NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS [10-2] at HOUSTON TEXANS [6-6] Sunday Dec. 13, 2015•NRG Stadium $[71,795) \cdot$ 8:30 p.m. ET
The New England Patriots will attempt to get back in the win column after losing two straight games when they travel to play the Houston Texans in a Sunday Night Football matchup.

Despite the losing effort last week against Philadelphia, QB Tom Brady passsed for 312 yards and three touchdowns to push his 2015 totals to an NFL-leading 3,912 yards and 31 touchdowns. It is the sixth time in his career that he has reached at least 30 touchdowns to become the fourth player in NFL history with at least 30 or more touchdowns passes in six seasons, joining Brett Favre (9), Peyton Manning (9) and Drew Brees (7).

Brady needs 88 yards passing this week to reach 4,000 passing yards for the eighth time in his career and join Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (9) as the only players with eight 4,000-yard passing seasons.

The Patriots and Texans met in the 2012 postseason in an AFC Divisional playoff game that was won by the Patriots, 41-28, on Jan. 13, 2013, at Gillette Stadium.
The Patriots only loss against Houston was in the final game of the 2009 regular season, when Houston defeated the Patriots, 34-27. The Patriots had already clinched the division prior to that game and Tom Brady was relieved for portions of that game by then backup QB Brian Hoyer.
Before the Texans joined the league, the Patriots and the Houston Oilers were foes dating back to the days of the American Football League, playing twice a year from 1960-69 and 33 times overall before the Oilers moved to Tennessee following the 1996 season.

The New England Patriots needed another big second half in a 34-31 victory over the Houston Texans at Reliant Stadium. Tom Brady threw for 371 yards and two touchdowns and K Stephen Gostkowski made two 53-yard field goals in the fourth quarter as the Patriots were able to rally for the win.

The Patriots trailed by 10 points at halftime and the lead changed five times in the second half. After falling behind 17-7 at halftime, the Patriots scored on five-of-six secondO-half drives to secure their 13th straight winning record with their ninth win of the year.

TE Rob Gronkowski caught six passes for 127 yards, and WR Julian Edelman added nine receptions for 101 yards.

Brady connected with Gronkowski on a 50-yard pass to get to the Houston 13 -yard line on the first series of the second half. That helped the Patriots get in position for a 1-yard touchdown run by FB James Develin to cut the lead to 17-14. After stopping Houston on the next series, Brady picked apart the Houston secondary on a drive that included a 17-yard pass to WR Danny Amendola and a 25 -yard pass to Edelman before culminating the drive with a 9-yard touchdown pass to RB Shane Vereen to put the Patriots in front 21-17.

Houston recaptured the lead on the next series when QB Case Keenum threw a 28-yard completion to WR Andre Johnson and a 17-yarder to TE Garrett Graham before finishing the 10-play, 81-yard drive with a 5 -yard touchdown run that made it 24-21 heading into the final quarter of play.

The first three drives of the fourth quarter resulted in scores. The Patriots began the scoring by culminating a 9-play, 81-yard drive with a 7 -yard touchdown run by RB LeGarrette Blount for a 28-24 lead. Houston then answered with a scoring drive that was set up by a 66-yard pass from Keenum to WR DeAndre Hopkins that put the Texans in position for a 10-yard touchdown run by RB Ben Tate for a 31-28 Houston lead. New England answered that drive with a 9-play, 40-yard drive that resulted in a 53-yard field goal by Gostkowski to tie the game at 31

After stopping the Texans on the next series, a 17-yard pass from Brady to Gronkowski helped get in position for Gostkowski's game-winning 53-yard field goal with 3:12 to play. It was the second straight week that Gostkowski drilled a game-winning field goal to give the Patriots the win.

Tate, who finished with 102 yards and three touchdowns, got Houston on the scoreboard first when he finished a 5-play, 52-yard drive with an 8-yard score. Houston CB Johnathan Joseph picked off a Brady pass on the next series, leading to a Houston field goal and a 10-0 first quarter lead.

Brady led the Patriots on a 55-yard drive and finished the drive with a 23yard touchdown pass to Gronkowski late in the first quarter to make it 10-7

Houston extended its lead in the second quarter when Tate scored his second touchdown on a 20-yard run.

For the second time in 2013, the Patriots did not commit a penalty in a game. The Patriots were penalty free at Cincinnati on Oct. 6.

The Philadelphia Eagles scored on a blocked punt that was returned 24 yards for a touchdown, returned an interception 99 yards for a touchdown and returned a punt 83 yards for a touchdown on three straight scoring plays and held on for a 35-28 victory at Gillette stadium.

Philadelphia built up a 35-14 lead in the fourth quarter before the Patriots came storming back. QB Tom Brady, who finished with 312 yards and three passing touchdowns, led the Patriots on two scoring drives to make it 35-28. LB Jamie Collins forced a fumble that was recovered by DL Malcom Brown on the next possession to allow the Patriots to take over at their own 25-yard line with 1:02 left. Brady converted a third-and-10, but three straight drops sealed the Philadelphia victory.

After a scoreless first quarter, New England took a 14-0 lead with two straight 80-yard touchdown drives. Brady finished a 10-play, 80-yard drive with a 4-yard touchdown pass to RB James White. Then on the next offensive series, an 11-yard touchdown pass from Brady to WR Danny Amendola culminated an eight-play, 80-yard drive.

Philadelphia scored the next 35 points - two on special teams, one on defense and two on offense. Philadelphia's first touchdown was set up after the Patriots chose to have DB Nate Ebner drop kick the kickoff to an open spot, allowing the Eagles to start a drive at their on 41-yard line to spark a a 59-yard drive that ended with a 5-yard touchdown pass from QB Sam Bradford to TE Zach Ertz to make it 14-7.

New England got the ball back with 1:32 left to play in the first half, but were forced to punt from their own 38-yard line with 15 seconds to play. Eagles S Chris Maragos blocked P Ryan Allen's punt and LB Najee Goode recovered the loose ball for a 24-yard touchdown to tie the game at 14 at the half.

Early in the third quarter, Brady led the Patriots to the Philadelphia 5-yard line but had a pass intercepted by $S$ Malcolm Jenkins, who returned the pick 99 yards for a touchdown and a 21-14 lead. After being stopped on the ensuing possession, RB Darren Sproles returned Allen's punt 83 yards for a touchdown for 28-14 lead.

Philadelphia added to their lead on their first possession of the fourth quarter when Bradford engineered a 12-play, 80-yard drive that ended with a 10yard touchdown pass to WR Jordan Matthews for a 35-14 lead.

After Brady's 14-yard touchdown to TE Scott Chandler made it 35-21 in the fourth quarter, K Stepehen Gostkowski executed an onside kick that was recovered by DB Rashaan Melvin at the New England 44-yard line. The Patriots marched down the field where Brady scored on a 1-yard run to make it 35-28. The Patriots failed on a second onside kick but were able to get the ball back with just over a minute to play following Collins' forced fumble.

The Patriots have now lost back-to-back games for the first time since the 2012 season.

Despite the loss, White shined for the Patriots, with 10 receptions for 115 yards, his first career 100-yard receiving game.

## SUccessful onsipe Kick

The Patriots executed a successful onside kick in the fourth quarter after scoring to cut the Eagles' lead to 35-21, setting up a scoring drive that ended in a 1-yard touchdown run by Tom Brady to cut the Philadelphia lead to $35-28$ with 3:00 left. Rashaan Melvin pounced on the loose ball after Stephen Gostkowski's kickoff hit an Eagles player. The onside kick recovery was the second of the season for New England, having also recovered an onside kick vs. Washington on Nov. 8, 2015. For Gostkowski, it was the third successful onside kick of his career, having also had a successful onside kick against the Cleveland Browns on Dec. 8, 2013.

Tom Brady moved out of a tie with Dan Marino for sole possession of third place on the NFL's all-time touchdown list with 421 career scoring passes after throwing a 4-yard touchdown pass to RB James White in the second quarter. Brady now stands alone in third place on the NFL's all-time list.

## ANOTHER BOO-YARD PASSING DAY

Tom Brady finished the game with 312 passing yards for his 71st career 300yard game and the seventh 300-yard game of the 2015 season. Only Peyton Manning (93) and Drew Brees (92) have more 300-yard games than Brady. The Patriots are 59-12 in Brady's 71 career 300-yard games. Brady had five 300-yard games in 2014 and his personal single-season record is 11 in 2011. Drew Brees has the league record with 13 300-yard games in 2011.

*Brady is in his 16th season with the Patriots, tying former Patriots QB Steve Grogan [1975-90] for most seaons with the Patriots.
*Brady became the fourth NFL player to ever reach 400 career touchdown passes on a second quarter TD pass vs. Jacksonville [9/27/15].

* Brady [31] reached 30 touchdown passes in 2015, to become just the fourth player in NFL history with at least 30 or more touchdown passes in six seasons.
*If Brady $[3,912$ ) reaches 4,000 passing yards in 2015, he will be just the third player in NFL history with at least eight 4,000-yard passing seasons.
*Brady has now played in 221 career games with the Patriots, moving past Bruce Armstrong [212] for most games played in Patriots history. He has started in 219 games and moved past Armstrong [212] for most starts in Patriots history.

## TEAM NOTES



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 22nd season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft

announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles [14], conference crowns [7] and Super Bowl championships (4) than any other NFL team. Super Bowl XLIX was the seventh Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 21 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 16 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

## DIVISION RIVALS

The New England Patriots and Houston Oilers, who moved to Tennessee in 1997, shared an intense rivalry as original members of the AFL's Eastern Division. Here's what Patriots Hall of Famer Gino Cappelletti had to say about the rivalry:
"The rivalry with Houston matched that with Buffalo," said Cappelletti. "They were in the eastern division with us ... It did not benefit the Patriots because Houston was the best team. They won the championship in 1960 and played for it again in 1961. They came out of the chute strong. George Blanda, after 10 years in the NFL, joined Houston because he knew their coach. Blanda was able to help them recruit some of the best players such as Billy Cannon and Charlie Hennigan, a lot of NFL guys."
"When I made the transition into becoming a receiver it took place between the time we first played the Oilers and the final game of the year when we played the Oilers again down in Houston. I started the game at receiver in the final game and I always like to brag that I came out of the game with the highest average per catch of the year with a 28 -yard average. I had one catch for 28 yards. It was meaningful for me and established my potential for the next coming year. [Patriots head coach] Lou Saban told me that when I come back you will have to make it as a receiver."

A little more than one week later, the Patriots selected Cannon in the fifth round [138th overall] of the draft with the knowledge of his illness. Cannon was activated to the 53 -man roster later that year and is now in his fifth season with the team. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL - covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender - he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to four straight Pro Bowls (2011-14) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the fifth straight season in 2015.

The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by The Boston Globe. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERCENCE WAS SPECIAL
Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there - fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box - but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

"Guys have really bought into what we're trying to do here and believing in the goals that we've set to accomplish. We try not to acknowledge all the noise and hype surrounding ballgames. We prepare ourselves to have success by the way we work day-in and day-out on the field and in the meeting room, but it definitely starts with our leadership on this team."

That's what he's kind of done as a teammate here. He's come in here and accepted his role and did a pretty good job as a rookie."

DL Chandler Jones blocked a second-quarter Minnesota (9/14/14] 48yard field goal attempt, recovered the loose ball and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown. The Super Bowl Champion defensive end enjoys engaging his fans because he remembers a time when he was the one cheering from a distance.
"I feel like it was just yesterday when I was one of those fans," Jones said to ESPN's Mike Reis. "I didn't have access to an NFL team, but I was the guy that was on Twitter that was like, 'Oh my God, he tweeted me' or 'He shouted me out.' I was that person. So for me to have an opportunity to do that to people, I try to do that whenever I can. You see fans out there, they're sitting in the rain, they're sitting in the heat, sweating, they're drenched, and they're just yelling your name the whole practice. The least I can do is go over there and say hi and take some selfies and sign a few things. I love it. It's great."

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK
Chandler Jones was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance in the Patriots' 30-7 victory at Minnesota on Sept. 14, 2014. It was the first time in Jones' career that he has received an AFC Player of the Week honor. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for November last season and NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month in September 2012.

Jones blocked a 48-yard field goal attempt and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown to give New England a 24-7 halttime lead at Minnesota (9/14). He also finished the game with eight total tackles and his fifth career two-sack game.

The last time the Patriots earned an AFC Defensive Player of the Week honor was Week 10 of the 2011 season when Andre Carter tied a team record with four sacks at N.Y. Jets [11/13/11].

Sheard, who is typically soft-spoken around the microphones, was very excited to express his admiration for McGinest following the veteran linebacker's induction to the Patriots Hall of Fame on August 5.
"That's a guy that I watch film on still to this day," Sheard said to the Boston Globe. "How he used to rush, how he'd attack, how he was relentless. It's amazing to be out here with him. The heart he had, that dog. He would get after the quarterback, get after the run. He was so into the team, whatever they asked him to do, he would do it."

It makes sense that Sheard would feel a connection to McGinest, given the players' similarities. Before coming to New England as a defensive lineman, Sheard played outside linebacker for Cleveland in Mike Pettine's hybrid 3-4 system. By adding Sheard to his roster, Bill Belichick brings flexibility and, hopefully some of that McGinest magic, back to the Patriots front seven.

\section*{HISTORIC SCORING CLIP}

The Patriots had a historic scoring output over a three-game span in October and November 2014. New England tied a team record by scoring 40 or more points in three consecutive games from Oct. 26 to Nov. 16. The Patriots also scored 40 or more in three straight games in 2007. The Patriots have scored 40 or more points 62 times in team history, including 35 times since Bill Belichick became head coach in 2000, and 19 times since 2010.

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014 to turn a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. The Patriots came back from a 24 -point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34 31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, \(38-23\), vs. Seattle \((9 / 16 / 84)\). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, \(23-22\) [12/21/96]. The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo \([1 / 1 / 12]\).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS
The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times in their 55-year history. Sixteen of those playoff berths have come in the 21 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 17 division crowns, including 12 in the last 14 seasons, and have qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1976, 1985, 1994 and 1998). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.
