NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (2-1) vs. NEW YORK GIANTS (1-2) Thursday, Sept. 3, 2015 • Gillette Stadium (66,829) • 7:30 p.m. ET

After two weeks on the road, the New England Patriots return to the confines of Gillette Stadium to close out the 2015 preseason against the New York Giants. The Patriots and Giants will meet in the preseason finale for the 11th conseuctive season.

The clubs have been frequent preseason opponents recently, squaring off in the preseason openers for three straight years from 2001-03 and resuming the series in 2005 when they started to meet in the preseason finale.

The Patriots have faced the Giants more than any other team in the preseason with 24 matchups. Philadelphia is second with 22 preseason games.

The teams played three times during the 2007 and 2011 seasons, with meetings in the preseason, the regular season and in the Super Bowl. The Patriots and Giants are guarantees to face each other two times this year, with the preseason game this week and in the regular season on Nov. 15 in a matchup at MetLife Stadium.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by the Patriots Preseason Television Network and can be seen in every New England state, as well as Alaska and Hawaii. The preseason network's flagship station is WBZ-TV CBS in Boston. WBZ-TV's Dan Roche provides play-by-play and is joined by former Patriots tight end Christian Fauria in the broadcast booth. Former Patriots linebacker Matt Chatham will provide sideline analysis along with WBZ-TV's Steve Burton. Patriots Football Weekly's beat writers Paul Perillo and Andy Hart will also provide insight and analysis.

PATRIOTS 2014 SEASON WAS ONE FOR THE AGES

The Super Bowl XLIX win was the fourth Super Bowl win since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a total that is the most in the league over that span. The eighth Super Bowl appearance in 2014 tied Dallas and Pittsburgh for the most Super Bowl berths. Additionally, it was the seventh Super Bowl under the Kraft ownership, setting a new NFL record for most conference championships as an owner

The 28-24 Super Bowl victory over the Seattle Seahawks was the fourth Super Bowl title in franchise history. The Patriots joined Pittsburgh (6), Dallas (5) San Francisco (5), Green Bay (4) and the New York Giants (4) as the only teams with at least four Super Bowl wins.

PATRIOTS vs. Giants

SERIES HISTORY



The New England Patriots and the New York Giants will meet for the 25th time in the preseason and for the 11th straight year in the preseason finale.

The clubs have been frequent preseason opponents recently, squaring off in the preseason openers for three straight years from 2001-03 and resuming the series in 2005 when they met in the preseason finale.

The Patriots have faced the Giants more than any other team in the preseason with 24 matchups. Philadelphia is second with 22 preseason games.

The teams played three times during the 2007 and 2011 seasons, with meetings in the preseason, the regular season and in the Super Bowl. The Patriots and Giants are guaranteed to face each other twice this year, with the preseason game this week and in the regular season on Nov. 15 in a matchup at MetLife Stadium.

Overall, the Giants hold a 15-9 advantage in the preseason series. The Patriots claim a 5-4 edge in regular-season play.

The New England Patriots concluded the 2014 preseason against the New York Giants for the 10th straight season, dropping a 16-13 decision to finish with a 2-2 record.

With the score tied at 13 and the Patriots facing a fourth-and-one situation from their own 39-yard line with 2:52 to play, head coach Bill Belichick elected to go for the first down. The Patriots failed to convert and the Giants were able to move to the New England 19-yard line where they kicked a 37-yard field goal with 43 seconds to play to seal the victory.

Most of the Patriots regulars did not play in the game with just two regulars – S Duron Harmon and G Josh Kline – in the starting lineup. Rookie QB Jimmy Garoppolo got the start and played the entire game, finishing 22-of-42 for 284 yards with one touchdown and one interception.

The Giants got on the board first after a first-quarter interception of Garoppolo allowed the Giants to start a drive at midfield. The turnover helped set up a 24-yard field goal early in the second quarter for a 3-0 Giants lead. Garoppolo responded on the next series with an 8-play, 82-yard drive that ended when he connected with WR Aaron Dobson on a 33-yard touchdown pass for a 7-3 New England lead.

New York answered with a 14-play, 80-yard drive that ended with a 1-yard touchdown run by RB Peyton Hillis on a fourth-and-one from the 1-yard line to take a 10-7 lead.

New England got the ball back with 3:31 to play in the second quarter and marched 61 yards on 10 plays before K Stephen Gostkowski drilled a 37-yard field goal to make it 10-10 at halftime.

The Patriots had a first-and-goal situation in the third quarter after driving to the New York 3-yard line, but the drive stalled and the Patriots were forced to settle for a field goal and a 13-10 lead heading into the fourth quarter.

The Giants tied the game on their first drive in the fourth quarter when QB Curtis Painter entered the game and engineered an 8-play, 42-yard drive that resulted in a 45-yard field goal to make it 13-13.

NEW ENGLAND TIES

In the decades leading up to the founding of the American Football League in 1960, many football fans in New England followed the Giants, a franchise founded in 1925. New England-based NFL outfits such as the Providence Steam Roller (1925-31), the Boston Redskins (1932-36) and the Boston Yanks (1944-48) folded or moved away, leaving the Giants as the closest NFL team to New England until the Patriots franchise inaugurated play in the 1960 season.

MEMORABLE MATCHUPS

Aug. 15, 1971 — The Patriots defeated the Giants 20-14 in the opening preseason game at Foxboro Stadium.

Dec. 21, 1996 — The Patriots rallied from a 22-3 fourth-quarter deficit to clinch a first-round playoff bye with a 23-22 win at Giants Stadium.

Aug. 10, 2001 — New England began its first Super Bowl championship season with a 14-0 preseason shutout of the defending NFC champion Giants.

Dec. 29, 2007 — The Patriots defeat the Giants by a thrilling, 38-35, score to cap off the first 16-0 regular season in NFL history.

Feb. 3, 2008 — The Patriots faced the Giants in Super Bowl XLII in Glendale, Ariz. The Giants 17-14 win snapped the Patriots perfect season.

Feb. 5, 2012 — The Patriots faced the Giants in Super Bowl XLVI in Indianapolis, Ind. The Giants took a 21-17 lead when they scored with 57 seconds left in the game and held the Patriots on a final drive to secure the win.

For the second straight week, K Stephen Gostkowski drilled a game-winning field goal to lift the Patriots to victory. Gostkowski connected on a 53-yard field goal with 6:14 to play to give the Patriots a 17-16 victory. In the previous game, Gostkowski kicked a 35-yard field goal with 14 seconds to play to give the Patriots a 26-24 win at New Orleans.

After a slow start that saw QB Tom Brady throw two interceptions and the Patriots fall behind, 6-0, a perfectly executed two-minute drill gave the Patriots a 7-6 halftime lead. The Patriots started at their own 20-yard line with 2:13 left to play in the first half. A 25-yard pass to WR Danny Amendola got the Patriots to the 18-yard line, where Brady completed an 18-yard touchdown pass to TE Scott Chandler. Chandler was playing in his first game as a Patriots player after missing the first two preseason games. Brady played the entire first half and finished 7-of-13 for 84 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions.

Carolina scored 10 points on its first two series in the third quarter to take a 16-7 lead. Jimmy Garoppolo entered the game in place of Brady in the second half and led just two drives in the third quarter. In between the Carolina scores, Garoppolo led the Patriots on an 11-play, 52-yard drive that ended on a failed fourth down attempt from the Carolina 35-yard line.

Garoppolo managed to get production during the first series of the fourth quarter when a 40-yard pass to WR Aaron Dobson put the Patriots at the Carolina 9-yard line. On the next play, Garoppolo completed a 9-yard touchdown pass to RB Dion Lewis to close to within 16-14.

The Patriots defense held Carolina on the next series, and the Patriots responded by moving to the Carolina 35-yard line, where Gostkowski hit on his 53-yad field goal for a 17-16 lead with 6:14 to play. The Patriots got the ball back with 3:15 to play and managed to run out the clock to secure the win.

WAYNE MAKES DEBUT

WR Reggie Wayne, who was signed by the Patriots on Aug. 25, made his debut in a Patriots uniform.

CHANDLER MAKES MOST OF HIS DEBUT

TE Scott Chandler made his Patriots debut after missing the first two preseason games. He caught an 18-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 56 seconds to play in the first half to culminate a 7-play, 80-yard drive that gave the Patriots a 7-6 halftime lead.

MAYO 2015 DEBUT

LB Jerod Mayo made his return to action after missing the first two games of the season. Mayo was limited to six games in 2014 due to injury. Mayo started the game at linebacker.

DOBSON 2015 DEBUT

WR Aaron Dobson made his preseason debut after missing the first two preseason games. Dobson caught a 40-yard pass from Jimmy Garoppolo in the fourth quarter that helped get in position for a touchdown.

BOLDEN 2015 DEBUT

RB Brandon Bolden played for the first time in the 2015 preseason. He dressed, but did not play in the first two preseason games.

LEWIS SHOWS UP AGAIN

RB Dion Lewis was utilized as a kick returner. He has returned 33 kicks for 702 yards during his NFL career. Lewis also caught a 9-yard touchdown pass from QB Jimmy Garoppolo in the fourth quarter.

FLOWERS RETURNS

2015 fourth-round pick DL Trey Flowers returned to action after missing the game at New Orleans.

BRADY PLAYS ENTIRE FIRST HALF

Tom Brady started the game and played the entire first half. He completed 7-of-13 passes for 84 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions. He executed a perfect two-minute drill on a 7-play, 80-yard drive that ended with an 18-yard touchdown pass to TE Scott Chandler. Brady also had two rushing attempts for 18 yards.

ANOTHER GOST. GAME-WINNER

Stephen Gostkowski kicked a 53-yard field goal with 6:21 left to play to give the Patriots a 17-16 lead. It was the second straight game that he kicked the game-winning field goal. He kicked a 35-yard game-winning field goal with 19 seconds to lift the Patriots to a 26-24 win at New Orleans. Gostkowski has kicked six game-winning field goals in his career, including one in the postseason.

ANOTHER GOST. 50-YARDER

Stephen Gostkowski drilled a 53-yard field goal in the fourth quarter to give the Patriots a 17-16 fourth quarter lead with 6:14 left to play. It was his second field goal of 50 or more yards in the 2015 preseason. He had a 56-yard field goal vs. Green Bay (8/13).

MORRIS LEADING TACKLER AGAIN

LB James Morris led the team in tackles with seven total tackles. It was the second straight week that he led the team in tackles. He led with five tackles at New Orleans.

STARTING BLOCKS

★ Three members of the 2015 draft class were in the starting lineup for the third straight week with first-round draft pick DL Malcom Brown and fourth-round draft picks OL Tre' Jackson and OL Shaq Mason. Jackson started at right guard, while Mason started at left guard.

★ Rookie free agent OL David Andrews made his third straight start at center

★ First-year WR Jonathan Krause was in the starting lineup at wide receiver.

*The Patriots can match the Oakland Raiders (1973-1977) as only the second team in NFL history to advance to five straight AFC Championship games.

*The Patriots will look to become the ninth team to repeat as Super Bowl Champions and the first team to do so since New England won back-to-back Super Bowls in 2003 and 2004. The Patriots will try to match Pittsburgh as the only other NFL team with back-to-back Super Bowl wins two separate times.

*The Patriots have won six straight division titles (2009-14) and can match the Los Angeles Rams (1973-79) for the most consecutive division titles in NFL history if they win the AFC East in 2015.

BILL BELICHICK

*Bill Belichick (6) needs to reach one more Super Bowl as a head coach to break a tie with Don Shula (6) for the most conference titles.

*Belichick has four Super Bowl wins as a head coach to match Pittsburgh's Chuck Noll for the most wins. With one more Super Bowl win, Belichick will have the most wins by a head coach in Super Bowl history.

*Belichick (14 straight) needs to lead the Patriots to one more winning season to break a tie with Curly Lambeau (14) for the second most consecutive winning seasons all-time to the 20 by Tom Landry.

*Belichick is one of five head coaches to win six consecutive division titles (2009-14) - Paul Brown (1950-55), Tom Landry (1966-71), Bud Grant (1973-78) and Chuck Noll (1974-79) - and needs one more division title in 2015 to have seven, the most consecutive division titles among all head coaches.

*Belichick has 12 division titles as a head coach and needs one more to tie Tom Landry and Don Shula for 13, the most division titles among all head coaches.

TOM BRADY

* Tom Brady has 160 career regular-season wins with the Patriots, tied with Brett Favre (Green Bay) for the most wins by a quarterback with one team, and needs one more win for the most wins by a quarterback with one team.

*Brady enters the 2015 season in fifth place for most career touchdowns passes with 392 and needs eight touchdown passes to become the fourth NFL player to ever reach 400 career touchdown passes.

*If Brady reaches 30 or more touchdowns passes in 2015, he will become just the fourth player in NFL history with at least 30 or more touchdown passes in six seasons.

TOM BRADY (CONT.)

*If Brady reaches 4,000 passing yards in 2015, he will be just the third player in NFL history with at least eight 4,000-yard passing seasons.

*Brady has played in 209 career games with the Patriots and needs to play four more games to pass Bruce Armstrong (212) for most games played in Patriots history. He has started in 207 games and needs to start in six more to move past Armstrong (212) for most starts in Patriots history.

*The 2015 season will be Brady's 16th season with the Patriots, matching Steve Grogan (1975-90) for the most seasons with the team.

STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI

*Stephen Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in each of the last three seasons (2012-14). He can become just the third NFL player to lead the NFL in scoring in at least four consecutive seasons, joining Don Hutson (1940-44) and Gino Cappelletti (1963-66).

*If Stephen Gostkowski leads the NFL in scoring in 2015, he will join Don Hutson (5) and Gino Cappelletti (5) as the only NFL players to lead the NFL in scoring in five seasons. Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in 2008, 2012, 2013 and 2014.

*Gostkowski has 243 career field goals and needs 21 field goals in 2015 to move past Adam Vinatieri (263) for the most field goals in team history.

*Gostkowski is second in NFL history with 411 consecutive extra points and needs 12 more to move past Matt Stover (422) for the all-time lead.

ROB GRONKOWSKI

*Rob Gronkowski has 55 overall touchdowns and needs 14 touchdowns to move past Stanley Morgan (68) to become the all-time leader in touchdowns scored for the Patriots.

* Gronkowski (54) needs 14 receiving touchdowns to move past Stanley Morgan (67) to become the all-time leader in receiving touchdowns for the Patriots.

*Gronkowski (4,379) needs 621 receiving yards in 2015 to become the seventh New England Patriots player to reach 5,000 career receiving yards.

*Julian Edelman (266) needs 26 receptions in 2015 to move into the top 10 in team history.

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 22nd season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft

announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles [14], conference crowns [7] and Super Bowl championships [4] than any other NFL team. Super Bowl XLIX was the seventh Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 21 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 16 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

In the early 1990's, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season tickets are capped and more than 50,000 fans are on a season ticket waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 229 consecutive home games, including playoff and preseason games (dating back to the 1994 season opener).

The Patriots rushed for 200 yards in a game two times in 2014 with 220 yards in the win vs. Cincinnati on Oct. 5 and 246 yards in the win at Indianapolis on Nov. 16. The Patriots are 65-7 all-time when rushing for 200 yards or more and are 12-0 under Bill Belichick when rushing for 200 yards or more.

SEASON-HIGH OUTPUT

The Patriots scored a season-high 51 points vs. Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014. It is the seventh time the Patriots have scored at least 50 points in the last eight seasons (2007-14). In that span, no other team has more than three games with 50 points.

THE NUMBERS 2

Stephen Gostkowski executed a successful onside kick in a victory vs. Cleveland (12/8/13) for only the second time in team history. The first came when Jim Lee Hunt recovered a Gino Cappelletti kick at the end of the first half in a 26-10 win vs. the NY Jets (9/27/64).

Jonas Gray is the third player in NFL history to have at least 37 carries, 200 yards rushing and four rushing touchdowns in a single game, joining Mike Anderson of Denver in 2000 and Corey Dillon of Cincinnati in 1997. Gray gained 201 yards rushing on 37 carries with four touchdowns in the win at Indianapolis on Nov. 16., 2014.

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span vs. Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014. The Patriots are one of three teams to score three touchdowns in under a minute since the 1970 merger, and are the only team to have achieved the feat twice.



3X COACH OF THE YEAR

The Associated Press named Bill Belichick the NFL's Coach of the Year in 2010, the third time that Belichick earned the honor. He was also named Coach of the Year following the 2003 and 2007 seasons, joining Don Shula (4-time winner) and Chuck Knox as the only three-time winners.

BELICHICK ADDED TO HIS RECORD IN 2014

Bill Belichick has coached the Patriots to 12 straight seasons with 10 or more wins after reaching his 10th win of the 2014 season at San Diego (12/7/14), adding to his NFL record streak. In 2011, Belichick became the first coach in NFL history with nine straight seasons with at least 10 victories. George Seifert has the second most consecutive 10-win seasons with eight from 1989-1996 for San Francisco.




An lvy League defensive lineman standout at Brown, James Develin graduated in 2010 with a degree in chemical engineering and began lining up interviews with companies he felt might be best suited for the technical skills. However, Develin wanted to give football one last shot, and play in the NFL.

"Football is something that is not around your entire life," Develin told *The Boston Globe.* "I knew if I didn't give it my best shot to play football as a career, that I'd always regret it." Develin made the most of his opportunity by switching positions to fullback. Following stints in the Arena Football League and the now defunct United Football League, Develin caught on with the Cincinnati Bengals practice squad and eventually worked his way to the Patriots 53-man roster full-time in 2013.



RECORD RETURNER

WR Julian Edelman set a franchise record with his fourth career punt returned for a touch-down when he returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. Denver on Nov. 2, 2014. He set a franchise record with a 94-yard punt return touchdown vs. Miami (1/2/11). The previous longest punt return was an 89-yard touchdown return by Mike Haynes vs. Buffalo (11/7/76). FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he completed 56 percent of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

EDELMAN TAKES HIS FATHER'S ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told *The Boston Herald*. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."



Gronkowski scored a 2-yard touchdown on a lateral from Tom Brady in the third quarter vs. Indianapolis (12/4/11), becoming the first tight end in Patriots history to score a rushing touchdown. Gronkowski is the first NFL tight end to score a rushing touchdown since Tennessee's Bo Scaife had a 31-yard scoring run against Baltimore on Nov. 12, 2006. He is the first tight end since the 1970 merger to have two receiving touchdowns and a rushing touchdown in the same game.

HITTING THE CENTURY MARK

LaFell finished the game against Kansas City (9/29/14) with six receptions for 119 yards for his first 100-yard day as a Patriot and the third 100-yard day of his career. He had his fourth career 100-yard day vs. Chicago (10/26), setting a career-high with 11 receptions for 124 yards.

TWICE AS NICE

WR Brandon LaFell scored two touchdowns on an 18-yard pass and a 56yard pass in the fourth quarter at Buffalo on Oct. 12, 2014. It was his second two-touchdown game of his career. He had two touchdowns with Carolina vs. the New York Giants on Sept. 22, 2013. He added his third two-touchdown game at Green Bay on Nov. 30.

CAREER DAY FOR LAFELL

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to four straight Pro Bowls (2011-14) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the fourth straight season in 2014.

The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."





SLATER ON BILL BELICHICK

"Guys have really bought into what we're trying to do here and believing in the goals that we've set to accomplish. We try not to acknowledge all the noise and hype surrounding ballgames. We prepare ourselves to have success by the way we work day-in and day-out on the field and in the meeting room, but it definitely starts with our leadership on this team."



FIRST NFL TD

WR Brian Tyms scored his first NFL touchdown on a 43-yard reception from Tom Brady in the win at Buffalo (10/12/14). He entered the game with two career receptions for 12 yards in seven games. In total for 2014, Tyms had all five receptions for 82 yards, all coming against the Bills.



NATE SOLDER MAKES A GOOD CHOICE

It only took a day for Nate Solder to decide to change from his lifelong position of tight end to tackle after playing his freshman year at Colorado as a tight end. "My coaches came to me and said, 'You'd be an all right tight end, but you'd be an even better tackle," he told the *Boston Globe.* "I've always wanted to be great, so that's why I moved to tackle."

He added over 30 pounds after his redshirt freshman season and was named the team's starting left tackle. He played in 2,540 of 2,542 offensive plays over the next three seasons at Colorado and became an immediate contributor on the Patriots offensive line at right tackle as a rookie before moving to left tackle.



RYAN WENDELL LEADS THE NFL IN PLAY SNAPS IN 2012

Ryan Wendell played a league-high 1,249 snaps in 2012 and it helped earn him a spot on the *USA Today* All-Joe team. Said Wendell: "I think first it says a lot about the organization, our training staff and our strength training coaches, that they do everything they can all season and all off-season and during the spring to keep us healthy throughout the whole season. I think it says more about them than it does about me individually."

Reggie Wayne enters the 2015 season ranked 7th in NFL history with 1,070 career receptions and 8th in NFL history with 14,345 receiving yards.




WHAT'S IN A NUMBER?

JAMIE COLLINS' JOURNEY



The road to the NFL has been anything but easy for linebacker and 2013 second-round draft pick Jamie Collins. The youngest of five siblings growing up in Meadville, Miss., Collins lost both of his parents when he was six years old and was raised by one of his sisters, who was in her mid 20s

Collins turned to football as an outlet to help him through the tough times. "It means a lot. It's my living." Collins told *The Boston Herald.* "It kept me on track." Collins' resiliency in dealing with adversity has made a lasting impact on fellow Mississippi native Stevan Ridley, who grew up 30

miles west of Meadville in Natchez, Miss., and got to know Collins through a family friend. "What I've known about him, he really has been a strong person," Ridley told the *Herald*. "Anybody that's gone through the things that he's gone through and can still find a way to be successful on the football field, you have to be mentally tough. That's what he's kind of done as a teammate here. He's come in here and accepted his role and did a pretty good job as a rookie."

COLLINS RECORDS FIRST INT

LB Jamie Collins intercepted a Kyle Orton pass in the win at Buffalo (10/12/14), marking his first regular-season interception. He had his second of the year at the Jets on Dec. 21, 2014. His first career pick came in the 2013 AFC Divisional Playoff vs. Indianapolis (1/11/14).

COLLINS' FIRST TWO-SACK GAME

LB Jamie Collins registered his first NFL two-sack game with a 9-yard sack in the first quarter and a 9-yard sack in the second quarter against San Diego (12/7/14). It was the fourth time in 2014 that a Patriots player had a multiple sack game. LB Dont'a Hightower had two sacks at Minnesota (9/14), DE Chandler Jones had two sacks at Minnesota (9/14) and DL Rob Ninkovich had three sacks at Buffalo (10/12).

TEAM LEADER

Collins had a standout second season in 2014. He led the team in total tackles (109), forced fumbles (4) and fumble recoveries (2), and tied for the team lead in interceptions (2).

LB DONT'A HIGHTOWER

WEARING BRUSCHI'S JERSEY #54

As a first round draft pick, Dont'a Hightower is used to high expectations. Hightower went to training camp with jersey #45 but was switched to jersey #54 prior to the start of his rookie year in 2012. Former LB Tedy Bruschi wore #54 for 13 seasons.

Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another



linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

HIGHTOWER HAS A CAREER FIRST

LB Dont'a Hightower registered his first career two-sack game at Minnesota [09/14/14].

HIGHTOWER SETS CAREER HIGH

LB Dont'a Hightower registered a 9-yard sack of Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers (11/30/14) in the second quarter to set a career high with $4\frac{1}{2}$ sacks in 2014. He finished the year with 6.0. His previous best was four sacks as a rookie in 2012.

JONES ACHIEVES TRIFECTA

DL Chandler Jones blocked a second-quarter Minnesota [9/14/14] 48yard field goal attempt, recovered the loose ball and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown. It was the fifth blocked field goal returned for a touchdown in Patriots history and the first returned for a touchdown since S Patrick Chung blocked a field goal attempt that was returned 35 yards for a touchdown by DB Kyle Arrington at Miami on Oct. 4, 2010. It is the second field goal block by Jones. He blocked a 39-yard attempt vs. Miami on Oct. 27, 2013. It was Jones' second career touchdown. He recovered an errant shotgun snap squibbed into the end zone at Baltimore on Dec. 22, 2013.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Chandler Jones was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance in the Patriots' 30-7 victory at Minnesota on Sept. 14, 2014. It was the first time in Jones' career that he has received an AFC Player of the Week honor. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for November last season and NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month in September 2012.

Jones blocked a 48-yard field goal attempt and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown to give New England a 24-7 halftime lead at Minnesota (9/14). He also finished the game with eight total tackles and his fifth career two-sack game.

The last time the Patriots earned an AFC Defensive Player of the Week honor was Week 10 of the 2011 season when Andre Carter tied a team record with four sacks at N.Y. Jets (11/13/11).

JONES SNAPS A SELFIE

When training camp practice ends at Gillette Stadium, the first wave of players quickly head into the locker room to shower and recover from the tough workout, but Chandler Jones is almost never among them. He is autographing footballs, snapping selfies and chatting with as many fans as he can before he makes his way into the building to rest his body and escape the heat. The Super Bowl Champion defensive end enjoys engaging his fans because he remembers a time when he was the one cheering from a distance.

"I feel like it was just yesterday when I was one of those fans," Jones said to ESPN's Mike Reis. "I didn't have access to an NFL team, but I was the guy that was on Twitter that was like, 'Oh my God, he tweeted me' or 'He shouted me out.' I was that person. So for me to have an opportunity to do that to people, I try to do that whenever I can. You see fans out there, they're sitting in the rain, they're sitting in the heat, sweating, they're drenched, and they're just yelling your name the whole practice. The least I can do is go over there and say hi and take some selfies and sign a few things. I love it. It's great."



THIRD TEAM'S A CHARM

Chris Jones had an early introduction to failure in the NFL. Taken behind 37 other defensive linemen in the 2013 NFL Draft, the defensive tackle was cut by two teams over a span of just 11 days. After selecting him in the sixth round with the 198th overall pick, the Houston Texans cut Jones on Aug. 31. Jones signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sept. 1, but lasted only 10 days, as the Buccaneers released him on Sept., 10. Rather than be deterred by these early disappointments, however, Jones maintained a positive outlook when he signed with the Patriots on Sept. 11, and it has paid off in a big way. Thrust into a starting role after key injuries to the defensive line, Jones finished his rookie season with six sacks.

Jones' sudden success may have come as a surprise to some, but not to Dave Clawson, Jones' college coach at Bowling Green. Jones was part of Clawson's first recruiting class and blossomed into an All-American and two-two time captain for the Falcons. "It's hard to talk about Chris without getting a little bit emotional," Clawson told the *The Boston Herald*, "because he was that special of a player and person in our program."

JONES SAVES THE DAY; EARNS AFC HONORS

Chris Jones blocked a 58-yard field goal attempt by the Jets on the final play of the game to preserve New England's 27-25 win (10/16/14). It was the first blocked field goal for the Patriots since Chandler Jones blocked a 48-yard try by Minnesota's Blair Walsh earlier this season. He was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance in the victory.





SURE TACKLER

Jerod Mayo had his fifth straight 100-tackle season and his second season with over 180 total tackles after finishing the 2012 season with 184 tackles, the fifth-highest single season tackle total in franchise history. Mayo registered at least 10 tackles in 10 games, including a season-high of 20 vs. the New York Jets (10/28/12).

DOUBLE TROUBLE: DB DEVIN McCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of two active sets of twins playing in the NFL.

McCOURTY GOES LONG

IN GOOD COMPANY

Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joins Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

McCOURTY REGISTERS CAREER LONG

DB Devin McCourty returned a first quarter interception 60 yards to the Minnesota (09/14/14) 1-yard line to set up a Patriots touchdown. It is the longest interception return of his career. He had a 50-yard return as a rookie in 2010 at Detroit (11/25) on Thanksgiving Day.



A NOSE FOR THE FOOTBALL

Ninkovich has more opponent fumble recoveries (13) over the last five seasons (2010-2014) than any other NFL player. J.J. Watt is second during that time with 11 opponent fumble recoveries.





CAREER DAY IN BUFFALO

Ninkovich finished with a three-sack game for the first time in his career in the win at Buffalo (10/12/14), to add to two two-sack performances vs. Miami (1/2/11) and at Carolina (11/18/13).

WHERE DID HE COME FROM?

Rob Ninkovich's journey to the Patriots was not easy. He entered the league as a fifth-round pick by the Saints in 2006 and was waived four times by New Orleans and Miami before landing in New England on Aug. 2, 2009. He spent the 2009 offseason trying to make the New Orleans team as a long snapper. Before coming to the Patriots, he had appeared in just eight games over three seasons. He doubled that total in his first year in New England, appearing in 15 games in 2009 and his role on the team has grown since, earning a starting role at linebacker in 2010 and 2011 before moving to a starting role on the defensive line in 2011.

CRAZY EIGHTS

Ninkovich raised his 2014 total to a team-high of 8.0 sacks in 2014. Ninkovich has had at least 8.0 sacks in three consecutive seasons (8.0 in 2012, 8.0 in 2013 and 8.0 in 2014), becoming the first Patriots player to have at least 8.0 sacks in three consecutive seasons since Pro Football Hall of Famer Andre Tippett achieved the feat from 1985-87 (1985, 16 1/2, 1986, 9 1/2 and 1987, 12 1/2).

NINKOVICH SCORED AS A TE IN COLLEGE

Ninkovich played some at tight end in college at Purdue and caught two touchdown passes with a 2-yard touchdown pass from Buffalo QB Kyle Orton and a 1-yard touchdown pass from former New York Giants and Indianapolis QB Curtis Painter.

DB LOGAN RYAN AND DB DURON HARMON

CLASSMATES REUNITE IN NEW ENGLAND

Defensive backs Logan Ryan and Duron Harmon are used to working together. Ryan and Harmon began their college football careers together as members of the same recruiting class at Rutgers University and developed a close friendship during their four years in Piscataway, N.J. As fate would have it, Ryan and Harmon would begin their NFL journeys together as well when the Patriots selected the two defensive backs just eight picks apart in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft.

Reunited once again, the former Scarlet Knights are excited and eager to make their mark, just as they did at Rutgers. "We talked before the draft and said how good it would be to play on the same team again, and for it to happen again, it's exciting and it's a blessing," Harmon told *The Boston Globe.* "It's great [we're contributing], because at the end of the day you want to play, and to contribute to a team like this, it's fun."

RYAN'S FIRST PICK FOR SIX

Ryan returned his first NFL interception 79 yards for a touchdown N.Y. Jets on Oct. 20, 2013. The last Patriots player to return their first career interception for a touchdown was Kyle Arrington in 2010. The last rookie Patriots player to return their first career interception for a touchdown was James Sanders in 2005:

RYAN RETURNS... TO SCHOOL

When Logan Ryan decided to leave Rutgers and enter the NFL Draft after his redshirt junior season in 2012, he made a promise to his parents that after his rookie year, he would return to school and earn his degree.

Ryan kept his promise and graduated in the spring of 2014 with a degree in labor relations and a minor in psychology.

"I committed to Rutgers, not only as a football player, but as a student, so I was going to make sure I finished that end too," Ryan told NJ.com.

"It's a big accomplishment in my life. I held my word to my parents and stuck with it and I'm fortunate. It took a lot of work, but I was able to go back and finish and walk in graduation."

FIRST NFL SACK RESULTS IN TURNOVER

Ryan forced a fumble on his first NFL sack vs. Miami (10/27/13), a week after returning his first career interception for a touchdown. Ryan strip-sacked Ryan Tannehill, forcing a fumble recovered by Rob Ninkovich that led in to a touchdown. The play marked the second time in as many weeks that a Ryan turnover led to Patriots points.



SHEARD ON MCGINEST

Jabaal Sheard may be a new face in the Patriots locker room, but he's certainly familiar with Patriots legend, Willie McGinest. Sheard, who is typically soft-spoken around the microphones, was very excited to express his admiration for McGinest following the veteran linebacker's induction to the Patriots Hall of Fame on August 5.

"That's a guy that I watch film on still to this day," Sheard said to the *Boston Globe.* "How he used to rush, how he'd attack, how he was relentless. It's amazing to be out here with him. The heart he had, that dog. He would get after the quarterback, get after the run. He was so into the team, whatever they asked him to do, he would do it."

It makes sense that Sheard would feel a connection to McGinest, given the players' similarities. Before coming to New England as a defensive lineman, Sheard played outside linebacker for Cleveland in Mike Pettine's hybrid 3-4 system. By adding Sheard to his roster, Bill Belichick brings flexibility and, hopefully some of that McGinest magic, back to the Patriots front seven.



Gostkowski drilled a 51-yard field goal and a 53-yarder vs. Arizona (9/16/12) and connected on two 53-yard field goals at Houston on (12/1/13). He is the first Patriots player to have two 50-yard field goals in the same game.

A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (9/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).





PLAYOFF NOTES

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times in their 55-year history. Sixteen of those playoff berths have come in the 21 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 17 division crowns, including 12 in the last 14 seasons, and have qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1976, 1985, 1994 and 1998). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.
