ROBERT KRAFT NEWS & NOTES

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 20th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning



just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (13), conference crowns (6) and Super Bowl championships (3) than any other NFL team. The Patriots have made six Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 20 seasons, the Patriots qualified for the playoffs 15 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

Robert Kraft reached 200 career wins on Oct. 2, 2011 in the Patriots 31-19 win at Oakland. He reached 200 career wins in 302 career games, tied with the Green Bay Packers, Inc. for the second-fastest to reach 200 wins. Kraft has 238 career wins.

Over the last 20 years, the Patriots have had 14 quarterbacks on their active roster. Of this group, only four guarterbacks have started a regular season or post-season game for the club, the fewest total of any team in the NFL. Only two of these four guarterbacks - Tom Brady and Drew Bledsoe - have started on Opening Day for the Patriots, tied with Green Bay (Brett Favre and Aaron Rodgers) and Houston (David Carr and Matt Schaub) for the fewest number in the NFL.

COACHING CONSISTENCY UNDER KRAFT

In a league of constant change at the head coaching position, the Patriots have been a model of consistency under Robert Kraft. Since Kraft took ownership of the team in 1994, the Patriots have had just three head coaches - Bill Parcells (1994-1996), Pete Carroll (1996-1999) and current head coach Bill Belichick (2000-present), who is in his 14th season in New England and is the longest-tenured active head coach in the NFL. The only NFL team with fewer head coaches since 1994 is the Pittsburgh Steelers, who have had two - Bill Cowher (1992-2006) and Mike Tomlin (2007-present).

Kraft's success as an owner has brought the Patriots a great increase in national recognition. Prior to Kraft's ownership, the Patriots had been featured on the cover of just four issues of Sports Illustrated (1966, 1977, 1981, and 1986). Since 1994, New England has graced the cover a total of 27 times, including 17 that feature Tom Brady alone.



PATRIOTS HOME DOMINANCE



Since the Patriots opened Gillette Stadium in 2002, they have celebrated more regular season and postseason wins than any other team in the NFL. The Patriots have the highest point differential at home, rank first in points scored and third in points allowed at Gillette Stadium.

SERIES HISTORY



The Patriots and Broncos will meet for the fourth time in the postseason and for the 48^{th} time overall.

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to beat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football game in the 2013 regular season meeting on Nov. 24.

The Patriots and Broncos have played three previous times in the postseason, all in the Divisional round, with Denver holding a 2-1 advantage in those games. The Patriots two losses were in Denver in 1986 and 2005 and the one victory was in the 2011 postseason at Gillette Stadium.

Denver leads the all-time regular-season series with a 25-19 advantage

Of the 47 previous games in the series, 27 have been played in Denver. The Patriots have played more games against the Broncos than any other team that has never been in New England's division. The Patriots are 11-9 all-time against Denver in home games, including 4-2 against Denver at Gillette Stadium.

The history between the teams dates back to the first days of the American Football League in 1960. The Patriots played the Broncos in the inaugural game of each franchise, a 13-10 Denver win on Sept. 9, 1960 at BU Field. The teams squared off twice a year in the decade prior to the AFL-NFL merger, except for 1967 and 1969.

BRADY VS. MANNING

Tom Brady and Peyton Manning have had many epic games against each other over the course of their careers. This week's game will be the third Brady-Manning game since Peyton Manning's departure from the Indianapolis Colts and the first in the postseason.

Despite playing in separate divisions following the 2002 NFL division reformatting, the Patriots and the Colts played each other an astounding 15 times since 2001 overall. With the exception of the 2011 regular season matchup—a game which Peyton Manning missed due to a neck injury—and the 2008 regular season game that Tom Brady missed following an ACL tear, Brady and Manning have started at quarterback for their respective teams in every game dating back to Sept. 30, 2001. Sunday's game between the Patriots and the Broncos will mark the 15th time overall that Brady and Manning have started opposite one another.

Although Manning holds a regular season advantage over Brady in touchdowns, yards and completions, the Patriots have won eight of the 11 regular season games in which the two quarterbacks have faced each other.

Brady and Manning have also faced each other three times in the postseason. The Patriots are 2-1 in those three playoff games with Brady posting a better passer rating (81.7) than Manning (61.0).

Stephen Gostkowski kicked a 31-yard field goal in overtime after a misplayed punt return by Denver to lift the Patriots to a 34-31 come-from-behind win.

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, marking the largest comeback win in team history. The Patriots trailed the Broncos 24-0 at halftime. New England's previous best comeback win was from 23 points down on Sept. 16, 1984, when the Patriots came back from a 23-0 deficit to win 38-23.

Denver CB Tony Carter ran into P Ryan Allen's punt and DB Nate Ebner recovered at the Denver 13-yard line. After two plays, Gostkowski nailed the game-winner with 1:56 remaining in overtime.

The Patriots lost fumbles on their first three possessions, but QB Tom Brady threw for three touchdowns to lead the Patriots from a 24-0 halftime deficit to a 31-24 lead as New England scored on its first five possessions of the second half. Denver QB Peyton Manning then threw an 11-yard touchdown pass to WR Demaryius Thomas to tie the game at 31 with 3:10 remaining in regulation.

Brady, who finished 34-of-50 for 334 yards, was 21-of-28 for 228 yards with three touchdowns in the second half.

The early turnovers helped Denver jump to a 17-0 first quarter lead. Denver LB Von Miller returned a fumble 60 yards for a touchdown on the first drive and then strip-sacked Brady to force another turnover in the first quarter, setting up RB Knowshon Moreno's 2-yard touchdown run for a 14-0 lead.

When New England got the ball back, they held onto it for just two plays before another fumble that was recovered inside New England territory led to a field goal for a 17-0 lead. The Broncos added a touchdown in the second quarter for a 24-0 lead.

Brady helped get the Patriots on the scoreboard on the first series of the second half with an 8-play, 80-yard drive that was aided by a 33-yard pass to TE Rob Gronkowski to help get in position for a 5-yard touchdown pass from Brady to WR Julian Edelman. Denver, who lost three fumbles in the second half, fumbled on the next series when LB Dane Fletcher forced a fumble on a hit to RB Montee Ball that was recovered by LB Brandon Spikes at the Denver 32-yard line. Six plays later, RB Brandon Bolden ran it in for a 1-yard score to make it 24-14.

Edelman, who finished the game with nine receptions for 110 yards, caught a 43-yard pass from Brady on the next series before Brady connected with Gronkowski for a 6-yard touchdown to make it 24-21 heading into the fourth quarter.

Rookie CB Logan Ryan intercepted a Manning pass early in the fourth quarter deep inside Denver territory. Three plays later, Brady connected with Edelman for his second touchdown of the night on a 14-yard pass that gave New England the lead at 28-24.

The temperature at kickoff was 22 degrees, making the Broncos game the coldest regular season home game in Gillette Stadium history.

The Patriots held Denver's pass offense to 132 net yards, despite the Broncos coming into the game averaging an NFLbest 350.4 passing yards per game. Manning had just 73 yards through three and a half quarters and finished with only 150 passing yards.



2013 REGULAR SEASON MEETING GAME NOTES: PATRIOTS COMPLETE BIGGEST COMEBACK IN TEAM HISTORY IN 2013 REGULAR SEASON MEETING

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31 in overtime, marking the largest comeback win in team history. The Patriots trailed the Broncos 24-0 at halftime. New England's previous best comeback win was from 23 points down on Sept. 16, 1984, when the Patriots came back from a 23-0 deficit to win 38-23 vs. Seattle on Sept. 16, 1984. The Patriots cameback from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22, on Dec, 21, 1996. The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently on Jan. 1, 2012 against Buffalo. The last time the Patriots allowed 24 first half points was on Nov. 30, 2009 at New Orleans, when the Patriots trailed 24-10 at halftime. Before the Denver game, the last time the Patriots did not score in first half was on Dec. 24, 2011, when they trailed Miami 17-0 at halftime in a 27-24 win at Gillette Stadium.

COLDEST REGULAR SEASON HOME GAME IN GILLETTE STADIUM HISTORY

The temperature at kickoff was 22 degrees, making the Broncos game the coldest regular season home game in Gillette Stadium history. It is the coldest Patriots home game since Dec. 26, 1993 vs. Indianapolis at Foxboro Stadium when the temperature was 19 degrees. The Patriots won that game 38-0. The coldest game ever at Gillette Stadium was the 2003 AFC Divisional Playoff game vs. Tennessee, when the Patriots beat the Titans 17-14 in temperature of 4 degrees with a wind chill of -10.

COLDEST NOVEMBER GAME IN TEAM HISTORY

The game was the coldest November game in team history at 22 degrees. The previous coldest was Nov. 22, 1987 vs. Indianapolis in 26 degrees in Sullivan Stadium. The Patriots won that game, 24-0.

PATRIOTS HOLD BRONCOS PASS OFFENSE TO 132 YARDS

The Patriots held the Broncos' pass offense to 132 net yards, despite Denver coming into the game averaging an NFL-best 350.4 passing yards per game. New England's passing attack totaled 324 net yards, ahead of its average of 237.1 net passing yards heading into the game.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN THE 2013 POSTSEASON

TEAM

- With a victory, the Patriots will advance to their eighth Super Bowl, matching Dallas and Pittsburgh for the most Super Bowl appearances.
- The Patriots have rushed for 200 yards in their last two games with 267 yards in the regular season-finale vs. Buffalo and 234 yards in the Divisional Playoff win vs. Indianapolis. If they reach 200 yards rushing at Denver it will be the first time they have had a stretch of three straight games with 200 yards rushing since having a stretch of four straight 200-yard games in 1978, the year the Patriots set the NFL record for most rushing yards in a single season with 3,165 yards rushing. It is the Patriots longest standing NFL record.

ROBERT KRAFT

- With a win over Denver, Robert Kraft will earn his seventh conference title. Kraft is already the first NFL owner to bring his team to six Super Bowls.
- Kraft (21) needs one more postseason win to tie Eddie DeBartalo, Jr. for the fourth-most postseason wins by an ownership group, behind 33 by the Rooney family, 30 by Green Bay and 24 by the Mara family.

BILL BELICHICK

- Bill Belichick (19) needs one more postseason victory to move into a first place tie with Tom Landry (20) for most postseason victories.
- Belichick needs to earn one more Super Bowl berth to match Don Shula with six.

LEGARRETTE BLOUNT

• LeGarrette Blount ran for 166 yards vs. Indianapolis last week, tying Curtis Martin for the most rushing yards in a playoff game in Patriots history. If he runs for 100 yards at Denver, then he will join Laurence Maroney (2007) and Craig James (1985) as the only Patriots with back-to-back 100-yard games in the postseason.

TOM BRADY

- Tom Brady will make his 8th start in a Conference Championship game and join Charlie Waters and Jack Reynolds for the most starts in a Conference Championship in NFL history.
- Brady (5) needs to play in one more Super Bowl to match DL Mike Lodish, who played in six (four with Buffalo and two with Denver).
- Brady needs to start in one more Super Bowl to set the NFL record with six starting assignments. He is tied with Matt Light, Cornelius Bennett, John Elway and Charles Haley with five starts in the Super Bowl.
- Brady and John Elway are currently tied with five conference titles and a win over Denver in the Conference Championship will give Brady the most conference championship by a starting quarterback in NFL history.
- Brady (42) needs four more postseason touchdowns to move past Joe Montana (45) and Brett Favre (44) for the all-time lead.

STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI

• Stephen Gostkowski (18) needs two more postseason field goals to become just the 11th NFL player to reach 20 field goals in the postseason. He is currently tied for 11th in the NFL with his 18 postseason field goals.

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 21 times in its 54year history. Fifteen of those playoff berths have come in the 20 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths that the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 16 division crowns, including 11 in the last 13 seasons, and have qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1976, 1985, 1994, and 1998). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

BILL BELICHICK

- Bill Belichick (218) moved past Hall of Famer Chuck Noll (209) into fifth place all-time on the NFL wins list with the Patriots 30-27 win against New Orleans (10/13/13). Curly Lambeau is in fourth place with 229 career wins.
- Belichick (19) needs one more postseason victory to break a tie with Don Shula (19) for second place in postseason wins, behind Tom Landry (20) for the most postseason wins by a head coach.
- Belichick has five conference titles and needs one more to match Don Shula, who led his teams to six Super Bowls.
- Belichick has led the Patriots to 13 consecutive winning records (2001-13), third all-time behind 20 by Tom Landry (1966-85) followed by 14 by Curly Lambeau (1934-47).

LEGARRETTE BLOUNT

• LeGarrette Blount set a new Patriots single-game record vs. Buffalo on Dec. 29 with 334 all-purpose yards, gaining 189 yards from scrimmage and adding 145 return yards. Blount's performance topped the 51-year old team record set by Larry Garron on Nov. 3, 1962 when Garron had 272 all-purpose yards at Buffalo.

TOM BRADY

- Tom Brady has 59 career 300-yard games and ranks fifth alltime for most 300-yard games and third among active players.
- •Brady (4,343) reached 4,000 passing yards in 2013 for the sixth time in his career. He joins Dan Marino (6), Brett Favre (6), Drew Brees (8) and Peyton Manning (13) as the only players to have at least five seasons with 4,000 passing yards.
- Brady is the only quarterback in NFL history to have thrown for at least one touchdown pass in each game for three consecutive seasons (2010-12).
- Brady led the Patriots to his 148th career regular season win to move into a tie with Hall of Famer John Elway for third on the all-time win list among starting quarterbacks.

JULIAN EDELMAN

• Julian Edelman finished with 105 receptions in 2013 to join Wes Welker (2007-09, 11-12) and Troy Brown (2001) as the only Patriots players to reach 100 receptions in a season. Edelman is averaged 6.4 receptions per game in 2013.

• Edelman finished with 1,056 receiving yards in 2013 to become the 10^{th} Patriots player to register a 1,000-yard season.

ROB NINKOVICH

- Rob Ninkovich has 11 fumble recoveries over the last four seasons (2010-13), the most of any player in the NFL over that time. Vince Wilfork is second with seven.
- Ninkovich is the first Patriots player with back-to-back seasons with at least eight sacks since Willie McGinest in 1995 (11) and 1996 (9.5). He is the only player to accomplish the feat during Belichick's tenure as head coach in New England.

STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI

- Stephen Gostkowski set the franchise record for most points in a season with 158 total points.
- Gostkowski broke his own franchise record with 38 field goals in 2013. He originally set the record with 36 field goals in 2008.

PATRIOTS 2013 TEAM CAPTAINS

The Patriots team captains were elected by their teammates. Quarterback Tom Brady and G Logan Mankins are the offensive captains. Defensive lineman Vince Wilfork and LB Jerod Mayo are the defensive captains. Wide receiver Matthew Slater is the special teams captain. Brady has been chosen as a captain for the 12th straight season. Wilfork is a captain for the sixth straight season, while Mayo is in his fifth season serving as a captain. Mankins, and Slater are captains for a third time.

Following the season-ending injuries to Wilfork and Mayo, DB Devin McCourty and DL Rob Ninkovich were named defensive captains. McCourty previously served as a captain in 2011 and 2012. Ninkovich is a first-time captain.

PATRIOTS FINISH WITH THREE RECEIVERS OVER 100 YARDS FOR THE FIRST TIME IN TEAM HISTORY VS. PITTSBURGH

The Patriots had three players finish with 100 yards receiving in a single game for the first time in team history when Rob Gronkowski finished with 143 yards, Aaron Dobson with 130 yards and Danny Amendola with 122 yards vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 3, 2013. It is the 18th time since the merger that a team has had three players finish with 100 yards receiving in the same game.

PATRIOTS ARE THIRD TEAM IN NFL HISTORY WITH THREE PLAYERS WITH 120-PLUS RECEIVING YARDS AND ONE OR MORE TOUCHDOWNS IN THE SAME GAME

The Patriots had three receivers with 120 or more receiving yards and a touchdown, as Rob Gronkowski (9-143-1), Aaron Dobson (5-130-2) and Danny Amendola (4-122-1) did so vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 3, 2013. It is the third time in NFL history that a team has had three receivers top the 120 yard mark and score a touchdown in a game. The Dallas Cowboys achieved the feat earlier this season in their 51-48 loss to the Denver Broncos on Oct. 6, 2013. In that game, the Cowboys' Terrence Williams (4-151-1), Dez Bryant (6-141-2) and Jason Witten (7-121-1) all had 120 or more yards and a touchdown. The only other time in NFL history that a team had such an accomplishment was the Houston Oilers on Nov. 19, 1961 against the New York Titans. In that game, the Oilers' Bill Groman (5-152-3), Charley Hennigan (8-123-1) and Billy Cannon (7-122-3) had 120 or more yards to go along with a touchdown as the Oilers beat New York 49-13.

PATRIOTS 55 POINTS AND 610 TOTAL YARDS ARE THE MOST EVER AGAINST <u>PITTSBURGH</u>

The 55 points and the 610 total yards by the Patriots vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 3, 2013 are the most ever against the Steelers in their 81-year history. Pittsburgh gave up 54 points in a 1985 loss at San Diego and 559 yards in 1988 at Cincinnati.

FIVE OF THE SEVEN MEMBER 2013 DRAFT CLASS STARTED AT LEAST ONE GAME

Third-round draft pick DB Duron Harmon started at safety in place of the injured Steve Gregory at Carolina on Nov. 18. He joined LB Jamie Collins (second round), WR Aaron Dobson (second round), CB Logan Ryan (third round) and WR Josh Boyce (fourth round) as the fifth member of the seven-man draft class to earn a starting assignment.

PATRIOTS DID NOT COMMIT A PENALTY AT CINCINNATI AND AT HOUSTON

The Patriots played a penalty free game against Cincinnati on Oct. 6 and at Houston on Dec. 1. It is the fourth and fifth time in team history that the team did not commit a penalty in a game and the first time that the Patriots have done so twice in the same season.

PATRIOTS COMPLETE BIGGEST COMEBACK IN TEAM HISTORY

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos 34-31 in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest comeback win in team history. The Patriots trailed the Broncos 24-0 at halftime. New England's previous best comeback win was from 23 points down on Sept. 16, 1984, when the Patriots came back from a 23-0 deficit to win 38-23 vs. Seattle on Sept. 16, 1984. The Patriots came from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22, on Dec, 21, 1996. The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently on Jan. 1, 2012 against Buffalo.

TOM BRADY IS HOT WHEN IT IS COLD

Tom Brady is now 26-5 as a starting QB when the game-time temperature is 32 degrees or lower, throwing 53 touchdowns and just 22 interceptions. The patriots had two games in 2013 with temperatures 30 degrees or colder. It was 22 degrees at kickoff in the win vs. Denver on Nov. 24 and 30 degrees in the win vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8.

COLDEST REGULAR SEASON HOME GAME IN **GILLETTE STADIUM HISTORY**

The temperature at kickoff was 22 degrees, making the Broncos game on Nov. 24, 2013 the coldest regular season home game in Gillette Stadium history. It is the coldest Patriots home game since Dec. 26, 1993 vs. Indianapolis at Foxboro Stadium when the temperature was 19 degrees. The Patriots won that game 38-0. The coldest game ever at Gillette Stadium was the 2003 AFC Divisional Playoff game vs. Tennessee, when the Patriots beat the Titans 17-14 in temperature of 4 degrees with a wind chill of -10.

COLDEST NOVEMBER GAME IN TEAM HISTORY

The game against Denver on Nov. 24, 2013 was the coldest November game in team history at 22 degrees. The previous coldest was Nov. 22, 1987 vs. Indianapolis in 26 degrees in Sullivan Stadium. The Patriots won that game, 24-0.

PATRIOTS HOLD BRONCOS PASS OFFENSE TO 132 YARDS

The Patriots held the Broncos' pass offense to 132 net yards, despite Denver coming into the game averaging an NFL-best 350.4 passing yards per game on Nov. 24, 2013. New England's passing attack totaled 324 net yards, ahead of its average of 237.1 net passing yards heading into the game.

TOP 10 OFFENSE IN 2013

The Patriots offense finished seventh in the NFL with 384.5 yards per game in 2013. The Patriots offense has finished in the top 10 for seven straight seasons. Since the 1970 merger, the Patriots offense has finished in the top 10 a total of 17 times, including eight times under Bill Belichick.

BELICHICK IS GOOD IN DECEMBER

BLOUNT SETS TEAM SINGLE-GAME ALL-PURPOSE YARDS RECORD

LeGarrette Blount set a new Patriots single-game record with 334 all-purpose yards, gaining 189 yards from scrimmage and adding 145 return yards vs. Buffalo on Dec. 29, 2013 Blount's performance topped the 51-year-old team record set by Larry Garron on Nov. 3, 1962, when Garron had 273 all-purpose yards at Buffalo. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL - covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender - he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

EDELMAN TAKES HIS FATHER'S ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011. This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the Seventh Round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman, who has already passed his career highs in receiving yards and receptions this season, remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told the *Boston Herald.* "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

EDELMAN BREAKS 1,000-YARD RECEIVING MARK IN 2013

Edelman finished the 2013 season with 1,056 receiving yards to become the 10th Patriots player to register a 1,000-yard season. **1,000-Yard Receiving Seasons in Patriots History**

RIDLEY REACHES 12 TDS IN 2012

WILL SVITEK TAKES A HIKE TO REMEMBER

Will Svitek was born in Prague, Czechoslovakia. When he was 2, his parents took him and his three brothers out of the communist country. They left in secret with no money and only the clothes on their backs. Saying they were on a day hike, they walked 14 hours through the mountains and ended up in Austria. The family spent eight months in a refugee camp until being legalized to come to the United States. "My parents were hard-working immigrants who came here to achieve the American Dream and help their sons reach their full potential," said Svitek. "I think they instilled it in me to do everything well. I am a competitive person on the field and in the classroom and I don't think you can just turn that switch off."

JUDGE KEEPS AUTOGRAPHED PICTURE OF KENBRELL THOMPKINS ON HIS DESK

Florida judge Dennis Murphy will never forget Kenbrell Thompkins. This is especially true now, as Murphy keeps an autographed picture of Thompkins on his desk from the rookie's playing days at El Camino Community College. The picture was a gift from Thompkins, who has Murphy to thank for granting him special probation conditions after a drug charge in 2007 that allowed Thompkins to leave his crime-riddled neighborhood in Miami, Fla. and attend El Camino. "I'm a firm believer in giving youth a chance to try and turn it around," Murphy told *The Boston Globe.* After being arrested seven times between the ages of 15 and 18, Thompkins excelled at El Camino and went on to play at the University of Cincinnati en route to fulfilling his NFL dream. Thompkins earned his degree from Cincinnati in criminal justice.

<u>RB SHANE VEREEN</u>

RB SHANE VEREEN SETS TEAM RECORD FOR RECEPTIONS AND RECEIVING YARDS BY A RUNNING BACK

Shane Vereen had 12 receptions for 153 yards vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8, 2013, setting a single-game franchise records for most receptions and most receiving yards by a running back. Vereen's 153 receiving yards topped the 53-year-old franchise running back record of 124 receiving yards, achieved by Dick Christy against the Oakland Raiders on Nov. 4, 1960. Vereen's 12 receptions topped the previous Patriots running back record of 11 receptions, achieved three times, most recently by Kevin Faulk on Sept. 3, 2000 against Tampa Bay.

WHAT IS IN A NUMBER

When Arrington was first making the transition from Hofstra to the NFL in 2008, he was assigned jersey No. 42. At that point in his career, he was cut by both the Eagles and Buccaneers.

When Arrington first arrived in New England as a practice squad player in 2009, he initially donned No. 27. But when No. 24 became available, a result of Jonathan Wilhite leaving in free agency after the 2010 season, Arrington pounced on it.

The reason is that it reflects how he's flipped his NFL fortunes -- from a No. 42 struggling to hang on to a No. 24 who has carved out a role on a winning team.

Arrington moved from 24 to 25 in an agreement with Adrian Wilson this past season to accommodate the veteran's desire to keep the same jersey he has worn during his 12-year NFL career.

<u>LB JAMIE COLLINS</u>

JAMIE COLLINS' JOURNEY

The road to the NFL has been anything but easy for rookie linebacker and 2013 second-round draft pick Jamie Collins. The youngest of five siblings growing up in Meadville, Miss., Collins lost both of his parents when he was six years old and was raised by one of his sisters, who was in her mid 20s. Collins turned to football as an outlet to help him through the tough times. "It means a lot. It's my living," Collins told the Boston Herald. "It kept me on track." Collins' resiliency in dealing with adversity has made a lasting impact on fellow Mississippi native Stevan Ridley, who grew up 30 miles west of Meadville in Natchez, Miss., and got to know Collins through a family friend. "What I've known about him, he really has been a strong person," Ridley told the Herald, "Anybody that's gone through the thing that he's gone through and still find a way to be successful on the football field, you have to be mentally tough. That's what he's kind of done as a teammate here. He's come in here and accepted his role and done a pretty good job as a rookie."

<u>S STEVE GREGORY</u>

STEVE GREGORY WAS ABOUT TO ENTER THE POLICE ACADEMY WHEN SAN DIEGO CALLED

Steve Gregory's father and stepmother are New York City police officers and both were on duty during the events of September 11, 2001. Following his college career at Syracuse, Gregory took the test to enter the police academy. He found out he passed the test on the same day that the San Diego Chargers called him to offer him a rookie free agent contract.

GREGORY SET CAREER HIGH THREE INTERCEPTIONS IN 2012

Steve Gregory set a single-season career-high when he intercepted Miami QB Ryan Tannehill in the first quarter for his third on the season in the season-finale on Dec. 30, 2012. The pick helped set up a 9-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Wes Welker. Gregory's previous single-season high was two interceptions in 2010 when he played for San Diego.

GREGORY'S TEAMMATES MENTION HIS HIGH FOOTBALL IQ

Many of Steve Gregory's teammates have commented on his football smarts. Team Captain Devin McCourty recently told the *Boston Globe* – "When we're preparing for games, he's not only able to watch film and see things coming, but he's able to go to the coaches and say, 'Why don't we tweak this defense this way, because it better fits what they do?' When we're in meetings we'll have something in the defense and we're watching [film] and Steve will say, 'Why don't we do this?' We'll all sit there and look at him and be like, 'You're right, that probably would be better.' I think that's what makes him so good. Steve always has something each week we play that he sees and things we can do. That's why we call him a future head coach."

😻 LB DONT'A HIGHTOWER

DONT'A HIGHTOWER WEARS TEDY BRUSCHI'S JERSEY #54

As a first round draft pick, Dont'a Hightower is used to high expectations. Hightower went to training camp with jersey #45 but was switched to jersey #54 prior to the start of the regular season. Former LB Tedy Bruschi wore #54 for 13 seasons. Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

DE CHANDLER JONES

2012 FIRST ROUND PICK CHANDLER JONES FOLLOWS IN BROTHERS' FOOTSTEPS

Chandler Jones has two brothers, Arthur, a fifth-round NFL Draft selection by the Baltimore Ravens in 2010, who was a Syracuse defensive tackle, and Jon "Bones" Jones, a UFC fighter and the reigning Lightweight Champion.

JONES IS PILING UP SACKS

Jones had three two-sack games in 2013 with two vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 3 and two in both 2013 meetings against the New York Jets. He finished the 2013 season with 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ sacks on the year. The Patriots have now had a player finish with 10 or more sacks in a season 15 times in team history.

JONES IS FIRST PATRIOT TO START HIS CAREER WITH TWO 6-PLUS SACK SEASONS SINCE CHRIS SLADE

JONES HAS FORCED THREE FUMBLES ON SACKS

Jones had three forced fumbles in 2012. Jones forced a fumble on a sack at Tennessee (9/9/12), vs. Arizona (9/16/12) and at Seattle (10/14/12).

JONES NAMED AFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH FOR NOVEMBER

Jones was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for November by the National Football League. It is the first time in his career that he has received the honor. Jones registered 16 total tackles and four sacks in the team's three November games to push his season total to 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ sacks. The Patriots have now had a player finish with 10 or more sacks in a season 15 times. Jones has 17 $\frac{1}{2}$ sacks (6 in 2012 and 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ in 2013) in his first two NFL seasons, which ranks third in team history for most sacks in a player's first two seasons. Garin Veris had 21 and Chris Slade had 18 $\frac{1}{2}$. Jones is the first Patriots player to earn an AFC Defensive Player of the Month honor since S Eugene Wilson was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for September in 2004.

DT CHRIS JONES

THIRD TEAM IS A CHARM FOR CHRIS JONES

Chris Jones had an early introduction to failure in the NFL. Taken behind 37 other defensive linemen in the 2013 NFL Draft, the rookie defensive tackle was cut by two teams over a span of just 11 days. After selecting him in the 6^{TH} round with the 198^{th} overall pick, the Houston Texans cut Jones on Aug. 31. Jones signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sept. 1 but lasted only ten days, as the Buccaneers released him on September 10. Rather than be deterred by these early disappointments, however, Jones maintained a positive outlook when he signed with the Patriots on Sept. 11, and it has paid off in a big way. Thrust into a starting role after key injuries to the defensive line, Jones finished his rookie season with six sacks. Jones' sudden success may come as a surprise to some, but not to Dave Clawson, Jones' college coach at Bowling Green. Jones was part of Clawson's first recruiting class and blossomed into an All-American and two-two time captain for the Falcons. "It's hard to talk about Chris without getting a little bit emotional," Clawson told the Boston Herald, "because he was that special of a player and person in our program."

DB DEVIN MCCOURTY

DOUBLE TROUBLE: CB DEVIN MCCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of three active sets of twins playing in the NFL.

MCCOURTY REGISTERS SECOND CAREER TWO-INTERCEPTION GAME AT BUFFALO IN 2012

Devin McCourty had his second career two-interception game in the win at Buffalo on Sept. 30, 2012. He had his first interception of the 2012 season when he picked off a Ryan Fitzpatrick pass at the Buffalo 42-yard line in the first quarter. He picked off his second pass in the fourth quarter. It is McCourty's second career two-interception game. He had his first two-interception game at Detroit on Nov. 25, 2010. The Patriots are 9-0 when McCourty has at least one interception in a game.

MCCOURTY HAD A 104-YARD KICKOFF RETURN FOR A TOUCHDOWN; SECOND LONGEST IN TEAM HISTORY

Devin McCourty had a 104-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the first quarter vs. the Jets (10/21/12), the second longest kickoff return in team history. Ellis Hobbs has the longest in team history with a 108-yard return for a touchdown at the New York Jets on Sept. 9, 2007. McCourty was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance.

Devin McCourty picked off Colin Kaepernick in the end zone in the third quarter vs. San Francisco (12/16/12). It was his third pick in the end zone in 2012. McCourty picked off Matt Schaub vs. Houston on Dec. 10, 2012 in the first quarter. McCourty picked off Ryan Fitzpatrick in the end zone in the fourth quarter vs. Buffalo on Nov. 11, 2012. It was the fourth time in 2012 that the Patriots intercepted a pass in the end zone. Rookie Tavon Wilson had an interception in the end zone at Tennessee on Sept. 9 in the second quarter.

MCCOURTY JOINS PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAMERS ROD WOODSON AND RONNIE LOTT AS ALL-PROS AT CORNER AND SAFETY

Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety for his performance in 2013. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joins Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

NINKOVICH LEADS NFL OVER LAST FOUR SEASONS WITH 11 FUMBLE RECOVERIES

Ninkovich has more opponent fumble recoveries (11) over the last four seasons (2010-2013) than any other NFL player. Chicago's Brian Urlacher (retired) and Vince Wilfork are second during that time with seven opponent fumble recoveries.



NINKOVICH: WHERE DID HE COME FROM?

Rob Ninkovich's journey to the Patriots was not easy. He entered the league as a fifth-round pick by the Saints in 2006 and was waived four times by New Orleans and Miami before landing in New England on Aug. 2, 2009. He spent the 2009 offseason trying to make the New Orleans team as a long snapper. Before coming to the Patriots, he had appeared in just eight games over three seasons. He doubled that total in his first year in New England, appearing in 15 games in 2009 and his role on the team has grown since, earning a starting role at linebacker in 2010 and 2011 before moving to a starting role on the defensive line in 2011.

NINKOVICH TIED CAREER-HIGH IN SACKS IN 2013

Ninkovich tied a career-high with 8.0 sacks in 2013. He also had 8.0 sacks in 2012. Ninkovich is the first Patriots player with back-to-back seasons with at least eight sacks since Willie McGinest in 1995 (11) and 1996 (9.5). He is the only player to accomplish the feat during Belichick's tenure as head coach in New England.

NINKOVICH SCORED AS A TE IN COLLEGE

Ninkovich played some at tight end in college at Purdue and caught two touchdown passes with a 2-yard touchdown pass from Dallas QB Kyle Orton and a 1-yard touchdown pass from New York Giants QB Curtis Painter.



DB LOGAN RYAN AND DB DURON HARMON

RUTGERS CLASSMATES LOGAN RYAN AND DURON HARMON REUNITE IN NEW ENGLAND

Rookie defensive backs Logan Ryan and Duron Harmon are used to learning a new system together. Four years ago, Ryan and Harmon began their college football careers together as members of the same recruiting class at Rutgers University and developed a close friendship during their four years in Piscataway, N.J. As fate would have it, Ryan and Harmon would begin their NFL journeys together as well when the Patriots selected the two defensive backs just eight picks apart in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft. Reunited once again, the former Scarlet Knights are excited and eager to make their mark, just as they did four years ago at Rutgers. "We talked before the draft and said how good it would be to play on the same team again, and for it to happen again, it's exciting and it's a blessing," Harmon told the Boston Globe. "It's great [we're contributing], because at the end of the day you want to play, and to contribute to a team like this, it's fun.'

RYAN RETURNS FIRST PICK FOR A TOUCHDOWN

Ryan returned his first NFL interception 79 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter at the New York Jets on Oct. 20, 2013. The last Patriots player to return their first career interception for a touchdown was Kyle Arrington in 2010 against the Green Bay Packers, when he took back a Matt Flynn pass 36 yards for a touchdown. The last rookie Patriots player to return their first career interception for a touchdown was James Sanders in 2005:

RYAN'S FIRST NFL SACK RESULTS IN A FORCED FUMBLE

Ryan forced a fumble on his first NFL sack vs. Miami on Oct. 27, a week after returning his first career interception for a touchdown. Ryan strip-sacked Ryan Tannehill, forcing a fumble on a 10-yard sack that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich to give the Patriots possession at the Dolphins' 13-yard line in the third quarter. The play set up a 3-play, 13-yard drive that ended in Brandon Bolden's 2-yard touchdown run that tied the game at 17 in the third quarter. The play marked the second time in as many weeks that a Ryan turnover has led to Patriots points. The previous week against the New York Jets, Ryan scored on a 79-yard interception return for a touchdown.

LOGAN RYAN TIES FOR AFC LEAD IN INTERCEPTIONS AND IS FIRST AMONG ROOKIES IN 2013

Logan Ryan led all rookies in interceptions this year and finished tied with Cleveland's Tashaun Gipson and Tennessee's Alterraun Verner for the AFC lead, marking the fourth straight year a Patriots rookie has been in the top two among all NFL rookies in interceptions. Tavon Wilson (4) was second in 2012, Sterling Moore (2) was second in 2011 and Devin McCourty (7) made the Pro Bowl after leading all rookies in 2010. In 2009, Darius Butler finished one shy of second place with three interceptions. This is also the second straight year the Patriots have finished first in team interceptions by rookies, after tying with Green Bay in 2012 with 7 (Tavon Wilson, 4 and Alfonzo Dennard, 3) and leading this year with 7 (Logan Ryan, 5 and Duron Harmon, 2).

Harrison in a recent interview with the Boston Herald: "You can see how much he loves it, how he enjoys being physical. He's an intimidator. He's got that fight in him. He's going to hit you and you're going to feel it."

SPIKES GOES OVER 100 TACKLES FOR SECOND STRAIGHT SEASON

Spikes had 10 or more tackles in six games and finished with a then career-high 128 tackles in 2012. He has five 10-tackle games in 2013 and went over 100 tackles for the second straight season with 134 total tackles

SPIKES SETS CAREER HIGH WITH 22 TACKLES

Spikes set a career-high with 22 total tackles at Cincinnati on Oct. 6, 2013. His previous best was 16 tackles at the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. It is the highest tackle total for a Patriots player since Jerod Mayo had 23 total tackles vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 13, 2008.

Gostkowski drilled a 51-yard field goal in the third quarter and a 53-yarder in the fourth quarter vs. Arizona on Sept. 16, 2012 and then connected on two 53-yard field goals at Houston on Dec. 1, 2013. He is the first Patriots player to have two 50-yard field goals in the same game.

PATRIOTS HAVE THE MOST RUSHING TOUCHDOWNS IN THE NFL SINCE 2003

The Patriots rushed for 25 touchdowns as a team in 2012, the highest total in the NFL and the second-highest single-season total in franchise history behind the 1978 Patriots (30 touchdowns). Yet last year's success in the run game was no aberration. As of the end of the 2013 regular season, the Patriots have more regular season rushing touchdowns than any other NFL team over the last 10 years. Since 2003, the Patriots are one of only two teams (San Diego Chargers) to average more than one rushing touchdown per game, with 198 scores in 176 games. The ground game kept up its torrid pace this season, finishing first in the AFC with 19 rushing touchdowns in 16 games.

Four members of the New England Patriots have been selected to the 2014 NFL Pro Bowl. Quarterback Tom Brady, G Logan Mankins, WR Matthew Slater (special teams) and CB Aqib Talib have been selected to represent the New England Patriots in the 2014 NFL Pro Bowl on Jan. 26, 2014 at Aloha Stadium in Hawaii.



Brady was named to the Pro Bowl for the ninth time, tying John Hannah (9) for the most Pro **PROBOWL** Bowls in Patriots history. It is his fifth consecutive selection to the Pro Bowl. He was voted to the Pro Bowl after each of the following seasons: 2001, 2004, 2005, 2007, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2013. Brady finished the 2013 season with 4,343 passing yards, marking his third straight 4,000-yard season and his sixth 4,000 yard season of his career. He joins Dan Marino (6), Brett Favre (6), Drew Brees (8) and Peyton Manning (13) as the only NFL players to have at least six seasons with 4,000 passing yards. Brady also guided the Patriots to their 11th division title in 2013, the most division titles among any NFL quarterback.

Mankins was voted to his fifth consecutive Pro Bowl, as well, and his sixth overall. He went to his first Pro Bowl in 2007 when he became the first Patriots guard to earn a Pro Bowl selection since 1985 when Pro Football Hall of Famer John Hannah went to his ninth career Pro Bowl. The Fresno State product is in his ninth season with the Patriots since being selected in the first round (32nd overall) of the 2005 NFL Draft. Since entering the starting lineup in 2005, Mankins has helped New England finish in the top 10 on offense eight times, including a 7th ranked offense in 2013.

Slater earned his third consecutive Pro Bowl selection. A productive member of the Patriots special teams units since joining the squad as a fifth-round draft pick out of UCLA in 2008, Slater has become a leader after being voted special teams captain each of the last three years. He led the Patriots in special teams tackles for the past three seasons with 21 in 2010, 17 in 2011 and 20 in 2012. He finished the 2013 season ranked second on the team with 14 special teams tackles, despite missing four games due to injury.

Talib earned his first Pro Bowl selection this year. Talib forced three turnovers, including a pair of fourth-quarter interceptions, to help seal the Patriots 13-10 win over the AFC East rival New York Jets on Sept. 12. He defended a pass in the end zone on a fourth-down attempt in the final minute to secure the Patriots 30-23 win at Atlanta on Sept. 29. Talib also played a major role in holding New Orleans TE Jimmy Graham without a catch in the Patriots 30-27 win on Oct. 13. Graham entered that game averaging 118.6 receiving yards per game.

Ridley led the Patriots in rushing for the second consecutive season, finishing the year with 773 yards and 7 touchdowns on 178 attempts ... Rushed for two touchdowns in a Week 6 win over the Saints and a season-high 115 yards and two scores in a Week 9 win over the Steelers.

This is Ridley's third career Conference Championship game

RB LeGarrette Blount (Tr-'13)

Blount led the team with 166 yards rushing and a franchise-record four touchdowns in the team's 43-22 Divisional Round victory over the Colts ... Blount finished the season 772 yards and a career-high 7 touchdowns on 153 carries ... Set a franchise record against the Bills in Week 17 with 334 all-purpose yards on 145 return yards and a career-high 189 rushing yards ... Added two touchdown runs to tie him with Stevan Ridley and Benjarvus Green-Ellis for 5th in the AFC in rushing touchdowns with seven ... Had a 47-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter of a Week 4 win over the Falcons, the longest touchdown run by the Patriots since LaMont Jordan's 49-yard score at Oakland on Dec. 14, 2008. *This is Blount's first career Conference Championship game*

RB Shane Vereen (D2b, '11)

Vereen finished third on the team with 47 receptions for 427 yards and 3 touchdowns ... Also added 208 yards and one touchdown on 44 rushing attempts, giving him a career-high 635 all-purpose yards on the season ... Set single-game franchise records for the most receptions and receiving yards by a running back in Week 14 with 12 catches for 153 yards in a win over the Browns, becoming just the fourth running back to have 150 yards receiving in a game in the past 10 years.

This is Vereen's third career Conference Championship game

DE Chandler Jones (D1a, '12)

Jones finished the regular season with 11.5 sacks, tying him with Olivier Vernon for 3rd most in the AFC ... Has 171/2 sacks in his first two seasons, the thirdhighest total in team history behind Garin Veris (21) and Chris Slade (181/2) \ldots Was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month in November, becoming the first Patriot to earn the honor since S Eugene Wilson in September of 2004 ... Recorded 16 tackles and 4 sacks in three November contests to earn the award. Ended the regular season with a career-high 82 tackles, including 58 solo stops. This is Jones' second career Conference Championship game

DT Chris Jones (FA-'13)

Jones appeared in 13 games during his rookie campaign and started the final 11 games of the regular season at defensive tackle ... Recorded 6.0 sacks in 13 games, finishing second in the NFL among rookies behind Lions DE Ezekiel Ansah (8) ... Had a career-high 10 tackles in a Week 12 win over the Broncos, the first double-digit tackle effort of his career ... Sacked Dolphins QB Ryan Tannehill for a loss of seven yards in Week 8 and later added a half-sack, the third time this season he had recorded multiple sacks. Jones also had multiple-sack games against the Jets in Week 7 and the Bengals in Week 5.

DT Joe Vellano (UFA-'13)

Vellano appeared in all 16 games this regular season and made eight starts, seven at defensive tackle and one at left defensive end ... Recorded his second sack of the season in Week 15 when he dropped Dolphins QB Ryan Tannehill for a five-yard loss in the second quarter ... His first career sack came in a Week 4 win over the Falcons when he dropped Matt Ryan for a 13-yard loss in the 3rd quarter ... Recovered his first career fumble in Week 9 against the Steelers on a Rob Ninkovich strip sack of Ben Roethlisberger in the first quarter ... Both Vellano and his father, Paul, were All-Americans at Maryland, becoming just the fourth father-son combination to win All-American honors at the same school. The other three are Archie and Eli Manning (Mississippi), Kevin and Drew Butler (Georgia), and Lee and Travis McGriff (Florida).

DL Rob Ninkovich (FA-'09)

Ninkovich led all Patriots defensive linemen with 93 tackles (65 solo) in 16 games played during the regular season ... Finished second on the team behind Chandler Jones with 8.0 sacks, tying his career high set in 2012 Led the team in Week 11 with two sacks of Cam Newton for seven yards, giving him at least one sack in three consecutive games ... Forced his second fumble of the season in Week 9 against the Steelers on a strip sack of QB Ben Roethlisberger on Pittsburgh's opening drive ... Recovered his second fumble of the season in Week 8 when he scooped up a Logan Ryan strip sack on the Patriot 13-yard line ... Has recovered 11 fumbles over the last four seasons, more than any other player in the NFL.

LB Dane Fletcher (FA-'10)

Fletcher appeared in all but one game during the regular season after missing all of the 2012 season with a knee injury ... Finished the year with 19 tackles (14 solo), two sacks and a forced fumble ... Led the team with 15 special teams tackles in 15 games ... Stepped in for Jerod Mayo at linebacker in a Week 6 win over New Orleans after Mayo left the game with an injury Recorded a career-high three special teams tackles in that contest ... Subbed in at linebacker against the Broncos in Week 12 and recorded a season-high nine tackles (seven solo), including a forced fumble in the third quarter that led to a Patriots touchdown.

This is Fletcher's second career Conference Championship game

LB Dont'a Hightower (D1b,'12)

Hightower became the first player other than Jerod Mayo to lead the team in tackles since 2007, recording a career-high 137 stops (85 solo) in 16 games played ... Hightower and Brandon Spikes each had over 100 tackles, the sixth time in the Belichick era that the Patriots have had two players with more than 100 tackles ... Led the team with 14 tackles, 10 of them solo, in a Week 14 win over the Browns, marking the fourth time this season Hightower had recorded double-digit tackles in a game and only the second time in his career that he had 10 or more solo stops ... His other 10-solo-tackle effort came against the Jets in Week 7, when he led the team with a career-high 16 total tackles (10 solo).

This is Hightower's second career Conference Championship game

CB Agib Talib (Tr-'12)

Talib led the team with 13 passes defensed in the regular season despite missing three games in the middle of the season due to injury ... Finished second on the team behind CB Logan Ryan with four interceptions ... Limited Broncos WR Demaryius Thomas to a season-low 41 vards in a Week 12 win over the Broncos ... Held Saints TE Jimmy Graham to zero catches in a Week 6 win over the Saints before leaving the game with an injury in the second half. Graham was averaging 118.6 yards per game entering the contest ... Tied a career high with four passes defensed in a Week 4 win over the Falcons, including a game-saving pass breakup on Roddy White in the end zone on Atlanta's final drive.

DB Devin McCourty (D1,'10)

McCourty ended the regular season with 75 tackles (59 solo) in 15 games played at safety ... Forced a key fourth-quarter fumble against the Bengals in Week 5 when he stripped Giovanni Bernard at the NE 49-yard line. It was his second straight game with a forced fumble in the fourth guarter after he stripped Julio Jones in a Week 4 win over the Falcons ... Had back-to-back weeks with ten or more tackles when he made 12 stops (10 solo) against the Falcons in Week 4 and 11 tackles (9 solo) against the Bengals in Week 5.

This is McCourty's third career Conference Championship game

S Steve Gregory (UFA-SD, '12)

Gregory led all Patriots defensive backs with 90 tackles (68 solo) in 14 games played this season ... Recorded double-digit tackles in a game for the first time in a Patriots uniform in Week 15, tallying a season-high 10 tackles, 8 of them solo, against the Dolphins ... Notched his third career sack in Week 17 against the Bills when he dropped QB Thad Lewis for no gain in the third quarter.

This is Gregory's third career Conference Championship game

CB Kyle Arrington (UFA, '09)

Arrington tallied 60 tackles (45 solo) in 16 games played this season and was second on the team behind Agib Talib (13) with 11 passes defensed ... Recorded his second sack in as many games in Week 16 with a seven-yard drop of Joe Flacco in the second quarter ... Recovered Stephen Gostkowski's onside kick on Cleveland's 40-yard line with one minute remaining in Week 14 to set up the offense's game-winning drive ... Forced two fumbles in the Patriots' seasonopening win over Buffalo, a career-high.

This is Arrington's third career Conference Championship game

CB Alfonzo Dennard (D7a, '12)

Dennard recorded 42 tackles (34 solo) and eight passes defensed in 13 games played this season ... Had a career-high nine tackles against the Dolphins in Week 8 ... Made a pair of key pass deflections against the Saints in Week 6, including a breakup on third-and-seven in the fourth guarter to hold the Saints to a field goal ... Recorded his first interception of 2013 in a Week 2 win over the Jets when he picked off a Geno Smith pass late in the fourth quarter.

THE TEAM OF THE DECADE

When Robert Kraft purchased the New England Patriots in 1994, few would have thought that 17 years later the franchise would be the undisputed team of the decade in the first decade of the new millennium. Kraft brought a winning vision to the organization and dedicated his resources to building a consistent winner. On Jan. 27, 2000, Kraft hired Bill Belichick to coach the team, and three months later the team drafted then-unheralded quarterback Tom Brady, putting the final pieces in place for the Patriots to become the most successful NFL team of the 2000s. Below is a look at the accomplishments of the Patriots during the first decade of the new millennium that earned the Patriots the "Team of the Decade" moniker.
