NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (10-2) at CHICAGO BEARS (9-3)

Sun., Dec. 12, 2010 ★ Soldier Field (61,500) ★ 4:15 p.m. EST

The New England Patriots improved to a 10-2 record and claimed first place in the AFC east with a 45-3 victory over the New York Jets on Monday Night Football. This week, the Patriots will begin the first of two consecutive contests against the NFC North when they travel to Chicago to face the 9-3 first place Bears. Following the Chicago game, the Patriots will return to Gillette Stadium for a Sunday Night Football game against the Green Bay Packers. The Patriots improved to an NFL-best 30-5 record in December since 2002 with the win over the Jets.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience by CBS and can be seen in Boston on **WBZ-TV Channel 4**. **Jim Nantz** will handle play-by-play duties with **Phil Simms** providing color. The game will be produced by **Lance Barrow** and directed by **Mike Arnold**.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience by **Sports USA Radio Network**. **Larry Kahn** and **John Robinson** will call the game. **Troy West** will work the sidelines.

RADIO: 98.5 FM, The Sports Hub, is the flagship station for the **Patriots Radio Network**. A complete listing of the network's 36 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 34th season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 27th season as a broadcasting tandem.

MAYO ON HIGH TACKLE PACE

The day-of-game stats crew credited Jerod Mayo with 12 tackles against the Jets, raising his total to 157 total tackles in 2010. Mayo is on pace for a career-high 209 total tackles. That number will be the highest since LB Clayton Weishuhn had 229 tackles in 1984. Mayo can become just the third Patriots player ever to reach 200 tackles.

BRADY WINS 26th STRAIGHT START AT GILLETTE

Tom Brady set an NFL record for most consecutive home wins as a starting quarterback after leading the Patriots to a 45-3 win on Monday night against the Jets. The win over the Jets was Brady's 26th straight win in a regular-season home start, passing Brett Favre's previous record of 25 straight wins (1995-98) for the NFL record. The last time the Patriots lost a regular-season home game in which Brady started was on Nov. 12, 2006 against the New York Jets.

PATRIOTS VS. BEARS

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Bears will meet for the 11th time in regular-season play as Chicago as the Patriots make their 7th trip to Soldier Field since 1970 and first trip to Soldier Field since it was remodeled prior to the 2003 season. The Patriots last traveled to play the Bears in 2002 when the Bears played all of their home games at Memorial Stadium on the campus of the University of Illinois in Champaign while the new Soldier Field was being constructed.



The Patriots hold a 7-3 overall lead in the regular-season series, but Chicago claimed a victory in the teams' only postseason matchup, taking a 46-10 decision in Super Bowl XX following the 1985 season. Since Super Bowl XX, the Patriots have recorded a 5-1 record against Chicago and held the Bears to a touchdown or less in three straight games from 1988-97.



The Patriots own a 4-3 record in games played in Chicago. In New England's last road game against Chicago in 2002, the Patriots staged one of the most memorable comebacks in team history, rallying from a 27-6 deficit

late in the third quarter to pull out for a 33-30 win that was clinched on a 20-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to David Patten with 21 seconds left in the game.

PATRIOTS VS. NFC NORTH

This season, the Patriots will play each of the four teams from the NFC North (Green Bay, Minnesota, Detroit and Chicago) as part of the NFL's scheduling rotation. New England is 2-0 against the NFC North so far this year, following a 28-14 victory at home against Minnesota (10/31) and a 45-24 Thanksgiving Day win at Detroit (11/15). This week's game marks the first of two straight contests against NFC North foes. Following the Chicago game, the Patriots will return to Gillette Stadium to face Green Bay on Sunday Night.

The Patriots are 9-1 all-time against the NFC North since realignment in 2002. The Patriots have squared off against the NFC North in two seasons, finishing 3-1 in 2002 and 4-0 in 2006. The only loss was a 28-10 defeat vs. Green Bay on Oct. 13, 2002.

The Patriots hold an all-time regular-season record of 21-15 (.583) against the four NFC North teams. Two of the teams to which New England has lost the Super Bowl reside in the NFC North – Green Bay (XXXI) and Chicago (XX).

PATRIOTS VS. NFC

The Patriots have been successful against NFC teams in recent seasons, compiling a 33-5 (.868) regular-season record against the conference since 2001. Including the postseason, the Patriots are 36-6 (.857) against the NFC with a 3-1 Super Bowl record since 2001.

The Patriots ended a 17-game winning streak against the NFC last season following a loss at New Orleans on Monday Night Football last season. The Patriots were 3-1 against the NFC in 2009.

BRADY VS. CHICAGO

This week's game will mark Tom Brady's third start against the Chicago Bears and his first in the new Soldier Field. In his only other road game against the Bears (11/10/02), he rallied the Patriots from a 27-6 third quarter deficit to a 33-30 victory. Brady completed 36-of-55 passes for 328 yards and three touchdowns in that game. The comeback in that game was highlighted by a 20-yard touchdown pass from Brady to WR David Patten followed by a successful 2-point play from Brady to WR Troy Brown with 21 seconds left to play.

The Patriots improved to 8-3 on the season with a 17-14 victory over the previously 9-1 Chicago Bears. New England's defense forced four Chicago turnovers, as Asante Samuel recorded the first three-interception game by a Patriot in the regular season in more than 23 years. The Patriots offense recorded 354 total net yards against the Bears. Stephen Gostkowski booted a 52-yard field goal in the final seconds of the first half, recording the longest field goal the Patriots have converted at Gillette Stadium. The first quarter was scoreless but not without excitement, as the teams combined for three turnovers and a blocked field goal. After a Chicago fumble that Richard Seymour recovered early in the second quarter, the Patriots mounted their first touchdown drive, an 11-play, 92-yard jaunt that ended in a 1-yard touchdown run and a 7-0 Patriots lead. A Chicago field goal cut the lead to 7-3 before the Patriots

took advantage of a deflected punt by Mike Wright to set up a short drive to end the half with Gostkowski's long boot to give New England a 10-3 halftime advantage.

The turnover-fest resumed in the third quarter, as the teams combined for two fumbles and two interceptions. The second-to-last play of the quarter was a long pass interference penalty that brought the Bears to the Patriots' 6-yard line and set up a game-tying 2-yard touchdown run to tie the score at 10 with 14:53 left in the game. On the ensuing drive, New England reclaimed the lead on an 11-play, 73-yard excursion that ended in a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Benjamin Watson and a 17-10 Patriots lead with 8:22 left in the game. A Chicago field goal on its next possession cut the lead to 17-13, and a fumble on the Patriots' ensuing possession gave the ball back to the Bears with 1:52 remaining in the game. But on the first play of Chicago's ensuing drive, Samuel recorded his third interception of the day, icing the game for the Patriots and handing the Bears just their second loss.

The New England Patriots moved into sole possession of first place in the AFC East with a 45-3 romp over the New York Jets at Gillette stadium on Monday Night Football.

QB Tom Brady threw four touchdown passes and 326 yards in his NFL-record 26th straight regular-season home victory.

When Brady was not doing the damage, RB Danny Woodhead was. He registered his first 100-yard receiving game after finishing with four receptions for 104 yards. He turned a shuffle pass at the end of the third quarter into a 50-yard gain to help set up a fourth quarter touchdown. In the second quarter he turned a short pass into a 35-yard gain to get into Jets territory to set up a touchdown that gave New England a 24-3 lead.

The Patriots defense intercepted Jets QB Mark Sanchez on three straight series to start the second half, including two deep in New England territory. The Patriots converted all three turnovers into touchdown drives to take a commanding 45-3 lead in the fourth quarter.

The Jets opened the second half with a 10-play, 59-yard drive to the New England 9-yard line before rookie LB Brandon Spikes intercepted Sanchez to end the drive. On the ensuing drive, a 35-yard pass play from Brady to TE Aaron Hernandez helped position the Patriots for an 18-yard touchdown pass from Brady to WR Wes Welker. On the next series, Sanchez went deep, but rookie CB Devin McCourty intercepted the ball at the 6-yard line. The Patriots responded to that turnover with an 8-play, 94-yard drive that ended with a 1-yard touchdown pass from Brady to Hernandez early in the fourth quarter.

S James Sanders picked off a Sanchez pass on the next series and returned it 28 yards to the Jets' 28-yard line to help set up a 5-yard touchdown run by RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis for a 45-3 final.

The Patriots scored on their first four offensive drives to take a 24-3 halftime lead. After jumping to a 10-0 first quarter lead, the patriots faced a fourth-and-three situation from the New York 25-yard line. Head coach Bill Belichick elected to go for it and Brady responded with a 25-yard touchdown pass to WR Deion Branch for a 17-0 first quarter lead.

BRADY HAS BACK-TO-BACK 4-TD GAMES

Tom Brady finished with four touchdown tosses for the second straight game, marking the second time in his career he has had four or more touchdown passes in consecutive games. Brady's only other back-to-back 4-plus touchdown games were in 2007, when he threw five touchdowns at Dallas (10/14/07) followed by six scores at Miami (10/21/07). Brady's four touchdown passes against the Jets marks the eighth time he has had two or more touchdown passes in 2010, including two or more touchdown tosses in five straight games. Brady is now 66-12 as a starter when throwing two or more touchdown passes in a game. The Patriots are now 14-0 when Brady throws for four or more touchdowns.

BRADY BECOMES ONE OF JUST 14 NFL PLAYERS TO REACH 250 TOUCHDOWNS

Tom Brady's 4-yard touchdown to WR Brandon Tate in the second quarter was his 250th career touchdown pass. Brady became one of just 14 players in NFL history to throw for 250 or more touchdowns in a season.

BRADY TIES BRADSHAW WITH HIS 107TH CAREER WIN

Tom Brady recorded his 107th career victory as a starting quarterback, tying Terry Bradshaw for 8th place all-time.

STREAK GOES TO 4 WITHOUT A TURNOVER

The Patriots extended their streak to four straight games without a turnover, a Patriots single-season record.

BRADY MOVES UP ON ALL-TIME TOUCHDOWN LIST WITH 252ND CAREER TD TOSS

Brady finished the game with 252 career touchdown passes, moving into 13th place on the all-time list. Brady passed Drew Bledsoe's career total of 251 touchdowns to move into 13th place. Brady took over sole possession of 13th place on a 1-yard touchdown pass to TE Aaron Hernandez in the fourth quarter. Dan Fouts ranks 12th all-time with 254 touchdown passes.

GREEN-ELLIS SCORES 10TH AND 11TH RUSHING TOUCHDOWNS OF 2010

BenJarvus Green-Ellis scored his 10th rushing touchdown in 2010 on 1-yard run in the first quarter. He became the eighth player in Patriots history to record double digit rushing touchdowns and the first since Corey Dillon (13) in 2006. He added his 11th rushing touchdown of the season on a 5-yard run in the fourth quarter. Green-Ellis is the first undrafted rookie to score 10 or more rushing touchdowns in a season for the Patriots.

MCCOURTY REGISTERS AN INTERCEPTION IN THIRD STRAIGHT GAME

Devin McCourty intercepted a pass for the third straight game. McCourty is the first Patriots player to intercept a pass in three straight games since Asante Samuel did it during a three-game stretch in 2007. Ty Law (1995) and Myron Guyton (1995) also had three straight games with an interception. The Patriots record for most consecutive games with an interception is four by Mike Haynes (1976).

MCCOURTY IMPROVES HIS TOTAL TO SIX INTERCEPTIONS

Rookie CB Devin McCourty improved to six interceptions on the season. The six interceptions by a Patriots rookie are second to the eight by Mike Haynes in 1976.

WOODHEAD HAS CAREER DAY WITH FIRST 100-YARD GAME

Danny Woodhead registered his first career 100-yard game after finishing with four receptions for 104 yards. Woodhead is the first New England running back to have a 100-yard receiving game since Kevin Faulk finished with eight receptions for 108 yards on Nov. 23, 2003 at Houston.

WOODHEAD HAS TWO LONGEST RECEPTIONS OF HIS CAREER

Danny Woodhead had the two longest pass receptions of his career. He had a 35-yard reception in the second quarter and a 50-yard reception in the third quarter. His previous best was a 26-yard reception at Cleveland on Nov. 7, 2010. Woodhead's 50-yard reception is the longest by a Patriots running back since Corey Dillon had a 52-yard reception at Tennessee on Dec. 31, 2006.

BRANDON SPIKES RECORDS HIS FIRST NFL INTERCEPTION

Brandon Spikes registered his first NFL interception when he picked off a Mark Sanchez pass at the New England 2-yard line in the third quarter to end a New York scoring threat. Spikes had six interceptions in college at Florida and set a school record by returning four of those for a touchdown.

PATRIOTS HAVE BACK-TO-BACK 45-POINT GAMES

The Patriots had back-to-back 45-point games after finishing with 45 points against the Jets and 45 points last week at Detroit. The last time the Patriots had back-to-back 45-point games was in 2008 when they won 49-26 at Oakland (12/14) followed by a 47-7 win vs. Arizona (12/21). The Patriots' total of 90 points in the last two games is the fourth-highest point total for any two-game span in team history. The Patriots' team record for most points in a two-game span is 101, set in 2007 (a 49-point output at Miami was followed by a 52-point total against Washington).

ROBERT KRAFT NEWS & NOTES

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In 17 seasons of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won nine division titles, five conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships. The Patriots have made five Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than three berths.

SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season-ticket base stands at a capped total of 61,759 and more than 50,000 fans are on a waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 178 consecutive home games (dating back to the 1994 regular-season opener).

SUCCESS STORY

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have been one of the NFL's elite franchises. Over the first 16 seasons of Kraft's ownership, the Patriots own the NFL's highest winning percentage and have won more Super Bowl titles, more conference championships and more playoff games than any other NFL team. The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 14 of the 17 seasons that Robert Kraft has owned the team.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. He spent 20 years as an assistant coach in the NFL and this is his 16th season as a head coach. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the only man in NFL history to serve 20 or more seasons as an assistant coach and at least 15 seasons as a head coach. Over a 100-game span from 2003-08, Belichick directed the team to an 82-18 record, marking the best 100-game span for any team in NFL history. In the 2007 season, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in the NFL's 90-year history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. Belichick's Patriots teams own the all-time NFL records for consecutive total victories (21 from 2003-04), and established the record for consecutive regular-season victories (21 from 2006-08) and consecutive playoff victories (10 from 2001-05). Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of five Super Bowl championship teams.

BELICHICK LEADS TEAM TO 10TH STRAIGHT WINNING RECORD

Bill Belichick has led the Patriots to a winning record for 10 consecutive seasons. The only other NFL coach to have at least 10 consecutive winning seasons with one team since the 1970 merger was Tom Landry, who led the Dallas Cowboys to 16 consecutive winning seasons (1970-1985).

BELICHICK CAN MOVE INTO TOP TEN

With one more victory Bill Belichick will move into the top ten for most wins by an NFL coach. He is currently in 11th place with 173 career wins.

WELKER MOVES PAST FRYAR

Wes Welker moved past Irving Fryar (363) into fifth place on New England's all-time reception list and now has 418 receptions as a member of the Patriots. Welker passed Fryar on an 8-yard reception from QB Tom Brady in the third quarter vs. Buffalo (9/26/10). RB Kevin Faulk is in fourth place with 424 receptions.

WELKER'S ROUTE TO THE NFL

Despite being named the Oklahoma football player of the year by both *USA Today* and the *Daily Oklahoman*, Wes Welker's only scholarship offer came from Texas Tech, and only after a player that committed to Texas Tech backed out.

"I was thinking I'd get a scholarship somewhere," Welker said. "When it didn't happen, when it was supposed, to I was pretty hurt by it."

Welker had an impressive collegiate career, accumulating 259 receptions and eight punts returned for touchdowns. He even won a national award as the best special teams player in the country. Despite those accolades, he was passed over in the 2004 NFL draft and signed with San Diego as a free agent. He made the team, then was cut after the first game. He signed with Miami soon after and was used just on special teams. He caught New England's eye with a 71-yard punt return on Monday Night Football in a game against the Patriots. He was acquired by the Patriots in a trade with Miami in 2007.

WELKER TIES NFL RECORD FOR FEWEST INDIVIDUAL GAMES PLAYED TO REACH 100 RECEPTIONS

Welker reached 100 receptions in his 11th game of the 2009 season to tie Marvin Harrison for the fewest individual games played to reach 100 receptions in a season in NFL history. Harrison caught 100 passes in his first 11 games of the 2002 season en route to an NFL-record 143 catches. (Welker missed two games in 2009 due to injury).

DEION BRANCH RETURNS TO THE PATRIOTS

Deion Branch was acquired by the Patriots in a trade with Seattle on Oct. 12, 2010. Originally a second-round pick of the Patriots in 2002, Branch was traded to Seattle in 2006 for a first round pick (Brandon Meriweather). Branch returns to a team that he helped win two Super Bowls. Branch was awarded the Pete Rozelle Trophy as the Most Valuable Player of Super Bowl XXXIX. His 11 receptions in the game tied the Super Bowl record, also achieved by Jerry Rice, Dan Ross and Wes Welker. On the day of Super Bowl XXXIX, Deion called a dozen of his former football coaches to thank them for the support that they gave him throughout his high school, junior college and college careers. Hours after talking to his coaches, he tied the Super Bowl record with 11 receptions and was named MVP of the game. Branch has turned in his biggest performances on the greatest stage in sports, leading all receivers in Super Bowls XXXVIII and XXXIX. He recorded a combined 21 receptions in the two games and owns two of the top seven receiving performances in Super Bowl history. His career reception total in the Super Bowl ranks third all-time, trailing only Jerry Rice (33) and Andre Reed (27).

ROOKIE TIGHT ENDS ARE MAKING AN IMPACT

Rookie tight ends Rob Gronkowski and Aaron Hernandez are making an impact in the Patriots offense. Gronkowski (6) and Hernandez (4) account for 10 of Tom Brady's 27 touchdown passes in 2010.

ROB GRONKOWSKI SETS PATS ROOKIE TE MARK

Gronkowski has 6 touchdowns to establish a record for most touchdown catches by a rookie tight end in Patriots history, besting Russ Francis (4 in 1975) and Don Hasselbeck (4 in 1977). Gronkowski became the first Patriots rookie to ever record three touchdowns in a game with a three-TD game at Pittsburgh (11/14). MAYO ON HIGH TACKLE PACE

LB Jerod Mayo has 157 total tackles in 2010. Mayo had 139 tackles as a rookie in 2008 and 114 in 2009 and with his 112 tackles in 2010 he is the first Patriots player to have three consecutive 100-tackle seasons since Lawyer Milloy registered five straight 100-tackle seasons from 1997 through 2001. Mayo is on pace for a career-high 209 total tackles. That number will be the highest since LB Clayton Weishuhn had 229 tackles in 1984. Mayo has nine games in 2010 with 10-plus tackles. He can become the third Patriots player ever to reach 200 total tackles.

PATRIOTS NEWS & NOTES

BRANDON TATE HAS TWO KICKOFFS RETURNED FOR TOUCHDOWNS IN 2010

Brandon Tate has blossomed into a dual threat in both the return game and the receiving game. He has returned two kickoffs for touchdowns to provide the Patriots a spark on special teams, after returning the second half kickoff vs. Cincinnati 97 yards for a touchdown and the second half kickoff at Miami 103 yards for a touchdown. He is the first Patriots player to return two kicks for a touchdown in a season since Kevin Faulk returned two for a touchdown in 2002. The Patriots record for most kickoff returns for a touchdown in a season is three by Raymond Clayborn in 1977. His prowess for returns carries over from his collegiate days where he holds numerous NCAA and ACC career records including the NCAA career record for combined kick and punt return yards with 3,523. A native of North Carolina, Tate was a four-year return man for the Tar Heels. Tate suffered a knee injury against Notre Dame as a senior and missed the final seven games of the season. Tate joined the Patriots in the third round of the 2009 draft, but his rookie year was derailed by injury as he was placed on injured reserve on Nov. 14 after seeing action in only two games.

WOODHEAD GOES FROM DIVISION II TO THE NFL

Danny Woodhead was a standout at Division II Chadron State in Nebraska. He averaged 178.9 yards per game and totaled 101 rushing touchdowns during his collegiate career. Woodhead's outstanding junior and senior seasons earned him two Harlon Hill Trophies, the Division II equivalent to the Heisman Trophy. He is one of just three players to ever win two or more Harlon Hill Trophies, joining Texas A&M University-Kingsville running back Johnny Bailey, who won it three times (1987-89) before playing six seasons in the NFL for the Bears, Cardinals, and Rams. Valdosta State University's Dusty Bonner was the only other player to win the Harlon Hill Trophy multiple times (2000 and 2001). Cincinnati Bengals running back Bernard Scott (2008—Abilene Christian) joins Woodhead as active NFL running backs who have won the award. In his first game with the Patriots, Woodhead scored on a 22-yard run in the win vs. Buffalo (9/26).

EDELMAN GOES FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Julian Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Ca.) before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he completed 56% of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003.

WILFORK WEARS HIS HEART ON HIS NECK

Vince Wilfork wears No. 75 over his shoulder pads. Underneath hangs a gold chain locket for those who were number one in his heart: his parents. In 2002, parents David and Barbara Wilfork both passed away within five months of each other, leaving the then University of Miami star without his greatest support system. Wilfork, who lost his father to diabetes, has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for diabetes-related causes. His annual draft day fundraiser, a bowling event he has held for seven years, is one of the signature fundraising events held by a pro athlete in New England. For his charity work, Wilfork was awarded the 2010 New England Patriots Ron Burton Community Service Award. While he will always cherish his National Championship and Super Bowl rings, his constant reminder lies closest to his heart, a picture of his late parents at their high school prom. "I carry them with me wherever I go", Wilfork said of his parents' keepsake. "My parents pushed me to be the best I could be. The things I do and my wife does, we do out of the kindness of our heart, and we do it for the community. I never look for anything in return. My teammates are my second family. My kids, my wife, the New England Patriots – that's all I have."

ZOLTAN MESKO: COMING TO AMERICA

Rookie P Zoltan Mesko was born in Timisoara, Romania, on the Romania-Hungary border. On Many occasions in 1989, during the communist revolutions, his family was forced to take cover by diving on the floor to avoid gun shots from the armies. Even after the fall of the Berlin Wall, his family lived in poverty. His family was finally able to escape Romania when his father won a United States Permanent Resident Card (green card) in the Diversity Immigrant Visa Lottery in 1997 when Mesko was 11.

MESKO DISCOVERS FOOTBALL

An avid soccer player from his days in Romania, Mesko had a strong leg. It was only when he came to America that he discovered his leg could take him places. In eighth grade, Mesko was playing kickball in the gym when he kicked the ball so high that he broke a light fixture. He was given a choice: pay for the light fixture or play football. With his family still struggling with money and football being a more popular sport than soccer at his school, the choice was an obvious one—Mesko decided to play football. His leg would land him numerous Division I Scholarships and admission offers from Ivy League schools. From these, Mesko chose to play football at Michigan.

DOUBLE TROUBLE: CB DEVIN MCCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 11th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin and Jason were cornerbacks in the Rutgers secondary from 2005-08. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother Wasswa played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

ALL IN THE FAMILY: TE ROB GRONKOWSKI

Rookie TE Rob Gronkowski grew up playing football against his brothers in the backyard. Now, he has a chance to play against them in the NFL. Dan Gronkowski, the oldest of the bunch, is currently in his second season as a TE for the Denver Broncos, while 23-year old Chris is currently a rookie with the Dallas Cowboys as a fullback. The Gronkowskis are among 22 different sets of brothers currently in the NFL, yet they are the only family that can claim to have three siblings in the league. According to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the Gronkowski brothers join nine other families to have at least three brothers playing at the same time.

READ BETWEEN THE LINES

The Patriots teamed up with Ahern Middle School in Foxborough on June 9 to introduce "Read Between the Lines," a new program featuring Patriots offensive and defensive linemen to promote the school's "Summer Reading Blitz." Every student in attendance received a "Read Between the Lines" playbook and was encouraged to set their personal reading goals of at least two books this past summer. If the 923 students collectively read more than 2010 books over the summer, a Patriots lineman promised to return for another assembly to reward the students. On Sept. 28, Stephen Neal returned to the school to reward the students who accomplished their summer reading goals. One student received a "game ball" for her efforts after reading 70 books.



LIKE FATHER LIKE SON

WR Matthew Slater spent his college days at UCLA. The third-year promising young talent was born in 1985, when another Slater in The City of Angels was named to his second of seven Pro Bowls. Matthew's father, Jackie Slater, a Hall of Fame offensive tackle, spent his entire career with the Rams organization in LA. Matthew Slater, drafted in 2008, is one of six sons of Hall of Fame members to be drafted in NFL history.

GREETINGS FROM KAARST, GERMANY: SEBASTIAN VOLLMER MAKES HIS MARK

A native of Kaarst, Germany, Vollmer did not begin playing football until the age of 14 when he started playing for the Dusseldorf club team. Vollmer helped lead his German prep school team to two national football championships. His early football success landed him an appearance in the 2004 Global Junior Championships in San Diego, which led him to a scholarship at Houston. He spoke almost no English when he signed with Houston, but he became fluent in the language as he developed from a 250-pound tight end into a 315-pound lineman who started his final 25 games at tackle for the Cougars. Vollmer's collegiate career created interest from the NFL where the Patriots drafted him in the second round of the 2009 draft. Earned the nickname, Seabass, during his playing days at Houston. The nickname has carried over to the NFL.

PATRICK CHUNG'S JOURNEY TO THE NFL

Long before S Patrick Chung picked up flag football as a teen, his mother, Jamaican recording artist Sophia George, had preached about being a tough man in a song. Her hit single, "Girlie Girlie" – a traditional reggae song about poking fun at a boy who was not man enough – topped the charts in 1985. Chung is aware that among his talents he was born with, speed and agility, singing is not one of them. Chung, who possesses a great sense of pride in his unique heritage – his mother is Jamaican and his father is half Jamaican and half Chinese, was born in Jamaica and moved to California at age 12 where he started to play football as a freshman in high school. Chung went on to star at Oregon, where he holds the distinction of starting more games than any other defensive player in school history with 51 starts. He originally entered the draft as junior but ultimately decided to return for his senior season. Pinned to the back of his locker is a reminder of the support he has gotten to this stage, a Jamaican flag that indicates his family's importance to him.

BENJARVUS GREEN-ELLIS – THE LAW FIRM

BenJarvus Green-Ellis, who earned the nickname the Law Firm from his Patriots teammates because of his multi-part name, was signed by the Patriots as an undrafted free agent in 2008 out of the University of Mississippi. As a rookie, he recorded touchdowns in four straight games after being called up from the practice squad in October. His knack for finding the end zone has continued this season as he has reached the end zone a career-high 11 times, including his first two-touchdown performance vs. Minnesota (10/31). Green-Ellis also had a 112-yard rushing performance against the Vikings with 62 yards on the Patriots' final fourth quarter touchdown drive that extended a 3-point lead to a 10-point cushion in a 28-18 victory.

PATRIOTS HAVE TOP TELEVISION RATINGS

The Patriots are on a record-setting pace for household ratings through 11 weeks in their designated market area with a 32.4 HH rating. This season, the Patriots have also been part of two record-setting NFL broadcasts. New England's 23-20 overtime victory over Baltimore on Sunday, Oct. 17 helped CBS set the mark for the highest rating for its single game window since it acquired the current AFC package in 2008. The Patriots-Jets game on Sunday, Sept. 19 was the most watched September CBS game ever.

FREE AGENTS MAKE AN IMPACT

Seventeen players on the New England 53-man roster entered the NFL as rookie free agents. Two that came to the Patriots as rookie free agents have been consistent contributors on offense. Stephen Neal has been a regular in the starting lineup at right guard since 2004. BenJarvus Green-Ellis, who came to the Patriots as a rookie free agent in 2008, has 11 rushing touchdowns this season. Defensively, the Patriots have five players who have made a big impact. Mike Wright came to New England as a rookie free agent in 2005. He has a career-high 5.5 sacks so far in 2010. Gary Guyton came to New England as a rookie free agent in 2008. In the opening game of the season, Guyton recorded his first career interception, which he returned for a touchdown. Both Sergio Brown and Dane Fletcher are rookie free agent signees from this past offseason who have made regular defensive and special teams contributions. Brown had five tackles including one that saved a first down against San Diego TE Antonio Gates that helped preserve the Patriots 23-20 victory over the Chargers. Fletcher had a forced fumble and three defensive tackles in that same game against the Chargers.

PATRIOTS CALL ON VETERAN K SHAYNE GRAHAM

Many kickers have quite a journey before landing a roster position on an NFL team. Such has been the case during kicker Shayne Graham's road to a 10-year NFL career. He originally signed with New Orleans as a rookie free agent in 2000 and went to camp with Seattle in 2001 before finally securing a roster spot with Buffalo later that season. He then spent time with Carolina before a seven-year stint with Cincinnati. Graham went to camp with Baltimore in 2010 and had a week stint on the Giants roster. He spent time in between jobs practicing at the Virginia Tech campus with two pieces of packed luggage in his car at all times as he waited for a call for a team in need.



THE TEAM OF THE DECADE

When Robert Kraft purchased the New England Patriots in 1994, few would have thought that just 16 years later the franchise would be the undisputed team of the decade in the first decade of the new millennium. Kraft brought a winning vision to the organization and dedicated his resources to building a consistent winner. On Jan. 27, 2000, Kraft hired Bill Belichick to coach the team, and three months later the team drafted then-unheralded quarterback Tom Brady, putting the final pieces in place for the Patriots to become the most successful NFL team of the 2000s.
