NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (7-2) at TENNESSEE TITANS (4-4) Sunday, Nov. 11, 2018 • Nissan Stadium (69,143) • 1:00 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots improved to 7-2 with a 31-17 win last Sunday night against Green Bay. It is the seventh-straight season that the Patriots have started the season with a 7-2 or better record and the 10th time under head coach Bill Belichick

A win this week against Tennessee will guarantee that New England finishes with a .500 or better record for the 18th consecutive season. New England is currently tied with the Cleveland Browns (1957-73) for the second-longest streak at 17 behind the Dallas Cowboys' (1965-85) streak of 21-straight seasons of finishing with a record of .500 or better.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by CBS and can be seen locally on WBZ-TV Channel 4. Ian Eagle will handle play-by-play duties with Dan Fouts as the color analyst. Evan Washburn will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by Mark Wolff and directed by Bob Fishman.

NATIONAL RADIO: Sunday's game will be broadcast to a national audience on Sports USA One. Larry Kahn will call the game with Doug Plank providing analysis.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 41 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster Bob Socci will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback Scott Zolak, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by Marc Cappello.

17 STRAIGHT SEASONS ABOVE .500

The New England Patriots enter this week's game with a chance to lock up at least a .500 record for the 18th consecutive season. The Patriots are the only NFL team to finish with a record of .500 or better in each of the last 17 seasons (2001-17). Each of the other 31 NFL teams has had at least one losing season since 2001. The Patriots are currently tied with the Cleveland Browns (1957-73) for the second-longest streak at .500 or better, behind the Dallas Cowboys' (1965-85) streak of 21 straight years.

PATRIOTS AT TENNESSEE TITANS

SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and Tennessee Titans (formerly the Houston Oilers) will square off for the 43rd time since the two charter members of the American Football League began play in 1960. The Patriots and Oilers played twice each year from 1960-1969 and have squared off 22 times since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970. In those 22 post-merger matchups, the Patriots own a 15-7 record, including a 2-1 mark in playoff contests.

The New England and Houston/Tennessee franchises have met three times in the postseason. In 1978, The Houston Oilers beat New England, 31-14, in an AFC Divisional matchup in Foxborough. The Patriots beat the Titans, 17-14, in a 2003 postseason game to advance to the AFC Championship. Last season, the Patriots advanced to their seventh-straight AFC Championship Game with a 35-14 win in an AFC Divisional Playoff on Jan. 13, 2018, at Gillette stadium.

New England leads the all-time series 25-16-1. The Patriots have won the last seven times the two teams played. New England last played at Tennessee on opening day in 2012 and came away with a 34-13 victory.

The Titans struck first with a 95-yard drive that featured two 11-yard runs by QB Marcus Mariota to take a 7-0 lead. RB Dion Lewis caught three passes on New England's ensuing drive to set up RB James White's 5-yard touchdown reception to tie the game early in the second quarter.

The Patriots defense forced a three-and-out and White scored for the second time in less than four minutes for a 14-7 lead. Following another Tennessee punt, Brady engineered a 91-yard drive that was aided by an offsides penalty on a fourth-and-5 from a punt formation and featured four catches by WR Danny Amendola, culminating with WR Chris Hogan's 4-yard touchdown catch and a 21-7 lead.

A 27-yard pass to TE Rob Gronkowski set up RB Brandon Bolden's 2-yard touchdown run in the third quarter for a 28-7 lead. Following a three-and-out, the New England offense drove 90 yards and increased the lead to 35-7 with Gronkowski's 4-yard touchdown catch with 10:22 to play.

Titans WR Corey Davis' second touchdown catch with 1:55 remaining in the fourth quarter capped an 80-yard drive and finished the scoring.

Brady finished 35-of-53 for 337 yards and three touchdowns, while Amendola led all receivers with 11 receptions for 112 yards.

The New England Patriots earned their 12th win of the 2015 season with a 33-16 victory over the Tennessee Titans at Gillette Stadium. It marked the sixth-straight 12-win season for the Patriots, one shy of the NFL record of seven straight set by the Indianapolis Colts (2003-09). Overall, the Patriots earned their 10th 12-win season, tied with Denver for the third-most, behind San Francisco (13) and Dallas (11). Both of those records have since been broken by New England.

Tom Brady completed 23-of-35 passes for 267 yards and two touchdowns, a 5-yard strike to TE Rob Gronkowski on the first offensive series of the game and a 30-yard score to RB James White in the second quarter.

The defense registered five sacks and scored its first touchdown of the season. Tennessee was at their own 26-yard line when DE Chandler Jones forced the ball out of QB Marcus Mariota's hands, allowing DE Akiem Hicks to recover the ball in the end zone for a touchdown for a 14-0 lead.

Tennessee got on the scoreboard in the second quarter after recovering a fumbled punt at the New England 26-yard line to set up a field goal. New England responded after taking advantage of a 75yard kickoff return by WR Keshawn Martin to the Titans 30-yard line. Two plays later, Brady connected with White on a 30-yard touchdown pass and a 21-3 lead.

Mariota was forced to leave the game in the second quarter with a knee injury, giving way to backup QB Zach Mettenberger, who played the rest of the way. Mettenberger threw two touchdown passes to TE Delanie Walker, but he was also intercepted twice in the fourth quarter. His first pick was by CB Malcolm Butler in the end zone. Later in the fourth quarter, LB Jamie Collins intercepted a pass and returned the pick 51 yards to set up a 32-yard field goal by K Stephen Gostkowski.

A 15-yard run by rookie RB Joey losefa helped get the New England offense in position for a 43-yard field goal by Gostkowski with 1:49 left in the first half.

The Titans took their first second-half possession and moved to the New England 7-yard line to set up a 7-yard touchdown pass from Mettenberger to Walker to make the score 24-10. New England responded with an 11-play, 60-yard drive that resulted in a 38-yard field goal by Gostkowski to make it 27-10 heading in the fourth quarter.

A 57-yard touchdown pass from Mettenberger to Walker in the fourth quarter closed the gap to 27-16 after a failed extra-point attempt. The Patriots closed out the scoring with two field goals on their next two drives for a 33-16 final.

The New England Patriots improved to 7-2 after a 31-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers on Sunday Night Football at Gillette Stadium. The Patriots are now 7-2 or better after nine games for the sixthstraight season. It was also the Patriots sixth-straight victory following a 1-2 start.

New England broke a 17-17 fourth-quarter tie with a 14-point fourth quarter to secure the 31-17 win.

QB Tom Brady threw for 294 yards and a touchdown, and RB James White ran for two scores to lead New England to the win. WR Cordarrelle Patterson set a team record with 61 yards rushing, the most ever by a Patriots wide receiver in a single game. The old mark was 48 yards by Darryl Stingley on Oct. 3, 1976, vs. Oakland. He also scored on a 5-yard run in the second quarter, the first rushing touchdown by a New England wide receiver since 2001.

After taking a 17-10 halftime lead, Green Bay tied the game at 17 in the third quarter by taking the second-half kickoff for a touchdown. The Patriots offense responded on the ensuing drive with a 12-play, 66-yard drive, but failed to score on four attempts from the 1-yard line. Any momentum Green Bay could gain from the drive ended when the Patriots defense forced a three-and-out.

The Packers reached the New England 34-yard line early in the fourth quarter when DL Lawrence Guys forced a fumble on RB Aaron Jones that was recovered by CB Stephon Gilmore. New England converted the turnover into a 1-yard touchdown run by White. The drive was highlighted by a 37-yard pass from WR Julian Edelman to White that moved the ball to the Green Bay 2-yard line. White's touchdown made the score 24-17.

After stopping Green Bay on the next drive on three straight plays, New England took over and three plays later, Brady connected with WR Josh Gordon on a 55-yard touchdown pass for a 31-17 lead.

New England opened the contest with a 10-play, 59-yard drive that ended with an 8-yard touchdown run by White 3:20 into the game. Green Bay answered with a drive to the New England 11-yard line before settling for a field goal to make it 7-3 after the first quarter.

A 28-yard field goal by K Stephen Gostkowski early in the second quarter made the score 10-3 New England, but Green Bay took the ensuing kickoff and engineered 13-play, 79-yard drive that ended with a 2-yard touchdown pass from QB Aaron Rodgers to WR Davante Adams to tie the game at 10.

The Patriots next drive was aided by a 15-yard unsportsmanlike penalty against Green Bay to help position New England for Patterson's 5-yard touchdown run.

WIDE RECEIVERS IN A RUSH

It was the most rush attempts ever by Patriots wide receivers in a single game. The 89 yards by the receivers are the most by an NFL team since Kansas City had 89 yards by wide receivers on Dec. 25, 2016.

THE DEFENSE TAKETH AWAY

The Patriots have had at least one takeaway in each game of 2018 after DL Lawrence Guy forced a fumble that was recovered by CB Stephon Gilmore in the fourth quarter of the win over Green Bay. If they continue this streak for each game this season, it will mark the ninth time in franchise history and the first time since 2012 that the team has had a takeaway in every game of the regular season.
















Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 25th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the



team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (17), conference crowns (9) and Super Bowl championships (5) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (21) and have the fewest losing seasons (2) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LII was the ninth Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 24 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 19 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. In 2017, Kraft earned his 21st winning season in 24 years of owning the franchise.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

- Since purchasing the team in 1994, Robert Kraft has 30 career postseason wins as an owner, third-most in NFL history behind the Rooney Family in Pittsburgh (36) and the Green Bay Packers (34). The Rooney Family founded the Steelers in 1933 while the Green Bay Packers were founded in 1919.
- Under Robert Kraft's guidance, the 2000-09 Patriots set the NFL record for most wins in a decade in NFL history with 126 overall wins overall. With 11 wins overall in 2018, the Patriots will tie that record for the current decade.

KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 305 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 305-132 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win five Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 25 times in their 58-year history. Nineteen of those playoff berths have come in the 24 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 20 division crowns, including 15 in the last 17 seasons and 17 of which have come since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994.

- The Patriots are tied with Dallas (5) and San Francisco (5) with five Super Bowl wins and need one more Super Bowl win to tie the Pittsburgh Steelers (6) for the most Super Bowl wins in NFL history.

400-POINT SEASONS

The Patriots extended their NFL record to 11 straight seasons with at least 400 total points (2007-17) after finishing with 458 points last year. The San Diego Chargers previously held the record by scoring at least 400 points in eight straight seasons from 2004-11. The Patriots 458 points last year were second in the NFL to the 478 by the Los Angeles Rams.

RUSH TO VICTORY

Since 2000, New England is 49-1 in the regular season when a Patriot eclipses 100 yards rushing. The only loss during the Bill Belichick era came at Miami on Dec. 20, 2004, when Corey Dillon rushed for 121 yards on 26 carries and the Patriots lost to the Dolphins, 29-28. THE 40/40 CLUB

The Patriots defeated the Kansas City Chiefs, 43-40 on Oct. 14, 2018, at Gillette Stadium. It was just the second time in franchise history that the Patriots have played in a game that both teams scored 40 or more points. The only other occurrence was a 43-43 tie vs. Oakland on Oct. 16, 1964.

NO PUNTS; NO PENALTIES

The Patriots did not punt and were not charged with a penalty in the victory over Kansas City (10/14/18). It was the first time in the Super Bowl era that an NFL team played an entire game without punting or being charged a penalty. It was the sixth time in franchise history that the Patriots were not charged with a penalty and the fifth time in franchise history that the Patriots did not punt in a regular-season game.

WIDE RECEIVERS IN A RUSH

WR Cordarrelle Patterson (61 yards) and WR Julian Edelman (28 yards) combined for 89 yards rushing on 13 attempts in the win vs. Green Bay on Nov. 4, 2018. It marked the most rushing yards and attempts by wide receivers in a single game in New England history, besting the 51 yards on 12 attempts by the wide receivers (38 by Patterson and 13 by Edelman) the previous week vs Buffalo.

CAREER NOTES

Tom Brady has quarterbacked the Patriots to victories in 203 of his 260 career regular-season starts, compiling a .781 winning percentage and giving him the best record of any quarterback in the Super Bowl era (since 1966). Brady's 155 career wins in his first 200 starts are the most in NFL history. Peyton Manning is second with 136 wins in his first 200 career starts.



WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

- If Brady reaches 30 or more touchdowns passes in 2018, he will become just the fourth player in NFL history with 30 or more touchdown passes in eight seasons, joining Brett Favre (9), Peyton Manning (9) and Drew Brees (9).
- Brady is tied with Peyton Manning, Drew Brees and Aaron Rodgers with four seasons with 35 or more touchdowns and needs to reach that mark in 2018 for his fifth season with 35 or more touchdowns, for the most in NFL history.
- Brady has passed for 4,000 yards nine times in his career and if he reaches 4,000 yards in 2018, he will be the third player to reach ten seasons with 4,000 yards, joining Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (12).

- Brady is in his 19th season with the Patriots in 2018. He joined Jim Marshall (19-Minnesota), Bruce Matthews (19-Houston/Tennessee), Darrell Green (20-Washington), Jackie Slater (20-L.A. Rams) and Jason Hanson (21-Detroit) as the only players with at least 19 seasons with one NEL team.

FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State, where as a senior, he completed 56 percent of his passes (153-of-275 for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003.

Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

FATHERLY ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told The Boston Herald. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

UNCONVENTIONAL JOURNEY

Despite a successful three-year lacrosse career at Penn State, Hogan, also a standout football player in high school, said that playing college football was always in the back of his mind. Having redshirted his sophomore year of lacrosse, Hogan had an extra year of athletic eligibility following his fourth academic year at Penn State. As the football itch still lurked, Chris played his final year of eligibility with the Monmouth (N.J.) football team, and at the end of the season joined some workouts with teammates who were training for the NFL Combine.

"I honestly didn't know if I had what it took to play in the NFL," Hogan wrote in the Players Tribune. "Still, it was one of those things where I didn't want to look back in five years and be like, 'Man, I wish I would've tried."

Chris did not get invited to compete in the Combine that year but turned heads during a Pro Day at Fordham University. Later that summer, he signed with the San Francisco 49ers as an undrafted free agent.

G TED KARRAS

SCHOOL'S NOT OUT

Although he already owns a bachelor's degree in communications and a master's degree in recreation, sport and tourism from his time at the University of Illinois, Ted Karras hasn't completely given up his notebook for an NFL playbook. Along with teammate Joe Thuney, Karras is pursuing his MBA from Indiana University thanks to an NFLPA program that provides tuition assistance for players while navigating a busy NFL schedule.

"It just seems to be that everyone keeps wanting to pay for my school, so I'm not going to turn it down," Karras told the Boston Globe.

Karras and Thuney began their MBA pursuit two weeks after the Patriots Super Bowl LI victory by taking online classes and Skyping with professors from Indiana University's Kelley School of Business up until training camp. They continued their classes in the 2018 offseason.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to seven straight Pro Bowls (2011-17) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the eighth straight season in 2018.

The special teams ace shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eightman rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourthand-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."



THUNEY DOES HAVE THE SIZE

An Ohio native, Joe Thuney was told he may not have the size to play offensive line in the Big Ten conference for his hometown Ohio State Buckeyes. Settling on North Carolina State, Thuney went on to become a mainstay on the offensive line while also earning his bachelor's degree in accounting in just three years and added an international studies degree and minoring in Spanish.

Along with teammate Ted Karras, Joe Thuney has taken advantage of an NFLPA program that assists its players in earning college degrees. After earning his degree in accounting while also studying international studies at N.C. State, Thuney is now pursuing his MBA through Indiana University's Kelley School of Business.

LB DONT'A HIGHTOWER

WEARING BRUSCHI'S JERSEY #54

As a first round draft pick, Dont'a Hightower is used to high expectations. Hightower went to training camp with jersey #45 but was switched to jersey #54 prior to the start of his rookie year in 2012. Former LB Tedy Bruschi wore #54 for 13 seasons.



Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number

and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

WINNER ON MULTIPLE LEVELS

Dont'a Hightower and Russell Maryland (2 national championships at University of Miami and three Super Bowl Championships with Dallas) are the only two players in NFL history with two national championships and two Super Bowl wins.

DB DEVIN McCOURTY

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

Devin McCourty enters 2018 tied with Ty Law for second-most Pro Bowls as a Patriots defensive back with four. Only CB Mike Haynes had more Pro Bowl invites as a Patriots DB with six.

McCOUR-TD

DB Devin McCourty returned an interception 84 yards for a touchdown in the win at Buffalo (10/29). It was his first career interception returned for a touchdown and the ninth-longest in team history. The pick-six was McCourty's second career score. His first touchdown came on a 104yard kickoff return vs. the New York Jets on Oct. 21, 2012.

DOUBLE TROUBLE

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots this past offseason for his 10th NFL season. The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels. Shaquill and Shaquem Griffin of the Seattle Seahawks also accomplished this unique occurrence on Kickoff Weekend. New England also had twins on the team last year, with TE Jacob Hollister on the roster and WR Cody Hollister on the practice squad. Jacob is on the roster angain this year and Cody is on the non-football/injury list.

Devin and Jason were cornerbacks in the Rutgers secondary from 2005-08. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and was a year behind his brother in eligibility. Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

McCOURTY GOES LONG

McCourty had a 104-yard kickoff return for a touchdown vs. N.Y. Jets (10/21/12), the second longest kickoff return in team history. Ellis Hobbs has the longest in team history with a 108-yard return for a touchdown at N.Y. Jets on Sept. 9, 2007. McCourty was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance.

McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joins Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

BROTHERS IN ARMS

Devin, along with twin brother Jason McCourty, has seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

 If Stephen Gostkowski leads the NFL in scoring in 2018, he will set the NFL mark for most seasons leading the NFL in scoring with six, moving past Don Hutson (5) and Gino Cappelletti (5). Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in 2008, 2012-14 and 2015.



- In 2015, Gostkowski became the first NFL player with four seasons of 150 or more points. He added his fifth season of 150 or more points in 2017 and can add to that number in 2018.
- Gostkowski (5) needs one more 30-field goal season in 2018 to move out of a tie with David Akers (5), John Carney (5) and Justin Tucker (5) for the most in NFL history with six seasons of 30 or more field goals.
- Gostkowski has led the NFL in field goals three times (2008, 2013 and 2014), and if he leads the NFL in field goals in 2018, he will join Lou Groza (5), Jack Manders (4), Ward Cuff (4) and Mark Moseley (4) as the only NFL players to lead the NFL in field goals in at least four seasons.
- Gostkowski made 92.5 percent (37-of-40) of his field goals in 2017. He tied Adam Vinatieri (2002, 2004, 2010, 2014 and 2015) for the most seasons at 90 percent on field goals with five and needs one more season of 90 percent to set the NFL mark.
- Gostkowski (1,697) is in 15th on the NFL's all-time list for points.
- Gostkowski (180) is second all-time in postseason points, behind Adam Vinatieri (234) and will look to add to those numbers in 2018.
- Gostkowski is third on the NFL's all-time postseason list with 34 field goals behind Adam Vinatieri (56) and David Akers (39).

A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 25 times in its 58-year history. The Patriots have earned 19 of those playoff berths in the 24 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 20 division crowns overall (19 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occa-



sions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 17th straight year in 2017. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 17 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.

The Patriots are also the first team to win more than half of their games in 17 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, moving past the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 21 of the 24 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.
