## NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (7-3) vs. DENVER BRONCOS (9-1)

Sunday, Nov. 24, 2013 ★ Gillette Stadium (68,756) ★ 8:30 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will play a primetime nationally-televised game for the second consecutive week when they host the Denver Broncos. Last week, the Patriots traveled to Carolina for a Monday Night Football matchup with the Panthers and dropped to 7-3 on the season after a 24-20 loss.

This week's game will mark the third straight season that the Patriots will play back-to-back primetimes games. In 2011, the Patriots beat the New York Jets 37-16 on Sunday Night Football on Nov. 13 followed by a 34-3 win vs. Kansas City on Monday Night Football. Last season, the Patriots beat Houston, 42-14 on Dec. 10 on Monday Night Football and then lost to San Francisco on Sunday Night Football on Dec. 16. It will be the ninth time under Bill Belichick that the Patriots will play back-to-back Sunday Night football or Monday Night Football games.

Since Belichick took over as head coach in 2000, the Patriots have compiled a regular-season winning record against 30 of their 31 NFL opponents. As of 2013, the Denver Broncos remain the only team since 2000 that does not trail New England in their regular-season series. The Broncos have compiled a 5-5 record in 10 regular-season games against the Patriots in that span.

A victory over Denver this week would guarantee the Patriots a record of .500 or better for the 13 consecutive year. The Patriots are the only team in the NFL to finish with a record of .500 or better in each of the last 12 years (2001-12). Each of the other 31 NFL teams had at least one losing season between 2001 and 2012.

Since the 2010 season, the Patriots are now a combined 24-2 in the second half of the regular season. Since Bill Belichick became Patriots head coach in 2000, New England is 84-22 in the second half of the season.

# ROBERT KRAFT NEWS & NOTES

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 20th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (12), conference crowns (6) and Super Bowl championships (3) than any other NFL team. The Patriots have made six Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 19 seasons, the Patriots qualified for the playoffs 14 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

## 212-GAME SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season tickets are capped and more than 50,000 fans are on a season ticket waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 212 consecutive home games, including playoff and preseason games (dating back to the 1994 season opener).

## KRAFT PRODUCES MORE WINS THAN EVERY OTHER PATRIOT OWNER COMBINED

The Patriots have 232 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 232-113 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

## ROBERT KRAFT: ESTABLISHING A WINNING TRADITION

Kraft's winning percentage with the Patriots (.672) since taking over the team in 1994 is not only the highest of any current NFL owner, it ranks second all-time among owners with at least 10 years of experience, trailing only Lee Joannes, who compiled a .698 winning percentage with the Green Bay Packers from 1930-1947.

## QUARTERBACK STABILITY

Over the last 20 years, the Patriots have had 14 quarterbacks on their active roster. Of this group, only four quarterbacks have started a regular season or post-season game for the club, and only two (Tom Brady and Drew Bledsoe) have started on Opening Day, the fewest of any AFC East team in both categories. The only other NFL team to have started fewer quarterbacks over the last 20 years is the Green Bay Packers, with three total starters (Brett Favre, Aaron Rodgers, and Matt Flynn) and two Opening Day starters (Brett Favre and Aaron Rodgers).

## PATRIOTS A MODEL OF CONSISTENCY UNDER KRAFT

The Patriots have been a model of consistency at the coaching position under Robert Kraft. With Bill Belichick in his 14<sup>th</sup> season as head coach, the Patriots have had just three head coaches since 1994, the fewest number by far of any AFC East team.

## COVER BOYS

Kraft's success as an owner has brought the Patriots a great increase in national recognition. Prior to Kraft's ownership, the Patriots had been featured on the cover of just four issues of *Sports Illustrated* (1966, 1977, 1981, and 1986). Since 1994, New England has graced the cover a total of 27 times, including 17 that feature Tom Brady alone.



## COACHING CONSISTENCY UNDER KRAFT

In a league of constant change at the head coach position, the Patriots have been a model of consistency under Robert Kraft. Since Kraft took ownership of the team in 1994, the Patriots have had just three head coaches – Bill Parcells (1994-1996), Pete Carroll (1996-1999) and current head coach Bill Belichick (2000-present), who is in his 14<sup>th</sup> season in New England and is the longest-tenured active head coach in the NFL. The only other NFL team with fewer head coaches since 1994 is the Pittsburgh Steelers, who have had two – Bill Cowher (1992-2006) and Mike Tomlin (2007-present).

# PATRIOTS VS. BRONCOS

## SERIES HISTORY



The Patriots and Broncos will meet for the 47th time in series history, including three times in the postseason. It will mark Denver's third straight visit to New England, including a 45-10 Patriots win in the 2011 AFC Divisional playoffs and last season's 31-21 win on Oct. 7, 2012.

Denver leads the all-time regular-season series with a 25-18 advantage and is 2-1 in the postseason against New England. In addition to the 2011 postseason win, New England lost a Divisional Playoff game at Denver during the 1986 and 2005 playoffs. Both of those games were played in Denver.

Of the 46 previous games in the series, 27 have been played in Denver. The Patriots have played more games against the Broncos than any other team that has never been in New England's division. The Patriots are 10-9 all-time against Denver in home games, including 3-2 against Denver at Gillette Stadium.

The history between the teams dates back to the first days of the American Football League in 1960. The Patriots played the Broncos in the inaugural game of each franchise, a 13-10 Denver win on Sept. 9, 1960 at BU Field. The teams squared off twice a year in the decade prior to the AFL-NFL merger, except for 1967 and 1969.

# PATRIOTS VS. BRONCOS

## BRADY VS. MANNING

Tom Brady and Peyton Manning have had many epic games against each other over the course of their careers. This week's game will be the second Brady-Manning game since Peyton Manning's departure from the Indianapolis Colts. Despite playing in separate divisions following the 2002 NFL division reformatting, the Patriots and the Colts played each other an astounding 15 times since 2001 overall. With the exception of the 2011 regular season matchup—a game which Peyton Manning missed due to a neck injury—and the 2008 regular season game that Tom Brady missed following an ACL tear, Brady and Manning have started at quarterback for their respective teams in every game dating back to Sept. 30, 2001. Sunday's game between the Patriots and the Broncos will mark the 14<sup>th</sup> time that Brady and Manning have started opposite one another.

Although Manning holds a regular season advantage over Brady in touchdowns, yards and completions, the Patriots have won seven of the 10 regular season games in which the two quarterbacks have faced each other.

Brady and Manning have also faced each other three times in the postseason. The Patriots are 2-1 in those three playoff games with Brady posting a better passer rating (81.7) than Manning (61.0).

Quarterback Tom Brady directed four scoring drives of 80 or more yards and the running game chalked up 251 yards behind a career-high of 151 yards by RB Stevan Ridley to help lead New England to a 31-21 victory over the Denver Broncos.

It was the 13th meeting between Brady and Peyton Manning in a showdown of two of the NFL's top quarterbacks. Brady improved to a 9-4 record when facing Manning.

Brady completed 23 of 31 passes for 223 yards with one touchdown and a 1-yard touchdown run. Manning completed 31 of 44 passes for 345 yards with three touchdowns, but he lost a fumble on a sack by DL Rob Ninkovich in the third quarter that was recovered by DL Vince Wilfork at the Denver 14-yard line to set up an 8-yard touchdown run by Ridley for a 31-7 Patriots lead with under five minutes to play in the third quarter.

The Patriots set a franchise record with 35 first downs, their third straight game with 30 or more first downs. It also marked the first time since 1978 that the Patriots had back-to-back games with at least 200 yards rushing.

After taking a 17-7 halftime lead and then taking a 31-7 third quarter lead, Manning and the Broncos attempted to make a comeback. The Broncos responded to the Ridley touchdown with a 10-play, 90-yard drive that was highlighted by two key third down passes from Manning to keep the drive alive before he connected with WR Eric Decker on a 2-yard touchdown pass to make it 31-14.

In the fourth quarter, the Patriots elected to go for a first down on a fourth-and-5 situation from the Denver 37-yard line. Brady fumbled on a sack, allowing the Broncos to recover at the New England 43. That helped set up a drive that ended with a 5-yard touchdown pass to WR Brandon Stokley to make it 31-21. Ridley lost a fumble that was recovered at the Denver 32-yard line with just over five minutes to play, but Ninkovich forced his second fumble on a hit to RB Willis McGahee at the Denver 14-yard line and the Patriots were able to run out the clock to secure the victory.

Denver wasted a scoring opportunity on their first drive. Manning connected on a 43-yard pass to WR Demaryius Thomas but DB Sterling Moore stripped and recovered the ball to end the scoring threat.

WR Wes Welker caught 13 passes for 104 yards and scored the Patriots' first points on an 8-yard touchdown in the first quarter. Denver tied the game early in the second quarter but the Patriots added 10 points before halftime to secure a 17-7 lead. RB Shane Vereen scored on a 1-yard touchdown on a 14-play, 80-yard drive and then K Stephen Gostkowski added a 23-yard field goal at the end of the quarter. The field goal drive was aided by two big third down plays. Facing a third-and-14, Brady hit RB Danny Woodhead on a short pass that went for a 25-yard gain. Then on a third-and-1, RB Brandon Bolden ran for 24 yards.

The Patriots defense forced three fumbles, including two inside New England territory to end scoring threats.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR AGAINST THE BRONCOS

### TOM BRADY

- Tom Brady (2,552) needs 448 yards to reach 3,000 passing yards for the 11<sup>th</sup> time in his career. He will become one of just six players with at least 11 3,000 yard passing seasons.

### JULIAN EDELMAN

- Julian Edelman needs one more punt return for a touchdown to set the team mark with his fourth punt returned for a touchdown. He is tied with Irving Fryar and Troy Brown with three returns for a touchdown.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR AGAINST THE BRONCOS

### STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI

- Stephen Gostkowski has 10 field goals of 40 or more yards in 2013. He needs one more field goal of 40 or more yards to tie the Patriots record for most 40-yard field goals in a single season. Adam Vinatieri had 11 field goals of 40 or more yards in 2004 and 1998 and Gostkowski had 11 such field goals in 2012.
- Gostkowski needs to convert one field goal to extend his streak to 20 consecutive field goals. The team record is 23 by Adam Vinatieri in 2004.
- Gostkowski has scored in 101 consecutive games and needs to score in the next game to break a tie with Adam Vinatieri and John Smith for the team's all-time record with 102 consecutive games scored.
- Gostkowski has scored 98 points and needs two more points to reach 100 points. He has scored at least 100 points in six of his previous seven seasons.

### CHANDLER JONES

- Chandler Jones has a team-leading 9 ½ sacks and needs a half a sack to register the team's 15<sup>th</sup> 10-sack season.

### CHRIS JONES

- Chris Jones can add to his 2013 sack total of 5.0, which leads all rookies.

### STEVAN RIDLEY

- Stevan Ridley to score a rushing touchdown in his sixth straight game. In 2012, Ridley had a streak of six straight games with at least one rushing touchdown, which is tied for the second longest streak in team history.
- Ridley has 13 20-yard runs and needs one more to have the most for the Patriots since 2000. He is currently tied at 13 with Antowain Smith and Corey Dillon.

### BRANDON SPIKES

- Brandon Spikes leads the team with 91 total tackles and needs nine tackles to secure his second straight 100-tackle season. He had a career-high of 128 total tackles in 2012.

### TEAM

- The Patriots can earn their eighth win of the 2013 season and guarantee to finish the season with a record of .500 or better for the 13<sup>th</sup> consecutive season.
- A Patriots win and an Oakland loss will give the Patriots a tie for the most wins in the regular season among the original AFL teams. Oakland has 434 wins, while the Patriots have 433.

The Carolina Panthers topped the visiting New England Patriots 24-20 in a Monday Night Football matchup at Bank of America Stadium.

Carolina QB Cam Newton threw his third touchdown of the night with a 25-yard pass to WR Ted Ginn, Jr. with 59 seconds left. Newton drove the Panthers 83 yards on 13 plays for the go-ahead touchdown, but the Patriots still had a chance to get the win.

QB Tom Brady moved the Patriots to the Carolina 18-yard line and fired a pass into the end zone on the final play. The pass was intercepted by S Robert Lester, but the officials threw a flag after it appeared that LB Luke Kuechly had interfered with TE Rob Gronkowski by grabbing him with both hands. The officials quickly gathered together and waved off the penalty and the game ended. Faced with a fourth-and-10 from their own 20-yard line with 47 seconds to play, Brady completed a 23-yard pass to Gronkowski to keep the drive alive.

Brady was 29-of-40 for 296 yards and one touchdown, while Newton completed 19 of 28 passes for 209 yards and three touchdowns. He also ran seven times for 62 yards.

Both teams had just seven offensive series, including just one series each in the third quarter. After Carolina built a 10-0 lead, the Patriots answered with a field goal right before the half and then took their second half kick and engineered an 8-play, 70-yard drive that ended when Brady connected with Gronkowski for a 9-yard touchdown pass to tie the game at 10-10.

Carolina answered with a 13-play, 81-yard drive that ended with a 15-yard touchdown pass from Newton to TE Greg Olsen to take a 17-10 lead. That drive was kept alive when Newton scrambled on a third-and-seven play, breaking numerous tackles to convert on a 14-yard run. Newton completed all seven of his pass attempts on that drive for 77 yards.

The Patriots scored on their next two possessions, with a 1-yard touchdown run by RB Stevan Ridley to tie the game at 17-17 and then a 26-yard field goal by K Stephen Gostkowski that gave the Patriots a 20-17 lead. The scoring drives were sandwiched around a key three-and-out defensive series that included a 7-yard sack by DE Rob Ninkovich, his second of the night.

Newton and the Panthers came right down the field before hitting Ginn on a hitch route. Ginn escaped a few defenders before racing down the sidelines and into the end zone.

The Patriots were two-for-five in the red zone, including the last play of the game. In the second quarter, the Patriots reached the Carolina 13-yard line before a Ridley fumble ended the drive. Then in the fourth quarter, the Patriots reached the Carolina 8-yard line before being forced to settle for a field goal.

The Patriots ended a streak of 36 straight games with at least one turnover, a streak that began in October of 2011.

### **BILL BELTCHICK**

- Bill Belichick (212) moved past Hall of Famer Chuck Noll (209) into fifth place all-time on the NFL wins list with the Patriots 30-27 win against New Orleans. Curly Lambeau is in fourth place with 229 career wins.
- Belichick (18) needs one more postseason victory to tie Don Shula (19) for second place in postseason wins. Tom Landry (20) is in first place.
- Belichick has five conference titles and needs one more to match Don Shula, who led his teams to six Super Bowls.
- Belichick has led the Patriots to 12 consecutive winning records (2001-12). He is tied with Curly Lambeau (12 – 1921-32) for third all-time. The NFL record is 20 by Tom Landry (1966-85) followed by 14 by Curly Lambeau (1934-47).

### **TOM BRADY**

- Tom Brady has 55 career 300-yard games and ranks fifth all-time for most 300-yard games and third among active players.
- Brady (34) reached 30 touchdown passes in 2012 for the third straight season and became just the fifth player in NFL history with at least 30 touchdown passes in four seasons overall.
- Brady (4,827) reached 4,000 passing yards in 2012. He is just the fifth player in NFL history to reach 4,000 yards in five or more seasons: Peyton Manning (12), Drew Brees (7), Dan Marino (6) and Brett Favre (6).
- Brady is the only quarterback in NFL history to have thrown for at least one touchdown pass in each game for three consecutive seasons (2010-12).
- Brady had 401 completions in 2012 for the second straight season and joined Drew Brees (5), Peyton Manning (2) and Matthew Stafford (2) as the only NFL quarterbacks with at least two 400 completion seasons.

### **ROB GRONKOWSKI**

- Rob Gronkowski (10 touchdowns in 2010 and 18 in 2011) became the first tight end in NFL history with three straight 10-plus touchdown seasons after reaching 11 for the season in 2012. Gronkowski and Antonio Gates (13 in 2004 and 10 in 2005) are the only tight ends to have back-to-back 10-plus touchdown seasons.
- Gronkowski joins Randy Moss (2007, 2008 and 2009) and Corey Dillon (2004, 2005, 2006) as the only Patriots with three straight 10-plus touchdown seasons and three 10-plus seasons overall.
- Gronkowski has 40 receiving touchdowns and 41 touchdowns overall (40 receiving and 1 rushing) since 2010. The 40 receiving touchdowns are the second most in the NFL in that time span, behind Calvin Johnson (44).
- Gronkowski has 40 touchdowns in just 47 games. He became the fastest to 40 touchdowns. Antonio Gates previously held the record after reaching 40 touchdowns in 71 games.

### **ROB NINKOVICH**

- Rob Ninkovich has 11 fumble recoveries over the last four seasons (2010-13), the most of any player in the NFL over that time. Vince Wilfork is second with seven.

### **STEVAN RIDLEY**

- Stevan Ridley rushed for 1,263 yards in 2012 and will be looking to become the third Patriots player with back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons, joining Jim Nance (1966-67) and Curtis Martin (1995-97).
- Ridley scored 12 touchdowns in 2012 and will look to become the fourth running back in team history with back-to-back 10-plus touchdowns in a season, joining Corey Dillon (2004, 2005, 2006), BenJarvus Green-Ellis (2010, 2011) and Curtis Martin (1995, 1996).

## PATRIOTS 2013 TEAM CAPTAINS

The Patriots team captains were elected by their teammates. Quarterback Tom Brady and G Logan Mankins are the offensive captains. Defensive lineman Vince Wilfork and LB Jerod Mayo are the defensive captains. Wide receiver Matthew Slater is the special teams captain. Brady has been chosen as a captain for the 12<sup>th</sup> straight season. Wilfork is a captain for the sixth straight season, while Mayo is in his fifth season serving as a captain. Mankins, and Slater are captains for a third time.

Following the season-ending injuries to Wilfork and Mayo, DB Devin McCourty and DL Rob Ninkovich were named defensive captains. McCourty previously served as a captain in 2011 and 2012. Ninkovich is a first-time captain.

## BELICHICK IS GOOD IN DECEMBER

## BELICHICK NAMED COACH OF THE YEAR 3 TIMES

The Associated Press named Bill Belichick the NFL's Coach of the Year in 2010. It was the third time that Belichick earned the honor. He was also named Coach of the Year following the 2003 and 2007 seasons. Belichick joins Don Shula (4-time winner) and Chuck Knox as the only three-time winners.

## BELICHICK FIRST WITH 14 WINS IN FOUR SEASONS

Bill Belichick guided the Patriots to an NFL-best 14-2 record in 2010. Belichick is the first head coach ever to win at least 14 regular-season games in four separate seasons. ## BRADY'S 65 PASS ATTEMPTS AGAINST SF ARE A CAREER-HIGH

## OL DAN CONNOLLY

### DAN CONNOLLY HAS THE LONGEST KICKOFF RETURN EVER BY AN OFFENSIVE LINEMAN

Dan Connolly was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week after he returned a kickoff 71 yards to the 4-yard line in the second quarter of the Patriots win vs. Green Bay on Dec. 19, 2010. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, it is the longest kickoff return by an offensive lineman in NFL history. The run by Connolly topped the 48-yard touchdown return by Atlanta's Mal Snyder in 1969. Previously, the longest kickoff return for a Patriots offensive lineman was a 27-yard return by G Stephen Neal on Nov. 30, 2008 vs. Pittsburgh. Connolly's previous best was a 16-yard return vs. Miami on Nov. 8, 2009.



## WR JULIAN EDELMAN

### JULIAN EDELMAN SET FRANCHISE RECORD WITH A 94-YARD PUNT RETURN FOR A TOUCHDOWN

WR Julian Edelman set a franchise record with a 94-yard punt return for a touchdown in the second quarter vs. Miami (01/02/11). The previous longest punt return was an 89-yard touchdown return by Mike Haynes vs. Buffalo on Nov. 7, 1976. Edelman returned his second career punt for a touchdown vs. Kansas City on Nov. 21, 2011 with a 72-yard return. He was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance against Kansas City. Edelman had a 47-yard run in the fourth quarter vs. Indianapolis (11/18/12). It was the longest run from scrimmage for the Patriots in 2012, topping Steven Ridley's 41-yard run against St. Louis in London on Oct. 28. It is the longest run ever by a Patriots receiver, topping Troy Brown's 35-yard run vs. Tampa Bay on Sept. 3, 2000. It was the longest run by a Patriots player since Sammy Morris had a 55-yard run on Dec. 27, 2009 vs. Jacksonville.

### EDELMAN GOES FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he completed 56% of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

### GRONKOWSKI SECOND PATRIOTS TIGHT END TO REACH 1,000 YARDS

Gronkowski became the second tight end in New England Patriots history to go over 1,000 receiving yards in 2011. He broke TE Ben Coates (1,174 yards in 1994) franchise record en route to his NFL tight end receiving record of 1,327 yards.

### GRONKOWSKI BECOMES FIRST PATRIOTS TIGHT END TO RECORD A RUSHING TOUCHDOWN

Gronkowski scored a 2-yard touchdown on a lateral from Tom Brady in the third quarter vs. Indianapolis (12/4/11), becoming the first tight end in Patriots history to score a rushing touchdown. Gronkowski is the first NFL tight end to score a rushing touchdown since Tennessee's Bo Scaife had a 31-yard scoring run against Baltimore on Nov. 12, 2006. ## RIDLEY REACHES 12 TDS IN 2012

Ridley finished tied for third in the NFL with 12 rushing touchdowns in 2012. The 12 rushing touchdowns are tied with Corey Dillon (2005 and 2004), Antowain Smith (2001) and Steve Grogan (1976) for fifth all-time in team history.

## STEVAN RIDLEY HAD FOUR 100-YARD RUSHING DAYS IN 2012

Stevan Ridley had his first career 100-yard day in the 2012 season opener at Tennessee (9/9) with 125 yards rushing on 21 carries for a 6.0-yard average. He finished with 106 yards rushing on 22 carries for a 4.8-yard average at Buffalo (9/30), a career-high 151 rushing yards vs. Denver (10/7) and then gained 127 yards on 15 carries for an 8.5-yard average at St. Louis (10/28).

Ridley had his fifth career 100-yard day and his first of the 2013 season after gaining 115 yards on 26 attempts vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 3, 2013.

## RIDLEY GOES LONG

In the season opener at Tennessee (9/9/12), Ridley had five runs of 15 or more yards (17, 17, 16, 15, 15). No Patriots running back in at least the past 25 years has done that in a single game, according to the Elias Sports Bureau. Tennessee's Chris Johnson was the last NFL player to have five runs of 15 or more yards in a game (Nov. 27, 2011 vs. Tampa Bay).



## T NATE SOLDER

### 2011 FIRST ROUND PICK NATE SOLDER

It only took a day for Nate Solder to decide to change from his lifelong position of tight end to tackle after playing his freshman year at Colorado as a tight end. "My coaches came to me and said, 'You'd be an all right tight end, but you'd be an even better tackle,'" he told the *Boston Globe*. "I've always wanted to be great, so that's why I moved to tackle." He added over 30 pounds after his redshirt freshman season and was named the team's starting left tackle. He played in 2,540 of 2,542 offensive plays over the next three seasons at Colorado and became an immediate contributor on the Patriots offensive line at right tackle as a rookie before moving to left tackle.

### SLATER LED THE TEAM IN SPECIAL TEAMS TACKLES FOR THIRD STRAIGHT YEAR

Slater led the team with 20 special teams tackles, one behind his career-high of 21 tackles set in 2010. He has led the Patriots in special teams tackles for the past three seasons with 21 in 2010, 17 in 2011 and 20 in 2012.

### SLATER EMERGED AS A TWO-TIME CAPTAIN AND TWO-TIME PRO BOWLER ON SPECIAL TEAMS

Bill Belichick recently acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

## **WR KENBRELL THOMPkins**

### **JUDGE KEEPS AUTOGRAPHED PICTURE OF KENBRELL THOMPkins ON HIS DESK**

Florida judge Dennis Murphy will never forget Kenbrell Thompkins. This is especially true now, as Murphy keeps an autographed picture of Thompkins on his desk from the rookie's playing days at El Camino Community College. The picture was a gift from Thompkins, who has Murphy to thank for granting him special probation conditions after a drug charge in 2007 that allowed Thompkins to leave his crime-riddled neighborhood in Miami, Fla. and attend El Camino. "I'm a firm believer in giving youth a chance to try and turn it around," Murphy told *The Boston Globe*. After being arrested seven times between the ages of 15 and 18, Thompkins excelled at El Camino and went on to play at the University of Cincinnati en route to fulfilling his NFL dream. Thompkins earned his degree from Cincinnati in criminal justice.



## **OL WILL SVITEK**

### **WILL SVITEK TAKES A HIKE TO REMEMBER**

Will Svitek was born in Prague, Czechoslovakia. When he was 2, his parents took him and his three brothers out of the communist country. They left in secret with no money and only the clothes on their backs. Saying they were on a day hike, they walked 14 hours through the mountains and ended up in Austria. The family spent eight months in a refugee camp until being legalized to come to the United States. "My parents were hard-working immigrants who came here to achieve the American Dream and help their sons reach their full potential," said Svitek. "I think they instilled it in me to do everything well. I am a competitive person on the field and in the classroom and I don't think you can just turn that switch off."



## **T SEBASTIAN VOLLMER**

### **SEBASTIAN VOLLMER MAKES HIS MARK**

A native of Kaarst, Germany, Vollmer did not begin playing football until the age of 14 when he started playing for the Dusseldorf club team. Vollmer helped lead his German prep school team to two national football championships. His early football success landed him an appearance in the 2004 Global Junior Championships in San Diego, which led him to a scholarship at Houston. He spoke very little English when he signed with Houston, but he became fluent in the language as he developed from a 250-pound tight end into a 315-pound lineman who started his final 25 games at tackle for the Cougars. He was not invited to the NFL combine, but Vollmer's collegiate career created interest from the Patriots, who drafted him in the second round of the 2009 draft. Nicknamed "Seabass" during his playing days at Houston, it is a nickname that has carried over to the NFL.



## **C RYAN WENDELL**

### **RYAN WENDELL LEADS THE NFL IN PLAY SNAPS IN 2012**

Ryan Wendell played a league-high 1,249 snaps in 2012 and it helped earn him a spot on the USA Today All-Joe team in 2012. Said Wendell: "I think first it says a lot about the organization, our training staff and our strength training coaches, that they do everything they can all season and all off-season and during the spring to keep us healthy throughout the whole season. I think it says more about them then it does about me individually."





# PATRIOTS DEFENSIVE NOTES



## CB KYLE ARRINGTON

### WHAT IS IN A NUMBER

When Arrington was first making the transition from Hofstra to the NFL in 2008, he was assigned jersey No. 42. At that point in his career, he was cut by both the Eagles and Buccaneers.

When Arrington first arrived in New England as a practice squad player in 2009, he initially donned No. 27. But when No. 24 became available, a result of Jonathan Wilhite leaving in free agency after the 2010 season, Arrington pounced on it.

The reason is that it reflects how he's flipped his NFL fortunes -- from a No. 42 struggling to hang on to a No. 24 who has carved out a role on a winning team.

Arrington moved from 24 to 25 in an agreement with Adrian Wilson this past season to accommodate the veteran's desire to keep the same jersey he has worn during his 12-year NFL career.



## S STEVE GREGORY

### STEVE GREGORY WAS ABOUT TO ENTER THE POLICE ACADEMY WHEN SAN DIEGO CALLED

Steve Gregory's father and stepmother are New York City police officers and both were on duty during the events of September 11, 2001. Following his college career at Syracuse, Gregory took the test to enter the police academy. He found out he passed the test on the same day that the San Diego Chargers called him to offer him a rookie free agent contract.

### GREGORY SETS CAREER HIGH WITH HIS THIRD INTERCEPTION OF THE SEASON IN 2012

Steve Gregory set a single-season career-high when he intercepted Miami QB Ryan Tannehill in the first quarter for his third on the season in the season-finale on Dec. 30, 2012. The pick helped set up a 9-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Wes Welker. Gregory's previous single-season high was two interceptions in 2010 when he played for San Diego.



## LB DONT'A HIGHTOWER

### DONT'A HIGHTOWER WEARS TEDY BRUSCHI'S JERSEY #54

As a first round draft pick, Dont'a Hightower is used to high expectations. Hightower went to training camp with jersey #45 but was switched to jersey #54 prior to the start of the regular season. Former LB Tedy Bruschi wore #54 for 13 seasons. Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."



## DE CHANDLER JONES

### 2012 FIRST ROUND PICK CHANDLER JONES FOLLOWS IN BROTHERS' FOOTSTEPS

Chandler Jones has two brothers, Arthur, a fifth-round NFL Draft selection by the Baltimore Ravens in 2010, who was a Syracuse defensive tackle, and Jon "Bones" Jones, a UFC fighter and the reigning Lightweight Champion.

### JONES IS PILING UP SACKS

Jones has three two-sack games in 2013 with two vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 3 and two in both 2013 meetings against the New York Jets. He now has 9.5 sacks on the year. The Patriots have had a player finish with 10 or more sacks in a season 14 times in team history.

Jones has 9.5 sacks in 2013 and had 6.0 sacks as a rookie in 2012. He is the first Patriots player with 5-plus sacks in each of his first two NFL seasons since Chris Slade in 1993 (9.0) and 1994 (9.5).

## DT CHRIS JONES

### THIRD TEAM IS A CHARM FOR CHRIS JONES

Chris Jones had an early introduction to failure in the NFL. Taken behind 37 other defensive linemen in the 2013 NFL Draft, the rookie defensive tackle was cut by two teams over a span of just 11 days. After selecting him in the 6<sup>th</sup> round with the 198<sup>th</sup> overall pick, the Houston Texans cut Jones on Aug. 31. Jones signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sept. 1 but lasted only ten days, as the Buccaneers released him on September 10. Rather than be deterred by these early disappointments, however, Jones maintained a positive outlook when he signed with the Patriots on September 11, and it has paid off in a big way. Thrust into a starting role after key injuries to the defensive line, Jones has 5.0 sacks to lead all NFL rookies. Jones' sudden success may come as a surprise to some, but not to Dave Clawson, Jones' college coach at Bowling Green. Jones was part of Clawson's first recruiting class and blossomed into an All-American and two-time captain for the Falcons. "It's hard to talk about Chris without getting a little bit emotional," Clawson told the *Boston Herald*, "because he was that special of a player and person in our program."

## DB DEVIN MCCOURTY

### DOUBLE TROUBLE: CB DEVIN MCCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 12<sup>th</sup> set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of three active sets of twins playing in the NFL.

### MCCOURTY REGISTERS SECOND CAREER TWO-INTERCEPTION GAME AT BUFFALO IN 2012

Devin McCourty had his second career two-interception game in the win at Buffalo on Sept. 30, 2012. He had his first interception of the 2012 season when he picked off a Ryan Fitzpatrick pass at the Buffalo 42-yard line in the first quarter. He picked off his second pass in the fourth quarter. It is McCourty's second career two-interception game. He had his first two-interception game at Detroit on Nov. 25, 2010. The Patriots are 9-0 when McCourty has at least one interception in a game.

### MCCOURTY HAS A 104-YARD KICKOFF RETURN FOR A TOUCHDOWN; SECOND LONGEST IN TEAM HISTORY

Devin McCourty had a 104-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the first quarter vs. the Jets (10/21/12), the second longest kickoff return in team history. Ellis Hobbs has the longest in team history with a 108-yard return for a touchdown at the New York Jets on Sept. 9, 2007. McCourty was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance.

### MCCOURTY HAD THREE END ZONE PICKS IN 2012

Devin McCourty picked off Colin Kaepernick in the end zone in the third quarter vs. San Francisco (12/16/12). It was his third pick in the end zone in 2012. McCourty picked off Matt Schaub vs. Houston on Dec. 10, 2012 in the first quarter. McCourty picked off Ryan Fitzpatrick in the end zone in the fourth quarter vs. Buffalo on Nov. 11, 2012. It is the fourth time in 2012 that the Patriots have intercepted a pass in the end zone. Rookie Tavon Wilson had an interception in the end zone at Tennessee on Sept. 9 in the second quarter.



## DE ROB NINKOVICH

### NINKOVICH LEADS NFL OVER LAST FOUR SEASONS WITH 11 FUMBLE RECOVERIES

Ninkovich has more opponent fumble recoveries (11) over the last four seasons (2010-2013) than any other NFL player. Chicago's Brian Urlacher (retired) and Vince Wilfork are second during that time with seven opponent fumble recoveries.



### NINKOVICH: WHERE DID HE COME FROM?

Rob Ninkovich's journey to the Patriots was not easy. He entered the league as a fifth-round pick by the Saints in 2006 and was waived four times by New Orleans and Miami before landing in New England on Aug. 2, 2009. He spent the 2009 offseason trying to make the New Orleans team as a long snapper. Before coming to the Patriots, he had appeared in just eight games over three seasons. He doubled that total in his first year in New England, appearing in 15 games in 2009 and his role on the team has grown since, earning a starting role at linebacker in 2010 and 2011 before moving to a starting role on the defensive line in 2011.

### NINKOVICH SCORED AS A TE IN COLLEGE

Ninkovich played some at tight end in college at Purdue and caught two touchdown passes with a 2-yard touchdown pass from Dallas QB Kyle Orton and a 1-yard touchdown pass from New York Giants QB Curtis Painter.



## DBS LOGAN RYAN AND DURON HARMON

### RUTGERS CLASSMATES LOGAN RYAN AND DURON HARMON REUNITE IN NEW ENGLAND

Rookie defensive backs Logan Ryan and Duron Harmon are used to learning a new system together. Four years ago, Ryan and Harmon began their college football careers together as members of the same recruiting class at Rutgers University and developed a close friendship during their four years in Piscataway, N.J. As fate would have it, Ryan and Harmon would begin their NFL journeys together as well when the Patriots selected the two defensive backs just eight picks apart in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft. Reunited once again, the former Scarlet Knights are excited and eager to make their mark, just as they did four years ago at Rutgers. "We talked before the draft and said how good it would be to play on the same team again, and for it to happen again, it's exciting and it's a blessing," Harmon told the *Boston Globe*. "It's great [we're contributing], because at the end of the day you want to play, and to contribute to a team like this, it's fun."

### RYAN RETURNS FIRST PICK FOR A TOUCHDOWN

Ryan returned his first NFL interception 79 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter at the New York Jets on Oct. 20, 2013. The last Patriots player to return their first career interception for a touchdown was Kyle Arrington in 2010 against the Green Bay Packers, when he took back a Matt Flynn pass 36 yards for a touchdown. The last rookie Patriots player to return their first career interception for a touchdown was James Sanders in 2005:

## RYAN'S FIRST NFL SACK RESULTS IN A FORCED FUMBLE

Ryan forced a fumble on his first NFL sack vs. Miami on Oct. 27, a week after returning his first career interception for a touchdown. Ryan strip-sacked Ryan Tannehill, forcing a fumble on a 10-yard sack that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich to give the Patriots possession at the Dolphins' 13-yard line in the third quarter. The play set up a 3-play, 13-yard drive that ended in Brandon Bolden's 2-yard touchdown run that tied the game at 17 in the third quarter. The play marked the second time in as many weeks that a Ryan turnover has led to Patriots points. Last week against the New York Jets, Ryan scored on a 79-yard interception return for a touchdown.



## LB BRANDON SPIKES

### SPIKES IS A THROWBACK

Spikes, who patterns his style of play after Hall of Fame linebacker Dick Butkus, shared his feelings on modeling his game after old-school linebackers. "My thing is, when I'm done with this game, I want the older guys when they watch to say, 'He's playing the position the right way.' It's just a point of respect from me to them." Spikes' passion and energy are apparent when he plays the game. Said former Patriots safety Rodney Harrison in a recent interview with the *Boston Herald*: "You can see how much he loves it, how he enjoys being physical. He's an intimidator. He's got that fight in him. He's going to hit you and you're going to feel it."



### SPIKES WENT OVER 100 TACKLES IN 2012; ON PACE TO FINISH WITH OVER 100 AGAIN IN 2013

Spikes had 10 or more tackles in six games and finished with a career-high 128 tackles in 2012. With Jerod Mayo at 184 tackles and Spikes at 128, it is the fifth time in the Bill Belichick era that two players have finished with 100 or more tackles. Spikes has a team-leading 91 total tackles and is on pace to finish 146 total tackles and has had four 10-plus tackles in 2013.

### SPIKES SETS CAREER HIGH WITH 22 TACKLES

Spikes set a career-high with 22 total tackles at Cincinnati on Oct. 6, 2013. His previous best was 16 tackles at the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. It is the highest tackle total for a Patriots player since Jerod Mayo had 23 total tackles vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 13, 2008.

Spikes has four games so far in 2013 with 10 or more tackles – 10 vs. Tampa Bay, 22 at Cincinnati, 17 at New York Jets and 12 vs. Miami.



## DB AQIB TALIB

### AQIB TALIB HAS A NOSE FOR THE BALL

Aqib Talib has been one of the most prolific cornerbacks in the NFL at intercepting opposing quarterbacks and returning those interceptions for touchdowns during his NFL career. Since 2009, Talib ranks fifth in the NFL with 19 interceptions, and is tied for third in the league with 4 INT touchdowns:

## P RYAN ALLEN

### ROOKIE P RYAN ALLEN SETS TEAM MARK

With his 50<sup>th</sup> punt of the 2013 season, Patriots rookie punter Ryan Allen has qualified for the highest career punt average in team history with a 46.1 yard per punt average. # PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

## PATRIOTS HAVE CLINCHED PLAYOFF SPOTS IN 14 OF KRAFT'S 19 YEARS OF OWNERSHIP

New England has qualified for the playoffs 20 times in its 53-year history. The Patriots have earned 14 of those playoff berths in the 19 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 12 AFC East crowns under Kraft's leadership. New England has won 15 division crowns overall (14 AFC East Crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

Jones dropped Panthers QB Cam Newton for a five-yard loss in the second quarter on Monday night, his third sack in just two games. Jones had his third two-sack game of the season in a Week 9 win over the Steelers and is now 5<sup>th</sup> in the NFL with 9½ sacks on the season ... His other two-sack performances in 2013 both came against the New York Jets. Jones tallied four sacks for a combined loss of 31 yards against the Jets this season ... His 9½ sacks lead the team and have already surpassed his rookie year total of six sacks ... Jones also has 57 tackles through ten games to lead all Patriots defensive linemen.

### **DT Chris Jones (FA-'13)**

Jones sacked Dolphins QB Ryan Tannehill for a loss of seven yards in the fourth quarter in Week 8 and later added a half-sack, giving him five sacks on the season which leads all NFL rookies through Week 11 ... Dropped Jets QB Geno Smith twice for a total of 12 yards in just his second NFL start in Week 7... It was the second time in four NFL games that Jones had recorded multiple sacks. Jones dropped Bengals QB Andy Dalton for 1½ sacks for 13 yards in Week 5.

### **DT Joe Vellano (UFA-'13)**

Vellano recovered his first career fumble against the Steelers in Week 9 after Rob Ninkovich stripped QB Ben Roethlisberger in the first quarter ... Recorded a career-high 9 tackles and 8 solo stops in his third career start in Week 7 against the Jets ... Notched his first career sack in a Week 4 win over the Falcons when he dropped Matt Ryan for a 13-yard loss in the third quarter ... Both Vellano and his father, Paul, were All-Americans at Maryland, becoming just the fourth father-son combination to win All-American honors at the same school. The other three to accomplish the feat are Archie and Eli Manning (Mississippi), Kevin and Drew Butler (Georgia), and Lee and Travis McGriff (Florida).

### **DL Rob Ninkovich (FA-'09)**

Ninkovich paced the defense with a team-high nine tackles on Monday Night ... Also led the team with two sacks of Cam Newton for seven yards and has now recorded a sack in three consecutive games ... Forced his second fumble of the season against the Steelers in Week 9 on a strip sack of QB Ben Roethlisberger on Pittsburgh's opening drive ... Recovered his second fumble of the season when he scooped up a Logan Ryan strip sack on the Patriot 13-yard line ... Has recovered 11 fumbles over the last four years, more than any other player in the NFL ... Recorded his 10<sup>th</sup> fumble recovery in a Week 1 win over Buffalo when he scooped up a fumble forced by DB Kyle Arrington in the second quarter that led to a Patriots touchdown.

### **LB Brandon Spikes (D2c, '10)**

Spikes was second on the team with seven tackles (six solo) against the Panthers on Monday night ... Led the team in tackles for the second time in three weeks with a 17-tackle effort against the Jets in Week 7... Was a force in Week 5 against the Bengals, recording a career-high 22 tackles and a team-high 12 solo tackles. Spikes' 22 tackles were the most by a Patriot in a single game since 2008, when Jerod Mayo had 23 total tackles against the Jets in New York on Nov. 13 ... Also recorded his second career interception in Week 5 when he picked off an Andy Dalton pass at the NE 5-yard line to halt a Bengals drive. His first career interception came against the Jets in the final game of his rookie year in 2010 ... Finished with a career-high 128 tackles in 2012 and was one of only two Patriots (Jerod Mayo) to record 100 or more tackles in 2012.

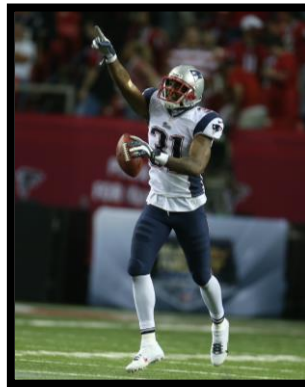

### **LB Dont'a Hightower (D1b, '12)**

Hightower finished with a career-high 16 total tackles against the Jets in Week 7 and led the team with 10 solo tackles ... It was the third time this season that Hightower had recorded double-digit tackles in a game and the first time in his career that he had 10 or more solo stops ... His previous high for solo tackles in a game was seven in a Week 2 win over the Jets ... Scored a touchdown in his first NFL game in 2012 when he recovered a fumble caused by a Chandler Jones strip sack on the 6-yard line and ran in for the score in the Patriots season-opening win at Tennessee (9/9/12).

### **CB Agib Talib (Tr-'12)**



Talib led the team with two passes defended on Monday night and has 11 on the season to lead the team despite playing in only seven games ... Held Saints TE Jimmy Graham to zero catches in a Week 6 win over the Saints before leaving the game with an injury in the second half. Graham was averaging 118.6 yards per game entering the contest ... Tied a career high with four passes defended in a Week 4 win over the Falcons, including a game-saving pass breakup on Roddy White in the end zone on Atlanta's final drive ... Also intercepted Matt Ryan in the fourth quarter for his fourth interception in as many games, tying him for the NFL lead with Kiko Alonso and Alterraun Verner at the time.

### **DB Devin McCourty (D1, '10)**

McCourty recorded seven tackles, five of them solo, against the Jets in Week 7 ... He leads all Patriot defensive backs with 46 stops (33 solo) through eight games ... Forced a key fourth-quarter fumble against the Bengals in Week 5 when he stripped Giovanni Bernard at the NE 49-yard line. It was his second straight game with a forced fumble after he stripped Julio Jones in the fourth quarter of a Week 4 win over the Falcons ... Made a crucial fumble recovery in a Week 2 win over the Jets when he returned a Stephen Hill fumble 44 yards to the Jets 19-yard line to set up a Stephen Gostkowski field goal.

### **S Steve Gregory (UFA-SD, '12)**

Gregory led the Patriots with seven tackles in the team's Week 9 win over the Steelers ... Led all Patriots defensive backs in tackles for the second straight week with five stops against the Buccaneers in Week 3. He recorded seven tackles in a Week 2 win over the Jets ... Gregory opened the season strong by finishing second on the team with nine tackles (seven solo) against Buffalo ... Gregory started in 12 games in 2012 and recorded 55 tackles including a career-high three interceptions.

### **CB Kyle Arrington (UFA, '09)**

Arrington recorded his first interception of the season in a Week 6 win over the Saints when he intercepted QB Drew Brees in the fourth quarter to set up a Stephen Gostkowski field goal ... Forced two fumbles in the Patriots' season-opening win over Buffalo, a career-high ... Arrington also recorded five tackles (four solo), a tackle for loss, and a pass defended in the team's 23-21 win.

### **CB Alfonzo Dennard (D7a, '12)**

Dennard recorded a career-high nine tackles against the Dolphins in Week 8 ... Recorded his first interception of 2013 in a Week 2 win over the Jets when he picked off a Geno Smith pass late in the fourth quarter.

# THE TEAM OF THE DECADE

When Robert Kraft purchased the New England Patriots in 1994, few would have thought that 17 years later the franchise would be the undisputed team of the decade in the first decade of the new millennium. Kraft brought a winning vision to the organization and dedicated his resources to building a consistent winner. On Jan. 27, 2000, Kraft hired Bill Belichick to coach the team, and three months later the team drafted then-unheralded quarterback Tom Brady, putting the final pieces in place for the Patriots to become the most successful NFL team of the 2000s. Below is a look at the accomplishments of the Patriots during the first decade of the new millennium that earned the Patriots the "Team of the Decade" moniker.
