NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (7-2) at OAKLAND RAIDERS (4-5) Sunday, Nov. 19, 2017 • Estadio Azteca (77,500) • 4:25 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots extended their road win streak to 12 straight wins dating back to last season with a 41-16 victory at the Denver Broncos. The 12-game road streak matches the team mark of 12-straight road wins from Dec. 24, 2006 through Oct. 5, 2008. The two 12-game streaks are second in NFL history to the 18-game road win streak by San Francisco (1988-90).



Following the game, the Patriots traveled to Colorado Springs to spend the week practicing at the Air Force Academy prior to their game against the Oakland Raiders in Mexico City.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

<u>TELEVISION</u>: This week's game will be broadcast by **CBS** and can be seen on **WBZ-TV** Channel 4. Jim Nantz will handle play-by-play duties with **Tony Romo** as the color analyst. **Tracy Wolfson** will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Jim Rikhof** and directed by **Mike Arnold**.

<u>RADIO:</u> 98.5 FM, The Sports Hub, is the flagship station for the **Patriots Radio Network**. A complete listing of the network's 40 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

INTERNATIONAL SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots-Raiders game will be the 30th regular season game played outside of the U.S. The first regular season game played outside of the U.S. was in Mexico City in 2005 when the Cardinals hosted the 49ers.

This week's game will be the third regular season game played in Mexico City. In addition, the 49ers-Cardinals game in 2005, the Raiders hosted Houston in Mexico City last season.

The Patriots will play an international game for the third time after playing in London in 2009 and 2012 at Wembley Stadium. The Patriots beat the Tampa Bay Buccaneers 35-7 at Wembley Stadium on Oct. 25, 2009 and then beat the St. Louis Rams, 45-7, on Oct. 28, 2012.

There have been 21 games in London, two in Mexico City and six games in Toronto.

The Patriots have traveled internationally for four preseason games in addition to their 2009 and 2012 regular season games in London:

★ The Patriots lost to Detroit, 22-9, in Montreal in 1969

- ★ The Patriots lost to Pittsburgh, 30-14, in Montreal in 1990
- ★ The Patriots lost to Cleveland, 12-9, in Toronto in 1993
- ★ The Patriots defeated Dallas, 21-3, in Mexico City in 1998

SERIES HISTORY



The Patriots and Raiders will meet for the 35th time overall and for the 32nd time in regular-season play this Sunday when the Patriots meet the Raiders in Mexico City.

This week's game will mark the third international regular season game for the Patriots after playing in 2009 and 2012 in London. In 2009, the Patriots beat Tampa Bay, 35-7 in London and in 2012 the Patriots beat the Rams 45-7 in London.

The Patriots and Raiders last played against each other on Sept. 21, 2014 in a 16-9 New England victory at Gillette Stadium.

The teams have met three times in the playoffs, producing memorable, classic encounters on each occasion. In 1976 the Patriots beat the Raiders 48-17 in the regular season before losing a playoff game at Oakland, 24-21. The Patriots advanced to their first AFC Championship game in 1985 after beating the Raiders, 27-20, in Los Angeles. Then in the first Super Bowl championship year in 2001, the Patriots beat Oakland, 16-13, in overtime in the last game ever played in Foxboro Stadium.

The Patriots lead the all-time series with a 18-15-1 advantage, including a 2-1 postseason record.

The Raiders have had the edge in home games against the Patriots as they own a 10-7 record when the two teams square off on the west coast. The series between the two charter members of the American Football League dates back to 1960, the inaugural season for each club.

Although the teams played frequently prior to the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, they have met just four times in the regular-season since 1989.

PLAYOFF MATCHUPS

The Patriots and Raiders have met three times in the playoffs, with each game producing a memorable result.

2001 Divisional Playoffs Jan. 19, 2002: Patriots 16, Raiders 13 (OT)

In one of the greatest games in NFL history, the Patriots rebounded from a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit to defeat the Raiders in overtime. The game was played in a snowstorm that coated the field with a thick white blanket throughout the game, creating a unique scene that few people who have seen the game will ever forget. It was the final contest at Foxboro Stadium and began a record-tying nine-game playoff winning streak that the Patriots carried into the 2005 season. The Patriots trailed by a 13-3 score heading into the fourth quarter, but Tom Brady's 6-yard touchdown run cut the deficit to 13-10 with 7:52 left in the game. With 1:50 left in the game and the Patriots at their own 42-yard line, instant replay was used to overturn a call that had been incorrectly ruled a fumble by Tom Brady. New England was able to continue its drive down the field and Adam Vinatieri dramatically tied the game with 27 seconds left on a 45-yard field goal through the snow, forcing overtime. New England won the overtime coin toss and marched down the field to set up a 23-yard game-winning boot by Vinatieri to earn a berth in the AFC Championship Game.

1985 Divisional Playoffs Jan. 5, 1986: Patriots 27, Raiders 20

The Patriots rallied from a halftime deficit to upset the top-seeded Raiders in Los Angeles, continuing their run to Super Bowl XX. New England forced six L.A. turnovers and converted those opportunities into 20 points. New England scored first following a recovery of a muffed punt, but the Raiders rattled off 17 unanswered points to take a 17-7 lead midway through the second quarter. A Ronnie Lippett interception helped the Patriots tie the game at 17, but L.A. took a 20-17 lead into the intermission. In the third quarter, the Patriots tied the game on a field goal after Fred Marion recovered a Marcus Allen fumble. On the kickoff following the tying field goal, New England's Mosi Tatupu forced the Raiders' Sam Seale to fumble and the ball rolled into the end zone, where New England's Jim Bowman recovered for a touchdown and a 27-20 Patriots lead. The New England defense stopped all three of L.A.'s fourth-quarter drives to clinch the win and a trip to Miami for the first AFC Championship Game in franchise history.

1976 Divisional Playoffs Dec. 18, 1976: Raiders 24, Patriots 21

The Raiders, en route to a 16-1 season and the Super Bowl XI championship, came back from a 21-10 fourth-guarter deficit in Oakland to defeat what many observers feel was one of the most talented teams in Patriots history. The Patriots controlled much of the first half, but an interception of a Russ Francis pass on an end around stalled the Patriots' momentum as the Raiders scored a touchdown in the final minute of the half to take a 10-7 lead into intermission. New England scored touchdowns on both of its third-quarter possessions, taking a 21-10 lead. Oakland scored early in the final quarter to cut New England's lead to 21-17 and the score stayed that way into the final minute. With Oakland facing a third-and-18 at the Patriots' 27-yard line, Ken Stabler's pass fell incomplete to seemingly put New England in position to win the game with one more stop on fourth-and-long. But Patriots nose tackle Ray Hamilton was called for a controversial roughing the passer penalty, giving the Raiders a first down at the Patriots' 13-yard line. Five plays later, Stabler ran into the end zone on a 1-yard run with 10 seconds left to clinch a 24-21 Oakland victory and advance to the AFC Championship Game.

The New England Patriots needed a last minute defensive play to secure a 16-9 victory over the Oakland Raiders in the 2014 home-opener to improve to a 12-1 record in home openers at Gillette Stadium.

Defensive lineman Vince Wilfork intercepted a QB Derek Carr pass at the New England 10-yard line with 51 seconds to play to secure the win. The Raiders drove to the Patriots 6-yard line and had a game-tying touchdown run by RB Darren McFadden called back due to a holding penalty. On the next play, Wilfork recorded his third career interception and his second against the Raiders. DB Logan Ryan jarred the ball loose from the intended receiver WR Denarius Moore, allowing Wilfork to make the pick.

The Patriots reached the red zone four times in the game, but were held to just one touchdown. New England was held to field goals on two drives that ended at the Oakland 2-yard line. The Patriots defense held Oakland out of the end zone, limiting them to just three field goals.

Brady, who finished the game 24-of-37 for 234 yards with one touchdown, earned his 150th career win to become just the third NFL quarterback with at least 150 career wins, joining Brett Favre and Peyton Manning.

WR Julian Edelman led the team with 10 receptions for 84 yards, registering his fourth 10-reception game. He also extended his streak to nine games with at least six catches.

After Oakland took a 3-0 lead in the first quarter on a 49-yard field goal by K Sebastian Janikowski, New England scored 10 points in the last 4:14 of the second quarter to take a 10-3 halftime lead. QB Tom Brady engineered a 15-play, 84-yard drive that ended when he completed a 6-yard touchdown pass to TE Rob Gronkowski to take a 7-3 lead. After stopping the Raiders on three straight plays, the Patriots took advantage of a 22-yard punt and began a drive at the 50-yard line with 2:45 to play in the first half. A 16-yard pass from Brady to Gronkowski helped the Patriots on a drive that was stalled at the 2-yard line to set up a 21-yard field goal by K Stephen Gostkowski on the last play before the intermission.

Oakland scored field goals on their first two drives in the third quarter to close the gap to 10-9 heading into the final quarter.

Brady completed a 20-yard pass to TE Tim Wright and a 16-yard pass to WR Kenbrell Thompkins on a drive that ended with a field goal after failing to score a touchdown on a first-and-goal from the Raiders 2-yard line. The Patriots scored on their next drive with a 36-yard field goal for a 16-9 lead to close out the scoring.

The New England Patriots extended their road streak to 12 straight wins -including eight last season and four in 2017 - to improve to a 7-2 record after a 41-16 win against the Denver Broncos at Sports Authority Field at Mile High. The 12-game road streak matches the team record of 12 road wins from Dec. 24, 2006 through Oct. 5, 2008. The 12-game streaks are second in NFL history to the 18 road wins from the San Francisco 49ers (1988-90)

QB Tom Brady threw three touchdowns and also won his 86th game on the road to break a tie with Peyton Manning for the most road wins by a starting quarterback.

The Patriots special teams units were the difference maker in the game. The Patriots recovered a muffed punt, returned a kickoff for a touchdown, blocked a punt and also caught the Broncos with 12 men on the field during a punt that resulted in a fresh set of downs. The special teams misfires resulted in 24 points by the Patriots.

New England went up 27-9 at halftime and cruised in the second half to claim the victory. The Patriots scored on seven straight drives after the first series.

The Patriots went three-and-out to start the game but Denver rookie WR Isaiah McKenzie muffed a punt that was recovered by Patriots TE Jacob Hollister at the Denver 24-yard line. Two plays later, Brady connected with RB Rex Burkhead for a 14-yard touchdown pass and a 7-0 lead.

Denver responded with a field goal drive, but RB Dion Lewis took the ensuing kick and returned it 103 yards for a 14-3 New England lead.

In the second quarter with the Patriots in front, 17-6, Burkhead blocked a Denver field goal that allowed a drive to start at the 30-yard line and a New England field goal for a 20-3 lead.

Following another Denver field goal that made it 20-9, New England got the ball back with 2:36 left to play and moved 75 yards before Brady hit TE Dwayne Allen for an 11-yard touchdown with 25 seconds to play in the first half to extend the lead to 27-9.

Denver opened the third quarter and went 75-yards in 13 plays before QB Brock Osweiler completed a 7-yard touchdown pass to WR Demaryius Thomas to make it 27-16. New England scored a touchdown in the third quarter on an eight-yard run by Lewis and Brady completed a six-yard touchdown pass to RB James White in the fourth quarter to make it 41-16. The Patriots defense held its opponent under 20 points for the fifth straight

game and held Denver to only one touchdown in four red zone drives.



ROAD SUCCESS

The Patriots extended their road streak to 12 straight wins, including eight last year and the first four road games of the 2017 season. The 12-game road streak matches the team mark of 12 straight road wins from Dec. 24, 2006, through Oct. 5, 2008. The 12-game streaks are second in NFL history to the 18-road game win streak by the San Francisco 49ers (1988-90).

The Patriots have now won two straight games in Denver after a 16-3 win on Dec. 18, 2016, and the win 41-16 tonight. It is the first time the Patriots have had consecutive wins at Denver since winning three games (1964, 1965 and 1966).

The Patriots and Broncos met for the seventh straight regular season, tying the Titans-Steelers (seven straight from 2008-14) for the third longest streak of any non-divisional opponents since division realignment in 2002. *Belichick has an NFL-best five Super Bowl championships as a head coach. If he wins one more championship he will join George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only NFL coaches with six championships since the league began postseason play in 1933.

*Brady is tied with Peyton Manning, Drew Brees and Aaron Rodgers with four seasons with 35 or more touchdowns. He needs to reach 35 touchdowns in 2017 for his fifth season with 35 or more touchdowns, for the most in NFL history.

*Brady has passed for 4,000 yards eight times in his career and if he reaches 4,000 yards in 2017, he will be the third player to reach nine seasons with 4,000 yards, joining Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (11).

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 24th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to pring a championship to New Enbring a championship to New En-gland, a tall order considering the

team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patri-ots have won more division titles (16), conference crowns (8) and Su-per Bowl championships (5) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (20) and are tied for fewest losing seasons (2) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LI was the eighth Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 23 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 18 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. In 2016, Kraft earned his 20th winning season in 23 years of owning the franchise.

SAFETY DANCE

DB Brandon King tackled Chargers PR Travis Benjamin in the end zone on a punt return for a safety in the second quarter vs. LA Chargers on Oct. 29, 2017. The Patriots recorded the NFL's first safety on a punt return since the New Orleans Saints recorded a safety on a punt at Tennessee on Sept. 21, 2003.

It was the Patriots first special teams safety since Dec. 9, 1979, when the Jets fumbled a snap on a punt out of the end zone. It marked the second time in team history that they recorded a safety on a punt return. On Oct. 31, 1965 at the San Diego Chargers DB Jay Cunningham tackled a Chargers player in the end zone following a punt.

DEFENSE NETS THIRD SAFETY

The Patriots set a new franchise mark with three safeties in 2016. The defense registered safeties in back-to-back games – at Cleveland (10/9) when QB Cody Kessler fumbled out of the end zone and when LB Dont'a Hightower registered one in the win vs. Cincinnati (10/16) when he sacked QB Andy Dalton in the end zone. DL Malcom Brown then registered the third safety when he dropped Baltimore RB Kenneth Dixon in the end zone on Dec. 12, 2016. The Patriots had two safeties in a season six previous times (1963, 1965, 1967, 1969, 1978 and 1985). The NFL record for most safeties in a season is four by many teams.

*Bill Belichick reached his seventh Super Bowl in 2016 to move past Don Shula (6) for the most conference titles as a head coach.

*Belichick has five Super Bowl wins as a head coach to move past Pittsburgh's Chuck Noll for the most Super Bowl wins by a head coach in Super Bowl history.

*Belichick won his 14th division title to move past Tom Landry and Don Shula (13) to set the record for most among all head coaches.

*Bill Belichick now has 244 regular seasons wins. He is behind Don Shula (328), George Halas (318) and Tom Landry (250).

*Belichick set the postseason mark with his six straight season of playoff advancement (2011-2016). Belichick (2003-07), John Harbaugh (2008-12), Mike Holmgren (1993-97), John Madden (1973-77) and Andy Reid (2000-04) won a playoff game in five consecutive seasons.

TOM BRADY

*Tom Brady has 215 wins overall (190 in the regular season and 25 in the postseason) and passed Peyton Manning (200: 186 in the regular season and 14 in the postseason) to become the all-time leader for most wins by an NFL quarterback.

C DAVID ANDREWS

FOOTBALL FAMILY

David Andrews is the nephew of long-time NFL head coach and player $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Dan}}$ Reeves.

Andrews said the bond between the two is still strong and he still seeks Reeves' advice.

"Not many people in my family know what it's like to play in the NFL," he told the *Boston Globe.* "So he's kind of the only one I can bounce things off or someone who might understand what it's like, so it's definitely cool."

Bolden's grandfather, Frank Pitts, played 10 years in the NFL (1965-74) as a receiver for Kansas City, Cleveland and Oakland. He was with Kansas City for two Super Bowls, losing Super Bowl I and winning Super Bowl IV. Said Bolden about his grandfather, "I remember being six years old, him popping in a highlight film of Super Bowl I and IV. I've seen that tape at least 500 times."

BOLDEN BLOCK PARTY

Brandon Bolden blocked his first NFL punt in the win at San Diego (12/7/14) to give the Patriots a first down at the Chargers 25-yard line.

RB REX BURKHEAD

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

As a junior at the University of Nebraska, Rex formed a close bond with a 5-year old fan of his, Jack Hoffman, who had been diagnosed with brain cancer. During that 2011 season, Rex wore a wristband with the phrase "Team Jack – Pray" which helped bring pediatric brain cancer into the national spotlight. Burkhead hosted Hoffman for a lunch, provided a personal tour of Memorial Stadium and has since joined the board of directors of the "Team Jack Foundation," which has raised more than \$4 million dollars to fight pediatric brain cancer since 2013. Rex recently hosted a fund raiser this past offseason at his high school alma mater that raised roughly \$45,000. In 2013, Jack Hoffman's touchdown run during Nebraska's spring football scrimmage went viral and earned him an ESPY award.

OL MARCUS CANNON

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

On April 20, 2011, just days before Texas Christian offensive line prospect Marcus Cannon was to enter the NFL Draft, he was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, a treatable form of cancer found in lymph tissue. A little more than one week later, the Patriots selected Cannon in the fifth round (138th overall) of the draft with the knowledge of his illness. The Patriots placed Cannon on the Reserve/Non Football Injury list to start the 2011 season while he received treatment and recovered. Cannon was activated to the 53-man roster later that year and is now in his seventh season with the team. Cannon made a full recovery and was named the Patriots 2011 Ed Block Courage Award winner - an annual award presented to select players in the National Football League who are voted by their teammates as role models of inspiration, sportsmanship and courage.

WR BRANDIN COOKS

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

Brandin Cooks, the youngest of four children, lost his father to a heart attack at the age of six. His mother was forced to pick up a second job at an after school program on top of her regular 3:00 a.m. shift at a local warehouse in order to keep food on the table for the boys. Eager to take some of the burden of raising four boys off his mother, Brandin committed himself to athletics where he excelled at both track and field, as well as football, on his way to earning a scholar-ship to Oregon State University.

UNCONVENTIONAL JOURNEY

Despite a successful three year lacrosse career at Penn State, Hogan, also a standout football player in high school, said that playing college football was always in the back of his mind. Having redshirted his sophomore year of lacrosse, Hogan had an extra year of athletic eligibility following his fourth academic year at Penn State. As the football itch still lurked in the back of his mind, Chris played his final year of eligibility with the Monmouth football team, and at the end of the season, joined in on some workouts with teammates who were training for the NFL Combine.

"I honestly didn't know if I had what it took to play in the NFL," Hogan wrote in the Tribune. "Still, it was one of those things where I didn't want to look back in five years and be like, 'Man, I wish I would've tried."

Chris did not get invited to compete in that year's Combine, but turned heads during a Pro Day held at Fordham. Later that summer, he signed with the San Francisco 49ers as an undrafted free agent.

G TED KARRAS

SCHOOL'S NOT OUT

Although he already owns a bachelor's degree in communications and a master's degree in recreation, sport and tourism from his time at University of Illinois, Ted Karras hasn't completely given up his notebook for an NFL playbook. Along with teammate Joe Thuney, Karras is pursuing his MBA from Indiana University thanks to an NFLPA program that provides tuition assitance for players while navigating a busy NFL schedule.

"It just seems to be that everyone keeps wanting to pay for my school, so I'm not going to turn it down," Karras told the Boston Globe.

Karras and Thuney began their MBA pursuit two weeks after the Patriots Super Bowl LI victory by taking online classes and Skyping with professors from Indiana University's Kelley School of Business up until training camp.

By his senior year, Mitchell had authored his own children's book, "The Magician's Hat," and through his Read With Malcolm initiative has toured schools both nationally and locally here in New England to promote the benefits of reading at an early age.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to six straight Pro Bowls (2011-16) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the seventh straight season in 2017.

The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by The Boston Globe. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts.'

OL JOE THUNEY

THUNEY DOES HAVE THE SIZE

An Ohio native, Joe Thuney was told he may not have the size to play offensive line in the Big Ten conference for his hometown Ohio State Buckeyes. Settling on North Carolina State, Thuney went on to become a mainstay on the offensive line while also earning his bachelor's degree in accounting in just three years, added an internal affairs degree and also minored in Spanish.

BACK TO SCHOOL

Along with teammate Ted Karras, Joe Thuney has taken advantage of an NFLPA program that assists its players in earning college degrees. After earning his degree in accounting while also studying international studies at N.C. State, Thuney is now pursuing his MBA through Indiana University's Kelley School of Business.

DL ADAM BUTLER

CAREER DEFINING CONTEST

Adam Butler arrived at Vanderbilt as an accomplished high school offensive lineman and spent his freshman season redshirting as a backup at center and guard. During his first offseason, Butler entered a rib eating contest, which judges ruled his team had lost. Butler disagreed and began arguing with the judges.

Then Commodore defensive coordinator Bob Shoop was in attendance and witnessed Butler's demeanor and was impressed with his competitive attitude. Shoop convinced then head coach James Franklin to ask Butler to transition to defense.

"Coach Franklin brought me into his office and he asked me what I wanted, and I wanted whatever was best for the team. Because we were so short on defensive linemen at that time, that's how it happened."

WHAT'S IN A NAME

During his rookie season in 2014, Malcolm Butler was nicknamed "Strap" by former teammate Jamie Collins, alluding to his ability to so closely cover receivers on the field. In 2015, some teammates started calling him "Scrap" for his scrappy style of play, giving Butler two unique, albeit similar-sounding, nicknames.

BUTLER HAS FIRST TWO-PICK GAME

CB Malcolm Butler had his first career two-interception game in the win vs. NY Jets (12/24/16). It is the first time a Patriots player has had two picks in a game since CB Logan Ryan had two interceptions at Baltimore on Dec. 22, 2013.

THE BUTLER DID IT - THREE TIMES

Butler had three total takeaways with two interceptions and a fumble recovery in the second quarter vs. the NY Jets (12/24/16). It is the first time that a Patriots player has had three takeaways in the same game since Steve Gregory had two fumble recoveries and an interception at N.Y. Jets (11/22/12).

DB NATE EBNER

MAKING THE OLYMPICS



Nate Ebner was selected to the 2016 U.S. Olympic Rugby squad and after he was given an excused leave of absence from his football obligations in Foxboro, suited up for Team USA in Rio de Janeiro last August. The Dublin, Ohio native was introduced to the sport of rugby around the age of six and developed a passion and a talent that stemmed from his father and role model, Jeff Ebner, who played the game at the University of Minnesota. Nate did not play football in high school but was a two-time MVP of the USA Rugby team at the Junior World Cup and a standout on the U19 and U20 national teams.

Although his parents were divorced, Nate and his father remained very close. "We were super tight," Nate told the *Boston Globe*. "I would put my father-son relationship against anyone's. He taught me how to be a man." The two often spent time working together at the family's auto reclamation business, Ebner & Sons in Springfield, Ohio, and would also train in the gym together behind the motto, "Finish Strong," - a message Jeff always preached to his son.

Nate played rugby at Ohio State during his first two years of college, but as an All-American on the school's club team, he decided to walk on to the Buckeyes football team and finish his career with his sights set on reaching the NFL.



SCORING FLURRY

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014 to turn a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. The Patriots are one of three teams to score three touchdowns in under a minute since the 1970 merger, and are the only team to have achieved the feat twice.

★ After the Patriots defense forced a quick three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.

 \star On the Bears' first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown and a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at half-time.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (9/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 24 times in their 57-year history. Eighteen of those playoff berths have come in the 23 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 19 division crowns, including 14 in the last 16 seasons, and have qualified as a Wild Card team four times (1976, 1985, 1994 and 1998). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 during the strike season.

New England has qualified for the playoffs 24 times in its 57-year history. The Patriots have earned 18 of those playoff berths in the 23 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 19 division crowns overall (18 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16team tournament following a players' strike.



ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENTS
