NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (2-1) vs. BALTIMORE RAVENS (3-0)

Sunday, October 4, 2009 ★ Gillette Stadium (68,756) ★ 1:00 p.m. EDT

The New England Patriots will host the Baltimore Ravens this Sunday at Gillette Stadium to close New England's only back-to-back home stand of the 2009 season. Last week, the Patriots beat the Falcons at home, 26-10, to extend their winning streak to 16-straight against NFC opponents.

Baltimore has never scored a touchdown in Foxborough after being held to a pair of field goals in a 20-3 loss at Foxboro Stadium in 1999 and a 24-3 loss in their first and only visit to Gillette Stadium in 2004.

For the second straight week, the Patriots will face an undefeated team with Baltimore standing at 3-0 after scoring 30-plus points in all three wins. Baltimore beat Kansas City, 38-24, San Diego, 21-26 and Cleveland, 34-3.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast to a regional audience by **CBS** and can be seen in Boston on **WBZ-TV Channel 4**. **Jim Nantz** will handle play-by-play duties with **Phil Simms** providing color.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience by **Sports USA Radio Network**. **Bob Fitzgerald** and **Ross Tucker** will call the game with **Tony Graziani** handling the sideline reporting.

RADIO: 98.5 FM, The Sports Hub, is the flagship station for the **Patriots Radio Network**. A complete listing of the network's 36 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 33rd season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 26th season as a tandem.

UNFAMILIAR TERRITORY

The Patriots have played just two regular season home games against Baltimore, with a 20-3 victory in the final game of the 1999 season (1/2/00) and a 24-3 win on November 28, 2004. The only two teams that have fewer trips to New England are Houston and Carolina with one visit each.

AFL LEGACY GAMES

This season also marks the 50th anniversary for the American Football League (AFL), of which the Patriots were an original member. The Boston Patriots, who hosted the AFL's first regular season game on Sept. 9, 1960 at Boston University Field, were featured in the NFL's first "AFL Legacy Game" on the opening weekend of the 2009 season on Sept. 14, 2009, when the Patriots hosted the Buffalo Bills at Gillette Stadium on Monday Night Football. It was the first of four "AFL Legacy Games" in which the Patriots will appear this season (at Den, vs. Ten and at Mia). The Patriots will wear red and white "throwback" uniforms in those games, replicating the uniforms worn by the 1963 team that claimed the franchise's first division title and competed in the franchise's first league championship game. Patriots coaches will also wear apparel featuring the Pat Patriot logo.

GAMEDAY PROGRAM DESIGN

The original "Pat Patriot" was born in 1960 when newspaper cartoonist Phil Bissell was assigned to sketch a reaction upon the announcement that Boston's American Football League team would be called the Patriots. From his original "Pat" cartoon, Bissell became forever linked with the franchise that wore a copy based off of his original figure on its helmets from 1961 to 1992. Bissell, a resident of Rockport, Mass., also contributed stylized "Pat Patriot" cartoons to the covers of over 50 Patriots game programs throughout the team's AFL seasons from 1960-69. In recognition of the Patriots 50th anniversary, Bissell has been commissioned to create the covers of this season's *Patriots GameDay* magazines in the same style of those early covers.



50TH ANNIVERSARY AFL EXHIBIT

The Hall at Patriot Place presented by Raytheon is a monument to 50 years of Patriots history. NEW ENGLAND-BALTIMORE

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Ravens have squared off four times in the regular season since the Baltimore franchise was founded following the Cleveland Browns' move to Baltimore in 1996. New England owns a perfect 4-0 record over Baltimore. The teams last met in week 13 of the 2007 season with the Patriots overcoming a 24-17 fourth-quarter deficit to keep their perfect regular season alive and improve to 12-0.



The Ravens' first trip to Gillette Stadium came on Nov. 28, 2004 with the Patriots claiming a 24-3 victory. Baltimore's first visit to Foxborough came in the final game of the 1999 regular season, a 20-3 New England win. The first meeting between the teams came during the Ravens' first season in Baltimore, when the Patriots prevailed 46-38 on Oct. 6, 1996. The 84 total points scored by both teams in that game rank as the second-highest total number of points in a game in Patriots history.

The Patriots rebounded from a 24-17 fourth-quarter deficit to improve to 12-0 with a victory over the Baltimore Ravens on Monday Night Football. The game was tied at 10 at halftime and was tied at 17 entering the final quarter. Baltimore took a 24-17 lead following a 1-yard touchdown catch by Daniel Wilcox with 14:25 left in the game. The Patriots were forced to punt on their next possession, but the New England defense came up with a key turnover on a James Sanders interception at the 1-yard line to give the Patriots possession. A 42-yard return by Sanders set up a 5-play, 47-yard drive that ended in a 38-yard field goal that cut the lead to 24-20 with 8:41 left. The Patriots defense forced a three-and-out, but New England's offense was subsequently forced to punt the ball back to Baltimore. New England's defense forced yet another three-and-out, setting up a 13-play, 68-yard drive that ended in a 27-24 Patriots lead on an 8-yard scoring pass from Tom Brady to Jabar Gaffney with 44 seconds left. On the final play of the game, Baltimore completed a Hail Mary pass, but Eric Alexander brought down Baltimore's Mark Clayton at the Patriots' 3-yard line as time expired to preserve New England's comeback win. It was one of Brady's four fourth quarter comebacks in 2007.

PATRIOTS VS. RAVENS' PREDECESSORS

From 1970-83, the Patriots faced the Baltimore Colts 27 times, recording a 12-15 record in those games. The Colts moved to Indianapolis prior to the 1984 season and Baltimore was without an NFL team until the Cleveland Browns moved to Baltimore and became the Ravens in 1996. Prior to the move, the Patriots were 4-11 against the Browns, including a 2-4 record against Cleveland while Bill Belichick was the Browns' head coach from 1991-95.

Since 2003, the Patriots are 22-4 in October games, having swept the month in 2003, 2006 and 2007. The Patriots had an 11-game winning streak in the month of October that was snapped last season when New England dropped a 30-10 decision at San Diego (10/12/08).

THIS WEEK IN PATRIOTS HISTORY

October 2 – October 8

October 8, 1967: In a game moved to San Diego due to the 1967 World Series at Fenway Park, the Boston Patriots and San Diego Chargers fight to a 31-31 tie. It was the ninth tie in franchise history, and the Patriots have not tied a game since.

October 6, 1974: The Patriots improve to 4-0 on the season with a 42-3 win over the Baltimore Colts at Schaefer Stadium. The 39-point victory is the fourth-largest in team history.

October 2, 1988: The Patriots defeat the Indianapolis Colts 21-17, with Doug Flutie providing the game-winning touchdown on a 13-yard bootleg with 29 seconds left in the game to erase a 17-14 deficit.

October 2, 1994: The Patriots score a thrilling 17-16 victory over the Green Bay Packers at Foxboro Stadium in the first home victory under Robert Kraft's ownership. Matt Bahr sealed the win by converting a do-or-die 33-yard field goal with four seconds left in the game.

October 6, 1996: The Patriots score the most points by a New England team since 1984 and gain a 46-38 shootout win over the Baltimore Ravens at Memorial Stadium.

October 4, 1998: Adam Vinatieri nails a 27-yard field goal with three seconds left in the game to give the Patriots a 30-27 win over the New Orleans Saints at the Louisiana Superdome.

October 8, 2000: The Patriots defeat the Indianapolis Colts 24-16 at Foxboro Stadium to record Bill Belichick's first home victory as New England's head coach.

October 5, 2003: The Patriots defeat the Tennessee Titans 38-30 at Gillette Stadium to begin their NFL-record 21-game winning streak, including a Super Bowl XXXVIII win.

The New England Patriots offense hit from every angle, and the New England defense held the high-powered Atlanta Falcons to just 10 points in a 26-10 victory in a steady rain in Foxborough. New England improved to 16 straight wins over NFC opponents.

Quarterback Tom Brady threw for 277 yards, WR Randy Moss caught ten passes for 116 yards, and RB Fred Taylor gained 105 yards rushing. New England had 28 first downs, gained 445 yards in total offense and possessed the ball for 39:49 to improve to 2-1.

PK Stephen Gostkowski connected on four field goals, including three on drives inside the red zone. Taylor scored on an eight-yard run in the second quarter, and Brady became the 27th player to pass for 200 touchdowns on a 36-yard score to TE Chris Baker in the fourth quarter.

After playing a competitive game for the first half, New England took control and dominated the rest of the way. Atlanta scored on two of its first three drives of the game, but possessed the ball for just over six minutes in the second half and gained only 78 yards of total offense against a stingy Patriots' defense. New England held RB Michael Turner to 56 yards, TE Tony Gonzales to only one catch, and QB Matt Ryan to just 17 completions and no touchdowns.

Both teams opened with long drives that ended in field goals. Atlanta opened the game with a drive that lasted 5:39, while New England answered with a drive that lasted 8:39.

The Patriots took the lead in the second quarter after taking advantage of a shanked 29-yard punt that allowed a drive to begin at midfield. Taylor gained 41 yards, including a 19-yard run and an eight-yard touchdown run to cap a New England scoring drive that put them in front, 10-3. Atlanta tied the game at 10-10 on the next series by converting a fourth-and-three from the 34-yard line on their way to a two-yard touchdown run by Turner. After stopping the Patriots on the next set of downs, Atlanta drove to the New England 31-yard line before S Brandon McGowan forced a fumble on a hard hit to Turner that was recovered by S James Sanders. New England responded by executing a 12-play, 58-yard drive that ended in a 33-yard field goal for a 13-10 halftime advantage.

After adding a field goal for a 16-10 lead with their opening drive of the second half, head coach Bill Belichick called two fourth-down plays on a series that ended in another field goal early in the fourth quarter. Faced with a fourth-and-one from their own 24-yard line, RB Sammy Morris converted with a two-yard run up the middle. Later on the same drive the Patriots were faced with a fourth-and-three from the Atlanta 37-yard line. Brady completed a deep pass to Moss for a 21-yard gain to keep the drive alive. The conversions allowed New England to stretch a drive that went 16 plays, 70 yards and chewed up seven minutes off the play clock.

BRADY THROWS 200TH CAREER TD

QB Tom Brady became the 27th player in NFL history to reach 200 touchdowns with his 36-yard touchdown pass to TE Chris Baker in the fourth quarter. Brady reached the milestone in a short period of time. Below is a chart showing where he ranks in NFL history on how many games it took him to reach this milestone.

BRADY GOOD WITH THE LEAD

Tom Brady improved his career regular-season record to 69-3 when leading at halftime and 72-1 when leading after three quarters. New England held a 13-10 lead at halftime and a 19-10 lead heading into the fourth quarter.

TAYLOR PASSES RIGGINS

Fred Taylor's 19-yard run in the second quarter moved him past Hall of Fame RB John Riggins (11,352) into 15th place on the NFL's all-time rushing list. Taylor's run was also the longest of the season for the Patriots. Taylor has 11,447 career rushing yards.

TAYLOR REGISTERS 49TH CAREER 100-YD GAME

Fred Taylor finished with 105 rushing yards on 21 carries, recording his 49th career 100-yard rushing game and first as a Patriot. Taylor's 49 career 100-yard rushing games rank ninth in NFL history and second among active players. The only active player with more 100-yard games than Taylor is Seattle's Edgerrin James with 57.

DOMINATING DEFENSE

The New England defense entered the Atlanta game ranked fourth in the NFL in total defense. The Patriots defense has not allowed more than 19 points in a game so far in 2009, limiting Buffalo to 17 offensive points, the New York Jets to 19 points and Atlanta to 10 points. The Patriots have allowed a total of 50 points through three games in 2009, an average of 16.7 points per game. The total of 50 points allowed is the Patriots' third fewest through three games in their 10 seasons being coached by Bill Belichick. Since Belichick arrived in 2000, the only times the Patriots allowed fewer than 50 points through the season's first three games were in 2007 (35) and 2001 (46).

MOSS OFF TO BEST START

Randy Moss has 26 receptions through three games so far this season, recording more catches through three games than in any other season in his career. Moss's previous best catch total through a season's first three games was 22 catches in the 2007 season. Moss's 21-yard catch on fourth-and-three in the third quarter of the Atlanta game was his 23rd of the season. Moss finished the day with 10 receptions for 116 yards, recording his second 100-yard receiving game of the season and the 61st of his career. Moss ranks second in NFL history in that category (Jerry Rice, 76). Moss now has 15 100-yard receiving games as a member of the Patriots, and the Patriots are 15-0 when Moss has a 100-yard receiving game. Moss had 10 catches vs. Atlanta, marking his 10th game with 10 or more catches in his 173-game career. The 10-catch performance was Moss's second of the 2009 season – he tied his career high with 12 catches in the season opening win.

QUICK HITS

- The Patriots did not allow a sack in 42 pass attempts, marking their second consecutive game with no sacks allowed. Including the sack-free performance against Atlanta, the Patriots have not allowed a sack in their last 134 pass attempts, recording the longest current streak in the NFL. Through three games this season, the Patriots have allowed just one sack on 142 pass attempts.
- Stephen Gostkowski (418) moved past Stanley Morgan (408 points) into fifth place on the New England All-Time points scored list.

ROBERT KRAFT NEWS & NOTES



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In 15 seasons of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won eight division titles, five conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships. The Patriots have made five Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than three berths.

SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season-ticket base stands at a capped total of 61,759 and more than 50,000 fans are on a waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 163 consecutive home games (dating back to the 1994 regular-season opener).

SUCCESS STORY

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have been one of the NFL's elite franchises. Over the first 15-plus years of Kraft's ownership, the Patriots own the NFL's highest winning percentage and have won more Super Bowl titles, more conference championships and more playoff games than any other NFL team.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. Belichick spent 20 years as an assistant coach in the NFL and this is his 15th season as a head coach. According to the Elias Sports Bureau he is the only man in NFL history to serve 20 or more seasons as an assistant coach and at least 15 seasons as a head coach. Over a 100-game span from 2003-08, Belichick directed the team to an 82-18 record, marking the best 100-game span for any team in NFL history. In the 2007 season, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in the NFL's 88-year history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. He has led the Patriots to the Super Bowl four times in the last eight seasons and has produced six division championships in the last eight seasons, including five straight from 2003-07. Belichick's Patriots teams own the all-time NFL records for consecutive total victories (21 from 2003-04), consecutive regular-season victories (21 from 2006-08) and consecutive playoff victories (10 from 2001-05). Belichick owns the second best postseason record in NFL history (15-4) and is the winningest NFL head coach since 2001 (113-35). From 2003-04, he directed the Patriots to back-to-back Super Bowl titles while posting consecutive 17-win campaigns. Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of five Super Bowl championship teams. His overall record of 118 -46 with the Patriots gives him the most victories and the best winning percentage of any head coach in franchise history.

ELITE COMPANY

Bill Belichick is one of nine NFL head coaches to win three or more championships since the league began postseason play in 1933. With the Patriots' victory in Super Bowl XXXIX, Belichick joined an exclusive club in which each of the eight other members has been enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

BELICHICK WINS 100th REGULAR-SEASON GAME WITH PATRIOTS

The Patriots' victory over Oakland on Dec. 14, 2008 was Bill Belichick's 100th regular-season victory as Patriots head coach. His 100th victory came in his 142nd regular-season game as head coach, and only three NFL coaches have won their 100th game with a team in fewer tries – Oakland's John Madden (136 games), Miami's Don Shula (137) and Cleveland's Paul Brown (138).

AMONG THE GREATS

Coach Belichick has recorded 155 career wins and is one of 17 coaches in NFL history to win 150 or more games. Belichick owns a career winning percentage of .630, placing third in NFL history among all NFL coaches with at least 150 career victories. Belichick trails only George Halas (.671) and Don Shula (.665) on that list.

Over his 11-year NFL career, Randy Moss has averaged one touchdown for every 6.44 receptions, a total that is the second best in NFL history among any receiver with at least 500 receptions. Moss has caught 135 touchdowns out of 869 career receptions. Lance Alworth, who played 11 seasons for San Diego and Dallas from 1962-72, caught 85 touchdowns out of 542 career receptions for an average of one score every 6.38 receptions.

MOSS IS NFL'S PREMIER TD RECEIVER

Since entering the NFL in 1998, Randy Moss has caught 135 touchdown passes, more than any other player over that span. Since joining the Patriots via trade prior to the 2007 season, Moss has caught 34 touchdowns – also the best in the league over that span. In terms of overall touchdowns (rushing, receiving and returning), Moss has totaled 136 scores since entering the league in 1998 (135 via reception and one via punt return), a tally that ranks second only to LaDainian Tomlinson (142 touchdowns) over that span. Last season, Moss's 11 touchdown receptions led the AFC and tied for third in the NFL.

Moss had 10 catches in the win vs. Atlanta (9/27), making it his 10th game with 10 or more catches. The 10-catch performance was Moss's second of 2009 – he tied a career high with 12 catches in the season-opener vs. Buffalo (9/14). Moss now has three 10-catch games with New England.

Moss has 26 receptions in 2009 and is in 12th place on the NFL's All-Time Reception list with 869 career receptions. He can become the 10th player to surpass 900 career receptions in 2009. He is one of 23 players to have at least 800 receptions.

MOSS MOVING UP ALL-TIME LISTS

Randy Moss currently ranks ninth on the NFL's all-time receiving yards list with 13,482 receiving yards. He is one of 11 players in NFL history to total at least 13,000 receiving yards. Moss moved into the top 10 on the NFL's receiving yardage list on Dec. 14, 2008 at Oakland. Moss needs 518 yards receiving to become the seventh player in NFL history to reach 14,000 yards.

WELKER LEADS NFL IN RECEPTIONS SINCE 2007

Wes Welker leads the NFL with 235 receptions from 2007. In 2007, he set a Patriots franchise record with 112 receptions, tying him for the NFL lead and setting a league record for most receptions in a player's first season with a new team. In 2008, he nearly replicated that feat, with his 111 receptions placing second in the NFL.



Welker joined the Patriots in a trade with the Miami Dolphins prior to the 2007 season, and since then is the NFL's leading receiver.

WELKER NAMED TO PRO BOWL SQUAD

Wes Welker was named to his first career Pro Bowl after the 2008 season and is the fifth Patriots wide receiver to earn Pro Bowl honors since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, joining Randy Moss (2007), Troy Brown (2001), Terry Glenn (1999) and Stanley Morgan (1979-80 and 1986-87). Welker finished second in the NFL with 111 receptions in 2008 – the second highest single-season total in team history behind his franchise-record 112 receptions in 2007. Welker became the eighth player in NFL history to record back-to-back 100-catch seasons and is the first player to achieve the feat with the Patriots.



WELKER RECORDS 12 CATCHES

Wes Welker tied his second-highest single-game reception total with 12 catches in the season-opener vs. Buffalo (9/14). His dozen receptions trail only his career-high 13 catches vs. Philadelphia on Nov. 25, 2007. The 12 catches against Buffalo marked Welker's fifth career regular-season game with 10 or more catches. Welker's other 12-catch game was last season at Seattle on Dec. 7, 2008. His 12 receptions tie the fifth-highest single-game total in team history, behind Troy Brown's team-record 16 catches on Sept. 22, 2002 and three 13-catch performances (Welker, 11/25/07; Deion Branch, 9/29/02; Terry Glenn, 10/3/99).

WELKER PILES UP YARDS

Wes Welker led the Patriots with 1,165 receiving yards in 2008 and joined Randy Moss in recording the first back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons in Patriots history. Moss also had 1,000 receiving yards in 2007 and 2008. Welker's 1,165 yards in 2008 rank sixth on the Patriots' all-time single-season list. In 2007, Welker totaled 1,175 receiving yards – a performance that ranked fourth in team history. In the franchise's 49-year history, there have been 11 single-season performances of 1,000 receiving yards and Welker owns two of them.

WELKER'S ROUTE TO THE NFL

Despite being named the Oklahoma football player of the year by both the *USA Today* and the *Daily Oklahoman*, Wes Welker's only scholarship offer came from Texas Tech, only after a player that committed to Texas Tech backed out.

"I was thinking I'd get a scholarship somewhere," Welker said. "When it didn't happen when it was supposed to I was pretty hurt by it."

Welker had an impressive collegiate career, accumulating 259 receptions and eight punts returned for a touchdown. He even won a national award as the best special teams player in the country. Despite those accolades, he was passed over in the NFL draft and signed with San Diego as a free agent. He made the team, then was cut after the first game.

He signed with Miami soon after and was used just on special teams. He caught New England's eye with a 71-yard punt return on Monday Night Football in a game against the Patriots. He was acquired by the Patriots in a trade with Miami in 2007.

WELKER CATCHES SIX OR MORE PASSES IN 11 STRAIGHT GAMES TO OPEN 2008

Wes Welker caught at least six passes in each of the first 11 games in 2008. Welker is the first player in NFL history to have six or more catches in the first 11 games of a season. He caught 12 in the 2009 season-opener vs. Buffalo (9/14).

Kevin Faulk is one of just 11 NFL players this decade to total at least 2,000 rushing yards and at least 2,000 receiving yards, and is one of only six players to have at least 2,000 rushing yards and at least 3,000 receiving yards. Faulk has totaled 2,983 rushing yards and 3,272 receiving yards since 2000, joining an exclusive list of elite players who have achieved the feat. Faulk is one of just six players who reached the milestone with just one team. In the 1990s, there were 13 players who achieved the 2000/2000 milestone; 22 players did it in the 1980s; nine players achieved the feat in the 1970s.

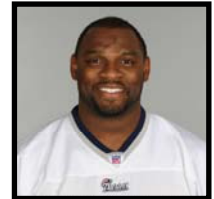

MATT LIGHT AND HIS FOUNDATION

The Light Foundation, a nonprofit founded in 2001 by Matt Light, held its signature fundraising event on Tuesday, September 29 at Addieville East Farm in Mapleville, RI.

The New England defense entered the Atlanta game ranked fourth in the NFL in total defense. The Patriots defense has not allowed more than 19 points in a game so far in 2009, limiting Buffalo to 17 offensive points, the New York Jets to 19 points and Atlanta to 10 points.

DEFENSE STARTS STRONG

The Patriots have allowed a total of 50 points through three games in 2009, an average of 16.7 points per game. The total of 50 points allowed is the Patriots' third fewest through three games in their 10 seasons being coached by Bill Belichick. Since Belichick arrived in 2000, the only times the Patriots allowed fewer than 50 points through the season's first three games were in 2007 (35) and 2001 (46).

PATRIOTS IMPROVE TO 26-4 AGAINST 1ST TIME VISITORS TO GILLETTE STADIUM

The Atlanta Falcons made their first appearance at Gillette Stadium last Sunday. With the Patriots' 26-10 win, New England improved to 26-4 against teams in their first game at the facility, which opened in 2002. The Patriots have won 22 of their last 23 games against first-time visitors to Gillette. Following the Atlanta game, the only NFL team the Patriots have not faced at Gillette Stadium in a regular-season or playoff game is the Carolina Panthers, who will make their debut at Gillette on Dec. 13, 2009. Including today's victory, the Patriots are 53-12 (.815) at Gillette Stadium since the venue opened in 2002 (including regular-season and playoff games).

SACK-FREE

The Patriots did not allow a sack in 42 pass attempts against Atlanta, marking their second consecutive game with no sacks allowed. Including the sack-free performance against Atlanta, the Patriots have not allowed a sack in their last 134 pass attempts, recording the longest current streak in the NFL. Through three games this season, the Patriots have allowed just one sack on 142 pass attempts.

WINNING STREAK CONTINUES

The Patriots' winning streak against NFC opponents increased to 16 with their 26-10 win over Atlanta. The Patriots, who have gone 4-0 against the NFC in each of the last three years (2006-2008) last lost to an NFC team in Week 2 of the 2005 season, when the Patriots dropped a 27-17 decision at Carolina (9/18/05).

PATRIOTS WIN GAME NUMBER 400

The Patriots recorded the franchise's 400th all-time victory, including postseason games with the 26-10 win over Atlanta. The 400 victories rank third among the eight original AFL teams, behind Denver and Oakland. The eight original AFL teams, including the Patriots, began play in 1960. The Patriots recorded their milestone 400th victory in their 50th season and in their 777th overall game. Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have 175 victories, more than any other NFL team during that span.
