NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (2-1) at MIAMI DOLPHINS (2-1)

Mon., Oct. 4, 2010 ★ Sun Life Stadium (75,192) ★ 8:30 p.m. EDT

The New England Patriots will travel to Miami for their first prime time game of the season on Monday Night Football against the Dolphins. The game will be the Patriots' third consecutive game against an AFC East opponent. The Patriots lost to the New York Jets on Sept. 19 at the New Meadowlands Stadium, then returned home where they beat Buffalo, 38-30, last Sunday.

The Patriots and Dolphins have squared off in prime time action 14 times, with 13 of those games being played in Miami. The teams have played on Monday Night Football nine times, Sunday Night Football three times, and Thursday Night Football two times. The Patriots are 4-5 all-time against Miami on Monday Night, including 3-5 at Miami.

Bill Belichick is 46-20 against AFC East opponents as head coach of the Patriots and QB Tom Brady owns a 40-11 record against AFC East opponents as a starter, including a 10-6 record against Miami.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be nationally televised by ESPN and can be seen in Boston on WCVB-TV Channel 5. **Mike Tirico**, **Ron Jaworski** and **Jon Gruden** will call the game. **Suzy Kolber** and **Michele Tafoya** will be the sideline reporters.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience by **Westwood One Radio Sports**. **Kevin Harlan** and **Boomer Esiason** will call the game. **Steve Tasker** will report from the sidelines.

RADIO: 98.5 FM, The Sports Hub, is the flagship station for the **Patriots Radio Network**. A complete listing of the network's 36 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 34th season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 27th season as a tandem.

DIVISIONAL DOMINANCE

The New England Patriots own a 44-14 (.759) record in regular season AFC East games since the beginning of the 2001 season, compiling the best intra-division record of any team in the NFL over the last nine seasons. The Patriots finished 4-2 in the division in 2009.

NOTES: The Indianapolis Colts were members of the AFC East in 2001 and compiled a 3-5 divisional record that season. In 2002, the Patriots and Jets both finished with a 9-7 overall record and a 4-2 divisional record, but the Jets claimed the division title by virtue of having a better record against common opponents. In 2008, the Patriots and Dolphins both finished with an 11-5 overall record and a 4-2 divisional record.

PATRIOTS VS. DOLPHINS

SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and Miami Dolphins will square off for the 90th time, including three playoff games, in their 45th year as division foes. The Dolphins and Patriots began playing twice a year during the regular season in 1967.

The Patriots have won 10 of the last 15 games against Miami. The teams have split the annual series in each of the last two seasons and five of the last six seasons. Last year, the Patriots beat Miami 27-17 (11/08/09) at Gillette Stadium before losing the rematch, 22-21 (12/06/09) in Miami.



The Patriots and Dolphins have squared off in prime time action 14 times, with 13 of those games being played in Miami. The teams have played on Monday Night Football nine times, Sunday Night Football three times, and Thursday Night Football two times. The Patriots are 4-5 all-

time against Miami on Monday Night, including 3-5 at Miami. This week's game is the first meeting on Monday Night Football between the two teams since Dec. 20, 2004 when the Dolphins beat the Patriots, 29-28 in Miami.

The Patriots have had the upper hand at home against Miami, as they hold a 26-17 record in games played in Boston in the regular-season, including a 6-2 record at Gillette Stadium. The Patriots are 11-33 all-time in Miami.

The two have played three times in the postseason with New England holding a 2-1 advantage.

PATRIOTS-DOLPHINS QUICK HITS

- Since Bill Belichick became Patriots head coach in 2000, New England is 11-9 (.579) against the Miami Dolphins. Since 2001, the Patriots are 44-14 against AFC East opponents. Half of those losses (7) have come to Miami. The Patriots are 11-7 against the Dolphins over that span and are 13-6 against the New York Jets and 18-1 against the Buffalo Bills in that time.
- The Patriots have not been swept in their season series with a divisional opponent since 2000, when they lost both games to Miami and also to the New York Jets.
- In six career games against the Dolphins, Wes Welker has caught 47 passes for 613 yards and two touchdowns, averaging 7.8 catches and 102 receiving yards per game against his former club. Those averages are the best against any team Welker has faced more than once in his career. He also has three 100-yard games against Miami with a 138-yard game at Miami (10/21/07), a 120-yard game at Miami (11/23/08) and a 10-catch 169-yard game last season at Miami (12/06/09).
- Last season, Randy Moss caught six passes for 147 yards with a 71-yard touchdown vs. Miami (11/08/09) and then had a 58-yard touchdown pass at Miami (12/06/09). He has four career 100-yard games against Miami with three as a member of the Patriots.

PASSING PERFORMANCES

Tom Brady is scheduled to start at quarterback against Miami for the 17th time and has recorded a 10-6 record in his previous 16 starts against the Dolphins. Brady is 40-11 in his career as a starter in the regular-season against AFC East opponents, with five of the nine losses coming to the Dolphins.

PATRIOTS ON MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL

The New England Patriots are 17-22 all-time on Monday Night Football, including 10-5 under head coach Bill Belichick. The Patriots had a six-game winning streak on Monday Night Football snapped last season when they dropped a 38-17 decision at New Orleans on Nov. 30, 2009. The Patriots played two Monday Night Football games in 2009, beating Buffalo in the Monday Night Football opener, 25-24 on Sept. 14, 2009 before losing to the Saints. The Patriots are 8-8 in home Monday Night Football games and 9-14 on the road.

BRADY AGAINST THE AFC EAST

As a starter against the AFC East, Tom Brady owns a 40-11 (.784) record. He is 16-1 against Buffalo, 12-4 against the New York Jets, 10-6 against Miami and was 2-0 against Indianapolis when they were in the AFC East (2001 season).

NFL'S BEST ROAD WARRIORS THIS DECADE

Since the start of the 2000 season, the Patriots have the third best road record with a 51-30 record, behind Indianapolis (56-26) and Philadelphia (53-28-1).

BRADY ON MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL

QB Tom Brady owns an 8-4 record when playing on Monday Night Football. His best statistical performance on Monday Night Football was the 2009 season opener when he went 39-of-53 for 378 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Patriots to a 25-24 win over Buffalo. He earned AFC Offensive Player of the week honors for his performance. He has thrown three or more touchdowns in a Monday Night game six times, including a four-touchdown performance in a 31-7 win at Minnesota (10/30/06).

The Patriots improved to a 6-2 record with a 27-17 victory over AFC East Divisional rival Miami. QB Tom Brady and WR Randy Moss connected on two big plays and the New England defense stopped the dangerous Wildcat offense to claim the win and extend the team's lead in the division. Moss set up New England's first touchdown with a 36-yard reception at the 1-yard line. Then in the third quarter, Moss caught a pass from Brady and broke one tackle en route to a 71-yard touchdown. Moss finished the day with six receptions for 147 yards. Brady had his third-straight 300-yard game after completing 25 of 37 pass attempts for 332 yards. It was also his team-record 27th career 300-yard game.

The Miami Dolphins overcame a 14-0 first half deficit and edged out a 22-21 victory over the visiting New England Patriots. For the third time on the road in 2009, the Patriots lost after leading in the fourth quarter when they failed to hold a 21-19 lead late in the game. QB Tom Brady completed 19-of-29 pass attempts for 352 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions. Brady threw touchdown passes of 58 yards to WR Randy Moss and 81 yards to WR Sam Aiken, and also had a 58-yard completion to WR Wes Welker. However, New England twice failed to score inside the Miami 10-yard line. The Patriots were stopped on downs from the Miami 6-yard line early in the second quarter, and then Brady was intercepted in the end zone from the Miami 4-yard line in the fourth quarter.

CONNECTIONS

- Miami Executive Vice President of Football Operations **Bill Parcells** served as Head Coach of the New England Patriots from 1993-96.
- Miami Dolphins Head Coach **Tony Sparano** was raised in West Haven, Conn. and was a four-year letterman at the University of New Haven. Sparano later became the offensive line coach/recruiting coordinator at the University of New Haven from 1984-87 and its head coach from 1994-98. Sparano was also the offensive line coach/recruiting coordinator/academic liaison at Boston University from 1988-89 and BU's offensive coordinator from 1990-93.
- Miami Offensive Coordinator **Dan Henning** was the head coach at Boston College from 1994-96.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2010

RANDY MOSS

- Moss is in fifth place on the NFL's all-time receiving yards list with 14,604 yards and needs 605 receiving yards in 2010 to move into second place all-time, behind Jerry Rice (22,895). He needs 396 receiving yards to become the fourth player in NFL history with 15,000 receiving yards. Jerry Rice (22,895), Isaac Bruce (15,208) and Terrell Owens (15,103) are the only other players to accomplish the feat.
- Moss is 10th place on the NFL's all-time list for receptions with 935. He needs 65 receptions to become just the seventh player in NFL history with 1,000 career receptions.
- Moss is in fourth place in NFL history with 152 overall touchdowns. He is just the fourth player in NFL history with at least 150 touchdowns. He has 151 receiving touchdowns and joins Jerry Rice (197) as the only players to top 150 touchdown catches.
- Moss has recorded 1,000 receiving yards in a season 10 times in his 12-year career. Moss can join Jerry Rice (14) as the only players in NFL history with 11 seasons with 1,000 receiving yards.

TOM BRADY

- Brady has 99 wins and needs one win to become the 11th NFL QB to reach 100 wins.

WES WELKER

- Welker has a streak of 66 straight regular-season games with at least one reception. The last time Welker did not catch a pass in a game was 12/24/05 when he played for the Dolphins. He has caught at least one pass in each of his 52 games as a Patriot, including three postseason games.

Quarterback Tom Brady threw three touchdown passes, with two going to WR Randy Moss, as the Patriots beat Buffalo, 38-30, to extend their streak to 14 straight wins over the Bills.

The Patriots tied Miami for the third longest winning streak against an opponent. Miami beat the Colts 14 consecutive times from 1980 through 1987.

Buffalo managed 30 points, but Bills QB Ryan Fitzpatrick was intercepted twice in the fourth quarter. Early in the final period with the Patriots holding a 31-23 lead, Fitzpatrick led Buffalo to the New England 20-yard line where his pass was intercepted by S Patrick Chung in the end zone. The Patriots converted the turnover into a touchdown to take a 38-23 lead. After a touchdown pass from Fitzpatrick closed the gap to 38-30, Buffalo got the ball back with 3:04 remaining, but Fitzpatrick was intercepted by S Brandon Meriweather on a pass deep down the sideline. New England ran out the clock to preserve the win.

RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis gained 98 yards on 16 carries to help the Patriots chalk up 200 yards rushing. Brady finished 21-of-27 for 252 yards with the three touchdown passes.

Buffalo scored on four of their five first half possessions, while New England scored two touchdowns and a field goal to go in front 17-16 at halftime. After Buffalo took a 3-0 lead, rookie TE Aaron Hernandez produced 52 yards of offense on the Patriots' first offensive possession, which ended in a 7-yard touchdown reception by Moss. Hernandez had a 13-yard rush, a 25-yard catch and a 14-yard catch on the drive.

Sandwiched between three consecutive Buffalo scoring drives in the second quarter was a 22-yard touchdown run by newly acquired RB Danny Woodhead. K Stephen Gostkowski nailed a 43-yard field goal at the buzzer to secure the 17-16 lead at the half.

Brady hit Moss for a 35-yard touchdown to open the third quarter for a 24-16 lead. Buffalo returned the ensuing kickoff to close the gap to 24-23, but the Patriots came right back with a 5-yard touchdown pass from Brady to TE Rob Gronkowski to culminate a 13-play, 59-yard drive.

MOSS AMONG THE BEST

Randy Moss registered his 150th career receiving touchdown on a 7-yard reception from QB Tom Brady in the first quarter. Moss joins Jerry Rice (197) as the only players in NFL history to reach 150 touchdown receptions. Moss added a 35-yard touchdown reception in the third quarter and finished the game with 151 career touchdown receptions.

MOSS MOVED UP ON PATRIOTS ALL-TIME SCORING AND ALL-TIME TOUCHDOWN LIST

Randy Moss moved into a tie with Ben Coates for seventh place on the Patriots' all-time scoring list, bringing his scoring total as a member of the Patriots to 302 points (50 touchdowns, one 2-point conversion). Coates also totaled 302 points in a Patriots uniform. Moss moved past RB Sam Cunningham (294 points) with touchdown catches of seven yards and 35 yards. Moss is tied with Coates (50) for second on the Patriots' all-time touchdowns list, behind WR Stanley Morgan, who is first with 68 touchdowns.

MOSS MOVING UP ALL-TIME LISTS

Randy Moss moved into fifth place on the NFL's all-time receiving yards list on a 35-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady in the third quarter, passing Marvin Harrison's career total of 14,580 yards. Moss finished the game with 14,604 career receiving yards.

MOSS HAS HIS 36TH CAREER GAME WITH TWO OR MORE TOUCHDOWN RECEPTIONS

Randy Moss recorded his 36th career two-plus touchdown reception game, second in NFL history to Jerry Rice who had 44 career two-plus touchdown reception games. Moss now has 15 two-plus touchdown reception games as a member of the Patriots. Moss' 15 two-plus touchdown reception games are the most in Patriots history. Stanley Morgan is second with 11 two-plus touchdown reception games.

HERNANDEZ CAN RUSH

TE Aaron Hernandez had his first NFL rushing attempt with a 13-yard run in the first quarter. It is the longest rush by a tight end in Patriots history, besting an 11-yard run by TE Ben Watson vs. Cleveland on Oct. 7, 2007.

WELKER MOVES PAST FRYAR INTO FIFTH PLACE ON THE PATRIOTS ALL-TIME RECEPTIONS LIST

Wes Welker recorded his 364th reception as a member of the Patriots, moving past Irving Fryar (363) into fifth place on New England's all-time reception list. Welker passed Fryar on an 8-yard reception from QB Tom Brady in the third quarter. RB Kevin Faulk is in fourth place with 424 receptions.

BRADY MOVES PAST STEVE YOUNG ON THE ALL-TIME TOUCHDOWNS LIST

Tom Brady threw his third touchdown of the game and the 233rd touchdown of his career on a 5-yard pass to TE Rob Gronkowski. Brady's 233 career touchdown passes moves him past Hall of Fame QB Steve Young (232) into 19th place on the NFL's all-time touchdowns list. George Blanda is in 18th place with 236 career touchdown passes.

BRADY MOVED PAST JOHN BRODIE ON THE ALL-TIME PASSING LIST

Tom Brady threw for 252 yards, raising his career passing yardage total to 31,602 yards. Brady moved into 28th place on the NFL's all-time passing yardage list, passing John Brodie (31,548 yards). Mark Brunell is 27th on the all-time passing list (31,928 yards).

BRADY WINS 22ND STRAIGHT START AT GILLETTE

Tom Brady has now won 22 consecutive regular-season starts at Gillette Stadium. The last time the Patriots lost a regular-season home game in which Brady started was on Nov. 12, 2006 against the New York Jets. Brady's home winning streak is the longest streak since QB John Elway of the Denver Broncos won 22 consecutive regular-season starts at home from Sept. 1, 1996 through Dec. 27, 1998. The NFL record for most consecutive home wins by a starting quarterback since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger is held by Brett Favre, who won 25 straight home games for Green Bay from Sept. 17, 1995 through Oct. 5, 1998.

RUSHING ATTACK TOTAL 200 YARDS

The Patriots ran the ball 38 times for 200 yards, marking New England's highest single-game team rushing total since Dec. 14, 2008, when the Patriots had 277 rushing yards on 38 carries at Oakland.

RB DANNY WOODHEAD MAKES FIRST NFL START AND SCORES FIRST NFL TOUCHDOWN

Newly acquired RB Danny Woodhead made his first NFL start on offense and scored his first NFL touchdown on a 22-yard run in the second quarter. Woodhead finished the game with three rushes for 42 yards.

BOUNCING BACK

Since the beginning of the 2003 season, the Patriots are now 24-2 (.923) in games following a regular-season loss. Over the last six-plus seasons (2003-10), the Patriots have only lost back-to-back games on two occasions, once in 2006 and once in 2009.

THREE MAKE FIRST START

Second-round draft choice Jermaine Cunningham made his first NFL start, CB Kyle Arrington made his first NFL start, and newly acquired RB Danny Woodhead made his Patriots debut and recorded his first NFL start on offense.

ROBERT KRAFT NEWS & NOTES

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In 16 seasons of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won nine division titles, five conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships. The Patriots have made five Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than three berths.

SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season-ticket base stands at a capped total of 61,759 and more than 50,000 fans are on a waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 174 consecutive home games (dating back to the 1994 regular-season opener).

SUCCESS STORY

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have been one of the NFL's elite franchises. Over the first 16 seasons of Kraft's ownership, the Patriots own the NFL's highest winning percentage and have won more Super Bowl titles, more conference championships and more playoff games than any other NFL team. The Patriots have now won 9 or more games in 13 of the 16 seasons that Robert Kraft has owned the team.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. He spent 20 years as an assistant coach in the NFL and this is his 16th season as a head coach. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the only man in NFL history to serve 20 or more seasons as an assistant coach and at least 15 seasons as a head coach. Over a 100-game span from 2003-08, Belichick directed the team to an 82-18 record, marking the best 100-game span for any team in NFL history. In the 2007 season, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in the NFL's 90-year history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. He has led the Patriots to the Super Bowl four times and has produced seven division championships, including five straight from 2003-07. Belichick's Patriots teams own the all-time NFL records for consecutive total victories (21 from 2003-04), and established the record for consecutive regular-season victories (21 from 2006-08) and consecutive playoff victories (10 from 2001-05). Belichick owns the second-best postseason record in NFL history (15-5) and is the winningest NFL head coach since 2001 (123-42). From 2003-04, he directed the Patriots to back-to-back Super Bowl titles while posting consecutive 17-win campaigns. Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of five Super Bowl championship teams. His overall record of 128-53 with the Patriots gives him the most victories and the best winning percentage of any head coach in franchise history.

ELITE COMPANY

Bill Belichick is one of nine NFL head coaches to win three or more championships since the league began postseason play in 1933. With the Patriots' victory in Super Bowl XXXIX, Belichick joined an exclusive club in which each of the eight other members has been enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Brady had seven 300-yard games in 2009. He had a streak of five consecutive 300-yard games snapped at New Orleans. Brady set a team record with eight 300-yard games in 2007. The NFL record for most 300-yard games in a single-season is 10 by Rich Gannon (2002) and Drew Brees (2008).

BRADY HAS 3 TD PASSES OF 80 OR MORE YARDS

Brady's 81-yard TD pass to WR Sam Aiken at Miami on Dec. 6, 2009 was his third pass of 80 or more yards and the third longest of his career, behind his 91-yard TD pass to WR David Patten at Indianapolis (10/21/01) and an 82-yard TD pass to WR Troy Brown at Miami (10/19/03).

200 TOUCHDOWNS

Brady became the 27th player in NFL history to reach 200 touchdowns with his 36-yard touchdown pass to TE Chris Baker in the fourth quarter of the Atlanta game (09/27/09). Brady reached the milestone in a short period of time. His 233 career NFL touchdowns are 19th on the NFL All-Time list. He passed Steve Young (232) with 3 touchdowns vs. Buffalo (09/26/10).

MOSS IS NFL'S PREMIER TD RECEIVER

Since entering the NFL in 1998, Randy Moss has caught 151 touchdown passes, more than any other player over that span. Since joining the Patriots via trade prior to the 2007 season, Moss has caught 50 touchdowns – also the best in the league over that span. In terms of overall touchdowns (rushing, receiving and returning), Moss has totaled 152 scores since entering the league in 1998 (151 via reception and one via punt return), a tally that ranks second only to LaDainian Tomlinson (154 touchdowns) over that span. Moss's 13 receiving touchdowns in 2009 tied for the NFL lead with Larry Fitzgerald and Vernon Davis.

MOSS HAS 10 CAREER 10-CATCH GAMES

Moss had 10 catches in the win vs. Atlanta on Sept. 27, 2009 making it his 10th game with 10 or more catches. The 10-catch performance was Moss's second of 2009 – he tied a career high with 12 catches in the 2009 season-opener vs. Buffalo (09/14/09). Moss now has three 10-catch games with New England.

MOSS TIES RICE FOR MOST 10-PLUS TD SEASONS

Randy Moss scored on a 13-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter at Buffalo on Dec. 20, 2009 to record his 10th touchdown of the season. Moss now has nine 10-plus touchdown seasons to tie Jerry Rice for the most NFL seasons with 10-plus receiving touchdowns.

MOSS REACHES 1,000 YARDS FOR 10TH TIME

Randy Moss reached 1,000 receiving yards for the third straight season and the 10th time in his career after finishing the 2009 with 1,264 receiving yards. He joined Jerry Rice (14 seasons) as the only players in NFL history with 10 1,000-yard receiving seasons.

MOSS MOVING UP ALL-TIME LISTS

Welker led the NFL with 123 receptions in 2009, despite missing two games due to injury and most of the season-finale due to an injury. He averaged 8.8 receptions in the 14 games he played. The 123 receptions are a Patriots record and match Herman Moore (Detroit in 1995) for the second most receptions in a single season in NFL history, behind Marvin Harrison's NFL record of 143 receptions in 2002. Welker's 8.8 catches per game in 2009 rank second in NFL history to the 8.9 average set by Harrison in 2002.

Welker has had six or more receptions in 28 of his last 33 regular-season games. He has 18 games with nine or more catches since joining the Patriots. His 18 games with nine or more catches are the most in Patriots history.

WELKER MOVES PAST FRYAR

Wes Welker recorded his 364th reception as a member of the Patriots, moving past Irving Fryar (363) into fifth place on New England's all-time reception list. Welker passed Fryar on an 8-yard reception from QB Tom Brady in the third quarter. RB Kevin Faulk is in fourth place with 424 receptions.

WELKER'S ROUTE TO THE NFL

Despite being named the Oklahoma football player of the year by both *USA Today* and the *Daily Oklahoman*, Wes Welker's only scholarship offer came from Texas Tech, and only after a player that committed to Texas Tech backed out.

"I was thinking I'd get a scholarship somewhere," Welker said. "When it didn't happen when it was supposed to I was pretty hurt by it."

Welker had an impressive collegiate career, accumulating 259 receptions and eight punts returned for touchdowns. He even won a national award as the best special teams player in the country. Despite those accolades, he was passed over in the 2004 NFL draft and signed with San Diego as a free agent. He made the team, then was cut after the first game. He signed with Miami soon after and was used just on special teams. He caught New England's eye with a 71-yard punt return on Monday Night Football in a game against the Patriots. He was acquired by the Patriots in a trade with Miami in 2007.

WELKER TIES NFL RECORD FOR FEWEST INDIVIDUAL GAMES PLAYED TO REACH 100 RECEPTIONS

Welker reached 100 receptions in his 11th game of the 2009 season to tie Marvin Harrison for the fewest individual games played to reach 100 receptions in a season in NFL history. Harrison caught 100 passes in his first 11 games of the 2002 season en route to an NFL-record 143 catches. (Welker missed two games in 2009 due to injury).

WELKER GOES OVER 100 YARDS

Welker had a career-high six 100-yard games in 2009 and has 14 for his career. His previous high for most 100-yard games in a season was four in 2007 and 2008.

MOSS AND WELKER: FIRST TIME IN PATS HISTORY TWO PLAYERS HAVE 12 CATCHES

Moss and Welker each hauled in 12 catches for the Patriots in the first meeting in 2009 against Buffalo (9/14), with each player tying the team's fifth-highest single-game reception total. It is the first time in team history that two players have had at least 12 catches in the same game. The last time the Patriots had two or more players with at least 10 catches in the same game was on Nov. 13, 1994, when Leroy Thompson had 11 catches, Ben Coates had 10 and Michael Timpson had 10 catches in a 26-20 overtime win over Minnesota.

MOSS AND WELKER GO THREE STRAIGHT YEARS WITH 1,000 YARDS EACH

Welker and Moss became the first Patriots players to have three straight 1,000-yard seasons (2007-09). It is the sixth time in NFL history a team has had two players go three straight seasons with 1,000 yards. Moss was part of another tandem to accomplish the feat from 1998-2000.

BANTA-CAIN SETS CAREER-HIGHS IN SACKS

LB Tully Banta-Cain set a single-game career-high with three sacks in the win at Buffalo on Dec. 20, 2009 and closed out the 2009 season with a career-high of 10.0 sacks for the season. His previous best for a season was 5.5 in 2006 with the Patriots. He had three games in 2009 with at least two sacks and now has five games in his career with at least two sacks. The Patriots have now had a player finish the season with double digit sack totals 12 times. Banta-Cain's 10 sacks are the most for the Patriots since Mike Vrabel's 12.5 sacks in 2007.

DOMINANT DEFENSE

The Patriots defense finished 11th in the NFL in 2009, eight yards behind the 10th place Washington Redskins. The Patriots defense has finished in the top ten 13 times, including five times under Head Coach Bill Belichick.

PATRIOTS FORCE TURNOVERS

The Patriots did not force a turnover against Miami (11/8/09), breaking a streak of 15 straight games with a turnover. That streak had been the longest streak in the NFL. WILFORK WEARS HIS HEART ON HIS NECK

Vince Wilfork wears No. 75 over his bulky shoulder pads. Underneath hangs a gold chain locket for those who were number one in his heart: his parents. In 2002, parents David and Barbara Wilfork both passed away within five months of each other, leaving the then University of Miami star without his greatest support system. Wilfork, who lost his father to diabetes, has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for diabetes-related causes. His annual draft day fundraiser, a bowling event he has held for seven years, is one of the signature fundraising events held by a pro athlete in New England. For his charity work, Wilfork was awarded the 2010 New England Patriots Ron Burton Community Service Award. While he has many accomplishment on the football field and will always cherish his National Championship and Super Bowl rings, his constant reminder lies closest to his heart, a picture of his late parents at their high school prom. "I carry them with me wherever I go", Wilfork said of his parents' keepsake. "My parents pushed me to be the best I could be. The things I do and my wife does, we do out of the kindness of our heart, and we do it for the community. I never look for anything in return. My teammates are my second family. My kids, my wife, the New England Patriots – that's all I have."

ZOLTAN MESKO: COMING TO AMERICA

Rookie P Zoltan Mesko was born in Timosoara, Romania, on the Romania-Hungary border. On Many occasions in 1989, during the communist revolutions, his family was forced to take cover by diving on the floor to avoid gun shots from the armies. Even after the fall of the Berlin Wall, his family lived in poverty. His family was finally able to escape Romania when his father won a United States Permanent Resident Card (green card) in the Diversity Immigrant Visa Lottery in 1997 when Mesko was 11.

MESKO DISCOVERS FOOTBALL

An avid soccer player from his days in Romania, Mesko had a strong leg. It was only when he came to America that he discovered his leg could take him places. In eighth grade, Mesko was playing kickball in the gym when he kicked the ball so high that he broke a light fixture. He was given a choice: pay for the light fixture or play football. With his family still struggling with money and football being a more popular sport than soccer at his school, the choice was an obvious one—Mesko decided to play football. His leg would land him numerous Division I Scholarships and admission offers from Ivy League schools. From these, Mesko chose to play football at Michigan.

DOUBLE TROUBLE: CB DEVIN MCCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 11th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin and Jason were cornerbacks in the Rutgers secondary from 2005-08. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother Wasswa played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

EDELMAN GOES FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Julian Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Ca.) before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he completed 56% of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003.

ALL IN THE FAMILY: TE ROB GRONKOWSKI

Rookie TE Rob Gronkowski grew up playing football against his brothers in the backyard. Now, he has a chance to play against them in the NFL. Dan Gronkowski, the oldest of the bunch, is currently in his second season as a TE for the Denver Broncos, while 23-year old Chris is currently a rookie with the Dallas Cowboys as a fullback. The Gronkowski's are among 22 different sets of brothers currently in the NFL, yet they are the only family that can claim to have three siblings in the league. According to the pro Football Hall of Fame, the Gronkowski brothers join nine other families to have at least three brothers playing at the same time.

The event allows for participants to test their clay shooting skills against a host of celebrities, including members of the New England Patriots as well as stars from TV and movies. Current Patriots QB Tom Brady, WR's Randy Moss and Wes Welker and Light's fellow linemen, C Dan Koppen and T Nick Kaczur have also tried their hand at the competition in years past. The Light Foundation was established in 2001 and strives to instill the values of responsibility and hard work to youths by providing unique outdoor learning experiences to assist them in reaching their highest potential.

LIKE FATHER LIKE SON

WR Matthew Slater spent his college days at UCLA. The third-year promising young talent was born in 1985, when another Slater in The City of Angels was named to his second of seven Pro Bowls. Matthew's father, Jackie Slater, a Hall of Fame offensive tackle, spent his entire career with the Rams organization in LA. GREETINGS FROM KAARST, GERMANY: SEBASTION VOLLMER MAKES HIS MARK

A native of Kaarst, Germany, Sebastian Vollmer did not begin playing football until the age of 14 when he started playing for the Dusseldorf club team. Vollmer helped lead his German prep school team to two national football championships. His early football success landed him an appearance in the 2004 Global Junior Championships in San Diego, which led him to a scholarship at Houston. He spoke almost no English when he signed with Houston, but he became fluent in the language as he developed from a 250-pound tight end into a 315-pound lineman who started his final 25 games at tackle for the Cougars. Vollmer's collegiate career created interest from the NFL where the Patriots drafted him in the second round of the 2009 draft. After starting eight games his rookie year, Vollmer has moved into the starting lineup at right tackle this season. As a result of his football success, Vollmer has become a hit with the German media and participates in frequent conference calls back to Germany. Earned the nickname, Seabass, during his playing days at Houston. The nickname has carried over to the NFL.



THE TEAM OF THE DECADE

When Robert Kraft purchased the New England Patriots in 1994, few would have thought that just 16 years later the franchise would be the undisputed team of the decade in the first decade of the new millennium. Kraft brought a winning vision to the organization and dedicated his resources to building a consistent winner. On Jan. 27, 2000, Kraft hired Bill Belichick to coach the team, and three months later the team drafted then-unheralded quarterback Tom Brady, putting the final pieces in place for the Patriots to become the most successful NFL team of the 2000s.
