## HEAD COACHES

### JASON GARRETT (7-5, 1st Year)

Jason Garrett was named the eighth head coach in Dallas Cowboys history on January 5, 2011. Garrett became the first former Dallas Cowboys player to become the team's head coach. As a backup quarterback during his playing career in Dallas, he started nine-of-23 games played and was a member of teams that won six division titles and three Super Bowl championships. Garrett was elevated to the Cowboys top job after taking over as the team's interim head coach at the midpoint of the 2010 season. He went on to guide a Dallas team that had started the season with a 1-7 record to a 5-3 mark down the stretch. In the season's second half, three of the Cowboys five victories were against teams that posted 10 regular season wins, while the three Dallas defeats were decided by a combined total of seven points. Since the 2007 season, Garrett had been the Cowboys offensive coordinator under head coach Wade Phillips, and in 2008, he was assigned the additional duties of being the club's assistant head coach. Under Garrett, the Dallas offense has reached high levels of productivity in several categories, and the unit has finished among the NFL's top-10 in total offense in three of his four years at the helm: 2010 (10th), 2009 (2nd), and 2007 (2nd). From the start of the 2007 season, the club has averaged 24.6 points-per-game and 368.5 total yards-per-outing. The team has set single-season records in a handful of categories, and from 2007 to 2009 the cumulative numbers for total net yards (17,753), gross yards (12,761) and passing yards (12,181) represented the best totals over a three-year span in the history of the organization. Garrett returned to Dallas in 2007 as the offensive coordinator. He entered the coaching profession as the quarterbacks coach for two seasons (2005-06) for Nick Saban's first Miami Dolphins club.

### BILL BELICHICK (181-101, 17th Year, NE - 140-55, 12th Year)

Bill Belichick is in his 37th season as an NFL coach and is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl championships in a four-year span. He has won more regular season games (121) and more overall games (135) during a 10-year stretch (2001-10) than any other head coach in NFL history. Belichick is currently ranked 10th on the NFL's all-time list with 181 wins. He was named the Patriots head coach on Jan. 27, 2000. Through 11 seasons in New England, Belichick has claimed three Super Bowl titles, four conference titles, eight division crowns and 14 playoff wins. He directed the Patriots to wins in Super Bowls XXXVI, XXXVIII and XXXIX, and in 2007, he became the first NFL coach to lead a team to a 16-0 regular season record. Only one NFL coach won more Super Bowl titles than Belichick (Chuck Noll, 4), and he is tied with Washington's Joe Gibbs and San Francisco's Bill Walsh for second all-time. Belichick has claimed a winning record in each of his 10 seasons with New England, making the Patriots the only NFL franchise to accomplish the feat in that span. Only one other NFL team with 10 consecutive winning seasons since the 1970 merger was Tom Landry, who led Dallas to 16 straight winning seasons. With his 14-2 finish in 2010, Belichick is the first coach with at least 14 regular season wins in four different seasons. His team also owns records for consecutive games won (21) and consecutive playoff wins (10). Belichick started his coaching career as a special assistant with the Baltimore Colts (1975). He then was the assistant special teams coach in Detroit (1976-77), followed by stops in Denver (1978) and with the N.Y. Giants (1979-1990). He was Cleveland's head coach in 1991 then joined New England in 1996. He then coached the Jets (1997-99) before returning to the Patriots in 2000.

## DALLAS vs. AFC

This week's game at New England is Dallas' second inter-conference game of the season. Dallas is 0-1 against the AFC so far in 2011 after dropping the season opener at the N.Y. Jets.

On the horizon, Dallas closes out its AFC schedule with a pair of home contests. The first pits the Cowboys against the Bills on Nov. 13 followed by a Thanksgiving Day matchup with the Dolphins.

Since 1970, the Cowboys boast the NFC's highest winning percentage (.564) when facing an AFC team. Philadelphia is second (.550), San Francisco third (.545), New York fourth (.514) and St. Louis fifth (.506). Dallas' 84 wins against AFC teams are second behind San Francisco's 85 for the most wins by an NFC team when facing the AFC.

## BYE-BYE BYE

This week's game at the New England Patriots marks the 23rd game for Dallas following a regular season bye week. Since 1990 when the bye week was installed, the Cowboys hold an impressive 16-6 record in games following the bye. Dallas enjoyed a streak of five consecutive wins coming out of the bye week until losing to Tennessee last year coming out of the bye week.. The club's longest win streak following a bye is eight games (1993-1999) which includes the 1993 season in which the team had two bye weeks.

Dallas has played on the road 13 times following its bye week, compiling a 9-4 record in those games. Currently, Dallas has won its last five road games coming off the bye.

## BYE WEEK BENEFITS

Since the NFL instituted a bye week in the 1990 season, the Cowboys have enjoyed a 16-6 record following a week off. Dallas' 16 wins tie the third-most wins in the league following a bye week, and the club's .727 win percentage also ties for third:

## FIRST TIME...LAST TIME

The first time these two clubs met was the first-ever game at Texas Stadium on Oct. 24, 1971. Dallas earned the first win in the new stadium with a 44-21 decision in front of 65,708 fans.

The last time these two clubs met, Dallas hosted the Patriots in a battle of two 5-0 teams on Oct. 14, 2007. New England got the better of Dallas, leaving Texas Stadium with a 48-27 win in front of 63,984 fans.

Averaged 53.8 yards-per-punt with a net of 42.4 on five punts in his only game against the Patriots.

Posted 13 tackles and a pass breakup in two games.

### Tony Romo - QB

Lost his only game against New England, completing 18-of-29 passes for 199 yards, two touchdowns and an interception.

### DeMarcus Ware - LB

In one game, tied a season-high with 10 tackles with one tackle for a loss, a sack and a pressure.

### Jason Witten - TE

In two games, caught four passes for 53 yards.

## NEW ENGLAND LAST WEEK

The New England Patriots hosted the New York Jets and handed their division rival a 30-21 loss. Tom Brady completed 24-of-33 passes for 321 yards with one touchdown and an interception. Wes Welker led the team with 124 receiving yards and BenJarvus Green-Ellis led the team with 136 rushing yards and a pair of touchdowns.

New England took a 10-0 lead with a Green-Ellis three-yard touchdown run in the first quarter and a Stephen Gostkowski 44-yard field goal in the second. Shonn Greene made it 10-7 with a three-yard rushing score. Deion Branch caught a two-yard touchdown from Brady followed by a Jeremy Kerley scoring catch from Mark Sanchez for a 17-14 third quarter score. Green-Ellis rushed in from three yards again then Gostkowski hit a 24-yard field goal to make the score 24-14 in the final frame. Santonio Holmes cut the Jets deficit to 27-27 on a 21-yard Sanchez pass, but Gostkowski added the final points with a 28-yard field goal.

## DALLAS LAST GAME

The Detroit Lions overcame a 24-point deficit for the largest comeback win over a Cowboys opponent in team history with a 34-30 win. Through the first two quarters, Dallas built a 17-0 lead. In the first quarter, Dez Bryant caught a 25-yard touchdown pass from Tony Romo and then caught a six-yarder in the second. A 41-yard Dan Bailey field goal gave the Cowboys a 17-0 lead by the middle of the second quarter. Detroit finally got on the board with a 33-yard Jason Hanson field goal. Bailey hit one more field goal - a 35-yarder - to bring the score to 20-3 at halftime.

Dallas opened the third quarter with a one-yard Romo-to-Jason Witten passing touchdown that pushed the Cowboys lead to 24 points at 27-3. However, the Lions crept back in the game with back-to-back interception returns for touchdowns (Bobby Carpenter 34 yards; Chris Houston 56 yards) on consecutive drives that drew the game closer at 27-17. Dallas upped its score to 30-17 late in the third quarter on a 23-yard Bailey field goal. In the fourth quarter, Detroit rallied from behind to post 17 unanswered points behind two Calvin Johnson touchdown grabs (23 yards; two yards) from Matthew Stafford and a Hanson 51-yard field goal to complete the comeback victory for Detroit.

## SOLD OUT STADIUMS

The Cowboys have played in front of sold out stadiums in 344 of their last 346 games (including playoffs) and in 146 consecutive games. They played in front of sold out crowds in 153 consecutive games at Texas Stadium (including playoffs) - dating back to Dec. 16, 1990 against Phoenix, their last home non-sellout. Dallas opened Cowboys Stadium with the largest crowd to witness a regular season NFL game with 105,121 tickets distributed and have 19 straight sellouts (including playoffs). The Cowboys have sold out each of their last 172 home games.

On the road, Dallas has played in front of sold out crowds in 73 straight games (including playoffs), dating back to its last road non-sellout - at Arizona (10/20/02).

## COWBOYS STADIUM RECORD WHEN...

The Dallas Cowboys are in their third season in Cowboys Stadium. Dallas' first game at its new venue was on Sept. 20, 2009 - a 31-33 loss to the N.Y. Giants. The club's first win came just a week later with a 21-7 decision over Carolina. So far, Dallas owns a 9-9 regular season record and a 1-0 postseason record in Cowboys Stadium. ## CLIMBING THE TE CHARTS

Since entering the league as Dallas' third round selection in the 2003 NFL Draft, Jason Witten has proven his skills as an offensive weapon. He has provided Dallas with the full package as a blocker and receiver. Through his eight years in the league, he has caught 644 passes for 7,333 yards and 37 touchdowns. Witten is the fourth all-time leading tight end in career receptions and sixth in receiving yards.

To open the 2011 season, Witten rattled off 110 yards - his 13th career 100-yard outing to become the seventh tight end in league history to reach 7,000 receiving yards. He topped 100 yards again in the overtime win at San Francisco (9/18) before hauling in six passes for 60 yards against Washington (9/26). Witten then had a 94-yard day against Detroit (10/2) to put him just 79 yards behind Pete Retzlaff (7,412) to etch into the top-five.

Witten's had a team-best six catches in the 2011 opener then added seven more at San Francisco (9/18) and six in the home opener against Washington (9/26). He again led the team with eight catches against Detroit to give him 644. He trails Ozzie Newsome (662) by 18 receptions for third:

Jason Witten has steadily climbed Dallas' all-time receiving yards charts. In 2008 he became the sixth player in Cowboys history to reach 4,000 career receiving yards. He topped the 5,000-yard barrier in the 2009 opener, making him the sixth pass catcher in club history to reach 5,000 career receiving yards. Later that same season, he moved past Frank Clarke (5,247) for fifth on Dallas' all-time receiving yards chart. Two weeks into 2010, Witten became the fifth Cowboy to top 6,000 career receiving yards. He opened 2011 with 110 yards at the N.Y. Jets (9/11) to become the fifth Cowboy to reach 7,000. His 94-yard outing against Detroit (10/2) put him past Bob Hayes (7,333) for fourth all-time in club history, and he now trails Drew Pearson (7,822) by 489 yards for third and Tony Hill (7,988) by 655 for second:

## UNDRAFTED, BUT NOT OVERLOOKED

Originally coming into the league as an undrafted free agent in 2006, Miles Austin came to the forefront of the Cowboys receiving corps in 2009. He emerged as a deep threat and scoring leader, finishing the season with 1,320 yards - third in the league - and 11 touchdowns - tied for fourth - to earn his first trip to the Pro Bowl.

Heading up the Cowboys offense is another former undrafted free agent in Tony Romo. Since becoming a starter midway through the 2006 season, Romo has re-written club passing records. He finished 2009 with a career-high and team record 4,483 passing yards.

With Austin's 1,230 yards and Romo with 4,483 passing yards, the quarterback/wide receiver duo became just the second undrafted tandem in league history with the quarterback topping 3,000 yards and the receiver over 1,000. The first occurred in 2006 when current Cowboys backup quarterback and undrafted free agent Jon Kitna threw for 4,208 yards and undrafted free agent wide receiver Mike Furrey recorded 1,086 yards.

## ALL-TIME UNRAFTED

Miles Austin finished 2009 third in the league with 1,320 yards and tied for fourth with 11 touchdowns. His yardage total was sixth all-time among undrafted pass catchers while his 11 touchdowns tied for seventh. ## MILES AHEAD

Breaking onto the scene in Week 5 of the 2009 season by making club history in his first career start, Miles Austin has not looked back. With the selection of Dez Bryant in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, the Dallas Cowboys looked to add to their lineage of home-grown talent at wide receiver. It should come as no shock that Bryant was issued the jersey number 88 to follow in the footsteps of two of the previous 88s in club history - Drew Pearson (1973-83) and Michael Irvin (1988-99). His progress as a rookie was slowed after landing on IR with an ankle injury suffered at Indianapolis (12/5/10). He returned to the playing field to open the 2011 season in style, catching three passes for 71 yards and a touchdown in the first quarter at the N.Y. Jets (9/11). He missed the overtime win at San Francisco (9/18) with a thigh injury, but returned the following week for the win against Washington (9/26). ## JONESING FOR THE BALL

Felix Jones opened the 2011 season as the starting tailback for the Dallas Cowboys. In the game at the N.Y. Jets (9/11), Jones rushed a team-high 17 times to give him 348 career rushing attempts and allow him to pass Timmy Newsome (340) for 15th in team history. He added 14 carries against Washington (9/26) to bring his career total to 371. He trails Roger Staubach (410) by 39 for 14th.

Jones was displayed his big-play ability in the 18-16 win over Washington (9/26) as he rushed for a career-best 115 yards. It was his second career regular season 100-yard outing.

Jones reached 115 yards on 14 carries for an 8.2 yard-per-carry average, a career-high when rushing 10-or-more times.

With his 115-yard effort, Jones increased his career rushing yards total to 1,935 to pass Troy Hambrick (1,896) for 14th in team history.

Laurent Robinson earned his first start as a Dallas Cowboy in the game against Detroit as Miles Austin continued to rehab his hamstring injury. ## THE WHOLE KITNA KABOODLE

Jon Kitna arrived in Dallas via a 2009 offseason trade with the Detroit Lions for DB Anthony Henry. In Kitna, the Cowboys welcomed in a seasoned veteran with solid experience in both the starting and backup quarterback role. In his first season with the Cowboys, he did not play in a single game as Romo became the club's first quarterback to be on the field for every snap of the season. Following Romo's fractured clavicle suffered against the N.Y. Giants (10/25), Kitna was thrust into the spotlight as Dallas' starting quarterback in 2010. In his first start since 2008, Kitna completed 34-of-49 passes for 379 yards, a touchdown and four interceptions against Jacksonville (10/31). Through his 14-year NFL career, Kitna started 124 regular season games while with Seattle (1997-2000), Cincinnati (2001-05), Detroit (2006-08) and Dallas (2010) and owns a 50-74 record as a starter. In total, he has completed 2,677-of-4,442 passes for 29,745 yards with 169 touchdowns and 165 interceptions for a career quarterback rating of 77.4.

Among active NFL quarterbacks, Kitna is eighth in attempts (4,442), completions (2,677), passing yards (29,745), and touchdowns (169) and 14th in completion percentage (60.3):

Entering the Giants game (10/25/10) in place of Tony Romo (fractured clavicle), Jon Kitna made his first appearance in a game since Oct. 5, 2008 while with Detroit. Kitna again saw action this season in place of Romo (rib) in at San Francisco (9/18). In three drives, Kitna went six-of-10 for 87 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions. Throughout his career including playoffs, Kitna has entered a game due to injury or roster change on seven occasions which then led to 38 starts. As a replacement due to injury or roster changes, Kitna has completed 893-of-1,434 (62.3%) passes for 9,647 yards, 60 touchdowns and 57 interceptions. Ware has five consecutive seasons (2006-10) with 10-or-more sacks, becoming the first Cowboys player to accomplish this feat since sacks became an official statistic in 1982. He is also the only player in the league to reach 10 sacks over the past five seasons.

## DEMARCU-ING HIS TERRITORY

Since coming into the league as Dallas' first draft pick in the first round of the 2005 NFL Draft (11th overall), DeMarcus Ware has led or tied for the team lead in sacks each of his first six years in the league - the first Cowboy to pace the team in sacks through each of his first six seasons. He has put together five straight seasons of 10-or-more sacks to become the first Dallas defender to accomplish that feat. He is the only defender in the league to reach at least 10 sacks over the past five seasons. In 2008 Ware established an official club sack record with a league-leading 20.0 sacks. He followed that up with a 2009 season where he finished with 11.0 sacks for the season. Ware closed out the 2010 season at Philadelphia (1/2/11) with a career-high tying 3.0 sacks to give him 15.5 for the season. It marked his seventh career three-sack game and his 17th career multi-sack game. Ware's 15.5 sacks in 2010 led the league for the second time in his career. He opened 2011 with his 18th career multi-sack game with two takedowns at the N.Y. Jets (9/11) then added two more at San Francisco (9/18). He had one more in the close win against Washington (9/26). Ware's five straight seasons of 10-or-more sacks marks the ninth time a league player had five consecutive seasons with 10+ sacks, it makes him the eighth different player to accomplish it, and the first since Simeon Rice (2001-05).

Ware then took sole possession of third place with two sacks against Tennessee (10/10/10) to give him his 15th career multi-sack game and the second time in his career he had back-to-back multi-sack games - the first in 2009 (at Kansas City, 10/11) and against Atlanta, (10/25) with two sacks in each game. Ware then notched his 16th multi-sack game with two against Washington (12/19/10) before adding his 17th multi-sack game with three at Philadelphia (1/2/11). Dallas game against Detroit (10/2) leading into the bye was DeMarcus Ware's 100th career game played. He brought a six-game sack streak into his milestone game but was unable to extend it as he was held without a quarterback takedown for the first time this season.

## LEADING THE WAY

Dallas' 2010 second round draft choice Sean Lee spent his first season learning the rigors of the NFL behind two veteran middle linebackers. He returned in 2011 to earn the first start of his career in the season opener at the N.Y. Jets (9/11).

In his first start, Lee led the team with a career-high 15 tackles (12 solo) which also led the team. Lee also picked off his third career pass that he returned 37 yards to the Jets one-yard line to setup a Dallas touchdown. For his career, his three interception returns have netted 81 yards and a touchdown.

Lee's work did not stop there as he also recovered his first career fumble following a Danny McCray sack.

Lee once again topped the tackle chart with his second career and second consecutive double-digit game with 13 at San Francisco (9/18).

In the home-opening win over Washington (9/26), Lee again led the squad with 13 tackles while also adding a tackle for a loss, an interception and a fumble recovery that sealed the win for Dallas.

## LEAP OF FAITH

As Dallas opened the 2011 season in New York (9/11), a newcomer to the starting linebacker corps emerged in Sean Lee. A 2010 second round draft choice, Lee saw time as a rookie in a reserve capacity. Three weeks into the 2011 season, elevating him to a starting role is beginning to pay dividends.

Lee is the club's tackle leader with 36 stops, already approaching his total of 45 from last year. Not only is Lee finding himself in on virtually every tackle, but he has also come to the forefront as a ball hawk. Through three games, he has a pair of interceptions and a pair of fumble recoveries.

In the opener at the Jets, he had his second two-takeaway game with an interception and a fumble recovery. He added his third two-takeaway game in the home-opening win against Washington (9/26), providing the same stat line as the Jets game, an interception and a fumble recovery.

His recovery of a Rex Grossman fumble in the waning minutes of the Washington game, sealed the win for Dallas.

## NO RUSH

Five weeks into the 2011 season, Rob Ryan's defense is ranked fourth overall with the league's best rush defense. The Dallas D is yielding just 61.8 rushing yards-per-game and just 3.1 yards-per-rush - also tops in the league.

The Cowboys defense has not allowed an opposing running back to top the 100-yard barrier in the last six games. The last 100-yard rusher against Dallas was LeSean McCoy, 149 yards against Philadelphia, 12/12/10.

## NO TD, NO PROBLEM

The Dallas Cowboys were unable to find the end zone in their 18-16 win over Washington (9/26), but that didn't seem to be a problem as the outcome determined. The game featured six Dan Bailey field goals to lead Dallas to a 2-1 open. The game was the 41st in which Dallas failed to score a touchdown, and it was just the sixth time the Cowboys have been victorious in a game without scoring a touchdown:

## THIS WEEK'S PROJECTED STARTERS

### OFFENSE

**WR -- 19 Miles Austin:** Became the starting wideout after making his first career start for an injured Roy Williams (ribs) at Kansas City (10/11/09). He responded with 10 receptions for a team-record 250 yards with two touchdowns to earn a full-time starting role. Racked up 2,513 receiving yards and 21 touchdowns in 30 games since becoming a starter to earn his first two Pro Bowl selections. Missed the last two games with a hamstring injury re-aggravated at San Francisco (9/18).

**LT -- 68 Doug Free:** Took over the starting position from Flozell Adams last season who was released prior to the start of the season. Started all 16 games for the first time in his career and returns to man the blind side once again.

**LG -- 61 Bill Nagy:** Selected by Dallas in the seventh round (252nd overall) of the 2011 NFL Draft. Had a strong training camp and won the battle. Made his first career start in the season opener at the N.Y. Jets (9/11). Missed the game at San Francisco (9/18) with a neck injury, but returned for the last two starts.

**C -- 67 Phil Costa:** Takes over the starting role after the release of five-time Pro Bowler Andre Gurode in the middle of training camp. Arrived in Dallas in 2010 as an undrafted free agent and played in four games with one start at guard as a rookie. Started all four games of the season thus far.

**RG -- 63 Kyle Kosier:** Makes the move to the right side after starting the last five seasons with Dallas on the left side. Will help tutor first round draft choice and starting right tackle Tyron Smith. Signed with Dallas as an unrestricted free agent from Arizona in 2007. Has started 108 of the 131 games he played in his nine-year career. Originally drafted in the seventh round (248th overall) by San Francisco in 2002.

**RT -- 77 Tyron Smith:** Dallas' first round pick - ninth overall - in the 2011 NFL Draft. Became only the fourth offensive lineman drafted by Dallas in the first round and the second-highest offensive lineman drafted by the club behind John Niland - fifth in 1966.

**TE -- 82 Jason Witten:** Selected to his seventh consecutive Pro Bowl in 2010 - the most Pro Bowl selections by a tight end in club history. In 2007 established single-season team tight end records for catches (96 - third-most in league history) and receiving yards (1,145) - the 13th tight end in league history to top 1,000 yards in a season. In 2009 broke the 1,000-yard barrier for the second time in his career and did it again in 2010 with 1,002 yards. Topped 7,000 career yards in Week 1, 2011 in 128 games - the third-fastest among tight ends with 7,000-plus yards. Caught a team-best eight passes for 94 yards - second on the team - to move into fourth in team history.

**WR -- 88 Dez Bryant:** Dallas' first round selection (24th overall) in the 2010 NFL Draft. Sniffed club rookie records with second with 45 catches, third with six touchdown catches, fifth with 564 yards and tied for fifth with eight overall touchdowns before an injury sidelined him for the final four games. Caught three passes for 37 yards and two touchdowns - his second career two-touchdown game.

**QB -- 9 Tony Romo:** Earned his second consecutive Pro Bowl trip in 2007 after establishing club records for passing yards (4,211), touchdowns (36), completions (335) and 300-yard games (seven). Also owns the club mark for consecutive games with a touchdown pass (20) and career 300-yard outings (29). Broke his club record for attempts (550), completions (347), yards (4,483) and 300-yard games (eight) in 2009. Owns a 41-24 regular season record as a starter. Has completed 1,425-of-2,222 passes for 17,923 yards and 125 touchdowns. His 2010 season was cut short after suffering a fractured clavicle in Week 7. Completed 34-of-47 passes for 331 yards with three touchdowns and three interceptions before the bye.

**RB -- 28 Felix Jones:** Became Dallas' full time starting tail back after the release of Marion Barber prior to training camp. Rushed a career-high 185 times for a career-best 800 yards in 2010. Has averaged 5.1 yards-per-carry since being drafted in the first round (22nd overall) of the 2008 NFL Draft. Rushed 16 times for 57 yards before the bye.

**TE -- 24 Tony Fiammetta:** Arrived in Dallas Week 2 after spending his first two pro seasons in Carolina. Was a fourth round (128th overall) draft choice by the Panthers in 2009. Was inactive with a hamstring injury before the bye week.

### DEFENSE

**RE -- 99 Kenyon Coleman:** Returns for his second stint in Dallas after playing for the club from 2003-06. Spent the previous two seasons in Cleveland under current Cowboys defensive coordinator Rob Ryan. Was held without a tackle last game.

**NT -- 90 Jay Ratliff:** Drafted in the seventh round in the 2005 draft as a defensive end and was a reserve for two seasons. Switched to nose tackle in 2007 after Jason Ferguson was lost in the season-opener. Finished 2008 with his first Pro Bowl selection as he had career-highs in tackles (83), sacks (7.5) and pressures (31). Selected to the Pro Bowl again in 2009 and 2010. Had one tackle and a pair of pass breakups last game.

**LE -- 97 Jason Hatcher:** Drafted in the sixth round (92nd overall) of the 2006 NFL Draft. Spent the majority of his career as a reserve lineman but has started the previous two games. Missed the game after suffering a calf injury the week before.

**SLB -- 93 Anthony Spencer:** Named the full-time starter with the release of Greg Ellis last season. Came on strong, notching 6.0 sacks over the final six games of the 2009 season. Led the team with 36 pressures. Originally drafted in the first round in 2007 as a college defensive end switching to linebacker in the NFL. Had five tackles, one tackle for a loss and two breakups in the last game.

**MLB -- 56 Bradie James:** Became the starting MLB in 2005 and led the team in tackles in each of the previous six seasons - the first Dallas defender to accomplish that feat. Had a career-high 202 tackles in 2008 - joining Eugene Lockhart (222) as the only Cowboys with 200-or-more tackles in a season. Posted double-digit tackles in seven games and led or tied for the lead in tackles eight games last season. Added one tackle last game.

**WLB -- 50 Sean Lee:** Drafted in the second round (55th overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft. Played in 14 games as a rookie reserve lineman in 2010. Has three career interceptions with one returned for a touchdown. Earned his first career start in the 2011 season opener and responded with a career-best 15 tackles. Tied for the team lead with six tackles to go with a pressure and a pair of breakups.

**JLB -- 94 DeMarcus Ware:** Earned his fifth consecutive trip to the Pro Bowl last season after leading the team and the league in sacks (15.5). Is the first Cowboys player to lead the club in sacks through each of his first six seasons. Is the ninth league defender with five straight 10-plus sack seasons and only the second to lead the league in sacks multiple times. In 2008 led the league with a club-record 20.0 sacks. Had a streak of 10 consecutive games with a sack to tie Simon Fletcher for the longest official sack streak. Got the starting nod in the Pro Bowl last season for his fifth straight time. Tallied three tackles, one tackle for a loss and three pressures before the bye.

**RCB -- 21 Mike Jenkins:** Took over the starting role in 2009 after a short battle with Orlando Scandrick. Led the team in 2009 with five interceptions and earned his first career Pro Bowl selection in the process.

**LCB -- 41 Terence Newman:** Earned his first career Pro Bowl selection in 2007 despite missing three games due to injury (foot). Tied his career-best with four interceptions, including one returned for a touchdown - his first career interception return for a touchdown - in 2007. Led the team again with four picks in 2008 before tying for the team lead with a personal-high five interceptions in 2010. Was named to his second Pro Bowl as an alternate in 2009. Finished last game with six tackles.

**SS -- 26 Abram Elam:** Returns to Dallas for his second stint after spending his rookie season (2006) with the Cowboys, playing mainly on special teams. Spent the previous two seasons with the Cleveland Browns, starting 31 of the 32 games. Was coached by current Cowboys defensive Coordinator Rob Ryan while with the Browns. Also spent two seasons with the N.Y. Jets (2007-08). Added a pair of tackles last game.

**FS -- 43 Gerald Sensabaugh:** Makes the move to free safety after joining the club in 2009 at strong safety. Arrived in Dallas after spending the first four years of his career in Jacksonville. Has 335 tackles and 12 interceptions. Racked up career-highs in tackles (86) and interceptions (five - tied for the team lead) while tying his career-best with 10 breakups in 2010. Had four tackles an interception and a breakup before suffering a head injury and missing the remainder of the game against Detroit (10/2).

## PERSONNEL BREAKDOWN -- OFFENSE

\* The Dallas Cowboys are averaging 417.8 yards of offense which is fifth in the NFC and sixth in the league. The team averages 6.2 yards-per-play which places them fifth in the conference and sixth in the league.

\* On the ground, Dallas is gaining 86.8 yards-per-game which is 14th in the NFC and 26th in the NFL. The club's 3.4 yard-per-rush average is 15th in the conference and 28th in the league.

\* Through the air, the Cowboys average 331.0 yards-per-game, second in the conference, third in the NFL. In averaging 8.0 yards-per-pass play, Dallas is second in the conference, and third in the league.

\* Dallas' 24.8 average points-per-game is good for seventh in the NFC and 12th in the league.

\* The Cowboys are making 20.8 first downs-per-game and rank seventh in the NFC and 13th in the NFL. On first down plays, the club averages 5.50 yards which places them 11th in the NFC and 21st in the league.

\* The club's 15 red zone trips is tied for eighth in the NFC and tied for 14th in the league. Dallas' 33.3 red zone touchdown percentage is tied for 14th in the NFC and tied for 27th in the league. The club's 80.0 red zone scoring percentage is 11th in the conference and 23rd in the league.

\* Dallas converted 18-of-52 (34.6%) third down opportunities to place ninth in the NFC and 20th in the NFL.

\* The Cowboys yielded seven sacks in four games which is second in the NFC and tied for fourth in the league.

\* Dallas' strongest quarter has been the fourth, where the club has scored 37 points.

### 2011 OFFENSIVE HIGHLIGHTS

\* Dallas opened the season with 390 total yards of offense at the N.Y. Jets (9/11). Dallas then racked up 472 yards at San Francisco (9/18) and 434 against Detroit (10/2).

\* **Miles Austin's** touchdown catch at the Jets tied him with Jay Novacek (22) for 12th in Cowboys history.

\* **Austin** topped 100 yards for the 12th time in his career with 143 - sixth-most in his career - at San Francisco.

\* **Dez Bryant's** two touchdown catches against Detroit was his second career two receiving touchdown game.

\* **Felix Jones** topped Timmy Newsome (340) for 15th in career rushing attempts in team history at the Jets. He brought his total to 348 with his 17 carries. Jones also scored the first rushing touchdown of the season in the game with a one-yard run.

\* **Jones** rushed for a career-best 115 yards - second career 100-yard game - on 14 carries for an 8.2-yard average in the home opener against Washington.

\* **Jesse Holley** had his first career receptions at San Francisco, finishing with three for 96 yards, including a 77-yarder in overtime to setup the game-winning field goal.

\* **Laurent Robinson** tied his career high with seven catches and established a high with 116 yards - his second career 100-yard day - against Detroit.

\* **Tony Romo** improved his club record of 300-yard games to 27 with his 342 yards at the Jets. He also upped his club record streak of consecutive games with a touchdown to 19.

\* **Romo** had his 28th career 300-yard outing at San Francisco (345) despite suffering a rib injury early in the first quarter. He also extended his club record of consecutive games with a touchdown pass to 20 with two.

\* At the Jets, **Jason Witten** caught a team-best six passes for a team-high 110 yards with a long of 64 yards. It was his 13th career 100-yard outing and his 64-yard catch was the second-longest of his career. He also topped 7,000 career receiving yards in the game to become the fifth Dallas Cowboy and seventh league tight end to reach the mark. He hit 7,000 in his 128th career game, the third-fastest league tight end to get to 7,000.

\* **Witten** had his 14th career 100-yard day - second of the season - with 102 at San Francisco.

\* **Witten** moved into fourth all-time in receiving yards in Cowboys history with his 94 against Detroit.

## QUARTERBACK

After spending the first four years of his NFL career as a backup quarterback, **Tony Romo** was thrust into the spotlight, taking over the starting role midway through the 2006 season. In just 10 games, Romo led the team to a 6-4 record and a playoff berth. His overnight sensation earned him his first career Pro Bowl selection. He returned as the full-time starter in 2007 and established then franchise marks for completions (335), passing yards (4,211) and touchdowns (36) among several others. He also led Dallas to a franchise record tying 13-3 finish and its 20th division title. In 2008, despite being injured for three games, Romo finished his second full season as a starter with 3,448 yards (12th in the NFL) on 450 attempts for a rating of 91.4 (eighth in the league) despite missing three games with a fractured pinkie finger on his throwing hand. In his third full season as a starter in 2009, Romo eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards, became the fifth Dallas passer with 100 career touchdown throws and finished the season as the only quarterback in franchise history to be on the field for every snap from center. With Romo at the helm, the club secured its second NFC East Divisional Championship over the

rest of the season when the team placed him on the Reserve/Injured list on Dec. 21. Before attempting his last pass of the season, he was well on his way towards another solid year with 1,605 yards on 148-of-213 passes (69.5%) with 11 touchdowns and seven interceptions and a quarterback rating of 94.9. He also surpassed 2,000 career attempts (2,070) to become only the fifth Dallas passer to do so and established a club record with 18 consecutive games with a touchdown pass. Before his injury in the sixth game of the season, Romo's five-game passing yard total of 1,556 yards was the highest yardage output during the first five games in a season in team history.

Thus far in 2011, Romo has completed 99-of-152 passes for 1,273 yards, seven touchdowns and five interceptions with a quarterback rating of 92.9. He is ranked ninth in the NFL in rating, eighth in completion percentage, 14th in yards, tied for 14th in touchdown passes, tied for 16th in completions and 23rd in attempts.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Completed 23-of-36 passes (63.9%) for 342 yards, two touchdowns and an interception. He improved his club record of 300-yard games to 27 while extending his club record of consecutive games with a touchdown pass to 19 games.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** Went 20-33 for 345 yards and two touchdowns despite suffering a rib fracture on the first series and sitting out most of the third quarter. His touchdown tosses extended his club record of consecutive games with a touchdown pass to 20 which is also the second-longest among current active NFL quarterbacks. His 345 yards tied the sixth-most in his career and were good for his 28th career 300-yard day. Led the team to a come-from-behind overtime victory, erasing a 10-point fourth quarter deficit and completing a 77-yard pass - the second-longest completion of his career - to set Dallas up at the San Francisco one-yard line for the game-winning field goal.

**vs. Washington (9/26):** Threw for 255 yards with one interception on 22-of-36 passes while leading the offense on six scoring drives - all field goals - including what would be the game-winner on a 40-yard field goal with 1:47 left in regulation. Without a touchdown in the contest, Romo's streak of consecutive games with a touchdown pass ended at 20 which was the second-longest active streak in the NFL.

**vs. Detroit (10/2):** Notched his 29th career 300-yard game, passing for 331 yards on 34-of-47 attempts with three touchdowns and three interceptions. His 47 attempts tied the fourth-most in a game in his career, his 34 completions tied the third.

past three seasons (2007) - 21st overall and 17th NFC East crown - and led the team to its first playoff win in 13 years with a victory over Philadelphia in the Wild Card Playoff Game. In 2010, Romo dealt with his most significant injury after a fractured clavicle suffered in the Monday Night Football Game against the N.Y. Giants (10/25) forced him to miss the next eight games and ultimately the

The Dallas Cowboys acquired **Jon Kitna** in a 2009 offseason trade with the Detroit Lions, giving the club a seasoned veteran with 14 years of NFL experience who has thrown for 29,658 yards and 168 touchdowns on 2,671-of-4,432 career attempts. Kitna did not take a single snap during the 2009 season as Romo was the only quarterback on the roster to be on the field for every snap from center. Kitna was forced to take the reigns of the offense in 2010 after a season-ending injury to Romo in the sixth game of the year. He led the team to a 4-5 record in nine games as the starter while passing for 2,365 yards on 209-of-318 attempts with 16 touchdowns and 12 interceptions.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** Stepped in for an injured Romo (ribs) in the third quarter and completed six-of-10 passes for 87 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions.

Behind Romo and Kitna is **Stephen McGee**, Dallas' first selection in the fourth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. McGee, who did not see the field in any of the team's games in 2009 while serving as the team's third quarterback, got the first playing action of his career in 2010. Playing in two games, including the first start of his career in the season finale at Philadelphia (1/2/11), he passed for 238 yards on 22-of-44 passes with two touchdowns and collected his first career win in the comeback victory in at the Eagles.

## RUNNING BACK

The Dallas Cowboys re-shuffled their stable of running backs in the offseason, but still boast a talented yet youthful trio in **Felix Jones**, **Tashard Choice**, and 2011 third round draft choice **DeMarco Murray**.

After becoming the first running back Dallas selected in the first round since drafting Emmitt Smith in 1990, **Jones** showed flashes of versatility before injuries landed him on Reserve/Injured as a rookie in 2008. Jones became the first rookie in club history to score a touchdown in each of his first three professional games with an 11-yard touchdown run on his first career carry in the season opener, a 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the home opener, followed by a 60-yard touchdown run in Week 3. He finished the season with 266 yards on 30 carries (8.9 avg.). A strong second half allowed Jones to post increased numbers in 2009 in attempts (116), yards (685) and tied his career-best with three rushing touchdowns. He led the team in rushing in the postseason, gaining 217 yards on 30 attempts with one touchdown in his first two career playoff appearances. Jones had his most successful season to date in 2010 while playing in all 16 games for the first time in his career to boast single-season career-bests in attempts (185), yards (800), receptions (48), receiving yards (450) and receiving touchdowns (one), making a career-high seven starts.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** The 17 carries in the opener gave him 348 for his career to pass Timmy Newsome (340) for 15th in team history. He also added his eighth career touchdown on a one-yard push.

**vs. Washington (9/26):** Led all rushers with a career-best 115 yards on 14 carries, a career-high 8.2 rushing average and a season-long rush of 40 yards. His 100-yard effort was the second of his career and his yardage output allowed him to pass Troy Hambrick (1,896) for 14th in team history.

Since being selected in the fourth round of the 2008 NFL Draft, **Choice** has proved to be more than an insurance policy, making the most of his playing time in his first two seasons. His rookie year saw him finish second on the roster with 92 carries for 472 yards (5.1 avg.) and two touchdowns with an increase in playing time due to injuries to both Marion Barber and Jones. Choice took snaps in the team's "Razorback" formation in 2009 to increase his playing time, allowing him to finish the season third in rushing with 349 yards on 64 carries with three touchdowns while also catching 15 passes for 132 yards. Choice totaled 243 yards on 66 carries while adding three rushing touchdowns - good for second on the squad.

**vs. Detroit (10/2):** Averaged 6.5 yards-per-carry, rushing for 39 yards on six attempts.

**Murray** was a heralded multi-purpose running back out of Oklahoma. The former Sooner left the school with career records in total touchdowns (65), points scored (390), kickoff return average (27.6) and all-purpose yards (6,718).

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Made his NFL debut in the opener and rushed two times for no yards, caught one pass for 13 yards and returned a kickoff for 14.

**Phillip Tanner**, an undrafted rookie out of Middle Tennessee State, impressed coaches with his play in the preseason enough to earn a spot on the active roster. Tanner led the team with 128 yards and 24 carries in preseason play.

Dallas picked up a fullback off waivers from Carolina when they signed **Tony Fiammetta**. Fiammetta begins his third season after starting 11 of the 24 games he played the previous two seasons with the Panthers. He was originally a fourth round pick (128th overall) in the 2009 NFL Draft from Syracuse.

## WIDE RECEIVER

**Miles Austin** used his first career start in 2009 as a launching pad for his career after hauling in a team-record 250 yards on a career-best 10 catches while subbing for an injured Roy Williams (ribs) at Kansas City (10/11). His effort at Kansas City propelled him into the starting role for the remainder of the season, and he led the team with 1,320 yards and 11 touchdowns while finishing second on the squad with 81 receptions to earn the first Pro Bowl selection of his career. The 2010 season marked Austin's first full season as a starter, getting the starting nod in all 16 games for the first time in his career to lead the team for the second straight season with 1,041 yards on 69 catches and seven touchdowns. His yardage tally allowed him to top 1,000-yards for the second consecutive season to become one-of-10 undrafted players to post multiple 1,000-yard seasons. He also notched his second consecutive Pro Bowl nod - this time as an injury replacement.

Thus far in 2011, he has 14 catches for 233 yards and four touchdowns.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Caught five passes for 90 yards - both good for second on the team - with a 36-yard touchdown in the season opener. His touchdown catch was the 22nd of his career to tie Jay Novacek for 12th in team history.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** Led the team with nine catches for a team-best 143 yards and a career-high three touchdowns. His 143 yards were the sixth-most in his career and gave him his 12th career 100-yard game. They also allowed him to pass Patrick Crayton (2,888) for 16th in team history. His nine catches gave him 182 for his career and moved him past Marion Barber and tie Walt Garrison for 22nd in franchise history.

**vs. Washington (9/26) and vs. Detroit (10/2):** : Inactive after re-aggravating a hamstring injury against the 49ers that was originally suffered during training camp.

Former 2010 first round draft choice **Dez Bryant** moves into a starting role in 2011 opposite Austin after taking the league by storm as a rookie. The 2010 season saw the former Oklahoma State star pay immediate dividends for the Cowboys both as a receiver and returner after he finished second all-time among club rookies with 45 receptions for 564 yards - fifth all-time among Dallas rookies - and six touchdowns - tied for second all-time among Cowboys rookies. On punt returns, Bryant took back two punts for scores to become the seventh Cowboy to accomplish the feat and only the second rookie to do so. Along with his six receiving touchdowns, Bryant's eight total scores tied him for fourth all-time among Dallas rookies.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Got off to a hot start in the opener, hauling in three passes for 71 yards with a long of 42 and a touchdown. All of his receptions came in the first quarter.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** Inactive with a thigh injury suffered on a punt return at the Jets.

**vs. Washington (9/26):** Returned to action after missing the previous game with a thigh injury to finish second on the team with four grabs for 63 yards, including a 30-yard catch. A 15-yard face mask penalty was drawn on the play that helped Dallas get position to boot home the game-winning field goal.

**vs. Detroit (10/2):** Caught three passes for 37 yards with a pair of touchdowns - his second career multiple receiving touchdown game.

Behind Austin and Bryant lies a former undrafted rookie in **Kevin Ogletree**. Ogletree originally made the squad after an impressive preseason performance in 2009 that saw him lead all wide receivers with seven catches for 87 yards and a team-high two touchdowns. He earned playing time as a rookie with the rib injury to Williams and played in 11 games to catch seven passes for 96 yards while also returning eight kickoffs for 166 yards. He returned in 2010 to play in six games while mixed into the receiving rotation. **Jesse Holley** plays into the mix at receiver after seeing the most playing time of his career in 2010 after being activated off the practice squad. He went on to play in 11 games, mainly on special teams, but continued to show flashes of his ability at receiver through the season. **Dwayne Harris** was drafted in the sixth round (176th overall) of the 2011 NFL Draft but showed coaches he was worth a roster spot with his play in the preseason. Harris led all Dallas pass catchers with 138 yards and two touchdowns on six catches while also seeing time on special teams as a returner. **Laurent Robinson**, who originally signed with the team on Sept. 7 but was released on Sept. 13, returned to the club on Sept. 20 to fill a need for receiver depth. He is a five-year veteran with previous playing experience with the Atlanta Falcons (2007-08) and St. Louis Rams (2009-10).

**Ogletree @ San Francisco (9/18)**: Earned his first career start in place of an injured Bryant (thigh) and finished with two catches for 50 yards, including a career-long 33-yarder.

**Holley @ San Francisco (9/18)**: Saw time late in the game with Austin (hamstring) limited and responded with his first career reception - an 11-yarder - finishing with three catches for 96 yards. His final catch was a 77-yard catch-and-run that setup the Cowboys at the 49ers one-yard line for the game-winning field goal in overtime.

**Robinson vs. Washington (9/26)**: Made his first appearance as a Cowboy and caught three passes for 49 yards including a long catch of 25 yards.

**Robinson vs. Detroit (10/2)**: Led the team with 116 yards on seven catches to give him his second career 100-yard outing and a single-game career-best in receiving yards. His seven catches tied a personal-best.

## TIGHT END

A staple in the Cowboys offense virtually since the day he was drafted, **Jason Witten** will lead the charge once again at tight end. With his selection to his seventh consecutive and overall Pro Bowl in 2010, Witten has made more appearances than any other tight end in club history. In eight pro seasons, Witten has emerged as one of the most prolific tight ends in league history. He has strung together seven consecutive seasons with at least 50 (one-of-three tight ends to accomplish the feat) and 60 catches (one-of-two to do it). He has topped 80 catches in a season five times, and in four straight and has tallied at least 90 catches in a season three times - the second-most by a tight end in league history. He finished 2010 with a team-best 94 catches - tops among league tight ends - and his third career 1,000-yard season (1,002) to become the fourth tight end with at least three 1,000-yard seasons. For his career, he has 636 catches for 7,239 yards and ranks second on the club's all-time receptions chart and fifth on the all-time receiving yards chart. He has the top-five single-season receiving yards totals by a tight end in club history and seven of the top-10 and is only the fifth Dallas pass catcher to reach 6,000 career receiving yards. He also joined Michael Irvin in 2010 as the only Dallas pass catchers with 600 career receptions. A model of durability, Witten has played in 135 of a possible 136 games, missing just one with a broken jaw in 2003.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11)**: Led the team with six catches and 110 yards. He improved his club tight end record of 100-yard outings to 13 while also reaching the 7,000-yard mark for his career. He became the fifth Dallas Cowboy and the seventh tight end to reach the plateau. Witten accomplished the feat in 128 games, the third fastest tight end to 7,000 yards behind Antonio Gates (119) and Pete Retzlaff (125). He had a long reception of 64 yards - his second-longest career catch.

**@ San Francisco (9/18)**: Caught seven passes for 102 yards - his 14th career 100-yard performance. With his 110 from the previous week, racked up consecutive 100-yard games for the third time in his career.

**vs. Washington (9/26)**: Once again led the team with six receptions for 60 yards along with a long catch of 23 yards.

**vs. Detroit (10/2)**: Caught a team-high eight passes for 37 yards and his first touchdown of the season. Brought his career receiving yardage total to 7,333 to pass Bob Hayes (7,295) for fourth all-time in team history.

After a 2008 draft-day trade sent 2006 second round selection Anthony Fasano to Miami, the Dallas Cowboys showed their dependency on a athletic tight end when they selected **Martellus Bennett** in the second round (61st overall) of the 2008 NFL Draft. Bennett proved to compliment Witten as a rookie, tying for second on the team in 2008 with four touchdown catches and finishing fifth in yards (283) and sixth in receptions (20). Among his four touchdown catches was a streak of three consecutive games with a touchdown catch to make him just the third club rookie to catch a touchdown pass in three consecutive games. After a season of learning the pro game, Bennett added 15 receptions for 159 yards in his second season as a pro.

The Cowboys showed their emphasis on the importance on the tight end position when the club drafted **John Phillips** with their second pick in the sixth round (208th overall) of the 2009 NFL Draft. Phillips showed good promise in his first professional season with seven receptions for 62 yards. He notched his first career touchdown with a one-yard catch in the Wild Card Playoff Game at Cowboys Stadium. Phillips suffered a setback in 2010 when a torn ACL during the opening preseason game wiped out his entire season.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11)**: Returned to the playing field for the first time since tearing his ACL in the first preseason game of the 2010 season. He started the game lined up as the full back and finished with two catches for 19 yards and a kickoff return for 16 yards.

## OFFENSIVE LINE

For the first time since the 2007 season, the offensive line of the Dallas Cowboys will feature a re-vamped starting five in 2011. Only two starters return in left tackle **Doug Free** and left guard **Kyle Kosier**, who will move to the right side, to provide stability and leadership on the line. The offensive line held true in 2010, assisting the offense as it compiled 5,828 total net yards to rank as the seventh-highest yardage output in franchise history. The line was faced with the challenge of protecting three starting quarterbacks during the season after Romo (collarbone) and later Kitna (abdominal) suffered injuries that opened the door for McGee who gained the first playing experience of his career. The group will introduce three new starters on the line at right guard, right tackle and center following the release of Leonard Davis, Marc Colombo and Andre Gurode, respectively.

At right tackle, 2011 rookie first round draft choice **Tyron Smith** has taken the spot. With his selection with Dallas' ninth overall pick, Smith became just the fourth offensive lineman to be selected in the first round by the Cowboys. He is the second-highest lineman ever drafted by the club.

**Kosier** moved to the right side to help Smith, and, at left guard, 2011 Cowboys draft choice **Bill Nagy** (seventh round, 252nd overall) has settled in the spot with his consistent play through the preseason.

**Phil Costa**, who made the 2010 squad as an undrafted rookie reserve, improved his play through the preseason enough to be named the starter at center going into the 2011 season.

**Free** returns to man the left side after starting all 16 games at the position in 2010. He stepped up to the role and performed after taking the position from Flozell Adams.

In reserve roles lie tackle **Jermey Parnell**, who came to Dallas as a reserve lineman in 2010, 2011 fourth round selection **David Arkin** - a guard - 2011 undrafted rookie free agent **Kevin Kowalski** - center - and **Derrick Dockery**, a former third round draft pick by the Washington Redskins in 2003. Dockery spent the first four years of his career with the Redskins before spending two in Buffalo. He returned to Washington for the 2009-10 seasons and has started 111 of the 117 games he played at guard in his eight seasons.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11)**: The opener featured two rookies starting on the offensive line - RT Tyron Smith and LG Bill Nagy. It was the first time in franchise history a Cowboys team started two rookies on the offensive line in the season opener. The duo also became the seventh and eighth rookie linemen to ever start in a season

opener for Dallas, and it was the first time a rookie lineman started for Dallas since Rob Petitti opened the season at right tackle in 2005. Overall, Smith and Nagy are the 38th and 39th rookies to start a season opener for Dallas. The young line blocked for Romo's 27th career 300-yard game.

**@ San Francisco (9/18)**: Dockery made his Cowboys debut and earned the start in place of Nagy (neck) while Kowalski made his NFL debut at center, filling in for Costa late in the game. The line allowed Romo to throw for his 28th career 300-yard game while providing time for the club to throw for three touchdowns - Romo, two and Kitna, one.

**vs. Washington (9/26)**: Nagy (neck) returned to the starting lineup at left guard while Dockery (knee) was held out. The line opened holes for a running game that amassed a season-high 125 yards including a career-best 115-yard individual effort by Felix Jones to mark only the second 100-yard regular season game of his career.

**vs. Detroit (10/2)**: Blocked for Romo's 29th career 300-yard day while Robinson set a career-best with 116 receiving yards while allowing just one sack on 47 pass attempts.

\* Opponents have entered the red zone nine times - the fewest in the division and tied for the fewest in the league. The club's 55.6 touchdown percentage allowed is 14th in the NFC and tied for 22nd in the league. The club's 88.9 red zone scoring percentage allowed is tied for 13th in the conference and tied for 21st in the league.

\* Dallas opponents convert 21-of-55 (38.2%) of their third down opportunities to place 10th in the NFC and tied for 15th in the NFL.

\* The Cowboys 13 sacks through their first four games is tied for eighth in the league.

\* Dallas' strongest quarter has been the opener where they have allowed just six points.

\* Dallas held the Jets (9/11) to just 45 rushing yards in the opener then held Frank Gore to a 2.4-yard rushing average at San Francisco (9/18).

When the Dallas Cowboys transitioned to the 3-4 defense under Bill Parcells, **Bradie James** may have benefitted the most from the change. As the signal caller of the defense, James notched 100-plus tackles and led the team in tackles each of the previous six seasons. He is the first Dallas defender since tackles were tracked in 1979 to lead the team in tackles six consecutive times and just the first to lead the team in tackles six times. His career reached an apex in 2008 as he finished with a career-best 202 tackles, joining Eugene Lockhart (222 in 1989) as the only two Dallas defenders to reach 200 tackles in a season. In 2009 James led the team with 181 tackles, had 10-or-more tackles in 11 games during the season and led or tied for the team lead 12 times. In 2008

James also tied for the team lead with eight tackles for losses, was second with three forced fumbles and tied for second with a career-high 8.0 sacks. On the year, he led or tied for the team lead in tackles nine times and posted 11 double-digit tackle games - a career-high. James led the defense in 2010 with 163 tackles.

**@ San Francisco (9/18)**: Notched five tackles in the overtime win.

Dallas used its second round draft pick in 2010 to select Penn State's **Sean Lee** to work behind Brooking. Lee was slowed early in his rookie season, but came on late to demonstrate his ability at the middle linebacker position, finishing his initial campaign 11th on the squad with 45 tackles. He earned his first career start in the 2011 season opener and has started each of the games this season.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11)**: Lee made his first career start and tallied a team-high and career-best 15 tackles along with an interception - the third of his career - and a fumble recovery.

**@ San Francisco (9/18)**: Lee once again led the team with his second consecutive double-digit tackle total - 13.

Thomas for the sixth-most sacks in a season in league history - Ware became the first Dallas defender to lead or tie for the team lead in sacks in each of his first four seasons with the team. He also became the fourth Cowboys defender - second since 1982 when sacks became official - to register three consecutive 10-plus sack seasons. He now has five straight seasons with 10-or-more sacks making him the ninth eighth league defender to accomplish the feat. Among his 85.0 career sacks was a streak of 10 consecutive games with a sack - spanning the final three games of 2007 and the first seven of 2008 - and 10 games with multiple sacks. Not only a pass rushing threat, Ware can play the run and cover receivers as he logged a career-high 110 tackles in 2008 and topped the 100-tackle plateau once again in 2010 with 108. A model of dependability, Ware has played in all 99 regular season games and the four playoff games of his career. He started 98 regular season contests, missing the only start of his career at New Orleans (12/19/09) as a precaution due to a neck injury he suffered in the game before (vs. San Diego, 12/13/09) though he did play in the game. He earned his fifth consecutive Pro Bowl nod after finishing the 2010 season third on the team with 108 tackles and tops on the team with 15.5 sacks and 36 hurries.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Tallied four tackles, two sacks and a team-high tying three pressures in the season opener. His two sacks marked his 18th career multiple sack game and was also his fourth straight game with a sack - his sixth career streak of sacks in four-or-more games.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** Had another big day with two sacks to go with three tackles while tying for third on the squad with six tackles. His sack streak is at five games for the third-longest streak of his career. It was also his 19th career multi-sack game to tie Jim Jeffcoat and Greg Ellis for the most in team history. With his two sacks from the prior week's game, it was the third time in his career he had back-to-back multiple sack games.

**vs. Washington (9/26):** Posted four tackles and collected a sack, a tackle for loss and a quarterback hurry. Ware's sack marked

his sixth straight game with a quarterback takedown - the third longest streak of his career (10 - 12/16/07-10/12/08 - and 7 - 11/2/08-12/20/08). With sacks in each of the first three games this season, it was the second time in his career he opened the season with sacks in each of the first three games. The first was in 2008 when he opened the season with at least one sack in each of the first seven games.

**vs. Detroit (10/2):** Had three tackles, one for a loss and three pressures.

Starting opposite Ware is **Anthony Spencer**, a 2007 first round choice, who continues to improve each season. He topped the century mark in tackles for the first time in his career in 2010 with a career-best 105 stops (fourth on the team) along with five sacks and 14 quarterback pressures - both good for second on the team.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Notched two tackles, two pressures and his first sack of the season.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** Tallied five tackles, a tackle for a loss and his second sack of the season.

**vs. Washington (9/26):** Logged four tackles, a sack, two hurries and a forced fumble. Spencer's sack marked his fourth straight game with a sack - the longest streak of his career - while his forced fumble of Rex Grossman on the same play helped the defense secure the win while the Redskins were attempting to drive down the field with seconds remaining.

**vs. Detroit (10/2):** Tallied five tackles, one tackle for a loss and two hurries.

Making his home outside of the state of Georgia for the first time in his life was one of three newcomers to Dallas' starting defense in 2009, **Keith Brooking**. Brooking, a five-time Pro Bowler, stepped in as the team's starting "Mo" linebacker. Upon his arrival in Dallas, he reunited with Wade Phillips, who was the Falcons defensive coordinator for two seasons (2002-03). Brooking's 11-year Falcons career had him make five consecutive Pro Bowls (2001-2005), one Super Bowl appearance (XXXIII) and lead the team in tackles eight consecutive times (2001-08). He has reached 200 tackles twice in his career and has amassed 1,778 tackles in his 13 pro seasons. Brooking finished second on the team with 156 tackles in 2009. By the end of his first season in his new surroundings, Brooking emerged as one of the team leaders on and off the field, teaming up with James in the same capacity. Both middle linebackers teamed up in 2010 to compile 314 tackles.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Finished the opener with four tackles and a pass breakup.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** Added six tackles in the overtime win. Backing up the outside spots are **Victor Butler**, a fourth round (110th overall) draft pick from the 2009 NFL Draft and 2011 rookie free agent **Alex Albright**. Butler was a collegiate defensive end, but began his transition to outside linebacker as a rookie. He will also be counted on to play special teams. Albright had an active rookie camp and will also have to compete on special teams for playing time.

**vs. Detroit (10/2):** Tied for the team lead with six tackles.  
**Albright @ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Made his NFL debut but did not record any defensive stats.

## DEFENSIVE LINE

**Marcus Spears**, a former first round pick (20th overall) by Dallas, returns to man the starting left defensive end position in 2011 after a left calf strain suffered in the eighth game of the 2010 season limited him to only 24 tackles and forced him to break a streak of 88 consecutive games played since his rookie season.

**Jay Ratliff**, now in his sixth season, is coming off three consecutive (2008-2010) Pro Bowls after posting 34 tackles, 3.5 sacks and 10 pressures in 2010. He anchors the defensive line at nose tackle after beginning his career as a reserve defensive end and continues to show his dominance in the middle of the trenches.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Tied for the team lead with three pressures while adding two tackles.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** Had a third quarter sack that led to a third-and-long on the 49ers final drive of the fourth quarter. Also had two tackles.

## PERSONNEL BREAKDOWN -- DEFENSE (cont.)

**vs. Washington (9/26):** Totaled three stops with one for a loss.

The Cowboys brought in **Kenyon Coleman**, a player who was acquired in free agency in 2011 from Cleveland where he logged 68 tackles, 2.5 sacks and three fumble recoveries. Coleman enters his second stint with the Cowboys, having previously appeared on the defensive line for four seasons (2003-07) earlier in his career. He also brings familiarity of Rob Ryan's defensive scheme as he played for Ryan for two seasons in Cleveland.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Tallied a tackle and a tackle for a loss.

**vs. Washington (9/26):** Notched five tackles to go with a tackle for loss.

Behind Spears and Coleman lie **Jason Hatcher**, a proven veteran and regular in the Cowboys defensive end rotation the past five years, **Sean Lissemore** (Dallas' 2010 seventh round selection), who showed flashes of his intensity before landing on Reserve/Injured, and first-year man **Clifton Geathers**, who's size and speed were on display for Dallas through the preseason.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** **Hatcher** notched four tackles and a tackle for a loss while **Lissemore** added two tackles in his return to the playing field.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** **Hatcher** registered a pair of sacks to give him his first career multi-sack game along with four tackles.

**vs. Washington (9/26):** **Hatcher** made one tackle before being forced to leave the game with a left calf injury.

Behind Ratliff at nose is 2010 Supplemental Draft choice **Josh Brent**, who proved to be the perfect compliment to Ratliff, notching 17 tackles while spelling the Pro Bowl nose tackle.

## SECONDARY

At cornerback, the Cowboys boast two Pro Bowlers in **Terence Newman** and **Mike Jenkins** - who both earned trips to the 2009 Pro Bowl.

**Newman** recorded career-bests with 81 tackles - good for fifth on the team - and five interceptions - tied for first on the team - to push his career interception total to 28 where he ranks ninth all-time in team history. He also had 14 pass breakups - second on the team. After earning the starting corner spot opposite Newman, one of Dallas' two first round picks from 2009, **Jenkins**, put a stamp on his first season as a starter by leading the team in both interceptions (five) and pass breakups (33) - both career-highs - to earn his first trip to the Pro Bowl. In 2010 his totals were 59 tackles, one interception and a team-best 15 pass breakups.

**Newman @ N.Y. Jets (9/11)** and **@ San Francisco (9/18):** Sat out the first two games of the season while recovering from a groin injury suffered in camp.

**vs. Washington (9/26):** Returned to the starting lineup while making his 2011 season debut in the home opener, making four tackles and a pass breakup in the contest.

**vs. Detroit (10/2):** Tied for the team lead with six tackles.

In **Orlando Scandrick**, the Cowboys boast a corner able to play the role as the team's nickel cornerback along with the ability to start. He registered 50 tackles - eighth on the team - and career-highs in sacks (2.5), tackles for loss (five) and pass breakups (eight) in 2010.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Contributed a tackle before an ankle injury in the second quarter sidelined him for the remainder of the game.

**Alan Ball**, a 2007 Cowboys draft choice who began his career as a cornerback but filled in at safety the past two seasons, returns to the cornerback position in 2011 after serving as the team's starting free safety in 2010 where he totaled 50 tackles, a half sack, two interceptions, five pass breakups and two forced fumbles - all career-highs.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Finished with five stops and a pass breakup.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** Finished with five tackles, a pass breakup and an interception that led to a touchdown to tie the game at 14-14.

Dallas added veteran **Frank Walker** to the roster on Sept. 13 to add depth to its injury-riddled cornerback corps. Walker spent the first four years of his career with the N.Y. Giants before playing in Green Bay (2007), Baltimore (2008-09) and Minnesota (2010).

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** Made his Cowboys debut and finished with one tackle.

**Gerald Sensabaugh** returns for his third season with the team. The 2009 free agent established a career-best in 2010 with a team-high tying five interceptions along with 53 tackles, two sacks and nine pass breakups.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** Led all defensive backs and finished second on the team with seven tackles.

**vs. Washington (9/26):** Finished second on the team with six tackles while also blocking a field goal on special teams - his fourth career blocked kick, third field goal and second as a Cowboy.

**Abram Elam**, who spent one previous season with the Cowboys in 2006, returned to Dallas in 2011 as a free agent pickup and will man the starting free safety spot opposite Sensabaugh. Elam is another player familiar with Rob Ryan's defense, having spent two seasons with him in Cleveland and notching 77 tackles, two interceptions, 10 pass breakups, two sacks, two fumble recoveries and two forced fumbles in 2010.

**vs. Detroit (10/2):** Was second on the squad with seven tackles with a tackle for lost yardage.

Behind the two veteran safeties are a pair of former 2010 rookie free agents in **Barry Church** and **Danny McCray**.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** **McCray** had a tackle and his first career sack in which he forced his first career fumble that was recovered by Lee.

## PERSONNEL BREAKDOWN -- SPECIAL TEAMS

\* The Dallas Cowboys are averaging 25.0 yards-per-kickoff return and rank seventh in the NFC and 14th in the league.

\* With an average of 7.9 yards-per-punt return, the club is 11th in the conference and 23rd in the NFL.

\* On the coverage side, the Cowboys have given up 22.8 yards-per-kickoff return, which is good for eighth in the conference and 12th in the league.

\* On punt coverage, Dallas has yielded 8.6 yards-per-return to rank eighth in the NFC and 14th in the league.

\* Following a kickoff, the Cowboys average drive starts at their 22.0-yard line - eighth in the conference and 14th in the NFL.

\* Dallas opponents average a start at their 22.4-yard line to rank 12th in the NFC and 24th in the league.

### 2011 SPECIAL TEAMS HIGHLIGHTS

\* **Dan Bailey** made his NFL debut at place kicker and split the uprights on a 34-yard field goal - his first career field goal attempt - and was true on all three PAT tries.

\* **Bailey** went two-of-three with a 48-yard long and a 19-yard game-winning field goal in the overtime win at San Francisco (9/18).

\* **Bailey** set a club rookie record and tied a league rookie record with six made field goals in the home-opening win over Washington (9/26). Bailey also handled kickoffs, booting seven with four reaching the end zone and two going for touchbacks.

\* **Bailey** connected on three more field goals against Detroit (10/2).

## KICKING GAME

Punter **Mat McBriar** had a stellar campaign in 2010. For the first time in franchise history, Dallas featured a punter who led the league in both gross punting average (47.9) and net punting average (41.7) - with the 41.7 net average marking a single-season career-best - as McBriar's performance earned him his second career Pro Bowl invitation. McBriar also landed 20 punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line to tie him for 20th in league rankings.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Punted six times for a 47.2 average and a 33.8 net with two inside the 20 and one touchback. He also suffered his third career blocked kick.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** Had four punts for a 48.5-yard gross average and a 37.3-yard net.

**vs. Washington (9/26):** Punted three times for a 50.7-yard average, a net average of 45.3 with two punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line and a long punt of 65 yards.

**vs. Detroit (10/2):** Punted three times with a 53.7 gross average, 43.0 net and a season-high 68-yard long.

Kicker **David Buehler** wrapped up his second pro season in 2010, but his first season as the squad's featured placekicker after seeing time as a rookie in 2009 as the club's kickoff specialist. He responded to his role as a rookie and led the NFL with a club single-season record 29 touchbacks. Buehler finished the 2010 season tied for the league lead in 50+ yard field goals made (four), and was 10th in scoring (112) and tied for 13th in total field goals made (24). In total, he was 24-of-32 on field goals (75.0%) and 42-of-44 on PATs. He also resumed his role as the kickoff specialist, finishing fifth in the league with 22 touchbacks.

**Buehler @ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Kicked off five times with three reaching the end zone and one touchback.

**vs. Washington (9/26):** Inactive due to a groin injury.

Rookie free agent placekicker **Dan Bailey** (Oklahoma State) had a solid camp and earned a roster spot for kicking field goals and PATs.

**Bailey @ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** Made his NFL debut and was true on his first career field goal attempt - a 34-yarder and all three of his PAT tries.

**Bailey @ San Francisco (9/18):** Converted two of three field goal tries, including a career-long 48-yarder at the end of regulation and the game-winning 19-yarder in overtime.

**Bailey vs. Washington (9/26):** With Buehler sidelined with a groin injury, Bailey took over all kicking duties. He established a club rookie record while going a perfect six-of-six on field goal attempts. It also allowed him to become just the third rookie in NFL history (since 1960) to convert six field goals in a single game. The first was Garo Yepremian (Detroit, at Minnesota, 11/13/66) followed by Jeff

Reed (Pittsburgh, at Jacksonville, 12/1/02). He also made his debut on kickoffs, finishing the contest with seven kickoffs and four reaching the end zone with two touchbacks.

**Bailey vs. Detroit (10/2):** Finished three-of-three on his field goal tries and converted all three of his PAT tries. Also logged three touchbacks on six kickoffs with Buehler (groin) inactive.

Deep snapper **Louis-Philippe Ladouceur** signed with Dallas prior to their Week Four contest at Oakland in 2005 and has been solid and mistake-free on 432 punts, 184 field goals and 270 PATs since joining the team.

## RETURN GAME

On kickoff returns, 2011 third round draft choice **DeMarco Murray**, who averaged 27.6 yards-per-kickoff return with two touchdowns through his career at Oklahoma, and third-year vet **Kevin Ogletree**, who has 14 returns under his belt through two previous seasons, look to get the inside job at the top returner spots.

Rookie draft pick receiver **Dwayne Harris** looks to also provide some looks at kick returner and a boost as a punt returner after averaging 9.4 yards while returning punts at East Carolina.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** In the opener, Bryant returned one punt 12 yards, and in his NFL debut, **Harris** returned two for 17 yards. Murray handled the kickoff returns, posting 14 yards on his lone try.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** **Harris** had two punt returns for 25 yards with a long of 14 and McCann returned two for 13 yards with a long of 16. McCann also added a kickoff return for 26 yards.

**vs. Washington (9/26):** **Harris** had two punt returns for 10 yards.

**vs. Detroit (10/2):** **Harris** had three punt returns for 18 yards and two kickoff returns for 56 yards.

## COVERAGE UNITS

The Cowboys boast solid coverage units while returning a majority of their top tacklers, including 2010's tackle leader **Danny McCray**, who's 28 stops ranked third in a season in team history since the club started recording special teams tackles in 1988. The unit also features **Jesse Holley** and **Barry Church**, who both tied for third in 2010 with 16 tackles each. Along with Dallas' veteran special teamers, coupled with the 2011 additions, the Cowboys special teams coverage units looks to continue to thrive under Coach Joe DeCamillis' in his third season in Dallas.

**@ N.Y. Jets (9/11):** **Albright** notched his first career special teams tackle in his NFL debut while **McCray** led the unit with three tackles while **Butler**, **Lee** and **Phillips** all finished with two.

**@ San Francisco (9/18):** **Albright** and **Holley** tied for the team lead in special teams tackles (two).

**vs. Washington (9/26):** **McCray** had a team-high two special teams stops. **Sensabaugh** notched his fourth career blocked kick on a 36-yard field goal attempt.

**vs. Detroit (10/2):** **Butler** and **Church** each had two tackles while **Holley**, **Phillips**, **Sensabaugh** and **Walker** each finished with one.
