BYE WEEK SUMMAR

The New England Patriots opened the second half of the 2014 season with a 43-21 victory over the Denver Broncos to improve to 7-2, the best record in the AFC. The game marked New England's fifth straight win and 14th straight home victory. Over their fivegame winning streak, the Patriots have averaged 40.2 points per game.

Since the 2010 season, the Patriots are now a combined 30-3 in the second half of the regular season. In both 2010 and 2011, the Patriots were 8-0 in the second half of the year. New England was 7-1 in 2013 and 6-2 in 2014. Since Bill Belichick became Patriots head coach in 2000, New England is 90-23 in the second half of the season, and has gone 8-0 in the second half four times in Belichick's tenure and 7-1 three times.

The Patriots need one more victory to guarantee a finish of .500 or better for the 14th consecutive season. Since 2001, the Patriots are the only team to finish with a record above .500 in each of those seasons. Every other NFL team has had at least one losing season between 2001 and 2013.

The Patriots return to action on Nov. 16 when they travel to Indianapolis to face the Colts in a Sunday Night Football game on NBC.

NOVEMBER REIGN

The New England Patriots own an NFL-best 38-14 (.731) record in the month of November since 2001. During that time, the Patriots have had four undefeated Novembers (2003, 2004, 2007 and 2012).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN THE SECOND HALF

TEAM

- The Patriots will come off the bye seeking their sixth consecutive win, the longest win streak since New England won seven straight in 2012.
- The Patriots need one more victory to guarantee a finish of .500 or better for the 14th consecutive season.

TOM BRADY

Brady has 2,392 passing yards and 22 touchdowns throught the first nine games and is on pace to finish with 4,252 passing yards and 39 touchdowns.

STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI

- Gostkowski has 1,124 career points and needs seven more to pass Gino Cappelletti into second place on the Patriots all-time scoring list.
- Gostkowski has 24 field goals so far in 2014, putting him on pace to finish with 43 field goals, which would be the second highest single-season total in NFL history.
- Gostkowski has scored 101 points through nine games and is on pace to score 180, which would be an NFL record.

ROB GRONKOWSKI

Gronkowski needs two more touchdown receptions to become the first tight end in NFL history with four 10-TD catch seasons.

BRANDON LAFELL

LaFell has five touchdown receptions, putting him on pace for 10 for the season. One more TD reception will set a new career high.

KRAFT

News & Notes

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 21st season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994,



Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles [13], conference crowns [6] and Super Bowl championships [3] than any other NFL team. The Patriots have made six Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 20 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 15 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

In the early 1990's, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season tickets are capped and more than 50,000 fans are on a season ticket waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 223 consecutive home games, including playoff and preseason games (dating back to the 1994 season opener).

KRAFT PRODUCES MORE WINS THAN EVERY OTHER PATRIOTS OWNER COMBINED

The Patriots have 245 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 245-117 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

QB STABILITY

Since 1994, the Patriots have had 15 quarterbacks on their active roster. The New England Patriots and Tom Brady out dueled the Denver Broncos and Peyton Manning in the 16th meeting of the quarterbacks. Brady is now 11-5 when facing a Manning-led team.

It marked the 200th career start for Brady, who has more wins (155) in his first 200 starts than any other NFL quarterback. Manning is second with 136 wins in his first 200 starts.

Brady finished 33-of-53 for 333 yards and four touchdown passes. His 333 yards moved him past Pro Football Hall of Famer John Elway for the fifth-most passing yards in NFL history.

WR Julian Edelman returned a second-quarter punt 84 yards for a team record fourth career punt returned for a touchdown. TE Rob Gronkowski caught nine passes for 105 yards and a touchdown, and DE Rob Ninkovich and CB Brandon Browner both had interceptions that helped lead to touchdowns.

The game was not too competitive after the first quarter. Denver took a 7-3 first-quarter lead, but New England scored 24 points in the second frame to take a 27-7 halftime lead.

After a 29-yard field goal early in the second quarter closed the gap to 7-6, Ninkovich picked off a Manning pass deep in Denver territory for a Patriots first down at the Denver 34-yard line. The Patriots converted the turnover into a 5-yard touchdown pass from Brady to Edelman for a 13-7 lead. After forcing Denver to punt on the next series, Edelman raced 84 yards for a touchdown to put the Patriots in front, 20-7.

The Patriots got the ball back with 2:05 to play in the first half and for the eighth time in nine games, New England scored in the final two minutes of the first half. Brady engineered a 9-play, 57-yard drive that was highlighted by a 26-yard pass to Edelman for a first down at the Denver 23-yard line. Brady finished the drive with a 5-yard touchdown pass to RB Shane Vereen for a 27-7 lead heading into halftime.

Denver tried to get back into the game in the third quarter. The Patriots first drive ended in an interception that led to a Denver touchdown to close the gap to 27-14. However, New England scored on their next two drives to take a 37-14 lead. First, K Stephen Gostkowski drilled a 45-yard field goal. On the next series, Browner picked off Manning and returned the ball 30 yards to the Denver 20-yard line. On the very next play, Brady connected with WR Brandon LaFell for a 10-yard touchdown and a 37-14 lead.

The Broncos added a touchdown on the ensuing drive, but New England responded with a 14-play, 80-yard drive that ended with a 1-yard touchdown pass to TE Rob Gronkowski early in the fourth quarter for a 43-14 Patriots lead. It marked Gronkowski's 50th career touchdown reception in just his 59th NFL game. He tied Randy Moss for the second-fastest to reach 50 touchdown receptions.

PATRIOTS WIN STREAK ROLLS ON

The Patriots won their fifth consecutive game, the longest current winning streak in the NFL. New England and Denver entered the game tied for the league's longest winning streak [4]. The Patriots have not lost since a 41-14 defeat at Kansas City on Sept. 29. Over their five-game winning streak, the Patriots have averaged 40.2 points per game.



HOME IS WHERE THE WINS ARE

With the win over the DBroncos, New England has now won 34 straight games at home against AFC opponents. The 34 straight home wins against a conference is the longest in NFL history (following the 1970 merger). The Miami Dolphins are second in NFL history with 21 straight home conference wins (1971-1974). The Patriots last loss at home against an AFC opponent was a 33-10 loss vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 30, 2008.

HALFTIME HELP

The Patriots have been very successful in the final two minutes of the first half in 2014. New England has scored in the final two minutes of the game in eight of the first nine games this season, including three field goals as time has expired. Against Denver, Tom Brady found Shane Vereen on a 5-yard TD strike with eight seconds remaining. Overall, through nine games this season, New England has scored 12 times after the first-half two-minute warning, good for 56 total points.

PICKS FOR POINTS

Patriots scored 14 points off of turnovers against the Broncos, and now have scored 74 points off of takeaways in 2014. Against Denver, Rob Ninkovich intercepted a Peyton Manning pass in the second quarter, setting up a 4-play, 34-yard drive that ended in the Patriots' first touchdown of the afternoon and. Brandon Browner intercepted a Manning pass in the third quarter and returned the pick 30 yards to the Broncos' 10-yard line. Tom Brady hit Brandon LaFell for a 10-yard scoring pass on the next play to give the Patriots a 37-14 lead.

PATS SCORE FIRST AND WIN AGAIN

The Patriots scored first on a 49-yard field goal by Stephen Gostkowski in the first quarter. It is the fifth straight game that the Patriots have scored first (all victories).

SWAT TEAM IN EFFECT

The Patriots had eight passes defensed vs. Denver, setting a season-high in that category. The previous season-best was seven passes defensed at Minnesota on Sept. 14. Patrick Chung led the way for the Patriots with a career-high three passes defensed.

HOT WHEN IT'S COLD

The game time temperature was 35 degrees and Tom Brady improved his career regular-season record as a starter to 33-4 in games where the temperature at kickoff was under 40 degrees. In his last 15 such games, Brady is 14-1 and has thrown 36 touchdowns and just six interceptions. In his career as a starter in home games where the temperature is under 40 degrees at kickoff, Brady is 23-3 with 46 touchdowns and 14 interceptions. Including playoffs, he is 43-6 overall in such games.



BRADY MAKES 200TH START

Tom Brady made his 200th career regular-season start against Denver and is now one of eight NFL quarterbacks to start at least 200 games. The other quarterbacks with 200 starts are Brett Favre (298), Peyton Manning (247), Dan Marino (240), Fran Tarkenton (239), John Elway (231), Vinny Testaverde (214) and Warren Moon (203).

BROWNER HAS FIRST PICK

Brandon Browner picked off a Peyton Manning pass in the third quarter and returned it 30 yards to the 10-yard line to set up a 10-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Brandon LaFell. The interception was Browner's first as a Patriot. Browner also had some key defensive plays, notably with tight coverage on Demaryius Thomas on third down on the Broncos' second offensive possession of the game to complete the Patriots defense's second straight three-andout to begin the game. Browner also provided tight coverage on Thomas in the second quarter, helping to force an incompletion on second-and-20, setting up a third-and long that the Broncos did not convert, and Julian Edelman returned the ensuing punt 84 yards for a touchdown and a 20-7 Patriots lead in the second quarter.

GRONKOWSKI HEATING UP

era came at Miami on Dec. 20, 2004, when Corey Dillon rushed for 121 yards on 26 carries and the Patriots lost to the Dolphins, 29-28. Since then, New England is 26-0 with a 100-yard rusher.

SECOND-HALF LOCKDOWN

The Patriots have now won 72 straight home games when leading at halftime, adding to their NFL record. The last Patriots loss at home after leading at halftime was on Dec. 24, 2000 (vs. Miami), when the Patriots lost 27-24 after leading 21-17 at halftime. New England has never lost a game at Gillette Stadium when trailing at halftime, going 64-0 since 2002.

GROUND CONTROL

The Patriots had 220 rushing yards as a team against Cincinnati on Oct. 5, 2014. Stevan Ridley led the way with 113 rushing yards, while Shane Vereen added 90 rushing yards. It was the first time this season the Patriots broke the 200-yard rushing mark. In 2013, the Patriots achieved the feat once, totaling 267 rushing yards in the regular-season finale against Buffalo (12/29/13). The Patriots improved to 64-7 all-time when rushing for 200 or more yards in a game.

SEASON-HIGH OUTPUT

SCORING FLURRY

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26 to turn a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. The Patriots are one of three teams to score three touchdowns in under a minute since the 1970 merger, and are the only team to have achieved the feat twice.

HOW THE PATRIOTS SCORED THREE TOUCHDOWNS IN 57 SECONDS:

- ★ Rob Gronkowski got the scoring started by hauling in a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive.
- ★ After the Patriots defense forced a quick three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- ★ On the Bears' first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown and a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

HALF-CENTURY CLUB

The Patriots scored 51 points against the Bears, marking the 13th time in franchise history that they have broken the 50-point barrier. New England has topped 50 points eight times since 2007. The last time the Patriots broke the 50-point mark was on Nov. 3, 2013, in a 55-31 win over Pittsburgh. The Patriots' franchise record for most points in a game is 59, achieved twice – on Nov, 18, 2012 against Indianapolis [59-24] and on Oct. 16, 2009 vs. Tennessee [59-0].

PILING UP THE RECEIVING YARDS

Rob Gronkowski and Brandon LaFell each broke the 100-yard receiving mark in the win vs. Chicago (10/26). It was the first time this season that the Patriots have had two 100-yard receivers and the 34th time in team history that the feat has occurred. The last time the Patriots had two 100-yard receivers in a game was on Dec. 15, 2013, at Miami, when Julian Edelman (139) and Danny Amendola (131) each broke the 100-yard mark.

TOM BRADY

TOUCHDOWN TOM

Brady currently is fourth all-time with 381 career touchdowns and is one of five NFL players with at least 370 career touchdown passes.

300-YARD GAMES

Brady currently is tied with Brett Favre for fourth with 62 career 300-yard passing games. Dan Marino (63), Drew Brees (83) and Peyton Manning (88) are the only quarterbacks in front of him.

30 TD PASSES

If Brady reaches 30 or more touchdowns passes in 2014, he will become just the fourth player in NFL history with at least 30 or more touchdown passes in five seasons. Brady has 22 touchdowns so far and is on pace for 39 in 2014.

4,000-YARD PASSING SEASON

If Brady reaches 4,000 passing yards in 2014, he will be just the third player in NFL history with at least seven 4,000-yard passing seasons. Brady has 2,392 yards so far in 2014 and is on pace to finish with 4,252 passing yards.

STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI

NFL SCORING LEADER #1

Stephen Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in each of the last two seasons (2012-13). He can become just the fifth NFL player to lead the NFL in scoring in at least three consecutive seasons, joining Don Hutson (1940-44), and Gino Cappelletti (1963-66), Pat Harder (1947-49) and Paul Hornung (1959-61). Gostkowski leads the NFL with 73 points so far in 2014. He enters this week first in the NFL with 101 total points.



3X COACH OF THE YEAR

The Associated Press named Bill Belichick the NFL's Coach of the Year in 2010, the third time that Belichick earned the honor. He was also named Coach of the Year following the 2003 and 2007 seasons, joining Don Shula [4-time winner] and Chuck Knox as the only three-time winners.

BELICHICK ADDED TO HIS RECORD IN 2013

Bill Belichick has coached the Patriots to 11 straight seasons with 10 or more wins after reaching his 10th win of the 2013 season vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8, adding to his NFL record streak. In 2011, Belichick became the first coach in NFL history with nine straight seasons with at least 10 victories. George Seifert has the second most consecutive 10-win seasons with eight from 1989-1996 for San Francisco.

DIVISION TITLES RECORD

Belichick guided the Patriots to the AFC East Title in 2013. It is the 11th division title of his career, tying him with Don Shula for the most division titles since the 1970 NFL merger.



The Patriots secured their eighth conference championship appearance in the Tom Brady - Bill Belichick era (since 2001 with Brady starting at QB) in 2013. By omitting the season Brady missed due to injury in 2008, the Patriots have made eight title games in 12 seasons with Brady as the starter.

FOUR 30-TD SEASONS

Brady has four 30-touchdown seasons overall after throwing for 34 in 2012, an NFL-leading 36 in 2010, 39 in 2011 and a then NFL-record 50 in 2007. The only other Patriots quarterback to have a 30-touchdown season was Vito "Babe" Parilli in 1964 when he led the AFL with 31. Brady is the fifth quarterback in NFL history to have 30 or more touchdown passes in at least four seasons and the fifth quarterback in NFL history with three or more straight seasons with 30 or more touchdowns. He 22 touchdowns so far in 2014 and is on pace for 39.

"Football is something that is not around your entire life," Develin told *The Boston Globe.* "I knew if I didn't give it my best shot to play football as a career, that I'd always regret it." Develin made the most of his opportunity by switching positions to fullback. Following stints in the Arena Football League and the now defunct United Football League, Develin caught on with the Cincinnati Bengals practice squad and eventually worked his way to the Patriots 53-man roster full-time in 2013.

A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told the *Boston Herald*. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."



SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to three straight Pro Bowls (2011-13) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he has been elected a captain by his teammates for the fourth straight season in 2014.

The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

"Guys have really bought into what we're trying to do here and believing in the goals that we've set to accomplish. We try not to acknowledge all the noise and hype surrounding ballgames. We prepare ourselves to have success by the way we work day-in and day-out on the field and in the meeting room, but it definitely starts with our leadership on this team."

Ryan Wendell played a league-high 1,249 snaps in 2012 and it helped earn him a spot on the *USA Today* All-Joe team. Said Wendell: "I think first it says a lot about the organization, our training staff and our strength training coaches, that they do everything they can all season and all off-season and during the spring to keep us healthy throughout the whole season. I think it says more about them than it does about me individually."







WHAT'S IN A NUMBER?

When Arrington was first making the transition from Hofstra to the NFL in 2008, he was assigned jersey No. 42. At that point in his career, he was cut by both the Eagles and Buccaneers. When Arrington first arrived in New England as a practice squad player in 2009, he initially donned No. 27. But when No. 24 became available, a result of Jonathan Wilhite leaving in free agency after the 2010 season, Arrington pounced on it.

The reason is that it reflects how he's flipped his NFL fortunes – from a No. 42 struggling to hang on to a No. 24 who has carved out a role on a winning team. Arrington moved from 24 to 25 in an agreement with Adrian Wilson in 2013 to accommodate the veteran's desire to keep the same jersey he had worn during his 12-year NFL career.

ARRINGTON SCORES AGAIN

DB Kyle Arrington returned a Cincinnati (10/5/14) fumble forced by Brandon Bolden on a third-quarter kickoff 9 yards for a touchdown. It marked his third career touchdown. He returned a blocked field goal 35 yards for a touchdown at Miami (10/4/10) and returned his first career interception 36 yards for a touchdown vs. Green Bay (12/19/10).



JAMIE COLLINS' JOURNEY

The road to the NFL has been anything but easy for linebacker and 2013 second-round draft pick Jamie Collins. The youngest of five siblings growing up in Meadville, Miss., Collins lost both of his parents when he was six years old and was raised by one of his sisters, who was in her mid 20s.

Collins turned to football as an outlet to help him through the tough times. "It means a lot. It's my living," Collins told *The Boston Herald.* "It kept me on track." Collins' resiliency in dealing with adversity has made a lasting impact on fellow Mississippi native Stevan Ridley, who grew up 30 miles west of Meadville in Natchez, Miss., and got to know Collins through a family friend. "What I've known about him, he really has been a strong person," Ridley told the Herald. "Anybody that's gone through the things that he's gone through and can still find a way to be successful on the football field, you have to be mentally tough. That's what he's kind of done as a teammate here. He's come in here and accepted his role and did a pretty good job as a rookie."

Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Chandler Jones was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance in the Patriots' 30-7 victory at Minnesota on Sept. 14, 2014. It is the first time in Jones' career that he has received an AFC Player of the Week honor. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for November last season and NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month in September 2012.

Jones blocked a 48-yard field goal attempt and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown to give New England a 24-7 halftime lead at Minnesota (9/14). He also finished the game with eight total tackles and his fifth career two-sack game.

The last time the Patriots earned an AFC Defensive Player of the Week honor was Week 10 of the 2011 season when Andre Carter tied a team record with four sacks at N.Y. Jets $\{11/13/11\}$.

JONES ACHIEVES TRIFECTA

DL Chandler Jones blocked a second-quarter Minnesota 48-yard field goal attempt, recovered the loose ball and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown. It is the fifth blocked field goal returned for a touchdown in Patriots history and the first returned for a touchdown since S Patrick Chung blocked a field goal attempt that was returned 35 yards for a touchdown by DB Kyle Arrington at Miami on Oct. 4, 2010. It is the second field goal block by Jones. He blocked a 39-yard attempt vs. Miami on Oct. 27, 2013. It is Jones' second career touchdown. He recovered an errant shotgun snap squibbed into the end zone at Baltimore on Dec. 22, 2013.

MULTIPLE SACKS FOR JONES

Jones finished with his fifth career two-sack game at Minnesota (09/14/14). He had three two-sack games in 2013.



THIRD TEAM'S A CHARM

Chris Jones had an early introduction to failure in the NFL. Taken behind 37 other defensive linemen in the 2013 NFL Draft, the defensive tackle was cut by two teams over a span of just 11 days. After selecting him in the sixth round with the 198th overall pick, the Houston Texans cut Jones on Aug. 31. Jones signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sept. 1, but lasted only 10 days, as the Buccaneers released him on Sept., 10. Rather than be deterred by these early disappointments, however, Jones maintained a positive outlook when he signed with the Patriots on Sept. 11, and it has paid off in a big way. Thrust into a starting role after key injuries to the defensive line, Jones finished his rookie season with six sacks.

Jones' sudden success may have come as a surprise to some, but not to Dave Clawson, Jones' college coach at Bowling Green. Jones was part of Clawson's first recruiting class and blossomed into an All-American and two-two time captain for the Falcons. "It's hard to talk about Chris without getting a little bit emotional," Clawson told the *The Boston Herald*, "because he was that special of a player and person in our program."

JONES SAVES THE DAY; EARNS AFC HONORS

Chris Jones blocked a 58-yard field goal attempt by the Jets on the final play of the game to preserve New England's 27-25 win. It was the first blocked field goal for the Patriots since Chandler Jones blocked a 48-yard try by Minnesota's Blair Walsh earlier this season. He was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance in the victory.







DOUBLE TROUBLE: DB DEVIN McCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of two active sets of twins playing in the NFL.

McCOURTY GOES LONG

Devin McCourty had a 104-yard kickoff return for a touchdown vs. N.Y. Jets (10/21/12), the second longest kickoff return in team history. Ellis Hobbs has the longest in team history with a 108-yard return for a touchdown at N.Y. Jets on Sept. 9, 2007. He was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance.

IN GOOD COMPANY

Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joins Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

McCOURTY REGISTERS CAREER LONG

DB Devin McCourty returned a first quarter interception 60 yards to the Minnesota [09/14/14] 1-yard line to set up a Patriots touchdown. It is the longest interception return of his career. He had a 50-yard return as a rookie in 2010 at Detroit [11/25] on Thanksgiving Day.



A NOSE FOR THE FOOTBALL

Ninkovich has more opponent fumble recoveries [13] over the last five seasons [2010-2014] than any other NFL player. J.J. Watt and Julius Peppers are second during that time with nine opponent fumble recoveries.



CAREER DAY IN BUFFALO

Ninkovich finished with a three-sack game for the first time in his career in the win at Buffalo (10/12), to add to two two-sack performances vs. Miami (1/2/11) and at Carolina (11/18/13).

WHERE DID HE COME FROM?

Rob Ninkovich's journey to the Patriots was not easy. He entered the league as a fifth-round pick by the Saints in 2006 and was waived four times by New Orleans and Miami before landing in New England on Aug. 2, 2009. He spent the 2009 offseason trying to make the New Orleans team as a long snapper. Before coming to the Patriots, he had appeared in just eight games over three seasons. He doubled that total in his first year in New England, appearing in 15 games in 2009 and his role on the team has grown since, earning a starting role at linebacker in 2010 and 2011 before moving to a starting role on the defensive line in 2011.

CRAZY EIGHTS

Ninkovich tied a career-high with eight sacks in 2013. He also had eight sacks in 2012. Ninkovich is the first Patriots player with back-to-back seasons with at least eight sacks since Willie McGinest in 1995 (11) and 1996 (9.5). He is the only player to accomplish the feat during Belichick's tenure as head coach in New England.

NINKOVICH SCORED AS A TE IN COLLEGE

Ninkovich played some at tight end in college at Purdue and caught two touchdown passes with a 2-yard touchdown pass from Buffalo QB Kyle Orton and a 1-yard touchdown pass from former New York Giants and Indianapolis QB Curtis Painter.







HOMETOWN PATRIOTS CONNECTION

Revis and former Patriots CB Ty Law are close friends, having both grown up in Aliquippa, Pa., Revis considers Law a close family friend. He sees Law as somewhat of an adviser.

"Ty has been a mentor through my whole life. He's a very close friend to my family. I talk to Ty all the time – about life and football. I'm just happy he's on my side and I can bounce questions off of him and ask him certain things because he has a lot of experience. Ty's always there in my corner to help me whether it's football or life. I thank Ty for that."

DB LOGAN RYAN AND DB DURON HARMON

CLASSMATES REUNITE IN NEW ENGLAND

Defensive backs Logan Ryan and Duron Harmon are used to working together. Ryan and Harmon began their college football careers together as members of the same recruiting class at Rutgers University and developed a close friendship during their four years in Piscataway, N.J. As fate would have it, Ryan and Harmon would begin their NFL journeys together as well when the Patriots selected the two defensive backs just eight picks apart in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft.

Reunited once again, the former Scarlet Knights are excited and eager to make their mark, just as they did at Rutgers. "We talked before the draft and said how good it would be to play on the same team again, and for it to happen again, it's exciting and it's a blessing," Harmon told *The Boston Globe.* "It's great [we're contributing], because at the end of the day you want to play, and to contribute to a team like this, it's fun."

RYAN'S FIRST PICK FOR SIX

Ryan returned his first NFL interception 79 yards for a touchdown N.Y. Jets on Oct. 20, 2013. RYAN RETURNS... TO SCHOOL

When Logan Ryan decided to leave Rutgers and enter the NFL Draft after his redshirt junior season in 2012, he made a promise to his parents that after his rookie year, he would return to school and earn his degree.

Ryan kept his promise and graduated in the spring of 2014 with a degree in labor relations and a minor in psychology.

"I committed to Rutgers, not only as a football player, but as a student, so I was going to make sure I finished that end too," Ryan told NJ.com.

"It's a big accomplishment in my life. I held my word to my parents and stuck with it and I'm fortunate. It took a lot of work, but I was able to go back and finish and walk in graduation."





FIRST NFL SACK RESULTS IN TURNOVER

Ryan forced a fumble on his first NFL sack vs. Miami (10/27/13), a week after returning his first career interception for a touchdown. Ryan strip-sacked Ryan Tannehill, forcing a fumble recovered by Rob Ninkovich that led in to a touchdown. The play marked the second time in as many weeks that a Ryan turnover led to Patriots points.



REASONS FOR TEAM SUCCESS

Patriots Pro Bowl DL Vince Wilfork, who has served as a defensive captain for the Patriots for seven straight seasons, says the team's continued success is a result of the entire organization working towards one common goal:

"The Patriots are all about team, family and smart football players. They try to get good people here from coaches to guys who work in the front office to guys who put on this uniform. I think everybody has to have one goal in mind, and that's to be together. When you get an organization together that is seeking one goal, you can be pretty successful."

SEALED WITH A PICK

Vince Wilfork notched his third career interception (second vs. Oakland on Sept. 21) when he snared a pass that had been deflected in the final minute of the game. The play came with the Raiders having gained a first-and-goal and with Oakland trailing by seven points. Wilfork's last interception was also against Oakland, coming in a 31-19 New England victory in Oakland on Oct. 2, 2011.

THIRD TIME'S A CHARM

Vince Wilfork became the franchise's all-time leader in interceptions by a defensive lineman following his INT vs. Oakland. Wilfork became the first Patriots defensive lineman to have three interceptions.
