NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (2-1) vs.CAROLINA PANTHERS (2-1)

Sunday, Oct. 1, 2017 • Gillette Stadium (65,878) • 1:00 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots closed out the first month of the season with a 2-1 record and begin the month of October at home when they host the Carolina Panthers this Sunday at Gillette Stadium. The Patriots are an NFL-best 53-17 in the month of October since 2000. Last season, the Patriots finished with a 4-1 October record.

This Sunday's game will be the Patriots' second against an NFC team. In Week 2, the Patriots traveled to New Orleans and beat the Saints, 36-20. New England owns a 49-12 (.803) record vs. NFC teams since realignment in 2002, the best inter-conference record in the NFL during that time. Pittsburgh is second with a 41-20 record.

QB Tom Brady has thrown for 825 yards and eight touchdowns in the last two games with 447 yards and three touchdowns at the Saints and 378 yards and five touchdowns vs. Houston.

SERIES HISTORY





The New England Patriots and the Carolina Panthers will meet for the first time in the regular season since 2013 and for the first time at Gillette Stadium in a regular season game since the 2009 season. The 2009 matchup, a 20-10 Patriots win, was Carolina's only regular season game played between the two teams at Gillette Stadium.

The teams last played in the regular season in 2013 in a competitive Monday Night Football contest on Nov. 18, 2013 when a Tom Brady pass to TE Rob Gronkowski fell incomplete on the last play of the game to give Carolina a 24-20 win at Bank of America.

Carolina holds the edge in the regular season with a 3-2 margin.

The Patriots and Panthers met in Super Bowl XXXVIII on Feb. 2, 2004. The Patriots-Panthers Super Bowl is widely believed to be among the most entertaining Super Bowls ever played, as the Panthers took a fourth-quarter lead only to see the Patriots came up with a game winning field goal to clinch the seesaw battle in the final seconds.

The Carolina Panthers topped the visiting New England Patriots, 24-20, in a Monday Night Football matchup at Bank of America Stadium.

Carolina QB Cam Newton threw his third touchdown of the night with a 25-yard pass to WR Ted Ginn, Jr. with 59 seconds left. Newton drove the Panthers 83 yards on 13 plays for the go ahead touchdown, but the Patriots still had a chance to get the win.

QB Tom Brady moved the Patriots to the Carolina 18-yard line and fired a pass into the end zone on the final play. The pass was intercepted by S Robert Lester, but the officials threw a flag after it appeared that LB Luke Kuechly had interfered with TE Rob Gronkowski by grabbing him with both hands. The officials quickly gathered together and waved off the penalty and the game ended. Faced with a fourth-and-10 from their own 20-yard line with 47 seconds to play, Brady completed a 23-yard pass to Gronkwoski to keep the drive alive.

Brady was 29-of-40 for 296 yards and one touchdown, while Newton completed 19 of 28 passes for 209 yards and three touchdowns. He also ran seven times for 62 yards.

Both teams had just seven offensive series, including just one series each in the third quarter. After Carolina built a 10-0 lead, the Patriots answered with a field goal right before the half and then took their second half kick and engineered an 8-play, 70-yard drive that ended when Brady connected with Gronkowski for a 9-yard touchdown pass to tie the game at 10.

Carolina answered with a 13-play, 81-yard drive that ended with a 15-yard touchdown pass from Newton to TE Greg Olsen to take a 17-10 lead. That drive was kept alive when Newton scrambled on a third-and-7 play, breaking numerous tackles to convert on a 14-yard run. Newton completed all seven of his pass attempts on that drive for 77 yards.

The Patriots scored on their next two possessions, with a 1-yard touchdown run by RB Stevan Ridley to tie the game at 17 and a 26-yard field goal by K Stephen Gostkowski that gave the Patriots a 20-17 lead. The scoring drives were sandwiched around a key three-and-out defensive series that included a 7-yard sack by DE Rob Ninkovich, his second of the night.

Newton and the Panthers came right down the field before hitting Ginn on a hitch route. Ginn escaped a few defenders before racing down the sidelines and into the end zone.

The Patriots were two-for-five in the red zone, including the last play of the game. In the second quarter, the Patriots reached the Carolina 13-yard line before a Ridley fumble ended the drive. Then in the fourth quarter, the Patriots reached the Carolina 8-yard line before being forced to settle for a field goal.

The Patriots ended a streak of 36 straight games with at least one takeaway, a streak that began in October of 2011.

Wide receiver Brandin Cooks caught a 25-yard toe-tapping touchdown with 23 seconds to play and then added a two-point play to give the Patriots a 36-33 come-from-behind victory over the visiting Houston Texans.

The New England defense stopped Houston on a third-and-1 play when they tried to run the ball up the middle from the New England 18-yard line with 2:34 left, forcing the Texans to settle for a field goal that gave them a 33-28 lead with 2:28 to play.

QB Tom Brady, who finished 25-of-35 for 378 yards and five touchdowns, led the Patriots on the game winning drive that began at the 25-yard line. Brady completed two big third downs to keep the drive alive. Faced with a third-and-12, he connected on a 15-yard pass to TE Rob Gronkowski and then when faced with a third-and-18 from his own 48-yard line, connected with WR Danny Amendola to the Houston 25-yard line. On the next play, Brady went deep to Cooks for the game winner.

Cooks finished the game with five receptions for 131 yards and two touchdowns. He also caught two 40-yard passes, including a 42-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter.

The Patriots defense struggled against rookie QB Deshaun Watson, who rushed for 41 yards and passed for 301 yards with two touchdowns. Despite the struggles, the Patriots defense was able to hold Houston to field goals on drives to the New England 13 and 18-yard line in the fourth quarter.

New England opened the game with a seven-play, 51-yard drive that ended with a 5-yard touchdown pass from Brady to Gronkowski for a 7-0 lead. The Patriots were set up with good field position following a 33-yard punt return by Amendola to midfield. Houston responded with a field goal drive and later in the first quarter took just two plays to take a 10-7 lead. After starting a drive at midfield, Watson connected on a 15-yard pass followed by a 29-yard touchdown strike to take the lead.

The two teams exchanged leads in the second quarter. CB Stephon Gilmore intercepted Watson and returned the pick 39 yards to the Houston 12-yard line. That helped get in position for a 7-yard touchdown pass from Brady to WR Chris Hogan to make it 14-10.

However, Houston scored on the game's next two possessions with a field goal and then a strip sack that resulted in a 22-yard touchdown by LB Jadeveon Clowney for a 20-14 Houston lead.

Brady threw deep to Hogan on a 47-yard touchdown pass on the next series to give the Patriots a 21-20 lead at halftime.

The Patriots opened the second half with a 42-yard touchdown pass from Brady to Cooks to extend their lead to 28-20. Houston scored 13 straight points to take a 33-28 lead in the fourth quarter before the Patriots comeback offert.



PATRIOTS HOME DOMINANCE

Since Gillette Stadium opened in 2002, the Patriots own the NFL's best record at home overall. The Patriots own an overall record of 102-20 (.836) at home in regular season games and a 118-23 (.837) record including playoffs. The Patriots are an NFL-best 162-47 at home since 1994 when Robert Kraft purchased the team.

BILL BELICHICK

- *Belichick has an NFL-best five Super Bowl championships as a head coach. If he wins one more championship he will join George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only NFL coaches with six championships since the league began postseason play in 1933.
- *Belichick is tied with Tom Landry and Don Shula for the most postseason games as a head coach with 36 and needs to coach in one more postseason game to set the NFL record.
- *Belichick set a postseason mark by leading his team to advancement in the playoffs for six straight seasons (2011-16) and looks to add to that mark in 2017.
- *Belichick is in fourth place with 265 career victories overall and needs six victories to move past Tom Landry (270) into third place all-time, behind Don Shula (347) and George Halas (324).

- *If Brady reaches 30 or more touchdowns passes in 2017, he will become just the fourth player in NFL history with 30 or more touchdown passes in seven seasons, joining Brett Favre (9), Peyton Manning (9) and Drew Brees (9).
- *Brady is tied with Peyton Manning, Drew Brees and Aaron Rodgers with four seasons with 35 or more touchdowns and needs to reach 35 touchdowns in 2017 for his fifth season with 35 or more touchdowns, for the most in NFL history.
- *Brady has passed for 4,000 yards eight times in his career and if he reaches 4,000 yards in 2017, he will be the third player to reach nine seasons with 4,000 yards, joining Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (11).
- *Brady led the NFL with 36 touchdowns passes in 2015, his fourth time leading the NFL in passing touchdowns. He tied Drew Brees, Len Dawson, Brett Favre, Peyton Manning, Johnny Unitas and Steve Young for most seasons leading the NFL in touchdown passes.

- *Tom Brady has 28 Player of the Week awards after winning the award in Week 2 of the 2017 season and moved past Peyton Manning (27) for the most Player of the Week honors.
- *Brady is tied with Joe Montana with nine games in the postseason with three or more touchdown passes and needs one more to set the NEL record.
- *Brady moved past Peyton Manning (51) in the win at New Orleans (9/17) and now has an NFL record of 53 career games with three touchdown passes and no interceptions.
- *The 2017 season is Brady's 18th season with the Patriots, the most seasons with one team by any NFI quarterback. He had been tied with John Brodie (San Francisco) and Dan Marino (Miami) with 17 seasons.
- *Brady has started 238 regular season games at quarterback. - *If Stephen Gostkowski leads the league in scoring in 2017, he will set the NFL mark for most seasons leading the league in scoring with six, moving past Don Hutson (5) and Gino Cappelletti (5). Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in 2008, 2012-15.
- *In 2015, Gostkowski became the first NFL player with four seasons of 150 or more points and can add to that in 2017.

- *Gronkowski (3) needs one more 1,000-yard season to join Tony Gonzalez and Jason Witten for the most 1,000-yard seasons by an NFL tight end with four.

News & Notes

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 24th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England,



a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (16), conference crowns (8) and Super Bowl championships (5) than any other NFL team. Super Bowl LI was the eighth Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 23 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 18 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. In 2016, Kraft earned his 20th winning season in 23 years of owning the franchise.

A SAFETY FIRST

The Patriots recorded a safety in back-to-back games for the first time in team history in 2016. LB Dont'a Hightower dropped Cincinnati [10/16/16] QB Andy Dalton in the end zone for an 8-yard sack for a safety. At Cleveland [10/9/16] the previous week, Browns QB Cody Kessler fumbled the ball out of the end zone for a safety, forced by a strong rush by Dont'a Hightower. The Patriots recorded their team-record third safety of the 2016 season when DL Malcom Brown registered a tackle in the end zone vs. Baltimore on Dec. 12.

BLOCK PART'

LB Shea McClellin blocked a first quarter field goal attempt vs. Baltimore on Dec. 12, 2016 for the Patriots third blocked kick of the 2016 season. McClellin blocked an extra point attempt vs. Seattle on Nov. 13 and DL Alan Branch blocked a field goal at the New York Jets on Nov. 27. The block was the first miss of the 2016 season by Baltimore K Justin Tucker. The Patriots three blocked kicks are the most blocked kicks New England has recorded since 2014 when the team recorded five on the year [4 field goals and 1 punt]. The Patriots' record for most kicks blocked in a season sits at six in 1975 (2 extra points, 3 field goals and 1 punt), while they have tallied five in season on two occasions (2014 and 1973) and four in a season four times (1974, 1977, 1986 20021

DEFENSE NETS THIRD SAFET

The Patriots set a new franchise mark with three safeties in 2016. The defense registered safeties sin back-to-back games – at Cleveland (10/9) when QB Cody Kessler fumbled out of the end zone and when LB Dont'a Hightower registered one in the win vs. Cincinnati (10/16) when he sacked QB Andy Dalton in the end zone. DL Malcom Brown then registered the third safety when he dropped Baltimore RB Kenneth Dixon in the end zone on Dec. 12, 2016. The Patriots had two safeties in a season six previous times (1963, 1965, 1967, 1969, 1978 and 1985). The NFL record for most safeties in a season is four by many teams.

BY THE NUMBERS

WR Brandin Cooks caught two 40-yard [44 and 42] vs. Houston (9/24/17)to become the first Patriots player to do so since WR Chris Hogan caught two 40-yard passes (63 and 43) at Cleveland (10/9/16).

James White finished third in the NFL among running backs with 60 receptions and 551 yards in 2016.

Stephen Gostkowski executed a successful onside kick vs. Washington [11/08/15] and vs. Philadelphia (12/06/15). It was his third (Cleveland - 12/08/13) and the fourth in team history. The first came when Jim Lee Hunt recovered a Gino Cappelletti kick at the end of the first half in a 26-10 win vs. the NY Jets (9/27/64).

The 2017 Patriots have four rookie free agents on the team - DL Adam Butler, OL Cole Croston, TE Jacob Hollister and LB Harvey Langi. It is the third-most rookie free agents in the Bill Belichick era. The Patriots had six rookie free agents in 2013 and five in 2000.



Said Bolden about his grandfather, "I remember being six years old, him popping in a highlight film of Super Bowl I and IV. I've seen that tape at least 500 times."

BOLDEN BLOCK PARTY

Brandon Bolden blocked his first NFL punt in the win at San Diego [12/7/14] to give the Patriots a first down at the Chargers 25-yard line. It was the Patriots first blocked punt since Patrick Chung blocked a punt at Miami on Oct. 4, 2010.

RB REX BURKHEAD

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

As a junior at the University of Nebraska, Rex formed a close bond with a 5-year old fan of his, Jack Hoffman, who had been diagnosed with brain cancer. During that 2011 season, Rex wore a wristband with the phrase "Team Jack – Pray" which helped bring pediatric brain cancer into the national spotlight. Burkhead hosted Hoffman for a lunch, provided a personal tour of Memorial Stadium and has since joined the board of directors of the "Team Jack Foundation," which has raised more than \$4 million dollars to fight pediatric brain cancer since 2013. Rex recently hosted a fund raiser this past offseason at his high school alma mater that raised roughly \$45,000. In 2013, Jack Hoffman's touchdown run during Nebraska's spring football scrimmage went viral and earned him an ESPY award.

OL MARCUS CANNON

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

On April 20, 2011, just days before Texas Christian offensive line prospect Marcus Cannon was to enter the NFL Draft, he was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, a treatable form of cancer found in lymph tissue. A little more than one week later, the Patriots selected Cannon in the fifth round [138th overall] of the draft with the knowledge of his illness. The Patriots placed Cannon on the Reserve/Non Football Injury list to start the 2011 season while he received treatment and recovered. Cannon was activated to the 53-man roster later that year and is now in his seventh season with the team. Cannon made a full recovery and was named the Patriots 2011 Ed Block Courage Award winner - an annual award presented to select players in the National Football League who are voted by their teammates as role models of inspiration, sportsmanship and courage.

WR BRANDIN COOKS

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

Brandin Cooks, the youngest of four children, lost his father to a heart attack at the age of six. His mother was forced to pick up a second job at an after school program on top of her regular 3:00 a.m. shift at a local warehouse in order to keep food on the table for the boys. Eager to take some of the burden of raising four boys off his mother, Brandin committed himself to athletics where he excelled at both track and field, as well as football, on his way to earning a scholar-ship to Oregon State University.

OB JIMMY GARAPPOLO

GAROPPOLO MAKES FIRST START

Jimmy Garoppolo became just the fifth quarterback in the last 31 years to make his first regular season start in a season opening night game (Sept. 11, 2016 vs. Cardinals). Aaron Rodgers was the last (2008, win vs. Minnesota), with Philip Rivers (2006), David Carr (2002) and Brian Griese (1999) before him. Garoppolo finished 24-of-33 for 264 yards with one touchdown.

UNCONVENTIONAL JOURNEY

Despite a successful three year lacrosse career at Penn State, Hogan, also a standout football player in high school, said that playing college football was always in the back of his mind. Having redshirted his sophomore year of lacrosse, Hogan had an extra year of athletic eligibility following his fourth academic year at Penn State. As the football itch still lurked in the back of his mind, Chris played his final year of eligibility with the Monmouth football team, and at the end of the season, joined in on some workouts with teammates who were training for the NFL Combine.

"I honestly didn't know if I had what it took to play in the NFL," Hogan wrote in the Tribune. "Still, it was one of those things where I didn't want to look back in five years and be like, 'Man, I wish I would've tried."

Chris did not get invited to compete in that year's Combine, but turned heads during a Pro Day held at Fordham. Later that summer, he signed with the San Francisco 49ers as an undrafted free agent.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to six straight Pro Bowls (2011-16) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the seven straight season in 2017.

The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by The Boston Globe. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts.'

OL JOE THUNEY

An Ohio native, Joe Thuney was told he may not have the size to play offensive line in the Big Ten conference for his hometown Ohio State Buckeyes. Settling on North Carolina State, Thuney went on to become a mainstay on the offensive line while also earning his bachelor's degree in accounting in just three years, added an internal affairs degree and also minored in Spanish.

DL ADAM BUTLER

CAREER DEFINING CONTEST

Adam Butler arrived at Vanderbilt as an accomplished high school offensive lineman and spent his freshman season redshirting as a backup at center and guard. During his first offseason, Butler entered a rib eating contest, which judges ruled his team had lost. Butler disagreed and began arguing with the judges.

Then Commodore defensive coordinator Bob Shoop was in attendance and witnessed Butler's demeanor and was impressed with his competitive attitude. Shoop convinced then head coach James Franklin to ask Butler to transition to defense.

"Coach Franklin brought me into his office and he asked me what I wanted, ans I wanted whatever was best for the team. Because we were so short on defensive linemen at that time, that's how it happened."

CB MALCOLM BUTLER

WHAT'S IN A NAME

During his rookie season in 2014, Malcolm Butler was nicknamed "Strap" by former teammate Jamie Collins, alluding to his ability to so closely cover receivers on the field. In 2015, some teammates started calling him "Scrap" for his scrappy style of play, giving Butler two unique, albeit similar-sounding, nicknames.

BUTLER HAS FIRST TWO-PICK GAME

CB Malcolm Butler had his first career two-interception game in the win vs. NY Jets (12/24/16). It is the first time a Patriots player has had two picks in a game since CB Logan Ryan had two interceptions at Baltimore on Dec. 22, 2013.

Butler had three total takeaways with two interceptions and a fumble recovery in the second quarter vs. the NY Jets (12/24/16). DB NATE EBNER

MAKING THE OLYMPICS



Nate Ebner was selected to the 2016 U.S. Olympic Rugby squad and after he was given an excused leave of absence from his football obligations in Foxboro, suited up for Team USA in Rio de Janeiro last August. The Dublin, Ohio native was introduced to the sport of rugby around the age of six and developed a passion and a talent that stemmed from his father and role model, Jeff Ebner, who played the game at the University of Minnesota. Nate did not play football in high school but was a two-time MVP of the USA Rugby team at the Junior World Cup and a standout on the U19 and U20 national teams.

Although his parents were divorced, Nate and his father remained very close. "We were super tight," Nate told the *Boston Globe.* "I would put my father-son relationship against anyone's. He taught me how to be a man." The two often spent time working together at the family's auto reclamation business, Ebner & Sons in Springfield, Ohio, and would also train in the gym together behind the motto, "Finish Strong," - a message Jeff always preached to his son.

Nate played rugby at Ohio State during his first two years of college, but as an All-American on the school's club team, he decided to walk on to the Buckeyes football team and finish his career with his sights set on reaching the NFL.

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback now with Cleveland was selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft by Tennessee. The two are the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of two active sets of twins playing in the NFL.


BROTHERS TEAM UP FOR A CAUSE

SCORING FLURRY

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014 to turn a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. The Patriots are one of three teams to score three touchdowns in under a minute since the 1970 merger, and are the only team to have achieved the feat twice.

- Rob Gronkowski got the scoring started by hauling in a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive.
- After the Patriots defense forced a quick three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears' first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15yard touchdown and a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at half-

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (9/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 [12/21/96]. The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).





PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 24 times in their 57-year history. Eighteen of those playoff berths have come in the 23 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 19 division crowns, including 14 in the last 16 seasons, and have qualified as a Wild Card team four times (1976, 1985, 1994 and 1998). PATRIOTS CLINCH PLAYOFF SPOT FOR 18th TIME IN KRAFT'S 23 YEARS OF OWNERSHIP

New England has qualified for the playoffs 24 times in its 57-year history. The Patriots have earned 18 of those playoff berths in the 23 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 19 division crowns overall (18 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.



ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENTS

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 16th straight year with a 14-2 record in 2016. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 16 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.

The Patriots are the third team to win more than half of their games in 16 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, joining the 49ers [16 straight from 1983-98] and the Cowboys [16 straight from 1970-85].

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 20 of the 23 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.
