THE COACHES

MIKE TOMLIN was named the 16th head coach in Pittsburgh Steelers history on Jan. 22, 2007. Hired at the age of 34, Tomlin became only the third head coach hired by the Steelers since 1969.

Tomlin became the youngest head coach in NFL history to both coach in and win a Super Bowl when he led the Steelers to a 27-23 victory over the Arizona Cardinals in Super Bowl XLIII. By winning the Super Bowl in only his second season as a head coach, he also became the fastest to win a Super Bowl title in Steelers history.

Tomlin is one of only seven coaches in league history to win a Super Bowl within his first two seasons as an NFL head coach.

Tomlin compiled a 43-21 record in the regular season during his first four years as head coach. His .672 winning percentage after four seasons tied for first in team history. By leading the Steelers to a 12-4 record in 2010, Tomlin became only the second Steelers' head coach to post winning records in each of his first four seasons.

The Steelers' offense ranked 14th in the NFL (14th passing, 11th rushing) despite playing its first four games without its starting quarterback, Ben Roethlisberger. Pittsburgh's defense ranked second in the NFL (first vs. run, 12th vs. pass) while leading the NFL with 48 quarterback sacks. The Steelers set a team record and led the NFL, allowing only 62.8 rushing yards per game.

The Steelers continued to be dominant at Heinz Field under Tomlin in 2010. Pittsburgh finished with a 5-3 home record in 2010 after finishing 7-1 (2007), 6-2 (2008) and 6-2 (2009) at home during Tomlin's first three seasons. Tomlin's 24-8 record and .750 winning percentage at home after four seasons ranks second in Steelers' history.

Tomlin was a three-year starter at wide receiver at William and Mary (1990-94) and finished his career with 101 receptions for 2,046 yards and a school-record 20 TD catches. A first-team All-Yankee Conference selection in 1994, he established a school record with a 20.2 yards-per-catch average.

Tomlin was the NFL's second-youngest head coach in 2007, and he became only the second Steelers coach in team history to win at least 10 games during his first year at the helm. The Steelers posted a 7-1 record at home in 2007 and were 5-1 in the AFC North (3-0 at home).

Tomlin became only the second Steelers head coach to win his first three games. During 2007, the Steelers became just the fifth team in NFL history to win their first four home games by at least 20 points.

The Steelers' defense was dominant under Tomlin's guidance in 2008, leading the NFL in total defense (237.2), pass defense (156.9), points per game (13.9), total yards per play (3.9), rushing yards per attempt (3.3), passing yards per attempt (4.7) and third down efficiency (31.4), and finished second in league rushing defense (80.3).

Tomlin led the Steelers to a 10-6 record in 2007, and became just the second coach in team history to post a winning record, win a division title and earn a playoff berth in his inaugural season.

BILL BELICHICK is in his 37th season as an NFL coach and his 12th as the head coach of the Patriots. Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl championships in a four-year span.

From 2001-10, Belichick won more regular season games (121) and more games overall (135) than any other head coach in NFL history during a 10-year stretch. Under Belichick the Patriots won 75.6 percent of their regular season games (121-39) from 2001-10, recording the highest winning percentage of any major American sports team over that span.

Pittsburgh Team Notes:

- The Steelers are now 99-58-1 all-time against NFC opponents.
- Pittsburgh has won five its last six games and is currently on a three-game winning streak.
- The Steelers are 2-2 on the road this season. Since the beginning of 2010, Pittsburgh is 9-3 on road during the regular season.
- The Steelers are now 2-0 against NFC West opponents this season and 6-4 against the division during the regular season since realignment in 2002. Pittsburgh improved to 2-3 on the road against the NFC West since 2002.
- Including the postseason, the Steelers have beaten the Cardinals in four of the past five games. Pittsburgh is now 1-1 at University of Phoenix Stadium.
- The Pittsburgh defense registered their first safety since 11/16/08 vs. San Diego when **LB LaMarr Woodley** pressured QB Kevin Kolb into an intentional grounding penalty in the end zone.
- The Steelers scored a touchdown on their first possession for the third consecutive game.
- The Steelers defense held the Cardinals scoreless in the first quarter, it marked the fourth time in 2011 Pittsburgh held the opposing team to zero points in the first quarter. Over the past six games the Steelers defense has allowed a total of 10 points in the first quarter.
- Pittsburgh registered a season-high 445 total net yards, it marked the fourth time in 2011 that the Steelers exceeded 400 yards and Pittsburgh is 4-0 in those games.

- Improved to 4-3 in games played indoors during the regular season.
- Improved record to 6-1 against the NFC West (including the postseason).

- Has connected with Wallace for a franchise-record 11 touchdown passes of 40-plus yards.
- Registered three touchdown passes versus the Arizona Cardinals. Including the postseason, it marked the 20th time in his career he threw for at least three touchdown passes in one game.
- Has thrown at least one touchdown pass in six of seven games this season.
- Recorded second 300-yard passing day of 2011 and 17th of his career during the regular season.
- Has won five of the last six regular season games in which he threw for over 300 yards.
- Totaled 361 passing yards against the Cardinals. Dating back to the 2010 regular season, Roethlisberger extended his career-best streak to 15 straight games with at least 200 yards through the air.
- For the first time in Roethlisberger's career, he has registered at least 200 yards passing in each of the first seven games of a season.
- Improved to 21-7 as a starting quarterback in the month of October.

WR Mike Wallace

- 95-yard touchdown reception was the longest pass play, second longest play from scrimmage in Steelers history (Bobby Gage, 97 yards touchdown run, 12/4/49 at Chicago Bears).
- Has 21 career receptions of at least 40 yards, 13 of which have gone for touchdowns.
- It marked the sixth straight game he registered at a least one reception of 40 yards or more, which is the longest NFL streak since Isaac Bruce in 2000.
- Mike Wallace recorded the 12th 100-yard receiving game of his career, passing Plaxico Burress for the fourth most in franchise history.

TE Heath Miller

- Hauled in a 12-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter to give Pittsburgh a 7-0 lead.
- Marked second touchdown in the last three games and the 31st of Miller's career.
- Registered four receptions for 59 yards. Miller now has 308 receptions for his career, passing Franco Harris (306) for sixth place in franchise history.

WR Antonio Brown

- Registered career-highs of seven receptions for 102 yards. Seven receptions was a game-high.
- Marked the first time in his career he recorded 100 yards receiving in one game.

WR Emmanuel Sanders

- Registered one touchdown reception, the second of 2011 and fourth of his career.
- Finished second on the team with five receptions for 46 yards.

LB LaMarr Woodley

- Registered 2.0 sacks for a loss of 15 yards against Arizona. It was the 15th multi-sack game of his career during the regular season.
- It marked the second time in Woodley's career he registered multiple sacks in three consecutive regular season games (2008).
- Registered at least 1.5 sacks in each of the last three games, totaling 5.5 sacks during that time span.
- Recorded 2.0 sacks versus Arizona. Including the postseason, it marked the 11th time in the past 14 games he registered at least a half a sack, totaling 13.5 sacks during the span.
- Recorded two sacks to reach 46.0 for his career, passing Aaron Smith (44.0) to tie Dwight White (46.0) for eighth most in Steelers' history.
- Forced a safety by pressuring QB Kevin Kolb into an intentional grounding penalty in the end zone late in the third quarter, giving Pittsburgh a 26-14 lead.

CB William Gay

- Made 25th career regular-season start and sixth consecutive of 2011. Including the postseason, marked eighth start in the past nine games.

DT Ziggy Hood

- Made his fifth straight start in place of injured **DE Aaron Smith**, marked his 15th career start after starting 10 games in 2010 in place of the injured Smith.

K Shaun Suisham

- Connected on all three field goal attempts, marking the second game of 2011 and fourth as a member of the Steelers he made at least three field goals.

PITTSBURGH TEAM NOTES

- The Steelers look to improve to 328-207 all-time against AFC opponents.
- Pittsburgh looks to open the season 4-0 at Heinz Field for the first time since 2009.
- Including the regular and postseason, Pittsburgh is looking for seventh consecutive win at home, which marks longest home winning streak since winning 10 in row in 2008-09.
- Pittsburgh looks to earn its sixth victory in the last seven games.
- The Steelers defense looks to allow less than 150 passing yards for the fifth time in the last seven games.
- Pittsburgh's defense will look to hold their seventh straight opponent to 20 points or less (0, 20, 17, 17, 13, 20).

Pittsburgh owns a 13-8 all-time record against the New England Patriots in the regular season and a 1-3 mark in the postseason...the Steelers are 9-6 at home and 4-2 in New England in the regular season...Pittsburgh is 1-2 against the Patriots at Heinz Field in the regular season...Pittsburgh has not won at home in the regular season against the Patriots since a 34-20 victory in 2004...the Steelers snapped the Patriots' NFL-record 18-game regular-season winning streak with that victory in 2004...New England has won seven of the past nine games in the series (including postseason), including victories in the 2001 and 2004 AFC Championship games, both in Pittsburgh...Pittsburgh and New England have met four times in the postseason and the Steelers are 1-3 in those games, including a 1-2 record at home...the Steelers defeated the Patriots, 7-6, on Jan. 3, 1998, in the AFC Divisional Playoffs...however, Pittsburgh lost, 24-17, to the Patriots in the AFC Championship Game Jan. 27, 2002, and 41-27 in the 2004 AFC Championship Game.

TEAM NOTES

Toughest Division?: The AFC North is the only division in the NFL to have all four teams with at least a .500 record this season. It is also the only division to have three teams with two or fewer losses.

Two teams in the AFC North currently have winning streaks of at least three games (Pittsburgh, Cincinnati). Collectively, AFC North teams are 4-1 against the NFC this season. Since 2008, the AFC North has had two teams in the playoffs each year.

Ground Success: In Week 7 at Arizona the Steelers recorded 91 rushing yards on 28 carries, helping the offense control the ball for 35:47. It marked the third consecutive game Pittsburgh out rushed their opponent, all wins. In four of the past six games, Pittsburgh has registered over 115 rushing yards.

In the last two home games (Weeks 5 and 6), the Steelers recorded 174 and 185 rushing yards, marking the first time Pittsburgh reached at least 160 rushing yards in back-to-back games since 2010 (162, 11/21/10 vs. Oak and 206, 11/28/10 at Buf). The Steelers average of 161.0 rushing yards in three home games is the fourth-highest average in home games in the NFL.

In Week 6 versus Jacksonville **RB Rashard Mendenhall** went over 100 rushing yards in the first half for the first time in his career (113), including a career long run of 68 yards. It was the second-most rushing yards by a Steeler in the first half, dating back to 1991. At the end of the game Mendenhall had 146 yards on 23 carries, the fourth most rushing yards of his career (151, 155, 165). His average of 6.3 yards per carry was his highest since averaging 7.0 against Denver on 11/9/09 (22 for 155).

In 2010, the Steelers averaged 120.3 rushing yards per game, which ranked seventh in the AFC and 11th in the NFL.

The Steelers outrushed 14-of-16 opponents in 2010, averaging nearly 60 more yards on the ground than their opponents. This season Pittsburgh has outrushed four of seven opponents, winning all four games.

The Steelers have achieved this success despite having a number of injuries to the offensive line since the start of the 2010 season. Last season the Steelers started five different combinations on the offensive line and so far in 2011 Pittsburgh has used a different starting offensive line combination in six of seven games.

This season Pittsburgh has also had to use a number of running backs due to injuries, three different Steelers have over 110 rushing yards through seven games and two have eclipsed 200 yards (Mendenhall, 351/Redman, 207).

Tough In The Air: This season has seen an unprecedented number of 300-yard passing games throughout the NFL. The Steelers number one ranked pass defense though has been yet to allow a team to even reach 260 net passing yards in a game.

In Week 5, the Steelers' held the Jacksonville offense to 76 net passing yards. Pittsburgh only gave up 10 net passing yards in the first two quarters, which is the fifth-fewest net passing yards allowed by Pittsburgh's defense in the first half, dating back to 1991.

The Pittsburgh defense has held four of seven opponents under 145 net passing yards.

The Steelers have held their opponents to a league-low 171.9 net passing yards per game and 5.78 yards per attempt. Pittsburgh has allowed a total of 1,203 net passing yards in seven games.

Limiting QBs: Pittsburgh has faced eight quarterbacks in seven games this season, holding six to a passer rating lower than 87.0. The Steelers have also not allowed a quarterback to throw for 300 yards and have held five of eight under 200 yards. Pittsburgh is one of six teams in the NFL to not allow a 300+ yard passer this season (Phi, Was, Cle, Cin, KC).

Since the start of the 2007 season, Pittsburgh's defense has allowed only 79 passing touchdowns, the third fewest in the NFL over that time span (Indianapolis Colts and New York Jets, 77). In 2011, the Steelers have yielded only eight passing touchdowns, which is tied for seventh fewest in the league.

If You Build It, They Will Come: The Steelers registered three of the top-10 all-time attendance records for a single game during the 2010 season, including the single-game record.

In the 2010 AFC Championship victory over the N.Y. Jets, the Steelers broke the single-game record. The attendance of 66,662 surpassed the old mark of 65,597 set October 25, 2009, during a game versus the Minnesota Vikings.

The previous regular-season record was 65,392, which was set on November 16, 2009 versus Cincinnati.

Pittsburgh set the team home attendance record in 2009 by averaging 63,458 (507,882 total).

Pittsburgh has sold out 305 straight games at home, dating back to Nov. 5, 1972 versus Cincinnati.

Heinz Field Advantage: The Steelers own the best home record in the NFL with a 230-88-1 record (.723) since 1970. Pittsburgh is 45-14 (.762) at home over the past seven seasons, including a 3-0 record in 2011. This season marked the third time in the past five seasons that the Steelers opened 3-0 at home.

Pittsburgh finished the 2004 regular season with an undefeated (8-0) home record for only the third time in team history and for the first time in 25 years.

The Steelers finished the 1979 regular season with an undefeated home record (8-0) and eventually won Super Bowl XIV. The Steelers were also undefeated at home (7-0) in 1972.

Controlling The NFC: After beating Arizona and Seattle in 2011, the Steelers have won 25 of their past 30 regular-season games versus teams in the NFC, dating back to 2003.

The Steelers are 99-58-1 all-time against the NFC, including 56-19-1 at home. Pittsburgh has won seven of their last eight games against NFC opponents.

The Steelers have reeled off six consecutive home victories versus NFC teams. Pittsburgh last lost to an NFC team at Heinz Field in 2008 (21-14, vs. New York Giants). Prior to losing to the Giants, Pittsburgh had won eight straight games versus NFC teams at home. The Steelers are 6-2 versus the NFC in the Super Bowl.

Turning Up the Heat: Pittsburgh has registered 17 sacks in 2011, which ranks fourth in the AFC and ties for eighth in the NFL. The Steelers have registered 13 of the 17 sacks at Heinz Field to lead the NFL for sacks at home.

The Steelers recorded three sacks in Week 5 against Tennessee and five in Week 2 versus Seattle, tying for the third highest single-game total of the **Mike Tomlin** era and the most since registering six versus Oakland on 11/21/10.

In Week 6 versus Jacksonville, Pittsburgh registered four of their five sacks in the first half, marking the 16th time since 1991 and the first time since 11/3/08 vs. Washington (4) that the Steelers recorded at least four sacks in the first half.

On the road the Steelers have recorded sacks at key times. Against Arizona in Week 7 **LB LaMarr Woodley** recorded a sack on third-and-seven at the PIT 45-yard line that forced a punt. Woodley also forced Cardinals QB Kevin Kolb into an intentionally grounding penalty in the end zone that resulted in a safety.

In Week 3 versus Indianapolis, **LB James Harrison** forced a fumble on a sack of Curtis Painter that **S Troy Polamalu** returned 16 yards for a touchdown to give Pittsburgh a 20-13 lead in the fourth quarter.

Since 1994, the Steelers have led the AFC in sacks six times and the entire NFL three times, including in 2010. Since 2004, the Steelers have the most sacks in the NFL with 326.

The Steelers led the NFL with 48 sacks in 2010, including a season-high six in Week 11 versus Oakland. In 2009, the Steelers finished with 47 sacks, ranking first in the AFC and second in the NFL.

Sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however, a record of "passers tackled" was kept prior to that time. Following are the Steelers' single-season sack totals dating back to 1970:

Defensive Dominance: The Steelers have given up 17.4 points per game in 2011 to rank third in the NFL. Over the past six weeks, Pittsburgh has given up a total of 87 points (14.5 points per game). In three home victories the Steelers have allowed a total of 30 points, giving up a league-low 10.0 points per game at home.

Since **Dick LeBeau** has been defensive coordinator (2004-present) the Steelers have allowed an average of 15.9 points per game at Heinz Field, ranking second in the NFL over that time span for points given up at home during the regular season (Baltimore, 14.6).

Last season Pittsburgh gave up just 232 points, which ranked first in the AFC and in the NFL.

The Steelers have allowed the fewest points in the NFL since the beginning of the 2007 season. Pittsburgh has allowed just 1,170 points during that span (16.5 per game).

The following is a list of the top four teams in the NFL who have allowed the fewest points since the start of the 2007 campaign:

Four Straight: In Week 6, the Steelers played the final game of four consecutive games against the AFC South. With a 17-13 win over the Jacksonville Jaguars, the Steelers finished the stretch 3-1. Pittsburgh opened up against the division with a 23-20 victory at Indianapolis in Week 3, followed by a 17-10 loss in Houston and a Pittsburgh victory over the Tennessee Titans at Heinz Field.

Steelers Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** improved to 7-4 against the AFC South during the regular season, including 2-1 against the Jaguars. Under Tomlin the Steelers are 4-2 at home against the AFC South during the regular season, including winning the last four. Overall, Pittsburgh is 6-5 at home versus the AFC South.

Starting Away From Home: This season the Steelers played three of their first four games on the road for the first time since 2001, and for only the eighth time in team history. In 2001, Pittsburgh went 3-1, including winning two out of three of those road games. This season the Steelers finished 1-2 on the road, losing the final away game in Week 4 at Houston, 17-10. The Steelers have won seven of their last nine regular-season road games.

Since 1970, Pittsburgh has opened the season with three of the first four games on the road six times and in five of those occurrences, including this season, they finished the four-game set with at least a .500 record. The chart below shows how they finished the first four games and the regular season.

Our House: Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** owns a 27-8 regular-season record at Heinz Field in his four seasons in Pittsburgh. The Steelers are 3-0 in 2011 at home.

Tomlin Versus the NFC: Following Week 7's victory over the Arizona Cardinals Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** improved his regular-season record to 13-5 against NFC teams in his fifth season at the helm of the Steelers.

The Steelers .722 regular season winning percentage against the NFC since 2007 is the third best in the NFL.

Primetime Specialist: Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** improved to 16-5 overall in primetime games, including an 8-3 record on the road, with the Week Three win at Indianapolis. He is 6-0 on Monday Night Football, 6-4 on Sunday Night Football and 4-1 on Thursday Night Football.

Tomlin joined only Bill Cowher (Steelers), Tom Flores (Raiders), Steve Mariucci (49ers), George Siefert (49ers) and Don Shula (Colts, Dolphins) as coaches to win their first six Monday Night Football games.

Strong Out Of The Gate: Pittsburgh won their first three home games for the third time in five seasons under Tomlin.

In Week 2 Pittsburgh won its fifth straight home opener under Head Coach Mike Tomlin. He is the only Steelers head coach to win his first five home openers.

Under Tomlin the Steelers are 13-5 in the month of October.

In Control: Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** owns an 18-7 all-time mark against teams in the AFC North.

Tomlin owns an impressive 10-2 record against divisional foes at Heinz Field.

Nine Times: Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** became only the seventh head coach to win at least nine games in each of his first four seasons since the NFL merger in 1970.

Tomlin joined George Siefert, Mike Holmgren, Bill Cowher, Chuck Knox, Mike Sherman and John Robinson.

Few And Far Between: Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** became only the second coach in Steelers' history to post winning records in each of his first four seasons. Tomlin is the only coach in team history to win division titles in each of his first two seasons (2007-08).

In 2007, Tomlin became the second head coach in team history to post a winning record in his first season with a mark of 10-6.

High Honor Roll: Defensive coordinator **Dick LeBeau** was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in August of 2010. LeBeau had an outstanding NFL career, finishing with 62 career interceptions (seventh all-time) and 171 consecutive starts (then-NFL record for a cornerback) with the Detroit Lions.

LeBeau was also inducted into the Ohio State University Hall of Fame in 2009. He played at Ohio State as a cornerback and halfback and was a member of the 1957 national championship team.

Defensive Mastermind: The Steelers defense has been led by defensive coordinator **Dick LeBeau** since 2004. During that time span it has been regarded as one of the top defenses in the NFL, helping to lead the Steelers to three Super Bowls. INDIVIDUAL OFFENSIVE NOTES

300-Yard Plateau: QB **Ben Roethlisberger** totaled 361 yards and three touchdowns in Week 7 at Arizona. It was the second time he has thrown for at least 300 yards this season and the 17th time in his career, a team record.

Roethlisberger previously registered 364 passing yards in Week 3 at Indianapolis. The Steelers have won five of the last six games where Roethlisberger has thrown for 300 yards.

Quick Start: QB **Ben Roethlisberger** has a passer rating of 106.2 in the first half of games in 2011. He has completed 77-of-120 pass attempts for 1019 yards, eight touchdowns and two interceptions in the first half of the first seven games this season.

Last week versus Arizona he registered a first half passer rating of 140.4 by completing 9-of-16 passes for 199 yards and two touchdowns.

Over the past three weeks Roethlisberger has led the Steelers offense to points on nine of 15 first-half possessions (seven TDs, two FGs), including scoring a touchdown on the opening drive in each of the last three games.

In Week 5 against Tennessee, Roethlisberger recorded three touchdown passes in the first half. It marked the fourth time in his career he totaled at least four touchdown passes in the first half and was only the sixth time since 1991 that a Steelers quarterback achieved the feat.

Roethlisberger completed 7-of-11 passes for 171 yards and one touchdown for a 137.5 passer rating in the first quarter against the Colts in Week 3. The 171 yards were the most yards he has thrown for in the first quarter during his career. Dating back to 1991, it was the highest first-quarter passing total of any Steelers' quarterback.

Roethlisberger went on to total 231 yards during the first half, the fifth highest first half total of his career. Out of those five games, the Steelers went on to win four of them.

Racking Up Yards: QB **Ben Roethlisberger** is in the midst of a career-long streak of 15 regular-season games with at least 200 passing yards.

For the first time in his career, Roethlisberger recorded at least 200 yards passing in each of the first seven games of the 2011 season.

Finding The End Zone: QB **Ben Roethlisberger** recorded the 20th game of his career with at least three touchdown passes in Week 7 at Arizona and the second one in three weeks. In the Steelers last three games, all victories, Roethlisberger has thrown for nine touchdowns and one interception.

He tied a career high with five touchdown passes in Week 5 against Tennessee. It was the fourth time in his career he threw at least four touchdown passes in one game and only the second time he totaled five (11/5/07 at Baltimore). Roethlisberger is the only Steelers quarterback to throw for a franchise-best five touchdowns in a single game twice during the regular season:

Facing The NFC: With a career record of 74-31 as a starter, QB **Ben Roethlisberger** has posted gaudy numbers no matter the opposition.

Throughout his career, Roethlisberger has feasted on competition from the NFC. In two games against the NFC this season, victories over Seattle and Arizona, he is 48-of-69 (69.6) for 659 yards with four touchdowns, zero interceptions and a passer rating of 119.2.

In 27 career regular-season games against NFC opponents, Roethlisberger has posted a 21-6 record while completing 432-of-698 passes (61.9 pct.) for 5,900 yards with 37 touchdowns and 17 interceptions for a passer rating of 96.4.

Roethlisberger's statistics against the NFC are equally impressive in games at Heinz Field. In 14 career games against NFC opponents at home, Roethlisberger has a 13-1 mark while completing 217-of-365 passes (59.5 pct.) for 3,139 yards with 18 touchdowns and eight interceptions for a passer rating of 94.8.

Roethlisberger won his first seven starts against NFC teams.

Titan-Sized Performances: QB Ben Roethlisberger improved to 3-1 during his career versus the Tennessee Titans, with all three wins coming at Heinz Field. In Week 5, Roethlisberger completed 24-of-34 passes for 228 yards, five touchdowns, one interception and a passer rating of 116.2. It marked his 43rd regular-season game with a passer rating of 100.0+ and his second against the Titans. His Week 5 performance earned Roethlisberger the seventh AFC Offensive Player of the Week honor of his career and the first since 1/2/11 at Cleveland.

In his first game versus Tennessee back on 9/11/05, Roethlisberger recorded his first perfect passer rating of 158.3 after completing 9-of-11 passes for 218 yards and two touchdowns.

Comeback Kid: In Week 3 at Indianapolis, **QB Ben Roethlisberger** led the Steelers on a 10-play, 60-yard drive in the final two minutes that led to a game-winning 38-yard field goal with 0:04 left. It marked his 24th game winning/overtime drive of his career in the regular season. The win improved him to 27-12 in games decided by six points or less (including postseason).

Title Man: QB Ben Roethlisberger has led the Steelers to the AFC Championship Game four times in his first seven seasons. He is one of only two active NFL quarterbacks to win multiple Super Bowl titles (Tom Brady).

Roethlisberger joined Roger Staubach, Bernie Kosar, Tom Brady and Donovan McNabb as the only quarterbacks to lead their teams to the conference title game at least three times in their first five seasons as the starting quarterback.

Controlling The North: QB Ben Roethlisberger owns a 29-8 (.784) record as a starter against AFC North opponents during his career with the Steelers. He finished a perfect 5-0 in 2010 against divisional foes.

Roethlisberger had won 12 straight games against divisional foes as the starter prior to the Week 3 setback at Cincinnati in 2009, which was the longest streak in the NFL and the longest since Peyton Manning won 12 straight from 2004-06.

In his 37 career games versus division opponents, Roethlisberger has posted a perfect passer rating once (11/5/07 vs. Baltimore) and has recorded a passer rating of over 100.0 a total of 14 times.

Home Cooking: QB Ben Roethlisberger owns a 41-12 (.774) mark in the regular season in his career at Heinz Field, including winning his first eight starts as a rookie in 2004.

At Heinz Field, Roethlisberger has completed 63.0 percent of his passes for 12,544 with 79 touchdowns and 43 interceptions for a passer rating of 94.3. He has thrown for more than 300 yards nine times and has 23 multi-touchdown games at home (18-5 record in such games), including a franchise and career tying high five touchdowns versus the Titans in Week 5.

Roethlisberger has twice posted a perfect passer rating at home, including most recently in Week 9 of 2007 against Baltimore. He also had a perfect passer rating (158.3) against Tennessee in the 2005 season opener and has posted at least a 125.0 passer rating seven times.

The Steelers have scored at least 20 points in 43 of the 53 games at home with Roethlisberger as the starter.

Starting In Style: In his career, **QB Ben Roethlisberger** owns a 74-31 (.705) record as a starting quarterback in the regular season. That mark is the second-best record in the NFL among all active quarterbacks (min. 50 starts).

With a win in Week 2 over Seattle, Roethlisberger reached 70 victories in the fourth-fewest starts (100) among quarterbacks who began their career in the Super Bowl era, only trailing Pro Football Hall of Famer Roger Staubach (94), Tom Brady (94) and Ken Stabler (98) in that category.

His 63-27 record after his first 90 starts in the NFL ranks third (tied) in league history for the best record in such starts. Only Tom Brady (67-23) and Ken Stabler (66-23-1) had better records in their first 90 starts in the NFL. Roethlisberger's record is tied with Jim McMahon.

Passing Perfection: QB Ben Roethlisberger has achieved a number of outstanding single-season accomplishments in his eight-year career, including achieving a feat three times that is rarely done in the NFL.

Roethlisberger, who set the team's single-season mark for passer rating (104.1) in 2007, has had a perfect passer rating (158.3) three times in his career, tying him with QB Peyton Manning for the most in NFL history (minimum 10 attempts).

Roethlisberger's 44 career 100-plus passer rating games in the regular season rank first in team history, surpassing Terry Bradshaw, who had 31 such games since the passer rating rule was implemented in 1973.

Taking Care of the Ball: QB Ben Roethlisberger completed 8-of-15 passes against Baltimore in Week 1 before throwing an interception early in the third quarter, ending his career-best streak of not throwing an interception in 173 consecutive passes. His interception streak started on December 5, 2010, at Baltimore.

Deadly Combination: Through seven games in 2011, **QB Ben Roethlisberger** and **WR Mike Wallace** have continued the success that started last season, hooking up for 730 yards on 36 receptions with five touchdowns.

The two have combined for 11 touchdowns of at least 40 yards since the start of 2009, which ranks first in team history and is the second-most amongst active players in the NFL (12, Peyton Manning and Reggie Wayne).

Through seven games in 2011, Roethlisberger and Wallace have recorded three touchdowns of at least 40 yards. In Week 7 at Arizona Roethlisberger and Wallace connected on a 95-yard touchdown, the longest pass play and second longest offensive play from scrimmage in Steelers history. In Week Five versus Tennessee, Roethlisberger and Wallace connected on a 40-yard touchdown pass. In Week 3 at Indianapolis the two recorded an 81-yard touchdown, marking the fourth-longest pass of Roethlisberger's career and the second longest reception for Wallace. Best of the Batch: QB Charlie Batch has a 23-29 record as a starting quarterback, including a 4-2 record in his nine seasons with Pittsburgh.

In his six career starts with the Steelers, Batch is 77-of-129 (59.7 pct.) for 969 yards with eight touchdowns and six interceptions (84.4 passer rating).

Moving Up: WR Hines Ward moved passed Hall of Fame WR Michael Irvin (11,904) into 19th place in NFL history in receiving yards. Out of the 18 players ahead of Ward on the NFL career receiving yards list, only Jerry Rice and Art Monk have multiple Super Bowl rings, and both are Hall of Famers.

In Week 5, Ward registered a team-high seven receptions for 54 yards with two touchdown, his 16th career multi-touchdown game during the regular season and first since 11/9/09 at Denver (2). Ward now has 11,939 career receiving yards and needs 61 yards to be the 18th player in NFL history to reach 12,000 receiving yards:

Top Dawg: WR Hines Ward leads the Steelers in at least 15 different career receiving categories.

Ward is the team's all-time leader in receiving yards (11,960), receptions (980) and receiving touchdowns (85).

Ward is the only wide receiver in Steelers history to be voted to four Pro Bowls. Ward's 1,167 receiving yards in 2009 made him the first Steelers receiver to reach 1,000 yards six times during

his career with the team. No other Steeler has more than three.

Additionally, Ward has 29 career 100-yard receiving games, which is first on the team's all-time list.

In 2002, Ward became the first receiver in Steelers history to catch 100 passes (112) in a season. His 12 touchdown receptions in 2002 tied him with Louis Lipps (1985) and Buddy Dial (1961) for the highest single-season total in team history.

Ward was selected to the 2002-05 AFC Pro Bowl squads.

In 2010, Ward became the first player in Steelers' history to reach 11,000 career receiving yards. Additionally, Ward, who has 967 career receptions, became just the 12th player in NFL history to record 900 receptions and 11,000 yards in a career.

Ward has 428 career rushing yards to mark the most by a Steelers wide receiver in team history.

Ward scored his first (and only) career rushing touchdown in 2004 against Philadelphia.

Wallace Continues To Thrive: WR Mike Wallace has started the 2011 season right where he left off in 2010, recording 36 receptions for 730 yards (20.3 avg.) and five touchdowns in his first seven games. In Week 7 at Arizona Wallace gained 118 yards on three receptions, including a 95-yard touchdown, the longest reception and second longest offensive play from scrimmage in

team history. It was Wallace's fourth 100-yard receiving game of the season.

He posted 100 yards receiving in each of the first three games this season, setting a franchise-best streak of six consecutive games with at least 100 yards receiving.

In Week 3 at Indianapolis, Wallace set a career high with 144 yards on five receptions, including an 81-yard touchdown. Dating back to 1991, Wallace's 129 yards on three receptions were the most by a Steelers' receiver in the first quarter.

In each of the first two regular-season games this season, Wallace matched his career-high of eight receptions in a game, originally set on 11/14/10 vs. New England.

In 2010, he posted his first career 1,000-yard season as he led all Steelers with 60 receptions, 1,257 receiving yards and 10 receiving touchdowns, all career highs.

Breakout Campaign: WR Mike Wallace had a personal-best 10 receiving touchdowns in 2010. Through seven games this season, Wallace has five touchdowns.

Going Deep: WR Mike Wallace was one of the NFL's top deep threats last season, averaging a conference-best 21.0 yards per catch (2nd in NFL), after leading the NFL in receiving average as a rookie in 2009. Through seven games in 2011, Wallace is averaging 20.3 yards per catch, good enough for third best in the NFL.

Since entering the league in 2009, Wallace has averaged 20.3 yards per catch and has 37 receptions of 25+ yards to lead the NFL.

So far in 2011, Wallace is tied for second in the NFL with nine receptions of at least 25 yards (26, 28t, 29, 40, 40t, 48, 53, 81t, 95t). He had 26 receptions for at least 20 yards in 2010, the most for Pittsburgh since Hall of Famer John Stallworth had 24 in 1984.

Through seven games in 2011, Wallace has six receptions of at least 40 yards, including a 81-yard touchdown at Indianapolis

in Week 3 and a 95-yard touchdown in Week 7 at Arizona, which ranks as the second longest offensive play from scrimmage and the longest pass play in Steelers' history. Wallace has registered a reception of at least 40 yards in each of the last six games, the longest such streak in the NFL since Isaac Bruce in 2000 (Games 2-7).

Last season, Wallace caught a 46-yard touchdown and a 41-yard touchdown in the Steelers' Week 3 victory at Tampa Bay. He became the first Steelers' receiver to have two 40-plus-yard touchdowns in the same game since Louis Lipps on Dec. 4, 1988 at Houston. Only five times in club history has a receiver had two touchdown catches of at least 40 yards.

Miller Time: TE Heath Miller ranks second on the Steelers' all-time receptions list and receiving yardage list for tight ends. Four receptions in Week 7 brought Miller to sixth place in Pittsburgh history (308), passing Franco Harric (306).

Three receptions in Week 5 against Tennessee made Miller the seventh player and second tight end in team history to reach 300 career receptions. Miller trails Elbie Nickel in both (329 receptions, 5,133 receiving yards) on the team's all-time list for tight ends.

Miller hauled in his first touchdown of 2011 and the 30th of his career, making him the eighth Steelers player to record at least 30 receiving touchdowns. He is second on the team's all-time list for touchdowns by a tight end (31). After registering a touchdown in the Week 7 victory over Arizona, Pittsburgh improved 22-6 when Miller finds the end zone.

More From Moore: RB Mewelde Moore has always been a steady contributor for the Steelers on special teams and on offense. It hasn't been any different so far in 2011.

After missing two games due to injury, Moore averaged 4.3 yards on six carries (26 yards) in Arizona.

In the Week 3 win at Indianapolis Moore helped move the Steelers in position for the game-winning field goal in the final minutes with three plays: 22-yard reception to the Colts' 41-yard

line, five-yard run to the Colts 25-yard line and a four-yard run to the Colts 21-yard line.

In Week 4 at Houston, Moore helped fill in for RB Rashard Mendenhall, when he left the game in the third quarter due to a hamstring injury, by registering 34 yards on four carries. It marked his highest single-game rushing performance since 11/30/08 at New England (67 yards on 12 carries).

Continuing To Contribute: RB Isaac Redman and WR Antonio Brown are two second-year players that continue to get better as each game goes by. Last season both showed flashes of their ability late in the season and through out the postseason. In 2011 they are showing up on a more consistent basis on offense.

Brown has shown more consistency as a receiver so far in 2011. In Week 7 at Arizona, Brown set career highs by recording a team-high seven receptions for 102 yards. He registered four receptions in both Weeks 2 and 3 and then a team-high five receptions for 67 yards in Week 4 at Houston.

Through seven games, Brown ranks second on the Steelers with 364 yards on 25 receptions, already surpassing his rookie totals of 167 yards on 16 receptions in nine games played last season.

In the four games that the Steelers have rushed for over 100 yards (124 vs. Sea, 118 at Hou, 174 vs. Ten, 185 vs. Jac) Redman has been a key contributor. He was second on the team against the Seahawks with a career-high 49 yards on 10 carries with one touchdown while totaling a team best 40 yards on six carries against the Texans. In his first career start, Redman tied his career-high of 49 yards on 15 carries against Tennessee before leaving the game early in the fourth quarter due to leg cramps. In Week Six against Jacksonville Redman averaged 5.5 yards per carry. On the road at Arizona in Week 7 he totaled 29 yards on six carries (4.8 avg.). The second-year back is tied for first in the NFL in third and one rushing, converting all four attempts this season.

INDIVIDUAL DEFENSIVE NOTES

Bringing The Wood: LB LaMarr Woodley has been a force defensively since he became a starter in 2008. The fifth-year linebacker leads the AFC with seven sacks this season, which is the second-most sacks Woodley has recorded through the first seven games of a season in his career (7.5, 2008). Including the postseason, Woodley has recorded at least half a sack 11 times in the past 14 games, totaling 13.5 sacks during the span.

Woodley recorded 1.5 sacks in Week 5 versus Tennessee and 2.0 sacks in both Week 6 against Jacksonville and Week 7 at Arizona, marking the second time in Woodley's career he registered multiple sacks in three consecutive regular season games (2008). Woodley has 15 career multi-sack games during the regular season.

His sack in Week 1 at Baltimore marked the third time in the past four Kickoff Weekend games (2008, 2010, 2011) he recorded a sack. With 44.0 sacks for his career, Woodley tied DE Aaron Smith for ninth on the team's all-time list.

Including the postseason, Woodley has recorded 20.0 sacks since the start of the 2010 season, tying for the fourth most in the NFL over that time span.

Woodley owns an NFL record after posting two sacks in each of his first four postseason games. Woodley has 11 sacks in seven career postseason games, including at least one sack in each game he has played.

Woodley had posted at least a half-sack in 10 straight games, dating from 2009-10, and had 13.5 sacks during that span (Week 10 of 2009 through Week 2 of this year). That span of 10 straight games broke the team's all-time record of six, previously held by Greg Lloyd in 1994.

Elite Company: LB LaMarr Woodley has registered 46.0 sacks in his first four-plus seasons with the Steelers, which ranks as the best start in franchise history and ties for the eighth most career sacks for a Steeler (Dwight White, 46.0).

Power Of The Beard: Over the past two weeks **DE Brett Keisel** has elevated his game to help lead an injury-plagued defensive unit. With multiple starters missing, the 10th year pro has recorded two of the best games of his career.

In Week 6 versus Jacksonville, Keisel tied a career-high with two sacks for a loss of 16 yards, the fourth multi-sack game of his career and first since 11/9/09 vs. Denver (2.0). He also registered five tackles, four QB pressures and one pass breakup against the Jaguars. Keisel followed that performance by leading the Steelers with five QB pressures in a Week 7 road win at Arizona.

Despite missing two games due to injury, Keisel leads the Steelers with 16 QB pressures this season.

Stepping Up: Over the past three weeks the Steelers had to deal with injury issues. Starting defenders **LB James Harrison, NT Casey Hampton** and **DE Aaron Smith** were all out due to injury, leaving the Steelers with holes to fill.

LB Lawrence Timmons slid from his normal position inside to fill in on the outside for Harrison. **LB Larry Foote** moved into Timmons starting ILB spot, making the 99th and 100th starts of his career and first since 12/20/09 as a member of the Detroit Lions. **DE Ziggy Hood**, who started Weeks 3 and 4 for **DE Brett Keisel**, moved to the other side to fill in for Smith over the last three weeks and is second on the team with 14 QB pressures this season. Hood was familiar with his spot after starting 10 games in place of Smith in 2010. In the center of the defense **NT Chris Hoke** took the place of Hampton over center for two weeks and the Steelers improved to 17-1 when Hoke starts. Hoke missed Week 7 at Arizona due to injury, forcing **NT Steve McClendon** to make his first career start.

It wasn't just the new starters that stepped up to fill in for missing starters, fellow starters and reserves also increased their level of play to make up for the missing personnel.

LB LaMarr Woodley has put together three of the best games of 2011, recording 5.5 sacks, two QB hits, one pass defended and one interception in the past three games. It marked the second time in Woodley's career he registered multiple sacks in three consecutive regular season games (2008).

S Ryan Clark recorded his first interception of 2011, after **LB James Farrior** tipped a pass by Arizona QB Kevin Kolb on the first drive of the game, giving the Steelers the ball on the Arizona 31-

yard. Pittsburgh offense capitalized with a touchdown to take a 7-0 lead. Clark also registered a team-high seven tackles at Arizona.

Rookie **DE Cameron Heyward** has seen increased playing time in a reserve roll and registered his first career sack, taking down QB Matt Hasselbeck for an eight-yard loss on third-and-one in the fourth quarter in Week 5.

All helped the Steelers limit Titans RB Chris Johnson to 51 yards on 14 attempts and one touchdown. Pittsburgh's defense held the Titans to 66 total rushing yards, the second lowest rushing total for a Steelers opponent this season (31 vs. Sea, 9/18). In Week Six they held the Jaguars to 76 net passing yards, the fourth-lowest out for an opposing offense during the Mike Tomlin era (2007-present). In Week 7 the Steelers held the Cardinals to 73 yards rushing.

Fantastic Furiar: Through seven games, **LB James Furiar** has recorded two sacks. Furiar now has 34.5 career sacks and 29 as a member of the Steelers.

In two of the past three weeks, Furiar has led the team lead in tackles, recording 13 against Tennessee and 12 versus Jacksonville. Before finishing second on the team with 137 tackles last season, Furiar had led the team in tackles for seven straight years (2003-09).

Man Of Troy: SS Troy Polamalu has continued to make plays during the 2011 season. In Week 6 against Jacksonville, Polamalu stopped RB Maurice Jones-Drew for no gain on third-and-one in the fourth quarter, forcing the Jaguars to punt. In Week 4 versus Houston he led the Steelers with 10 tackles. In Week 3 at Indianapolis Polamalu returned a fumble 16 yards for a touchdown in the fourth quarter. In Week 2 he registered his first sack of 2011 and the ninth of his career versus Seattle.

Polamalu ranks fifth in Steelers' history among safeties in sacks. He is one shy of passing Chris Oldham (9.5) for fourth place in franchise history for the most sacks among safeties.

In 2010, Polamalu made the "splash" plays that put him among the elite in the NFL. For his efforts, Polamalu was named 2010 NFL Defensive Player of the Year.

Polamalu, now has 27 career interceptions, the most of any active Steeler. The team is 22-3 when Polamalu has an interception.

All Good In The Hood: DE Ziggy Hood, the team's No. 1 draft pick in 2009, started the final 10 games of 2010 in place of injured DE Aaron Smith and has filled at both defensive end positions over the past five weeks.

In both Weeks 6 and 7, Hood accounted for two QB pressures, helping the Steelers defense register seven total sacks in two weeks. In Week 5 versus Tennessee Hood tied a career-high with four QB pressures (11/21/10 vs. Oak). Through six games in 2011, Hood has 14 tackles, a half a sack and is second on the team with 14 QB pressures.

He finished last season with 20 tackles and three sacks, which tied for the team-lead among defensive linemen (Keisel). He also led the defensive line unit with 18 QB pressures in 2010.

Back To Starting: CB William Gay has started the past six games for the Steelers. Including the 2010 postseason, Gay has started

eight of the past nine games. During the 2010 regular season Gay started one of 16 games played. This came after a 2009 season where he started 14 games.

In 2011, Gay has been a starting member of a pass defense that has yet to allow over 260 net passing yards in one game. Overall the Steelers rank first in the NFL, giving up an average of 171.9 net passing yards per game. In Week 6, Gay was part of a pass defense that held the Jaguars to 76 net passing yards, including only 10 in the first half. On the season, Gay has three passes defended and 23 tackles.

Outside Presence: LB James Harrison forced a fumble on a fourth-quarter sack of Colts QB Curtis Painter that **SS Troy Polamalu** returned 16 yards for a touchdown to give Pittsburgh a 20-13 lead during a Week 3 victory over Indianapolis.

It marked the 25th forced fumble of his career. Harrison ranks second in team history for career forced fumbles, behind only Greg Lloyd. The following is a list of the top seven career forced fumble leaders for the Steelers since 1987:

Harrison In Charge: LB James Harrison, the 2008 NFL Defensive Player of the Year, has been a terror on opposing quarterbacks since he became the starting outside linebacker for the Steelers in 2007.

Harrison recorded 51st career sack and forced a fumble that led to a touchdown in Week 3 at Indianapolis. He now has the seventh-most sacks in team history. The Steelers are 26-11 when he posts a sack. He needs three sacks to pass Greg Lloyd (53.5) for the sixth-highest career total in franchise history.

Harrison, who earned his fourth straight selection to the Pro Bowl last season, led the team with 10.5 sacks in 2010. He also had 100 tackles, six forced fumbles and two interceptions.

Sack Attack: LB James Harrison had a team-high 10.5 sacks in 2010 after posting 10 in 2009.

Harrison had a career-high 16 sacks in 2008, breaking the team record for sacks in a season. Mike Merriweather previously held the record since 1984.

Double Trouble: The Steelers have a tradition of fielding some of the best pass-rushing linebackers in the NFL, and current linebackers **James Harrison** and **LaMarr Woodley** have accounted for two of the top four sack totals by a Steelers' duo in team history.

INDIVIDUAL SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

Through seven games in 2011, the two have combined for 9.0 sacks: Harrison (2.0) and Woodley (7.0) even though Harrison has missed the last three games due to injury.

In 2010, Harrison (10.5) and Woodley (10) combined for 20.5 sacks. They totaled 23.5 sacks between them (Woodley 13.5, Harrison, 10) in 2009.

In 2008, Harrison and Woodley broke the team's top sack duo record (since 1982) by combining for 27.5 sacks. The 27.5 sacks by Harrison (16) and Woodley (11.5) broke the record (24) previously held by Jason Gildon (13.5) and Joey Porter (10.5) in 2000 and Kevin Greene (14) and Greg Lloyd (10) in 1994.

Double-Digit Duty: LB James Harrison became the first player in team history to post at least 10 sacks in three straight seasons as he had a team-best 10.5 in 2010.

Harrison posted 10 in 2009 and a career-best (team record) 16 in 2008.

Additionally, **LB LaMarr Woodley** became just the second player in team history to post at least 10 sacks in three straight years as he finished with 10 in 2010. Woodley recorded 13.5 in 2009 and 11.5 in 2008.

He's Back: P Daniel Sepulveda, who missed the final four regular-season games in 2010 with an ACL injury, has had a stellar first seven games this season.

In Week 5 versus Tennessee, Sepulveda completed the second pass attempt of his career when he found **S Ryan Mundy** for a 33-yard gain on a fake punt, converting a fourth-and-five down to the Tennessee 17-yard line. The drive resulted in a touchdown that gave Pittsburgh a 14-3 lead. It was Sepulveda's second career pass attempt (32-yard pass to Najeh Davenport, at St. Louis, 12/20/07).

When Sepulveda has punted he has done quite well. He surpassed his career-long twice in the first two weeks of the season. In his first game back he registered a 64-yard punt down to the Baltimore 16-yard line in, eclipsing his previous career-long of 62 yards (9/26/10 at Tampa Bay). For the game, Sepulveda averaged 52.8 yards (47.8 net avg.) on four punts with two landing inside the 20-yard line.

He followed up that performance by setting a new career long of 66 yards in week 2 and also hit punts of 61 and 48 yards for an average of 58.3 yards.

In Week 4 at Houston, Sepulveda averaged 50.5 yards on four punts (202 total yards) with a net average of 46.3 and a long of 58 yards. It marked his eighth career game when he averaged over 50 yards per punt, including the third this season.

Oh So Suisham: Connected on a 38-yard field with four seconds left in the fourth quarter to give Pittsburgh a 23-20 victory over Indianapolis in Week 3. It marked the fourth game-winning field goal of his career and second as a member of the Steelers.

Return Success: WR Antonio Brown started the 2011 season by performing well in the return game. He ranks third in the AFC in punt returns (12.8 avg.) and second in the NFL kickoff returns (29.4 avg.).

On punt returns, he registered a career-long 41-yard return in Week 2 versus Seattle it marked the longest punt return by a Steeler since 11/5/07 (49 yards, Allen Rossum, vs. Baltimore). He followed it up with the second and third longest punt returns of his career over the next two weeks, 37 yards at Indianapolis and 33 yards at Houston. In Week 7 at Arizona, Brown averaged 23.5 yards on two punt returns, including a long of 31 yards.

Brown has also performed well on kick returns. Against Tennessee in Week 5, he registered the second longest kick return of his career (89-yard TD, 9/12/10 vs. Atl), a 52-yarder to the 50-yard line. In Week 1 against the Baltimore Ravens he returned three kickoffs for a total of 103 yards (31, 41 and 31 yards).

Preseason Game #1

LANDOVER, Md. – For the first time since 2006, the Steelers lost their preseason opener, falling to the Washington Redskins, 16-7, at FedEx Field. The Steelers fell to 4-9 in the preseason when facing the Redskins on the road.

Neither team scored in the first quarter, but the Redskins had an opportunity on their opening drive of the game but K Shayne Graham missed a 29-yard field goal. Midway through the second quarter, QB Rex Grossman found WR Santana Moss for an eight-yard touchdown to give the Redskins a 7-0 lead. Grossman finished with a game-high 207 yards passing and one touchdown. Moss finished with a game-high seven receptions for 64 yards and one touchdown.

The Steelers answered Washington on their next possession. **RB Isaac Redman** broke free for a 22-yard touchdown run to tie the game, 7-7. Redman finished the game with five carries for 42 yards and one touchdown. But it would be the last points the Steelers would score. Prior to halftime, Graham missed another field goal, this time from 49 yards, and the teams went into halftime tied 7-7.

The Steelers only managed to gain 57 yards of offense in the second half, and only drove the ball into Redskins' territory once. The Redskins moved the ball well in the second half. Rookie RBs Evan Royster and Roy Helu combined for 88 rushing yards, while QB Kellen Clemens added 105 passing yards. K Graham Gano made three second-half field goals, from 32, 34 and 45 yards out, to seal the victory for the Redskins.

The Redskins gained 452 total yards of offense (312 passing, 140 rushing) to the Steelers' 186 yards of total offense (103 passing, 83 rushing). Washington's offense had 27 first downs, while the Steelers only had 12. The Redskins' defense added three sacks, while the Steelers' defense had zero. Washington also dominated the time of possession, holding the football for almost 20 minutes more than Pittsburgh.

The majority of the Steelers' starters only played one or two series, while the Redskins' starters played the entirety of the first half. Despite accounts that the preseason games would consist of sloppy play, there were only five total penalties in the game and neither team had a turnover.

PITTSBURGH – The Steelers' offense scored three touchdowns in the first half, cruising to a 24-14 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles at Heinz Field. With the win, the Steelers improved to 11-4 all-time against the Eagles at home in the preseason.

Less than a week after the Steelers' first-team offense failed to score a touchdown, they erupted for three first-half scores. **QB Ben Roethlisberger** found **WR Antonio Brown** for a 29-yard touchdown midway through the first quarter to put the Steelers up 7-0. Roethlisberger then found **WR Hines Ward** for a 20-yard touchdown early in the second quarter to give the Steelers a 14-0 lead. Roethlisberger finished the game 8-of-12 for 125 yards and two touchdowns.

On the Eagles next drive **S Ryan Clark** picked off QB Michael Vick, the first of five forced turnovers by the Steelers on the night. On the following Eagles drive, **CB Keenan Lewis** picked off Vick. And prior to halftime, **S Troy Polamalu** picked off Vick to set the Steelers up in Eagles' territory. With only 19 seconds left in the half **QB Byron Leftwich** found newly acquired **WR Jerricho Cotchery** for a 20-yard score and the Steelers went into halftime with a 21-0 lead. Leftwich completed 4-of-7 passes for 67 yards and one touchdown.

QB Vince Young came in for the Eagles in the third quarter and he was picked off by **LB Larry Foote**. Early in the fourth quarter, RB Dion Lewis was stripped by **S Will Allen**, the fifth turnover of the night for the Eagles.

PITTSBURGH – **QB Ben Roethlisberger** and **WR Antonio Brown** combined for two long touchdowns (77, 44) in the first half, and the Steelers cruised to a 34-16 victory against the Atlanta Falcons at Heinz Field. Pittsburgh is now 7-0 all time versus the Falcons in the preseason.

The Steelers wasted no time getting on the board, scoring only a minute and a half into the game. Brown took the opening kickoff back 51 yards and three plays later **RB Rashard Mendenhall** scored on a one-yard TD run. **LB Lawrence Timmons'** interception of QB Matt Ryan set up the Steelers second score, a **Shaun Suisham** 19-yard field goal, and the Steelers led 10-0.

The Falcons tied the game 10-10 on a field goal by K Matt Bryant and a 10-yard touchdown pass from Ryan to WR Roddy White. But the Steelers' offense kept rolling. Roethlisberger found Brown in the middle of the field for a 77-yard touchdown midway through the second quarter. With less than two minutes left in the half, Brown grabbed a 44-yard touchdown pass from Roethlisberger. Brown finished with a game-high 137 receiving yards and a game-high two touchdowns, while adding 109 kickoff return yards. Roethlisberger finished with 214 yards passing on just 11 completions and two touchdowns.

Bryant added a 46-yard field goal prior to halftime to cut the lead to 24-16. Neither team scored in the third quarter, but seconds into the fourth quarter, **CB Crezdon Butler** stepped in front of QB Chris Redman's pass and took it 95 yards for a touchdown to give the Steelers a 31-16 lead. CHARLOTTE – For the second consecutive year, the Steelers finished their preseason schedule in familiar fashion, beating the Carolina Panthers. With the 33-17 victory at Bank of America Stadium, the Steelers improved to 8-4 all time when facing the Panthers in the preseason.

The Steelers struck first for the third consecutive game, this time with a little luck. **WR Mike Wallace** caught the ball at the one-yard line, but he was stripped by CB Chris Gamble and the football rolled into the end zone. **TE David Johnson** fell on the loose ball and the Steelers took a 7-0 lead. Baltimore 35, Pittsburgh 7

BALTIMORE – The Steelers dropped their season opener for the first time since 2002, losing to the Baltimore Ravens at M&T Bank Stadium, 35-7. It was the largest margin of victory for the Ravens in the series history, thanks in large part to seven Steelers' turnovers.

It only took three plays for the Ravens to score their first touchdown. RB Ray Rice took the opening snap and rushed for 36 yards. Two plays later QB Joe Flacco found WR Anquan Boldin for a 27-yard touchdown and the Ravens led 7-0.

The Steelers first turnover came late in the first quarter when LB Terrell Suggs sacked and stripped the ball from **QB Ben Roethlisberger**. Suggs finished with a game-high three sacks. Rice then ran it in from one-yard out to put the Ravens up 14-0. The Steelers responded on their ensuing drive. Roethlisberger found **WR Emmanuel Sanders** for an 11-yard touchdown to cut the lead 14-7. But it would be the last points the Steelers would score.

Flacco and Rice hooked up for an 11-yard touchdown prior to halftime and the Steelers found themselves in a 14-point hole. On the Steelers' first play of the second half, Ravens' NT Haloti Ngata broke free and stripped the football from **RB Rashard Mendenhall**, setting the Ravens up at the Steelers' 16-yard line. On the very next play, Flacco found TE Ed Dickson for an 18-yard touchdown. Flacco finished the game 17-of-29 for 224 yards with three touchdowns and zero interceptions.

On the Steelers' very next offensive play, Roethlisberger was picked off by LB Ray Lewis. And on the Steelers ensuing drive, it looked as if they would find a way into the endzone, but Roethlisberger was intercepted by S Ed Reed. After Reed's interception, the Ravens marched right down the field and K Billy Cundiff connected on a 29-yard field goal.

Reed picked off Roethlisberger again in the fourth quarter, and the Steelers' **RB Mewelde Moore** was stripped by Lewis midway through the fourth quarter for the Steelers' seventh turnover. Cundiff connected from 30 yards out before the two-minute warning to give the Ravens the 35-7 victory.

PITTSBURGH – The Steelers won their ninth straight home opener, shutting out the Seattle Seahawks 24-0 at Heinz Field. This was the team's first shutout since the 2008 season and the second-consecutive time the Seahawks have been shut out at Heinz Field.

On the Steelers' opening drive, **QB Ben Roethlisberger** led the team to the Seattle one-yard line but the Seahawks held the Steelers on fourth-and-goal. The Steelers responded on their next drive when **RB Rashard Mendenhall** scored from one-yard out to put the Steelers up 7-0. Mendenhall finished with a game-high 66 yards rushing and one touchdown.

The Steelers went up 14-0 in the second quarter when **RB Isaac Redman** scored on a 20-yard touchdown run. It was Redman's first career rushing touchdown. He finished the game with 49 yards rushing and one touchdown. Steelers' **K Shaun Suisham** added a 20-yard field goal late in the first half and the Steelers took a 17-0 lead into halftime.

The Steelers scored their final points when Roethlisberger found **WR Mike Wallace** for a two-yard touchdown pass late in the third quarter. Wallace tied a career-high with eight receptions for 126 yards and one touchdown. The 126 receiving yards were the second-highest total of his career. Wallace also surpassed 100+ yards receiving for the fifth consecutive regular-season game.

The Steelers defense did not budge against Seattle, only letting up 164 total yards (133 passing, 31 rushing). The 164 yards allowed are the third-lowest total since the start of the 2008 season. The defense added five sacks. **NT Steve McLendon** recorded his first career half-sack and **LB James Harrison** became just the seventh player in team history to reach 50 sacks with his sack of QB Tarvaris Jackson.

With the victory, Roethlisberger won his 70th game as a starting quarterback. Roethlisberger is now 5-0 in home openers.

INDIANAPOLIS – **K Shaun Suisham** nailed a 38-yard field goal with only four seconds left in the game to lift the Steelers to a 23-20 victory against the Indianapolis Colts at Lucas Oil Stadium. With the victory, the Steelers improved to 2-1 on the season. It marked the first victory for the Steelers in Indianapolis during the regular season since 1991.

The Steelers took the opening kickoff and went up 3-0 on Suisham's 48-yard field goal. Late in the first quarter, the Steelers took a 10-0 lead when **QB Ben Roethlisberger** found **WR Mike Wallace** for an 81-yard touchdown, the longest reception in Wallace's career. Wallace finished the game with a career-high 144 yards receiving and one touchdown, extending his franchise record to six consecutive 100-yard receiving games.

The Colts scored 13 unanswered points, thanks in large part to three Steelers' turnovers. A Roethlisberger fumble set up K Adam Vinatieri's 21-yard field goal to cut the lead 10-3. And with less than two minutes remaining in the half, Roethlisberger was sacked and stripped and Colts' DE Jamaal Anderson scooped the ball up and returned it 47 yards for a touchdown. On the Steelers' ensuing drive, Roethlisberger was picked off and Vinatieri connected from 25 yards out to give the Colts a 13-10 lead at halftime.

The Steelers tied the game 13-13 early in the fourth quarter on Suisham's 44-yard field goal. Midway through the fourth quarter the Steelers' defense forced its first turnover of the season on **LB James Harrison's** sack and forced fumble. **S Troy Polamalu** picked up the loose ball and returned it 16 yards to give the Steelers a 20-13 lead.

The Colts though struck on their next drive. RB Joseph Addai scored from six yards out to tie the game 20-20. But there was plenty of time for the Steelers to score. Roethlisberger led the team on a 10-play, 60-yard drive that was capped off by Suisham's game-winning field goal. It was Roethlisberger's 24th game-winning/overtime drive of his career. Roethlisberger finished with a game-high 364 yards passing with one touchdown.

HOUSTON – RB Arian Foster scored on a 42-yard run midway through the fourth quarter to score the final points of a 17-10 victory for the Houston Texans over the Steelers at Reliant Stadium. With the loss, the Steelers fell to 2-2 on the season.

The Texans scored on their first possession as QB Matt Schaub led the team on a 19-play, 95-yard drive that was capped off by a one-yard touchdown toss to TE Owen Daniels.

K Neil Rackers added a 25-yard field goal late in the second quarter to give the Texans a 10-0 lead. The Steelers finally had some momentum on their final drive of the half. **K Shaun Suisham** attempted a 30-yard field goal, but it was blocked by S Danieal Manning. CB Johnathan Joseph then scooped up the loose football and returned 61 yards for a touchdown but the play was negated on a block in the back penalty. The Steelers trailed 10-0 at the half.

On the Steelers' first possession of the second half **QB Ben Roethlisberger** led the team on a 13-play, 74-yard drive that was capped by **RB Rashard Mendenhall's** three-yard touchdown run. The Steelers then tied the game, 10-10, when Suisham connected from 26 yards to begin the fourth quarter.

On the Texans' ensuing possession, Foster broke free and scored from 42 yards out. It was the longest run the Steelers' defense had given up since the 2006 season. The Steelers though had a chance to tie the game with less than a minute left, but Roethlisberger was picked off by CB Jason Allen.

The Texans rushed for 180 yards, which is the second-most rushing yards the Steelers' defense allowed in a game since the 2001 season. Foster's 155 rushing yards were the second-most by a running back against the Steelers' defense since 2001.

WR Hines Ward had one reception for 19 yards, giving him 11,838 career receiving yards, which puts him in 20th place in NFL History for receiving yards.

The Titans scored on their first possession of the game, marching 69 yards on 13 plays. K Rob Bironas connected from 29 yards out to put the Titans up 3-0.

The Steelers scored touchdowns on their first three possessions of the game. Roethlisberger found **TE Heath Miller** for an eight-yard touchdown pass to take a 7-3 lead. The Jaguars had a chance to win the game on their final drive, but Gabbert's hail-mary attempt was knocked down by Steelers' defenders.

The Steelers offense totaled 370 yards, including a season-high 185 yards on the ground. The Steelers' defense held the Jaguars to 209 total yards, including 76 net passing yards. The Steelers defense also had five sacks, including a pair from both **LB LaMarr Woodley** and **DE Brett Keisel**.

GLENDAL, Ariz. – The Steelers won their third consecutive game, defeating the Arizona Cardinals 32-20 at the University of Phoenix Stadium. With the win, the Steelers improved to 5-2 on the season, including 2-0 against the NFC West.

The Steelers scored a touchdown on their first possession for the third straight game after **S Ryan Clark** intercepted QB Kevin Kolb off a tipped pass to set the Steelers up at the Cardinals 31-yard line. Five plays later, **QB Ben Roethlisberger** found **TE Heath Miller** for a 12-yard score, and the Steelers led 7-0.

Midway through the second quarter, Roethlisberger and **WR Mike Wallace** connected on a 95-yard touchdown reception. It was the longest pass play in Steelers' history and second-longest play from scrimmage in team history. Wallace has now recorded one reception of at least 40 yards in six consecutive games, which is the longest streak in the NFL since Isaac Bruce in 2000. Wallace finished with a game-high 118 yards receiving and one touchdown.

With the Steelers up 14-0, the Cardinals answered with a 13-play 80-yard drive that was capped off by a one-yard run by RB Alfonso Smith to cut the lead 14-7. The Steelers went into halftime with a 17-7 lead when **K Shaun Suisham** connected on a 41-yard field goal as time expired.

The Cardinals cut the lead 17-14 when Kolb found RB LaRod Stephens-Howling for a 73-yard touchdown. But the Steelers put the game out of reach on their next three drives. Roethlisberger found **WR Emmanuel Sanders** for a four-yard touchdown to put the Steelers up 24-14. Then the Steelers registered a safety, their first since the 2008 season. **LB LaMarr Woodley** pressured Kolb in the end zone and Kolb was flagged for intentional grounding.

Suisham added two field goals in the fourth quarter (42, 39) to give the Steelers a 32-14 lead. The Cardinals added one score late in the fourth quarter.

Roethlisberger finished the game 26-of-39 for 361 yards with three touchdowns and zero interceptions, guiding the Steelers' offense to a season-high 445 total yards. Woodley added two sacks, marking the second time in his career that he's had three consecutive multi-sack games.
