NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (1-2) vs. N.Y. Giants (1-2) Thursday, Aug. 31, 2017 • Gillette Stadium (65,878) • 7:30 p.m. ET

The New England patriots will close out the 2017 preseason against the New York Giants for the 13th consecutive season when they square off on Thursday at Gillette Stadium. The clubs have been frequent preseason opponents recently, squaring off in the preseason openers for three straight years from 2001-03 and resuming the series in 2005 when they started to meet in the preseason finale.

The Patriots have faced the Giants more than any other team in the preseason with 26 matchups. Philadelphia is second with 22 preseason games.

The Patriots are off to a 1-2 preseason start and will be looking to finish the preseason with with a .500 record.

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by the Patriots Preseason Television Network and can be seen in every New England state, as well as Alaska and Hawaii. The preseason network's flagship station is WBZ-TV CBS in Boston. WBZ-TV's Dan Roche provides play-by-play and is joined by former Patriots tight end Christian Fauria in the broadcast booth. Former Patriots linebacker Matt Chatham will provide sideline analysis along with WBZ-TV's Steve Burton. PATRIOTS LOOK TO KICK OFF ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL SEASON

The 2017 New England Patriots have the chance to set or tie several NFL team records, including:

The Patriots have posted a winning record for 16 consecutive seasons. With nine or more wins in 2017, New England will pass the San Francisco 49ers (1983-98) and Dallas Cowboys (1970-85) for the most consecutive winning seasons with 17 since the 1970 merger.

The Patriots have made the playoffs for eight straight seasons (2009-16), tied with Green Bay (2009-16), Pittsburgh (1972-79), LA Rams (1973-80), Dallas (1966-73) and San Francisco (1983-90). If they make the playoffs in 2017 they will tie Dallas (1975-83) and Indianapolis (2002-10) for the most in NFL history.

SERIES HISTORY





The New England Patriots and the New York Giants will meet for the 27th time in the preseason and for the 13th straight year in the preseason-finale.

The clubs have been frequent preseason opponents recently, squaring off in the preseason openers for three straight years from 2001-03 and resuming the series in 2005 when they started to meet in the preseason-finale.

The Patriots have faced the Giants more than any other team in the preseason with 26 matchups. Philadelphia is second with 22 preseason games. The teams played three times during the 2007 and 2011 seasons with meetings in the preseason, the regular season and in the Super Bowl. The Patriots and Giants faced each other two times in 2015 with a preseason meeting in Foxborugh and a regular season meeting at the Giants. The Patriots lost the preseason finale 12-9 and then won the regular season game, 27-26.

Overall, the Giants hold a 17-9 advantage in the preseason series. The Patriots claim a 6-4 edge in the regular season play.

NEW ENGLAND TIES

In the decades leading up to the founding of the American Football League in 1960, many football fans in New England followed the Giants, a franchise founded in 1925. New England-based NFL outfits such as the Providence Steam Rollers (1925-31), the Boston Redskins (1932-36) and the Boston Yanks (1944-48) folded or moved away, leaving the Giants as the closest NFL team to New England until the Patriots franchise inaugurated play in the 1960 season.

MEMORABLE MATCHUPS

 $\mbox{\bf Aug. 15, 1971} - \mbox{The Patriots defeated the Giants 20-14 in the opening preseason game at the old Foxboro Stadium. }$

Dec. 21, 1996 — The Patriots rallied from a 22-3 fourth-quarter deficit to clinch a first-round playoff bye with a 23-22 win at Giants Stadium.

Aug. 10, 2001 — New England began its first Super Bowl championship season with a 14-0 preseason shutout of the defending NFC champion Giants.

Dec. 29, 2007 — The Patriots defeat the Giants by a thrilling 38-35 score to cap off the first 16-0 regular season in NFL history.

February 3, 2008 — The Patriots faced the Giants in Super Bowl XLII in Glendale, Ariz. The Giants 17-14 win snapped the Patriots perfect season.

February 5, 2012— The Patriots faced the Giants in Super Bowl XLVI in Indianapolis, Ind. The Giants took a 21-17 lead when they scored with 57 seconds left in the game and held the Patriots on a final drive to secure the win.

November 15, 2015 – K Stephen Gostkowski drilled a 54-yard field goal with one second to play to lift the Patriots to a 27-26 come-from-behind victory. The Giants took a 26-24 lead with 1:47 to play before QB Tom Brady drove the Patriots 44 yards and converted a fourth-and-10 on the series to set up the game-winning field goal.

Kicker Stephen Gostkowski drilled a 54-yard field goal with one second to play to lift the New England Patriots to a 27-26 come-from-behind victory over the New York Giants at MetLife Stadium. The Patriots improved to a 9-0 record with the win and secured a winning season for the 15 straight year, joining San Francisco [16] and Dallas [16] as the only teams with at least 15 straight winning seasons since the 1970 merger.

The Giants appeared to give the Patriots their first loss of the season after Josh Brown kicked a 29-yard field goal to give New York a 26-24 lead with 1:47 left to play. QB Tom Brady then drove the Patriots 44 yards, converting a fourth-and-10 on the series, to set up the game-winning field goal. It is the 49th time and the second time in 2015 that Brady has engineered a game-winning performance to lead his team to a victory from a fourth quarter deficit or tie. The Patriots also survived what could have been the game-clincher for the Giants. On the first play of the winning drive, Brady lofted a pass over the middle of the field that fell in and out of the hands of Giants S Landon Collins.

On the Giants final series, it appeared at first that QB Eli Manning had completed a 5-yard touchdown pass to WR Odell Beckham, Jr., but at the last second CB Malcolm Butler stripped the ball out of Beckham's hands. The play, initially ruled a touchdown, was reversed on replay.

The Patriots erased a 23-17 fourth-quarter deficit when Brady connected with TE Rob Gronkowski on a career-long 76-yard touchdown pass to give the Patriots a 24-23 lead. After stopping the Giants on three-straight plays, the Patriots got the ball and marched to the New York 1-yard line with 6:10 to play and a chance to put the game away. A 1-yard touchdown run by RB LeGarrette Blount was nullified by a holding call and then three plays later, Brady's pass to WR Brandon LaFell was intercepted by CB Trumaine McBride, to give the Giants the ball at the 5-yard line with six minutes to play.

Brady finished the game 26-of-42 for 334 yards with two touchdowns and one interception. Gronkowski caught four passes for 113 yards and one score. WR Danny Amendola caught 10 passes for 79 yards, including a 12-yard pass on fourth-and-10 on the game-winning drive. Amendola totaled three passes for 31 yards on that sequence. He also set a personal best with an 82-yard punt return that set up a touchdown in the third quarter.

The Patriots opened the game with a methodical 14-play, 80-yard drive that was capped with a 1-yard touchdown pass to TE Scott Chandler. Just 51 seconds later, Manning connected with Beckham on an 87-yard touchdown pass to tie the game at seven. Both teams added field goals in the second quarter before the Giants took the lead after two 31-yard pass plays helped get into position for Manning's 1-yard touchdown pass to WR Dwayne Harris for a 17-10 lead at halftime.

The Giants opened the third quarter with a drive that ended in a field goal to extend their lead to 20-10. The Patriots closed the lead after an 82-yard punt return by Amendola helped set up a 1-yard touchdown run by Blount to make it 20-17. The Giants added a field goal later in the third quarter to take a 23-17 lead into the fourth quarter.

The New England Patriots earned their first win of the preseason when K Stephen Gostkowski drilled a 45-yard field goal with two second s to play to lift the Patriots to a 30-28 win against the Detroit Lions at Ford Field.

QB Tom Brady and the first string offense scored on their first four offensive drives to jump out to a 24-0 first quarter lead. The Lions slowed the Patriots in the second quarter and scored with under two minutes to play in the first half to make it 24-7 at the break.

Overall Detroit scored on four straight drives to close the gap to 24-21 and then took the lead in the fourth quarter on a touchdown for a 28-24 advantage. The Patriots added a field goal late in the fourth quarter and then with just under two minutes to play, QB Jimmy Garoppolo threw a 31-yard pass to WR Cody Hollister to get in position for Gostkowski's game-winner.

Brady completed his first four passes for 59 yards before hitting WR Chris Hogan for a 7-yard touchdown and quick 7-0 lead.

Brady connected with WR Julian Edelman on a 23-yard pass and an 18-yard pass on the drive to get into scoring position. Edelman suffered a knee injury on the 18-yard reception and did not return to the game.

On the first play of the ensuing drive, CB Malcolm Butler forced a fumble on a short pass to WR Golden Tate that was recovered by S Jordan Richards at the Detroit 32-yard line. On the next play, Brady threw a 32-yard touchdown pass to Hogan for a 14-0 New England lead.

A 31-yard pass from Brady to WR Danny Amendola helped get into position for a 1-yard touchdown run by RB Mike Gillislee. The scoring run was Gilislee's first carry and first play from scrimmage as a member of the Patriots. He added a 2-point play to make his first two touches in a New England uniform scoring plays.

The Patriots added to their lead on the next series when a 25-yard pass from Brady to Hogan helped set up a 46-yard field goal by Gostkowski for a 24-0 lead.

PATRIOTS SCORE 24 FIRST QUARTER POINTS

The Patriots jumped to a 24-0 first quarter lead. The most first quarter points the Patriots have scored in the regular season is 21 points on three different occasions – at Oakland on Dec. 14, 2008, vs. NY Jets on Oct. 29, 1978 and at Miami on Dec. 15, 1974.

BRADY MAKES THE START

Tom Brady started the game and led the Patriots to scores on the first four drives of the game for a 24-0 first quarter lead. On the game's opening drive he completed 4-of-4 passes for 59 yards and finished the drive with a 7-yard touchdown pass to WR Chris Hogan. Following a fumble on Detroit's first play from scrimmage, Brady completed a 32-yard touchdown pass to Hogan. Brady finished 12-of-15 for 174 yards with two touchdowns and one interception.

TWO RECEPTIONS, TWO SCORES

WR Chris Hogan scored on a 7-yard touchdown pass and a 32-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady in the first quarter on his first two receptions of the game. The only two-touchdown game of his career was vs. Pittsburgh in the 2016 AFC Championship Game when he scored on 16 and 34-yard touchdowns. Hogan finished with four receptions for 70 yards and two touchdowns.

HARRIS MAKES FIRST START

LB David Harris made his first start as a member of the Patriots.

FLEMING STARTS AGAIN

Cameron Fleming started at left tackle in place of Nate Solder for the third straight preseason game. Fleming has made 14 overall starts with three at left tackle, six at right tackle and seven at tackle eligible tight end. His last regular season start at left tackle was in the season-opening win at Arizona on Sept. 11, 2016.

RICHARDS STARTS IN NICKEL D

S Jordan Richards started in the Patriots nickel defense. It marked his second start of the 2017 preseason. He was in the starting lineup in the base defense in the preseason-opener vs. Jacksonville (8/10). Jordan has two regular season starts, both during his rookie season. He started in the nickel defense vs. Tennessee (12/20/15) and in the base defense at safety at the New York Jets (12/27/15). Richards recovered a fumble forced by CB Malcolm Butler on Detroit's first play of the game at the Detroit 32-yard line.

GILLISLEE MAKES MOST OF FIRST ACTION

Newly acquired RB Mike Gillislee saw his first action as a member of the Patriots after missing the first two preseason games. He scored on a 1-yard touchdown on his first carry with the Patriots. He scored on a two-point play on his second carry. He scored eight rushing touchdowns last season with Buffalo.

GOSTKOWSKI HITS GAME WINNER

K Stephen Gostkowski drilled a game-winning 45-yard field goal with two seconds to play to give the Patriots a 30-28 victory. Gostkowski has kicked eight game-winning field goals in his career.

GAROPPOLO/HOLLISTER CONNECTION

QB Jimmy Garoppolo finished 7-of-12 for 83 yards but connected with WR Cody Hollister on a 31-yard pass to get to the Detroit 32-yard line with just under two minutes to play to help get in position for the game winning field goal.

PATRIOTS

- *The Patriots are tied with Dallas and San Francisco with five Super Bowl wins and need one more Super Bowl win to tie the Pittsburgh Steelers (6) for the most Super Bowl wins in NFL history.
- *The Patriots have played in the most Super Bowls in NFL history with nine.
- *The Patriots set an NFL record with eight straight division titles [2009-16] and look to add to that number in 2017.
- *The Patriots set an NFL record by reaching six straight conference title games (2011-16) and look to add to that total in 2017.
- *The Patriots are tied with the Dallas Cowboys (1991-96 12 wins) for the most consecutive seasons with at least one playoff win (2011-16 11 wins) with six straight and look to set the NFL record with a playoff win in 2017.

BILL BELICHICK

- *Belichick has an NFL-best five Super Bowl championships as a head coach. If he wins one more championship he will join George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only NFL coaches with six championships since the league began postseason play in 1933.
- *Belichick is tied with Tom Landry and Don Shula for the most postseason games as a head coach with 36 and needs to coach in one more postseason game to set the NFL record.
- *Belichick set a postseason mark by leading his team to advancement in the playoffs for six straight seasons (2011-16) and looks to add to that mark in 2017.
- *Belichick enters the 2017 season in fourth place with 263 career victories overall and needs eight victories in 2017 to move past Tom Landry (270) into third place all-time, behind Don Shula (347) and George Halas (324).
- *Belichick will look to win back-to-back championships for a second time in his career [2003-04] a feat so rare it's been achieved by only two other coaches in history. Chuck Noll did it with the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1970s [1974-75, 1978-79], and Vince Lombardi did it with the Green Bay Packers in the 1960s [1961-62, 1966-67].

TOM BRADY

- *If Brady reaches 30 or more touchdowns passes in 2017, he will become just the fourth player in NFL history with 30 or more touchdown passes in seven seasons, joining Brett Favre (9), Peyton Manning (9) and Drew Brees (9).
- *Brady is tied with Peyton Manning, Drew Brees and Aaron Rodgers with four seasons with 35 or more touchdowns and needs to reach 35 touchdowns in 2017 for his fifth season with 35 or more touchdowns, for the most in NFL history.
- *Brady has passed for 4,000 yards eight times in his career and if he reaches 4,000 yards in 2017, he will be the third player to reach nine seasons with 4,000 yards, joining Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (11).
- *Brady led the NFL with 36 touchdowns passes in 2015, his fourth time leading the NFL in passing touchdowns. He tied Drew Brees, Len Dawson, Brett Favre, Peyton Manning, Johnny Unitas and Steve Young for most seasons leading the NFL in touchdown passes.
- *Brady has 183 regular season wins and needs four more to move past Peyton Manning (186) and Brett Favre (186) for the most regular season wins in NFL history by an NFL starting quarterback.
- *Brady has led the Patriots to eleven 12-win seasons, tied with Peyton Manning for the most 12-win seasons in NFL history and needs to lead the Patriots to a 12-win season in 2017 to set the NFL record.
- *Tom Brady is tied with Peyton Manning with 27 Player of the Week awards and needs one more to set the NFL record for the most Player of the Week honors.
- *Brady is tied with Joe Montana with nine games in the postseason with three or more touchdown passes and needs one more to set the NFL record.
- *Brady is tied with Peyton Manning with 51 career games with three touchdown passes and no interceptions. He needs one such game in 2017 to set the NFL record.
- *The 2017 season will be Brady's 18th season with the Patriots and he will break a tie with John Brodie (San Francisco) and Dan Marino (Miami) for the most seasons with one team by any NFL quarterback.
- *Brady has started 235 regular season games at quarterback. With six more starts in 2017 he will move into third all-time for most regular-season starts by a quarterback behind only Brett Favre (298) and Peyton Manning (265). He needs five starts to pass Fran Tarketon (239) and six to pass Dan Marino (240).
- *Brady has played in 237 NFL regular season games entering the 2017 season, which is seventh all-time among NFL quarterbacks. If he plays in all 16 games in 2017 he will move into fifth place all-time with 253 games played among NFL quarterbacks, behind George Blanda (340), Brett Favre (302), Peyton Manning (266) and Earl Morrall (255).
- *Brady (12) needs one more Pro Bowl berth to join Tony Gonzalez (14), Peyton Manning (14), Bruce Matthews (14), Ray Lewis (13), Jerry Rice (13) and Reggie White (13) as the only NFL players with at least 13 Pro Bowl berths.

STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI

- *If Stephen Gostkowski leads the league in scoring in 2017, he will set the NFL mark for most seasons leading the league in scoring with six, moving past Don Hutson (5) and Gino Cappelletti (5). Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in 2008, 2012-15.
- *In 2015, Gostkowski became the first NFL player with four seasons of 150 or more points and can add to that in 2017.
- *Gostkowski [4] needs one more 30-field goal season to tie David Akers [5] and John Carney [5] for the most in NFL history with five seasons of 30 or more field goals.
- *Gostkowski has led the NFL in field goals three times (2008, 2013 and 2014) and if he leads the NFL in field goals in 2017, he will join Lou Groza (5), Jack Manders (4), Ward Cuff (4) and Mark Moseley (4) as the only NFL players to lead the NFL in field goals in at least four seasons.
- *Gostkowski (1,457) enters the 2017 season 23rd in NFL history in total points scored and needs 30 points to reach the top 20.
- *Gostkowski (160) is third all-time in postseason points, behind Adam Vinatieri (234) and David Akers (175) and will look to add to those numbers in 2017.

JULIAN EDELMAN

- *Julian Edelman enters the 2017 season third in NFL history with 89 postseason receptions, behind Jerry Rice (151) and Reggie Wayne (93) and needs five postseason receptions to move past Wayne into second place all-time.
- *Edelman is one of 14 NFL players with at least 1,000 postseason receiving yards and his 1,024 postseason receiving yards are ranked 13th in NFL history. He needs 39 postseason yards to move into the top 10.
- *Edelman enters the 2016 season tied with Deion Branch for first in Patriots history with four postseason 100 yard games.

ROB GRONKOWSKI

- *Gronkowski (3) needs one more 1,000-yard season to join Tony Gonzalez and Jason Witten for the most 1,000-yard seasons by an NFL tight end with four.
- *Gronkowski has an NFL-leading five seasons with 10 or more touchdowns by a tight end and can add to his record in 2017.
- *Gronkowski enters the 2017 season with twenty-three 100 yard games, third in NFL history among tight ends behind Tony Gonzalez (31) and Kellen Winslow (24). His twenty-three 100 yard games are third in Patriots history, behind the 38 by Stanley Morgan and the 28 by Wes Welker.
- *Gronkowski and Tom Brady have connected on 67 touchdown passes, second among all quarterback and tight end combinations to the 84 by Philip Rivers and Antonio Gates. The Brady to Gronkowksi connection is tied with Peyton Manning-Reggie Wayne for sixth all-time.
- *Gronkowski enters the 2017 season with 6,095 receiving yards, 15th all-time among NFL tight ends and needs 475 yards to move into the top 10 among all tight ends in NFL history.
- *Gronkowski has 6,095 receiving yards and is fourth in Patriots history and needs 272 yards to move past Troy Brown (6,366) into third all-time
- *Gronkowski (68) enters the 2017 season third all-time among NFL tight ends with 68 receiving touchdowns, behind the 111 by Antonio Gates and Tony Gonzalez.
- *Gronkowski enters the 2017 season first among all NFL tight ends with nine postseason touchdowns. Dave Casper and Vernon davis are second with seven.
- *Gronkowski is tied with Dallas Clark with three postseason 100-yard games and needs one more to tie Vernon Davis and Keith Jackson for the most 100-yard games by a tight end in postseason history with four.
- *Gronkowski [3] needs one more 100-yard game in the postseason to tie Deion Branch and Julian Edelman for the most in New England postseason history with four.
- *Gronkowski enters the 2017 season fourth all-time among NFL tight ends with 754 postseason receiving yards, behind Dallas Clark [847], Keith Jackson [834] and Shannon Sharpe [814].
- *Gronkowski enters the 2017 season fifth all-time among NFL tight ends with 52 postseason receptions, behind Dallas Clark [64], Jay Novacek [62], Shannon Sharpe [62] and Brent Jones [60].

News & Notes

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 24th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England,



a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (16), conference crowns (8) and Super Bowl championships (5) than any other NFL team. Super Bowl LI was the eighth Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 23 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 18 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. In 2016, Kraft earned his 20th winning season in 23 years of owning the franchise.

Browns RB Isaiah Crowell entered the game third in the NFL in rushing yards and was held to 22 yards on 13 carries for a 1.7yard average. The Patriots have held the opponent under 30 yards rushing 17 times in team history.

A SAFETY FIRST

The Patriots recorded a safety in back-to-back games for the first time in team history in 2016. LB Dont'a Hightower dropped Cincinnati [10/16/16] QB Andy Dalton in the end zone for an 8-yard sack for a safety. At Cleveland [10/9/16] the previous week, Browns QB Cody Kessler fumbled the ball out of the end zone for a safety, forced by a strong rush by Dont'a Hightower. The Patriots recorded their team-record third safety of the 2016 season when DL Malcom Brown registered a tackle in the end zone vs. Baltimore on Dec. 12.

BLOCK PART'

LB Shea McClellin blocked a first quarter field goal attempt vs. Baltimore on Dec. 12, 2016 for the Patriots third blocked kick of the 2016 season. McClellin blocked an extra point attempt vs. Seattle on Nov. 13 and DL Alan Branch blocked a field goal at the New York Jets on Nov. 27. The block was the first miss of the 2016 season by Baltimore K Justin Tucker. The Patriots three blocked kicks are the most blocked kicks New England has recorded since 2014 when the team recorded five on the year (4 field goals and 1 punt). The Patriots' record for most kicks blocked in a season sits at six in 1975 (2 extra points, 3 field goals and 1 punt), while they have tallied five in season on two occasions (2014 and 1973) and four in a season four times (1974, 1977, 1986, 2002).

DEFENSE NETS THIRD SAFET

The Patriots set a new franchise mark with three safeties in 2016. The defense registered safeties sin back-to-back games – at Cleveland (10/9) when QB Cody Kessler fumbled out of the end zone and when LB Dont'a Hightower registered one in the win vs. Cincinnati (10/16) when he sacked QB Andy Dalton in the end zone. DL Malcom Brown then registered the third safety when he dropped Baltimore RB Kenneth Dixon in the end zone on Dec. 12, 2016. The Patriots had two safeties in a season six previous times (1963, 1965, 1967, 1969, 1978 and 1985). The NFL record for most safeties in a season is four by many teams.

THE NUMBERS

WR Chris Hogan caught two 40-yard passes (63 and 43) at Cleveland [10/9/16] to become the first Patriots player to do so in a game since Rob Gronkowski (50 and 49) at Washington (12/11/11).

James White finished third in the NFL among running backs with 60 receptions and 551 yards in 2016.

Stephen Gostkowski executed a successful onside kick vs. Washington [11/08/15] and vs. Philadelphia (12/06/15). It was his third (Cleveland - 12/08/13) and the fourth in team history. The first came when Jim Lee Hunt recovered a Gino Cappelletti kick at the end of the first half in a 26-10 win vs. the NY Jets (9/27/64).

The Patriots became the first team in NFL history in 2014 to earn five straight first-round byes and extended that record with their seventh straight bye in 2016. Dallas and San Francisco earned four straight byes from 1992 through 1995 and Denver earned four straight from 2012-15.

The Patriots and Green Bay Packers are the only teams that have made the playoffs in each of the last eight seasons (2009-16).

The Patriots have had a rookie free agent make the 53-man roster for 13 straight seasons, the third most, behind the Chargers (20) and Colts (18). <u>14</u>

RB Dion Lewis is 14-0 in the regular season when he plays as a member of the Patriots. Including the playoffs with Lewis in the lineup, the Patriots are 17-0. <u>16</u>

The Patriots have gone 16 straight seasons without being swept by a division opponent after beating each of the AFC East teams in 2016, extending the longest such streak since the 1970 NFL merger.

The Patriots have won nine or more games in 16 straight seasons, the most seasons of nine or more wins since 2001 in the NFL.

<u>16</u> The Patriots have 16 first-team All-Pro selections via the draft since 2000, which ranks behind only Carolina (18) and Seattle (17). The Patriots 63 Pro Bowl selections via the draft since 2000 is a league-leading total, followed by Dallas (62).

Patriots WR Chris Hogan finished tied for first in the NFL with Washington's DeSean Jackson with a 17.9-yard average in 2016.

19 Nate Ebner finished tied for first in the NFL with Miami's Michael Thomas [19] with a career best 19 special teams tackles.

20 The Patriots have scored on the final possession of the first half and the opening possession of the second half 20 times since 2009, first in the NFL. New Orleans is second with 14 such scoring drives.

Following a 3-0 record in September and a 4-0 record in December in 2016, the Patriots now have 23 undefeated months since 2000, the most in the NFL.

Indianapolis is second with 15.

The Patriots have won 24 straight home games against non-division AFC opponents. Their last loss to a non-division AFC team was a 33-10 loss vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 30, 2008.

The Patriots have gone 26 straight games (regular season and postseason) without allowing an opponent to run for 100 or more yards. (last game - Nov. 29, 2015, at Denver).

Rob Gronkowski and Tom Brady have connected on 67 touchdown passes. It is the second most connections between a quarterback and a tight end in NFL history and is sixth overall.

The Patriots have won 87 straight home regular season games when leading at halftime, adding to their NFL record. The last time the Patriots lost at home after leading at halftime was on Dec. 24, 2000, vs. Miami when they lost 27-24 after leading 21-17 at halftime.





RB BRANDON BOLDEN

BETTER THAN AVERAGE

RB Brandon Bolden's 8.6-yard average at Buffalo (9/30/12) is tied for the third highest ever in a single game for the Patriots among running backs with at least 15 rushing attempts. Bolden earned the FedEx Ground Player of the Week for his performance.

FOOTBALL FAMILY TRADITION

Bolden's grandfather, Frank Pitts, played 10 years in the NFL (1965-74) as a receiver for Kansas City, Cleveland and Oakland. He was with Kansas City for two Super Bowls, losing Super Bowl I and winning Super Bowl IV. Said Bolden about his grandfather, "I remember being six years old, him popping in a highlight film of Super Bowl I and IV. I've seen that tape at least 500 times."

BOLDEN BLOCK PARTY

Brandon Bolden blocked his first NFL punt in the win at San Diego (12/7/14) to give the Patriots a first down at the Chargers 25-yard line. It was the Patriots first blocked punt since Patrick Chung blocked a punt at Miami on Oct. 4, 2010.

RB REX BURKHEAD

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

As a junior at the University of Nebraska, Rex formed a close bond with a 5-year old fan of his, Jack Hoffman, who had been diagnosed with brain cancer. During that 2011 season, Rex wore a wristband with the phrase "Team Jack – Pray" which helped bring pediatric brain cancer into the national spotlight. Burkhead hosted Hoffman for a lunch, provided a personal tour of Memorial Stadium and has since joined the board of directors of the "Team Jack Foundation," which has raised more than \$4 million dollars to fight pediatric brain cancer since 2013. Rex recently hosted a fund raiser this past offseason at his high school alma mater that raised roughly \$45,000. In 2013, Jack Hoffman's touchdown run during Nebraska's spring football scrimmage went viral and earned him an ESPY award.

OL MARCUS CANNON

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

On April 20, 2011, just days before Texas Christian offensive line prospect Marcus Cannon was to enter the NFL Draft, he was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, a treatable form of cancer found in lymph tissue. A little more than one week later, the Patriots selected Cannon in the fifth round [138th overall] of the draft with the knowledge of his illness. The Patriots placed Cannon on the Reserve/Non Football Injury list to start the 2011 season while he received treatment and recovered. Cannon was activated to the 53-man roster later that year and is now in his seventh season with the team. Cannon made a full recovery and was named the Patriots 2011 Ed Block Courage Award winner - an annual award presented to select players in the National Football League who are voted by their teammates as role models of inspiration, sportsmanship and courage.

WR BRANDIN COOKS

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

Brandin Cooks, the youngest of four children, lost his father to a heart attack at the age of six. His mother was forced to pick up a second job at an after school program on top of her regular 3:00 a.m. shift at a local warehouse in order to keep food on the table for the boys. Eager to take some of the burden of raising four boys off his mother, Brandin committed himself to athletics where he excelled at both track and field, as well as football, on his way to earning a scholar-ship to Oregon State University.

ANOTHER TEAM RECORD

Edelman had a 47-yard run in the fourth quarter vs. Indianapolis (11/18/12). It is the longest run ever by a Patriots receiver, topping Troy Brown's 35-yard run vs. Tampa Bay on (9/3/00).

FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State, where as a senior, he completed 56 percent of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

EDELMAN TAKES HIS FATHER'S ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011. This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told *The Boston Herald*. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

OB JIMMY GARAPPOLO

GAROPPOLO MAKES FIRST START

Jimmy Garoppolo became just the fifth quarterback in the last 30 years to make his first regular season start in a season opening night game (Sept. 11, 2016 vs. Cardinals). Aaron Rodgers was the last (2008, win vs. Minnesota), with Philip Rivers (2006), David Carr (2002) and Brian Griese (1999) before him. Garoppolo finished 24-of-33 for 264 yards with one touchdown.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to six straight Pro Bowls (2011-16) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the sixth straight season in 2016.

The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by The Boston Globe. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts.'

OL JOE THUNEY

LIKE FATHER LIKE SON

An Ohio native, Joe Thuney was told he may not have the size to play offensive line in the Big Ten conference for his hometown Ohio State Buckeyes. Settling on North Carolina State, Thuney went on to become a mainstay on the offensive line while also earning his bachelor's degree in accounting in just three years, added an internal affairs degree and also minored in Spanish.

WHITE HAS CAREER DAY

James White set career highs with 10 receptions and 115 receiving yards vs. Philadelphia (12/6/15). White's 115 receiving yards are the second-highest such total for a Patriots running back since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, trailing only Shane Vereen's team-record 153 receiving yards vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8, 2013. White's 10 catches are the third highest such total of the Bill Belichick era for a running back (since 2000), trailing only Shane Vereen's club record 12 catches vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8, 2013, and Kevin Faulk's 11 catches vs. Tampa Bay on Sept. 3, 2000.

MAKING THE OLYMPICS



Nate Ebner was selected to the 2016 U.S. Olympic Rugby squad and after he was given an excused leave of absence from his football obligations in Foxboro, suited up for Team USA in Rio de Janeiro last August. The Dublin, Ohio native was introduced to the sport of rugby around the age of six and developed a passion and a talent that stemmed from his father and role model, Jeff Ebner, who played the game at the University of Minnesota. Nate did not play football in high school but was a two-time MVP of the USA Rugby team at the Junior World Cup and a standout on the U19 and U20 national teams.

Although his parents were divorced, Nate and his father remained very close. "We were super tight," Nate told the *Boston Globe.* "I would put my father-son relationship against anyone's. He taught me how to be a man." The two often spent time working together at the family's auto reclamation business, Ebner & Sons in Springfield, Ohio, and would also train in the gym together behind the motto, "Finish Strong," - a message Jeff always preached to his son.

Nate played rugby at Ohio State during his first two years of college, but as an All-American on the school's club team, he decided to walk on to the Buckeyes football team and finish his career with his sights set on reaching the NFL.

Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of two active sets of twins playing in the NFL.


BROTHERS TEAM UP FOR A CAUSE

SCORING FLURRY

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014 to turn a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. The Patriots are one of three teams to score three touchdowns in under a minute since the 1970 merger, and are the only team to have achieved the feat twice.

- ★ On the Bears' first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown and a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at half-time

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle [9/16/84]. The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 [12/21/96]. The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).





PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 24 times in their 57-year history. Eighteen of those playoff berths have come in the 23 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berth's the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 19 division crowns, including 14 in the last 16 seasons, and have qualified as a Wild Card team four times (1976, 1985, 1994 and 1998). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 during the strike season.

PATRIOTS CLINCH PLAYOFF SPOT FOR 18th TIME IN KRAFT'S 23 YEARS OF OWNERSHIP

New England has now qualified for the playoffs 24 times in its 57-year history. The Patriots have earned 18 of those playoff berths in the 23 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 19 division crowns overall (18 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.



ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENTS

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 16th straight year with a 14-2 record in 2016. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 16 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.

The Patriots are the third team to win more than half of their games in 16 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, joining the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 20 of the 23 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.
