ALL TIME SERIES



New England leads the series 5-2, having won the last two meetings. The Patriots won the last matchup, 35-7, in London in 2009, the Buccaneers' first time playing out of the country in the regular season. In 2005, the Patriots hosted the Buccaneers and won 28-0. The Buccaneers won, 21-16, at New England in the 2000 season opener. The Buccaneers also won, 27-7, in 1997 in Tampa. The first meeting between the two clubs was in the Bucs' first season in 1976, a 31-14 New England win in Tampa. The Patriots also captured wins in 1985 (32-14 in Tampa), 1988 (10-7 in overtime in New England).

LAST GAME RECAP



New Orleans 16, Tampa Bay 14 (Sept. 15, 2013)

TAMPA – In their regular-season home opener, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers took on the division-rival New Orleans Saints, but despite a strong defensive effort that kept the Saints offense largely in check, the Buccaneers fell just short, giving up a last-second field goal for a 16-14 defeat. On the game's opening drive, New Orleans quarterback Drew Brees led his team down the field to the Tampa Bay 19, where defensive tackle Gerald McCoy sacked the signal-caller for a loss of seven, forcing the Saints to settle for a 44-yard field goal. Weather intervened before the Buccaneers offense had a chance to take the field for their own opening possession, with a lightning delay that lasted over an hour. When the two teams resumed play, Tampa Bay was forced to punt. However, on the first play from scrimmage of the Saints' next drive, Buccaneers linebacker Dekoda Watson nabbed Brees' pass, giving Tampa Bay the ball at the New Orleans 35. Quarterback Josh Freeman kept the drive alive on third-and-10, scrambling for 13 yards and putting his team in scoring position at the New Orleans 10. Two plays later, Freeman connected with wide receiver Kevin Ogletree for the score, putting the Buccaneers up, 7-3. The Saints answered with tight end Jimmy Graham reeling in a 56-yard pass from Brees, bringing the score to 10-7. After a Tampa Bay punt, New Orleans drove down the field and attempted a 43-yard field

goal, but kicker Garrett Hartley's attempt went wide right. Just before halftime, the Saints drove deep into the Buccaneers' territory, but the Tampa Bay defense held strong. New Orleans attempted a 20-yard field goal, which was good, but a defensive offsides penalty nullified the play. Now one yard from the goal line, the Saints went for a touchdown, but running back Mark Ingram was stopped just short of the score by linebackers Lavonte David and Mason Foster, preserving the 10-7 score as the first half ended. Tampa Bay got the ball to start the second half, but a forced fumble gave possession to New Orleans. However, a sack of Brees by David for a loss of six yards held the Saints to a field goal attempt, which Hartley completed, making the score 13-7. On the ensuing drive, Freeman found Jackson on a 73-yard touchdown pass, but the play was overturned by a penalty and two plays later Freeman was picked off by New Orleans safety Malcolm Jenkins. The Saints were unable to capitalize on the pick, and after trading punts with the Buccaneers, Brees was then intercepted by Foster, who sprinted down the sideline for an 85-yard touchdown return – the third longest in franchise history – to give Tampa Bay the 14-13 lead. Late in the fourth quarter, the Buccaneers were poised to close out the game, attempting a 47-yard field goal with 1:10 left to play. But kicker Rian Lindell's attempt was wide left, and, with a chance to re-take the lead, the Saints moved downfield and Hartley completed a 27-yard field goal in the game's final seconds.

LAST MEETING



New England 35, Tampa Bay 7 (Oct. 25, 2009)

LONDON - Playing out of the country for the first time in team history during the regular season, Tampa Bay trailed New England by two touchdowns in London as it entered the second half but was unable to cut into the lead. The Patriots grabbed and early 7-0 lead on the Buccaneers first drive of the game as S Brandon Meriweather intercepted QB Josh Johnson and ran 39 yards for a touchdown. Tampa Bay entered New England territory on its next possession, but Johnson was again picked off by Meriweather to end the threat. New England increased its lead to 14-0 late in the first quarter as QB Tom Brady hit WR Wes Welker for a 14-yard touchdown. Early in the second quarter, New England threatened to increase its lead, but S Tanard Jackson picked off Brady in the end zone. However, the Buccaneers were forced to punt on the resulting possession and three plays later, Brady hit WR Sam Aiken on a short pass over the middle that he turned into a 54-yard catch-and-run for a score and a 21-0 lead for the Patriots. Tampa Bay got on the board just before halftime as Johnson hit WR Antonio Bryant for a 33-yard score to trim the lead to 21-7. New England went back up by three touchdowns on the first drive of the second half as Brady hit TE Ben Watson for a 35-yard touchdown for the only scoring of the third quarter. Following a 10-play, 89-yard drive early in the fourth quarter, the Patriots put the game away as RB Laurence Maroney ran in from one yard out to make the score 35-7. Following the Patriots final score, rookie QB Josh Freeman made his professional debut as he engineered the Buccaneers final two drives.

SERIES HIGHLIGHTS



After taking a 14-7 halftime advantage, the Buccaneers were outscored by the Patriots 24-0 falling 31-14 in their inaugural season (12/12/76)... Bucs took 14-0 lead before falling 32-14 to Patriots (10/27/85)... With 6:15 left in the fourth quarter, Bucs QB Steve Spurrier was intercepted by LB Sam Hunt who returned it 68 yards for a touchdown and a 21-14 Patriots lead... WR Mark Carrier caught 15-yard touchdown pass from QB Vinny Testaverde with 2:09 left sending the game into OT (12/11/88)... Patriots K Jason Staurovsky kicks 27-yard field goal in OT for 10-7 Patriots win... Bucs outgain the Patriots 343 yards to 168 yards while picking up five sacks in a dominating 27-7 victory (11/16/97)... FB Mike Alstott paced the team with 16 rushes for 91 yards and a touchdown while also adding three receptions for 35 yards... The Buccaneers sacked Patriots' QB Drew Bledsoe six times and outrushed the Patriots 140 yards to 88 yards in a 21-16 victory (9/3/00)... The Bucs were outgained 336 yards to 138 yards and QB Chris Simms was sacked seven times in their first shutout loss since 1999 (12/17/05)... WR Ike Hilliard had five catches for 50 yards recording his 400th career reception and Patriots QB Tom Brady threw for 258 yards and three touchdowns (12/17/05)... On the first drive of the game, Buccaneers QB Josh Johnson was intercepted by Patriots S Brandon Meriweather who then ran 39 yards for a touchdown (10/25/09).

- RB Doug Martin

- Martin has 1,663 career rushing yards and needs 276 more to pass LeGarrette Blount (1,939 from 2010-12) for 10th and 385 more to pass Earnest Graham (2,047 from 2004-11) for ninth in career rushing yards in franchise history.
- Martin has 12 career rushing touchdowns and needs only two more to pass LeGarrette Blount (13 from 2010-12), and Doug Williams (13 from 1978-82) for 10th-most in franchise history.
- Martin has 372 career rushing attempts and needs 106 more to pass Earnest Graham (477 from 2004-11) for 10th and 144 more to pass Jerry Eckwood (515 from 1979-81) for ninth in career rushing attempts in franchise history.

- QB Josh Freeman

- Freeman has 13,298 career passing yards and needs 1,522 more to pass Vinny Testaverde (14,820 from 1987-92) for the most passing yards in team history.
- Freeman has 1,926 career passing attempts and needs 113 more to surpass Trent Dilfer (2,038 from 1994-99) for second-most and 235 more to pass Vinny Testaverde (2,160 from 1987-82) for the most attempts in team history.
- Freeman has 1,125 career passing completions and needs two more to pass Vinny Testaverde (1,126 from 1987-82) for the most completions in team history.

- Williams has 2,792 career receiving yards and needs 51 more to crack the top 10 in franchise history by passing Lawrence Dawsey (2,842 receiving yards from 1991-95).
- Williams has 195 career receptions and needs 41 more to pass Gerald Carter (239 from 1981-87) for 10th most receptions in franchise history.

• Koenen has 51 punts inside the 20 with the Buccaneers and needs five more to pass Tommy Barnhardt (55 from 1996-98) for sixth-most, six more to pass Tom Tupa (56 from 2002-03) for fifth-most and nine more to pass Dan Stryzinski (59 from 1992-94) for fourth-most punts inside the 20 in team history.

GREG SCHIANO





Greg Schiano is in his second season as head coach in 2013, having been named the ninth head coach in team history on January 27, 2012.

In his first season leading Tampa Bay, Schiano's impact was evident in all three phases of the game while instilling a culture change within the organization. He transformed a team that had lost its fi-

nal 10 games of 2011 into a competitive 7-9 club – tied for second place in the NFC South – with seven of those losses being decided by one score or less. Schiano's seven wins in his debut season marked the second-most by a Buccaneers first-year head coach.

The Buccaneers offense blossomed under Schiano, becoming the most prolific in franchise history by setting team records for most points, yards, touchdowns, passing yards and passing touchdowns.

Quarterback Josh Freeman became the first passer in team history to eclipse the 4,000-yard passing mark with a team-record 4,065, while throwing for a Buccaneers record 27 touchdowns. Freeman also set franchise highs with 35 passes of 25+ yards and 185 first-down passes.

Wide receiver Vincent Jackson, who Schiano lured to Tampa Bay as a free agent in March 2012, earned a Pro Bowl selection following the 2012 season. Jackson recorded the second-most receiving yards in a single season in team history (1,384), which ranked fifth in the NFL in 2012. He also led the league in yards per catch (19.2) and first-down catch percentage (84.7), while his 17 receptions of 25+ were the most in team history.

Rookie running back Doug Martin, selected by Schiano and General Manager Mark Dominik with the 31st pick in the 2012 NFL Draft, also paid immediate dividends while earning Pro Bowl honors. Martin recorded the second-most rushing yards (1,454), scrimmage yards (1,926) and total touchdowns (12) in a single season in franchise history, as well as tying for the second-most rushing touchdowns in a single season in team history (11). All were franchise rookie records. Martin's 1,926 yards from scrimmage were the third-most in the NFL and was the third-highest total for a rookie in league history.





Schiano took a Buccaneers defensive unit that ranked last against the run in 2011 and transformed it immediately. Tampa Bay finished 2012 with the No. 1-ranked rush defense in the NFL, both in yards per carry (3.5) and yards allowed per game (82.5), a mark which also stands as the best in Buccaneers history. The worst-to-first turnaround was the first of its kind since the 1970 NFL merger.

That rush defense was anchored by defensive tackle Gerald McCoy, who under Schiano's tutelage, earned his first career Pro Bowl selection, and rookie linebacker Lavonte David, who was selected to the All-Rookie Team. David finished seventh in the NFL in total tackles, second in solo tackles and third in tackles for loss. His 20 tackles for loss were the most by an NFL rookie since 2001. In addition to Martin and David, safety Mark Barron, the Buccaneers' first selection in the 2012 NFL Draft, earned All-Rookie Team honors, giving Tampa Bay the distinction as the only club to have three position players selected.

On special teams, the Buccaneers set a franchise record and led the NFL with three blocked punts, which resulted in a league-leading 17 points, including one returned for a touchdown. Dekoda Watson was responsible for two of the blocks, becoming just the third player in the last six seasons to have more than one. Punter/Kickoff Specialist Michael Koenen ranked first in the NFL in touchback percentage, while kicker Connor Barth led the league in field goals of 40 yards or longer.

Schiano joined the Buccaneers after serving as the head coach of Rutgers University for 11 years, where he transformed the Scarlet Knights from an unknown into a consistently winning and respected program.

During his tenure, Schiano's teams and players rewrote the Rutgers record book. His teams set single-season school marks for passing yards, passing touchdowns, receiving yards, receptions, rush yards and rushing touchdowns. His players also hold the top spots in career passing yards, passing touchdowns, receiving yards, receptions, receiving touchdowns, 100-yard receiving games, rushing yards and rushing touchdowns.

Under his leadership, Rutgers – which had advanced to a postseason bowl just once in the team's previous 135-year history – developed a new tradition of not only competing in, but also winning, bowl games. In his final seven seasons with the team, Schiano's Scarlet Knights qualified for six bowls and recorded five consecutive bowl victories.

Rutgers' rise to national prominence under Schiano began in the 2005 season, where the team made its first postseason bowl appearance since 1978. In 2006, the Scarlet Knights took the next step, putting together a sensational season, winning 11 games and concluding with a No. 12 ranking in the national polls and a convincing 37-10 victory over Kansas State in the Texas Bowl, the first bowl championship in school history.

For his architecture of such a prodigious turnaround, Schiano was honored with 2006 Coach of the Year accolades from every major college football awards outlet, including the Football Writers Association of America, The Walter Camp Football Foundation, the Maxwell Club, and the titles of Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year, Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year, Home Depot National Coach of the Year and Big East Coach of the Year.

Schiano's aptitude for developing young players has translated into NFL success for many of his former charges. He was responsible for developing 18 NFL draft picks as Rutgers' head coach, including 14 in the last six drafts. During his years coaching collegiately, Schiano helped produce nearly 60 players who went on to professional careers.

In 2009, wide receiver Kenny Britt became Rutgers' inaugural first-round NFL Draft pick when he was selected by the Tennessee Titans with the 30th overall pick. Britt was the first of a school-record five Scarlet Knights selected in that year's draft. The next year, Schiano's players continued to make their names known, with two men – tackle Anthony Davis (San Francisco, 11th overall) and cornerback Devin McCourty (New England, 27th overall) – being selected in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft.

Other notable current and former professional players groomed under Schiano's leadership include running back Ray Rice, linebacker Gary Brackett, linebacker Jonathan Vilma, safety Ed Reed, and linebacker Dan Morgan, among others. In 2010, 32 of Schiano's Scarlet Knights played on an NFL roster, including seven players from the 2009 squad.

Three former Rutgers players from Schiano's tenure have earned Super Bowl rings over the past seven years. Rice was chosen to his third Pro Bowl in leading Baltimore to a Super Bowl XLVII victory, Brackett served as a captain of the Super Bowl XLI Champion Indianapolis Colts, and Darnell Stapleton started at right guard on Pittsburgh's Super Bowl XLIII Championship team.





Schiano is known for impacting more than simply his players' performances on the field, however, as he accrued a reputation while at Rutgers for attracting high-character students and pushing his team to academic success. Rutgers football achieved the nation's No. 1 ranking in Academic Progress Rate in 2010, and the nation's No. 2 mark in 2011. For the fourth consecutive year, the Rutgers football team was ranked in the top three nationally in multi-year APR rates, becoming the only university in the entire nation to earn that prestigious honor.

Prior to heading up Rutgers' program, Schiano served two seasons (1999-00) as defensive coordinator with the Miami Hurricanes. While with the Hurricanes, the team posted a 20-5 record, including an 11-1 mark, the No. 2 ranking and a Sugar Bowl victory in 2000.

The 'Canes showed rapid improvement under Schiano, as the team closed out the 1999 season by not allowing a passing touchdown in 27 quarters and was ranked 12th nationally in scoring defense (17.2). In 2000, Miami surrendered just 15.5 points per game, the fifth-best mark in the nation and the fewest allowed by any team in the Big East. In those two seasons, Schiano also helped the team to finish in the top five in total takeaways, amassing 35 in 1999 (third in the nation) and 33 in 2000 (fifth in the nation).


Schiano served three seasons in the NFL with the Chicago Bears as a defensive assistant (1996-97) and later defensive backfield coach (1998), and also spent six seasons at Penn State as a graduate assistant (1990) and defensive backfield coach (1991-95).

Since coming to Tampa, Schiano and his family have quickly dove into the local community, working with Hillsborough County Public Schools, the Pepin Academy, Metropolitan Ministries and All-Pro Dads, while continuing his long-time association with Athletes in Action.

Schiano – born in Wyckoff, N.J. on June 1, 1966 – is a 1988 graduate of Bucknell University, where he was a three-year letterman at linebacker. He and his wife, Christy, are the proud parents of four children: Joey, John, Matt and Lena Kate.

BILL BELICHICK





Bill Belichick is in his 39th season as an NFL coach and is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl championships in a four-year span. In 2007, he became the first NFL head coach to guide his team to a 16-0 regular season. He was hired by Chairman and CEO Robert Kraft on Jan. 27, 2000 and is in his 14th season as Patriots head coach in 2013.

In his 13 seasons in New England, Belichick has delivered three Super Bowl championships, five conference titles, 10 division crowns and 17 playoff victories. He has won more regular-season games (126) and more games overall (140) during a ten-year stretch (2003-2012) than any other head coach in NFL history. Belichick directed the Patriots to victories in Super Bowls XXXVI (2001), XXXVIII (2003) and XXXIX (2004), and claimed the 2007 and 2011 AFC Championship. New England's 14 playoff victories in the 2000s are tied for the highest total in any decade in NFL history. Additionally, Belichick currently ranks sixth all-time with 207 total victories as a head coach. His winning percentage of .653 ranks third in NFL history among coaches with 150 or more wins, trailing only Hall of Famers George Halas (.682) and Don Shula (.666).

In 2012, Belichick guided the Patriots to a 12-4 record, their fourth straight AFC East division title and their 10th playoff appearance in his 13 seasons as New England's head coach. Belichick also became the eighth head coach to win at least 200 games in NFL history.

Through just the first two games of the season, each of the starting linebackers has at least one sack and one interception, the first time since 1982 (when sacks became an official statistic) that a team has had three different players record one sack and one interception in the first two weeks of the season. Only three times in Buccaneers history has the team had at least three linebackers finish the season with at least one sack and one interception (2010, 2002, 1985).

Tampa Bay made six selections in the 2013 NFL Draft. All six draft choices are on the current 53-man roster. Below are quick looks at the newest members of the Buccaneers.

CB Johnthan Banks was selected in the second round (43rd overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft by the Buccaneers. He is the fourth player from Mississippi State University to be selected by Tampa Bay and is one of two cornerbacks to be selected out of Mississippi State in the second round of the 2013 NFL Draft. At Mississippi State, he started 45-of-51 career games, including every game in his final two seasons. As a senior in 2012, Banks won the Jim Thorpe Award (Best Defensive Back), and was a semifinalist for both the Chuck Bednarik Award (Top Defensive Player) and the Ronnie Lott IMPACT Trophy. Throughout his four-year career, Banks recorded 221 tackles, 26 passes defensed, 16 interceptions, four sacks, four forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries. Prior to the 2012 campaign, he was selected to the watch list for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and the Paul Hornung Award. He served as a team captain his senior year, totaling 63 tackles, seven passes defensed, four interceptions, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

QB **Mike Glennon** was the 73rd overall selection of the 2013 NFL Draft, taken by the Buccaneers in the third round. From 2008-2012, Glennon played in 36 games and started his final 26 at North Carolina State. He finished his career ranked in the top five in passing touchdowns (third), pass completions (third), passing yards (fourth) and passing attempts (fourth) in N.C. State history. He also ranks tied for the ninth-most career touchdown passes in Atlantic Coast Conference history. As a senior, Glennon completed 330-of-564 passes for 4,031 yards and 31 touchdowns, earning him a place in the 2013 Senior Bowl. After his junior season, Glennon was selected as an Academic All-ACC member and earned a spot on the ACC's Academic Honor Roll. He gradu-





ated with a bachelor's degree in business management, as well as a master's degree in liberal studies.

DT **Akeem Spence** was selected by Tampa Bay in the fourth round (100th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft. At the University of Illinois, Spence started in all 38 games that he played in for the Illini. Spence, who entered the draft following his junior season, recorded career totals of 186 tackles, 17.5 tackles for loss, 3.5 sacks, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and 26 quarterback pressures. During his junior season, he recorded personal bests in tackles (72) and tackles for loss (7.0). His performance earned him second-team All-Big Ten honors from Phil Steele. In 2010, Spence was named a Freshman All-American by College Football News, the FWAA, Phil Steele and Rivals.com.

DE **William Gholston** was drafted in the fourth round (126th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft by the Buccaneers. A three-year letterwinner at Michigan State University, Gholston finished his career ranked 10th in school history in tackles for loss (30.0).. In 36 career games, including 24 starts, Gholston accumulated 142 tackles and 10.0 sacks. He was a 2012 second-team All-Big Ten selection and a quarterfinalist for the Lombardi Award (College Lineman of the Year). As a junior, he led all FBS defensive linemen with 10 pass break-ups and led the Spartans with 4.5 sacks.

DE **Steven Means** was selected by the Buccaneers in the fifth round (147th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft. Means was a four-year contributor at the University at Buffalo, totaling 185 tackles, 18.5 sacks, two interceptions, three fumble recoveries and two forced fumbles. His 18.5 career sacks rank him fourth in Buffalo history, while his 29.5 tackles for loss rank 10th. In 2012, Means was named All-MAC second team, with 77 tackles, 11 sacks, and 6.5 tackles for loss.

RB **Mike James** was drafted in the sixth round (189th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. James played in 50 games for the University of Miami, including 17 starts. He recorded 312 career rushes for 1,386 yards (4.4 avg.) and 17 touchdowns, while catching 67 passes for 585 yards and five touchdowns. James started all 12 games his senior season, registering a career-best 621 rushing yards. He was one of only 11 FBS players named to the 2012 AFCA Allstate Good Works Team and received the University of Miami's Community Service Man of the Year Award, Captain's Award, Melching Leadership Award and the Jack Harding Team Most Valuable Player. In 2011, James recorded a career-high eight total touchdowns, including seven rushing and one receiving.

FRESH FACES



The Tampa Bay Buccaneers entered this offseason looking to improve their roster and came out of it with several key acquisitions that will benefit the team and help with the development of the team's young talent. Among the most notable acquisitions, the Bucs traded for CB Darrelle Revis, signed S Dashon Goldson, LB Jonathan Casillas, TE Tom Crabtree, RB Brian Leonard and WR Kevin Ogletree.

CB **Darrelle Revis** spent the last six seasons with the New York Jets, starting all 79 games he played in, totaling 325 tackles, 102 passes defensed, 19 interceptions for 364 yards and three touchdowns, six fumble recoveries, three forced fumbles and a sack. The 2009 AFC Defensive Player of the Year, Revis is widely considered one of the top players at his position, earning All-Pro honors three consecutive years (2009-11) and four consecutive Pro Bowl selections (2008-11). From 2007-11, Revis led a Jets secondary that ranked first in the NFL in opponent completion percentage, second in passing yards and passing touchdowns allowed, and fourth in opponent passer rating. During his 2009 AFC Defensive Player of the Year campaign, Revis recorded 31 passes defensed, the most in a single season in NFL history. As a rookie in 2007, he was named to the Pro Football Weekly All-Rookie team.

S **Dashon Goldson** comes to Tampa Bay after six seasons with the San Francisco 49ers, starting the final 62 games of his tenure there. He has recorded 443 tackles, 36 passes defensed, 14 interceptions for 152 yards and one touchdown, five forced fumbles, four fumbles and three sacks. Goldson comes to Tampa Bay after back-to-back Pro Bowl selections, and being named to his first career All-Pro team. His 14 interceptions since 2009 are tied for the fourth-most in the NFL by a safety and tied for the 10th-most in the league. Since being named a starter in 2009, Goldson helped lead a San Francisco defense that ranked in the top 5 in the league in yards allowed, rush yards allowed, points allowed and forced fumbles, while also ranking in the top 10 in interceptions.

LB **Jonathan Casillas** spent the first four seasons of his career with the New Orleans Saints, including as a member of the Saints Super Bowl XLIV championship team. He has played in 38 games, with seven starts, registering 112 tackles, four passes defensed, three sacks, two fumble recoveries and 21 special teams tackles.

TE **Tom Crabtree** joins the Buccaneers after three seasons in Green Bay, where he was a member of the Packers Super Bowl XLV championship team. A starter in 16-of-46 career games, Crabtree tallied 18 receptions for 302 yards and four touchdowns. Primarily a blocker for his first two seasons, Crabtree had his best season as a receiver in 2012, catching eight passes for 203 yards and three touchdowns, all career-highs. His 49.0 yard average on his three touchdowns ranked him second in the league among players with three or more touchdown receptions.

RB **Brian Leonard** spent the past four seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals after playing with the St. Louis Rams for his first two years in the league. During his career, he has played in 71 games with eight starts, recording 174 rushes for 646 yards and 113 reception for 814 yards and one touchdown, while also contributing 24 special teams tackles. Leonard had the second-most rushes and rushing yards of his career in 2012, playing in 15 regular season games and one playoff contest.

WR **Kevin Ogletree** spent the last four seasons with the Dallas Cowboys, playing in 46 games, tallying 57 receptions for 730 yards and four touchdowns. He had his best season as a pro in 2012, playing in 15 games and catching 32 passes for 436 yards and four touchdowns, all career-highs. He had his first career 100-yard game and his first multi-touchdown game in the season opener against the New York Giants, finishing the game with eight receptions for 114 yards and two touchdowns.

PRO BOWL BUCS



Tampa Bay's current roster features eight players who have been named to the Pro Bowl in their careers, including S Dashon Goldson, WR Vincent Jackson, RB Doug Martin, DT Gerald McCoy, G Davin Joseph, G Carl Nicks, T Donald Penn and CB Darrelle Revis.

Last season, the Buccaneers were represented by McCoy, Jackson and Martin at the annual all-star game. The three Pro Bowl selections were the most for the Bucs since 2008 (4).

Last year's selection marked the first time that McCoy earned a Pro Bowl trip. McCoy became the first Buccaneers defensive lineman to make the Pro Bowl since 2003, when DE Simeon Rice and DT Warren Sapp were chosen to the all-star game. McCoy joins Rice, Sapp, Dave Pear (1978) and Lee Roy Selmon (1979-84) as the only defensive linemen to be named to the Pro Bowl in team history.

Jackson earned his third career Pro Bowl selection (2009, 2011, 2012) last season, and his first as a Buccaneer. Jackson is the first Buccaneers wide receiver to make the Pro Bowl since 2003, when WR Keenan McCardell was chosen to the all-star game. Jackson joins McCardell, Keyshawn Johnson (2001) and Mark Carrier (1989) as the only wide receivers to be named to the Pro Bowl in team history.

In his rookie season, Martin earned his first career Pro Bowl selection. Martin was the first Buccaneers rookie to make the Pro Bowl since 2008, when Clifton Smith was chosen as the NFC Kick Returner. Martin is the fourth Buccaneeer running back to be chosen for the all-star game, joining Mike Alstott (1997-02), Warrick Dunn (1997, 2000) and James Wilder (1984).

This offseason, the Buccaneers acquired two more Pro Bowl players in S Dashon Goldson and CB Darrelle Revis.

Goldson comes to Tampa Bay from San Francisco, where he made the Pro Bowl roster in 2011 and 2012. In 2011, Goldson intercepted six passes, tied for the second-most in the NFL.

One of the top players at his position in the NFL, Revis made four consecutive Pro Bowls (2008-11) before getting injured last season. He set a single-season NFL record with 31 passes defensed in 2009, and had the most passes defensed in the league from 2008-11.

Arguably the best guard tandem in the NFL, Nicks (2010-11), and Joseph (2008, 2011) have each been selected to two Pro Bowls. Penn represented the Buccaneers as he made his first trip to the Pro Bowl following the 2010 season.

STOPPING THE RUSH



Under Head Coach Greg Schiano, the Buccaneers defense has been known for its ability to stop the run. When Schiano took over the team in 2012, they were coming off of a season in which they were last in the NFL in rush yards allowed and second-to-last in yards per carry.

Last year, the Buccaneers became the first team since the 1970 NFL Merger to go from last to first in rush defense. The Bucs defense picked up where it left off at the start of 2013, limiting the New York Jets to just 90 yards on 29 carries (3.1 avg.). Tampa Bay has only allowed two 100-yard rushers during Schiano's tenure, and has allowed the fewest yards-per-game, as well as the second-fewest yards-per-carry.

Tampa Bay opened the 2013 season against the New York Jets (9/8), with the Bucs sacking Jets QB Geno Smith five times, led by LB **Mason Foster's** career-high 2.0 sacks. Foster dropped Smith for an 18-yard loss, which is tied for the biggest loss on a sack in team history (DE Simeon Rice, at WAS 10/12/2003). The Buccaneers had gone almost a decade since winning a game in which they had trailed by 10 or more points. The drought ended in Chicago on September 21, 2008, when Tampa Bay rallied from a 24-14 deficit to win in overtime, 27-24.

Stunningly, that sort of rally has now become almost commonplace for Tampa Bay, even as the team's roster has become steadily younger. Apparently, the Bucs' newcomers are comeback kids, because there have been no fewer than nine games since 2008 and two in 2011 in which the Buccaneers have rallied from a double-digit deficit to get the win, ranking as the second most in the NFL over that time. The most recent occurrence came in Week 11 at Carolina as the team came back from a 21-10 deficit to win 27-21. Their first comeback win in 2011 occurred in Week 2 at Minnesota (9/18), when the Buccaneers came back to win 24-20 after trailing 17-0. It tied for the second-largest comeback win in team history. Before 2008, the last time the team had come back from double-digits to win a game was December 12, 1998, against Detroit, when the team came back from a 10-0 deficit to win, 23-16.

TACKLING MACHINES

In consecutive drafts (2011-12), the Buccaneers were able to add two of the most productive linebackers in college football, both of whom made their presence in the NFL known right away.

After finishing his senior season at the University of Washington as the nation's second-leading tackler with 162, LB **Mason Foster** proved he is also a playmaker on the next level during his rookie season. Foster, the Buccaneers' thirdround selection (84th overall) in the 2011 NFL Draft, led the team in tackles (126) and finished fourth on the team in sacks (2.0), while also recording four tackles for loss, one interception, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery despite being limited by injury.

Joining Foster is LB **Lavonte David**, who left the University of Nebraska as one of the most productive linebackers in school history. David recorded 285 tackles in only two years as a Cornhusker, the fourth-most all-time and the most ever by a two-year player. David also set the school record in 2010 with 152 tackles. His ability to make plays has translated quickly to the NFL; David led the team in both tackles and tackles for loss last season.

David and Foster finished 2012 as the top two tacklers on the team, with 139 and 104 tackles, respectively. They became the first Buccaneer teammates to each top 100 tackles in a season since Barrett Ruud (114) and Derrick Brooks (109) in 2007. David and Foster were also first and third on the team in tackles for loss last year (19 and 13 respectively).

ON THE OFFENSIVE



The Buccaneers posted a franchise-record four consecutive games of 400 or more yards last season, including two games over 500 yards last season. The performance marked the most yards in a two-game span in team history. In Week 6 of the last season, against Kansas City (10/14/12), the team put up 463 yards of total offense, the third-highest output in a home game and the ninth-highest total in team history. The 463 yards included two 60-plus yard receptions (Mike Williams, 62 and Tiquan Underwood, 62), the first time the Buccaneers have had two catches of 60 or more yards in the same game since December 7, 1998, against Green Bay (QB Dilfer to WR Green for 64 yards and QB Dilfer to WR Emanuel for 62-yard touchdown). The team also recorded the best average gain-per-play (9.08) in a single game in franchise history.

The Bucs followed that up with 513 yards of total offense in Week 7 against New Orleans (10/21/12), the second-most yards in team history and the most in a home game. They also recorded the third-most net passing yards in a game in team history (420 yards).

After a last-second loss against the Saints, the Buccaneers bounced back with a 36-17 win at Minnesota in Week 8 (10/25/12). The team recorded 416 yards of total offense, led by rookie RB Doug Martin's 214 total yards, including his first 100-yard rushing game and a career-long 64 yard touchdown reception.

Following the win at Minnesota, the Bucs went to Oakland in Week 9 (11/4/12) and earned a 42-32 victory. In the victory the team recorded the second-highest offensive output in Bucs history, highlighted by Martin's team-record 251 rushing yards and four touchdowns.

With WR Vincent Jackson breaking the 1,000 yard receiving mark for the season in Week 13 at Denver (12/2/12), the Bucs now have a 3,000 yard passer (Freeman-3,003), a 1,000 yard rusher (Martin-1,106) and a 1,000 yard receiver (Jackson-1,014) for only the second time in franchise history (1984).

In the season finale at Atlanta (12/30/12), QB Josh Freeman reached 4,000 yards for the season, becoming the first quarterback in Buccaneers history to reach that plateau.

Beginning in Week 6 against Kansas City (10/14/12), the Buccaneers had one of their greatest stretches of offense in team history, scoring at least 28 points in five consecutive games for the first time in franchise history. The Buccaneers also managed to score 30 points in three consecutive games for only the second time in franchise history, with that streak beginning in Week 8 at Minnesota (10/25/12).

Last season's offense also broke previous Buccaneers records for points and yards in a season, scoring the most points and gaining the most yards by any team in franchise history.

During the 2011 season, against Indianapolis (10/3/11), the Buccaneers recorded one of their highest offensive outputs in 20 years as the team recorded 466 yards of total offense, tying the then sixth-best single-game performance in team history and the best mark in team history for a home game.

The team followed up with 420 yards against New Orleans (10/16/11) in Week 6, earning a 26-20 win.

In Week 11 at Green Bay (11/20/11), the Buccaneers recorded 455 yards of total offense marking the third time the team finished with 400+ yards of total offense in a game last season.

In recording the 455 yards of offense, the Buccaneers finished with a 300-yard passer (QB Josh Freeman, 342), a 100-yard rusher (RB LeGarrette Blount, 107) and 100-yard receiver (TE Kellen Winslow, 132) for the first time since December 2, 2007, when Buccaneers RB Earnest Graham recorded 22 rushes for 106 yards, WR Joey Galloway recorded seven receptions for 159 yards and QB Luke McCown was 29-of-37 passing for 313 yards against the New Orleans Saints.

Over the past six years (2007-12), the Buccaneers have posted at least three games each season in which they recorded 400-plus yards of offense. Before 2007, the team had only achieved three or more 400-plus-yard games in a season twice (1980, 1981) since their inaugural year of 1976.





STARTING FAST



One of the Buccaneers biggest strengths this season was their ability to gain an early lead by scoring quickly. After ranking 30th in the league in 2011, with only 34 first-quarter points all year, the Bucs turned things around last season, ranking tied for ninth in the league with 94 first quarter points scored.

In Week 6 of the 2012 season against Kansas City (10/14/12), Freeman finished with 328 yards passing, three touchdowns and one interception for a 124.7 passer rating. In Week 7 against New Orleans (10/21/12), Freeman finished with a career-high 420 yards passing, three touchdowns and no interceptions, completing 24 of his 42 pass attempts for a 115.2 passer rating. The 420 yards passing are the third-most in team history and the most since Vinny Testaverde recorded 469 passing yards on October 16, 1988 at Indianapolis. It was Freeman's fifth career 300-yard passing game and his second in a row. He became the first Buccaneer to have back-to-back 300-plus yard passing games since Vinny Testaverde (336, 10/29/89-at Cincinnati and 370, 11/5/89-vs. Cleveland). He is also just the third player in Buccaneers history to throw for 300 or more yards and three or more touchdowns in back-to-back games (also Vinny Testaverde in 1989 and Doug Williams in 1980).

Freeman's play also had him setting Buccaneers records. From Weeks 6-10, Freeman posted a passer rating of over 100 in each of the five games that the team played in, becoming the first Buccaneers quarterback to record five consecutive games with a passer rating over 100.

Freeman also threw at least two touchdowns from Weeks 6-11, making him the first Bucs quarterback to throw two or more touchdown passes in six consecutive games.

A BREAKOUT YEAR



After a promising rookie season, QB **Josh Freeman**, took a major step forward in 2010 with a record breaking sophomore campaign that helped the team to a 10-6 record. With the 10 wins, Freeman became the first quarterback under the age of 23 to lead his team to a 10-win season since Pittsburgh Steelers QB Ben Roethlisberger in 2004.

In just his second year as a pro, Freeman established one of the best seasons for a quarterback in Tampa Bay history. His 25 touchdowns were the second-most in a single season in team history and his 3,451 passing yards were the fourthmost in a single-season by a Buccaneer at that time. Five of those touchdown passes occurred on a career and recordsetting day against Seattle (12/26/10), as Freeman became the youngest quarterback (22 years) since Dan Marino (22 years) on September 2, 1984, to throw five touchdown passes and zero interceptions. Freeman became just the second quarterback in Buccaneers history to record 3,000plus yards passing, 20-plus passing touchdowns and 10 or less interceptions in the same season, along with QB Brad Johnson in 2002 (3,049 passing yards, 22 touchdowns and six interceptions). He is also just the sixth Buccaneer quarterback in team history to have a 3,000-plus yard passing season.





Freeman was also smart with the football in 2010, tying for third in the NFL and first in the NFC for the fewest interceptions thrown. With only six interceptions, he became just the second quarterback in NFL history under the age of 23 to throw six-or-fewer interceptions in a season with 200+ attempts, along with Dan Marino in 1983.

In 2011, ESPN debuted a new Total Quarterback Rating or QBR. The QBR is a statistical measure that incorporates the contexts and details of throws by quarterbacks and what they mean for wins. It's built from the team level down to the quarterback, to better understand first what each play means to the team, then give credit to the quarterback for what happened on that play based on what he contributed. Based on these new calculations, Freeman ranked eighth in Total QBR in 2010.

Never one to fear a deficit, 10 of QB **Josh Freeman**'s 24 career victories have been fourth quarter/OT comeback wins (41.7%), including five in 2010, the most in the NFL. Freeman's eight fourth quarter/OT comeback victories in his first 30 starts are the most in a player's first 30 games in NFL history, passing Peyton Manning (seven in 31 games played) and Jake Plummer (seven in 25 games played).

In Week 11 at Carolina (11/18/12), Freeman helped lead the Bucs from down 11 with six minutes left to win a 27-21 overtime victory. It was Freeman's second overtime win in his career and the first overtime touchdown scored by the Buccaneers in franchise history. Freeman threw for 152 yards and two touchdowns in the fourth quarter of the game, the most fourth-quarter/OT yards he has ever thrown for in a comeback victory and tied for the most touchdowns.

- Freeman also threw for 1,855 yards, the most in a singleseason by a rookie quarterback in team history. The previous record was held by Gradkowski, who threw for 1,661 passing yards in 2006.
- Finished with the highest completion percentage (54.5) among 2009 rookie quarterbacks.
- He became just the third rookie quarterback in team history to throw for 300 yards in a single game, joining Vinny Testaverde in 1987 and Doug Williams in 1978.

In Week 9 of the 2009 season against Green Bay (11/8), Buccaneers first-round pick QB **Josh Freeman** (21 years, 299 days old at the time) started in his first career game and became the second-youngest quarterback to win his first career start since 1970, the youngest being Michael Vick (21 years, 138 days). He was also both the youngest quarterback to start a game and the youngest quarterback to win a game for the Buccaneers in team history.

 Freeman finished his first start passing for 205 yards, three touchdowns and one interception on 14-of-31 pass attempts, leading the team to an victory from a 11-point fourth quarter deficit.

The Tampa Bay Buccaneers, in need of a top end receving threat, pursued WR **Vincent Jackson** via free agency last offseason, and the payoff has been immediate and immense. After setring career highs in catches (72) and yards (1,384), and leading the team in both categories last season, Jackson continued his success in the opening week of 2013.

In Week 1 at the New York Jets (9/8), Jackson recorded his 20th career 100-yard receiving game and his sixth as a Buccaneer. With his 77 receiving yards in Week 2 against New Orleans (9/15), Jackson set a Buccaneers record for the most receiving yards through the first two weeks of the season, surpassing Keyshawn Johnson (185 yards-2003).

Jackson has recorded 1,000 yards receiving in four of the last five seasons, including 1,384 yards and eight touchdowns on 72 receptions in 2012. Since his first 1,000-yard season in 2008, Jackson ranks first in receiving yards per catch (18.3) and catch percentage for first downs (86.8), tied for sixth in receiving touchdowns (36), eighth in receiving yards per game (73.6) and 10th in receiving yards (5,003) among active NFL wide receivers.

With his receiving totals in Week 16 against St. Louis (12/23/12), Jackson recahed 6,000 career receiving yards, a mark shared by only 20 other active receivers.

A proven deep threat, Jackson has the best yards-per-catch average of any receiver since 2008, and his ability to stretch the field has continued to show itself this season. He ranks third in the NFL in yards per reception.

Jackson and Williams finished the year ranked first and fifth in the NFL, respectively, in yards per reception (min. 60 catches).

In Week 4 against Washington (9/30/12), both Williams and Jackson recorded 100-plus yards receiving, marking the first time two Buccaneers have had 100 or more receiving yards in the same game since September 13, 1992 against Green Bay (Mark Carrier – 7 receptions for 115 and 1 TD; Lawrence Dawsey – 5 receptions for 107). It was also just the eighth time in Bucs history the feat has been accomplished.

Against St. Louis in Week 16 (12/23/12) Williams and Jackson each topped 100 yards for the second time in the same game this year, with Williams recording a career high 132 receiving yards. With their Week 16 performance, they become the first Buccaneers teammates to record multiple games of over 100 receiving yards in the same game since Bruce Hill and Mark Carrier in 1989.

Williams and Jackson combined for 2,380 receiving yards this season, the most by Bucs teammates in franchise history, passing Mark Carrier and Bruce Hill in 1989 (2,095 combined yards).

Williams and Jackson's combined 2,380 yards were the fourth-most by any receiving duo last season.

WR Mike Williams proved himself as a big play target in the 2012 season. In Week 4 against Washington (9/30/12), Williams finished with four catches for 115 yards, including a career-long 65-yard pass reception. The reception also marked the longest play for the Buccaneers to that point in the season. Williams followed up that performance with another 100-yard receiving day in Week 6 against Kansas City (10/14/12), totaling four receptions for 113 yards and a 62-yard touchdown. The touchdown reception marked the second-longest reception of his career and the longest touchdown reception of his career to that point. He was the first Buccaneer to record back-to-back 100-yard receiving games since WR Antonio Bryant (108 yards - 12/14/08 at ATL and 127 yards - 12/21/08 vs. SD). He added his third 100-yard receiving day in Week 16 against St. Louis, tying a career high in catches (7) and setting a career-high in receiving yards (132), including a 61-yard touchdown. He now has four 100-yard receiving games in his career.

With his Week 1 touchdown against the New York Jets (9/8/13), Williams has 24 in his career, tied for the fifthmost receiving touchdowns in team history and the ninth most total touchdowns in franchise history.

In the 2010 draft, 12 wide receivers were taken ahead of fourth-round pick (101st overall) WR **Mike Williams**. Though Williams wasn't drafted highly, his talent and production on the field led him to become a Rookie of the Year finalist and for some experts to consider him the "steal of the draft." After starting all 16 games for the team in 2010, Williams was nominated for NFL Rookie of the Week five times, and was the only rookie receiver to have a reception in each of his teams' games that season.

Since his rookie season in 2010, WIIIiams has stacked up well against receivers from his draft class, ranking second in receptions, receiving yards and touchdowns.

Following his record-setting performance against Oakland, Martin was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week. Martin became the first Buc to win the award wince QB Josh Freeman won it in Week 9 of the 2010 season. Martin is also the first Buccaneer running back to win the award since Michael Pittman in Week 9 of the 2004 season, and Martin is only the second Buc rookie to ever win the award, sharing the honors with Warrick Dunn, who won in Week 2 of the 1997 season. Martin also became the first rookie running back to earn the award since Adrian Peterson in 2007.

Martin's record-breaking totals took shape in the second half at Oakland. After tallying only 31 rushing yards in the first half, he exploded for 220 rushing yards in the second half, the second most in a half in NFL history. Martin also had a notable third quarter, when the rookie rushed for 143 yards in that quarter alone, tied for the fouth most rushing yards in any quarter in NFL history.

From Weeks 6-10, Martin recorded 858 yards of offense, the most by a rookie in a five-game span since Edgerrin James in 1999, and his 608 yards from scrimmage from Weeks 8-10 is the most in a three-game span by a rookie in NFL history.

In Weeks 6-11 (10/14/12-11/18/12) Martin totaled 1,019 yards from scrimmage, joining Eric Dickerson (1983) and Edgerrin James (1999) as the only rookies in NFL history to gain at least 1,000 yards in a six-game span.

CAPITALIZING ON TURNOVERS

Over the past few seasons, the Buccaneers have been one of the best teams in the NFL at converting turnovers into points, as the team has finished in the top seven of points off of turnovers in the NFL, three of the previous five seasons.

The Bucs last two defensive scores have been two of the longest in franchise history, with CB Leonard Johnson returning an interception 83 yards for a score in Week 10 against San Diego (11/11/12). The team's first defensive score of the 2013 season came in Week 2 (9/15) when LB Mason Foster intercepted Drew Brees and returned it 85 yards for a touchdown, the third-longest interception return in Bucs history.

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE

Tampa Bay's defense has ranked in the Top 10 in total defense in 11 of the past 15 seasons, including a stretch of nine consecutive seasons (1997-2005), then the longest streak in the League and tied for the second-longest streak in the NFL since 1970.

The Buccaneers defense has stepped up this season, ranking as one of the best in the NFC, allowing the third-fewest points in the conference through two weeks, and leading the NFL in average points allowed in the redzone and touchdown percentage.

On November 21, 2010 at San Francisco, the Buccaneers became just the third team at the time, and finished as one of only five teams last season, to earn a shutout victory, as they recorded their 10th shutout in team history. It was the first time since October 9, 1977 that the 49ers have been shut out at home and was the first shutout by the Buccaneers since December 5, 2004, when they defeated Atlanta 27-0. It was also the first on the road since September 8, 2003, when the team defeated Philadelphia 17-0.

Tampa Bay is tied for third in shutouts since 2002, tied for fifth since 2000 and tied for fourth since 1998. Below is how the Buccaneers rank in shutouts during those spans.

On July 29, 2011, the Buccaneers added a key piece to their special teams unit by signing free-agent punter **Michael Koenen**, from the Atlanta Falcons. In his sixth NFL season, Koenen handled punting and placekicking duties for Tampa Bay.

In his Buccaneers debut, Koenen finished with three touchbacks on kickoffs, after Tampa Bay had two as a team all of last season. He also added five punts for 261 yards, a gross average of 52.2 yards, and a net average of 45.4 yards. He had a long of 58 yards and one of his punts ended up inside the 20.

In Week 4 against Washington (9/30/12), Koenen recorded a 64-yard punt, which tied for the sixth-longest punt in team history.

In 2010 with Atlanta, Koenen was one of the League's best when taking away the threat of an opposing team's return game with 24 of his 74 punts fair caught, ranking second in the NFL. He also placed 29 of his punts inside the 20, ranking tied for eighth in the League. On kickoffs, Koenen was equally effective, as he ranked first in the NFL in average opponent starting field position after a kickoff (22.2 yard-line). He also ranked third in the NFL for kickoffs to reach the end zone (48) and seventh in percent of kickoffs to result in touchbacks (26.4).





STRENGTH OF THE SOUTH

Over the previous 11 seasons, one could argue that the toughest division in the NFL is the NFC South. Since realignment in 2002, the NFC South is one of only four divisions in the NFL to have every team earn a division championship, and is the only division to have each of its teams make a conference championship appearance. The NFC East, NFC West and AFC West are the only other divisions to have all four teams earn a division championship since realignment. The NFC South has also been represented seven times in a conference championship game, the best in the NFC and tied for the most in the NFL. The NFC South is also tied for the thirdmost appearances in the Super Bowl (3) behind only the AFC East and AFC North. They are also tied for the most different teams to the Super Bowl of any division, sending three different teams (Tampa Bay, Carolina, New Orleans), a feat that only the NFC West has matched (Arizona, San Francsico and Seattle). The NFC South is also the only division to have more than one teamwin a Super Bowl (Tampa Bay, New Orleans), since 2002. The NFC South has had a nearly even split of champions, with the Buccaneers, Falcons and Saints each having won three division crowns.

In 2010, the NFC South recorded another impressive feat, as they were the only division to have three teams finish with a winning record, with three of the four teams finish with a double-digit win total (Atlanta - 13-3; New Orleans - 11-5; Tampa Bay - 10-6). It marked just the second time, dating back to realignment in 2002, that a division has had three teams with double-digit wins in the same season (also the AFC South in 2007).

In 2008, the NFC South again showed its overall strength, as it finished as one of only three divisions in the League to have three of its four teams with a record of 9-7 or better (also AFC East and NFC East) and is one of two divisions to have all of its teams at 8-8 or better (also NFC East). The NFC South also finished with a remarkable 27-5 overall home record in 2008, the best combined home winning percentage by a division in NFL history (.844), with the next best division last season, the NFC East, holding an 23-9 record at home. The South was also a near-perfect 11-1 at home when facing other South division opponents in 2008. The Bucs contributed significantly to that mark, as they finished 6-2 at home, winning their first six games at Raymond James Stadium in 2008.

They grace the Bay area skyline as twin monuments to the power and passion of professional football: Raymond James Stadium, "The Crown Jewel of the NFL," and its partner in excellence, One Buccaneer Place, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers training facility.

Upon its opening in 2006, the Buccaneers' home was touted as the standard by which all future sports facilities would be measured, and it continues to awe visitors today. No effort was spared in the creation of the expansive complex, which is equipped with every modern amenity and the latest tools of the profession.

The team headquarters is a combination of function, style and space - much, much more space than the Buccaneers had previously enjoyed prior to the organization's move. The facility encompasses 136,320 square feet covering 33 acres and includes three meticulous practice fields behind the main buildings.

The facility raised the bar in every category of team preparation, from its massive locker room to the strength and conditioning center. Add in the team auditorium, media workroom and studio, a remarkably well-equipped team dining room and countless other features and you have one of the top team headquarters in the League.

"This facility gives our players, coaches and staff an unparalleled environment in which to work," said Buccaneers Co-Chairman Joel Glazer.

The signature of One Buccaneer Place is its spectacular entrance, which is adorned with the world's largest football. The sleek steel-and-glass construct is five stories tall, point to point, and angles against the main building as if it were on a tee, ready to start the game.

The two-story main building stretches away to both sides of the football centerpiece, fronted by appealing walls of glass that reflect notable features of Raymond James Stadium. Referred to as "The Crown Jewel of the NFL" by League insiders, the stadium's features are centered around one concept: enhancing the fan's experience at a Tampa Bay Buccaneers game.

Since opening in 1998, Raymond James Stadium has drawn rave reviews as one of the best playing surfaces in the National Football League. Tampa Bay's home stadium has ranked as the top turf in the League in five of the previous six surveys, earning top honors in 1998, 2000, 2002, 2004 and 2006. In 2008 and 2010, RJS was rated as having the second-best natural grass field. For the 2010 survey, the NFL Players Association polled over 1,619 active players from all 32 teams.

SUPER BOWLS IN TAMPA

The Super Bowl returned to the Tampa Bay area on February 1, 2009, when Raymond James Stadium hosted the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Arizona Cardinals for Super Bowl XLIII. The game marked the fourth time that Tampa has hosted the world's premier sporting event, and second time that the game had been played at RJS. Super Bowls XVIII and XXV were played in Tampa Stadium, and Super Bowl XXXV was played at RJS.

Super Bowl XLIII - On February 1, 2009, the Pittsburgh Steelers defeated the Arizona Cardinals 27-23 in dramatic fashion before 70,774 fans at Raymond James Stadium. Santonio Holmes earned MVP honors after scoring the game winning touchdown on a six-yard pass from QB Ben Roethlisberger with 35 second left in the game. LB James Harrison also contributed to the win recording a 100-yard interception return for a touchdown, the longest scoring play in Super Bowl history. Approximately 98.7 million people watched Super Bowl XLIII, making it the most watched Super Bowl ever.

Super Bowl XXXV - On January 28, 2001, the Baltimore Ravens defeated the New York Giants 34-7 before 71,921 at Raymond James Stadium. Baltimore's LB Ray Lewis led a suffocating defense and was named MVP.

Super Bowl XXV - On January 27, 1991, the New York Giants defeated the Buffalo Bills 20-19 before 78,813 at Tampa Stadium. New York's RB Ottis Anderson rushes for 102 yards and one TD and was named MVP.

Super Bowl XVIII - On January 22, 1984, the L.A. Raiders defeated the Washington Redskins 38-9 before 72,920 at Tampa Stadium. Los Angeles' RB Marcus Allen rushed for a Super Bowl-record 191 yards and was named MVP.

HOME SWEET HOME



Since Raymond James Stadium opened in 1998, Tampa Bay owns an impressive 68-46 record in the regular season and a 2-2 mark in the playoffs.

In 2008, the Buccaneers finished 6-2 at home, winning their first six home games of the year for the first time in team history. With the 6-2 record at home in 2008, the club tied for the second best home win total in team history and marked the third time in four years that the team had finished with a 6-2 home record. In 2005 and 2007, the team also finished with six wins at home.

The team record for consecutive regular season home victories is eight, accomplished during the 1999-2000 seasons. Tampa Bay won its final seven home contests in 1999 and its first home game in 2000 before the streak was snapped in a 21-17 loss to the N.Y. Jets (9/24/00). The best home record in team history came in 1999 when the team finished 7-1 at Raymond James Stadium.

GLAZER CHILDREN'S MUSEUM)

When Tampa Bay Buccaneers Owner Malcolm Glazer established the Glazer Family Foundation in 1999, he made a point of establishing charitable initiatives that would have a lasting impact on the community's youth. In 2010, the Foundation helped create a new way for children to become lifelong learners and leaders: the Glazer Children's Museum.

"What a dream to have a museum like this in our very own backyard," said Glazer Foundation Co-President Darcie Glazer Kassewitz. "It's here we hope that children uncover their great secrets and talents and discover the great capabilities they have in their bodies right now. We hope that children discover who they can become here and also more about who they already are."

The 53,000-square foot museum provides a safe and playful environment, where children and adults can learn about themselves, each other, and the world around them through exploration, role-playing and direct experience. The highly-interactive museum includes 12 themed galleries and 170 'interactivities' - hands-on, minds-on exhibits - for children aged birth to ten. A combination of permanent and travel-

ing exhibits, comprehensive year-round programs and special events provide children, parents, caregivers and teachers a rich and ever-changing environment for playful learning. The Glazer Children's Museum also offers over 5,000 square feet of event space, 2,500 square feet of classroom space, and a 1,000-square foot roof terrace accessible from the third floor.

The world-class facility has already hosted hundreds of thousands of visitors and become an instant hit among families in Tampa Bay. The Museum has been honored both locally and nationally for educational excellence and economic impact. It was named one of the Top 10 family museums in the country by Women's Day Magazine in June 2011, and in 2012 the Tampa Bay Business Journal named the Glazer Children's Museum as its Arts, Culture and Humanities "Nonprofit of the Year." The museum's impactful partnerships with schools, nonprofit organizations and civic leaders have made it an invaluable resource to the community.

GIVING BACK

The Tampa Bay Buccaneers store at Enterprise Village provides a handson learning experience within a community marketplace setting to thousands of students each year.
- •Holiday Shopping Spree: Each year, the Glazer Family Foundation hosts more than 250 underprivileged children for an exciting early morning shopping spree with assistance from some of Santa's special helpers: Tampa Bay Buccaneers Cheerleaders, Captain Fear, the Women's Organization and Buccaneers staff. The children all receive gifts chosen just for them and filled with the holiday spirit.
- Tampa Bay Sports Commission: Through donations nearing \$1 million, the Glazer Family Foundation has continued its commitment to support the Tampa Bay Sports Commission. These efforts provide amateur athletic opportunities in Hillsborough and Pinellas Counties for Bay area children.

"The Glazers, first and foremost, are a close family that is very devoted to family and family values. They are also, quite obviously, smart business managers and very successful in multiple arenas. They are engaging and fun to be around, and they give their time to league committees and issues that have helped us be a better league.

The Glazer family transformed the franchise after acquiring it in 1995. They have rebuilt it, given it a new look and created an entirely new and positive image. They put together an exciting winning team, including the franchise's first Super Bowl appearance and victory during the 2002 season when the Bucs beat the Oakland Raiders in Super Bowl XXXVII. The Glazers also provided tremendous leadership in the building of an outstanding new stadium and a first-class team facility. They have been very instrumental in bringing multiple Super Bowls to the Tampa Bay community, including the great Steelers-Cardinals game."

A SUCCESSFUL STORY

On January 16, 1995, **Malcolm Glazer** announced his purchase of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Since that time, the Glazer Family has helped shape the Buccaneers into a franchise with direction and a dedication to winning. Prior to the Glazers' ownership, the team had amassed just 87 wins over the course of 19 seasons. However, since the purchase, the team has won 135 regular season games in 16 seasons. The fortunes have certainly changed drastically for Tampa Bay under the Glazer family, vaulting from the NFL's basement to the team's first Super Bowl title with a 48-21 victory over the Oakland Raiders in Super Bowl XXXVII on January 26, 2003 in San Diego.

The Buccaneers, who following the 2002 season were making their first appearance in the NFL's championship game, also claimed the first-ever NFC South title in 2002. Tampa Bay reached the playoffs for the fourth straight time in 2002, the only team in the League to head to the postseason all four years (1999-02). The Buccaneers also claimed NFC South Division titles in 2005 and 2007 for the fifth and sixth division crowns in franchise history.

PLAYOFF PUSH



The Buccaneers' seven playoff appearances from 1997-11 are tied for the 11th-most in the NFL and their six postseason berths since 1999 are tied for ninth-best in the League. The franchise advanced to the postseason just three times in the previous 19 years (1976-1994) prior to Glazer's team purchase.

Under the Glazer's watch, the Buccaneers boast five playoff wins, easily the most successful stretch in club annals. Tampa Bay also eclipsed the club record for wins in a regular season with 12 in 2002. In fact, six of the top seven single-season win totals in club history (12 in 2002, 11 in 2005, 11 in 1999, 10 in 2010, 2000 and 1997) have come with the Glazers at the helm.

The 1999 campaign marked one of the most successful seasons in the club's history. Tampa Bay captured its first division title in 18 years, while posting an 11-5 regular season record and a club-record 7-1 home mark. The Buccaneers reached the NFC Championship Game for then just the second time in franchise history, before losing a heartbreaker to the St. Louis Rams. Four years later, Tampa Bay defeated the Philadelphia Eagles 27-10 in the 2002 NFC Championship Game. One week later, the Glazer family would have its first world championship when the Buccaneers defeated the Oakland Raiders 48-21 in Super Bowl XXXVII.
