NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (8-0) at NEW YORK GIANTS (5-4) Sunday, Nov. 15, 2015 • MetLife Stadium (82,500) • 4:25 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will travel to face the New York Giants at MetLife Stadium this Sunday for the second straight game against an NFC East opponent. Last week, the Patriots beat the Washington Redskins, 27-10, at home to improve to 8-0 in 2015 and a 44-10 record against NFC teams since 2002. That is the best inter-conference record in the NFL since realignment in 2002.

The Patriots are an NFL-best 41-15 in the month of November since 2001 for a .732 winning percentage.

With a win on Sunday against the Giants, the Patriots will secure a winning record for the 15h straight season, joining San Francisco (16, 1983-98) and Dallas (16, 1970-85) as the only teams to have winning records in at least 15 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger

SERIES HISTORY





The Patriots and Giants will meet for the 12th time since their series was inaugurated in 1970, with the Patriots claiming a 5-4 edge in regular-season play. The teams have met in two Super Bowls with the Giants claiming wins in both Super Bowl XLII and Super Bowl XLVI.

The series dates back to 1970, the year of the AFL-NFL merger and includes some memorable games despite the relative infrequency of the matchups. In 1996, the Patriots stole a 23-22 win to clinch a playoff berth after trailing 22-3 in the fourth quarter. In 2007, the Patriots captured a 38-35 win to finish a perfect 16-0 regular season.

The last time the teams played in the regular season was in Nov. 6, 2011, at Gillette Stadium when the Giants snapped the Patriots 20-game home regular season winning streak with a 24-20 win.

The first preseason game between the teams was the first NFL game played in Foxborough, as the Patriots opened Schaefer Stadium with a 20-14 win in 1971. The clubs have been frequent preseason opponents recently, squaring off in the preseason openers for three straight years from 2001-03 and in preseason finales for 11 straight seasons from 2005-15. The teams faced each other in the 2015 preseason finale at Gillette Stadium on Sept. 3, with the Giants claiming a 12-9 victory.

NEW ENGLAND TIES

In the decades leading up to the founding of the American Football League in 1960, many football fans in New England followed the Giants, a franchise founded in 1925. New England-based NFL outfits such as the Providence Steam Rollers (1925-31), the Boston Redskins (1932-36) and the Boston Yanks (1944-48) folded or moved away, leaving the Giants as the closest NFL team to New England until the Patriots franchise inaugurated play in the 1960 season.

MEMORABLE MATCHUPS

Aug. 15, 1971 — The Patriots defeated the Giants 20-14 in the opening preseason game at Foxboro Stadium.

Dec. 21, 1996 — The Patriots rallied from a 22-3 fourth-quarter deficit to clinch a first-round playoff bye with a 23-22 win at Giants Stadium.

Aug. 10, 2001 — New England began its first Super Bowl championship season with a 14-0 preseason shutout of the defending NFC champion Giants.

Dec. 29, 2007 — The Patriots defeat the Giants by a thrilling, 38-35 score to cap off the first 16-0 regular season in NFL history.

February 3, 2008 — The Patriots faced the Giants in Super Bowl XLII in Glendale, Ariz. The Giants' 17-14 win snapped the Patriots' perfect season.

February 5, 2012 — The Patriots faced the Giants in Super Bowl XLVI in Indianapolis, Ind. The Giants took a 21-17 lead when they scored with 57 seconds left in the game and held the Patriots on a final drive to secure the win.

The New York Giants drove 80 yards with just over one minute to play before QB Eli Manning connected with TE Jake Ballard on a 1-yard touchdown pass with 15 seconds left to lift the Giants to a 24-20 victory. The loss ended a 20-game home winning streak and marked the first loss at home to an NFC team since 2002 for the Patriots.

It appeared the Patriots would erase a 10-0 third quarter deficit and escape with a win after QB Tom Brady threw a 14-yard touchdown pass to TE Rob Gronkowski on a fourth-down play to give New England a 20-17 lead with 1:36 to play.

The Giants final scoring drive was helped by a 20-yard pass interference penalty that gave the Giants a first down at the New England 1-yard line with 30 seconds to play.

After a scoreless first half, the Patriots appeared to overcome the 10-0 third quarter deficit by scoring on four consecutive second half drives. New England took their first lead after a 45-yard field goal by K Stephen Gostkowski with 7:08 in the fourth quarter made it 13-10. The Giants responded with an eight play, 85-yard drive that resulted in a 10-yard touchdown pass from Manning to WR Mario Manningham to retake the lead at 17-13.

Brady, who completed 28-of-49 passes for 342 yards with two touchdowns, took over with 2:58 to play and moved the Patriots to the Giants 14yard line before connecting with Gronkowski for the lead.

New England's six first-half drives began at their own 5, 6, 17, 20, 11 and 9-yard lines. Two times the Patriots drove into New York territory but Brady was intercepted on one drive and the Patriots missed a field goal on the other drive.

New York took a 10-0 lead after converting on two New England turnovers to start the second half. Brady was intercepted at the Giants 39-yard line on the first drive in the second half, leading to a Giants field goal. On New England's second drive, Brady fumbled on a sack, resulting in a Giants first down at the New England 10-yard line. On the next play, RB Brandon Jacobs scored on a 10-yard run to give the Giants a 10-0 lead.

New England recovered a muffed punt on the next series to help set up a field goal. After CB Kyle Arrington intercepted Manning in the end zone, the Patriots responded with a 7-play, 80-yard drive that culminated with a 5-yard touchdown pass from Brady to TE Aaron Hernandez to tie the game at 10 early in the fourth quarter.

- ★ Giants offensive coordinator Ben McAdoo served as offensive line/tight ends coach at Fairfield (Conn.) University in 2002.
- ★ Giants defensive coordinator Steve Spagnuolo was born in Whitinsville, Mass., and attended Grafton HS, where he is a member of the school's athletic Hall of Fame. After high school, Spagnuolo played wide receiver at Springfield [Mass.] College and was named Scholar Athlete of the Year in 1982. Spagnuolo began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Massachusetts following graduation. Wide Receiver Julian Edelman scored on an 8-yard touchdown pass and RB LeGarrette Blount scored on a 5-yard run to give the New England Patriots a 14-O lead before the visiting Washington Redskins ran their second play from scrimmage in a 27-10 victory. The Patriots improved to 8-O and are guaranteed to finish the season with a record of .500 or better for the 15th consecu-

Quarterback Tom Brady passed for 299 yards and two touchdowns, Blount gained 129 yards rushing and WR Brandon LaFell caught five passes for 102 yards. The Patriots defense held Washington to just 37 yards on the ground for a 2.5-vard average.

The Patriots took a 14-0 first quarter lead despite two turnovers deep in Washington territory with a fumble at the Washington 37-yard line and an interception from the Washington 16-yard line.

The Patriots opened the game with a 13-play, 84-yard drive that ended with a 8-yard touchdown pass from Brady to Edelman. The Patriots converted a fourth-and-two from the Washington 33-yard line on that drive with a 5-yard completion from Brady to Edelman.

On the ensuing kickoff, the Patriots pulled off a successful onside kick attempt that was recovered by LB Jonathan Freeny at the New England 45-yard line. The Patriots failed to capitalize when the drive stalled on an Edelman fumble that was recovered by the Redskins at their own 26-yard line. On the very next play, a QB Kirk Cousin pass bounced off the hands of WR Pierre Garçon and was intercepted by CB Logan Ryan at the Washington 28-yard line.

The Patriots moved to the 5-yard line where Blount pounded it into the end

zone for a 14-0 first-quarter lead. After holding the Redskins on three-straight plays, New England took over and marched to the Washington 16-yard line before Brady was intercepted for just the second time in 2015. A 44-yard return on the pick helped the Redskins get into New England territory, but a failed fourth-down play from the 36-yard line gave New England the ball. The Patriots engineered a 10-play, 61-yard drive that ended win a 21-yard field goal for a 17-0 second-quarter lead.

Washington got on the board at the end of the second half with a 23-yard field goal with 16 seconds to play.

The Patriots added another field goal in the third quarter for a 20-3 lead and then Brady connected with RB Brandon Bolden on an 18-yard touchdown pass in the beginning of the fourth quarter to finish a 14-play, 88-yard drive for a 27-3 lead.

The Redskins finally got in the end zone with a 3-yard touchdown pass from Cousins to TE Jordan Reed with 29 seconds to play.



BETTER THAN AVERAGE

After improving to 8-0 on the 2015 season, the Patriots are guaranteed to finish with a record of .500 or better for the 15th consecutive year. At the conclusion of the 2015 season, the Patriots will be the only NFL team to finish with a record of .500 or better in each of the last 15 years (2001-2015). Each of the other 31 NFL teams had at least one losing season between 2001 and 2014.

FAST START FOR DEFENDING CHAMPS

The Patriots are the fourth defending Super Bowl champion to start a season with a record of 8-0 or better, joining Green Bay (2011-13-0), Denver (1998 – 13-0) and San Francisco (1990 – 10-0).

PATRIOTS TIE NFL SCORING RECORD

The Patriots have scored in 31 straight quarters, tying the NFL record for most consecutive quarters scoring points. The Indianapolis Colts also scored in 31 straight quarters in 2005 and the St. Louis Rams also scored in 31 consecutive quarters in a streak that spanned from 1999 to 2000. The only quarter in which the Patriots failed to score a point in 2015 was the first quarter of the 2015 season opener vs. Pittsburgh (9/10).

INTER-CONFERENCE DOMINANCE

The Patriots improved to 44-10 against NFC teams since 2002, improving on the best inter-conference record in the NFL since realignment in 2002.

BLOUNT RUMBLES FOR 10TH 100-YARD GAME

RB LeGarrette Blount had his 10th career 100-yard rushing game and his first since he gained 118 yards at Carolina on Sept. 11, 2014, while with Pittsburgh, after finishing with 129 yards. It is the first 100-yard game for the Patriots since Jonas Gray had 201 at Indianapolis on Nov. 23, 2014. Since 2000, the Patriots are now 41-1 in the regular season when a Patriots player eclipses 100 yards rushing. The only loss in the Bill Belichick era came at Miami on Dec. 20, 2004 when Corey Dillon rushed for 121 yards in a 29-28 loss. Since that time, the Patriots are 28-0 when one of their players breaks the 100-yard rushing mark.

Blount finished with a career-high 29 rushing attempts. His previous best was 26 rushing attempts at San Francisco on Nov. 21, 2010, while with Tampa Bay.

BRADY THROWS MULTIPLE TDS AGAIN

Tom Brady has opened the 2015 season with eight straight games with at least two touchdown passes after throwing for two against Washington. In 2007, Brady started the season by throwing two or more touchdowns in the first 10 games of the season. He had a nine-game streak in 2010 and 2011 and a 10-game streak in 2014 with two or more touchdowns.

LAFELL GOES OVER 100

Brandon LaFell had 102 receiving yards on five catches, recording his third 100-yard receiving game as a Patriot and his first since tallying 124 receiving yards on 11 catches against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014. It was LaFell's fifth career 100-yard receiving game, including two with Carolina from 2010-2013. The Patriots have now had a player gain 100 or more receiving yards in seven consecutive games.

GRONKOWSKI ON PACE TO BREAK OWN RECORD

KRAFT

News & Notes

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 22nd season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft



announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (14), conference crowns (7) and Super Bowl championships (4) than any other NFL team. Super Bowl XLIX was the seventh Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 21 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 16 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

MILESTONE WIN FOR KRAFT

The victory over the New York Jets (12/21/14) was the 250th win under Robert Kraft. His 250 wins in his first 368 total games tied Chicago's George Halas for the fastest an owner has reached 250 victories.

CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the second team (1970s Pittsburgh Steelers) in NFL history – and first in 35 years – to win four Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

KRAFT PRODUCES MORE WINS THAN EVERY OTHER PATRIOTS OWNER COMBINED

The Patriots have 261 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 261-119 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

During his 12-year stint (1979-90) with the New York Giants, Bill Belichick worked his way up from defensive assistant to defensive coordinator and helped the Giants win two Super Bowls. His dominant Giants defense of the 1980s is still known today as one of the greatest defensive units in NFL history.

THE BIG BLUE WRECKING CREW

The "Big Blue Wrecking Crew" was the name given to the legendary Giants defense of the 1980s. Predictably, it all began in 1981 when the Giants, with the second overall pick in the draft, selected arguably the best defensive player of all time, Hall of Fame linebacker Lawrence Taylor. Taylor was the final piece to a linebacking corps that featured Hall of Famer Harry Carson, five-time Pro Bowler Brad Van Pelt and Brian Kelly. Together they were known as "The Crunch Bunch," and they were a bone-rattling force to be reckoned with on the field. Collectively, the Crunch Bunch owns 24 Pro Bowl selections and even though they were only together for three years (1981-83), they laid the foundation for one of the most dominant defenses in NFL history. As defensive coordinator, Bill Belichick continued to build his defense through his front seven. He added defensive ends George Martin and Leonard Marshall and nose tackle Jim Burt to create a terrifying group that had the size and speed to bully the offensive lines of the NFC East and get the quarterback. In 1985, the Giants defense, under Belichick, amassed a franchise-record 68 sacks.

Perhaps one of the most telling displays of the Big Blue Wrecking Crew's defensive dominance came in February of 1991 when the Giants faced the Buffalo Bills in Super Bowl XXV. The Bills, who had scored 44 and 51 points in the divisional round and AFC Championship, respectively, were held to just 19 points by the Giants defense. Many credit Belichick's elaborate defensive scheme for the nail-biting victory.

Belichick was always a believer in stopping the run, but this game was different. He knew that the Bills dangerous no-huddle offense, led by Hall of Famers, quarterback Jim Kelly and running back Thurman Thomas, would get their yards one way or another. Belichick had to pick his poison. He also knew that Bills offensive coordinator Ted Marchibroda, who Belichick worked for with the Baltimore Colts, allowed his players to call their own plays. He decided to lay off Thomas and attack the passing game with the idea that Kelly would struggle to read the defense and make mistakes.

His plan paid off and the Giants held Kelly to just 212 passing yards en route to a 20-19 victory. Belichick's game plan from that night now resides in Canton as property of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

SACKS IN A SEASON

Bill Belichick was promoted to defensive coordinator of the New York Giants in 1985 and held the position through 1990, winning two Super Bowls (XXI and XXV) with the organization. During that time, three of his teams amassed 55-plus sacks and rank first, second and third in franchise history in total sacks in a season. Their 1985, 68-sack season ranks first all-time in league history.

PATRIOTS GAME DAY EXPERIENCE REMAINS A CUT ABOVE

Since the team played its inaugural regular-season game at Gillette Stadium against the Steelers in September 2002, the Patriots organization has continued to renovate and install new amenities to ensure that fan satisfaction remains at the forefront of the venue. In 2015, the Kraft family has made some of its most significant and innovative capital improvements to date, with the addition of three new facilities within the stadium: the Optum Field Lounge, the Cross Insurance Pavilion and Business Center and the DraftKings Fantasy Sports Zone, as well as a major expansion to the signature bridge and the addition of more in-bowl LED ribbon boards.

OPTUM FIELD LOUNGE

Offering a game day experience unlike any other, the Optum Field Lounge brings its members closer to the action than ever before with an on-field, outdoor patio and lounge located in the south end zone. Inside, members will enjoy an upscale, climate-controlled space featuring a 9-foot-by-32-foot high-resolution media wall, HD screens, premium food and bar service and private restrooms. On game days, Patriots season ticket members, who have also paid an Optum Field Lounge membership fee, can come and go between their seats and the venue throughout the game. Members can access the lounge beginning three hours prior to kickoff and stay one hour after the game. On non-game days, the space will be utilized for a variety of events, functions and parties, including dinner receptions and business meetings.





CARMAX BRIDGE

Since opening Gillette Stadium in 2002, the iconic bridge and lighthouse have stood to represent the home of the Patriots while paying homage to its deep New England roots. The newly expanded CarMax bridge is four times wider and gives fans plenty of room to gather on game days to hang out and watch the action while improving the concourse's foot traffic.



CROSS INSURANCE PAVILION

A first of its kind function facility, the Cross Insurance Pavilion & Business Center will be utilized on game days for exclusive pregame hospitality events 2 ½ hours prior to kickoff on Patriots game days. Then, 30 minutes prior to kickoff, the venue will transform into a gathering area open to all ticketed fans inside the stadium. On non-game days, the space and open floor plan will host a variety of functions, from trade shows, car displays and business meetings to proms, galas and dinner receptions. The new venue features a pre-function mezzanine area, outdoor terrace and access to the stadium's main concourse. Inside features 24-foot high ceilings, state-of-the-art audio visual capabilities with Bose sound system, a 24-foot video screen and LED HDTVs and classic furnishings with mahogany finish.



DRAFTKINGS FANTASY SPORTS ZONE

Among the most innovative amenities offered at the stadium is the DraftKings Fantasy Sports Zone located in the southwest corner of the main concourse. This high-tech sports bar offers excellent food choices, DraftKings beer selections of the day and an impressive array of nearly 40 HDTVs to capture all of the NFL and fantasy football action in real time. This venue will keep football and fantasy sports fans up to date with live fantasy scoring updates and the NFL RedZone. Additionally, when the weather is nice, the sports zone is open to the field. During inclement games, the glass front wall closes to keep the space warm and dry while still connecting fans to the action on the field. The Draft-Kings Fantasy Sports Zone is open to all ticketed patrons inside the stadium.



LED RIBBON BOARDS

Information is power! With the addition of more LED ribbon boards, Patriots fans will be the most powerful in the league. Fantasy information, scores from around the league and real-time stats are just some of the information to which fans will have access. Taking it to the next level, starting in 2015 fans will know things like who is the fastest player on the field at any given time and which players are lined up for the start of plays.

THE NUMBERS

Stephen Gostkowski executed a successful onside kick vs. Washington [11/08/15]. It was his second [Cleveland - 12/8/13] and the third in team history. The first came when Jim Lee Hunt recovered a Gino Cappelletti kick at the end of the first half in a 26-10 win vs. the NY Jets [9/27/64].

DE Chandler Jones set a career high with 3 sacks in the win at Buffalo on Sept. 20, 2015. He has eight career multi-sack games.

The 2015 Patriots are the fourth defending Super Bowl Champion to start the season with a record of 8-0 or better, joining Green Bay (2011-13-0), Denver (1998-13-0) and San Francisco (1990-10-0).

The Patriots became the first team in NFL history in 2014 to earn five straight first round byes. Dallas and San Francisco earned four straight byes from 1992 through 1995.

The Patriots scored 40 or more points in back-to-back wins (40 and 51) in 2015 for the eighth time in team history.

The Patriots scored on each of their first nine drives before taking a knee to run out the clock in the win vs. Jacksonville (9/27/15), the first time in team history that has occured.

The Patriots lead the NFL with 10 first round byes since the current NFL playoff format was instituted in 1990.




On April 20, 2011, just days before Texas Christian offensive line prospect Marcus Cannon was to enter the NFL Draft, he was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, a treatable form of cancer found in lymph tissue. A little more than one week later, the Patriots selected Cannon in the fifth round [138th overall] of the draft with the knowledge of his illness. The Patriots placed Cannon on the Reserve/Non Football Injury list to start the 2011 season while he received treatment and recovered. Cannon was activated to the 53-man roster later that year and is now in his fifth season with the team. Cannon made a full recovery and was named the Patriots 2011 Ed Block Courage Award winner - an annual award presented to select players in the National Football League who are voted by their teammates as role models of inspiration, sportsmanship and courage.

FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo [Calif.] before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he completed 56 percent of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

EDELMAN TAKES HIS FATHER'S ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told *The Boston Herald.* "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."



The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

SLATER ON BILL BELICHICK

"Guys have really bought into what we're trying to do here and believing in the goals that we've set to accomplish. We try not to acknowledge all the noise and hype surrounding ballgames. We prepare ourselves to have success by the way we work day-in and day-out on the field and in the meeting room, but it definitely starts with our leadership on this team."










JAMIE COLLINS' JOURNEY



The road to the NFL has been anything but easy for linebacker and 2013 second-round draft pick Jamie Collins. The youngest of five siblings growing up in Meadville, Miss., Collins lost both of his parents when he was six years old and was raised by one of his sisters, who was in her mid 20s.

Collins turned to football as an outlet to help him through the tough times. "It means a lot. It's my living." Collins told *The Boston Herald.* "It kept me on track." Collins' resiliency in dealing with adversity has made a lasting impact on fellow Mississippi native Stevan Ridley, who grew up 30

miles west of Meadville in Natchez, Miss., and got to know Collins through a family friend. "What I've known about him, he really has been a strong person," Ridley told the *Herald*. "Anybody that's gone through the things that he's gone through and can still find a way to be successful on the football field, you have to be mentally tough. That's what he's kind of done as a teammate here. He's come in here and accepted his role and did a pretty good job as a rookie."

COLLINS RECORDS FIRST INT

LB Jamie Collins intercepted a Kyle Orton pass in the win at Buffalo (10/12/14), marking his first regular-season interception. He had his second of the year at the Jets on Dec. 21, 2014. His first career pick came in the 2013 AFC Divisional Playoff vs. Indianapolis (1/11/14).

COLLINS SETS CAREER HIGH

LB Jamie Collins set a career high with 2 1/2 sacks in the win at Buffalo on Sept. 20, 2015. It was his second career multi-sack game. He registered his first NFL two-sack game with at San Diego (12/7/14).

TEAM LEADER

Collins had a standout second season in 2014. He led the team in total tackles (109), forced fumbles [4] and fumble recoveries [2], and tied for the team lead in interceptions [2].

COLLINS BLOCKS FIRST XP SINCE 2008

LB Jamie Collins blocked a fourth quarter extra point at Indianapolis (10/18/15). It was the Patriots first blocked extra point since Vince Wilfork blocked a PAT at Oakland on Dec. 14, 2008. It is Collins' second blocked kick. He blocked a field goal attempt vs. Miami on Dec. 14, 2014.






WEARING BRUSCHI'S JERSEY #54

As a first round draft pick, Dont'a Hightower is used to high expectations. Hightower went to training camp with jersey #45 but was switched to jersey #54 prior to the start of his rookie year in 2012. Former LB Tedy Bruschi wore #54 for 13 seasons.

Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another



linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

JONES ACHIEVES TRIFECTA

DL Chandler Jones blocked a second-quarter Minnesota [9/14/14] 48-yard field goal attempt, recovered the loose ball and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown. It was the fifth blocked field goal returned for a touchdown in Patriots history and the first returned for a touchdown since S Patrick Chung blocked a field goal attempt that was returned 35 yards for a touchdown by DB Kyle Arrington at Miami on Oct. 4, 2010. It is the second field goal block by Jones. He blocked a 39-yard attempt vs. Miami on Oct. 27, 2013. It was Jones' second career touchdown. He recovered an errant shotgun snap squibbed into the end zone at Baltimore on Dec. 22, 2013.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Chandler Jones was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance in the Patriots' 30-7 victory at Minnesota on Sept. 14, 2014. It was the first time in Jones' career that he has received an AFC Player of the Week honor. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for November last season and NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month in September 2012.

Jones blocked a 48-yard field goal attempt and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown to give New England a 24-7 halftime lead at Minnesota (9/14). He also finished the game with eight total tackles and his fifth career two-sack game.

The last time the Patriots earned an AFC Defensive Player of the Week honor was Week 10 of the 2011 season when Andre Carter tied a team record with four sacks at N.Y. Jets (11/13/11).

JONES SNAPS A SELFIE

When training camp practice ends at Gillette Stadium, the first wave of players quickly head into the locker room to shower and recover from the tough workout, but Chandler Jones is almost never among them. He is autographing footballs, snapping selfies and chatting with as many fans as he can before he makes his way into the building to rest his body and escape the heat. The Super Bowl Champion defensive end enjoys engaging his fans because he remembers a time when he was the one cheering from a distance.

"I feel like it was just yesterday when I was one of those fans," Jones said to ESPN's Mike Reis. "I didn't have access to an NFL team, but I was the guy that was on Twitter that was like, 'Oh my God, he tweeted me' or 'He shouted me out.' I was that person. So for me to have an opportunity to do that to people, I try to do that whenever I can. You see fans out there, they're sitting in the rain, they're sitting in the heat, sweating, they're drenched, and they're just yelling your name the whole practice. The least I can do is go over there and say hi and take some selfies and sign a few things. I love it. It's great."



THIRD TEAM'S A CHARM

Chris Jones had an early introduction to failure in the NFL. Taken behind 37 other defensive linemen in the 2013 NFL Draft, the defensive tackle was cut by two teams over a span of just 11 days. After selecting him in the sixth round with the 198th overall pick, the Houston Texans cut Jones on Aug. 31. Jones signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sept. 1, but lasted only 10 days, as the Buccaneers released him on Sept., 10. Rather than be deterred by these early disappointments, however, Jones maintained a positive outlook when he signed with the Patriots on Sept. 11, and it has paid off in a big way. Thrust into a starting role after key injuries to the defensive line, Jones finished his rookie season with six sacks.

Jones' sudden success may have come as a surprise to some, but not to Dave Clawson, Jones' college coach at Bowling Green. Jones was part of Clawson's first recruiting class and blossomed into an All-American and two-two time captain for the Falcons. "It's hard to talk about Chris without getting a little bit emotional," Clawson told the *The Boston Herald*, "because he was that special of a player and person in our program."

JONES SAVES THE DAY; EARNS AFC HONORS

Chris Jones blocked a 58-yard field goal attempt by the Jets on the final play of the game to preserve New England's 27-25 win (10/16/14). It was the first blocked field goal for the Patriots since Chandler Jones blocked a 48-yard try by Minnesota's Blair Walsh earlier this season. He was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance in the victory.







SURE TACKLER

Jerod Mayo had his fifth straight 100-tackle season and his second season with over 180 total tackles after finishing the 2012 season with 184 tackles, the fifth-highest single season tackle total in franchise history. Mayo registered at least 10 tackles in 10 games, including a season-high of 20 vs. the New York Jets (10/28/12).

DOUBLE TROUBLE: DB DEVIN McCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of two active sets of twins playing in the NFL.

WHERE DID HE COME FROM?

Rob Ninkovich's journey to the Patriots was not easy. He entered the league as a fifth-round pick by the Saints in 2006 and was waived four times by New Orleans and Miami before landing in New England on Aug. 2, 2009. He spent the 2009 offseason trying to make the New Orleans team as a long snapper. Before coming to the Patriots, he had appeared in just eight games over three seasons. He doubled that total in his first year in New England, appearing in 15 games in 2009 and his role on the team has grown since, earning a starting role at linebacker in 2010 and 2011 before moving to a starting role on the defensive line in 2011.

CRAZY EIGHTS

Ninkovich raised his 2014 total to a team-high of eight sacks in 2014. Ninkovich has had at least eight sacks in three consecutive seasons (8.0 in 2012, eight in 2013 and eight in 2014), becoming the first Patriots player to have at least eight sacks in three consecutive seasons since Pro Football Hall of Famer Andre Tippett achieved the feat from 1985-87 (1985, $16\frac{1}{2}$, 1986, $9\frac{1}{2}$ and 1987, $12\frac{1}{2}$).

NINKOVICH SCORED AS A TE IN COLLEGE

Ninkovich played some at tight end in college at Purdue and caught two touchdown passes with a 2-yard touchdown pass from Buffalo QB Kyle Orton and a 1-yard touchdown pass from former New York Giants and Indianapolis QB Curtis Painter.

DB LOGAN RYAN AND DB DURON HARMON

CLASSMATES REUNITE IN NEW ENGLAND

Defensive backs Logan Ryan and Duron Harmon are used to working together. Ryan and Harmon began their college football careers together as members of the same recruiting class at Rutgers University and developed a close friendship during their four years in Piscataway, N.J. As fate would have it, Ryan and Harmon would begin their NFL journeys together as well when the Patriots selected the two defensive backs just eight picks apart in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft.

Reunited once again, the former Scarlet Knights are excited and eager to make their mark, just as they did at Rutgers. "We talked before the draft and said how good it would be to play on the same team again, and for it to happen again, it's exciting and it's a blessing," Harmon told *The Boston Globe.* "It's great [we're contributing], because at the end of the day you want to play, and to contribute to a team like this, it's fun."

RYAN RETURNS... TO SCHOOL

When Logan Ryan decided to leave Rutgers and enter the NFL Draft after his redshirt junior season in 2012, he made a promise to his parents that after his rookie year, he would return to school and earn his degree.

Ryan kept his promise and graduated in the spring of 2014 with a degree in labor relations and a minor in psychology.

"I committed to Rutgers, not only as a football player, but as a student, so I was going to make sure I finished that end too," Ryan told NJ.com.

"It's a big accomplishment in my life. I held my word to my parents and stuck with it and I'm fortunate. It took a lot of work, but I was able to go back and finish and walk in graduation."

RYAN'S FIRST PICK FOR SIX

Ryan returned his first NFL interception 79 yards for a touchdown N.Y. Jets on Oct. 20, 2013. The last Patriots player to return their first career interception for a touchdown was Kyle Arrington in 2010. SHEARD ON MCGINEST

Jabaal Sheard may be a new face in the Patriots locker room, but he's certainly familiar with Patriots legend, Willie McGinest. Sheard, who is typically soft-spoken around the microphones, was very excited to express his admiration for McGinest following the veteran linebacker's induction to the Patriots Hall of Fame on August 5.

"That's a guy that I watch film on still to this day," Sheard said to the Boston Globe. "How he used to rush, how he'd attack, how he was relentless. It's amazing to be out here with him. The heart he had, that dog. He would get after the quarterback, get after the run. He was so into the team, whatever they asked him to do, he would do it."

It makes sense that Sheard would feel a connection to McGinest, given the players' similarities. Before coming to New England as a defensive lineman, Sheard played outside linebacker for Cleveland in Mike Pettine's hybrid 3-4 system. By adding Sheard to his roster, Bill Belichick brings flexibility and, hopefully some of that McGinest magic, back to the Patriots front seven.



A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (9/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).







PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times in their 55-year history.
