a game before that was on Nov. 14, 2004, when Adam Vinatieri had five field goals vs. Buffalo.

SCORING FLURRY

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014, to turn a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. - Rob Gronkowski got the scoring started by hauling in a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive.
- After the Patriots defense forced a quick three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown that gave the Patriots a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular-season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (9/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).

PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 25 times in its 58-year history. The Patriots have earned 19 of those playoff berths in the 24 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 20 division crowns overall (19 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occa-



sions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 17th straight year in 2017. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 17 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.
