THIS WEEK'S GAME

The Cardinals travel to New England this week looking to improve to 2-0 on the season and snap a five game winless streak against the Patriots. The Cardinals bring with them an 8-2 record over the last 10 games, a record that trails only New England's 9-1 mark over the same period.

Last week the Cards won their third-straight season opener by downing the division rival Seahawks 20-16 at University of Phoenix Stadium. In front of the stadium's 66th consecutive sellout crowd, the Cards earned their sixth straight home win, which trails only Baltimore (11) among active streaks. After taking a 13-3 lead early in the third quarter, miscues on offense and special teams led to the Seahawks coming back and taking a 16-13 lead with under 10 minutes remaining. On the ensuing drive, Cards starting QB John Skelton suffered an ankle injury while completing a pass to WR Andre Roberts and was forced from the game. Backup Kevin Kolb entered and completed 6 of 8 pass attempts for 66 yards on Arizona's game-winning drive, including a six-yard TD pass to Roberts that gave Arizona a 20-16 lead. An 18-play drive by the Seahawks on the next possession was halted by the Cards defense after Seattle reached the AZ red zone. Seattle ran six plays inside the AZ 15-yard line but was held scoreless.

New England returns home with a 1-0 record following a 34-13 victory over Tennessee. QB Tom Brady threw for two TDs while RB Stevan Ridley totaled 125 yards and a TD on the ground. Meanwhile, the Pats defense held Titans All-Pro RB Chris Johnson to just four yards on 11 carries.

Arizona returns home to face Philadelphia next week while the Patriots travel to Baltimore.

SERIES NOTES

LAST WEEK'S GAME

CARDINALS 20, Seahawks 16 September 9, 2012 – University of Phoenix Stadium (60,032)

The Cardinals earned a hard-fought week 1 victory by relying on a stout defense and resilient offense. Despite taking over in some tough spots following turnovers and long kick returns, the AZ defense was strong and allowed just one TD in 70 plays. It helped keep the game close, especially as the offense struggled to find its rhythm in the 2nd half. However, that offense produced when it needed to most and under some very adverse conditions. Starter John Skelton, who had won the job in preseason, was knocked down the game with an ankle injury with just over 8 minutes to play. In came Kevin Kolb with the Cards down 3. He proved more than capable and led the go-ahead TD drive. After that, the Cards defense had to turn away one last Seattle threat in a furious and controversial finish.

Seattle's game-opening drive ended when Steven Hauschka's 50-yard FG try was blocked by Calais Campbell, the 6th of his career. However 2 plays later RB Ryan Williams fumbled it back to SEA at the AZ42, setting up a 27-yard FG. The Cards answered with a 13-play, 75-yard drive that reached the 3 & tied it with a 21-yard Jay Feely FG. WR Andre Roberts keyed the effort with a 15-yard reverse and 2-26 receiving. AZ took the lead on its next drive when LaRod Stephens-Howling scored from a yard out to make it 10-3.

The Cards took advantage of a Paris Lenon fumble recovery and went up 10 early in the 3rd thanks to a 31-yard Feely FG. That lead would soon disappear as Seattle scored 13 straight. Leon Washington's 83-yard KOR set-up a 10-yard Russell Wilson TD pass to Sidney Rice. On the next play from scrimmage Skelton tried to throw it away but was INT'd on the sideline at the AZ34 by CB Richard Sherman. The Cards D forced Seattle to settle for a 47-yard game-tying FG. After a 3-n-out by AZ, Washington returned the ensuing punt 52 yards to the AZ16. Despite being handed another short field, the defense again answered and Seattle had to settle for a 39-yard FG after netting minus-5 yards in 3 plays. Trailing 16-13, a Skelton-to-Roberts pass gave AZ its first 1st down of the 2nd half with 8:18 to play. However, Skelton injured his ankle on the play and Kolb entered. Despite no reps during the week & little warm-up he crisply operated the hurry-up offense and moved the Cards to the SEA6. On 2nd-n-goal from there, he hit Roberts for the go-ahead TD. On the drive he was 6-8 passing for 66 yards and a TD. The Cards defense would then have to answer one more time. Seattle took over at its own 20 with 4:58 to play and 2 timeouts. With :52 to play they had advanced to the AZ13. From there the Seahawks would run 13 more plays and be given an extra timeout due to an officiating error amidst great confusion. However, they would not find the end zone and when Wilson's 4th-n-goal pass from the 4 fell incomplete, Arizona emerged with the victory.

CARDINALS & PATRIOTS – THE LAST TIME

Game 15 Patriots 47, CARDINALS 7 December 21, 2008 – Gillette Stadium (68,756)

The Cardinals headed to Foxboro for the final road game of the regular season and a showdown with the Patriots. Like Arizona, the Pats entered the game at 9-5. However unlike the Cardinals, who clinched the NFC west two weeks earlier and were pretty much locked into their playoff spot, New England was in a three-way tie atop the AFC East and fighting for its postseason life. In addition to the must-win Patriots, Arizona also had to contend with Mother Nature. A winter storm socked much of the east coast and the game was played amid a steady snowfall. The Cardinals had not played a game in snow in over 25 years (12/18/83 vs. Philadelphia at St. Louis) and it was clear New England was far more comfortable in the environment. The Arizona offense entered the game #2 in the NFL with a 26.6 points/game average but was limited to a season-low 7 points. The Patriots offense was more successful and rolled up 514 total yards. It all added up to a very one-sided contest.

Of its six first half possessions, New England scored four touchdowns and a field goal. Conversely on its six drives, Arizona went 3-n-out 5 times and turned it over on downs once. Those two factors resulted in a 31-0 New England halftime lead. LaMont Jordan capped each of the first two Patriot drives with short TD runs. Early in the 2nd, a 15-yard Matt Cassel pass to Kevin Faulk made it 21-0 and an 11-yard Cassel pass to Wes Welker on the next series made it 28-0. Stephen Gostkowski's 38-yard FG in the closing seconds of the first half made it 31-0.

A bad situation for AZ got even worse on the first play from scrimmage after intermission. Cassel hit Randy Moss with a quick screen at the line of scrimmage and the receiver took it 76 yards down the left sideline for a TD that made it a 38-0 score :19 into the 2nd half. The Pats then added Gostkowski FGs on their next three drives. Kurt Warner was replaced at QB by Matt Leinart late in the 3rd quarter and he finished the game. It was Leinart's 78-yard TD pass to Larry Fitzgerald with 6:17 to play that kept the Cardinals from being shut out.

TWO OF THE BEST IN THE LAST 10

In 2011, the Cardinals posted a stunning turnaround after a 1-6 start, finishing the season as one of the NFL's hottest teams by winning seven of the final nine. Arizona's 7-2 record in that span tied for the league's second best total behind only Green Bay, New Orleans and New England (all 8-1).

Arizona continued that successful streak during the 2012 regular season opener last week vs. Seattle. The Cards 20-16 victory over the Seahawks improved the team's record to 8-2 over the last 10 games. Only this week's opponent, the Patriots (9-1), have a better record over the last 10 games.

HOME WIN STREAK HITS SIX

The Cardinals pushed their home win streak to six games with the victory over Seattle in last week's season opener. In winning the final five games of the 2011 season at University of Phoenix Stadium, the Cardinals won five straight home games in a single season for the first time since 1976.

Tack on the 20-16 victory over the Seahawks and the Cardinals current six-game home win streak is the team's longest overall home win streak since the team won seven straight between 2007-08. In this six-game streak, the Cardinals have:

- 5 fourth quarter comebacks
- 4 overtime wins
- 6 wins by six points or fewer
- 4-point average margin of victory
- 4 consecutive wins by four points or fewer
- 6 straight game holding opponent to 20 points or fewer

The Cardinals current six-game home win streak is tied with San Francisco for the second-longest active home win streak in the NFL during the regular season. Only Baltimore (11) has more consecutive wins at home than Arizona.

For head coach **Ken Whisenhunt**, last week's win marked the 30th home win (including postseason) of his career and he improved to 30-14 overall at University of Phoenix Stadium.

CARDINALS-PATRIOTS CONNECTIONS

Coaching Connections

From 1991-94, Cardinals Special Teams coach **Kevin Spencer** served as a coaching assistant for the Browns while Patriots Head Coach **Bill Belichick** served as head coach. Spencer played football and lacrosse at Springfield (MA) College from 1972-75.

Cardinals Strength and Conditioning coach **John Lott** (1997-2004) coached on the Jets staff with **Belichick** from 1997-99.

Former Patriots

Cardinals S **James Sanders** played for the Patriots from 2005-10. He appeared in 84 games (50 starts) with New England after being selected in the fourth round (133rd overall) in the 2005 NFL Draft, and he made a career-high 15 starts in 2007.

Cardinals G/C **Rich Ohrnberger** played for the Patriots from 2009-11. He was selected by New England in the fourth round (123rd overall) of the 2009 draft and played in five games over his first two years with the team before spending the 2011 season on injured reserve.

Cardinals Director, Player Personnel **Jason Licht** worked for the Patriots from 1999-02 and again from 2009-11. He was hired in 1999 as a college scout, elevated to national scout in '01, and then to assistant director of player personnel in '02. He returned to the Pats in '09 and spent three seasons as their director of pro personnel.

Cardinals Football Operations Coordinator **Matt Caracciolo** spent the past seven years working for the Patriots. He began as a football operations assistant in 2005 and then spent six years as the director of football operations.

Arizona Connections

Patriots TE **Rob Gronkowski** played college football at Arizona, and he set school records for receptions, receiving yards, and TD catches by a TE despite playing only two seasons. He missed his junior season after undergoing back surgery and then declared for the NFL Draft a year early.

In 1979, Patriots Assistant Head Coach/Offensive Line **Dante Scarnecchia** was the offensive line coach at Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff, where the Cardinals hold training camp.

Massachusetts Connections

Cardinals LS **Mike Leach** began his college career at Boston University before transferring to William & Mary when the school dropped its football program.

Pro Connections

Cardinals DE **Vonnie Holliday** (2009) and T **D'Anthony Batiste** (2010) all played for the Broncos with Patriots WR **Brandon Lloyd** (2009-11) and while Patriots Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks coach **Josh McDaniels** (2009-10) was Denver's head coach.

Cardinals LB **Quentin Groves** and Patriots LB **Trevor Scott** played together with the Raiders from 2010-11.

From 2005-06, Cardinals DE **Vonnie Holliday** and Patriots WR **Wes Welker** were teammates with the Dolphins.

College Connections

Patriots QB **Tom Brady** (1997-99) and Cardinals K **Jay Feely** (1995-98) played together at Michigan and were both part of the team that won a share of the national championship in 1997.

From 2008-10, Cardinals CB **Patrick Peterson** and Patriots RB **Stevan Ridley** were teammates at LSU.

Cardinals S **James Sanders** and Patriots G **Logan Mankins** were teammates at Fresno State from 2002-04 and were both drafted by the Patriots in 2005.

Cardinals DT **Dan Williams** played at Tennessee with Patriots LB **Jerod Mayo** from 2006-07.

Cardinals LB **Daryl Washington** and Patriots OL **Marcus Cannon** played together at TCU from 2007-09.

Cardinals QB **Kevin Kolb** and Patriots T **Sebastian Vollmer** were teammates at Houston from 2005-06.

Cardinals WR **LaRon Byrd** and Patriots DL **Marcus Forston** played together at Miami from 2008-11.

From 2006-08, Cardinals S **Rashad Johnson** played at Alabama with Patriots DL **Brandon Deaderick**.

HALL OF FAMER GOES HOME

Cardinals FB **Anthony Sherman** grew up a star athlete playing in the shadows of Gillette Stadium in Foxborough.

Sherman hails from North Attleboro, which is approximately 10 miles from the Patriots home stadium. The 2006 Gatorade Player of the Year for Massachusetts while playing at North Attleboro High School, Sherman earned first-team All-State honors as a linebacker while also being named league and team Offensive MVP as a running back.

In November of last year, Sherman, who finished his career at Attleboro as the all-time record holder with 2,537 yards rushings, 48 TDs and 284 points, was inducted in the school's Hall of Fame during his first year of eligibility.

In addition to his exploits on the football field, Sherman was also a standout performer in baseball and track, earning Attleboro Sun-Chronicle honors in each and twice being named all-league in baseball. Sherman also excelled away from athletics, earning all-scholastic honors from the Boston Globe and the Boston Herald.

BY THE BUNCH

With three sacks of Seahawks QB Russell Wilson last week, the Cardinals defense has now posted multiple sacks in seven consecutive games dating back to last season. That ranks as the second-longest active streak in the NFL behind the Patriots (9), the Cardinals opponent this week.

FITZ WENT LONG

The Cardinals lone TD during the last meeting against New England (12/21/08) was a 78-yard TD reception by WR **Larry Fitzgerald**, which remains the longest reception of his career. Fitzgerald finished the day with three receptions for 101 yards.

The 78-yard strike was the longest offensive TD by an opponent at Gillette Stadium since Denver's Javon Walker hauled in an 83-yard TD catch on 9/24/06 and it remains the longest offensive TD by an opponent since then.

A TRIP EAST AND A RETURN FOR TWO

The Cardinals make their first trip cross country this week when they visit New England. It will be over two months before the Cards travel back to the Eastern Time Zone, where they will play two games in three weeks against the Falcons (Week 11) and Jets (Week 13).

After the visit to New England this week, the Cardinals return to the Valley for back-to-back home games against the Philadelphia Eagles and Miami Dolphins. The 2012 season marks the first time since 2009 and just the second time since '88 that the Cards have three of their first four games at home.

THE COMEBACK CARDS RETURN

During the 2011 season, the Cardinals proved to be one of the best comeback teams in NFL history, winning six games in which the team trailed in the fourth quarter, tied for the second-most such victories for any NFL team since 1970.

That trend continued into the 2012 season after the Cardinals overcame a three-point fourth quarter deficit to beat the Seahawks 20-16 last week at University of Phoenix Stadium.

The Cardinals overcame a second half deficit in seven of their eight wins last season, one shy of the NFL modern-era record (8, shared by six teams, most recently the 2010 NY Jets).

CARDIAC CARDS

In 1976, the Cardinals won eight games by seven points or fewer, earning the team the nickname "Cardiac Cards." The 2011 Arizona squad were the 2.0 version of the Cardiac Cards, matching that eight win total in contests decided by seven points or fewer, including an NFL single-season record four games in overtime.

That is yet another trend from the 2011 season that carried over into the first game of 2012. Giving fans plenty to cheer about at University of Phoenix Stadium last week, the Cardinals pulled out a 20-16 nail-biter against the Seahawks.

Of the Cardinals nine home games dating back to 2011, eight have been decided by seven points or fewer.

Of the Cards 16 games last season, 13 were decided by seven points or fewer, the most in the NFL. Arizona posted an 8-5 record in those games.

Arizona's eight wins decided by seven points or fewer in 2011 matched the original Cardiac Cards team from 1976 for the most victories in franchise history decided by a TD or less.

The Cardinals four OT wins in 2011 established a new NFL record for most OT wins in a single season. Prior to last year, the Cardinals had played in just four OT games (regular season) in the previous four seasons combined.

DEFENSE STANDS TALL AGAIN

The Cardinals defense allowed just 16 points in last week's win over Seattle, despite having to overcome a host of obstacles. Turnovers, big returns by Seattle's special teams units and an extra timeout erroneously awarded to the Seahawks on the closing drive all placed the Cards defense under tremendous pressure—and they came through yet again.

The Seahawks posted three field goals and a TD last week but all four of the team's scoring drives started inside Cardinals territory. Below is a look at the Seahawks four scoring drives in the game:

Seattle's four scoring drives covered a combined total of 57 yards, an average of 14.3 yards per drive. On those four drives, Seattle ran 20 plays, an average of 2.8 yards per play.

Of the 18 plays (not including penalties) the Seahawks ran on their final drive, six came inside the Arizona 20-yard line. After reaching the AZ-13 yard line, Arizona's defense forced QB Russell Wilson into five incomplete passes.

Keeping clear of the endzone

During the 2011 season, Arizona allowed just 23 TDs in 58 possessions inside the red zone, with their 39.6 TD percentage ranking as the second-lowest total in the NFL (Baltimore, 38.1%).

That success continued last week, as the Cards allowed the Seahawks to score just one TD on four trips to the red zone.

Getting off the field

Another area the Arizona defended excelled in during the '11 season was on third down, when the team allowed opponents to convert just 71 of 226 third down attempts on the year, with their 31.4 conversion percentage ranked as the best in the NFL.

Against Seattle, the Cardinals defense allowed the Seahawks to convert just 5 of 16 third down attempts (31.3%).

A LOOK BACK—CARDS "D" IN 2011

The Cardinals overall turnaround as a team in 2011 largely mirrored the emergence of the Arizona defense as the group thrived in **Ray Horton's** system over the final nine games.

THE NEW FACES

THE VETERANS

CB William Gay: Has played in 80 consecutive regular season games since entering the NFL in 07, which ranks as the fourth-best streak among active CBs. Has also appeared in eight postseason games, including Super Bowl XLIII and XLV with the Steelers.

LB Quentin Groves: A second round pick of the Jaguars in the 2008 NFL Draft, played two seasons in Jacksonville before being traded to Oakland, where he played two seasons. Made a strong impression throughout training camp and preseason, totaling 10 tackles, two sacks, four tackles for loss and two special teams tackles.

T Pat McQuistan: Enters his seventh NFL season after being selected by the Cowboys in the seventh round (211th overall) of the 2006 NFL Draft. Has also played with Miami (2010) and New Orleans (2011) and has played in 66 career games (eight starts).

G/C Rich Ohrnberger: Originally a fourth round (123rd overall) draft pick of the Patriots in 2009, appeared in five career games in New England before spending the 2011 season on injured reserve.

S James Sanders: Has helped his team reach the playoffs in six of his first seven NFL seasons, going five times in six years with the Patriots and again in 2011 with the Falcons. Started 13 games for the Patriots in 2007, the year the team finished 16-0.

G Adam Snyder: Played in 107 games with 69 starts in seven NFL seasons, with starting experience at left tackle (21 starts), right tackle (21), right guard (17), and left guard (10). Started 13 games and both playoff games in 2011 with the 49ers.

LB Jamaal Westerman: Appeared in 36 games with three starts in three seasons with the Jets after the team signed him as a rookie free agent in 2009. Has posted 31 career tackles, with 4.5 sacks and four fumble recoveries. Claimed off waivers from Miami.

WR Michael Floyd: (1st Round, 13th overall)-The most prolific wide receiver in Notre Dame history, he owns all-time school records with 271 receptions, 2,686 receiving yards, 37 receiving TDs, and 17 100-yard receiving games.

CB Jamell Fleming: (3rd Round, 80th overall)-Twice named Defensive MVP in bowl games played in Arizona, helping Oklahoma to victories in the 2011 Fiesta Bowl at University of Phoenix Stadium and the 2012 Insight Bowl in Tempe. Played in 51 games for the Sooners, starting the final 24 contests.

T Bobby Massie: (4th Round, 112th overall)-A two-time All-SEC selection, he never allowed a QB sack while playing with the first-unit offensive line in three seasons at Ole Miss.

G Senio Kelemete: (5th Round, 151st overall)-Two-time team captain at Washington who began his career as a defensive tackle before moving to the offensive line as a sophomore.

S Justin Bethel: (6th Round, 177th overall)-Established a Big South Conference career record with nine blocked kicks and is Presbyterian's all-time leader with 279 tackles and seven INTs. Blocked three kicks (PAT, punt, FGA) for the Cards in the preseason.

QB Ryan Lindley: (6th Round, 185th overall)-Four-year starter at San Diego State who set Mountain West career records with 49 starts, 961 completions, 1,732 pass attempts, and 12,690 passing yards.

T Nate Potter: (7th Round, 221st overall)-As a senior in 2011, became the second Boise State player to earn consensus All-American honors since the program joined the FBS in 1996. One of six Boise State players drafted in 2012, a school record.

Free Agent

WR LaRon Byrd: The lone rookie free agent in a group of 16 to earn a spot on the 53-man roster. A four-year player at Miami (FL), he appeared in 51 games and finished his career with 106 receptions for 1,254 yards and seven TDs. His 12 receptions during preseason action were a team high.

A DIFFERENT LOOK

The Cardinals starting lineup in 2012 has a different look than the one that opened the 2011 season. Eight of the 22 starters from last week's game were not in the starting lineup at that time in 2011.

The most noticeable difference between 2011 and 2012 is the offensive line. Last week's game served as the debut of three new linemen for Arizona, with veterans **D'Anthony Batiste** (7th NFL season) and **Adam Snyder** (8th NFL season) and rookie **Bobby Massie** (4th round pick) making their first starts for the Cards.

Making the start at RT against the Seahawks, Massie became the first Cardinals rookie offensive lineman to start on opening day since **Levi Brown** started in the same spot during the 2007 opener at San Francisco.

Batiste was making his first NFL start since the 2007 season and first ever start at tackle. Prior to last week, he had started four career games (two at LG and two at RG) for the Atlanta Falcons in '07. For his first start at tackle, Batiste lined up across from Seahawks standout DE Chris Clemons, who had 11 sacks in 2011.

ARIZONA SUCCESS

The Cards 20-16 victory over Seattle on Sunday completed a four-game sweep for football in the state of Arizona. Combined with wins by Arizona State (45-14 over Illinois), Arizona (59-38 over 18th ranked Oklahoma State) and Northern Arizona (17-14 over UNLV), all four teams won on the same weekend for the first time since Oct. 17-18 of 2009. Coincidentally, the Cards opponent that weekend was the Seahawks.

THIRD ROOKIE IN A ROW

In defeating the Seahawks last week, the Cards improved to 3-0 in season openers in the last three years, while going against a rookie QB making their first career start in each game. On Sunday it was Seattle's Russell Wilson, the team's third round pick (75th overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft. Each of the previous two years, the Cards defeated Heisman Trophy winners who were the top overall pick in the NFL Draft in Cam Newton (2011) and Sam Bradford (2010).

A SPECIAL UNIT

After leading the NFL in blocked FGAs in each of the last three seasons (5-2011, 3-2010, 3-2009), it didn't take the Cardinals long to take the early lead in that category again in 2012.

When DE **Calais Campbell** blocked Seattle's 50-yard FGA on the first offensive possession of the game, it marked Arizona's first blocked FGA of the season and 13th block dating back to 2008, an NFL-high.

It was Campbell's sixth blocked FGA of his career. He tied Seattle's Red Bryant for the NFL lead with three blocked FGAs in 2011.

Arizona's blocked FGA against the Seahawks was the only blocked FGA in the NFL during week one.

Having led the NFL in blocked FGs each of the last three years and leading the category again in 2012, the Cardinals have definitely given opposing kickers plenty to think about. During the 2011 season, some of the league's best had their struggles against Arizona.

- ✓ Bengals K **Mike Nugent** held the NFL lead for FG accuracy (93.1%), having hit on 27-of-29 FG attempts on the season. Against the Cardinals, Nugent doubled his miss total for the season in the first half alone, missing on attempts of 35 and 48 yards.
- ✓ San Francisco K **David Akers**, who established an NFL record for most FGs in a season with 44, saw most of his struggles in 2011 come against Arizona. Akers missed eight FG attempts last season (44-of-52) and half of those (4) came against Arizona.
- ✓ Entering the game against the Cardinals in Week 13, Cowboys rookie K **Dan Bailey** had made 27-of-28 FGAs on the season, including 26 in a row leading into the game. That streak came to an end in the first quarter when Bailey's 53-yard attempt went wide left. Bailey finished the day 2-of-4 on FGAs, also missing a potential game-winning 49-yard attempt at the end of the fourth quarter.

TOUCHDOWNS ARE A SPECIALTY

The Cardinals have scored 13 special teams TDs dating back to 2007, the year special teams coordinator **Kevin Spencer** took the reins. Prior to Spencer's arrival, it took the Cardinals 28 years (1979-2006) to accumulate 13 special teams TDs.

Since then, the Cardinals have scored at least one special teams TD each season, and multiple TDs in each of the last four seasons.

CB **Patrick Peterson** tied the NFL single-season record for punt return TDs in 2011 when he scored four.

With two KOR TDs, RB **LaRod Stephens-Howling** was one of just five NFL players with multiple KOR TDs in 2010.

Dating back to 2007, the Cards nine total kick return TDs (punt and kickoff return) trail only Chicago (15) for most in the NFL.

FEELY'S STREAK HITS 13

After connecting on field goals of 21 and 31 yards last week against Seattle, K **Jay Feely** has now hit on 13 consecutive FGAs dating back the 11th game of the 2011 season. That represents the fourth-longest streak in franchise history.

ON THE CUSP

RB **LaRod Stephens-Howling** has recorded 146 kickoff returns for 3,684 yards and three TDs during his first three-plus seasons in the NFL. In doing so, he has put himself into position to cement his place as one of the best return men in team history this season.

Stephens-Howling's 146 returns rank as the fourth-best total in franchise history while his 3,684 return yards rank third and his three TDs rank second.

He enters this week's game needing 32 returns to become the franchise all-time leader in that category.

IN THE NFC WEST UNDER WHISENHUNT

Following the victory over Seattle last week, the Cardinals improved to 19-12 against teams from the NFC West under **Whisenhunt**. The win also gives Arizona a 5-1 record at home against Seattle since 2007.

The 2010 season was the first under Whisenhunt in which the Cards posted a below .500 record against teams in the division. After losing the final five division games in 2010 and losing to Seattle in Week 3 of the 2011 season, Arizona has won five of the last six NFC West matchups.

In Week 14 against San Francisco, the Cardinals snapped a five-game losing streak to the 49ers that dated back to the beginning of the 2009 season. Arizona has now won two straight against Seattle, following a three-game losing streak.

CARDS UNDER WHISENHUNT

Whisenhunt has had an impressive run in his first five-plus seasons with the Cardinals. Prior to the 2010 season, Whisenhunt earned a four-year contract extension with a team option for a fifth.

During his first five seasons in Arizona, Whisenhunt earned 44 victories (including postseason), becoming the winningest coach in franchise history. Last week's win over Seattle marked number 45. Below is a look at a list of achievements that Whisenhunt has put together during his time in Arizona:

- With the victory over the Seahawks in the '12 opener, the Cardinals have a 30-14 record at University of Phoenix Stadium under Whisenhunt (including postseason).
- Posted a .500 record or better in four of his first five seasons with the Cardinals.
- The Cardinals earned NFC West titles in 2008 and '09, their first back-to-back division titles since 1974-75.
- Arizona's win over Green Bay in the 2009 Wild Card matchup gave the Cardinals wins in the postseason in back-to-back years for the first time in franchise history.
- The Cardinals have won twice as many playoff games under Whisenhunt (4) as they had won in their total playoff history (2) prior to his tenure. Under Whisenhunt, the Cardinals appeared in six playoff contests between 2008-09, after appearing in seven total postseason games in the franchise's history prior to his arrival.
- Arizona finished with a 10-6 record in '09, giving the Cardinals 10+ wins in the regular season for the first time since 1976 (10-4).
- Whisenhunt was the first head coach in franchise history with a .500 record or better in each of his first three seasons. The Cardinals were 8-8 in 2007, 9-7 in 2008 and 10-6 in '09.
- The 2011 season marked Whisenhunt's fifth straight season with a home winning percentage of at least .500, a new franchise record. Entering the 2011 season, Whisenhunt was tied with Don Coryell for most seasons with a .500 home record or better.
- The Cardinals started the 2009 season with a 5-0 record on the road for the first time since 1975.
- The Cardinals posted a 6-2 road record in '09, the most road wins in a single season since posting six wins in 1963.
- The Cardinals have posted a 19-12 record against NFC West opponents under Whisenhunt.
- Led the Cardinals to the NFC West title in 2008, their first division title since 1975.
- Led the Cardinals to their first-ever Super Bowl appearance in 2008 and more wins in a single season (12) than any coach in franchise history.
- The Cardinals 30-24 win over Atlanta in the 2008 Wild Card Game was the first home playoff victory in 61 years.
- With the 34-21 win over Seattle in the 2008 regular season finale, the Cardinals finished the 2008 regular season with a 9-7 record, matching their best regular season record since the franchise moved to Arizona in 1988.
- With the Cardinals 20-17 win over the Browns in Week 15 in 2011 at University of Phoenix Stadium in 2011, the team improved to 8-2 at home against teams from the AFC.
- In 2008, the Cards offense scored a franchise record 427 points and added 188 points in the playoffs, the third-highest total in NFL postseason history.

80 YEARS OF OWNERSHIP

In 1932, Charles W. Bidwill agreed to purchase the Chicago Cardinals from then-owner Dr. David Jones and the team has remained in the Bidwill family ever since.

A prominent figure in the history of the National Football League, Charles Bidwill was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967. Upon his passing in 1947, his wife Violet retained control of the franchise and ran the Cardinals for the next 15 years until her passing in 1962. Control of the team then moved to her sons Charles and William (Bill).

Bill, whose association with the Cardinals began as a ball boy on Chicago's South Side, became the sole owner and chief executive officer in 1972 and his involvement with the team - now in its eighth decade - continues today.

Mr. B remains a constant fixture at team functions as well as the Cardinals Tempe training facility where the responsibility for the day-to-day operation of the team today resides with his son and team president, Michael.

Michael Bidwill joined the Cardinals in 1996 as Vice President/General Counsel after practicing law for six years as a federal prosecutor. He has established his own legacy with the franchise that has included spearheading the effort that led to the creation of University of Phoenix Stadium and the team's greatest period of success, both on the field and off.

"It's always been a great sense of pride for our family to be associated with the National Football League," said Cardinals owner Bill Bidwill. "It is a privilege that also carries a great sense of responsibility to our fans and fans of the league that we do all we can to make sure our team and game are of the highest quality. We take that responsibility very seriously."

Founded in 1898, the Cardinals are the oldest continuously run franchise in professional football. They were a charter member of the National Football League when it began in 1920; the Cardinals and Bears are the only charter members of the NFL still in existence today.

SUPER BOWL RETURNING TO ARIZONA

On October 11, 2011, following a very competitive bidding process, the NFL owners awarded Super Bowl XLIX to Arizona as the nation's biggest sporting event will be held at University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale following the 2015 season.

"It's going to be huge for tourism, our economic development and our visibility not only in the United States but around the world," said Cardinals President **Michael Bidwill** following the vote.

Super Bowl XLIX will be the third Super Bowl played in Arizona and the second one at University of Phoenix Stadium. The Cardinals home played host to Super Bowl XLII between the NY Giants and New England Patriots following the 2007 season and Arizona first hosted the Super Bowl following the 1995 season, when the Dallas Cowboys defeated the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Super Bowl XLII brought with it an estimated economic impact of \$500 million, with nearly 100,000 out-of-state visitors and thousands of media members from around the world visiting the Valley.

With Super Bowl XLIX being held in Glendale, Arizona becomes one of just six host sites to be selected to host the Super Bowl at least three times.

DRAFTING WELL

Cardinals General Manager **Rod Graves** is one of the NFL's longest-tenured football decision makers, having led the team's personnel department since 2003.

A native of Houston, Graves is in his 16th season with the Cardinals organization after joining the team in 1997 as the Assistant to the President. He was promoted to Vice President, Football Operations in 2003 and General Manager in 2007.

Graves is one of six African American general managers in the NFL, joining Baltimore's Ozzie Newsome, Houston's Rick Smith, Detroit's Martin Mayhew, the Giants Jerry Reese and Oakland's Reggie McKenzie.

Graves oversees all facets of the team's football operations and has seen considerable success in building the team. One of the main ways Graves has built the team is through the NFL Draft. The Cardinals have received high praise for their successful draft classes under Graves, especially in recent years.

Current Cardinals Pro Bowl players such as CB **Patrick Peterson**, WR **Larry Fitzgerald**, DT **Darnell Dockett**, and SS **Adrian Wilson** were all acquired through the draft. Other rising stars recently identified and brought in by Graves include DE **Calais Campbell**, LBs **Daryl Washington** and **Sam Acho**, RBs **Beanie Wells** and **Ryan Williams**, WR **Andre Roberts** and QB **John Skelton**.

Of the 22 Cardinals starters that began the season last week against Seattle, 13 were draft choices of the team during Graves' tenure while one other starter (C **Lyle Sendlein**) joined the team as an undrafted rookie free agent.

The Cardinals top five draft picks in the 2010 NFL Draft are all starters for the Cardinals in just their third season.

Of the Cardinals 15 draft picks between 2010-11, eight are already full-time starters and 11 are every day players who see significant action on game days.

ADDING WASHINGTON TO THE CORE

GM **Rod Graves** has made it clear that under his leadership, the organization will identify a core group of players to build the team around and keep that core intact.

Last week, third-year LB **Daryl Washington** became the newest Cards player drafted under Graves that was extended by the team. Washington was given a six-year extension just under four months after the team extended DT **Calais Campbell**, their second round pick (50th overall) in the 2008 Draft.

"Two things that successful teams do consistently is build through the draft and keep their core players," Graves said in announcing the extension for Washington. "Daryl has certainly lived up to the potential we all saw in him coming out of TCU in 2010 and he has established himself as one of the top young defensive players in the NFL. I know he feels, like we do, that his best football is still ahead of him and we're thrilled that this deal gives him the opportunity to achieve that with the Cardinals."

During Graves' tenure, WR **Larry Fitzgerald**, SS **Adrian Wilson** and DT **Darnell Dockett** have all signed multiple contract extensions since being drafted by Arizona.

BEYOND THE RECORDS

In his first eight NFL seasons, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** broke virtually every major Cardinals career receiving record. With those records in his pocket, the only remaining question is how high the numbers will go by the time he is done.

In 2011, Fitzgerald became the franchise all-time leader in receiving yards, receiving TDs, career 100-yard games and total TDs. He became the franchise all-time receptions leader in 2010.

Fitzgerald is among an elite group of players in league history who have recorded at least 1,400 yards receiving in a season at least four times in their career. His 1,411 receiving yards in 2011 put him in a select group that includes only Jerry Rice, Randy Moss and Marvin Harrison.

Now in his ninth season in the NFL, Fitzgerald has a chance to place himself alongside arguably the greatest WR in league history. With 1,400 yards in 2012, he would join Jerry Rice as the only players in NFL history with at least five 1,400 yard seasons. MILESTONES APPROACH

Fitzgerald enters this week's game against New England with 697 receptions and 9,678 receiving yards, which has him close to a few career milestones.

The 700 Club

Fitz needs just three receptions to become the youngest player in NFL history to reach 700 career catches. The current record is held by Houston's Andre Johnson (30 years, 139 days old). Fitzgerald will be 29 years, 16 days old when the Cards meet the Patriots on Sunday and if Fitzgerald reaches the mark then, he would be over a year younger than Johnson.

At this point in his career, Fitzgerald has more receptions (697) than any of the receivers enshrined in Canton—by a large margin. The next closest receiver is Jerry Rice, who had 618 receptions through his first 125 career games.

Fitzgerald has more receiving yards (9,678) than all HOF receivers except Rice (10,351) and Lance Alworth (10,175).

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass those of many receivers that are currently enshrined in the HOF.

He has more career receptions than 15 of the 21 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Berry (631), Maynard (633) and Taylor (649).

He has more career receiving yards than 13 of the 21 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Taylor (9,110) and Berry (9,275).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (697), receiving yards (9,678), receiving TDs (73), total TDs (73) and 100-yard receiving games (32). His six 1,000-yard seasons are a franchise record, as are his current streak of five consecutive 1,000-yard seasons.

- Will be 29 years, 16 days old when the Cardinals travel to New England this week to face the Patriots, and he will look to become the youngest player in NFL history to reach 700 career receptions. The current record is held by Houston's Andre Johnson, who was 30 years, 139 days old when he reached the mark. If he reaches 700 receptions this week, he will be over a full year younger than Johnson.

A SPECIAL AWARD FOR FITZ

On August 13, **Fitzgerald** was honored as the recipient of the 14th annual Arthur S. Arkush Humanitarian Award by Pro Football Weekly. The award is given to an NFL player whose contributions to the community and charitable organizations are especially outstanding.

Fitzgerald's work in the community is plentiful and far-reaching. He was honored by Pro Football Weekly for his work with the **Larry Fitzgerald First Down Fund**, which funds positive activities for kids during the summer and throughout the year, with programs in Arizona, Minneapolis and Chicago. It also makes significant contributions — in time, money and resources — to numerous organizations throughout the United States.

His work with the **Carol Fitzgerald Memorial Fund**, which was established in honor of his late mother, who passed away from breast cancer in 2003, offers support of causes that Fitzgerald's mother held dear, including educating urban youth about HIV/AIDS and breast cancer issues.

Fitzgerald has served as a key figure in the NFL's annual Breast Cancer Awareness Month. He served as an NFL spokesman for the league-wide initiative "A Crucial Catch" for the last two years and was again invited to do so in 2012.

Fitzgerald has traveled to Africa numerous times over the last few years, both with his good friend Anquan Boldin and on behalf of the Starkey Hearing Foundation. His most recent trip was in late July just prior to the start of training camp when he flew to Uganda to assist President Clinton and his daughter Chelsea fit hearing aids for those in need.

PFW also cited Fitzgerald's use of social media to further his humanitarian work. Through Twitter and Facebook, he connects with his huge following of fans (currently over 1.3 million followers) with his **Gimme 5 Fridays with Fitz** initiative, in which he tweets and asks "Team Fitzgerald" to text HAND to 50555 and \$5 is given to Phoenix Children's Hospital.

CONTINUING WHERE HE LEFT OFF

If any Cardinals player exemplified Arizona's breakout success over the final nine games in 2011, it was WR **Andre Roberts**, who finished the season as one of the team's hottest players.

Roberts continued that hot streak in the Cards opener against Seattle on Sunday, leading the team with five receptions against the Seahawks, including a six-yard TD catch in the fourth quarter that proved to be the game-winner. It was the fifth TD of Roberts career and it was the second game-winner in his last five games played. Against the 49ers in Week 14 of last season, Roberts hauled in a three-yard TD pass in the fourth quarter that gave the Cards a 21-19 win over San Francisco.

After hauling in two TD passes in his first 27 career games, Roberts has now caught three TD passes in the last five games dating back to last season.

In 2011, Roberts started all 16 games and totaled 51 receptions for 586 yards and two TDs. Following a slow start over the season's first seven contests, Roberts flashed the potential that caused the Cardinals to make him the highest draft pick out of the Citadel (3rd round, 88th overall) since 1970 (LB John Small, Atlanta, 1st round, 12th overall).

During the final nine games, Roberts totaled 38 receptions for 453 yards and two TDs. That came after he totaled 13 receptions for 133 yards through the first seven games.

EARLY ON THE RISE

WR **Early Doucet** enjoyed what was easily the best season of his career in 2011 while serving as the team's third WR. In his fourth NFL season, he shattered his previous career-highs by hauling in 54 receptions for 689 yards and five TDs, including TD receptions of 70 and 60 yards.

Prior to 2011, Doucet's best season had come in 2010, when he totaled 26 receptions for 291 yards and a TD.

- During his first three seasons, posted a long reception of 36 yards. Had TD receptions of 70 and 60 yards in '11 and totaled eight receptions of 20+ yards on the year.
- Had more receptions for first downs in 2011 (35) than he did in his first three seasons combined (28).

HEAP KEEPS ON CLIMBING

When the Cardinals signed TE **Todd Heap** as a free agent in 2011, they brought home an Arizona native who attended Mountain View High School before starring at Arizona State. Prior to signing with Arizona, Heap spent 10 seasons with the Baltimore Ravens, where he became one of the game's best receiving TEs while earning two Pro Bowl selections.

Back in Arizona, Heap continued his march up the NFL's all-time list for receptions and receiving yards among TEs. He resumed that climb again last week vs. Seattle and enters this week's game against New England with a few milestones in reach.

With 494 career receptions, Heap needs just five catches to pass Steve Jordan (498) for 10th place on the NFL career receptions list among TEs. He needs just six receiving yards to pass Hall of Famer Mike Ditka (5,812) for 12th place on the NFL's all-time receiving yardage list among TEs.

TWO DIFFERENT PATHS

In addition to veteran WRs **Larry Fitzgerald**, **Andre Roberts** and **Early Doucet**, the Cardinals have a pair of rookies filling out the WR position that entered the league in completely opposite ways. **Michael Floyd** was the team's first round pick in the 2012 NFL Draft while **LaRon Byrd** signed with the team as a rookie free agent.

Michael Floyd (1st round pick, 13th overall)

The most prolific WR in Notre Dame history, Floyd owns five career receiving records for the Irish—receptions (271), receiving yards (2,686), receiving TDs (37), receiving yards per game (85.7) and 100-yard receiving games (17).

LaRon Byrd (Rookie Free Agent)

The lone rookie free agent to earn a spot on the 53-man roster, Byrd appeared in 51 games at Miami (FL) and finished his career with 106 receptions for 1,254 yards and seven TDs.

A CONTINUED PROGRESSION

QB **John Skelton** won a preseason battle with Kevin Kolb to become the starting QB for the Cardinals in 2012. In doing so, he resumed the position that he held last season as he helped the Cards post their remarkable late season turnaround. The Cards won seven of their final nine and Skelton was under center for six of those wins.

Skelton proved in his first two seasons in the NFL that he can win games for the Cardinals. After posting a 5-2 record as a starter in 2011, Skelton earned his eighth career victory (8-4) with the win over Seattle last week. He also improved to 6-0 at home as a starting QB. Skelton became the first Cardinals QB of the Super Bowl era to win his first six home starts and he is the first NFL QB to do so since the 49ers Shaun Hill (7 straight wins, 2007-09).

Playing under less than ideal circumstances in 2011, the second-year player out of Fordham took advantage of his opportunities when starter Kevin Kolb went down with injuries over the second half of the season. After helping the Cardinals recover from a 1-6 start to win seven of their final nine games, Skelton earned his way into the preseason battle for the starting QB spot.

During last week's game, Skelton completed 14 of 28 attempts for 149 yards against the Seahawks before a fourth quarter ankle injury knocked him out of the game.

ALWAYS READY

Entering the 2012 season as a backup, QB **Kevin Kolb** vowed to be ready when called upon this season. That is exactly the scenario that played out in last week's opener against Seattle when John Skelton went down with an ankle injury during the Cardinals final offensive drive of the game.

With the Cards down 16-13, Kolb entered the contest and proved he was indeed ready when called on. After his first pass attempt—a deep ball to WR Larry Fitzgerald down the near sideline—fell incomplete, Kolb went on to complete six of his next seven attempts for 66 yards, including a game-winning six-yard TD pass to WR Andre Roberts with just under five minutes remaining.

For Kolb, it was his first regular season game action since being forced from the 2011 Week 14 matchup vs. San Francisco with a head injury. His six-yard TD pass to Roberts in Sunday's win marked his first TD pass since his 52-yard game-winner to LaRod Stephens-Howling in OT against the Cowboys in Week 13.

Dating back to that TD pass to win the Dallas matchup, in Kolb's last 10 regular season pass attempts, he has:

- ✓ 2 game-winning TD passes
- ✓ 8 completions for 120 yards, 2 TDs

LINDLEY EARNS HIS SPOT

QB **Ryan Lindley**, selected by the Cardinals with their second selection of the sixth round (185th overall) in this year's draft, earned a spot on the 53-man roster with an impressive training camp and preseason performance.

Lindley performed so well in camp that head coach **Ken Whisenhunt** gave him the start in the team's final preseason matchup vs. Oakland. Playing the first half, Lindley completed 9 of 13 pass attempts (69%) for 101 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 117.8. Lindley was later forced back into action in the second half after an injury to Richard Bartel.

"The one thing that has been consistent is his poise and how he's handled himself," Whisenhunt said of his newest QB. "He's thrown the ball well and he's accurate."

A four-year starter at San Diego State, Lindley established a school record with 49 consecutive starts. He also established Mountain West Conference career records for pass completions (961), pass attempts (1,732), passing yards (12,690), starts (49), total plays (1,822) and total offensive yards (12,415).

LOOKING FOR A REPEAT

RB **Beanie Wells** was in his third NFL season in 2011 and it was hailed as the year he would break out. After a preseason trade that sent Tim Hightower to the Redskins, Wells entered the season as the starter for the first time in his career.

Despite injuries that forced him to miss two full games and most of a third last season, Wells still managed to run his way into the Cardinals record books as he made good on the promise he showed during his 2009 rookie campaign.

Wells posted career-highs with 245 rushing attempts for 1,047 yards and 10 TDs in 2011. It marked the first 1,000-yard campaign for the back out of Ohio State and he became the first Cardinals player to rush for 1,000 yards in a season since Edgerrin James in 2007 (1,222).

Wells became the ninth player in franchise history to record 1,000 yards rushing in a season and it marked the 14th 1,000-yard season by a Cardinals back.

BEANIE BREAKS RECORDS

No running back in team history had ever accomplished what RB **Beanie Wells** did last season. With 1,047 rushing yards and 10 rushing TDs in 2011, Wells became the first player in franchise history to record at least 1,000 yards rushing and 10 rushing TDs in a single season.

A good chunk of that yardage total came in Week 12 at St. Louis, when Wells broke the franchise single-game rushing record by totaling 228 yards on 27 attempts against the Rams.

With 10 rushing TDs in 2012, Wells would become the first player in franchise history to rush for at least 10 TDs in back-to-back seasons.

RYAN RETURNS

RB **Ryan Williams**, the Cardinals second round selection (38th overall) in the 2011 NFL Draft, made his NFL debut last week when he received the start vs. Seattle. Williams missed his entire rookie campaign with a ruptured patella tendon in his right knee, suffered in an August, 2011 preseason game at Green Bay.

One of the early stars of training camp last season, Williams was turning heads with his blend of power and quickness before suffering the season-ending injury. After spending his entire rookie season on injured reserve, Williams worked tirelessly throughout the offseason to rehab and be ready to make his NFL debut in 2012.

That debut came in the Cards third preseason game, when Williams made the start against Oakland on 8/17, nearly a year to the day following his injury. Against the Raiders, Williams rushed for 25 yards and a TD on five carries. "I felt like I was six years old again playing Pop Warner," Williams said of his return. "I haven't had that feeling in a long time, so that first carry was just a lot of nervousness. After I got that first hit, they tugged on my leg a little bit, I realized that I was fine, and the rest is history. I just started playing like myself."

Williams was the second running back selected in 2011, behind only former Alabama Heisman Trophy winner Mark Ingram (Saints). After redshirting in 2008, Williams played just two seasons at Virginia Tech, but needed just one year to prove how special a back he can be. He piled up a school-record 1,655 yards rushing as a freshman in 2009, and tied Marshall Faulk's NCAA freshman record with 21 TDs.

ALWAYS A THREAT

In the three-plus years since the Cardinals selected him in the seventh round (240th overall) of the 2009 NFL Draft, RB **LaRod Stephens-Howling** has evolved as a threat in many ways. The 5-7 back went from one of the league's most dangerous kickoff return men into his role last year as a threat to score from anywhere coming out of the backfield.

Entering the 2011 season, Stephens-Howling had scored five career TDs in his first two NFL seasons, with three of those coming on kickoff returns spanning 102, 99 and 92 yards.

In 2011, the third-year back expanded his game and made his biggest contributions out of the backfield, posting TD receptions of 73 and 52 yards, with the 52-yarder coming in OT during the Week 13 victory vs. Dallas.

With the 73-yard TD reception against the Steelers in Week 7, Stephens-Howling became one of just seven players in franchise history with at least four TDs of 70+ yards.

In the season finale vs. Seattle in 2011, he appeared as the Cardinals feature back for the first time in his career in place of the injured Beanie Wells and posted career highs with 21 attempts for 93 yards, averaging 4.4 yards per carry. His 39-yard run in the first quarter was the longest run of his career.

Last week in the opener, Stephens-Howling scored the Cards lone rushing TD—his second career rushing TD—on a one-yard run to give the Cards a 10-3 lead in the second quarter.

HOLLIDAY APPROACHES 200

DE **Vonnie Holliday** will play in his 200th career regular season game this week in New England, which puts him in exclusive company in the NFL. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Holliday will be just the 11th active player (non-kickers) to have reached that career milestone.

Now in his 15th NFL season, Holliday has 62.5 sacks, 654 tackles, 10 fumble recoveries, and nine forced fumbles in his career. He played in all 16 games in 2011, his first season with the Cardinals, after being acquired in a trade with the Redskins during training camp.

Originally a first-round pick (19th overall) of the Packers in the 1998 draft, Holliday has topped five or more sacks in nine of his 14 years in the NFL and ranks 15th among active players in career sacks.

ADRIAN SIGNS AGAIN

Now in his 12th season, S **Adrian Wilson** is the team's longest tenured player and has been with Arizona since the team selected him in the 2001 NFL Draft. Wilson is one of just six players selected in 2001 still with the team that selected them.

The day the team reported to camp this season, Wilson signed his third extension with the Cards, ensuring that the franchise staple will continue on with Arizona. Wilson's first two extensions came on 12/22/04 and 6/4/09 and were both five-year deals.

Wilson has appeared in 167 career games with Arizona. That ranks as the 10th highest games played total in franchise history. It also means that Wilson has played in more games as an Arizona Cardinal than any player in the team's history following the team's relocation to the Valley in 1988. Among defenders, only Roger Wehrli (193), Larry Stallings (180) and Larry Wilson (169) have played more games for the Cardinals than Adrian.

Should he appear in all 16 games in 2012, Wilson will reach 182 games played, moving into sixth place. It will also mean he will have appeared in more games than any Cardinals defensive player other than Hall of Fame CB Roger Wehrli (193).

THE 20-20 MAN

Wilson has had a long list of individual accomplishments during his first 11 seasons with the Cardinals, including five Pro Bowl appearances and numerous NFL single-season records.

One of the most significant is his inclusion on an exclusive list of NFL players who have recorded at least 20 INTs and 20 sacks in their career. In 2009, Wilson reached the career milestone, becoming just the 10th player in NFL history with at least 20 sacks and 20 interceptions.

Since Wilson accomplished the feat in '09, S Lawyer Milloy (2010) and LB Brian Urlacher (2011) have also joined the list, becoming the 11th and 12th players to reach the 20/20 club.

Three of the four Cardinals players with at least 30 career INTs are in the Hall of Fame (Larry Wilson, Roger Wehrli and Dick "Night Train" Lane) while the fourth, Aeneas Williams, was one of 10 finalists for the Hall last year.

STAYING IN THE GAME

A torn biceps muscle didn't stop **Wilson** from starting all 16 games in 2011, and in fact he played more snaps (1,134) than any defensive player in the league.

Following last week's start in the '12 opener, Wilson has started 60 consecutive games, marking the second-longest current starts streak in the NFL among safeties.

MANY GREAT RETURNS

As much as CB **Patrick Peterson** is focused on becoming one of the game's top cover corners, it is impossible to ignore the things he did as a punt returner as a rookie.

Peterson tied the NFL record and became just the fourth player in NFL history to return four punts for TDs in a single season. He joined Jack Christiansen (Detroit, 1951) as the only rookies in NFL history with four punt return TDs.

Peterson's 699 punt return yards shattered the franchise single season record, previously held by Vai Sikahema who had 550 punt return yards in 1987.

AFTER 55, A NEW FOCUS

Having electrified the NFL and solidified his status as one of the best return men in the league with his four 80+ yard punt return TDs as a rookie in 2011, **Peterson** returned for his second NFL season with a whole new focus.

Listed at #55 on the NFL Network's Top 100: Players of 2012 following a vote of his peers, Peterson now has his sights on climbing that list as he establishes himself as one of the top CBs in the league.

"I definitely believe I made it through the record I set, tying the NFL (punt return) record," Peterson said following the unveiling of his name of the Top 100 list. "I believe that's primarily what got me in the Top 100. But this year I've been working more on my coverage skills and trying to be more of a shutdown cornerback versus an elite punt returner."

Peterson started all 16 games at CB and totaled 63 tackles, two INTs, a sack and 13 passes defended. His two INTs tied with Daryl Washington for the second-highest total on the team behind Richard Marshall (3) and his 13 passes defended also tied for second behind Adrian Wilson (16).

TALENT IN THE SECONDARY

Experience rules in the Cardinals secondary. Of the 10 DBs on the Arizona roster, eight have started at least seven career games. Five of the 10 have spent at least one full season as a starter in the NFL.

The most seasoned of the Cards three young LBs, Washington is entering his third season, after Arizona traded up to get him in the second round (47th overall) of the 2010 Draft. A starter from day one of his NFL career, Washington had a huge opener last week vs. Seattle with 10 tackles, a sack and a tackle for loss.

Sam Acho

After being selected by the Cardinals in the fourth round (103rd overall) of the 2011 NFL Draft, Acho played like a first round pick after moving into the starting role last season. He finished second on the team with 7.0 sacks as a rookie and also added a team-high four forced fumbles. He put a huge hit on Seattle RB Marshawn Lynch on a backwards pass which forced a fumble that Arizona recovered.

O'Brien Schofield

Now in his third NFL season, Schofield came into his own during the second half of last season. He finished the year with a career-high 4.5 sacks, including two pivotal sacks on consecutive plays, forcing a fumble on the second one, in the Week 15 win over Cleveland. He totaled five tackles in Sunday's win over Seattle.

The three LBs combined to total 16 tackles, a sack, a tackle for loss and two QB hits last week against the Seahawks. Over the last seven games dating back to last season, the trio has accounted for 10 sacks and four forced fumbles.

BACK TO BUSINESS

For second-year LB **Sam Acho**, the 2012 season is about improving upon his stellar rookie season and moving full time into the starting outside linebacker role.

The Cardinals fourth round selection (103rd overall) in the 2011 NFL Draft, Acho appeared in all 16 games for Arizona last season and was one of the breakout stars of the rookie class. He started the final 10 games of the season after entering the starting lineup in place of the injured Joey Porter in Week 8.

Acho recorded 37 tackles, seven sacks, five tackles for loss, a team-high four forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. He also played a significant role on special teams, with nine tackles. Acho's seven sacks ranked as the second-highest total in franchise history for a rookie (Simeon Rice (12.5, 1996).

Acho's biggest game of the season came in Week 12 at St. Louis, when he totaled three tackles, two sacks, two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery and a tackle for loss against the Rams. He became just the third Cards player to record at least two sacks and two forced fumbles in a game and the first to do so since Bertrand Berry (3.0 sacks, 2 FF) on 10/22/06 at Oakland.

READY FOR THE NEXT STEP

LB **Daryl Washington** had a breakout season last year in his second NFL campaign. The former TCU star led the team with 111 tackles and 16 tackles for loss, adding five sacks, two INTs and seven passes defended. Washington's 16 tackles for loss were the most for a Cards defender in a single season since DE Clyde Simmons posted 17 in 1995.

He was also one of only five NFL defenders who recorded at least five sacks and two INTs during the 2011 season.

The performance earned him a contract extension—signed last week with two years remaining on his rookie deal—that keeps the budding superstar in Arizona for years to come.

As he has shown the last two seasons, Washington knows how to make an impression coming out of the gate. After the 2011 opener against the Carolina Panthers saw Washington total six tackles, a tackle for loss, a sack and an INT, he started off the 2012 season with a team-high 10 tackles, a tackle for loss and a sack against the Seahawks last week.

With 10 tackles in Sunday's game, Washington now has double digit tackles in each of the last three games (11, 11, 10).

After the Cardinals traded up to select Washington with the 47th overall selection in the 2010 NFL Draft, it didn't take him long to make an impression. During his rookie campaign, he became the first rookie defender to start on opening day during the Ken Whisenhunt era.

A HUGE GAME FOR LENON

LB **Paris Lenon** posted the first multi-sack game of his 11-year career in last week's win. He tallied sacks in the first and fourth quarters against Seattle, to go along with six tackles, two tackles for loss, two QB hits and a fumble recovery.

Lenon was one of 10 players to record at least two sacks in week one, joining Green Bay's Clay Matthews (2.5), Indianapolis' Robert Mathis (2.0), Chicago's Henry Melton (2.0), Denver's Von Miller (2.0), Miami's Randy Starks (2.0) and Dallas' DeMarcus Ware (2.0), Baltimore's Haloti Ngata, San Diego's Shuan Phillips (2.0) and Cincinnati's Geno Atkins (2.0).

Prior to the 2011 season when he established a career-high with three sacks, Lenon had never recorded more than two sacks in an entire season. After totaling five sacks in his first eight seasons (127 games), Lenon has posted seven sacks in just 33 games with Arizona.

A former postal service employee and the only former XFL player still active in the NFL, Lenon entered the league in 2000 with Carolina as a rookie free agent out of Richmond. After a year out of the league following his release from the Panthers, Lenon went on to play with the Memphis Maniax of the XFL before spending eight seasons in the NFL with the Packers (2002-05), Lions (2006-08) and Rams (2009) before signing with Arizona.

NOBODY BETTER

All-Pro DT **Darnell Dockett** had another solid season for the Cardinals in 2011, starting all 16 games while recording 52 tackles, 10 tackles for loss, 3.5 sacks, two fumble recoveries and a team-high 19 QB hits.

Dockett got off to a strong start last week vs. Seattle, totaling five tackles and two QB hits, while providing a very disruptive presence in the Seahawks backfield all game.

Dating back to 2004, no player at his position has appeared in more games (128) than Dockett. He has started 127 of 128 career games and has missed just one contest in his first eight seasons. The only game he missed came on 11/14/10 vs. Seattle when a shoulder injury held him out, snapping a streak of 104 consecutive games played.

Dockett has led the NFL in sacks among DTs twice in his career, recording 9.0 sacks in 2007 and 7.0 sacks in 2009.

CARDS NAME CAPTAINS

Last week, the Cardinals announced the six team captains for the 2012 season as selected in a team vote. Among them are two players who entered the league as rookie free agents with Arizona.

For the third consecutive season, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** and C **Lyle Sendlein** were named offensive captains. For the second straight season, both SS **Adrian Wilson** and LB **Paris Lenon** were awarded the honor on defense. On special teams, LB **Reggie Walker** and FB **Anthony Sherman** were named captains.

Fitzgerald serves as a captain for the fourth consecutive season while Sendlein, a former rookie free agent now in his sixth season, earned the title for the third time.

Wilson, the team's longest tenured player, is serving as a captain for the fourth consecutive season and for the fifth time in his career (2007, 09-12). Lenon was named captain for the second consecutive season.

Both Sherman and Walker are serving as team captains for the first time in their careers. Now in his fourth NFL season, Walker signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent in 2009 out of Kansas State. Sherman earned the honor in just his second NFL season, after being selected by the Cards out of UConn in the fifth round (136th overall) of the 2011 NFL Draft.

KEEPING CAMPBELL IN THE CORE

Following a career year in 2011, DE **Calais Campbell** signed a new five-year contract on 5/10/12 that will keep the young, (turned 26 on Saturday, Sept. 1) core player around for the foreseeable future.

Campbell made a strong case to be considered among the top young defensive linemen in the game with his performance last season. He totaled 73 tackles, a team-high 8.0 sacks, 11 tackles for loss, 16 QB hits, 11 passes defended, an INT, two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery and three blocked FGs.

His 11 passes defended ranked as the fourth-best total on the team behind DBs Adrian Wilson (16), Patrick Peterson (13) and Richard Marshall (13) and with 8.0 sacks on the year, he has led or tied for the team lead in sacks in each of the last three seasons. His nine passes knocked down at the line of scrimmage led the NFL.

Named the Cardinals 2011 NFL Walter Payton "Man of the Year" for his community work, Campbell was originally taken by Arizona in the second round (50th overall) of the 2008 NFL Draft out of Miami. He has played in 64 regular season games with 47 starts and recorded 216 tackles (156 solos), 21 sacks, four forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, 19 passes defended and an INT. He also has six career blocked field goals.

For Campbell, who the team had placed under the "non-exclusive" franchise tag in March prior to his new deal, the career trajectory during his three seasons as a starter has led straight up. He has shown improvement in almost every category on a yearly basis.

WHY HE'S THE BEST

Standing 6-8, DE **Calais Campbell** led the NFL in a few categories during the 2011 season—all of which were direct reflections of his height advantage and athleticism. Campbell tied for the NFL lead in passes defended (11) and blocked FGAs (3) and led the league in passes batted down at the line of scrimmage (9).

In the Cardinals win over Seattle last week, Campbell got a good jump on the 2012 campaign by blocking a 50-yard FG attempt by Steve Hauschka in the first quarter and knocking down a Russell Wilson pass at the line in the third quarter.

Campbell's blocked FGA was the sixth block of his career. During the 2011 season, he tied Seattle's Red Bryant for the NFL lead with three blocked FGAs.

For third-year DT **Dan Williams**, reporting to training camp at 314 pounds was the biggest indication that the former first round pick was ready to be the anchor up the middle of the Cardinals defense that the team envisioned when selecting him with the 26th overall pick in the 2010 NFL Draft.

Williams battled weight issues during his first two seasons, but was playing some of the best football of his pro career when he went down for the season in Week 11 at San Francisco with a broken arm. In fact, Williams had posted a career-high six tackles against the 49ers prior to suffering the injury.

Williams has appeared in 26 of 27 games during his first two-plus NFL seasons, including all 10 games in 2011 before going on IR.
