### LAST GAME RECAP

**Tampa Bay 25, Kansas City 0**

**Friday, August 12, 2011**

**KANSAS CITY** – Tampa Bay opened its preseason slate with an impressive shutout victory in Kansas City, displaying control in all three phases of the game. The Buccaneers raced to an early lead in the first quarter, as rookie LB Mason Foster—Tampa Bay's third-round draft selection—recovered a Chiefs fumble on the Kansas City 9-yard line, which led to a five-yard rushing touchdown by QB Josh Freeman. On the Chiefs' ensuing possession, CB Elbert Mack forced a RB Jackie Battle fumble, which was recovered by S Sean Jones to give the Buccaneers possession near midfield. K Connor Barth extended the lead to 10-0 with a 25-yard field goal, following a three-yard rush on third-and-one by RB LeGarrette Blount and a 21-yard reception by WR Dezmon Briscoe. P Michael Koenen notched his second touchback of the night on the subsequent kickoff, booting the ball 74 yards and deep into the endzone to set up a Chiefs drive that was quickly smothered by the Buccaneers defense. As the second quarter began, Freeman, on his final drive before leaving the game, led the offense into Kansas City territory once more, and K Connor Barth's 40-yard field goal brought the score to 13-0. The teams then traded punts before the defense made another big play, as LB Dekoda Watson and DL Michael

Bennett sacked QB Tyler Palko in the endzone for a safety and the 15-0 lead that the Buccaneers would take into halftime. Early in the third quarter, Watson found Palko again, sacking him on third-and-six and forcing a fumble that, while recovered by Kansas City, led to a punt. Tampa Bay QB Josh Johnson then pieced together an impressive drive that included a 15-yard reception by WR Micheal Spurlock, and a 16-yard reception by 2011 seventh-round draft pick TE Daniel Hardy, which set up the final three-yard touchdown pass to Spurlock. As the game progressed into the fourth quarter, the Buccaneers put up their final points of the evening with a 46-yard field goal by rookie K Jacob Rogers. The Chiefs were unable to move the ball in their following possessions and the Buccaneers defense continued to apply pressure, which included two sacks by DE Kyle Moore and one by DE George Johnson. Kansas City QB Ricky Stanzi kneeled to allow the clock to expire, ending the game with a 25-0 Tampa Bay effort.

**ALL-TIME SERIES**

The Buccaneers and Patriots have met eight times in the preseason, with Tampa Bay winning each of the last seven contests. This year’s meeting is the seventh in Tampa, with the Bucs owning a 5-1 mark at home in the series.

During the regular season, New England leads the series 5-2. The Buccaneers won, 21-16, at New England in the 2000 season opener. The Buccaneers also won, 27-7, in 1997 in Tampa. The first meeting between the two clubs was in the Bucs’ first season in 1976, a 31-14 New England win in Tampa. The Patriots also captured wins in 1985 (32-14 in Tampa), 1988 (10-7 in overtime in New England), 2005 (28-0 in New England) and their last meeting in 2009 (35-7 in London).

**LAST MEETING (PRESEASON)**

**Tampa Bay 27, New England 10  
Sunday, August 17, 2008**

**TAMPA** - For the second consecutive season, Tampa Bay topped the New England Patriots in its preseason home opener. The contest also marked the second consecutive game in which the Buccaneers defense limited the opposition to less than 200 yards of offense and the Buccaneers offense did not commit a turnover. The Buccaneers again held a distinct advantage in time of possession, nearly 16 minutes, while only being flagged for three penalties, giving them just three penalties in their first two preseason games. Offensively for Tampa Bay, RB Michael Bennett again led all players with 57 yards on only eight carries as the quarterbacks completed 76 percent of their passes while registering a collective quarterback rating of 104.2. On the game’s opening drive, Tampa Bay marched 80 yards on 17 plays, chewing up 9:38 on the clock, to take a 7-0 lead on RB Earnest Graham’s one-

yard touchdown run. Following a Patriots turnover in Buccaneers territory, K Matt Bryant tacked on a 34-yard field goal that was set up by a 33-yard catch-and-run by WR Antonio Bryant. Tampa Bay increased the lead on its next drive as QB Luke McCown found FB Byron Storer on a one-yard touchdown pass with 1:13 left in the first half. New England K Stephen Gostkowski brought the Patriots within two touchdowns on the last play of the half as he connected on a 53-yard field goal. On the first play from scrimmage of the second half, S Sabby Piscitelli scooped up a Patriots fumble and raced 24-yards for a touchdown and a 24-3 lead. Following a Buccaneers interception inside Patriots territory, Bryant hit a 23-yard field goal to increase the score to 27-3. Patriots RB Heath Evans' one-yard touchdown run with 10:20 left in the contest provided the game's final score and was the first touchdown surrendered by the Buccaneers in the preseason.

### **LAST MEETING (REGULAR SEASON)**

#### **New England 35, Tampa Bay 7 (10/25/09)**

**LONDON** – Playing out of the country for the first time in team history during the regular season, Tampa Bay trailed New England by two touchdowns in London as it entered the second half but was unable to cut into the lead. The Patriots grabbed an early 7-0 lead on the Buccaneers first drive of the game as S Brandon Meriweather intercepted QB Josh Johnson and ran 39 yards for a touchdown. Tampa Bay entered New England territory on its next possession, but Johnson was again picked off by Meriweather to end the threat. New England increased its lead to 14-0 late in the first quarter as QB Tom Brady hit WR Wes Welker for a 14-yard touchdown. Early in the second quarter, New England threatened to increase its lead, but S Tanard Jackson picked off Brady in the end zone. However, the Buccaneers were forced to punt on the resulting possession and three plays later, Brady hit WR Sam Aiken on a short pass over the middle that he turned into a 54-yard catch-and-run for a score and a 21-0 lead for the Patriots. Tampa Bay got on the board just before halftime as Johnson hit WR Antonio Bryant for a 33-yard score to trim the lead to 21-7. New England went back up by three touchdowns on the first drive of the second half as Brady hit TE Ben Watson for a 35-yard touchdown for the only scoring of the third quarter. Following a 10-play, 89-yard drive early in the fourth quarter, the Patriots put the game away as RB Laurence Maroney ran in from one yard out to make the score 35-7. Following the Patriots final score, rookie QB Josh Freeman made his professional debut as he engineered the Buccaneers final two drives.

The Patriots scored a pair of touchdowns during a span of 2:52 in the third quarter, when Ken Toler recovered a fumble in the end zone for a score and RB Tony Collins scored on a two-yard run for the go-ahead touchdown... QB Jerry Golsteyn completed 8-of-11 passes for 120 yards and two touchdowns in a 41-21 rout over the Patriots (8/26/83)... WR Theo Bell hauled in three receptions for 116 yards, including a 69-yard scoring strike from QB Jack Thompson... Tampa Bay erupted for 35 second-half points in a 44-10 drubbing of New England (8/18/90)... The Buccaneers posted a pair of defensive touchdowns on S Thomas Everett's 33-yard interception return and LB Broderick Thomas' 56-yard fumble return... Tampa Bay posted its highest preseason point total ever en route to a 45-14 win at Raymond James Stadium (8/28/99)... The Bucs gained 436 total yards in the contest and did not commit a turnover... RB Warrick Dunn rushed for 115 yards on 12 carries in Tampa Bay's 20-3 win vs. New England (8/25/01)... QB Brad Johnson threw scoring passes to RB Aaron Stecker and WR Jacquez Green... RB Kenneth Darby led all rushers with 84 yards on 15 carries in a 13-10 win over New England (8/10/07)... K Matt Bryant hit a game-winning 32-yard field goal as time expired... The Buccaneers took the lead early and never surrendered it as they went on to defeat the Patriots 27-10 (8/17/2008)... Tampa Bay's

defense held the Patriots to 174 total yards of offense on its way to the seventh straight preseason victory against the Patriots.

## 2011 SLATE

The Buccaneers' 2011 schedule will feature eight games against teams that finished the 2010 season with a .500 record or better, including seven games against teams that made the 2010 playoffs. Tampa Bay will face off against the NFC North and AFC South, as well as the Dallas Cowboys (home) of the NFC East and the NFC West's San Francisco 49ers (away). The schedule is based on a formula that was implemented with realignment in 2002. It includes home and away games against the three divisional opponents, four games against teams from another division within its conference on a rotating three-year cycle, four games against teams from a division in the other conference on a rotating four-year cycle and two intraconference games based on the prior year's standings against teams from the same conference divisions that are not scheduled to play that season.

## YOUNGRY

After finishing last season with a 10-6 record and barely missing a playoff berth — a spot that went to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Green Bay Packers — the young and hungry Buccaneers are determined not to be denied again this year. Though the team has 72 players on their 90 man roster that are 25 years of age or younger, youth has never been an excuse for a lack of success in Tampa Bay. Not only have the Buccaneers stockpiled emerging talent over the past two years, they have also seen major production from those players. In a recent *Football Outsiders* analysis, Tampa Bay was ranked as having the best under-25 talent in the league. A multitude of the factors went into the ranking, including the number of games in 2010 started by players under the age of 25, a team's recent track record of developing and retaining young talent and whether or not a team has a talented, young quarterback, among other calculations.

The team's quick rise in 2010 was due in large part to skill position players, such as second-year QB **Josh Freeman** and rookies RB **LeGarrette Blount** and WR **Mike Williams**. Amongst NFL rookies, Blount led the League in rushing yardage while Williams led in receiving yardage, the first time rookie teammates have recorded that feat since 1968 (Cincinnati, Bob Trumpy and Paul Robinson). As impressive as Blount and Williams' accomplishments were given their rookie status, Freeman, at 23 years old, is even younger than both.

Freeman finished last season among the League's best quarterbacks, passing for 3,451 yards, 25 touchdowns and only six interceptions ranking as the sixth-highest rated quarterback in the NFL. He earned a two FedEx Air NFL Player of the Week awards and two NFC Offensive Player of the Week awards, as well as being named a finalist for the NFLPA PULSE award for emerging player.

Blount was claimed off of waivers from the Tennessee Titans, and despite starting in only seven games, totaled 1,007 yards rushing on 201 carries on the season. He was awarded the FedEx Ground Player of the Week in Week 16 against Seattle, and then named the NFL

Offensive Rookie of the Month for December/January following his League-leading 511 yards in the final five games of the season.

Williams led all rookie receivers in 2010 in yardage (964), receptions (65), and touchdowns (11), the last of which broke the Buccaneers record for most receiving touchdowns in team history (Joey Galloway, 10 in 2005). He became the first rookie wide receiver to start for Tampa Bay on opening day since 1990. Williams and Blount were also both named to the NFL All-Rookie Team by The Sporting News and the All-Rookie Team by the PFW/PFWA.

The production didn't end there, as 2010 first-round draft pick DT **Gerald McCoy** started the first 13 games before being sidelined by a bicep injury, recording 43 tackles, 3.0 sacks, six tackles for loss, 17 quarterback pressures, five passes defended and one forced fumble. Seventh-round picks S **Cody Grimm** and LB **Dekoda Watson** also saw extended action throughout the season, making an impact on the defensive side of the ball. Grimm started nine games at safety, recording 61 tackles two interceptions and two passes defended before suffering a broken leg against Baltimore (11/28) and Watson was a major contributor on special teams, finishing second on the team with 19 special teams tackles.

In all, the Buccaneers played 10 rookies in each of the final 12 games and started at least five rookies in 10 of the last 11 games while four of the team's nine draft picks earned starting roles. Tampa Bay also became the first team to start 10+ different rookies in a single season and finish with a winning record since the merger in 1970 and the first to start seven rookies in one game and win since 2002. The Buccaneers led the NFL in touchdowns by rookies (21), while also earning 12 Pepsi Rookie of the Week nominations from five different players.

### **THE FREE-CHISE**

Entering his third NFL season and just his second full season as Tampa Bay's starting quarterback; **Josh Freeman** is already establishing himself as one of the league's most prolific young passers. Freeman has gladly taken on a leadership role and after a promising rookie season, and he continued in 2010 with a standout sophomore campaign. Over his last 19 starts, Freeman has gone 12-7 record and has won eight of his last 10 road games. Last season, Freeman became the first quarterback under the age of 23 to lead his team to a 10-win season since Pittsburgh Steelers QB Ben Roethlisberger in 2004.

In just his second year as a pro, Freeman established one of the best seasons for a quarterback in Tampa Bay history. His 25 touchdowns were the second-most in a single season in team history and his 3,451 passing yards were the fourth-most in a single-season by a Buccaneer. Five of those touchdown passes occurred on a career and record setting day against Seattle (12/26/10), as Freeman became the youngest quarterback (22 years) since Dan Marino (22 years) on September 2, 1984 to throw five touchdown passes and zero interception. Freeman became just the second quarterback in Buccaneers' history to record 3,000+ yards passing, 20+ passing touchdowns and 10 or less interceptions in the same season along with QB Brad Johnson in 2002 (3,049 passing yards, 22 touchdowns and six interceptions). He is also just the sixth Buccaneer quarterback in team history to have a 3,000+ yard passing season. With two touchdown passes at New Orleans in Week 17, Freeman also set a franchise mark for the most consecutive games with a touchdowns pass (13).

Freeman was also smart with the football last season, ranking tied for third in the NFL and first in the NFC for the fewest interceptions thrown. With only six interceptions, he becomes just the second quarterback in NFL history under the age of 23 to throw six-or-fewer

interceptions in a season with 200+ attempts (also Dan Marino 1983). He currently has a streak of 109 consecutive passes without an interception.

In 2011, ESPN debuted a new Total Quarterback Rating or QBR. The QBR is a statistical measure that incorporates the contexts and details of throws by quarterbacks and what they mean for wins. It's built from the team level down to the quarterback, to better understand first what each play means to the team, then give credit to the quarterback for what happened on that play based on what he contributed. Based on these new calculations, Freeman ranked eighth in Total QBR in 2010.

### **ABC = ALWAYS BE CLOSING**

Never one to fear a deficit, seven of QB **Josh Freeman's** 13 career victories have been fourth quarter/OT comeback wins (53.8%), including five last season, the most in the NFL. Freeman's seven fourth quarter/OT comeback victories in his first 25 starts, tied for the most in a player's first two seasons in NFL history with Peyton Manning (seven in 31 games played) and Jake Plummer (seven in 25 games played).

### **ROOKIE REVIVAL**

In last year's 31-16 victory over Carolina in Week 10, the Buccaneers became the first team to start seven rookies (WR Arrelious Benn, S Cody Grimm, G Ted Larsen, FB Erik Lorig, DT Gerald McCoy, LB Dekoda Watson, WR Mike Williams) and win a game since the Dallas Cowboys defeated the Jacksonville Jaguars, 21-19, on November 24, 2002. Of the seven rookies, three were seventh-round picks from last year's draft, including the first career starts of FB Erik Lorig and LB Dekoda Watson. The team also had five additional rookies play in the game (RB LeGarrette Blount, T Derek Hardman, P Robert Malone, WR Preston Parker and DT Al Woods), four of which had gone undrafted.

In Week 16 against Seattle (12/26), the Buccaneers did one better, as they earned a 38-17 win to guarantee a winning season, becoming the first team to start 10 different rookies in a season and finish with a winning season since the 1970 merger (excluding the 1987 strike season). They are also the first team since 2004 (Tennessee Titans) to start 10+ different rookies in the same season.

In all, the team played at least 10 rookies in each game for the final 12 games and started at least five rookies in 10 of the final 11 games in 2010.

Rookies made a huge impact on Tampa Bay's success last season, starting on Opening Day when Tampa Bay featured seven players making their NFL debuts in the season-opening 17-14 win against Cleveland (9/7), which included six members of the 2010 NFL Draft class.

A pair of rookies, including first-round pick (third overall) DT **Gerald McCoy** and fourth-round pick (101st overall) WR **Mike Williams** both made their debuts in the starting lineup, marking the first time since 2007 that two or more rookies started in the season opener. Along with McCoy and Williams, Buccaneer draft picks WR Arrelious Benn, S Cody Grimm, LB Dekoda Watson and DT Brian Price all saw their first action in the NFL.

### **A FOOT FOR ALL SEASONS**

On July 29, 2011 the Buccaneers added a key piece to their special teams unit by signing free-agent punter **Michael Koenen**, of the Atlanta Falcons. Entering his sixth NFL season, Koenen will handle punting and place kicking duties for Tampa Bay. In the ongoing battle for field position, Koenen's services will be extremely valuable during the upcoming season, in which the NFL has moved the kickoff point forward from the 30 to the 35 yard line. In his Buccaneers debut, Koenen had one punt for 40 yards and three kickoffs, two resulting in touchbacks and one which saw the Chiefs starting from their own eight yard line.

Last season, Koenen was one of the League's best when taking away the threat of an opposing teams return game with 24 of his 74 punts fair caught, ranking second in the NFL. He also placed 29 of his punts inside the 20, ranking tied for eighth in the League. On kickoffs, Koenen was equally effective, as he ranked first in the NFL in average opponent starting field position after a kickoff (22.2 yard-line). He also ranked third in the NFL for kickoffs to reach the endzone (48) and seventh in percent of kickoffs to result in touchbacks (26.4).

Since entering the League in 2005, Koenen has placed 150 punts inside the 20, tied for eighth among punters in that time span and ranks third in the NFL in both touchbacks off of kickoffs (106) and touchback percentage (23.6), behind only K Olindo Mare and K Sebastian Janikowski.

### **UDRAFTED ≠ UNWANTED**

With the NFL expanding preseason rosters to 90 players this year, more undrafted players than ever are fighting to secure a spots on a team's final 53 man roster. The Buccaneers have been one of the best in the League at finding value amongst the undrafted. Tampa Bay's final roster last season had 24 players who originally entered the League as undrafted rookie free agents and have totaled 460 games played, including 121 starts among them. The group included major contributors, such as K **Connor Barth**, RB **LeGarrette Blount**, RB **Earnest Graham**, LS **Andrew Economos**, CB **Elbert Mack**, T **Donald Penn** and WR **Micheal Spurlock**. Last season, Penn was one of 23 undrafted players in NFL to make the Pro Bowl.

## **2011 DRAFT**

Tampa Bay made eight selections in the 2011 NFL Draft. Below are quick looks at the newest members of the Buccaneers.

DE **Adrian Clayborn** was selected in the first round (20th overall) of the 2011 NFL Draft by the Buccaneers. He is the first player from the University of Iowa to be selected by Tampa Bay and the first defensive end in Iowa football history to be taken in the first round. Clayborn was one of six defensive ends drafted in the first round of the 2011 NFL Draft, tying for the most players at any one position to be taken in the first round in League history. In 2010, he earned consensus All-American honors (AFCA, Walter Camp, Associated Press), was an All-Big Ten Conference first-team selection and finished the year as a finalist for the Ted Hendricks (Top Defensive End) and Rotary Lombardi (Top Defensive Lineman) Awards. Clayborn also earned MVP honors at the 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl and served as a member of the Hawkeyes' Leadership Group during his sophomore, junior and senior years. He was a two-time team captain at Iowa, starting in 37-of-50 games played during his career, including his last 30 consecutive games. Clayborn recorded 192 tackles in his collegiate career, in addition to 19.0 sacks, 37.5 TFL, seven forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

DE **Da'Quan Bowers** was selected by the Buccaneers in the second round (51st overall) of the 2011 NFL Draft. A product of Clemson University, Bowers' three-year career saw him start 30 of 38 games, recording 150 tackles, 19.5 sacks, 46 tackles for loss, four passes defended, 26 quarterback pressures, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries and an interception. He left his mark in the Clemson record books, establishing a school record by recording at least one sack in nine consecutive games during the 2010 season, where his 15.5 total sacks led the nation and also shattered the previous school record for single-season sacks. He also finished with the eight-most career tackles for loss and ninth-most career sacks in Clemson history. In 2010, he became the first Tiger to garner the Nagurski (Top Defensive Player) and Hendricks trophies. Like Clayborn, Bowers was awarded consensus All-American first-team honors in 2010, in addition to being named the ACC Defensive Player of the Year and earning All-ACC first-team honors.

LB **Mason Foster** was Tampa Bay's third round (84th overall) selection in the 2011 NFL Draft. He joins the team as a four-year starter and senior-year captain from the University of Washington. He started 41 of 50 games during his collegiate career, finishing with 378 career tackles, 38.5 tackles for loss, 10.5 sacks, 15 passes defended, eight forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries, one blocked kick, four interceptions—including one for a touchdown. His 163 tackles in 2010 ranked first in the Pac-10 and second in the nation, and he was

named the Defensive MVP of the 2010 Holiday Bowl. He was also named first-team All-Pac-10 and earned All-American honors from Scout.com (first-team), Rivals.com (first-team), the Associated Press (third-team) and SportsIllustrated.com (honorable mention) during his senior season.

TE **Luke Stocker** was selected in the fourth round (104th overall) of the 2011 NFL Draft by the Buccaneers. Stocker was selected at the third-highest position of any Tennessee tight end in NFL Draft history (Jason Witten, 69th, 2003; Brad Cottom, 76th, 2008) and is first tight end drafted by the Buccaneers since 2006. Stocker started in 38-of-52 games played, including the last 38 games of his Tennessee career. He set a Tennessee record for position players by competing in all 52 games of his collegiate career. He was named a 2010 Mackey Award Semifinalist (nation's top tight end), All-SEC second-team by Phil Steele and was selected to the 2011 Senior Bowl. Stocker recorded 85 receptions for 956 yards and eight touchdowns during his career.

S **Ahmad Black** was selected by the Buccaneers in the fifth round (151st overall) of the 2011 NFL Draft. Black appeared in 48 games with 39 starts during his four-year career at Florida. In 2010, he was named first-team All-American by Rivals.com, Associated Press second-team All-American, Sports Illustrated honorable mention All-American, first-team All-SEC and also to the SEC Football Community Service Team. Black amassed 244 total career tackles, recorded 13 interceptions, 15 passes defensed and 2.0 sacks over his career. Black tied for first in the country among active players in interceptions returned for touchdowns in 2010 with three. He was named 2011 Outback Bowl Most Valuable Player following Florida's victory over Penn State, recording six tackles and a career-high two interceptions, one of which he returned 80 yards for a touchdown.

RB **Allen Bradford** was the Buccaneers' 6th round (187th overall) selection of the 2011 NFL Draft. He finished his career at the University of Southern California playing in 52 games with 1,585 yards rushing on 267 carries (5.9 avg.) and 16 touchdowns. He also recorded 14 receptions for 176 yards and four touchdowns. Last season, Bradford had his best collegiate season, recording three 100-yard rushing games with a pair of 200-yard games, as his 7.2 yards per carry average (794 yards on 110 carries) was second in the nation.

CB **Anthony Gaitor** was selected in the 7th round (222nd overall) of the 2011 NFL Draft by the Buccaneers. Upon his selection, Gaitor became just the third player ever drafted from Florida International University. He finished his career as Florida International's all-time leader in interception returns for touchdown (three) and second in interceptions (11). He was a three-time All-Sun Belt Conference first-team selection and three-time Sun Belt Conference Defensive Player of the Week. A four-year starter, Gaitor started 48-of-49 games played for FIU and recorded 197 tackles, 3.0 sacks, 19.0 TFL, 36 passes defensed, one forced fumble and three fumble recoveries.

TE **Daniel Hardy** was selected by the Buccaneers in the 7th round (235th overall) of the 2011 NFL Draft. He recorded 80 receptions for 1,364 yards and six touchdowns during his career with the Vandals, and is the first player from the University of Idaho to be selected by the Buccaneers. As a senior in 2010, he finished second among all of Idaho's receivers with 32 receptions for 545 yards and one touchdown, despite playing in only eight games due to a broken arm that forced him to miss the final five contests. Hardy was also named second-team All-WAC and was a semifinalist for the 2010 Mackey Award, which honors the nation's top tight end.

## AROUND THE CORNER

After missing his entire rookie season in 2009 due to a shoulder injury, CB **E.J. Biggers** boasted one of the strongest success rates by NFL cornerbacks in 2010 based on a unique statistic calculated by *Football Outsiders*.

The Cornerback Success Rate statistic, as defined by the Football Outsiders, is "the percentage of passes that don't manage to get at least 45 percent of needed yards on first down, 60 percent of needed yards on second down, or 100 percent of needed yards on third down."

Among all cornerbacks with at least 40 charted pass attempts their way, Biggers ranked seventh in the league with a 63% Success Rate, seven percent behind top-ranked Darrelle Revis of the New York Jets. Biggers defended 65 charted targets in 2010 and limited his targets to only 5.7 yards per pass, the 12th lowest in the league. Buccaneer teammate CB **Ronde Barber** also fared strongly in the yards per pass category, holding his targets to the NFL's eighth-lowest rate of 5.5 yards per pass.

Biggers' targets averaged 2.9 yards after contact on an average pass distance of 13.3 yards.

The seventh-round selection out of Western Michigan played in all 16 games for the Buccaneers last year, starting in six, as he recorded 53 tackles and collected his first career interception in his first career start.

## TURNING THE TIDE

After finishing the 2009 season with a 3-13 record, the 2010 Buccaneers under the direction of Head Coach **Raheem Morris** and General Manager **Mark Dominik**, recorded the best single-season turnaround in franchise history after going 10-6, giving the team a seven game improvement. The Buccaneers were also part of a record-tying season in the NFL, as 13 teams recorded at least 10 wins in 2010.

### **STRENGTH OF THE SOUTH**

Over the previous nine seasons, one could argue that the toughest division in the NFL is the NFC South. Since realignment in 2002, the NFC South is one of two divisions in the NFC and is one of only three divisions in the NFL to have every team earn a division championship. The NFC West and the AFC West are the only other divisions to have all four teams earn a division championship since realignment. The NFC South has also been represented a League-best six times in a conference championship game and are tied for a League-best three times in the Super Bowl along with the AFC East and AFC North. They have also sent the most different teams to the Super Bowl of any division, sending three different teams (Tampa Bay, Carolina, New Orleans) and have the most different teams to win a Super Bowl, two (Tampa Bay, New Orleans), since 2002. The NFC South has been led by the Buccaneers, who have won three division crowns in nine years.

Last season, the NFC South recorded another impressive feat, as they were the only division to have three teams finish with a winning record, as they had three of the four teams finish with a double-digit win total (Atlanta – 13-3; New Orleans – 11-5; Tampa Bay – 10-6). It marks just the second time, dating back to realignment in 2002, that a division has had three teams with double-digit wins in the same season (also the AFC south in 2007).

In 2008, the NFC South again showed its overall strength, as it finished as one of only three divisions in the League to have three of its four teams with a record of 9-7 or better (also AFC East and NFC East) and is one of two divisions to have all of its teams at 8-8 or better (also NFC East). The NFC South also finished with a remarkable 27-5 overall home record in 2008, the best combined home winning percentage by a division in NFL history (.844), with the next best division last season, the NFC East, holding an 23-9 record at home. The South was also a near-perfect 11-1 at home when facing other South division opponents in 2008. The Bucs contributed significantly to that mark, as they finished 6-2 at home, winning their first six games at Raymond James Stadium in 2008.

### **BILL WALSH NFL MINORITY FELLOWSHIP COACHES**

Tampa Bay will continue its longstanding relationship with the NFL's Minority Fellowship Program during this year's Training Camp. The Buccaneers have enjoyed repeated success working with the NFL, both with participants in the program and hiring graduates of the NFL program.

Established in 1987, the **BILL WALSH NFL MINORITY COACHING FELLOWSHIP** provides NFL training camp positions to minority coaches every year. The program, which was named after the man who conceived the idea – late Pro Football Hall of Fame head coach **Bill Walsh** – exposes talented minority college coaches to the methods and philosophies of summer NFL training camps. Walsh introduced the concept to the League in 1987 when he brought a group of minority coaches into his San Francisco 49ers' training camp.

As a part of Training Camp coaching staffs, the fellowship coaches perform duties that mirror those of full-time NFL assistant coaches. They become working members of NFL staffs for the summer and are responsible for specific assignments, including planning and

directing workouts, formulating scrimmage and preseason game strategies, breaking down videotape, and evaluating players. More than 1,500 coaches have worked in the Training Camps of NFL teams since the program's inception in 1987.

This year, the Buccaneers' two Bill Walsh NFL Minority Fellowship Program coaches are Darnell Dinkins and Lance Schulters.

## **2011 MINORITY FELLOWSHIP INTERNS**

### **DARNELL DINKINS**

Dinkins will be the Buccaneers offensive intern and will work primarily with tight ends. He played with the N.Y. Giants, Baltimore Ravens, Cleveland Browns and New Orleans Saints over the course of his eight-year career, earning a Super Bowl win with the Saints in 2009.

Dinkins entered the League with the New York Giants in 2002 as a free agent and was allocated to NFL Europe, where he played for the Rhein Fire. He made his NFL debut against the San Francisco 49ers on September 5, 2002. Dinkins played in 89 career games with 15 starts for the Giants, Ravens, Browns and Saints, recording 30 receptions for 250 yards and four touchdowns.

Dinkins played college football at the University of Pittsburgh, where he started at free safety for three years and also saw time at wide receiver and linebacker. His best collegiate season came in 1998, where he started all 11 games at free safety, finishing second on the team with 78 tackles, while also posting six pass deflections, 2 quarterback hurries and one forced fumble.

A standout quarterback and linebacker at Schenley High School in Pittsburgh, Dinkins was named City League MVP by both the Pittsburgh Post Gazette and the Pittsburgh Courier and was a member of the 1995 Big 33 Team. As a senior, he rushed for 435 yards and three touchdowns on 26 carries and threw 113 passes for 1,256 yards and ten touchdowns. On defense, he had 86 tackles, three knockdowns, four sacks and four fumble recoveries (one for a touchdown).

Dinkins, who earned a college degree in criminology, has also worked as a sports commentator for the University of Pittsburgh Panthers on both 93.7 The Fan and on Pitt Panthers Television.

### **LANCE SCHULTERS**

Schulters will be the Buccaneers defensive intern and will work primarily with the defensive backs. He played with the San Francisco 49ers, Tennessee Titans, Miami Dolphins, and Atlanta Falcons over the course of his 10-year career.

Drafted by San Francisco in the fourth round of the 1998 NFL draft, Schulters played his first four years in the NFL with the 49ers, earning the starting free safety position after the first week of the 1999 season. He had six interceptions for 127 yards in 1999 including a 64-yard interception returned for the game-winning touchdown against New Orleans. For his efforts, Schulters was selected to the NFL's Pro Bowl in Honolulu that year.

After another All-Pro season in 2002, Schulters signed with Tennessee, where he played three seasons with the Titans before moving on to the Miami Dolphins and Atlanta Falcons.

The former Hofstra star finished his NFL career with 97 starts in 121 games played, recording 19 interceptions, 583 tackles, 7.5 sacks, and 24 passes defensed.

Schulters is a graduate of Canarsie High School in Brooklyn, where he played for legendary coach Mike Camardese. After high school, he played two seasons at Nassau Community College before transferring to Hofstra University, where he was a two-year starter in 1996-97.

Schulters, who was born on May 27, 1975 in Guyana, will be the defensive backs coach for Bryant University this year.

### **CURRENT BUCCANEERS COACHES**

Two current Buccaneer coaches are graduates of the NFL’s Minority Coaching Fellowship.

Head Coach **Raheem Morris** enters his ninth season with the Buccaneers and third as Head Coach after re-joining the team following a stint as defensive coordinator at Kansas State University in 2006. Morris, who was a defensive intern with the N.Y. Jets in 2001, as part of the NFL’s Minority Coaching Fellowship program, spent his first four seasons with the Buccaneers as defensive quality control coach (2002), defensive assistant (2003) and assistant defensive backs coach (2004-05).

**Alfredo Roberts** enters his third season with the Buccaneers as the tight ends coach. Before joining Tampa Bay, Roberts spent time with the Cleveland Browns and Jacksonville Jaguars. He is also a veteran of three minority coaching internships, one with the Washington Redskins in 2000 and two with the Miami Dolphins in 2001 and 2002.

Morris is one of six current NFL head coaches – **Leslie Frazier** (Minnesota Vikings), **Hue Jackson** (Oakland Raiders), **Marvin Lewis** (Cincinnati Bengals), **Lovie Smith** (Chicago Bears) and **Mike Tomlin** (Pittsburgh Steelers) are the others – who are graduates of the program.

“It was a great opportunity to get in, to get involved with people who were in the NFL world, to establish myself and establish some of the relationships with the people that I met with the Jets,” says Morris. “If you’re willing to learn, become a sponge, it’s awesome. It helped my career tremendously.”

## YOUTH AT THE HELM

The Buccaneers decision to tap **Raheem Morris** as the eighth head coach in franchise history fit in with a League-wide hiring theme in 2009. Morris, now 34, was, at 32, the youngest of those hired in 2009 and remains the youngest head coach in the League.

Morris, in fact, became the fourth-youngest individual hired to coach an NFL team since World War II. He is now one of just two head coaches currently in the League who have yet to celebrate their 40th birthdays, joining Pittsburgh's Mike Tomlin (38).

## TAMPA BAY BUCCANEERS HEAD COACH RAHEEM MORRIS

Raheem Morris—named the eighth head coach in team history on January 17, 2009—enters his third season leading the Buccaneers in 2011.

Morris is currently in his second stint with Tampa Bay, having first joined the team's defensive coaching staff in 2002. He served on staff from 2002-05, then spent the 2006 season as Kansas State's defensive coordinator before returning to the Buccaneers to serve as the defensive backs coach from 2007-08. Morris has quickly risen through the coaching ranks during his time with Tampa Bay, serving as defensive quality control coach in 2002, defensive assistant in 2003 and assistant defensive backs coach from 2004-2005 before taking over as defensive backs coach in 2007. During his first stretch with the club, he worked closely with former Buccaneers defensive backs coach and current Steelers head coach Mike Tomlin in the development of one of the NFL's top secondaries.

Morris, the youngest head coach in the League in 2010, also directed the season's youngest team, with Tampa Bay's final 53-man roster featuring 29 players in their rookie, first or second years in the NFL. In fact, the Morris-led "Young Bucs" became the first team since the merger in 1970 to start 10+ rookies and finish the season with a winning record, as the team turned in an exciting 10-6 performance, narrowly missing a playoff berth. The seven-game swing from a 3-13 season in 2009 marked the best single-season turnaround in team

history and the best turnaround in the NFL for 2010. Six of the Buccaneers' wins were on the road, including a 21-0 shutout at San Francisco in Week 11 and a 23-13 victory over NFC South rival New Orleans in Week 17 to close the season.

While Tampa Bay was beset by injuries throughout the 2010 season, with eight starters—including some of the team's most productive players—being placed on Injured Reserve, Morris' "next man up" philosophy was fully embraced by his team. Rookies and backups heeded Morris' call, filling in and stepping up whenever needed, as evidenced by the offensive line, which fielded eight different starting lineups throughout the season, but still kept QB Josh Freeman on his feet and paved the way for a 1,000-yard rushing season by rookie RB LeGarrette Blount, while also earning Madden Most Valuable Protector honors in Week 16.

In his inaugural head coaching season in 2009, Morris took over the defensive reins after the first 10 games of the season and dramatically improved the performance on that side of the ball. Prior to its 11th game, the team ranked 27th in overall defense (378.9 ypg), 32nd in rushing defense (168.9 ypg), 14th in pass defense (209.4 ypg) and 31st in scoring defense (29.4 ppg). In the final six weeks of the season under Morris' direction, the team ranked 15th in overall defense (356.0 ypg), tied for 26th in rush defense (140.3 ypg), 12th in pass defense (204.0 ypg) and most impressively, ninth in scoring defense (17.7 ppg). The Buccaneers finished the year 10th overall in pass defense, marking the sixth time in seven seasons with Morris on the staff that the Buccaneers defense ranked in the Top 10 in pass defense.

Morris led the Buccaneers to two wins in the final three contests of the 2009 campaign, including a 20-17 upset victory over the eventual Super Bowl Champion New Orleans Saints at the Superdome on December 27. Trailing 17-0 in the second quarter, Tampa Bay scored 20 unanswered points to win in overtime. The 17-point comeback tied for the second-largest comeback in team history, and it also marked the first time in NFL history that a team that was 10 or more games below .500 defeated a team that was 10 or more games above .500.

Morris has helped shape one of the NFL's best defenses over the past decade. Since 1996, the Buccaneers defense has produced 36 Pro Bowlers, the second-most in the NFL, and finished as the NFL's top-ranked defense twice (2002 and 2005). The past 14 seasons have also seen the Buccaneers defense rank in the Top 10 on 11 occasions and in the Top 5 eight times.

During his nine seasons in Tampa Bay, the Bucs have finished ranked in the Top 5 in the NFL in total defense five times, including No. 1 rankings in 2002 and 2005. Additionally, the defense finished as the top-ranked pass defense on three occasions (2002, 2004 and 2007) and seventh or better in seven of nine seasons with Morris on the staff. In 2002, his first season as a coach in the NFL, Morris helped guide the Buccaneers top-ranked defense as they captured the franchise's first world title in Super Bowl XXXVII.

In Morris' final season as the defensive backs coach in 2008, Tampa Bay's defense finished the year ranked fourth in the NFL against the pass. At the time, the accomplishment marked the fifth time in six seasons with Morris on the staff that the Buccaneers defensive unit ranked in the Top 5 in pass defense. After Tampa Bay fell to 19th in the NFL in pass defense in 2006, Morris led a resurgence during his return in 2007, guiding the Buccaneers pass defense to the League's top ranking en route to the NFC South division title. The Buccaneers secondary helped limit opposing quarterbacks to a 76.2 rating in 2007, ranking eighth in the NFL after previously ranking 29th in 2006.

In his lone season with Kansas State in 2006, Morris coordinated a defense that displayed improvement in several statistical categories from the previous season, including total defense, scoring defense and pass defense. He oversaw a Wildcat defense that included seven players who received conference recognition, including two first-team All-Big 12 honorees and one second-team selection.

Morris joined Tampa Bay after spending the 2000 and 2001 seasons as defensive backs coach at Hofstra University. He also spent time in the fall of 2001 with the New York Jets, serving a defensive minority internship.

Morris began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at Hofstra in 1998, where he was responsible for coaching the offensive scout team, developing scouting reports and handling video breakdown and computer input and analysis. He then landed at Cornell University as defensive backs coach and special teams assistant for the 1999 season.

Morris has focused his community efforts on education and promoting the importance of academics amongst Bay area youth. In 2009, Morris started his "Be the Ultimate Character Student" (BUCS) program. The initiative is designed to teach students lessons on education and athletics as they relate to leadership, determination and character. Throughout the regular season, students from Hillsborough and Pinellas counties are recorded asking Morris' opinion on a variety of on and off-the-field topics. Morris then records video podcasts on the Monday following each home game, utilizing his own experiences during the football season to answer the questions and relate messages about perseverance, integrity, commitment and, ultimately, the importance of making the most of one's educational opportunities. The video podcasts air in middle and high schools in Hillsborough and Pinellas County School Districts, where teachers can display the podcast on the classroom monitors and work Morris' message into their day's curriculum. On the weeks during the Buccaneers' away games, schools work on their own character education curriculum, which is reinforced by Coach Morris' character-building message.

In May 2011, Morris and Buccaneers Director of Player Development Eric Vance hosted the inaugural Buccaneers University Student-Athlete Transition Program. The free, interactive event was created for high school athletes preparing to play college football and focused on career development, decision-making, media preparation, time management and other important skills to help students succeed at the next level of play. Students learned from Morris, assistant coaches, team officials and former college players as they discussed real-life issues to prepare for college.

Morris' commitment to youth development extends through a variety of outreach efforts. In 2010 and 2011, he presented "Bucs for Books" scholarships to graduating high school students to assist with academic-related costs for college. Morris has also visited Middleton High School, Sulphur Springs Elementary School, and Walton Academy for the Performing Arts to reinforce the importance of scholastic achievement and encourage high performance in the classroom. In the past two years, he has dedicated a new Play 60 Zone at LaVoy Exceptional Center and Carver Exceptional Center in Tampa to support the physical fitness and academic development of Tampa's neediest students. Additionally, he has helped surprise two deserving single mothers with a brand new car through the Buccaneers' "Road to Success" program, been a guest speaker at the Hillsborough County Public Schools SERVE awards for local teachers, and helped dedicate the grand opening of the First Tee Learning Center at the Rogers Park Golf Course in Tampa.

Along with his passion for youth education, Morris helps raise funds and awareness for cancer research, heart disease, and youth athletics, among many other causes. He actively

supports the charitable efforts and player foundations of current and former Buccaneers, and regularly volunteers for team community relations events and initiatives throughout the year.

Morris played collegiately as a safety at Hofstra from 1994-1997, and received his Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. Morris, who hails from Irvington, New Jersey, was presented the Key to the City in his hometown during "Raheem Morris Day" on June 5, 2009.

### **NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS HEAD COACH BILL BELICHICK**

Bill Belichick is in his 37<sup>th</sup> season as an NFL coach and is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl championships in a four-year span. In 2007, he became the first NFL head coach to guide his team to a 16-0 regular season. He was hired by Chairman and CEO Robert Kraft on Jan. 27, 2000 and is in his 12th season as Patriots head coach in 2011.

In his 11 seasons in New England, Belichick has delivered three Super Bowl championships, four conference titles, eight division crowns and 14 playoff victories. He has won more regular-season games (121) and more games overall (135) during a ten-year stretch (2001-2010) than any other head coach in NFL history. Belichick directed the Patriots to victories in Super Bowls XXXVI (2001), XXXVIII (2003) and XXXIX (2004), and claimed the 2007 AFC Championship. New England's 14 playoff victories in the 2000s are tied for the highest total in any decade in NFL history. Additionally, Belichick currently ranks 10th all time with 177 total victories as a head coach. His winning percentage of .639 ranks third in NFL history among coaches with 150 or more wins, trailing only George Halas (.682) and Don Shula (.666).

In 2010, Coach Belichick led a very young squad to an NFL-best 14-2 record, a division title, its eighth playoff appearance in his 11 seasons as New England's head coach and received several major awards in the process. Belichick was named Associated Press Coach of the Year for the third time, joining Don Shula (four-time winner) and Chuck Knox as the only three-time winners. In addition, Belichick earned Peter King's SI.com and Pro Football Weekly Coach of the Year.

### **2011 PRESEASON SCHEDULE**

Tampa Bay kicked off its preseason schedule on Friday, August 12, with a nationally-televised game on FOX, as the team earned a 25-0 win over the hosting Kansas City Chiefs. It was the fourth straight year the Buccaneers opened on the road and the second year in a row the team played the Chiefs in the preseason. The Buccaneers now hold a 5-1 advantage in the series, having defeated the Chiefs in each of the last four meetings.

In Week 2 of the preseason (Thursday, August 18), Tampa Bay will host the New England Patriots for the third time in five years, with the Buccaneers earning a 27-10 victory in their last matchup in 2008. Tampa Bay has won the last seven meetings between the two teams and leads the preseason series, 7-1.

The following week (Saturday, August 27), the Buccaneers will continue their longest-running preseason series with the Miami Dolphins at Raymond James Stadium. The Sunshine State's first two football franchises will meet for the 26th time and 11th consecutive year, with the Buccaneers winning five of the last nine preseason meetings. The Dolphins lead the all-time series 16-9 after a 10-7 win last year.

For the first time since 2002 and the 11th time overall, Tampa Bay will face the Redskins in the preseason, as they conclude their exhibition slate. The Buccaneers, who will travel to

Washington for this year's meeting on Thursday, September 1, are tied 5-5 in the all-time series, but are 1-0 in their only other meeting in D.C.

10 News (WTSP-TV) will be the official home of Buccaneers preseason football, and will produce three of the four preseason games in 2011: against New England, against Miami, and at Washington.
