

After defeating the Houston Texans 30-0 in the AFC Wild Card round, the Kansas City Chiefs now travel to Foxborough, Mass. to take on the defending Super Bowl Champion New England Patriots at Gillette Stadium. Kickoff is slated for 3:35 p.m. CT.

For the second time in three seasons under Head Coach Andy Reid, the Kansas City Chiefs are competing in postseason play. Last week's shutout was the club's first shutout in postseason history and first playoff win since Jan. 16, 1994.

Kansas City became only the second team in NFL history to make the playoffs after starting 1-5, joining the 1970 Bengals (KC was the first team to do so and win a playoff game). The Chiefs finished the regular season 5-1 in division play and 10-2 against AFC opponents. In the club's 10-game win streak to end the season, the team averaged 27.8 points per game and allowed a league best of only 12.8 points per game. KC outscored its opponents 278-128 in its last 10 games (+150 point differential).

Offensively, QB Alex Smith finished tied for the league lead among QBs to start all 16 games with only seven interceptions this season (min. 300 attempts, tied QB Tom Brady). He went 312 pass attempts without being picked off, the second-longest streak in NFL history behind Brady (358). The Chiefs finished second in the NFL to Carolina (+20) in turnover differential with 29 takeaways and only 15 giveaways (+14). Kansas City's defense tied with Arizona for the league lead in scoring with six returned touchdowns (four INTs, two fumbles). The club's special teams and defense were critical in average starting field position. The Chiefs led the league in that category, averaging the 31.3 yard line. KC's opponents are averaging only the 24.6 yard line (third in the NFL). KC had 22 interceptions this season, the second-highest mark in the league behind the Panthers (24).

Reid is currently in his third season with the club and has recorded 31 regular season wins, the most victories by a head coach in team history in his first three seasons. He has qualified for the postseason 11 times (including 2015) in 17 seasons as a head coach. KC has a number of playmakers including wide receiver Jeremy Maclin, who eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving mark. He led the team with 87 catches for 1,088 yards (12.5 avg.) with eight touchdowns. Tight end Travis Kelce was second on that list with 72 catches for 875 yards (12.2 avg.) and five TDs. Chiefs quarterback Alex Smith had a career high 3,486 passing yards on 307 completions. Defensively, linebacker Derrick Johnson led the team with 116 tackles (95 solo). Linebacker Justin Houston had 7.5 sacks, two INTs, one INT return TD and nine tackles for loss. LB Tamba Hali had 6.5 sacks. Rookie CB Marcus Peters had eight INTs with two TD returns. On special teams, K Cairo Santos was 30 of 37 on field goal attempts (81.1%). RB Nile Davis had returned 24 kickoffs for 603 yards (25.1 avg.).

DID YOU KNOW?

Chiefs QB Alex Smith can be as dangerous with his legs as he is with his arm. In 2015, Smith rushed 84 times for 498 yards (5.9 ypc), an average of 31.1 yards per game. He finished the season ranked third among QBs in the NFL with 30 first down rushes behind only Cam Newton (56) and Russell Wilson (31). He had 17 rushes of 10+ yards in regular season play.

CHIEFS HEAD COACH ANDY REID



Reid is currently in his 24th NFL season and third with the Chiefs. In his first three seasons with the club he has tallied 31 wins, more victories than any other head coach in franchise history in his first three years. Under Reid, the Chiefs have made the playoffs two of his three seasons and won its first playoff game since 1994 last weekend vs. the

Texans. In 2013, Reid led the Chiefs to an 11-5 record marking the greatest single-season turnaround in franchise history.

Reid boasts a career record of 161-110-1 (.594) in the regular season. He also owns a 11-10 postseason record. He ranks 13th in NFL history in regular-season winning percentage and is one of eight active NFL coaches with over 100 regular season wins. Prior to joining the Chiefs, Reid led the Philadelphia Eagles to a 130-93-1 (.583) regular season record during his 14 seasons as head coach. He led the Eagles franchise to one Super Bowl appearance. When you include his time as an NFL assistant coach, his teams have made the playoffs 18 times including 2015 (19-15 record), and he has coached in three Super Bowls and eight NFC Championships.

Reid spent seven seasons as an assistant coach with the Green Bay Packers under Head Coach Mike Holmgren. Prior to joining the NFL ranks, Reid's final collegiate stop was the University of Missouri (1989-91). Prior to his stint with the Tigers, Reid spent two years working with the offensive line at the University of Texas – El Paso, and before that, he held the same position with Northern Arizona. In 1983, Reid took the position of offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at San Francisco State (1983-85).

A tackle/guard at Brigham Young University from 1979-81, Reid entered the coaching ranks as a graduate assistant at BYU in 1982.

PATRIOTS HEAD COACH BILL BELICHICK



The longest-tenured head coach currently in the NFL, Bill Belichick is in his 16th season leading the New England Patriots and his 21st year as an NFL head coach.

Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl championships in a four-year span.

Additionally, he leads all active coaches and currently sits alone in fourth place all-time with 245 total victories as a head coach.

Belichick most recently passed Hall of Famer Curly Lambeau on the NFL wins list and his winning percentage of .664 ranks third in NFL history among coaches with 150 or more wins, trailing only George Halas (.682) and Don Shula (.666).

In 16 seasons, Belichick has delivered four Super Bowl championships, six conference titles and 12 division titles.

Serving on the staffs of the Baltimore Colts, Detroit Lions, New York Giants, Cleveland Browns, New York Jets and the New England Patriots, Belichick is currently in his 41st year coaching in the NFL.

Bill Belichick was born in April 1952 in Nashville, Tenn. Belichick grew up in Annapolis, Md. His father, Steve, played fullback for the Detroit Lions in 1941. He was inducted into the Annapolis High School Hall of Fame.

BIG DIFFERENTIAL

Since the game versus Pittsburgh on Oct. 25, the Chiefs tallied a point differential of +150 in their 10-game winning streak to close out the season. That led the NFL during that timespan.

CHIEFS WIN FIRST POSTSEASON GAME IN 22 SEASONS: Saturday's 30-0 win over the Houston Texans snaps an eight-game playoff game losing streak spanning 22 seasons. The Chiefs last postseason win was also in Houston as Kansas City beat the Oilers 28-20 in an AFC Divisional Round matchup.

The Chiefs extend their winning streak to 11 games after entering the playoffs on a 10-game streak.

CHIEFS SHUTOUT TEXANS: The Chiefs held the Texans scoreless marking the first time in franchise history the club has shut out an opponent during postseason action. The last time a team was shutout in an AFC Wild Card game was when the New York Jets beat the Indianapolis Colts 41-0 on Jan. 4, 2003.



DAVIS LONGEST KICKOFF RETURN NFL HISTORY: RB Nile Davis returned the opening kickoff 106 yards, marking the longest kickoff return in NFL AFC Wild Card postseason history and the second longest in overall NFL postseason history. Baltimore Ravens WR Jacoby Jones returned a kickoff 108 yards in Super Bowl XLVII. Davis' kickoff return is the first kickoff return touchdown in postseason action since Seattle WR Percy Harvin's 87-yard kickoff return in Super Bowl XLVIII.





POSTSEASON CAPTAINS

After rotating a group of three different captains for each regular season game — one player representative from each of the offensive, defensive and special teams groups — Head Coach Andy Reid named six players as postseason captains following a team vote. Two offensive, two defensive and two special teams players were elected to serve as postseason captains, starting with the AFC Wild Card Game at Houston on January 9, 2016.

Offensively, QB Alex Smith and WR Jeremy Maclin were voted captains. Smith is a two-time postseason captain for the Chiefs after being selected during the 2013 postseason. Maclin earned a captain's patch in his first postseason with the Chiefs.

Defensively, LB Derrick Johnson and S Eric Berry were voted captains. Both Johnson and Berry are three-time postseason captains, each earning the honor during the 2010, 2013 and 2015 postseasons.

On special teams, P Dustin Colquitt and S Daniel Sorensen were voted captains. Colquitt is a three-time postseason captain, earning the nod after the 2010, 2013 and 2015 seasons. Sorensen earned a spot in his second year with the club.



CHIEFS POSTSEASON STORYLINES

- Kansas City's 30-0 win in the AFC Wild Card Game at Houston is the first postseason victory for the Chiefs since Kansas City beat the Houston Oilers in an AFC Divisional Game on Jan. 16, 1994.
- Kansas City's 30 points are the fourth-most points in a postseason game in franchise history (44, 31 and 31) and are the second-most points in a postseason win in team annals (31).
- The 30-0 final marked the first time in franchise history that the Chiefs shut out an opponent in the postseason. In the Super Bowl era, Saturday's AFC Wild Card Game goes down as the fifth-largest shutout in NFL history. It was the 26th playoff game to be decided by 30 or more points and was just the 20th shutout in NFL postseason history (since 1966). It marks the first playoff game shutout since a 23-0 Carolina Panthers win over the New York Giants in the 2005 postseason.
- Kansas City's +30 point differential is the highest margin of victory in Chiefs history. The next highest margin of victory in the postseason is +24, a 31-7 win in the 1966 AFL Championship Game against the Buffalo Bills.
- Fifteen of the club's 22 non-Super Bowl postseason games have come on the road, with the first five non-Super Bowl postseason games all on the road, while the two most-recent playoff contests have been away games for the Chiefs.
- Andy Reid becomes the third head coach in Kansas City Chiefs history to win a postseason contest, joining Pro Football Hall of Fame Coach Hank Stram and Marty Schottenheimer.
- Reid has now coached in 21 career postseason contests and has an 11-10 record in those games. Only Tom Landry, Don Shula, Bill Belichick, Joe Gibbs, Mike Holmgren, Chuck Noll and Bud Grant coached in more.
- Reid's 11 postseason victories ties him for ninth all-time in NFL history behind Belichick, Landry, Shula, Gibbs, Noll, Holmgren, Bill Cowher and Tom Coughlin. His 11 wins are tied with Marv Levy, Bill Parcells and Dan Reeves.

Rookie **DL Rakeem Nunez-Roches** was drafted by the Chiefs in the sixth round (217th overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft. Offensive Line

In 2015, the Chiefs started nine different offensive line combinations, involving eight offensive linemen. Four of which (T Eric Fisher, OL Jeff Allen, OL Zach Fulton and OL Donald Stephenson) have started at multiple positions, including Fulton proving his versatility starting at three different positions – C, RG and LG.

HE'S BACK!



On Nov. 24, 2014, a cancerous mass was found inside the chest of Chiefs safety Eric Berry. Shortly after, he was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Lymphoma at the age of 25. On July 28, 2015, only 247 days later, he reported to Chiefs training camp cancer-free and was on the practice field day one. Here is what Eric had to say about his journey:

• "I would first like to start off by saying thank God. I'm truly blessed to come out of this situation, truly blessed to have such a wonderful supporting cast. My support system just took care of me, starting off with my parents, my friends, family and everybody. From my coaching staff, the whole Chiefs Kingdom, Vol Nation, my home back in Atlanta – Fairburn, Georgia. I mean it has just been great. This experience has been a roller coaster, but I wouldn't change it for the world."

• "You can't look too far ahead because I did that in the beginning and I ended up crying to my dad about thirty minutes at breakfast because it was a long road. It was tough. It was a battle every day. I mean it came to a point where I had to set goals to just get out of bed."

• "Whatever you learn in football it carries right over to life and it is vice-versa, so the things that you learn in life you carry onto the football field. So I just tried to use all those experiences and everything that I have gone through in the past on and off the field and all of my experiences, I just tried to use it to get through this."

• "I felt like the whole NFL family came together. And that did a lot for me. Just to see them get together for a good cause and just to motivate me and show that they were thinking about me before big games and things like that. It meant a lot."

• From Eric Berry's father, James Berry: "We got back together and it was like the old father-son bond that we used to have when he was staying at home," James explained. "We got to watch TV together and we got to go to the store together. We got to stay up late and eat snacks together, and just talk about father-son type of stuff. It's crazy because we like the same type of movies and shows. To me, that time was a defining moment—that he'll always be your little boy. You'll always be there for him and you'll always be his father."

• "I'm a lot more wise. I analyze things before I just go into them and the list is so long. Overall, I'm more wise and I understand and embrace the process. Everything is a process. It doesn't happen over night. Everything is preparation – don't overlook anything. Coach (Andy Reid) always talks about eliminating distractions and I would like to thank you guys for respecting me not wanting to do interviews or doing things like that, but I wanted to eliminate the distractions and focus on what I needed to focus on. **Fear nothing, attack everything.** That's how I kind of did the things."

• On returning to Arrowhead: "All those emotions and things that come along with the game, you get it just riding through the parking lot. You have to be a Kansas City Chief to understand how that feels. Like I said, everyone is grilling out, having a good time. The kids are out there with jerseys on throwing the football. But every time you come through it's like they know when the players come and they stop and they wave and they just give so many words of encouragement on the way to the stadium, it's almost like a pre-game pep talk. So just seeing those guys out there does a lot for me emotionally."

THE QUICK STORY OF THE 2015 CHIEFS

- The Chiefs tallied an 11-5 record in 2015. After starting the season 1-5, Kansas City won 10 games in a row and captured the No. 5 seed in the AFC playoffs.
- With 11 wins in 2013, nine in 2014, and 11 in 2015, Coach Reid's 31 victories are the most among Chiefs head coaches in franchise history in their first three years in KC.
- LB Derrick Johnson broke the club's all-time tackle record in Week Three at Green Bay, passing former Chiefs LB Gary Spani's record of 999 tackles.
- Rookie cornerback Marcus Peters was outstanding in 2015, ranking fourth on the team in tackles, setting a Chiefs record with 26 passes defended as well as intercepting eight passes - including the first pass he saw in his NFL career - and returning two interceptions for touchdowns.
- The Chiefs swept all three road games in the division (at Denver, at San Diego, at Oakland) for the first time since the 1995 season, when the club went 4-0 with Seattle in the AFC West.
- QB Alex Smith went from the third quarter in Week Three to the second quarter in Week 14 without throwing an interception. Smith's 312 pass attempts during that time rank second in NFL history.
- Chiefs safety Eric Berry was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Lymphoma following a Week 12 game in 2014 versus the Raiders. Berry was deemed cancer free on June 22, 2015, only eight months later. Berry has returned to the team without missing a beat. The defensive leader is third on the team in tackles while recording two interceptions on the season.
- LB Derrick Johnson has returned from a torn Achilles suffered in the first game of the 2014 season to lead the team in tackles in 2015 with 116.
- After RB Jamaal Charles tore his ACL on Oct. 11 vs. Chicago, running backs Charcandrick West and Spencer Ware stepped in. West and Ware combined for 1,256 total yards from scrimmage and 11 touchdowns this season.
- The Chiefs had five Pro Bowlers voted to the NFL's all-star game in 2015: S Eric Berry, LBs Justin Houston and Tamba Hali, TE Travis Kelce and CB Marcus Peters.

JUSTIN HOUSTON SIGNS LONG-TERM DEAL

On July 15, the final day for franchise players to sign a long-term contract with their club, the Chiefs and Justin Houston agreed on a long-term contract. Here is what Chiefs GM John Dorsey had to say:

"We were able to reach an agreement with Justin and his agent, Joel Segal, to keep him here in Kansas City for the foreseeable future. He's one of the top players in the National Football League and a premier pass rusher. As we've said from the beginning, Justin the football player, and the person, is someone we wanted to be a part of our organization. We are very happy that he will remain a member of the Chiefs."



CHIEFS ADD WR JEREMY MACLIN

On March 11, 2015, the Chiefs announced the club had signed free agent wide receiver Jeremy Maclin. He played four years under Chiefs Head Coach Andy Reid in Philadelphia from 2009-12.

Maclin has played in 90 games (88 starts) in six NFL seasons. His career numbers include 430 receptions for 5,859 yards (13.6 avg.) with 44 touchdowns. Maclin's most productive season came in 2014 as he earned a trip to the Pro Bowl after tallying 85 catches for 1,318 yards (15.5 avg.) with 10 touchdowns. He has had over 50 receptions in each of his six active seasons. Maclin finished 2015 with 87 receptions for 1,088 yards (12.5 avg.) and eight touchdowns. Maclin originally entered the NFL as a first-round draft pick (19th overall) of the Eagles in the 2009 NFL Draft.



JOHNSON & DEVITO RETURN

Chiefs linebacker Derrick Johnson and defensive lineman Mike DeVito suffered season-ending Achilles injuries in Week One of the 2014 regular season. The injuries occurred eight plays apart. Both are healthy and returning for the 2015 season.

Johnson and DeVito spent all of last season rehabbing together and sharing a similar journey. Below is what each had to say about going through the process together:

"Every time we walk by each other, we're giving each other high fives, man," said Johnson, an inside linebacker who turns 33 in November. "It's been a long road for us. We've been talking about this day since we got hurt."

"Mike DeVito was a guy I depended on a lot, even before the injury," Johnson said. "He's the guy that kept the big guys off of me. To have a guy of that caliber to actually be in and out of rehab with me every single day ... I got even closer with him."

"(Rehab) became our battle — football was over and now it was about getting back," DeVito said. "To do that by yourself ... I heard you guys talking to DJ about retirement. I think I would have considered retirement if I would have had to go through that by myself."

"We were brothers before, but we really built that bond even more so. You don't really know the person you're with when you face adversity with them, so it was awesome. I don't know if I would have made it to this point right now if it wasn't for working with DJ."

NEW ERA BRINGS BIG TURNAROUND

The Chiefs won two games in 2012, but the Andy Reid and John Dorsey era has quickly turned things around in Kansas City. Winning seasons in 2013 and 2014 gave the Chiefs 20 total wins over their first two seasons. Since 1984, that is the third-best turnaround in back-to-back seasons following a two-win or less season total. Only Indianapolis (2011-13) and the New York Jets (1996-98) have more wins in their next two seasons following a two-win total or less.

2015 DRAFT ADDITIONS

CB Marcus Peters was selected by Kansas City with the 18th overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft. The former Washington Husky recorded 11 interceptions, returning one for a touchdown, over his three-year playing career. Peters opened his NFL career intercepting the first pass he saw and followed up his debut with a 55-yard pick-six in his second game. Peters finished 2015 fourth on the Chiefs in tackles, with 60, and tied for first in the NFL with eight interceptions. Additionally, Peters set the Chiefs rookie record with 26 passes defensed. In Week 15 at Baltimore, Peters became just the second Chiefs rookie with two interception return touchdowns in a season.

C Mitch Morse begins his NFL career as the Chiefs second round pick after starting 39 games in his time at the University of Missouri, including every game he played in his last three seasons. By starting in Week One, Morse became the first Chiefs rookie center to start in Week One of his rookie season since 1961. Morse started 15 games at center in his rookie campaign.

WR Chris Conley was one of the most athletic prospects in the 2015 Draft. Conley's athleticism stood out to the Chiefs, who traded two picks to move up in the draft to select the 6-3 receiver. As a rookie, Conley started three games and compiled 17 receptions for 199 yards and one TD, in addition to four special teams tackles.

CB Steven Nelson played in 25 games (21 starts) over his two-year career at Oregon State, recording 122 total tackles along with eight interceptions. Nelson's first two college seasons were spent at College of the Sequoias where he compiled six interceptions as a freshman and sophomore. In 2015, Nelson played in 12 games, recording one tackle and seven special teams tackles.

LB Ramik Wilson was the 118th overall selection in the 2015 NFL Draft. Wilson recorded 253 tackles (138 solo), 6.0 sacks and two forced fumbles during his four-year college career. Wilson played in 10 games as a rookie, including two starts, recording 20 tackles. Wilson recovered a fumble in the end zone in Week Five vs. Chicago.

LB D.J. Alexander became the second Oregon State Beaver drafted by the Chiefs in 2015. Alexander tallied 209 tackles (120 solo), with 8.5 sacks (62.0 yards), in his four college seasons. In his first NFL season, Alexander had two defensive tackles and led the Chiefs with 11 special teams tackles, in addition to blocking an Oakland punt for a safety in Week 17.

TE James O'Shaughnessy (IR) was an All-Missouri Valley Football Conference Second-Team selection following the 2014 season. O'Shaughnessy hauled in 67 passes over his four-year college career, totaling 1,170 yards and 14 touchdowns. In 2015, O'Shaughnessy hauled in six passes during his rookie campaign before being placed on IR with a foot injury.

DL Rakeem Nunez-Roches played in 31 games with 24 starts at Southern Miss. He was a first-team All-Conference USA selection after a senior year in which he recorded 58 total tackles (32 solo), 3.0 sacks and seven quarterback pressures. Nunez-Roches recorded four tackles in seven games in his NFL career.

WR Da'Ron Brown (Practice Squad) led his Northern Illinois offense in every major receiving category as a senior in 2014. Brown had 68 catches for 1,065 yards and six touchdowns, which earned him a Second-Team All-MAC selection. Brown finished his time at Northern Illinois with 155 receptions for 2,295 yards and 19 touchdowns.

KEY OFFSEASON ACQUISITIONS

WR Jeremy Maclin signed with Kansas City in the offseason, reuniting him with Head Coach Andy Reid, who originally drafted Maclin when Reid was the Head Coach/Executive VP of Football Operations for the Eagles. Maclin's Kansas City career began by hauling in 87 passes for 1,088 yards and eight TDs. Maclin became the first Chiefs player with 1,000 receiving yards in a season since 2011. Additionally, Maclin's 87 receptions set a Chiefs single-season record for receptions by a wide receiver.

G Ben Grubbs was acquired via trade from New Orleans on March 12. Grubbs has seen action in 129 total games since being drafted by Baltimore in the first round of the 2007 NFL Draft. Grubbs made the Pro Bowl in 2011 and 2013. Grubbs started seven games for the Chiefs in 2015 before being placed on IR.

S Tyvon Branch joined the Chiefs after spending his first seven seasons in Oakland. Branch recorded 40 total tackles, four passes defensed and one sack in his first season in KC. In Week 13 vs. his former team, Branch intercepted a Derek Carr pass and returned it 38 yards for a touchdown.

DB Ron Parker was re-signed by the Chiefs after a career year in 2014. Parker had a great season in 2015, where he is second on the Chiefs with 78 total tackles in addition to two interceptions, 12 passes defensed, six tackles for loss and 5.0 sacks.

In his first three seasons as head coach of the Chiefs, Andy Reid coached his team to a 31-17 record in the first 48 games. His 64.6 winning percentage is the top mark in franchise history for any coach in his first three seasons leading the club. Marty Schottenheimer is second on that list, leading his Chiefs teams to a 29-18-1 (61.5%) record in his first three seasons.

REID CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Career record of 161-110-1 in the regular season, as well as a 11-10 postseason record. Reid's 172 combined wins rank 15th in NFL history. Reid ranks fourth among active coaches in regular season and postseason wins. He has defeated all 32 NFL teams as a head coach.
- His 31 wins in his first three seasons with Kansas City are more than any other head coach in franchise history in their initial three seasons.
- The 2013 Chiefs, led by Head Coach Andy Reid, orchestrated the greatest single-season turnaround in franchise history after an 11-5 finish. In 2012, the team finished 2-14, a +9 turnaround in his first season with the club.
- During Reid's 14 seasons in Philadelphia, his teams made the postseason nine times, which ranked third in the NFL behind Indianapolis' 12 and New England's 10. With the Chiefs in 2013, Reid made his 10th trip to the postseason. 2015 will be his 11th trip.

- Mentored future Hall of Fame quarterback Brett Favre while with the Packers along with QB Donovan McNabb with the Eagles.

ASSISTANT COACHES WHO PLAYED FOR REID

The following Chiefs assistant coaches played for Head Coach Andy Reid during his time in either Green Bay or Philadelphia.

Offensive Coord. Doug Pederson: From 1996-98, played quarterback for both Andy Reid and General Manager John Dorsey while Reid was an assistant coach in Green Bay and Dorsey was a college scout (1996) and later the director of college scouting (1997-98). Pederson played in Philadelphia while Reid was the head coach in 1999; he started nine games for the Eagles in 1999, throwing for 1,276 yards and seven touchdowns.

Running Backs Coach Eric Bieniemy: Running back in Philadelphia under Reid in 1999, returning 10 kickoffs for 210 yards. Finished his career with 1,589 rushing yards in 142 career games.

Asst. Offensive Line Coach Eugene Chung: Experienced time in Philadelphia as an offensive lineman under Reid in 2000. Chung was the 13th overall pick in the 1992 NFL Draft by New England.

Defensive Asst./Secondary Coach Al Harris: Cornerback played under Reid for the Eagles from 1999-2002. In his four years with Reid, Harris recorded seven interceptions to go with 99 total tackles and 48 pass deflections. Harris' stint in Green Bay was with Chiefs GM John Dorsey.

DORSEY'S CAREER QUICK HITS

- John Dorsey was named the sixth general manager in Kansas City Chiefs history on January 14, 2013. Dorsey enters his third season as an NFL general manager and his 25th year as a player personnel member.
- Most recently served as Director of Football Operations for the Green Bay Packers (2012). Before being promoted to that post, Dorsey served 12 years as the Packers' Director of College Scouting (2000-11).
- A player for the Packers during the 1980s, Dorsey oversaw the college portion of Green Bay's scouting operations and was also actively involved in the area of pro personnel throughout his tenure.
- It was during his time as a college scout and eventually as Director of College Scouting that Dorsey began his association with Chiefs Head Coach Andy Reid, who served as the Packers tight ends/assistant offensive line coach (1992-96) and quarterbacks coach (1997-98).
- Worked alongside multiple Green Bay Packers General Managers including Ron Wolf and Ted Thompson.
- In his first three seasons with the Chiefs, he and Head Coach Andy Reid won 31 games. They orchestrated the greatest single-season turnaround in franchise history in 2013 with an 11-5 record. The club finished just 2-14 the previous year, a +9 turnaround.
- Has two Super Bowl rings, three NFC Championships and helped earn 10 division titles over his career.

THE FIRST LADY OF FOOTBALL

Norma Hunt continues to play an integral part of the Chiefs in Kansas City. She owns the distinction of being the only woman known to have attended all 49 Super Bowls and was selected to preside over the coin toss at Super Bowl XLI along with Pro Football Hall of Fame quarterback Dan Marino. She is involved in numerous philanthropic and civic efforts in Kansas City and Texas. Her late husband, Lamar Hunt, was the guiding force behind the formation of the Kansas City Chiefs and the American Football League and was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1972. He, with the help of his family, coined the term "Super Bowl."

Hunt, along with her daughter-in-law Tavia Hunt (wife of current Chiefs Chairman & CEO Clark Hunt), participate in the NFL Women's Apparel advertising campaigns. 

PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAMER EMMITT THOMAS

Pro Football Hall of Fame Cornerback Emmitt Thomas is in his sixth season as defensive backs coach with the Kansas City Chiefs. Thomas works alongside former NFL Cornerback Al Harris, who joined the Chiefs as a defensive assistant/secondary coach in 2013.

One of the best defenders in Chiefs history, Thomas finished his career with 58 interceptions – a Chiefs record – as well as five defensive touchdowns in 181 games, all with Kansas City. Thomas holds the Chiefs record for interception return yardage with 938 yards.

Thomas was a member of the Chiefs Super Bowl IV Championship squad and was elected to the Chiefs Hall of Fame in 1986 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2008.

On Monday, Sept. 29, 2014, Kansas City defeated the New England Patriots 41-14, and Chiefs fans set a Guinness World Record for Loudest Crowd Roar at a Sports Stadium (Outdoors). Chiefs fans reached a peak decibel reading of 142.2 as Guinness World Records adjudicator Philip Robertson monitored the sound levels. The mark was set early in the contest while the club was on defense. The Arrowhead Stadium record passed the old record of 137.5 decibels and broke Seattle's record of 137.6.

Eric's unique hashtag, #BerryWPMOYChallenge, was used more than 94,000 times.



Noah Sanchez, 15, has had a life that has been anything but ordinary for a typical Shawnee Mission North High School freshman.

"He's been through more in his lifetime than most adults will go through in theirs," Alex Sanchez, Noah's father, said.

Noah is a participant in Camp Quality and a survivor of a cancerous brain tumor, one that required chemotherapy, radiation and surgeries in order to remove and save his life. As a result of all the treatment, Noah has dealt with numerous side effects that have occasionally found him singled out among his fellow classmates.

When the Chiefs Ambassadors heard about this, they decided to take a visit to Shawnee Mission North to conduct an impromptu school assembly.

The former Chiefs even provided a jersey for Sanchez. This led to a student standing ovation for Noah.

"Our kids have a great amount of admiration and respect for [Noah]," said Annette Gonzales, one of three associate Shawnee Mission North principals. "I thought that it was just awesome. Having the Chiefs here and the message that they provided not only for Noah and telling him about how great he is overcoming perseverance, but an incredible message for all of our kids to hear. Noah prides himself on overcoming obstacles and working hard, having a great work ethic, persevering, having that passion and drive and [Tim Grunhard] already said it. That's our school and he represents not only just our school well, but also the Chiefs Ambassadors."

Alex couldn't believe the reaction of both Noah and his fellow classmates.

"It was absolutely amazing—it's a father's dream come true," he said. "When they heard about [Noah's] story and hear about what he's been through and is still going through, it's pretty amazing. And then when they get to know him and realize he's a very gentle, quiet, very caring individual, that really just takes it over the top. The way the guys and all the Ambassadors, and Chiefs organization is completely behind him, is amazing."

One of the charities of choice for the Ambassadors, Camp Quality is a volunteer driven, volunteer run and community funded non-profit organization that provides free camping experiences and year-round support programs for children with cancer, and their families.

Camp Quality Greater Kansas City's programs are focused to care for the emotional needs of children with cancer and their families. 

Travis Kelce chasing Tony Gonzalez by studying his game

ST. JOSEPH, Mo. -- Tight end Travis Kelce is just getting started in his pursuit of Tony Gonzalez. Kelce had a nice debut season for the Kansas City Chiefs last year, leading them in catches with 67 and yards with 862.

He still has miles to go to catch or surpass Gonzalez, the all-time NFL leader in catches, yards and touchdowns for a tight end. Gonzalez did much of that work in his 12 seasons for the Chiefs (he also played five seasons with the Atlanta Falcons).

In order to get there, Kelce spent part of his offseason studying him on film.

"That guy was an athletic guru," Kelce said. "He was head over heels more athletic than anybody else on the field. Half the stuff he did was based off his supreme athleticism, but he was a fundamental technician in the run blocking.

"You could tell he understood defenses just from how he played, where his eyes were, where his awareness was on the field. Half the time what we do out here on the field as tight ends is predicated on the defense."

Kelce's debut season was far superior to Gonzalez's rookie season of 1997. Gonzalez caught 33 passes for 368 yards, less than half of Kelce's 2014 numbers.

Gonzalez took off from there, though. He had 59 catches his next season and never had fewer than 71 receptions for the Chiefs after that.

To similarly improve his game, Kelce turned into something of a film critic during the offseason. He watched not only Gonzalez, but any tight end performing his craft.

"I can't watch football by watching the teams go up and down the field," Kelce said. "Every time I turn on a football game, whether it's college or whether it's professional, I'm kind of just locked in

like a magnet to the tight end. I watch his fundamentals, what he does, how he attacks zones. You constantly get better by watching film."

Whether all this pays off when the season begins remains to be seen. But it certainly can't hurt that Kelce appears to be a serious student of the game. Alex Smith indicated during the offseason that Kelce would frequent the quarterback meetings, suggesting changes to routes based off what a defense was doing and then calling for the ball at the line of scrimmage during practice.

"My main focus going into training camp was to understand the intentions of the play call," Kelce said. "I want to understand what Alex is thinking. I want to understand why Coach [Andy] Reid is calling certain plays versus certain coverages and in certain situations. I want to mentally put it all together and become a team player.

"I want to be the best football player I can for this team. Obviously, I want to catch as many passes as I can. I want to go out there and be the best tight end in the league. That can all happen this year as long as I go out there with a lot of focus and a lot of passion."

Instincts, passion help Chiefs' Marcus Peters make immediate impact

The young cornerback scanned the receiver's body, looking for a tell. And the moment Demaryius Thomas planted off his inside foot and drove to the sideline, Marcus Peters broke.

Fifty-five yards later, Peters — who correctly anticipated a Peyton Manning hot route with a blitz in his face — was frantically high-stepping into the end zone with the football and posing as his new teammates swarmed him.

It was, to be sure, what Peters hoped the NFL would be like after the Chiefs invested the 18th overall pick in him during year's NFL Draft.

"Like Eric Berry says, you have to live your dreams out, and my dream was to come to the NFL and to make my presence be felt and to be welcomed by my teammates by my play," Peters said. "Not by just the words I speak, (but) by me going out there and proving myself."

Through two games, Peters has done just that. He is tied for the team lead in tackles with 12, and while quarterbacks have not been afraid to attack him, he has risen to the challenge as he's already started generating some early buzz for defensive rookie of the year.

According to Pro Football Focus, Peters has yielded 14 receptions on 27 targets — a very respectable 51.9 catch percentage — and is far and away the team's leader pass breakups with seven, as no one else has more than three (Jamell Fleming).

What's more, with his two interceptions — he also picked off Houston quarterback Brian Hoyer in week one — Peters has given the Chiefs a dash of playmaking in the secondary they desperately lacked a year ago, when they finished tied for last in the league with a paltry six interceptions.

"He can play — he can flat out play," safety Husain Abdullah said. "It's going to be a joy to watch him as the season progresses and as he starts to pick up even more than he already knows. He can play."

Peters cares, too, as Abdullah found out after he let a bobbled interception slip through his fingers in the fourth quarter Thursday. Peters was right there, hugging him during the near-pick and encouraging him afterward with a fiery look in his eyes.

It was one of many times Peters has worn his emotion on his sleeve during the Chiefs' first two games, as he could constantly be seen yelling and strutting and, as Chiefs coach Andy Reid puts it, letting his personality show.

In that way, it's like a light-switch flipped on since training camp, when Peters was impressive but not demonstrative.

"He's a competitive kid," Reid said. "I mentioned this before — you have to have a short memory when you're out on the edge there. You also have to have talent, that helps, and he's got both."

That much was apparent in camp, at least to his teammates.

"That's one of the first things I picked up on, his football IQ," said fellow cornerback Sean Smith, who is suspended for the Chiefs' first three games because of his DUI arrest in June 2014. "You've got some guys who are used to playing in a certain system, or played only in the boundary and they're a little limited on their learning curve."

"But he came out here, (and) you try to coach him up on something and you see he's already on the same page as you. Right now, if (he's working on) anything, it's all technical. This hand, this step (in coverage), this alignment. But as far as recognizing or anything mental, he's straight."

This is not a shock to the Chiefs' front office. General manager John Dorsey said Peters' natural feel for the position was one of the reasons the Chiefs were intrigued by a corner who was dismissed from his college team (Washington) in November after several clashes with a new coaching staff and who didn't tear up the NFL Combine.

"He plays the game with his eyes, (and) the good ones play with the eyes," Dorsey said. "From the corner position, he can actually read and mirror routes of the receiver, and I think that's a good thing."

“And then he has the fluid, athletic hips to turn, run and change directions. Then he can run support, he’s a square tackler, and he’s got good ball skills.”

Peters has shown all of that thus far, but he credits his football-loving family — his dad is a high school coach and he lived across the street from his high school field — for helping cultivate an institutional knowledge of the game that allows him to always be around the ball.

“It’s paying attention to the small details, how many steps they take in their routes,” Peters said. “It’s just something that gradually grows on you, and for me, it just comes from being around the game of football a lot.

“Like I said, I’ve got my pops, he’s an offensive coordinator. So dealing with him a lot, you’ve got to scheme things. Even if we’re playing Madden at the house and stuff like that, it all translates back to the field.”

Peters says that his innate football IQ is the reason he’s been able to make such a quick transition to the NFL.

“I think that’s where people get lost in it, man — it’s still ball,” Peters said. “You’ve got to go out there and line up with 10 other guys and you’ve got to go make a play. If it comes down to you making the play on that down (by) eliminating your man, you did your job and the defense is ahead.”

By that definition, Peters is doing his job more often than not. And even when he hasn’t, Reid is pleased with Peters’ ability to stay focused and bounce back.

“He’s able to learn from his mistakes and then come right back at it and challenge you again,” Reid said. “He did that, even with that last third-and-9 play that Thomas caught (on the game-tying drive), it was contested and he was right there on top of it and the kid made a good play on him. He wasn’t shying away against one of the better receivers in the league.”

That competitiveness will come in handy down the road. Peters’ start has been electrifying — Reid even confirmed Peters was an “energy-giver,” which is the type of player he looks for — but he knows there are 14 games remaining, and teams have even more tape on him to attack.

“He’s done a very nice job and he’s been a pleasure to be around,” Reid said. “He works hard, and again, his challenge will just be not on that (effort) front, but he’s young in the business, so people will study him and then he’s got to keep answering the bell every week.”

Peters, for his part, seems to understand that for as well as he’s played, the purpose is to win. When asked after Thursday’s 31-24 loss how it felt to record his first career pick-six off Manning, Peters didn’t take the bait.

“It feels good, but it stings too bad,” Peters said. “It’s a team game, and as a team, we took a tough loss. All the individual accolades we can make, I leave them on the field without the W.”

Chiefs' running back Charcandrick West has overcome plenty on his path to the NFL

Jamaal Charles' replacement stepped to the microphone, the camera lights shining in his face.

This was the first time Charcandrick West had been brought to the daily media session at the Chiefs' practice facility, and it was the latest sign that he has come a very long way in a short amount of time.

You'd have a hard time finding a player in the Chiefs' locker room who is happier to be here than West, a running back who has gone from undrafted free agent to practice-squad player to NFL starter in just 17 months. None of this good fortune is lost on him, which explains in part why he is always quick to smile, always quick to laugh, and always eager to entertain.

"Yeah, he would definitely be an energy-giver," Chiefs coach Andy Reid said, employing one of his favorite terms of endearment to describe West, a 24-year-old out of Abilene Christian. "He works his tail off, he's humble as can be and he's a good kid all the way around."

Toward the end of West's first media-room experience, he was asked about the origin of his unique first name. He turned toward the reporter and grinned.

"How many Charcandricks do you know in the world?" he responded to chuckles. "I like it; it's different. I'm probably the only Charcandrick in the world. It's nice to be something."

Asked if he ever queried his parents as to why they would give him such a unique name, West broke into what his stepfather, Toccara Ford, calls "that million-dollar smile. "No," he said, "I was trying to learn how to spell it."

The room erupted into laughter.

"That's one of his special features; that's him," Ford said later. "He's got a big heart. One day he told me, 'I wish everybody could be happy and get along.' I told him, 'Well, everybody you come in contact with, just bring their day up,' and he has. He's a special kid."

A self-described "goofy" dude, West is upbeat for a reason. A number of factors — a high school illness that threatened his football career, for instance, and the recent death of a beloved mentor — have converged to make him someone who is truly grateful to step into an NFL locker room every day.

"My road to get here is not like a typical one," West said. "I didn't get drafted. I started at one school, had to go to another one. I had a lot of situations where I could have just gave up, but I just stuck with it and followed my dreams."

West does not cut an imposing figure. At 5 feet 10 and 205 pounds, he's one of the smallest players on the team, a fact that explains his nickname among teammates: "Tidget," a mash-up of "tall" and "midget."

Those who know West best call him "Moosey," a nickname given to him by his maternal grandmother.

"Because he was such a big boy at birth," West's mother, Demetrice Ford, said. "She said he looked like a big moose. He was an 8-pound, 10-ounce boy."

Demetrice said West's first name is derived from his biological father's name. But when he was growing up in Cullen, La., it was Ford, West's stepdad, and Ford's best friend Dante' Coleman who helped cultivate Charcandrick's passion for football.

"After my mom got married to my stepdad, they started a little pee-wee football team," said West, who used to dream of being a major-league shortstop. "My mom wouldn't let me play before that, but once (Ford) came along, they worked with me, got me into football, and it turns out I was pretty good at it."

West's first team was the Cowboys, named after Coleman's favorite NFL team, and they went undefeated two years in a row. West was a star running back, but his two mentors never let him get a big head.

"We saw he had a special talent, so Dante' used to be on him so hard," Toccara Ford said. "He'd be his biggest critic. What everybody else saw was a great game, Dante' could always find the thing he could have done better, because the guy knew football. Together, we'd always bring him back to earth."

People used to think Ford was crazy when he trailed West on his bike as the youngster jogged through the neighborhood, or when they'd spend hours playing the "pushup game," where they'd catch 100 balls a day and do 10 pushups per drop.

But the process taught West the benefits of hard work; it was during these sessions that Coleman taught West to be mentally tough.

"He knew how to drive me; he knew how to get to me," West said.

Coleman was also someone West could go to whenever he needed to talk.

"With a kid, it takes a village, and sometimes you have to come at them in different ways," Toccara Ford said. "Sometimes I'd tell Moosey something, then ask Dante' to tell him the same thing, and that would be the thing that made him listen. He was more of a guardian angel for him."

When West got to Springhill High School in Louisiana, he continued to star on the football field. But his identity as a football player would soon be threatened by the toughest test of his young life.

One morning in November 2006, West woke up with a fever, stiffness in his joints and a rash. It appeared out of nowhere; he'd even played a football game the day before — he was the rare freshman on the varsity squad — and scored three touchdowns.

West's parents took him to a hospital in Shreveport, La., but when doctors couldn't figure out what was wrong with him, he ended up at Arkansas Children's Hospital in Little Rock, where he was bedridden for 21 days.

During that time, West lost a lot of weight — he says he dropped from 185 pounds to nearly 120 — and battled a fever. There were times he felt like giving up, especially after he absorbed the one-two punch of not hearing from his biological father's side of the family and being told by doctors that he might never play football again.

West's mother, Demetrice, had always been a tough woman, and she refused to let her baby give up on life at age 14. She'd make him get up and stay active, whether by bathing himself or simply standing outside.

"He laid there and cried and didn't want to go anymore," Demetrice Ford said. "And I said, 'Son, you're lying here, and God put you here for a reason. This is not the end.'"

Ford, meanwhile, stewed over the reality that his stepson might never play football again. It infuriated him as much as it demoralized his son.

"Charcandrick was the one that had to be there with me and keep me strong," he said. "Moosey was my Superman. He was just so tough, and for him to be down like that was tough for me."

Eventually, West got better — doctors never could explain why, or what had come over him — and he was allowed to go home. He gained his weight back in time for track season the following spring ... but then he got sick all over again.

At that point, the Fords consulted a specialist in Shreveport, who diagnosed West with juvenile rheumatoid arthritis, an illness that can lead to complications and treatment-related side effects that can contribute to premature death.

But the family finally had a plan of attack, and West — who began taking injections and medication — has been fine ever since. He returned to the football field for his junior year, and he did well enough to earn scholarship offers from Arkansas and Louisiana State. Both schools wanted him as a cornerback, but West believed his future was at a running back, so he opted for Louisiana Tech.

He'd never enroll there, however: His efforts to make himself academically qualified in time for the 2010 season fell short. So West opted to enroll at Abilene Christian, then a Division II program. He starred at the Texas school, scoring 35 touchdowns and rushing for more than 2,000 yards as a three-year starter. He was signed by the Chiefs as an undrafted free agent in May 2014.

When the Chiefs saw enough in West to keep him on their practice squad for the 2014 season, his entire village beamed with pride. Among the most proud was Coleman, West's old mentor, who'd been having serious back problems and had started to lose a lot of weight.

"Dante' was the type of person where if something was wrong, you'd never know," West said. "He wouldn't take off work unless it was for a football game."

Constantly in pain, Coleman nevertheless made plans to accompany West's parents to the Chiefs' season opener in Houston last month, provided Charcandrick made the team.

"He was proud to say, 'Hey, I was a part of that,'" Toccara Ford said.

One morning this summer, West snapped awake at the sound of his phone buzzing. It was 6 a.m. on July 21, and his mother was calling him. He thought this was odd; he always called her in the morning, not the other way around.

When West answered, his mother was crying. Dante' is dead, she said. He'd awakened that morning feeling hot, and after he was taken to the emergency room, his heart stopped beating. He was only 35.

"She told me, and I didn't believe it until the next day, really," said West, who was training in Dallas at the time. "So I went home and just dealt with the situation. You don't understand how tough it was. I mean, he was a guy that put the football in my hands."

West placed his No. 35 Chiefs game jersey in Dante's casket during the funeral. When the Chiefs opened training camp a short time later, he reported with a heavy heart. He quietly decided to dedicate this season to his lifelong friend and mentor, which also meant playing each snap like it was his last.

"He said he was going to use that as his fuel," Toccara said. "He learned in dealing with Dante' that tomorrow isn't promised, so you have to take advantage of your time while you're here. Make your mark, seize the day."

West quickly emerged as one of the breakout stars of training camp. His pass-catching skills helped him stand out among the backup runners, and his enthusiasm for football and drive to get better — cultivated back home by Ford and Coleman — caught the eye of his coaches.

West impressed them enough to hold onto his job as the team's top personal protector on punt coverage, and the team was confident enough in him to part ways with veteran backup Cyrus Gray, a former special-teams captain and favorite of assistant coach Dave Toub.

"He's tough, tough as nails," Toub said of West during training camp. "He will stick his face in there on any-sized guy. He's an ankle-biter and a tackler. He gets in there and is a real good tackler, real good, solid blocker as a personal protector, and he is smart and knows our stuff."

West made the Chiefs' 53-man roster out of training camp, and when his old college number — 26 — became available before the season, he considered switching to it until he realized that his current number, 35, matched Coleman's age when he died.

"It was a sign," West said.

West still thinks about Coleman often. In his weekly game plans, he sometimes scribbles the words "I got you," to let Coleman know he's thinking about him. Every night, he prays and asks Coleman to watch over him.

"Dante' was more of a guardian angel for Moosey," Toccara said. "And he still is."

Things have broken West's way since he dedicated this season to his departed friend and mentor. Starting in week three, West usurped Knile Davis, a third-round pick in 2013, as the Chiefs' second-string back, and he has gotten the lion's share of the work ever since.

During last Sunday's 18-17 loss to the Chicago Bears, West received a majority of the snaps when Charles went down. His parents were in attendance, as were Coleman's wife and two kids.

"Me actually being able to play some and them seeing that, with his son and daughter here ... I'm doing it for him, honestly," West said.

On their way home from the game, Toccare and Demetrice talked about the changes they've noticed in their son. He's stronger, more serious, than he used to be.

"Especially since the Dante' stuff," Demetrice said. "He takes life in a different perspective now. He'd always want to be silly and goofy and joking around, but he's not doing a whole lot of that anymore. He's become a real man now."

If pressure of being a starting NFL running back is getting to West, he isn't showing it. He's still lighting up rooms wherever he goes, with a positive energy that Reid hopes will extend to the football field on Sunday in Minneapolis, where the 1-4 Chiefs will try to save their season on the road against the Vikings.

It is the opportunity of a lifetime for West, and he is treating it with the respect it deserves. He plans on going 100 mph Sunday, because if there's anything he learned from his high school illness and Coleman's death, it's that tomorrow isn't promised.

"Just to wake up every morning, it's something to be happy about," West said. "We all know life brings problems, but you've just got to stay happy."

"Dante' would be proud I never gave up ... I know he's up there watching over me. He's got a big part to do with all of this."

The long journey of Justin Houston, one of the NFL's great mysteries

Let's start with the fire. The day Justin Houston lost everything began like any other lazy Saturday at the two-bedroom house on Garfield Street in Statesboro, Ga. It was Oct. 25, 2003. Justin was in the ninth grade. That afternoon his mother, Kimberly, left him in charge of two younger brothers, and he sat them on her bed to watch cartoons so he could dial up a love interest.

Then the phone went dead.

Justin walked out of the bedroom. The door nearest to the den, as he remembers it, was engulfed in flames, with smoke billowing from underneath the frame. He panicked and ran onto the front lawn in his T-shirt and gym shorts, only to realize he had left the boys, Tylen and Aaron, inside. He turned around. "I couldn't see nothing," Houston says, "only smoke. It was dark inside. If I didn't know that house, I would have been in trouble. We'd been there for years. I could run through that house with my eyes closed."

So he did. Justin sprinted back inside, fighting through the smoke and flames, and found his brothers, who were too scared to move. He shepherded them outside. The clothes on their backs were the family's only possessions that didn't burn.

According to the Statesboro fire department incident report for case No. 23089, an alarm sounded at the station at 3:19 p.m. Firefighters could see the smoke from the firehouse, a mile-and-a-half away. They arrived at 129 Garfield Street four minutes later and, as they later noted, "found the structure completely involved." As in, completely on fire. They twice asked for additional personnel; it took eight firefighters more than two hours to extinguish the blaze. The report concludes, "The residence is a complete loss."

That record does not list a cause for the fire, but it finds that no "human factors" contributed. Houston says his family believes the blaze resulted from "some old wires in the ceiling" that sparked near the water heater on a wall in the other bedroom. The report estimates the damage at \$45,000 for the residence and \$15,000 for everything inside.

Afterward local churches helped feed and clothe the Houstons while they found another place to live. The family of 10—besides Justin, Tylen and Aaron, Kimberly has nine other children, six of whom lived with her at the time—eventually settled into a house about 30 minutes outside of town. Statesboro High and its football teams helped as well, according to one of Houston's childhood friends, Jon Knox. But little was said about Justin's heroics.

That's the thing about Houston, the Chiefs linebacker who in July signed a new six-year, \$101 million contract. "He rescued those little boys," says Knox, yet he didn't seek any praise. He doesn't share that story with many outsiders. His teammates say they've never heard it.

Houston says he never told them.

Ask any Kansas City player about Justin Houston and be ready for the look. Eyes downcast. Brow furrowed.

REPORTER: [Justin and I] talked for an hour.

DEE FORD, CHIEFS LINEBACKER: Really?

REPORTER: I don't think the casual sports fan knows anything about him.

FORD: That's exactly right.

REPORTER: Is he different in [the locker room]?

FORD: Justin is Justin, man.

REPORTER: What does that mean?

FORD: That's a Justin thing. That's between God and Justin.

There should be a website called Justin Houston Facts, a hub for learning about one of the NFL's great mysteries. Of note: Houston is married to a lawyer ... has a three-year-old son ... is expecting a daughter ... loves his Air Jordans ... bears a scar on his chest from a cyst he had removed as a child ... has a tattoo near the scar that says ONLY GOD CAN JUDGE ME. He's a 6'3", 260-pound All-Pro with 52.5 sacks in 59 starts, but the only place he wants to stand out is on the football field.

In a world of needs-no-introduction athletes, here's a star who requires one. Even Houston's mentor, fellow outside linebacker Tamba Hali, concedes, "Outside of football, we don't hang out that much."

Houston enters a conference room at the Chiefs' practice facility and folds his large frame into an office chair that wobbles under his bulk. ESPN's morning blabfest First Take plays on the television on the wall, but Houston pays no attention. He doesn't even look.

The first question lobbed his way is the same, always. Why don't people know anything about you? "I don't want the spotlight," he says. "I see how other guys do it, and I know how I would like to do things."

Which is to say, the opposite. Late in the fourth quarter of his final outing last year, against the Chargers, Houston notched his fourth sack of the game and 22nd of the season. He stood half a takedown away from the NFL's single-season record, Michael Strahan's 22.5 in 2001, but he was asked to drop into coverage on the last play of the game. He never complained, never begged for the chance to make history, an opportunity he might never have again.

Houston says he doesn't see himself as famous. "This is my job, just like you have a job," he says. "The only difference: They put my job on TV." (Never mind the autographs, bank accounts, 62,000 Twitter followers.... Other than those little things, no difference.)

“We’re all human,” Houston says. “Some guys, when they do interviews, it’s all about them. Some guys, every single thing they do is all about them. I have a big family, so I’m used to everything not being all about me.”

Country. That’s how Houston describes his hometown, a city of roughly 30,000, some 30 minutes from the Georgia–South Carolina border. “Like if you’re driving in from Atlanta or Augusta, you just see cornfields,” he says. “That type of country.”

Statesboro is known for its university, Georgia Southern, and the fields of cotton, peanuts and corn that spread for miles outside the city limits. People go there to retire, Knox says, or they simply never leave. They hunt and farm, and they watch and play sports. The vibe is overalls and tractors. “It’s big enough that you can have some of the city opportunities, but small enough that you can hide and nobody knows where you are,” says Steve Pennington, Statesboro High’s football coach.

Houston is a football warrior raised by women. His maternal grandmother, Linda Houston, worked three jobs, house-sitting during the day and pulling night duty at a nursing home. She rarely slept more than three hours at a time, often in a chair. Justin’s mother had no steady male influence to lean on. She was strict. She wanted her kids home by 6 p.m. and in bed around nine. She wanted her rules followed without exception. “The whippings I got,” Houston says, “I appreciate them now.”

His brother Demetrius, eight years older, was the nearest thing he had to a father figure. Demetrius pushed Justin into everything from sports to street fights. He demanded toughness. “He didn’t believe in raising no chumps,” Justin says of the second-oldest in his family.

Justin is the family’s sixth oldest—smack in the middle—but an outlier when it comes to size. He’s larger than any of his siblings, including his twin brother, Jared, who was born a minute later. That mass was evident early on in hands that looked like oven mitts and in feet so big that Justin’s brothers and sisters called him Flipper.

On Garfield Street, Justin recalls a life without privacy, a bathroom that never seemed free, a house that never went quiet. The siblings spent all their time together; the kids played hide-and-seek and video games and deemed the person with the most losses the Scrub of the Night.

Justin, despite his bulk, played point guard on the Statesboro High basketball team, bringing the ball up the floor. “That joker was a mini-LeBron James,” says Pennington. “He was the best 6’3”, 215-pound point guard you’re ever going to see. He could have played some college ball on the hardwood.”

In his other sport, Houston started by wanting to emulate Emmitt Smith and Barry Sanders, to run away from contact rather than seek it. But from seventh grade, when he first played the sport, he was a defensive end—and from the first blow he delivered, he hit more like a man than a teenager. High school teammates called him Big Tomb, for the savage blows he delivered.

But Houston had not fully grown into his frame, so he wasn’t heavily recruited until after a state semifinal his junior year. That game, played at the Georgia Dome, pitted Statesboro against Griffin High and its future NFL running back, Bobby Rainey. Griffin ran away from Houston all day, but he stalked its backs across the field, and Rainey averaged only three yards a carry. Statesboro forced a fumble two yards from its end zone and made several fourth-down stops to win 7–0. The next weekend Houston and his teammates secured the state title. “Justin went

from being this big dude, great athlete, to being basically the Incredible Hulk,” says Knox, a safety on that team.

Urban Meyer, then at Florida, offered Houston a scholarship, but Houston wanted to stay closer to his family. Then Georgia coach Mark Richt paid a visit.

Houston followed Knox to Athens, a three-hour drive from Statesboro. They shared an apartment with two other Bulldogs, and that marked Houston’s first adjustment to life away from home: There was too much space. He’d never had his own room before. “[At Georgia] we had to share a bathroom,” he says, “but that was nothing.”

He struggled that first year getting to classes on time (or at all), red-shirted, played sparingly as a freshman and was suspended for two games his sophomore season for violating team rules. He sometimes coasted during games, coaches say, relying on natural ability over technique.

Houston had gained 40-odd pounds by the time Todd Grantham was hired as Georgia’s defensive coordinator in March 2010, before Houston’s junior season. Grantham switched the Bulldogs to the 3–4 scheme the Dallas Cowboys had run when he was their D-line coach, from ’08 through ’09. He scoured his new roster for a collegiate version of DeMarcus Ware—whom he’d watched rack up 31 sacks during Grantham’s time in Dallas—and saw Houston, big for an outside ’backer by college standards but typically sized for the pros. “I’ll be honest,” says Grantham, “I thought he was as explosive, or more explosive, than DeMarcus.”

Houston welcomed the switch away from 4–3 defensive end. He still rushed the quarterback about 85% of the time, but now he did so from a more comfortable standing start, and he exploded even faster. Every morning he settled behind Grantham’s desk, typed in the password his coach had given him and studied film—Ware and the Cowboys—until it was time for class. Whereas most NFL rush defenders relied on either speed or power, Houston saw Ware blending the two, making him one of the most feared defenders in the NFL.

That winter, after ESPN draft analyst Mel Kiper Jr. tabbed Houston as college football’s top 3–4 ’backer prospect and the heir to Ware’s throne (Houston had 67 tackles, 10 sacks and 18.5 tackles for loss in 2010), Houston, citing his family’s needs, declared for the NFL draft. At the combine he wowed scouts with 30 bench-press reps at 225 pounds, a 36.5-inch vertical leap and a 10’5” broad jump.

Richt would later say that Houston reminded him of another former Bulldog, receiver A.J. Green, in that he was both private and supremely gifted. But he was also, it appeared, still maturing. Houston tested positive for marijuana at the combine. That, paired with college tape that showed him at less than full effort (which Grantham admits was a problem at Georgia), sent Houston tumbling into the third round.

Scott Pioli, the Chiefs’ general manager at the time, called up Grantham, who alleviated his concerns. Neither of them agreed with ESPN analyst Jon Gruden, who labeled Houston “the most disappointing guy I studied.”

“I knew I had put myself in a bad situation,” Houston says of having fallen all the way to the 70th pick (one spot before the Cowboys nabbed DeMarco Murray). “At that point, I just wanted to get after it.”

This summer, two years after John Dorsey replaced Pioli as the Chiefs' GM, Dorsey retreated to his vacation home in Door County, Wis. The cabin has no cellphone reception, so each morning Dorsey drove his white Ford Expedition north to Fish Creek and turned up a hill to the highest point in town, the Nelson Shopping Center. There he parked behind a hardware store and resumed negotiating a contract extension with Houston's agents. Each session lasted upward of three hours. "I had some moments," says Dorsey, "where I assumed [the store owners] must think I'm staking out the joint."

In mid-July the two parties reached an agreement that guaranteed Houston more money (\$52.5 million) than any defensive player not named Ndamukong Suh. Those millions reflect the name of the hardware store where Dorsey parked each morning: True Value. In the opinion of Chiefs coach Andy Reid, Houston "was the best in the business last year."

It's difficult for anyone other than Houston to understate his impact. Consider the Chiefs' Week 2 game against the Broncos, which Kansas City lost only after Denver returned a late fumble for a TD. Houston sacked quarterback Peyton Manning twice, batted down a pass and disrupted three other throws. He set the edge against the Broncos' running game, and Denver gained only 61 yards on 22 carries. Houston rushed from the left and the right, from outside against tackles and inside against guards, even from the same side as Hali. "The most underrated part of Justin's game is how much he does," says Chiefs defensive coordinator Bob Sutton. "Unless you watch him play every game, you can't appreciate that."

That versatility is the result of continual growth. Early on, Houston asked so many questions of Hali, five years his elder, that the veteran 'backer finally said, "I'm telling you too much; you can't have all my secrets." Hali did, however, teach Houston the importance of using his hands to gain leverage on opposing linemen. He adjusted Houston's stance, having him put more weight on his back foot in order to better explode off his front. Together they practiced the footwork required to drop into pass coverage. Says Hali, "Justin was more like a sponge than any other guy I've been around."

Houston's personality, his skill set and his versatility coalesced into a perfect fit for Kansas City. Chiefs fans are rabidly supportive but usually leave him alone when he dines out or hits the mall. He's like them in that he defends one smoked-ribs joint above all others; in his case Jack Stack Barbecue. And in the Chiefs' locker room—maybe the least flashy space in the glorified world of pro football—he's found teammates with similar mind-sets, who respect his space and privacy.

Last season Kansas City suffered severely from injuries and health problems, starting with the Week 1 loss of two team leaders to IR and culminating in the Week 13 departure of All-Pro safety Eric Berry, Houston's best friend on the team, for lymphoma treatments. (The Chiefs, according to Football Outsiders, had the NFL's sixth-worst injury situation in 2014.) Houston visited Berry at the hospital roughly a dozen times (more than any other Kansas City player, according to various teammates), and in the end—reluctantly but at Reid's request—he stepped into the leadership void.

The Chiefs closed out 2014 with two wins in their last three games, finishing 9–7 but falling just short of the playoffs. After their finale, a 19-7 victory over the Chargers, Houston stepped before his teammates. He talked about the season and about Berry and about the potential that still

needed to be realized, and he committed to a playoff push in '15. (Although the Chiefs have stumbled to a 1–4 start, they're past the toughest portion of their schedule; their remaining opponents were a combined 23-28 through Sunday.) “It stayed with me the entire off-season,” Dorsey says of Houston’s appeal. “It was that sincere. That heartfelt. That real.”

Minutes after autographing his new contract on July 15, Houston settled on his first purchase. He didn't buy anything that might be considered stereotypical or lavish for a multimillionaire athlete. Instead he spent a few hundred dollars on the only thing he really wanted: a plane ticket back to Georgia.

News of the deal’s consummation had reached Houston near the end of yet another workout. He finished 45 minutes of abdominal torture, flew from Atlanta to Kansas City, tried to sleep, failed, drove to team headquarters, passed a physical and signed a stack of papers an inch thick. Next stop: the airport, for a return trip. On board he turned his head away from his fellow passengers, focusing on the farms spread below the window. Even if his tears were joyful, he didn't want anyone to see them.

After landing he pointed his car southeast, toward Statesboro. He cranked the volume on the stereo, sang out loud and drummed the steering wheel with both hands as he lost himself in the moment. (His second purchase: a speeding ticket.)

Three hours later he pulled into his mother’s driveway and met her and his grandmother at the door. They didn’t talk for 10, maybe 20 minutes; they just hugged and cried. Then they retreated to the garage and told stories for hours: stories about siblings and sports and the ultimate middle child.

Houston is now known in Georgia and Missouri and, to some extent, across the country. Yet only a handful of people really know much about him. On the way to one of his sacks against the Broncos, TV cameras captured his face. He was smiling. And that better summarizes his thoughts on the 2015 season than anything he could say. Or would say.

His siblings are older now, deep into their own lives. Demetrius owns a barbershop in Statesboro. Another brother runs a cleaning business. One sister is going back to school to get her master’s degree. Others are in high school or college. The youngest Houston is in eighth grade. Justin gives them all the same gift each Christmas: new shoes.

As he wrapped up his visit, he hugged his mother and grandmother one last time and shared a final surprise that he’d saved for the end. He had purchased two plots of land next to each other

In Statesboro, and there he planned to build a house for each of the women: marble kitchens, hardwood floors, everything designed to their specifications—whatever they want.

That gesture will say what Houston cannot express in words. He will replace what his family lost. He will show how far they’ve come.

Emmitt Thomas predicts greatness for Chiefs rookie CB Marcus Peters

KANSAS CITY, Mo. – The Chiefs ranked last in the NFL with six interceptions last season.

This season, the Chiefs already have eight picks through eight games, and three of those picks have come from emerging star Marcus Peters, the cornerback the team drafted 18th overall in May.

Peters started the season on an eye-popping note, intercepting two passes and logging seven passes defended in the first two games.

His first pick, against the Houston Texans, came on the first play of his NFL career. The next week, facing the rival Denver Broncos and an all-time great at quarterback in Peyton Manning, Peters snagged a pick and returned it 55 yards for a score. His third interception came against the Minnesota Vikings in Week 6.

“He’s a good football player, and I’m glad we got him,” Chiefs defensive backs coach Emmitt Thomas said. “In the future, he’s going to be one of the better ones in the league.”

Thomas would know about greatness as a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, and he likes what he sees from Peters not only on game days but on practice days as well.

“The ball skills came with him,” Thomas said. “That’s something that’s an innate ability, but the thing ... that is really impressive is the way he practices. He practices like it’s a game, and it’s a carryover into the game.”

Numerous attributes of Peters make Thomas optimistic about the career the young cornerback has in front of him, but the player’s enthusiasm for the game is the first one the coach mentions.

“That’s the thing that you really gauge a young man on, is that he enjoys practice, so consequently he enjoys playing the game,” Thomas said, “and [every] day we practice out there, he practices like it’s a game, which is very exciting to see.”

At the midway point of the season, Peters is tied for third in the league with three interceptions and 11 passes defended. Thomas does not talk about the cornerback's numbers, however, but rather the forces behind them.

"His enthusiasm for the game, his instincts, his work habits," Thomas said. "He really understands the game, he loves to compete, and he's got excellent ball skills."

Chiefs coach Andy Reid will not say he is surprised by the production of Peters thus far; neither will he praise that performance with too much gusto. On both counts, however, the coach projects positivity about what is ahead.

"Listen, we felt he was the best corner in that draft," Reid said. "Is he learning every week? Did he have a couple plays there that [he'd] like to have back? Yeah. But the one thing he does, he's got a short memory, which you've got to have at that position, and he's going to keep bringing it at you, and he's got a good attitude that goes along with that."

"He's feisty," Reid added. "Very, very competitive."

The Kansas City defense looked sharp Sunday against the hapless Detroit Lions, whom the Chiefs defeated 45-10 in London. They racked up six sacks and two picks. Detroit's only touchdown came in the fourth quarter.

Thomas was pleased at how the defensive backs performed, and he credited another unit for enabling them to do their jobs better.

"They played real well, especially going over there and working hard and kept focus," Thomas said of the pass rush. "We've always said as a defensive secondary that the pressure's the thing that makes us, and we have two excellent rushers outside, and we're getting some pressure up inside."

With the obvious benefit of great defensive players around him, including linebackers Tamba Hali and Justin Houston on that fearsome pass rush, Peters has handled the transition from college to pro quite well on the field.

Like any player and particularly any rookie, however, he still has areas in which he can improve, and he has already made some strides.

“Training his eyes is probably the best improvement I’ve seen him make,” Thomas said. “Got to get him to catch the flash a little bit better, but other than that he’s doing well.”

Thomas said Peters needs to work on staying focused all the way through each play on his coverage.

“He’ll have a guy [covered] and then he’ll lean off trying to go somewhere else and help someone else,” Thomas said, “but as far as his movement skills, ball skills, his intelligence, it’s all there.”

Chiefs' Duvernay-Tardif juggles med school, life in NFL

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The day before the Kansas City Chiefs made Laurent Duvernay-Tardif their newest member, he was cradling in the biggest hands you'll ever shake the first of tiny twins born premature.

It sure put the stress of the NFL draft into perspective.

Two years later, the medical student from Canada's prestigious McGill University is the Chiefs' starting offensive guard. His task is no longer taking care of infants delivered by C-section in the operating room, but taking care of quarterback Alex Smith inside Arrowhead Stadium.

"He's a smart guy," says Chiefs coach Andy Reid, himself a former offensive lineman. "I keep reminding his coaches that someday he might be doing surgery on you, so you better keep it right."

The sixth-round draft pick is not the first medical student to make it in the NFL, or even the first to make it out of McGill. Jean-Phillipe Darche spent nearly a decade as a long snapper, most of it with the Seattle Seahawks but ultimately ending his career in Kansas City.

The difference with Duvernay-Tardif is that, rather than put medical school on hold until his playing career is over, he keeps plowing along. He spent this past offseason putting in residency hours, and plans to do the same next offseason. This past week, when the rest of the Chiefs enjoyed their bye, Duvernay-Tardif was taking another exam for which he'd been studying for weeks.

This isn't simple biology, either. This is the kind of stuff that makes those often cumbersome, complicated playbooks of an NFL offense seem like reading "Goodnight Moon."

"When you have two passions, you don't count the hours, you just work as hard as you need to," Duvernay-Tardif said. "I love being in med school. I love being here playing. And the good thing now is when I am here, I can focus 100 percent on football and I don't care about med school."

"When I was back in college," he said, "I had to do both at the same time."

The level of play at Canadian colleges like McGill is roughly equivalent to a junior college in the U.S., so it's not as if Duvernay-Tardif was playing in the SEC. But that was a good thing. Medical school kept him so busy that he would usually practice just once week, learning the game plan just in time to step onto the field and bulldoze some unsuspecting defensive end.

Those games gave an old high school friend, Sasha Ghavami, enough material for a highlight film that Duvernay-Tardif sent out to NFL teams. Close to a dozen sent scouts to see him work out.

His footwork needed refinement. He needed to put on muscle. But it became evident in a hurry that Duvernay-Tardif was an athlete, and his intelligence was off the charts.

"I saw potential in him within five minutes," said Matthieu Quiviger, an assistant coach for McGill at the time. "He was the one who asks the most questions. He always wants to know. With intelligent people, you can't tell them to do something. You have to tell them why. You have to be pretty quick on your feet and justify what you want him to do."

Not surprisingly, Duvernay-Tardif has a particular interest in sports science. He is fascinated by the way the body works. It's one of the main reasons he got into medicine in the first place.

So when the topic of concussions is broached, he approaches it in an analytical way.

Yes, he has read the literature — not the stuff in the media about CTE, but the kind of stuff that is found in research papers and peer-reviewed journals. He knows that playing on the offensive line in the NFL is dangerous, and puts him at a great risk for his own concussion. But he also is wise enough to know that if he ever sustains enough of them that he'll recognize when to quit.

"I think everybody thinks about it," Duvernay-Tardif said, "but it's more a question of knowing the risk. Knowing the potential consequences. And asking yourself the question, 'Is it worth it?' I think I'm in the position where it's worth it."

He's also in a unique position to help his teammates deal with the issue.

"When they look at the metabolism of the glucose inside the brain, it's all material I can understand," he said, "and share that knowledge with guys who want to know more about it."

There's a difference between book smarts and football smarts, though. They don't always equate. But in the case of Larry, as he's known to teammates and friends, there is a correlation.

"He's so book smart yet he understands every rule," Chiefs center Mitch Morse said, "so book smarts almost turn into football smarts. He can understand what's happening in a second."

When you combine that intelligence with impressive size (6-foot-5, 320 pounds) and speed, you get the rare combination that makes for an imposing NFL offensive lineman.

Just as he has work left in medical school, Duvernay-Tardif is still learning the ins-and-outs of professional football. He still struggles to grasp some of the more complex protections and deal with some of the exotic blitzes that are quickly becoming in vogue in the NFL.

But considering he was cradling a premature baby in his giant paws two years ago, the fact that he's capably wrestling 300-pound defensive tackles is nothing short of extraordinary.

"I would tell you he's still learning," Reid said, "but he's making improvement every week. Sometimes he can take that step back and take a little bit of a bigger step forward. I think he's done that to this point."

Receiver Jeremy Maclin brings feisty, edgy attitude to Chiefs

The moment Jeremy Maclin realized Charcandrick West just might take it to the house, he turned on the jets himself to sacrifice his body.

This was Sunday, the fourth quarter of the Chiefs' 29-13 win over Denver. The Chiefs already had a healthy 22-point lead at the time, which might have kept another wide receiver from making the choice Maclin did. But to him, it was about the principle of the thing.

Nevertheless, as West bore down on the Broncos' end zone, Maclin finally caught up with Broncos safety T.J. Ward, who was hot in pursuit of West, just inside the 5-yard line. Maclin then threw his body in front of Ward, and it was the last block West would need on an 80-yard catch-and-run touchdown that officially put the nail in the Broncos' coffin.

But Maclin would not have time to celebrate afterward; he was too busy giving Ward a piece of his mind. While both were going to the ground, Ward intentionally struck Maclin in the head, a 15-yard unsportsmanlike conduct penalty that got Ward ejected and ultimately fined \$10,000.

But before Ward could leave, he'd have to deal with Maclin, who immediately popped off the ground and got in Ward's face. Let's just say coaches and teammates were not surprised by this.

"Jeremy is a feisty guy, man — and a confident guy," Chiefs coach Andy Reid said. "That part could carry over to other people. He's going to play hard, you saw it in his blocking (Sunday). Not just the one where 43 (Ward) got ejected from the game, but on some of the other plays you saw him downfield blocking people.

"That's how he rolls, he's going to play the whole play. He played aggressive, tough, not going to back down from anybody."

Backup quarterback Chase Daniel added, "Oh yeah, he's always got an edge to him. What people don't realize is how physical a blocker he is in the run game. He likes to stick his head in there, get dirty a little bit. He doesn't like getting punked, and he felt like he got punked when T.J. did that, so it was fun to watch."

Maclin's reaction to Ward's dirty play has actually been a constant all season long. Turn on the tape of almost any game, and you can see Maclin, the Chiefs' \$55 million wide receiver, talking to an opposing defensive player at some point about something done to him — a verbal slight, a cheap shot, etc. It was all part of the Maclin package the Chiefs signed up for when they signed him to a five-year deal this offseason.

"He brings a little swag out there, and I love to see that," offensive coordinator Doug Pederson said. "He definitely brings a great quality of football skills to what we're doing offensively, and then with that, comes the rest. So it was kind of a football-first (decision to sign him), and then whatever's coming with it, we'll take it."

And while Maclin has lived up to his contract on the field, his intangibles have been a net gain, as well, as Maclin's teammates and coaches say his take-no-stuff attitude has not only helped him earn the respect of his offensive linemen, it's also rubbed off on his younger players.

"I think it's just (my) competitive nature," Maclin said. "I don't necessarily think it's a part of my game. ... I just think it's a grown-man mentality, you know? I'm not going to let anybody say anything to me crazy, you know what I mean?"

Perhaps the first sign that Maclin was a bit unlike anybody the Chiefs have had at receiver in a long time came during training camp in August. During one otherwise nondescript day, he and cornerback Marcus Cooper got into a scuffle after Cooper took Maclin to the ground while trying to defend a deep pass.

Maclin rose to his feet, took a few steps toward Cooper — his head cocked slightly — and pushed him. The two had to be separated, and the event ignited what turned out to be a spirited day of practice that featured a few other scuffles between the offense and defense.

Cooper says the two buried the incident immediately, and Maclin — who he calls the "ultimate competitor" — has his respect.

"He's everything you want in a guy," Cooper said. "He's going to come out there and he's going to try to be physical with you if that's the way to beat you. He's going to try to outsmart you ... he's trying to win every rep."

Maclin says that in general, he feels the need to stand up for himself. When someone tries to take a cheap shot, just to make it known that it won't be tolerated — not that day, not ever.

"I just think it's a mentality to let teams know that 'Hey, can't bully us — that's not what it's going to be like (today),' " Maclin said. "I think some teams, historically, come with that type of mindset, with that type of reputation like 'Hey, we're going to try to bully you.' But it's not going to go down like that.

"If a guy pushes me, my goal is not necessarily to push him back; my goal is to say, 'Hey man, you better chill out' — it's that simple, you know what I mean? Sometimes, I think defensive backs think they're tougher because they play on defense as opposed to offense. Some guys do it, some guys don't, but like I said, it's just letting people know they're not going to do whatever they want to do (to me)."

Chiefs receiver Jason Avant, who was Maclin's teammate in Philadelphia from 2009 to 2012, says Maclin has always had a chip on his shoulder when it comes to his on-field play, which can be beneficial for a team provided you don't get penalties, which Maclin doesn't.

"This is a football game, it's a violent game — you don't want to have guys pushing you around, you don't want to acquiesce to anything in this game," Avant said. "Everything should be worked for and hard earned. So if a guy is pushing on you and stuff like that, it's a sign of disrespect. And in the game, you can't just have it."

Younger teammates say Maclin's attitude, which is also shared by Avant, emboldens them on the field.

"Oh, they never back down," rookie receiver Chris Conley said. "They're always going to take it to (people), sometimes to the point where you've got to pull them back a little bit. But that's what your teammates are there for."

Second-year receiver Albert Wilson said Maclin's physical play sets the tone for the other receivers.

"It gives you more confidence where you see he doesn't take anything and you're following behind him, so you don't take anything," Wilson said. "When you're playing with a certain attitude, the game goes better. The defense stops with the little nagging, the cheap shots. But if you just go without saying anything, they're going to keep doing it."

Aside from using his words, one of the ways Maclin, 27, likes to even the odds with defensive players is by being a selectively physical blocker. On run or pass plays where he recognizes that he has an opportunity to potentially spring a big block, he'll give good effort in trying to do so, even if it would take a cutback from several yards away to make worth it.

It's hardly something receivers get credit for, especially physically-gifted ones like Maclin who command fans' attention for their speed and ball skills.

But to him, blocking in Reid's offense — which is reliant on screens and stretching the field horizontally — is a necessity.

"You just have to be a team player," Maclin said. "I've said this all along, I've made my money. It's not about going out there and putting up 200 yards receiving every game. In crunch time, when my number is called, I'll be there ... even if you're on the back side of a run you always have to stay in tune with what's going on."

His linemen have taken notice of his effort, too. Center Mitch Morse, left guard Jeff Allen and right guard Laurent Duvernay-Tardif all mentioned that they appreciate Maclin's willingness to do the dirty work.

"That speaks volumes about how unselfish he is," Morse said.

Duvernay-Tardif even went as far to call Maclin one of the team's best open-field blockers.

"It sets the tempo and everybody kind of feeds off of it," he said.

Duvernay-Tardif was specifically referring to blocks like the one Maclin had on West's 80-yard touchdown, a display of effort that fired up Allen so much he actually mentioned it to Maclin after the game.

"I was like, 'Man, I didn't know you had that in you,'" Allen said. "He brought it out."

It should also be said that Maclin is doing the thing he was brought to Kansas City to do — catch passes. He's tied for the team lead with 45 catches, and has a team-leading 583 yards.

But Maclin knows that being a complete football player is about more than that. It's about setting a good example for his teammates, whether it's by standing up for himself on the field or by doing the dirty work as a blocker, all in the name of getting victories.

"I respect the guys who do everything," Maclin said. "It's not just about catching 15 balls for 200 and two touchdowns in a loss. You can have three (catches) or 17 (yards) like I did, hustle your butt off and come up big when your team needs it."

With the support of Chiefs' 'family,' Eric Berry back to being himself

Nearly 12 months after Eric Berry's scary Hodgkin lymphoma diagnosis, the reddish-brown hair is back on his head now, and so is the speed and playmaking ability that helped him earn three Pro Bowl berths in his first five years in the league.

Any doubt that remained about that was answered on one play he made Sunday, during the Chiefs' 33-3 win over the San Diego Chargers, when he sniffed out a quick screen, dived underneath a 330-pound offensive lineman and took out the legs of receiver Stevie Johnson to rack up an impressive solo tackle.

"That was a superior play," said Chiefs coach Andy Reid, who rarely uses such superlatives when describing anything his players do. "You just don't see that very often where he goes underneath an offensive lineman, pops up and makes a tackle on a screen — it was ninjasque."

It was the kind of play that has defensive coordinator Bob Sutton thinking that Berry, who has 41 tackles and two interceptions this season, is playing "as good as he's played" since the current staff arrived in 2013.

Sutton says Berry is playing faster than he did last year. He doesn't think Berry has lost weight, either. Instead, Sutton suspects the cancer ordeal — which Berry beat in under nine months — taught him to play looser.

"I think he's free," Sutton said. "It's really exciting to see him like that. He's playing great football right now."

Berry's recent play is a reason the Chiefs have bounced back to win their last four games and pull to 5-5 after a miserable 1-5 start. But so is their team camaraderie.

After their 33-3 win over the San Diego Chargers on Sunday, multiple Chiefs credited their locker-room character — in essence, their team unity — for keeping them from turning on one another during their 1-5 start, which certainly isn't always a given in the NFL.

Teams, of course, often talk about being a family. But with so many dollars on the line, few actually mean it.

“I think it’s a family — everybody’s close,” outside linebacker Justin Houston said earlier this season. “You can go in there and sit at any table at any time and talk to anybody at any time about anything ... I think it’s very rare. My first couple years, we didn’t have that. You couldn’t go to sit at the lunch table with anybody and have a good conversation.

“I think this is the first year I’m able to do that. I think the coaches, the GM, did a great job putting a good staff together and getting the right group of guys together.”

Reid echoed those thoughts on Monday, crediting general manager John Dorsey for putting together a group of players with “good souls.”

But some of this also falls on the players, and when it comes to leadership, few have been more influential than Houston, whose supportive acts during Berry’s cancer fight — he stayed with him intermittently and was always there for his friend — are examples of the type of tight-knit group the Chiefs have become.

“Justin’s a big part of that, you really saw him take over the leadership position last year of that defense,” Reid said. “And he and Eric are so close, not only do they live kind of close to each other, but they’re close from a player standpoint.

“And Justin comes from a family — like a huge family — so he understands family. If anybody on this team understands family, it’s him.”

It didn’t not take long for Houston and Berry to bond. When Houston arrived in Kansas City as a third-round pick in 2011 — one year after Berry arrived as a first-round pick — the two found plenty of common ground.

First, they were Georgia kids — Houston is from Statesboro while Berry is from Fairburn, which is about 3 1/2 hours away. And second, they were competitors committed to winning.

“Since I came in, he accepted me with open arms,” Houston said. “He was never hesitant about anything. I could go to him about anything, ask questions. Just being around him and being who he is, he’s a cool guy — you’d like to be around him.

The two even found common ground in shared tragedy. When Berry’s childhood home burned down in 2013, Houston could relate — the same happened to him in 2003, when he was just a ninth-grader.

“Eric did share with me that Justin’s house burned down, and they bonded off that,” said Berry’s mother, Carol.

So when Berry found out that he likely had Hodgkin lymphoma late last November, Houston was one of the first people to know, along with Berry’s family, of course.

“He called me and told me,” Houston said. “But I had a positive mind-set — I said it wasn’t what he thought it was, it would be alright, it would be cool.”

But in the meantime, Berry would need chemotherapy treatment. He opted to do it in Atlanta, so he could fight it with the support of family, and on the Monday following his last game in 2014 — the Chiefs’ 24-20 loss to the Oakland Raiders — Berry left Kansas City to return home, with Houston right there to send him off.

“Every time I think about it, when we left (that Monday), Justin was there,” Carol Berry said. “It broke my heart. It’s such a great story.”

But that was not the last the Berry family would see of Justin Houston. Since that day, Berry has thanked many people for supporting him in his recovery, but few were more supportive than Houston.

“Before that, we were tight, we were real good friends,” Berry said. “But after that, it did a lot for me because it was a rough point, a rough spot that I was in, and he was taking his off days to come down and visit me. It meant a lot and I really do appreciate it.”

In the month following Berry’s lymphoma diagnosis, the Chiefs’ organization stood behind him. BerryStrong became a hashtag, and decals were added to team apparel. A Berry sign was even hung outside the locker room.

But on the field, no player expressed more support for his teammate than Houston, who started lifting his jersey after every sack to reveal a T-shirt with Berry's number written on it, which was first written in marker and ultimately screen-printed.

It was a very visible show of support, but it didn't stop there. For most of the following month, Houston would quietly fly from Kansas City to Atlanta every Monday — the Chiefs' off day is Tuesday — to visit Berry and return before the practice week started on Wednesday.

Carol Berry remembers the first time Houston visited their home; she thought he was just coming to Georgia to see his family, first, and then drop by to see Berry. Nope.

"When Justin showed up at the door, I thought 'Oh, how sweet is that,'" she said. "I did not know he was staying with us."

But he did. When we came to visit, Houston would spend the night in a guest room and return to Kansas City the next day. Carol remembers Houston loving the cooking of Eric's father, James; Houston remembers watching television with Berry and his family.

"I was just there for support," Houston said. "Me being around him ... I never saw a point where he was down, so I couldn't tell if I was helping him or not. But I just knew me being around him, I felt like that was a good thing to do."

It was, Carol Berry said.

"They ate, James cooked, and they had a great time," said Carol Berry, who added that the value of a friendship like Houston's can't be measured. "It made Eric feel good."

Houston, however, was just one of many people to stand in Berry's corner during his recovery. Cornerback Sean Smith also visited, and Berry worked out with tight end Travis Kelce as he fought his way back.

Berry also thanked two of his longtime friends, Savion Frazier and Jason Stanley, for pushing him through his intense training as he worked his way through energy-sapping chemotherapy treatments.

And when Berry improbably returned to the team in time for training camp in July — somehow weighing a pound more than he did when he went into the grueling process — he was grateful for everyone who stood with him through tough times, including Houston.

“Houston, he was pushing me when I got back (to the team), saying ‘Come on man, let’s go, let’s go ... we talked about this on your couch back when you were taking chemo, we’re on a mission, we’ve got to get this done,’ ” Berry said.

“Just having people like that in your corner and helping you strive for greatness is good.”

By the time the regular season started in September, there was a notable change in the Chiefs’ locker room setup. Berry was back in his usual spot, surrounded by all the defensive backs, but to his left — in a locker that is typically occupied by a defensive back — was Houston.

For the first four years of Houston’s career, he’d sat across the room, directly next to his mentor, Tamba Hali. Derrick Johnson, however, wasn’t surprised by Houston’s move next to Berry.

“They’re real tight,” Johnson said, “and (Justin) wanted to move away from Tamba. Tamba’s a little messy, so that’s part of the reason, too.”

Johnson was joking, obviously, and Hali played along when asked about it later.

“I was offended,” Hali joked. “I really thought, like, I did something to Justin and, like, he didn’t want to sit next to me anymore.”

But in all seriousness, both Hali and Johnson knew what prompted the move.

“I know they’re cool, and last year, when Eric was battling cancer, it really hit Justin hard,” Hali said.

Like it did everyone, for that matter.

“Eric,” Johnson said, “means a lot to everybody.”

To Houston, Berry is somebody he always wants to be around, because the cancer ordeal proves tomorrow isn't promised to anybody. On this Thanksgiving, Berry definitely understands this more than most.

Almost one year to the day after receiving the scariest news of his life, Eric Berry is now healthy, playing the best football of his career and surrounded by a locker room that has his back and a family that loves him.

Berry is looking forward to celebrating the holiday with all of them, too. When he was a child, he used to spend the night before Thanksgiving with his grandma, helping her prepare the food. He did this until he went to college at Tennessee, but with a smile, he noted Sunday that his grandma would be coming back to Kansas City this week so they could revive the tradition.

"We're going to get down like we used to," Berry said with a grin.

And his teammates are invited, too — including Houston, of course.

"He can ask me for anything," Berry said, "and I'll be there for him."

And vice versa.

"Through tough times, you'll find out who your true friends are," Houston said. "Most guys, during tough times, they turn their back on you. I just wanted to show I was a true friend."

Defensive back Ron Parker is Chiefs' 'ultimate team guy'

Last line of defenders are lumped together as defensive backs, but that generic term fails to explain the specific skill sets of the cornerbacks, safeties and nickel corners.

Ron Parker is an excellent source for this. He's played them all. "Whatever the coaches ask me to do, I try and do my best," Parker said.

That's a good thing because perhaps no player on the roster has been asked to shift more than Parker.

A year ago, Parker had 11 starts at strong safety and four at cornerback. He opened this year at safety.

But the season-ending injury to Phillip Gaines against the Green Bay Packers in the third game meant a move to the nickel corner and adjustment for Parker. "It was a big challenge, playing more nickel," Parker said. "At first I wasn't comfortable there. But it kind of played out the way it did when I moved to other positions. It's uncomfortable until I can work with it and rep in it."

Parker has started seven games at safety and three at nickel. He's second on the team in tackles with 45 after leading the team in that department last year, and he's come up big during the team's four-game winning streak that's resulted in a 5-5 record entering Sunday's home game against the Buffalo Bills.

Parker recorded two sacks against the Lions, doubling his career total, and had one of the Chiefs' five interceptions in the victory at Denver. On the season, Parker has 10 passes defended, second on the team to cornerback Marcus Peters' 14.

Beyond the stats sheet, Parker's acceptance of his changing roles and desire to pour everything into new ventures is what coach Andy Reid means when he repeats, "I like this team."

“There’s no question that no one wants to do a job they don’t feel like they’re prepared to do,” defensive coordinator Bob Sutton said. “But with Ron, it was, ‘OK, let’s go. Help me get ready.’”

“He’s the ultimate team guy.”

Prep work was the tough part. “That position is its own world,” Sutton said. “It’s not an easy job. You’re involved in a lot of things, from blitzing to cover in man and zone, and he’s done a really nice job.”

Parker’s athletic life has been defined by versatility. He played football, baseball and basketball at Beaufort High in South Carolina, and multiple positions at each sport. Parker said he was driven by curiosity. “I wanted to see what it was like playing different positions,” he said. “It’s always been my mentality.”

Parker enrolled at Independence Community College in Kansas and returned to his home state to finish school at Newberry College, where he became a three-time Division II All-America.

Parker put up big numbers in college, leading the conference in interceptions in each of his final two seasons but wasn’t invited to the NFL Combine. And he wasn’t selected in the draft.

He signed with Seattle in 2011 and appeared in five games with the Seahawks and Oakland Raiders that year. He played three games with the Carolina Panthers in 2012 before finding a home with the Chiefs in 2013.

He started to grow roots when Parker signed a five-year, \$30 million deal with the Chiefs after last season. “When I signed the deal and thought about the numbers, it felt unreal,” Parker said.

The Chiefs may have felt like they were getting a bargain, paying one player who can effectively play multiple positions. “When you’re moving around, the important thing is you have to know what’s going around you,” Parker said. “Where there’s help, what you can and can’t do. With me, it’s all about understanding the game. And then not going out there and moaning about being moved around.”

Rookie C Mitch Morse Has Been the Rock For an Ever-Changing Chiefs OL

The Kansas City Chiefs have played in 10 games, and throughout them, the starting offensive line combination has changed five times.

The Chiefs have had different left guards, different right guards, different left tackles and different right tackles.

But they have only had one center, a rookie, and the only player that has played in every single offensive snap in 2015.

His name is Mitch Morse.

“He’s getting better every week,” Chiefs head coach Andy Reid said of the offensive lineman on Wednesday. “He’s still got a ways to go and he’ll do that—that’s the way he’s wired. He’ll keep working. If he makes a mistake, he normally doesn’t make it twice. I think he’s becoming more confident each week.”

After an offseason departure at the center position, there was a question as to how the team was going to fill such an important role.

The answer came on night two of the NFL Draft.

General manager John Dorsey selected Morse, a Missouri Tiger, with Kansas City’s second-round pick at 49th overall.

On the telecast, NFL draft analyst Mike Mayock called Morse a future 10-year starter.

"I like the way he plays football," Dorsey said that night. "I think the coaches at Missouri have done a really nice job of developing him as he comes along. It's interesting because what they do is they play them at multiple positions during their career and that's helpful when they get to the National Football League."

Coming into the pros, Morse had college experience at right and left tackle, along with the center position. With the vacancy at center, the Chiefs announced Morse at that position on draft night.

At training camp, Morse started with the second-string team, but quickly moved up on the depth chart. By the middle of the preseason, it became clear the starting center role would be his.

10 games later and in the midst of a four-game winning streak, the Chiefs have to be happy looking back at their decision as Morse is among the top 10 of his position in the league (Pro Football Focus).

"He's come a really long way," quarterback Alex Smith said of Morse. "He's gotten a lot thrown at him. We've faced a lot of different types of fronts and different things and I think he's done such a great job learning week in and week out being able to handle all that stuff."

Off the field, Morse is mild mannered. He's easy to talk to. He can frequently be seen joking around with his teammates.

On the field, he's a force. He's athletic. When Smith drops back to pass, he gives him time. When Reid calls a screen, he zips to the outside to block. He's aided greatly in what has been a near seamless transition from Jamaal Charles to Charcandrick West.

But ask him about his personal success and he'll divert the conversation. More than simply his ability on the field, Morse has the makeup of what you want in the center of your line—he loves his team.

"I feel like we're marching along," he answered when asked about how his rookie season has gone thus far. "There have definitely been some learning experiences, but that's part of football especially as a rookie. I've been feeling like we've been doing real well and as long as we keep growing as an offensive unit, with the older guys helping us younger guys, collectively doing what we need to do, then we're going to be good."

It's no wonder why he has the whole coaching staff behind him.

“Mitch has improved every week and he’s gotten a lot better,” offensive coordinator Doug Pederson said. “He’s seeing things a lot better. The game is slowing down for him.”

When Ben Grubbs suffered a neck injury against the Pittsburgh Steelers in Week 7, the Chiefs inserted another veteran in Jeff Allen to the starting lineup, and that has seemed to only benefit the rookie.

“To have a guy like Jeff next to him – a veteran guy who’s been in not only that center role but he’s now playing that guard role, I think there’s great communication there,” Pederson added. “That’s really everything with the offensive line - the communication level and having a guy like Jeff next to him has benefitted Mitch and is kind of keeping that offensive line going in the right direction.”

This coming Sunday, Morse and the Chiefs face a Buffalo Bills team known for their aggressive style of defense and talented front seven.

“This week will be a big challenge for both he and I,” Smith said, “more than usual because of all the different looks that defense does. We’ll have to do a great job communicating up there making sure we’re on the same page.”

Using the last 10 games, and more specifically the last four, as evidence, that shouldn’t be a problem.

“I feel like we’re tough, man,” Morse said. “I think these few weeks, what helped us win is we’re a physical unit. We don’t quit on plays and that’s really helped us out, kind of set the tone for the offense and how the game’s going to go.”

Tamba Hali beat odds to become one of NFL's great pass-rushers

KANSAS CITY, Mo. -- Over the years, the Kansas City Chiefs have drafted more than one player they thought had the ability to become an elite NFL pass-rusher.

Then there was Tamba Hali, the Chiefs' first-round draft pick in 2006. In him, the Chiefs saw a raw player who always tried hard. Maybe, they thought, he could eventually develop into a nice complementary player.

But they didn't think he could be what he has become -- not a top-50 all-time pass-rusher. He was too slow. He wasn't strong enough.

What has happened has surprised even Hali himself.

"I tried to run a 4.6, and I ran a 4.8," Hali said, referring to his college times in the 40-yard dash. "I wanted to bench [press] a lot. I didn't. There are goals for myself that I never accomplished, so I would probably agree with you that you wouldn't think I'd be in this conversation.

"It's humbling to know. It takes a lot of work to get to where I am."

Hali, who is second on the Chiefs in sacks this season with 6.5, recently moved into the top 50 on the NFL's all-time list. He has 86 career sacks, which ties him with former New England Patriot and Cleveland Brown Willie McGinest for 48th all time.

That's the thing about Hali: He is fueled by his failures -- not his successes. If it were the other way around, Hali might not have lasted for his 10th NFL season.

But Hali plays so hard -- as if his job depends on his getting to the quarterback on every play -- that his effort increases every time he doesn't get there in time.

Being known as much for his effort as his ability doesn't bother Hali. Instead, he wears it like a badge of honor.

"Part of my job is to hustle," he said. "It didn't come naturally to me. Some guys are naturally strong or just flat-out fast. The game I play, it has to do with longevity, the toughness of the man and enduring the pain and everything, going through all the aches and still being accountable, available.

"That means a lot to me -- more than just having raw talent. Guys who are talented but don't work at it, it's just for a flash, and then they're gone. You have to have talent, but you have to work and work tirelessly until it becomes second nature to you."

When people around the NFL talk about Hali, the first thing they mention is his effort. His talent is often an afterthought.

Hali isn't fast, but he has great closing speed. He showed that Sunday, when he ran around Buffalo tackle Seantrel Henderson and stripped Bills quarterback Tyrod Taylor from behind for the Chiefs' only sack of the game.

"He's not going to run a fast 40," said Herm Edwards, the Chiefs' coach when Hali was drafted. "But 10 yards? Oh, boy. He gets off the ball that way. We understood that when we drafted the guy. He was just learning to play the game. We knew he would figure the game out because we knew he would work at it."

When Hali says he has to work tirelessly to make football second nature, he means it. Hali, who moved to the United States from Liberia when he was 10, didn't grow up in a football culture. He spent his early years in the U.S. learning to read and write a new language.

"You have to understand that I came to the United States in 1994, and I was just starting to read [English]," he said. "Playing football was just something fun for me. It wasn't a goal. I went out and played, and I did well, but I didn't know what college scholarships were. I didn't understand that process.

"So even when I got to Penn State, the NFL wasn't a goal I set. I wanted to go to school and get a degree. My junior year, my coach sat me down and just basically said, 'If you want to play on the next level, you have to get to the quarterback.' The following year, I got to the quarterback."

Since joining the Chiefs, Hali has been fortunate to play with a couple premier pass-rushers: first Jared Allen and later Justin Houston. They are the pass-rushers who generally demanded the most attention from opponents on a down-by-down basis.

But Hali flourished in the years between Allen's departure and Houston's arrival. Hali had his career high of 14.5 sacks in 2010, two years after the Chiefs traded Allen to the Vikings and one year before they drafted Houston.

One thing Hali had to learn was how to play through injuries. He initially adopted the natural approach of wanting to sit out until all the aches and pains were gone. Edwards, among others, eventually helped prod Hali to take the opposite approach.

Since then, he hasn't missed a game in the past season-and-a-half, despite an ailing knee that many weeks prevents him from completing the practice week.

"That was the hardest part for me," Hali said. "Once you can get over that 'I'm hurt, I'm injured, I can't go,' once you get of that mind that 'I'm going to be out there, regardless,' you start realizing once you're out there how much of a threat you are even when you're not at your best."

In Hali's case, that means winding up his NFL career among the top 50 pass-rushers all time.

"I'm happy for Tamba, happy that he could finish his career in Kansas City," Edwards said. "He's going to go down as one of the better guys to play that position."

Chiefs linebacker Derrick Johnson is playing better than ever, and here's why that's remarkable

A ruptured Achilles' tendon means an All-Pro linebacker's body is as useful on an NFL team as your neighbor's. But the mind is a different thing entirely, so Derrick Johnson's family grew used to a sort of a next-level broadcast during Chiefs games last year.

They met most Sundays at Johnson's house in Austin, Texas, maintaining the tradition of a dozen or so gathering for Beverly Johnson's famous breakfasts — pancakes, biscuits, omelettes, hash browns, fruit, bacon, you name it.

Once the game started, Johnson took his place on the couch and just could not help himself. The Achilles' in his right leg ripped in the Chiefs' season opener, and that kind of injury has killed many careers — careers of younger men, and of men who rely less on speed on quickness than Johnson.

He knew that, but he buried the scary facts under a carpet of positivity. During the week, it was non-stop workouts at the Total Athlete gym he runs with his brother Dwight. And on Sundays, it was watching his teammates, as involved in the game as a person can possibly be from his living room.

"That was hard," Derrick said.

"Every game, at some point, it was, 'Boy, I wish I could be out there,' " said Beverly, Derrick's mother.

"He's just so antsy," Dwight said. "It was, 'It's a slant! It's a slant!' Or, 'Cover 2! Get in Cover 2!' He's calling it out from the couch, because he knows the tendencies of all the teams."

Johnson is back on the field now, which is significant on its own. A study released seven years ago — researchers are working on an update — found that at least half of the athletes who rupture their Achilles' tendon never return to competition. It is, perhaps, the worst injury an

athlete can suffer. The effects are worse for those who rely on speed, and worse still the older they are.

For Johnson, who turned 33 last month, the best outcome seemed to be a return with noticeably reduced effectiveness.

Instead, he is playing every bit as well as he did before the injury. Perhaps better. He thinks he is faster than ever, and Chiefs coach Andy Reid said Johnson is as good or better than the year before he was hurt.

Johnson leads the Chiefs and entered this week's games eighth in the NFL in tackles. Pro Football Focus rates Johnson as the second-best inside linebacker in the league this season, and the website's metrics say he's on pace for the best season of his career. It is hard to imagine the Chiefs carrying one of the league's best defenses or a seven-game win streak into today's game at Baltimore without Johnson's remarkable recovery.

Eric Berry's return from Hodgkin lymphoma is without peer in the NFL, but Johnson's rebound from his own injury could be without precedent. Selene Parekh, an associate professor at Duke's orthopedic surgery department, has done extensive research into Achilles' injuries and says he does not know of an athlete Johnson's age who has made such a full recovery.

"I don't," he said. "I can't think of anyone. I'll go back tonight and see if I'm just forgetting anyone, and if so, send you an email."

He did not send an email.

Physical recovery starts with the mind. This is how Johnson sees it, anyway. You cannot rehab an injury — heck, you can't do anything worth doing, really — without first believing you can do it.

Sure, he knew the statistics. Knew that his might have been the worst possible injury for a 30-something linebacker who made his impact with speed and explosiveness. So he focused on the positives.

When he talked of the injury, he focused on the talent of his surgeon, the improving techniques of the surgery, the knowledge of the people guiding his rehab, and the resources available to him at his gym in Austin. Being able to measure progress and exchange motivation with Mike DeVito, the teammate who suffered the same injury in the same game, was a help.

Even when Johnson could barely walk — and when he says this, he hunches his back, and pantomimes an elderly man’s gait — he kept a strong mind and said, “Hey, I’m walking already!”

Instead of thinking about the statistics, he called or studied success stories like Robert Mathis and Terrell Suggs.

“You speak things into existence,” Dwight said. “What you put into life is what you get back. We believe that.”

Optimism can only go so far, though. At the beginning of the season, Johnson talked about being completely back to full strength. He said there was some fine-tuning to do — train your eyes, is his term — but that in practical and physical terms he was the same player from before.

He now sees that was more of him “speaking things into existence” than literal truth. At that point, the focus from the outside was primarily on the simple fact that he was returning (though, understandably, most of the “return” focus was on Berry) and that he began the season just 15 tackles short of the Chiefs’ all-time franchise record.

He passed Gary Spani’s mark in the third game of the season, a blowout loss at Green Bay, but needed another month before he felt right.

Because when Johnson is asked to be self-reflective about his season, he thinks of the Lions game in London as the turning point. Before that game, he made some big plays, but not enough. At least, not enough to his standards. He has always been an overachiever, a perfectionist, and to him, if he’s not making what he calls “impact” or “preventative” plays, well, you could anybody to merely fill a position.

But from the Lions game on, those important plays have become routine. He doesn’t list them, but if you go back and watch him in each of the Chiefs’ last six games you can see what he’s probably talking about.

Against Detroit, he showed blitz over the center, but then came around the outside on a stunt, perfectly timing his move to confuse the offensive line and sack Matthew Stafford unblocked.

At Denver, he made tackles on both sidelines, and timed and disguised another blitz perfectly to sack Peyton Manning.

At San Diego, he had perfect coverage on a well-run route and well-run throw to Ladarius Green, diving across the body and knocking the pass down.

Against Buffalo, he found himself isolated in coverage against LeSean McCoy in the end zone, a linebacker shadowing one of the game's great playmakers and deflecting the pass to save a touchdown.

At Oakland, he made two drive-stalling plays on Latavious Murray in a row — swooshing around the linemen to stop a run for no gain, and, with David Carr calling out Johnson's number before the snap, reading an underneath throw and making the tackle for no gain.

Against the Chargers, he dropped into coverage and killed the last drive before halftime by intercepting a deflected pass.

These are just moments — snippets from each game — but they are largely how Johnson judges his worth. For the most part, these are plays Johnson makes with his quick mind and quicker feet.

A hundred and fifty-one games have a way of giving a man an edge if his body can keep up, and to hear Johnson tell it, the reason his body is keeping up has only a little bit to do with the tackles record.

"I have a lot of things to get done," he said.

The record is nice, just like another year at the Pro Bowl or being voted All-Pro would be nice. But that's not why he came back. He has never been part of a playoff winner. Just three Wild Card Game losses in 11 seasons.

A year of rehab gives a man time to think, and Johnson is sure of two things: the Chiefs would have made the playoffs last year if he'd stayed healthy, and this is the best chance he's had yet of postseason success.

"Yes, it is," Johnson said. "It's easy to say that right now with the momentum we have. But looking at the beginning of the year, I thought this was the best roster I've been on."

How Alex Smith's running ability has lifted the Chiefs' offense

With 16 seconds left in the first half of their showdown against San Diego last Sunday, quarterback Alex Smith showed why his mobility in the pocket has long been considered a strength.

The Chiefs had the ball at the Chargers' 40-yard line and were looking to pad a seven-point lead. On second and 10, Smith received the shotgun snap and scanned his downfield options. He was not looking to run, but the protection up front was good, and as the Chargers' defensive backs dropped deep in man coverage, he spotted the back of their jerseys.

At this point, his instincts took over. With pass rushers closing in, Smith spotted a running lane to his left and sprinted 18 yards before ducking out of bounds at the 22-yard line with 7 seconds left. Kicker Cairo Santos' ensuing field goal gave the Chiefs a 10-point halftime lead and a crucial cushion down the stretch of a 10-3 victory.

"That scramble right before the half won us the game," backup quarterback Chase Daniel said. "It was awesome for him. I know he enjoys running, getting a little dirty every once in a while."

Indeed. The play was, in many ways, an example of the way Smith has lifted the Chiefs during their seven-game winning streak, both with his mind and his legs, as he ranks fourth among quarterbacks in rushing with 366 yards, while his long of 49 yards ranks second.

There is an art to being a mobile quarterback in the NFL, one that Smith has excelled at the last several games. Run too much, and it can limit the effectiveness of the designed plays. Run too little, and you're a sitting duck in the pocket.

Mobile quarterbacks also need to protect themselves beyond the line of scrimmage, where angry defenders lick their chops to light them up. That's why quarterbacks almost always slide before contact, which Smith does, but with a flair — and a defensive, spikes-up style — that his teammates rib him for, though ultimately concede its effectiveness.

This is all part of the Alex Smith package, which has helped the Chiefs rebound from a 1-5 start to an 8-5 record heading into their road game against Baltimore today.

“I think throughout his career, he’s had a pretty good feel for that,” coach Andy Reid said of his 31-year-old quarterback’s rushing ability. “The linemen, there are seams there that are created, so if he has to go, he’s got to go.”

“The one good thing about him is he always has his eyes downfield and looking to get it to the receivers, if possible — (running) is kind of the last resort there.”

While the offensive line has improved the last two months, Smith’s ability to remain poised in the pocket and escape trouble, when necessary, has played a big role in them going from allowing four sacks per game during the 1-5 start to a little more than two during the seven-game winning streak.

“Ideally, you don’t want to make a mistake (up front),” right guard Laurent Duvernay-Tardif said. “But when you see your quarterback running ... it gets you pumped because you know your quarterback is with you.”

During the winning streak, O-line coach Andy Heck’s group has adopted an inside-out philosophy in pass protection designed to simplify the scheme and protect Smith from having to deal with free rushers up the middle.

Also, the Chiefs have developed a counter, of sorts, to all the stunts and defensive-line games teams tortured them with earlier this season. It has not been rare to see them pushing stunting defensive linemen wider upfield, which creates natural rushing lanes for Smith.

Smith’s athleticism — he ran a respectable 4.71 at the 2005 NFL Combine and was an option quarterback in college at Utah — poses problems for defenses. But Smith remains a pass-first quarterback and plays for a head coach in Reid who specializes in throwing the football.

“I just think that it helps you in your run-pass options at the line of scrimmage,” offensive coordinator Doug Pederson said.

But Smith’s awareness and athleticism aren’t the only things that make him an effective runner. His occasional jump slide at the end of runs — when he leaps into the air with gusto and slides

with his spikes up, Ty Cobb style — have become the stuff of legend in the Chiefs' quarterback room. "The quarterbacks give me a hard time about it," Smith said with a laugh.

Smith, however, says he does it for two reasons.

"One is if you slide and you hydroplane, (the officials) mark you down pretty far back," Smith said. "It makes a difference of 4 or 5 yards ... I think if I jump into it, I'll get half that back."

And the second part of it — and why his coaches condone it — is for his own protection.

"You're sliding (normally) and you're really vulnerable," Smith said. "Some of (what I do) is to try to get something in front that, if someone was coming (at me hard) like that, maybe you've got a better chance to protect yourself."

Backup quarterback Aaron Murray said it looks as if Smith is "trying to kill somebody" when he slides.

"It's just funny to watch on the film," Murray said. "He's literally jumping in the air."

Daniel, who uses a more conventional approach to sliding, also gets a good laugh out of Smith's technique, but he doesn't doubt its effectiveness.

"When it comes to running ability, you can put Alex up there with some of the best to ever play the game," Daniel said.

"He's so athletic, he's so smart ... he doesn't look to run, but when he sees an opening, he knows how to run, how to get down and how not to take a hit."

Smith says the latter is something he's developed with age, and something he will surely continue to do down the stretch as the Chiefs continue their march to the playoffs.

"You learn it over time," Smith said. "I think you just get better at knowing the game situation and playing fast and being smart about it. And I think I've gotten a lot better at that as I've gotten older and played more."

Eric Berry's cancer doctor is 'truly awed' he made the Pro Bowl

Last December, Kansas City Chiefs safety Eric Berry was diagnosed with Hodgkin's disease after an MRI revealed a mass on the right side of his chest. Doctors initially described the cancer as "very treatable and potentially curable," but the news, like any cancer diagnosis, put Berry's future as a professional football player very much in doubt.

Less than seven months later, however, Berry learned that he was cancer-free. By the end of July, he was cleared to practice, and in mid-August he was on the field for the Chiefs' first preseason game.

There were still questions to be answered about how Berry's lymphoma battle would affect his play once the regular season started, of course. But through 14 games, Berry has looked very much like the Berry of old, with two interceptions and 58 tackles for 9-5 Kansas City, which can potentially clinch a playoff spot this weekend.

Berry's return to form was only further confirmed on Tuesday night, when he was rewarded with his fourth Pro Bowl selection, a distinction that thrilled Dr. Christopher Flowers, who diagnosed and treated Berry at Emory University's Winship Cancer Institute.

"I was truly awed by the incredible achievement," Flowers told FOX Sports. "I reached out to him today to congratulate him, and Eric is really, truly a testament to the great will and spirit of an individual in overcoming this cancer. He's been a fighter through all of his therapy so far and has really had the best outcome that we could have possibly hoped for him at this point."

Throughout his fight, Berry remained determined to not miss any time as a result of the disease. And according to Flowers, a battle like the one Berry fought is nothing short of commendable.

"He was treated with what was a multi-agent, multi-drug chemotherapy that typically lasts several months, and I tell people going through this that have standard desk jobs that this is the kind of treatment that will take somewhere from three and six months to recover back to performing their usual duties," Flowers said.

The fact that Berry's job is the farthest thing imaginable from a standard desk job makes it all the more impressive the he was able to return to the field at a Pro Bowl level less than a year

after his original diagnosis. That isn't lost on Flowers' other patients, either, as he said they regularly use Berry's story as a source of their own motivation.

"There have been numerous patients, treated at my clinic and other clinics at the Winship Cancer Institute, who were receiving care at the same time and even afterward, who found his story inspirational," Flowers said. "And they really use this as a drive to be able to continue on in their own care as they battle against lymphoma and against other cancers.

"I can't tell you how many times patients or patients' families have reached out to me because of Eric's story. These are people who want to seek additional care or to seek additional opinions or pursue new therapies and face their own cancer care in courageous ways because of the things that Eric has been able to do."

Derrick Johnson discusses the turnaround of the unheralded Chiefs

When the smoke clears after Week 17 of the regular season in the NFL, there will be a whopping four playoff-bound teams that dug themselves out of sizable holes in late October with impressive turnarounds: Washington and Seattle in the NFC, and Houston and Kansas City in the AFC. But nobody had more heavy-duty excavation work to do than the Chiefs, who found themselves sitting in last place in the AFC West on the morning of Week 7, Sunday, Oct. 25.

After winning a combined 20 games in coach Andy Reid's first two seasons on the job, Kansas City entered the season with strong playoff hopes, only to lose five consecutive games following a win in its opener at Houston. At 1–5, the Chiefs were also dealing with the reality of having lost their most explosive playmaker, running back Jamaal Charles, to a season-ending knee injury in a Week 5 loss at Chicago.

Things looked bleaker than bleak, given the 1970 Bengals were the NFL's only team to ever rebound from a 1–5 start to make the playoffs, winning seven straight after starting 1–6 to earn a wild-card berth in the first season of the AFC-NFC format. But the Chiefs have yet to lose a sixth game, and their nine-game winning streak is the AFC's longest active run, and is tied with Arizona for the league's best. They've clinched at least a wild-card spot and could still win the division if they beat Oakland at home on Sunday and get a San Diego road upset of Denver.

I spoke with Chiefs linebacker Derrick Johnson—the team's longest tenured player along with fellow 2005 draft pick Dustin Colquitt, the team's punter—on Tuesday morning about his team's remarkable comeback this season. Like his team, Johnson has rallied in 2015, after suffering a season-ending Achilles tear in Week 1 of last season. The three-time Pro Bowler has been perhaps Kansas City's most consistent player this year and is one of the faces of the franchise.

Don Banks: The Chiefs are the hottest team in the AFC, but I suggest that you're on the most under-the-radar and overlooked nine-game winning streak in NFL history. Do you guys like that down-in-the-weeds position you're in, and is that the perfect spot from which to mount a long playoff run?

Derrick Johnson: You've got to use anything you can for motivation. It may be quiet now, but when it's all said and done and the playoffs get here, we'll get as much media time as we need. So we're O.K. flying under the radar. We don't get distracted. We've got a high-character team and we just keep our heads down and keep working, and our goal is to win it all. We're trying to put ourselves in the position to do that.

DB: Tell me the truth: At 1–5, are you thinking you're still alive for the playoffs, or that nine straight wins are on the way?

DJ: You know what, that would be too far-fetched to actually even talk about the "P" word at that time. We were just trying to win one game, and we weren't panicking, but there was a sense of urgency. It was, 'Hey guys, we're underachieving. We have a good team. We need to start

getting it done.' There was some players meetings going on. I knew if everything held true from what I believed at the beginning of the season, I knew we were a pretty good team. But we weren't doing the job at the beginning of the year, for whatever reason.

DB: As oversimplified as it may sound, did the Chiefs draw any inspiration from the Royals' playoff success? Your turnaround as a team started two days before the World Series began. Did that spark a change in focus or attitude after Week 6 and that 1-5 start?

DJ: Well, I mean, of course it's two different sports, and there was a whole lot of other elements involved with winning and losing in regards to the beginning of our season and the Royals being in the World Series. But for the city of Kansas City, that helped out the vibe, having the Royals winning the World Series and taking it all.

We were rooting for those guys and trying to get ourselves going at the same time. But it's just a coincidence that it happened at that time, that our streak started at that time. We had been doing things the right way consistently, and finally the ball started rolling our way and we started winning. Not to take any credit away from the Royals, they did their thing. But we have a whole 'nother sport and it's different.

DB: But they must have helped at least set the tone for comebacks in Kansas City, didn't they, with their repeated rallies in their playoff games? Did that help make it feel like anything's possible in K.C. this year?

DJ: That's exactly right. It just showed the grit and the motivation that this city and this community has, and how they're behind us. Even when we were 1-5. Don't get me wrong, we had some loyal fans. Kansas City is a Chiefs town. And for the Royals to do what they did, man, that just helped out big time. They painted the city blue and now we're going to see if we can paint it red.

DB: There's never a good time to start 1-5, but if there is a better time to start 1-5, I'd imagine it was while the city was entirely captivated by the Royals postseason run. Did that buy you guys a little time to get things turned around?

DJ: That's so true. That's so true. You never want to start out a season like that. If you told us that at the beginning of the year, you guys'll be 1-5, but you'll get to the playoffs, we would have said you're crazy. That's crazy. But we've got a lot of leaders on this team, veteran leadership, and Andy Reid, as far as the job he's done, keeping our confidence high at all times, even when we were losing, he's just a heck of a coach. At 1-5, you have to coach your butt off. He's a big part of this winning streak.

DB: You haven't lost since Oct. 18, Week 6. What's that feel like to be a football player and go 71 days, or more than 10 weeks, without tasting defeat?

DJ: That doesn't happen often. One other time a couple years ago (in 2013), we started 9-0. But now we're peaking at the right time and our confidence is really high. We're not conceited, but very confident. And that's going to help us throughout the playoffs, knowing our wins came in the second half of the season. We just need to keep rolling. We're an excited group, but there's a lot more that we can do better.

DB: You're tied for being the senior-most Chief in terms of continuous service, and you've said this is the most talented Chiefs team you've been on? You've been to the playoffs in 2006, 2010, 2013 and now you're going in 2015. Why was this your most talented team in your eyes?

DJ: We just have a lot of proven players, a lot of Pro Bowl players. Don't get me wrong, I don't want to say the Pro Bowl is the best thing out there, but it puts a tag on people as far as what caliber players we are. We've got a lot of Pro Bowl players on this team and at the beginning of the year, I said it a couple times that this is probably the top one or two teams I've been on in my 11 years, and that's saying a lot.

DB: Watching that Denver game Monday night must have been tough. Cincinnati is winning 14–0, and Kansas City's shot to win the AFC West is so close you almost can taste it, and then it all turns the other way. Does that hurt, or are all your goals still attainable via the wild-card route if you have to go that way?

DJ: Everything's still attainable. You don't want to get too focused in on other people controlling your destiny. We know we still control our destiny. We're in a heck of a spot right now. Of course we can move up in the seedings, but at the end of the day, it doesn't matter the [seed] that you go into the playoffs with. Our mindset is if we're going to go, we're trying to win it all. However it unfolds, we've got to win it all.

DB: You've punched your ticket for the playoffs, so all that's left is tasting victory in the postseason. This franchise is 0–7 in its last seven playoff trips going back to 1994, and you're personally 0–3 in the playoffs. Two years ago in Indianapolis, the Chiefs let that huge second-half lead get away. How much does it burn to get that goose egg off the board in the playoffs for the franchise?

DJ: Man, we need to get it off real quick. It's one of those things that's been hanging over our heads. Every year is different, so we're not going to be going into the game thinking, 'Oh, we haven't won in a playoff game in however many years.' It's not like that. But we have to take advantage of our opportunity and seize the moment and what better way to do that than to come from 1–5, working our way all the way back, and now to have an opportunity to win our first playoff game in probably 20 years?

DB: How does a team lose one of the best running backs in the league in Jamaal Charles and proceed to lead the NFL in rushing from Week 6 on? That defies logic and conventional wisdom. Can you explain that?

DJ: Not at all. I cannot tell you how that happened. If you had told me that before it happened, I'd say something's not right about that. But what have I seen go right is the determination of the young guys stepping up when they needed to, being that next man up. Charcandrick West and Spencer Ware have done a great job of helping out with big shoes to fill. We needed two people to fill Jamaal Charles's shoes. It's one of those things we wish he was with us, but it's always next man up.

DB: You have four sacks this season and are one sack away from a career high. You've turned in another strong season, but you play with stars like Justin Houston and Tamba Hali, so you don't always get the media attention. It would seem you're having an under-the-radar season on this under-the-radar team.

DJ: I appreciate that, man. We have a lot of good players on this team, and even though the media part is not there as much because it's a smaller market here in Kansas City, I think the guys on the team really appreciate what I bring to the table and I really value their opinions. I got my 1,000th career tackle earlier this year against Green Bay and broke the Chiefs' team tackle record, so that was a big deal for me, especially coming off the Achilles injury last year. Being all the way back now and being able to help my team win, it's been an awesome year.

DB: What's the DNA of this team? I see almost no turnovers by quarterback Alex Smith, a reliable running game and a stout defense with so many different playmakers, doing whatever it takes to win games. What's your assessment of this team's winning formula?

DJ: We're tough, a very tough-minded team. We have a running game that's always there for us, we don't turn the ball over, and we try to create turnovers on defense and stop the run, making teams one-dimensional. That's been the pedigree through this winning streak we've had, and hopefully we can keep it going.

DB: Let's talk about Andy Reid's dancing. He's doing the dab. Your thoughts, critiques?

DJ: You know what, that surprised the heck out of me, man. Usually as we come in he gives us a little fist bump, or maybe a "How 'bout those Chiefs?" after we win. But for him to do the current dance, the dab, that was a good one that he laid on us, to see an older guy get himself to do that.

Here's Why Everyone Deserves Credit for Chiefs Current Nine-Game Winning Streak

He's quick to point the credit towards general manager John Dorsey for constructing a roster that could not only handle the kinds of injuries the Kansas City Chiefs have faced this year, but also thrive in the aftermath.

It's worth arguing that what the Chiefs have accomplished this season has been the best work of Andy Reid's illustrious career, and because of that, Reid deserves serious consideration for the NFL's Coach of the Year award.

But much like his players, four of whom were recently honored with Pro Bowl nominations, including two first-timers in Marcus Peters and Travis Kelce, who went no further than simply saying, "That's cool, but it's not what we're about," in regards to being honored among their peers, Reid isn't concerned with personal accomplishments or accolades.

That's not the focus, that's not the goal and that's not what's real.

What is real about the 2015 season thus far?

The Chiefs have been without their best offensive player and the franchise's all-time leading rusher—Jamaal Charles—since Week 5. Their best defensive player and the NFL's reigning sack leader—Justin Houston—has already missed more than a quarter of the season with a knee injury.

And that's just at the surface of what the Chiefs have dealt with this season. After a 1-5 start that saw two heartbreaking losses in the final seconds of the first two home games—plus the injury to Charles in that devastating loss to the Chicago Bears—the stars had seemed to have aligned to where nobody would have been surprised if things had continued to spiral out of control for the Chiefs from there.

But that's not what happened.

They refused to let anything derail the belief they had in themselves that it wasn't too late to turn things around, and despite who was injured for the season or who was unable to go in any given week, there was confidence and trust in the next man up to get the job done.

Whether it was little-known second-year running back Charcandrick West out of Division II Abilene Christian, or this year's first-round pick, Marcus Peters, the guys have responded when their name was called.

The Chiefs join the 1970 Cincinnati Bengals as the only teams in NFL history to start the season with a 1-5 record and ultimately make the playoffs.

It's already been a historic run, and it's far from over. But how do you spread the credit around after such an amazing turnaround?

Well, there's plenty to go around.

It starts with Dorsey and the personnel staff for putting together a roster with such depth that it could not only withstand, but also prosper through a variety of injuries to different key parts of the roster.

They've had injuries along the offensive line, starting with veteran Ben Grubbs, who coming into the season was the only player expected to start along the line that had been in the league for more than five years.

It was an already-young group and he was brought in to help solidify the core with a veteran presence. Grubbs hasn't played since Week 7 and was placed on Injured Reserve on December 1 with a neck injury.

Former No. 1 overall pick Eric Fisher was set to begin the season at right tackle but wasn't able to play in the opener against the Houston Texans because of an ankle injury, and therefore, Jah Reid, who had been picked up by Dorsey and crew just six days earlier, started Week 1 against Houston.

Just nine starts later, Reid would sign a multi-year contract extension with the Chiefs.

Fisher took over at left tackle for the Chiefs back in Week 7 against the Pittsburgh Steelers and they haven't lost a game since.

The most consistent offensive lineman for the Chiefs this year?

It's rookie second-round pick Mitch Morse, who leads all offensive linemen with 861 total snaps played.

Second-year player Zach Fulton has started at right guard, center and left guard already this season, providing key depth to an offensive line that has seen seven different starting combinations this season.

Here's a look at the game-by-game starters for the Chiefs offensive line.

With the season-ending foot injury to rookie tight end James O'Shaughnessy, the Chiefs have gotten 102 total snaps from another rookie in Brian Parker, who they picked up via waivers from the San Diego Chargers right before the season began.

In the defensive backfield, starting nickel cornerback Phillip Gaines was lost for the season with a torn ACL suffered in the Week 3 loss in Green Bay.

The versatile veteran Ron Parker, who has rotated between safety and cornerback throughout his time in Kansas City, was asked to move back inside to nickel after the injury to Gaines.

It's a difficult transition that Parker has handled beautifully and it's one of the most underappreciated storylines of a Chiefs defense that over the past nine games, has allowed just 12.3 points per game, which ranks as the best in the NFL.

The defensive line went eight straight games without Dontari Poe (Week 6), Mike DeVito (Weeks 7, 8, 14) and Allen Bailey (Weeks 10-13) all being available in the same game.

Jaye Howard, who was picked up on waivers from Seattle by Dorsey back in 2013, has been the one constant for the defensive line, and he's responded with a career year in terms of tackles (53) and sacks (4.5). He's also forced a fumble and recovered 2 of them.

At outside linebacker, the Chiefs have relied on the expected impact of Justin Houston and Tamba Hali when they've been healthy, but in their absence, veteran Frank Zombo and second-year player Dee Ford have made enough plays to continue the defense's dominance throughout this winning streak, half of which has been without Houston coming off the edge.

Zombo has become particularly valuable, excelling on special teams and also filling in at both inside linebacker and outside linebacker throughout the season.

Last Sunday against the Browns, with both Houston and Hali out with injuries, Zombo played all 68 snaps for the Chiefs defense but didn't lessen his impact on special teams, where he tied for the team lead with 20 snaps.

All of this goes without saying of the return of Eric Berry and Derrick Johnson to lead this defense through all of these difficult times.

The "next man up" philosophy hasn't just been an overused cliché or punchline for this Chiefs team, but rather as a badge of honor to highlight what's truly been a team effort to pull off such a historic turnaround.

Led by Dorsey and his staff of dedicated evaluators, who largely go unappreciated for all of their behind-the-scenes work, Reid, who led the ship when times were difficult, the coaching staff as a whole, which had everyone ready to play, and the training staff, which quickly helped players get healthy and back on the field—the credit for what has transpired needs to be shared among all of these people, and obviously, with the players who were performing out on the field.

How the Chiefs became 'the team that people don't want to play'

Albert Lewis is a fan, even now, 17 years after his last NFL game, and of course he follows the Chiefs closely because how could he not? He played most of his 16 seasons and 225 games in a red helmet with an arrowhead on the sides. His name is spelled in bold black letters inside Arrowhead Stadium, forever a member of the Chiefs' ring of honor.

Football is a business, he likes to say, so he does not come to this as a blind fan but there is a little more pride in his voice when he talks about his favorite former employer. Especially now, nine wins deep into a franchise-changing win streak. He says it's largely the same feeling whether you're a fan, player, former player or, it seems, a former player who now coaches for perhaps the game's top Super Bowl contender.

Like, Kevin Ross, who shared a defensive backfield with Lewis in Kansas City and now coaches cornerbacks for the Cardinals.

"We had a conversation about this the other day," Lewis said. "He said, 'Man, the team that people don't want to play is the Chiefs.'"

A caveat: nothing in American sports promotes overreaction like football, and especially in the NFL, games are won and seasons are lost on a razor's edge. The conversation around the Chiefs would be different if, for instance, Danny Woodhead caught that final pass at Arrowhead or if the Browns had completed that comeback instead of going all Browns.

But results matter, and by now the Chiefs have a tall enough stack of irrefutable results that they have not only changed their season and perhaps the futures of some coaches, but they've changed the look, feel and even the odds of the AFC playoffs.

Because a conspiracy of favorable external context (top teams appearing vulnerable) and internal fortitude (one of the greatest in-season turnarounds in NFL history) has reshaped the way the AFC will be decided.

Going into week 7, the Chiefs were a 300:1 longshot to win the Super Bowl, according to Bovada. Only the Ravens, Bears, Browns and Jaguars had worse odds. Now, the Chiefs are a 14:1 bet. Only the Patriots and Broncos have better odds among AFC teams. Football Outsiders' leading metric has the Chiefs as second in overall team efficiency, and first among AFC teams.

This is more than a market correction. The closer you look at both the Chiefs and the teams they'll compete against, the better you feel about their chances to win a playoff game for the first time in 22 years, and possibly more.

Some of this is the simple logic that most of the reasons to doubt the Chiefs are buried under more than two months of nothing but success. They are giving up 13.2 points per game since week 5. Since the turn of the century, only five teams have been more effective defensively. Two of them made their conference championship games. A third was the 2000 Ravens, the Super Bowl champions and one of the best defenses of all time.

Quoting statistics like this can be notoriously misleading, and in this particular case the stretch used coincides with a severe drop-off in competition. So dismiss if you'd like.

But it also lines up with the Chiefs becoming more of what they now are. They played the first three games without top cornerback Sean Smith (who is allowing only 51.4 percent of his targets to be completed, according to Pro Football Focus). Dontari Poe, recovering from back surgery, went from playing less than 60 percent of the total snaps the first three weeks to about 80 percent in the 12 games since.

Similarly, Eric Berry (Hodgkin lymphoma) and Derrick Johnson (ruptured Achilles) have played faster and stronger as the season has progressed, and Marcus Peters has gone from good to great in the second half.

What's more, the Chiefs have played much of the last two months without Justin Houston (their best overall player) and Husain Abdullah (severely underrated and under appreciated). They played last week without Houston and Tamba Hali. All three players should be back for the playoffs.

The NFL has long marketed and valued offense over defense, but half of the last 10 Super Bowl teams have ranked either first or second in points allowed. Only three have ranked in the top five in points scored. Even with that rotten start, and basically five straight games without Houston, the Chiefs rank second in points allowed.

What's more, the Chiefs have scored six touchdowns on defense, meaning the opposition is averaging just 15.2 net points per game with its offense on the field. No team in the league has been better and, again, that includes the Chiefs' terrible first month.

The Chiefs' offense is not as good as the defense, but it's also much better than most casual fans probably realize. They are ninth in the league in points, and tied for ninth in yards per play, seventh in percentage of drives ending in points, and first in fewest turnovers.

Their offense is likely better than the tropes about Alex Smith's arm and Andy Reid's clock management allow, too.

In particular with Smith, the common criticisms and institutionalized doubts are both mostly earned but also a bad fit for how he has performed since October.

Smith has played three playoff games in his career. He beat Drew Brees in a shootout, was kneecapped by special teams mistakes in a loss to a defense that beat Aaron Rodgers and Tom Brady and won the Super Bowl, and threw for 378 yards and four touchdowns in a loss in which he played without Jamaal Charles and a starting receiver and still scored 44 points.

By virtually any measure, Smith is playing better than ever. He already has set career highs in yards, advanced metrics like Total Quarterback Rating have him on a career-best path, and studies of his play show more comfort and willingness to throw deep. In addition to all of that, he is one of the game's best running quarterbacks. His 437 yards rank fourth, and his 5.8 yards per rush average is higher than Cam Newton, Russell Wilson and Tyrod Taylor. Thirty-two of his 76 rushes have resulted in first downs or touchdowns, including 17 of 26 on third or fourth down.

Here's a sentence you didn't expect to be true: with the Steelers a relative longshot to make the playoffs, Alex Smith could be the best quarterback in the AFC postseason after Tom Brady.

This is not hyperbole.

His health, career postseason record and recent performance are all better than Andy Dalton. Denver's quarterback situation is a weekly soap opera, and Houston's is as bad as any playoff team in recent history. Ryan Fitzpatrick is having a very good season, and the Jets' receivers are better than the Chiefs', but he is also Ryan Fitzpatrick.

Wider comparisons of the Chiefs and their postseason competition are similar, and without the stink of their franchise's sorry playoff record, the reasons that Ross and others around the league see the Chiefs as so dangerous would be easier to see.

There are no perfect teams. The Patriots have Bill Belichick, Tom Brady and Rob Gronkowski but little else. They've suffered an astounding number of injuries, and gave up 65 points in consecutive losses to Denver and Philadelphia.

The Bengals have lost four of their last seven, beating only the Rams, Browns and 49ers, and will be playing with either A.J. McCarron or a diminished Andy Dalton, and have their own recent playoff failures. The Jets are probably undervalued by many, winning five in a row, but remain statistically unimposing, particularly on offense. The Steelers were just blown out by the awful Ravens, and the Texans are a product of the loophole that puts all division winners, no matter how mediocre, into the postseason.

So, strange as it may sound, the Chiefs have a real shot at this.

You know, it's not just former stars like Ross and Lewis who are high on the current group. Nick Lowery, the former kicker who is also in the team's ring of honor, spent much of a wide-ranging 30-minute conversation on a sort of magic he sees in this team.

Like many with ties to Kansas City, Lowery became enthralled with the Royals these last two years. The comebacks, the camaraderie, the relentlessness. It is almost certainly a coincidence of geography, but he sees a lot of similarities with the football team.

"They are playing almost like the Royals brand of football," Lowery said. "No major stars. They have no stars, but lots of heroes. Guys who understand what it takes to win, don't seem to care who gets the credit, and seem completely bought in on the bigger cause. That is the juice in the bottle that is the most elusive of all."

Lowery knows much of the Chiefs' postseason heartbreak in an undeniably personal way. As much as any fan, he has reason to be cynical. But as much as any football man, he also sees reason to be confident.

That's the inner conflict that will be determined by the rest of this Chiefs season, first on Sunday against the Raiders, and then, somehow, the next week in the playoffs.

In many ways, Smith is the prototype of an Andy Reid quarterback. That's why one of Reid's first acts as Chiefs head coach, along with new GM John Dorsey, early in the 2013 offseason was to ship two second-round picks to San Francisco in exchange for Smith, a price some deemed steep at the time.

Smith thrives on the intermediate throws that Reid loves, perennially completes more than 60 percent of his passes and is notoriously careful with the football (save for the anomaly of Sunday's win against Oakland, when he was picked off on back-to-back passes). Three Reid quarterbacks, McNabb, Nick Foles and Smith, rank Nos. 8, 9 and 10, respectively, in lowest

career interception rate in NFL history; a fourth, Jeff Garcia, is 12th. During a span this season from late September to mid-December, Smith threw 312 passes without a pick, the second-longest streak in league annals.

Smith will never put up eye-popping quarterback stats—he ranked 20th in the NFL with 3,486 passing yards and 20 passing TDs this season—because he’s not asked to. The Chiefs are built to win with a strong run game, an opportunistic defense and a quarterback who makes good decisions. Being given more power, to make better decisions, has been a process. Or, as Smith puts it: “A battle, for three years, on some things.”

He’s grinning as he says it, because he and Reid have a strong relationship. Smith had never been with a coach and offensive coordinator in the NFL as long as he’s been with Reid and Pederson (and when three years is a long time, that speaks to the upheaval Smith has been through). Reid’s system is set up for the quarterback to have defined reads so he can move through his progression quickly, and move through plays quickly. If the first option doesn’t look good, just keep it moving to find the next open guy.

That’s in contrast to Smith’s last offense before coming to Kansas City. With former 49ers coach Jim Harbaugh and offensive coordinator Greg Roman, Smith would go to the line with as many as five different plays and then choose the best one based on what he saw. What’s happened this season is a blending of these two approaches. Take that Kelce touchdown play again: During the offseason, Smith and the coaches added five different adjustments Smith could make, whether with a verbal call or a hand signal, to change a receiver’s route depending on the look the defense is giving. Watching from the sideline, the coaches knew what adjustment Smith would tell Kelce to make. They knew it’d be a touchdown.

Ask any of Smith’s receivers, and they can rattle off an example from this season when his machinations have worked. Maclin caught a 32-yard pass against the Bills in Week 12, when Smith checked out of a screen pass. The Chiefs’ only touchdown in their Week 14 win against San Diego came off an adjustment, too. When the deep safety, Eric Weddle, came up on a blitz, Smith gave receiver Albert Wilson the cue to switch his route to a quick three-step slant instead of going deep. Wilson worked inside the cornerback covering him, and when the defender whiffed on the tackle, Wilson was in the clear to run the rest of the way for a 44-yard score.

“It has opened our eyes as coaches who have grown up in this system to sort of branch out and go, hey, that’s pretty sweet,” says Pederson, who was Reid’s quarterbacks coach for two seasons in Philly. “This just makes us better. This makes this play that much better. Those are things Alex has brought to us, and to be able to put that on his plate, and let him get us out of bad situations or get us into a better situation, slowly kind of crept us out of our hole at the beginning of the season.”

One of Reid’s strengths as a coach is to see the game through the eyes of his quarterbacks, no matter what style they play—and he’s certainly coached the gamut. Favre. McNabb. Michael Vick. Foles. Smith. Etc.

“I watched Mike Holmgren do that with Favre,” says Reid, whose first NFL coaching job was on Holmgren’s Packers staff. “Everything wasn’t like exactly like it was in San Francisco. Favre was different than Joe Montana. Steve Young was different than Montana and Favre. McNabb was different than those guys. You can go so many different directions with the offense, so you just kind of fit it into the personality of that player.”

Reid had followed Smith, from his college career in Utah, where he went 24-2 under Urban Meyer in his final two seasons (including 12-0 in 2004), through his early years in the NFL with the 49ers, when Smith started four games against Reid's Eagles. Reid always thought Smith would be a good fit for his offense, so when the Chiefs traded for him in '13, he already had an idea of how to play to his strengths.

Such as folding in some of the spread concepts from Meyer's Utah offense. Smith has rushed for a career-high 498 yards this season, and against the Raiders he converted a fourth-and-1 with an option run out of the pistol formation. During all those Eagles-49ers games, Reid had also observed how good Smith was making checks at the line of scrimmage. It took time to get there, but he was willing to open that up to Smith.

"I tell him, he's got the keys to the car," Reid says. "He's got ways in and out of plays, really every play, and I've got confidence that he can do it."

Reid's track record with quarterbacks was a big reason why Smith wanted to come to Kansas City—and yes, Smith had input into the trade. Most of his first eight seasons in San Francisco were a blueprint on how to ruin a No. 1 overall pick. Smith played for six offensive coordinators in his first six pro seasons, never being given a chance to master a system, or have his coaches master him. The 49ers never had a winning season those first six years, and he threw more interceptions (53) than he did touchdowns (51).

"You say a lot of quarterbacks would be ruined by that. I would say most. Most are ruined," says Rich Gannon, CBS commentator and an 18-year NFL quarterback, to whose playing style Smith's is often likened. "He was abused and mistreated those early years in San Francisco. It ruins your confidence and that of the people around you, whether it's teammates, the coaches or the fan base. No quarterback should go through what he went through."

By 2011, when Harbaugh was hired by the 49ers, "let's just say it," says Roman, Smith's seventh NFL offensive coordinator, "he was considered a bust." Though the 49ers had drafted Colin Kaepernick in the second round that year, Harbaugh and Roman decided to forge ahead with Smith. Their starting point was the same place that keyed the Chiefs' turnaround this year: Smith's brain. They wanted Smith to think through a football game, Roman says, like Jack Nicklaus used to think his way through a golf course. Smith was given the chance to find answers to problems on the football field, and when he did that his confidence started to rebuild.

Smith led the Niners to the NFC Championship Game during the 2011 season and was off to another good start in 2012. The entire NFL world knows what happened next: Smith suffered a concussion midseason, Kaepernick performed well in his absence, and Smith never got his job back. If Smith's early years in the pros calcified his mental fortitude, his stint as Kaepernick's backup confirmed his solidarity.

Roman remembers meeting with the quarterbacks the Monday before their second NFC Championship Game, which Kaepernick would start this time, and was impressed by the lengths Smith went to make sure that week's game plan would be one in which Kaepernick could succeed. A few weeks earlier, in Week 16 of the regular season, the 49ers offense had struggled in a loss amidst the deafening crowd noise of Seattle's CenturyLink Field. For the title game against Atlanta in the Falcons' noisy Georgia Dome, Smith advocated for a no-huddle attack that wouldn't rely on verbal communication. "He literally was like Kaepernick's agent," Roman says, "to make sure I didn't pile too much on him in the championship game."

It worked, and Kaepernick got the 49ers to Super Bowl XLVII, where they narrowly lost to the Ravens. With Kaepernick firmly set as the starter, it wasn't feasible to keep Smith, his \$8.5 million salary prohibitive for a backup. A few weeks after the Super Bowl, Harbaugh acknowledged publicly that Smith would likely be traded.

"We used to talk all the time about how can we keep both of these guys, but I don't think it was fair to Alex to do that," Roman says. "And he probably didn't look at it this way, and I understand that, but I think there was a great effort on our part—and I've got to credit Harbaugh with that—to try to find him the best situation, because of how thankful we were for what he did and how he did it for us. It went beyond a business decision for us. We all wanted to see him have success."

Smith does agree with that. After the 2012 season ended, he says the 49ers kept him in the loop about which teams were interested and presented options to him. He didn't get to pick, per se—but he says he had a lot of input. And his input on Kansas City, which had young talent and a new coach with a track record of success with all kinds of quarterbacks, was that it was a place he would like to go.

"I absolutely wanted this," Smith says. "When it all came down, when it was all laid out, this team was for sure my choice."

Late Sunday night the Chiefs' locker room had emptied after the last home game of the season, but Smith was standing in an envious position. For the second time in three years in Kansas City, there was more football to be played after Week 17. Meanwhile, a couple time zones away, the team that had shipped him here was facing more turmoil. In the past year, the 49ers have fired Harbaugh and Jim Tomsula and benched Kaepernick. In a polar opposite from the Chiefs, they have no idea who their coach or quarterback will be in 2016.

From afar, Smith has to look back and think, Boy, they'd like to have that trade back. Right?

"For me, it was so long ago," Smith says. "You see it. I certainly have a lot of friends on that team. And you do recognize it is—even for me—crazy to watch what has happened the last couple of years. But from day one, when the trade happened, I was so happy about the opportunity to come here, and was going to go full bore with it and not think about anything else, and try to make the most of it. I think, certainly, what happened with me there makes you appreciate the opportunity. The opportunity to play and start and how it can get taken from you pretty quick. So, yeah."

He's asked, Do you think they consider it a mistake?

"I have no idea," Smith says. "It's weird. None of them are there. They are out of there as well."

Three years later, you can do a valuation. The 49ers turned the two second-round picks they got for Smith into three players they still have, DT Tank Carradine, LB Corey Lemonier and RB Carlos Hyde, and two they don't, LB Chris Borland (retired) and WR Stevie Johnson (cut). The Chiefs got something every franchise wants, and something they haven't had since Trent Green: Stability at the quarterback position. Over the past five seasons (two in San Francisco, three in Kansas City), Smith trails only Tom Brady, Aaron Rodgers and Andy Dalton in quarterback wins.

What every franchise wants even more than stability at the quarterback position, of course, is a championship. The two go hand in hand, sure, but where on the quarterback spectrum between “stable” and “Super Bowl winner” does Smith register? He’s always been a challenge to appraise. And what about that tag, “game manager?”

“That’s okay,” Pederson says. “I’d rather have somebody that way, who is not going to turn the ball over, who is going to use his legs when he needs to run, who uses his brain all the time to get us out of bad situations. And if he manages the game that way and we win, then I’ll take that.”

“Everybody is into labels these days: Is he elite? Is he a franchise quarterback? Is he a game manager?” Gannon says. “If you think about it, all the top quarterbacks are game managers. I just think he’s a very unselfish player.”

“He’s an Andy Reid quarterback,” says veteran receiver Jason Avant, who has played nine seasons under Reid, “because what makes an Andy Reid quarterback is a quarterback who is willing to spend the time like Coach Reid does. A quarterback who knows as much about what’s going on as the coach does.”

That meeting of the minds turned a season around, and now the Chiefs head into the playoffs as the hottest team in football. Game manager? Alex Smith is that, and a lot more.

The Chiefs' drought is over, and now who can be sure what's next?

Andy Reid walks off the field and toward the celebration of the first Chiefs playoff win in 22 years with his arm around his wife. When it was time for the coach to turn right, toward the locker room, they kissed and hugged and laughed. Tammy Reid hung around, though, because when you're part of something like this, you don't want to miss a moment.

Nobody did.

Knile Davis skipped, literally, to the locker room. Donald Stephenson tomahawk-chopped. Marcus Peters sang rap lyrics. Alex Smith hugged Clark Hunt, who, finally, is the man in charge of a playoff winner.

The Chiefs beat the Texans 30-0 in an AFC Wild Card game Saturday at NRG Stadium, across the parking lot from the abandoned dome where they won their last playoff game. Twenty-two years. Long enough ago that the Internet, for all intents and purposes, did not exist. Neither did this building, nor the team the Chiefs just beat, nor high-definition televisions many watched on.

This was not the same mark of frustration as the Royals' playoff drought, for a lot of reasons, but it was the third-longest streak in the NFL and had come to define the Chiefs in a way that everyone from Hunt to the groundskeepers have been eager to change.

The easy thing is to say that the 22-year drought does not matter, because the NFL is a year-to-year existence, so how is Peters or Travis Kelce or Eric Berry supposed to feel connected to failures that happened before they hit puberty? But that's not the truth, or at least it's not the truth for those most connected to the franchise and Kansas City.

"Yeah it matters," said Tamba Hali, in his 10th year with the Chiefs. "It matters, for sure. You can't overlook that. We are part of the organization and the family. We can't keep repeating it. To be able to overcome losing in the playoffs, that's huge, for the organization, our fans. And as a player, I've been here long enough."

Hali smiled. I suggested it must feel particularly good washing away those past frustrations this way, squashing them, like a wrecking ball through a brick wall. If the uniforms were reversed, and it were the Chiefs on the other side, losing a home game while the quarterback put on one of the all-time worst performances in playoff history would fit nicely along with a list of other losses that we don't need to get into here. After all of that, it must feel especially fulfilling being on this side of that.

Hali laughed.

"I'm not saying that," he said. "You said that. Not me."

Well, yes. That's exactly what I'm saying.

Because this was a blowout, a curb-stomping, an annihilation that was so complete that most of entire sections of seats here were empty by the end of the third quarter. Smith was sharp (at least after the first quarter), Kelce was unstoppable, and even accounting for the way Texans quarterback Brian Hoyer appeared more in the mood for a quiet night on the couch than a playoff game, the Chiefs defense was suffocating.

It was the first playoff shutout since 2005. Not including a kneel-down before halftime, the Texans had 11 possessions: five punts, four interceptions, one lost fumble and one turnover on downs.

The Chiefs have lost playoff wins in every way imaginable. Blowouts, blown leads, blown opportunities and simply not being good enough. Here, they won, and for a hundred different reasons — they had the better quarterback, better coach, more balanced team, better defense, the fortitude to come back from 1-5, the depth and versatility to absorb injuries to their best players, and, maybe, the football gods decided to finally give them a break.

The Chiefs have shown a remarkable week-to-week focus, one of a dozen characteristics they needed to make this journey and one that makes them a legitimate threat in the AFC.

The Chiefs will play the Patriots next Saturday, and the game will be on the road, without question a tougher matchup than any during their win streak. Jeremy Maclin left the game because of a knee injury, and they do not yet know how serious that is. Maclin may have been the team's most important player during the regular season, and if he's unable to go, the Chiefs will have to make another major adjustment.

But they've done more, and been through worse. It's all there for them, everything possible. One of the sport's longest playoff droughts over, one of the league's greatest turnarounds complete, one of the franchise's best teams — still going.
