JUST THE FACTS

Three down and one to go.

That’s how John Harbaugh describes this week’s game at the New England Patriots. In fact, those are similar words that he used to alert his team of last Sunday’s contest against the Browns: “Two down and one to go.”

Bill Belichick will take a similar approach with his Patriots this week. You could see him saying: “It’s the next game on the schedule. We’ll show up.”

Fans and media will view this Sunday’s (Oct. 4) battle between Baltimore and New England at Gillette Stadium (1 p.m.) as more than just another game on each team’s schedule. That should make a fun week of anticipation. The Ravens, who beat the Browns, 34-3, last Sunday at M&T Bank Stadium, take a 3-0 mark into the Pats game. The Patriots, now 2-1, beat the visiting Falcons, 26-10, in Foxborough on the same day.

The Ravens intercepted 4 Browns passes, converting 3 into TDs, in their victory over visiting Cleveland. RB Willis McGahee ran for 2 scores, while RB Ray Rice scored his 1st NFL TD and QB Joe Flacco hit WR Derrick Mason with a 72-yard TD bomb. The Ravens produced 479 yards of offense, tied for the 2nd-most in franchise annals, while limiting the Browns to 186 total yards.

Following the trip to New England, the Ravens return home to host the Bengals on 10/11 before heading to Minneapolis to face the Vikings on 10/18. Baltimore’s bye weekend will take place at the end of the month before hosting the Broncos on 11/1.

HARBS SAYS

“It’s early in the season, and we don’t care about rankings and what the experts say about our future. No disrespect to those who do that, but it just doesn’t matter to us. We know what we are and where we’re going. We have played with poise, class and with courage so far this season. We are a rough, tough, disciplined and hard-playing team. That’s who we are.”

INJURY UPDATE

All 53 Ravens were available to play against the Browns, and there were no new injuries reported after the game. CB Samari Rolle (neck/shoulder) is on the Physically Unable to Perform list. Several key players are on Injured Reserve: DT Lamar Divens (hip), LB Jason Phillips (knee), WR Marcus Smith (knee), TE Quinn Sypniewski (knee) and T Adam Terry (knee).

LAST WEEK

The Ravens followed 3 INTs with TD drives in last Sunday’s 34-3 stomping of the Browns at M&T Bank Stadium. Baltimore CB Domonique Foxworth ended Cleveland’s 1st series with an INT to the Browns’ 31. The Ravens quickly took advantage, taking a 7-0 lead on a 7-yard RB Willis McGahee TD run. McGahee came back with a 15-yard 2nd-quarter TD. Those scores, plus 2 K Steve Hauschka FGs, gave the Ravens a 20-0 halftime lead. Eric Mangini replaced Brady Quinn with Derek Anderson for the start of the 2nd half. Baltimore’s defense then stole 3 Anderson passes in the final 2 quarters, 2 of which led to Ravens TDs. The initial score came on RB Ray Rice’s 1st NFL TD (9-yard run), and the 2nd saw WR Derrick Mason catch a 72-yard Joe Flacco TD pass. Baltimore produced 479 yards (tied for 2nd most in team history), while the defense held the Browns to 186 net yards.

RAY RICE ON THE 2009 RAVENS

“Coach [Harbaugh] always preaches ‘the team, the team.’ And, we are a team. We look out for each other. The coaches don’t have to do all the correcting. We have great leaders who are players, especially Ray [Lewis]. We correct each other in practices and games even before the coaches have to say anything. I think that says something about us.”

WHAT’S GOING ON?

IT’S IN THE TRENCHES

Football coaches always talk about how games are won in the trenches, along the offensive and defensive lines. Certainly, the Ravens “trenchmen” have a lot to do with the team’s positive start to the season. The O-line features a 6-time Pro Bowl C Matt Birk and a pair of No. 1 draft choices, LG Ben Grubbs (2007) and RT Michael Oher (2009), who has been impressive as a rookie starter. LT Jared Gaither, a 5th-round supplemental pick in ’07, shows signs of being special, while RG Chris Chester (2nd round in ’06) is playing at an impressive level. The starting D-line features an Ozzie Newsome special: a top draft choice (DT Haloti Ngata, No. 1 pick in ’06), a graduate of Baltimore’s practice squad (NT Kelly Gregg) and a veteran free agent signing (4-time Pro Bowl DE Trevor Pryce).

Of all the honors and awards you have earned, which one means the most to you?

“I would have to say the Lombardi Award [in 2002 as the nation’s top collegiate lineman or linebacker]. The defensive players that I was up against had amazing senior campaigns, and I was only a junior. I didn’t expect to win, but when I did, it felt great.”

What made you want to start your foundation “Team Sizzle”?

“It’s actually my production company and charity foundation tied into one. I love movies, and I was tired of seeing so many bad movies. I know I can make a quality film, so I got it all organized. I got an LLC and a production company together. Not only that, I employed a lot of my family members who were unemployed. So, I kind of killed two birds with one stone with that and helped out my family.”

In your mind, what makes a quality movie?

“Just a good story. If I can be amazed by the story and have a good time watching it – not have to critique it, piece it together or find out what was missing and what shouldn’t be there – that’s what makes a great movie. If I can sit there and tell you exactly what’s missing, it would still be a decent movie, just not one of the greats.”

If a movie were to be made about your life, who would be the director of the film and the actor that plays you?

“I would definitely want Martin Scorsese to direct it. He brings some drama to every movie he does and can have a little bit of sense of humor in it, too. I would have to say that Henry Simmons would play me. He’s a great-looking guy and would definitely do me some justice on the looks aspect of it.”

I know some of your favorite films are the “Ocean’s” series. Which character would you play?

“Hands down, Danny Ocean. I’d be the brains of the operation and have the girl. My cousin Rico would be Rusty Ryan, and my cousin ‘Q’ would be Linus – Matt Damon’s character.”

As a secondary education/history major, did you ever plan on becoming a teacher?

“I did. I really wanted to teach high school history. I love teaching and love history. High school was one of the greatest times in my life. So, I’ve always wanted to go back to Arizona and teach some history in my high school.”

Who is the most famous person in your cell phone?

“Amare Stoudemire. But I have a few: John Singleton [director of ‘Four Brothers’] and [TV/film producer] Robert Townsend. They are people who have been to my celebrity charity event. I would say that Amare is probably the one that everybody knows.”

If you get another tattoo, what will it be?

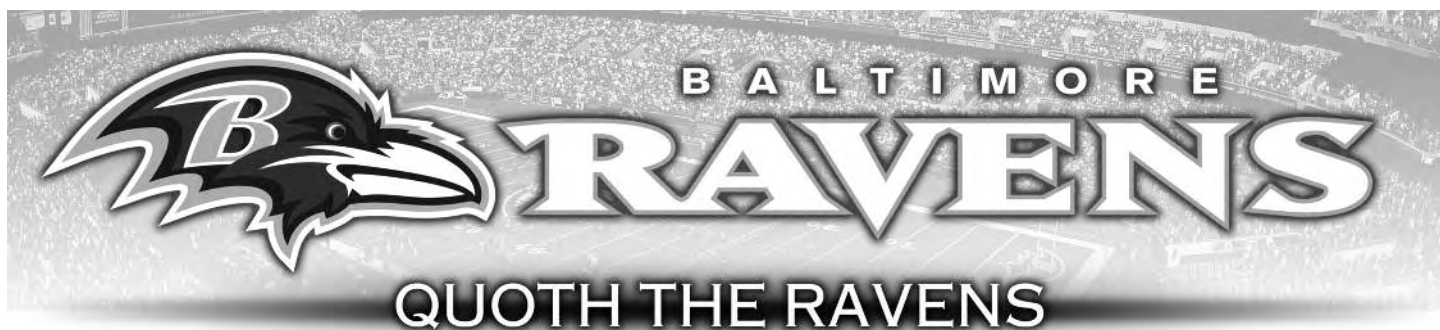

Browns head coach Eric Mangini on what he's seen from LB Ray Lewis that makes him one of the elite players in the NFL:

“He's passionate. He has an incredible work ethic. He has great instincts that he combines with the fact that he studies so hard. He plays faster, and he always has, than he is. Not that he's slow by any stretch, but he knows where things are going. He sees it and anticipates it and then is able to go over and execute it. The way that he's able to rally guys around him, it's unique. You always talk about leadership – learned or born with it. I saw it [as a scout with the Ravens in 1996] from Day One from a very unique perspective from a rookie linebacker, and it looks like he hasn't stopped since.”

Offense coordinator Cam Cameron on WR Derrick Mason getting 800 catches in his career:

“In my view, Derrick Mason, the number of catches is the least important thing he probably does. It's the clutch catches that he makes, the leadership that he brings, the way he practices, and the habits that he has. He has developed probably as good of habits as any player that I've been around, in terms of his weekly preparation. When you do that, and all of a sudden look up, there's 800 catches.”

***The Sporting News'* Vinnie Iyer on the Ravens in 2009:**

“Let's hope the critics of the Ravens' offense are finally silenced. They can run the ball. Joe Flacco has the arm to get the ball downfield. And oh yeah, with playmakers such as Ray Lewis and Ed Reed, they can still also score on defense. Going into Baltimore with a bad offense can mean only one thing: Bad results.”

S Ed Reed on the Ravens' offensive production this season:

“It's a great thing. Being around here for the last couple of years, and those guys fighting and battling to get where they're at, it's been a growing process. It's still a growing process because they have some young guys over there making plays, but it's exciting. Definitely, hats off to those guys. We appreciate the rest. You're going to need the defense later on this season. So getting that rest now is definitely going to help.”

***YahooSports.com's* Charles Robinson on the production of RB Willis McGahee this season:**

“Quarterback Joe Flacco deserves a nod, but McGahee has been a huge difference maker. When I visited the Ravens in the preseason, all anyone could talk about was how McGahee was rejuvenated physically and mentally. I was skeptical, but he's put together arguably the best three-game period of his career. With two touchdowns in Baltimore's stomping of Cleveland, McGahee has cemented his standing as a wizard in the red zone. His six scores this season are nearly halfway to his career high of 13.”

Former NFL head coach Steve Mariucci on the Ravens:

“Baltimore is the team to beat in the AFC. We know they play defense. They've got a good young quarterback, they can run. They are a complete football team.”

John Harbaugh on if fans should be excited about the potential of the Ravens this season:

“We're excited about our team. We're excited about our guys. I'm excited about the people. I'm excited about the type of people that we have, the guys that walk in this room right here. That's been from Day One. The type of men we have coaching. The type of people in the building. So, yes, hopefully they'll recognize that. If you're a Ravens fan, you have to be excited about the tremendous players on your football team and really everybody in the organization. We've been excited.”

TE Todd Heap on the improvement from QB Joe Flacco:

“Joe's getting more opportunities to throw the ball down the field, and we're getting a chance to see what he's capable of. I don't think we've seen it all yet, but you can see his confidence out there. We feel it in the huddle as well. We know if there's a chance the ball's coming to you, it's going to be put where it needs to be put. Joe in the huddle, his persona, he has that confidence about him that he knows he's going to get the job done. It's not a one-play thing. It's an every-play thing. I don't think he gets fazed by all the little things that happen. If we do have a bad play, those things wash right off his back.”

FB Le'Ron McClain on the offense's dominating performance against the Browns last Sunday:

“From the time that we started this year, we were just on a mission. We wanted to give ourselves an identity and come out and be the most physical offense. That's the mentality that we take when we step out on the field.”

RB Ray Rice on the combination backfield and how the backs are complementing each other:

“I'm fresh going into every game. Me and Willis are offsetting each other. We're both putting our quality yards [in], and it just feels good to know that it's a long season, and we've got a great rotation going. He's fresh, I'm fresh, and it's just good to know that we're both doing our thing.”

CB Domonique Foxworth on playing for his hometown team:

“It feels fantastic. This is the city I love. I don't feel this strongly about the city because of what the Ravens paid me. I feel this way about the city because I was raised in it. I drive past places where I went to school or places where I'd eaten, even the building where I had my prom. It puts a smile on my face. I get a lot more post-game text messages now from people who actually watch me play.”



RAVENS NOTES / OPPONENT INFO

PATRIOTS IN A SNAPSHOT

The Patriots are good, and they have been remarkably consistent under Bill Belichick, who was named New England’s head coach in 2000. Under Belichick, the Pats own NFL records for consecutive victories (21 from 2003-04), consecutive regular season wins (21 from 2006-08) and consecutive playoff triumphs (10 from 2001-05). Plus, New England became the only team in league annals to win 3 Super Bowls in 4 years (2001-04). After starting his NE tenure with a 5-11 mark, Belichick teamed with QB Tom Brady to begin an impressive stretch that includes 6 playoff appearances in 7 seasons. Even last season, when Brady missed 15 games, New England produced an 11-5 mark, but did not make the playoffs. With Scott Pioli, now the GM of the Chiefs, Belichick assembled a roster that features an amazing 12 Pro Bowl players. Seven of those Pro Bowlers are on offense: Brady, WRs Randy Moss and Wes Walker, who also returns punts, RB Fred Taylor, C Dan Koppen, LG Logan Mankins and LT Matt Light. Standouts on defense include NT Vince Wilfork, former Raven OLB Adalius Thomas and LCB Shawn Springs. Both kickers, K Stephen Gostkowski and P Chris Hanson, have made the trip to Hawaii for the NFL All-Star game. The Patriots own the NFL’s best home record (55-19) since 2000, 1 game better than the Ravens (54-20). (The Colts are 54-19, a half game ahead of Baltimore.)

QUICK HITS

- The Ravens aim to open the season at 4-0 for only the 2nd time in team history (2006).
- Baltimore looks to earn a win against the Patriots for the 1st time ever. New England (4-0) and Carolina (3-0) are the only NFL teams the Ravens have never beaten.
- Under head coach John Harbaugh, the Ravens are 8-4 all time on the road (6-3 regular season and 2-1 playoffs). Baltimore has won 3 consecutive regular season road games.
- Since the 2000 season, the Ravens are 18-18 in the month of October. Under Harbaugh, Baltimore is 2-2 in the 10th month.

NOTE OF THE WEEK

Dating back to Week 7 of the 2008 campaign, the Ravens have compiled an NFL-best 6-1 road record in the regular season. When including postseason play, Baltimore is 8-2 during that span (also the best record in the league over that time).

NOTE OF THE WEEK II

QB Joe Flacco has flourished on the road during his brief NFL career. In the Ravens’ last 7 regular season road games (dating back to 10/19/08), Flacco has produced a 101.1 QB rating, the best figure in the NFL. In those contests, he has completed 64.9% of his passes (122 of 188) for 1,448 yards, 11 TDs and just 3 INTs.

TOP PERFORMERS VS. PATS

WR Derrick Mason

- In 4 games against the Patriots, Mason has 21 receptions for 260 yards (12.4 avg.) and 1 TD. Mason has also produced 17 1st downs on his 21 receptions, an 81% conversion rate.

- On 10/5/03 at New England, Mason produced 8 receptions for 99 yards (12.4 avg.), converting 6 catches (75%) for 1st downs.

RB Willis McGahee

- Has faced New England 7 times, producing 443 yards and 1 TD on 123 carries in those games. McGahee also has 12 receptions for 144 yards against the Patriots.

- McGahee has converted 25 1st downs and has produced 13 runs of 10-plus yards vs. New England.

- In the last meeting between the Ravens and Patriots (12/3/07), McGahee rushed for 138 yards on 30 carries. McGahee produced 1 rushing TD in Baltimore's heartbreaking 27-24 loss.

- In 3 games at Gillette Stadium, McGahee has carried the ball 65 times for 243 yards (3.7 avg.), converting 12 runs for 1st downs. He has also pulled in 5 receptions for 57 yards and converted 3 of his catches for 1st downs.

CB Domonique Foxworth

New England defensive coordinator **Dean Pees** was Baltimore head coach **John Harbaugh's** defensive coordinator during the 1983 season at the Miami (OH) University, where Harbaugh played defensive back. Harbaugh said of Pees: "He was the one coach who thought I could play."...

As teammates on the Minnesota Vikings from 1998-2004, Ravens **C Matt Birk** and Patriots **WR Randy Moss** were selected to a total of 9 Pro Bowls between them...

Ravens **RB Willis McGahee** is a 1st cousin of Patriots 2009 2nd-round draft pick **CB Darius Butler**...

Mike Woicik, the Patriots' strength and conditioning coach, was born in Baltimore...

Several players featured in this game grew up in Maryland: Ravens **CB Domonique Foxworth** (Randallstown) and **T Jared Gaither** (White Plains), along with Patriots **CB Leigh Bodden** (Hyattsville), **LB Derrick Burgess** (Greenbelt) and **CB Shawn Springs** (Silver Springs). Ravens **QB Troy Smith** and Patriots **LB Pierre Woods** attended Glenville (Cleveland, OH) HS, together along with Dolphins WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** and Bills S **Donte Whitner**. Although they never all played together on the gridiron, they did spend time together playing basketball while growing up...



In 2005, Ravens **DT Haloti Ngata**, **WR Demetrius Williams** and Patriots **SS Patrick Chung** (2009 2nd-round pick) all enjoyed stellar seasons with the Oregon Ducks. Ngata was named a consensus 1st-team All-American on his way to being drafted 12th overall by Baltimore, while Williams led the Ducks' offense with 59 receptions for 1,059 yards and 10 TDs. At the same time, Chung was enjoying his freshman campaign as the Ducks' 2nd-leading tackler with 91 stops (58 solo) and 2 INTs...

From 2006-07, Ravens **T Michael Oher** and Patriots **RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis** helped guide the Ole Miss Rebels' offense. Oher was instrumental in creating holes for Green-Ellis, who amassed 2,137 rushing yards and 13 TDs over those 2 seasons...

Ravens **S Dawan Landry** and Patriots **LB Gary Guyton** played together on the Georgia Tech defense during the 2004-05 campaigns. Patriots **TE Michael Matthews** also was with the Yellow Jackets those same seasons...

Several players crossed paths as members of the Miami Hurricanes in the early part of the decade. Ravens **RB Willis McGahee** (2000-02) and **LB Tavares Gooden** (2003-07) each played with Patriots **DL Vince Wilfork** (2001-03) and **S Brandon Meriweather** (2002-06).

COACH “HARBS”



Taking over a team that produced a 5-11 mark in 2007, John Harbaugh guided the '08 Ravens to an 11-5 record and an appearance in the AFC Championship game where they lost a heart-stopping battle to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Steelers. En route to the conference title game, Harbaugh tied the NFL record (since 1978) for turnarounds for head coaches taking over a sub-.500 team, and he became just the 5th rookie head coach to win his first 2 playoff games.

Despite the 1st-season success, “Harbs” diffuses accolades: “It’s not about me, it’s about us. It’s about the team. It’s about the players, the coaches, the owner, Ozzie [Newsome] and the scouts. It’s about the support staff. It’s about all of us pulling together to win – to be the best,” Harbaugh says.

Harbaugh, who established a reputation as one of the NFL’s top special teams coaches, is the 3rd head coach in team history, following Ted Marchibroda (1996-98) and Brian Billick (1999-2007). Harbaugh arrived in Baltimore with 24 years of pro and college coaching experience, including the previous 10 seasons with Philadelphia. He was the Eagles’ special team coach from 1998 through 2006 and headed Philly’s secondary in 2007. Harbaugh was originally hired by then-head coach Ray Rhodes and, subsequently, was 1 of 4 assistants retained by Andy Reid in 1999.

One of 4 new head coaches in the NFL last season, Harbaugh’s Ravens produced the most total wins (13) among them all. The others included: Mike Smith (Atlanta, 11), Tony Sparano (Miami, 11) and Jim Zorn (Washington, 8).

“MATTI” NEW MAN FOR “D”



The Ravens named Greg Mattison their new defensive coordinator on Jan. 26, 2009. Mattison, who served as Baltimore’s LBs coach in 2008, became the 4th defensive coordinator in franchise history: Rex Ryan – 2005-08; Mike Nolan – 2002-04; Marvin Lewis – 1996-2001.

Before joining the Ravens last season – his 1st in the NFL – Mattison coached for 32 years on the collegiate level, including 10 as a defensive coordinator. From 2005-07, Mattison served as Florida’s co-defensive coordinator/defensive line coach, helping the Gators win the National Championship in 2006. Mattison was also the “D” coordinator at Notre Dame from 1997-2001 and at Michigan from 1995-96. Under Bob Davie, while heading the Fighting Irish defense, Mattison also coached the defensive line and linebackers. As a member of Tyrone Willingham’s staff (2002-04) at Notre Dame, Mattison coached the D-line and was the program’s recruiting coordinator.

Mattison’s ties to the Harbaugh coaching family are deep rooted. Serving as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach under Jack Harbaugh at Western Michigan from 1981-86, Mattison coached alongside John Harbaugh, who was a graduate assistant for his father from 1984-86.

Mattison now coordinates a unit that, over the past 10 years, has ranked 1st in nearly every NFL defensive category.

CAM’S O.C. SUCCESS



Cam Cameron, Baltimore’s offensive coordinator, guided a Ravens’ attack that produced the 2nd-most points per game in team history (24.1) during the 2008 season. Cameron was hired by John Harbaugh after serving 1 season (2007) as Miami’s head coach and 5 seasons before that guiding the San Diego Chargers’ explosive offense.

Cameron, who Harbaugh has known for 28 years, is acknowledged as one of the top developers of QBs in the NFL. Prior to his 1-year stint in Miami, 4 of Cameron’s last 5 starting QBs earned Pro Bowl or collegiate All-American recognition: Philip Rivers and Drew Brees in San Diego, Antwaan Randle El, when Cameron was the Indiana head coach, and Gus Frerotte, when he tutored the QBs for the Redskins.

Since arriving in Baltimore, Cameron has been instrumental in developing its potent offense and QB Joe Flacco, who has 18 TD passes and just 3 INTs in the Ravens’ last 12 wins.

2009 Offensive Quick Hits:

- Just 3 weeks into the ‘09 season, the Ravens’ offense has posted the top 2 total net yards performances in franchise history.
- After totaling the most yards in franchise history (501 vs. KC on 9/13) in the season opener, the Ravens’ offense tallied 479 total yards this past Sunday vs. Cleveland (337 passing and 142 rushing), tied for 2nd most in team history.
- Baltimore has piled up 1,291 yards over its initial 3 games of ‘09 to average 430.3 yards per contest (2nd in the NFL).
- Baltimore has averaged 34.3 points per game this season. The Ravens have posted a least 30 points in 8 of their last 10 regular season wins dating back to last year. In their last 12 regular season victories (dating back to 10/19/08 at Miami), the Ravens have averaged 32.6 points per game.

Ozzie Newsome’s legacy is unlike any the game has seen. Known throughout all of sports as a premier leader, Newsome is a Hall of Fame player, the architect of Baltimore’s Super Bowl XXXV championship team and an elite personnel evaluator who became the NFL’s first African American general manager. “Ozzie’s credibility is what stands out the most,” head coach John Harbaugh states. “And it’s not just about what he has accomplished. To me, it’s his commitment and focus while striving to do more.”

A key cog in Baltimore's rush defense, which ranked 3rd in the NFL by allowing just 81.4 yards per game, Ngata produced one the best seasons in team history.

- The Ravens have a history of strong run defense, but with Ngata's help the past 4 seasons, Baltimore's ground "D" has improved markedly from what it was before he entered the NFL.

BACK IN ACTION



NT Kelly Gregg, the cornerstone of the Ravens' D-line and perhaps one of the NFL's most underrated players, returns to action this year after missing all of 2008 recovering from microfracture knee surgery. The Ravens' No. 2 all-time leading tackler (629 stops), Gregg finished the 2007 campaign with a career-high 111 tackles. From 2003-2007, he totaled at least 100 tackles in 4 seasons, an achievement no other interior lineman was able to accomplish.

Since 2002, only 1 interior lineman has registered more tackles than Gregg's 610 (Ryan Pickett, 632). What makes this feat even more impressive is that Gregg missed the entire '08 campaign. Here is a look at the top NFL DT tacklers from 2002-present:

In the season opener vs. Kansas City (9/13), Joe Flacco established career highs in attempts (43), passing yards (307) and TDs (3). Last week vs. Cleveland, he again set a new career high in passing yards (342) with his 25-of-35, 1-TD performance.

Heap also caught a 9-yard TD in Week 2’s 31-26 victory at San Diego.

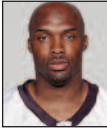

One of the league’s most durable wideouts, he has played in 109 consecutive games (2nd most among active WRs) and has produced at least 60 catches in 9 straight seasons.

HEAD COACH JOHN HARBAUGH'S MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE

Opening statement: “We’ve had a chance to come to work, and the guys have just finished up now. We had meetings and a little practice, and the guys lifted and had a chance to go through tape. A lot of good things. There are a lot of things we need to get better at. But, all three phases contributed. It probably started with [Joshua] Cribbs and the coverage teams. Shutting down Josh Cribbs, that’s a monumental feat, really, right now in this league. They’ve got a bunch of good special teams players, so I think the credit goes to those guys and to Jerry [Rosburg] and the work they put in. Offensively, we spread it around a little bit and threw it early. We were physical when we needed to be. I thought Joe [Flacco] did a great job of managing the things we had to manage, getting us in the right plays. We blocked well. That’s another week that we blocked well. We’re getting better in that way. Defensively, there are too many things to talk about, really. The turnovers obviously were a huge part of it. I thought we tackled well. When you tackle well and you run to the ball, sometimes they had a couple of nice things schemed up. I remember Haloti [Ngata] came out of the line one time and got a screen from behind. Jarret Johnson tripped up a screen one time out in the open field. Those are just a couple of examples of plays that are really, really special plays that are effort plays and just good fundamental football plays. That’s what we saw on the tape, but we’ve got a lot of things we need to get better at.”

Along with the excitement you’ve created with this team, are you starting to feel that it is time to explain to fans that they have to redefine what the phrase Ravens football is all about? “Hmmm, you got me. It sounds like a good piece that you’re going to be writing. It’s going to be interesting to read. I have no idea where you’re going with it. It’s a great point. That’s a big picture thing. And that’s something that would take some thought. I’m just not going to [say anything]. I don’t have the time to go there. We’re just trying to be the best team we can be right now at this time. And we’ve got good players to build around. We’ve got really good coaches that understand what our players are capable of doing, and we understand what type of team we want to be. So, if that’s redefining from the last 10 years, it’s probably true. But it’s not something that we’re thinking about too much.”

Has RB Willis McGahee’s role been redefined this year or is it just a role that is more suited to him? “The role is whatever you carve out as a player. You carve out your role by what you do every day in practice and what you show the coaches that you’re capable of doing at a really high level. Willis has done a good job of that this year. He practiced well throughout training camp. He’s doing so many things well that you’re not opposed to having him in there, [whether it’s] pass protection, running the ball – obviously running the ball near the goal line. All the things you’d ask a running back to do right now, he’s doing well. So we’re for having him there to do all those things.”

Did LB Jarret Johnson’s shoulder and TE L.J. Smith’s hamstring hold up well from the game? “It looks like guys held up OK. There will still be some things that we’re mending over the course of the week, but nothing major. We’ve got a few concussions that we are dealing with. We’re just going to see how that goes during the week. You worry about the concussions because you don’t know exactly where those are going to go.”

Are there new concussions or concussions from the previous week that you are concerned about? “New concussions. You’ll see Wednesday when the injury report comes out.”

How important has it been to have veteran C Matt Birk to help the young players on the offensive line? “Matt has tied our whole line together. Matt, in his own right, is a really good player. You saw Matt line up against Shaun Rogers yesterday, and it was a heck of a battle. Shaun got a few good shoves in there, and Matt got a few good pushes in there, and it maybe was a stalemate, which is about the best you can do against a player like that. For a center to be able to neutralize a premier nose guard in this league like Matt did, that says a lot. Those guys have been going at it for years. So in his own right, he can play, and yet he still ties the whole line together. He does a lot for Joe as far as helping Joe identify some things. He does a great job of communicating to those young guys on either side which direction they need to be going, and that’s really important for a center.”

Can you talk about the coverage the running backs had from the offensive line yesterday being able to go into the end zone for a touchdown untouched by Cleveland defenders? “John Matsko and Andy Moeller did a great job. These guys walk-through like nobody else. They are constantly [working]. Before meetings or after meetings, during breaks in practice, they’re working on assignments and techniques. So it’s really a credit to and a product of the work [they do]. They’re also talented guys, and they play really hard. But those plays are clean plays, and it’s not very often in this league you see clean plays like that. That’s a credit to the O-line.”

DE Trevor Pryce said that the Ravens’ offense is making the defense better. Is that by design? “We said from the beginning that all three phases make the other phases better. It’s the offense’s job to help the defense become great. It’s the defense’s job to help the offense become great. Special teams supports both of those areas. We had it last year. You saw it last year, when the offense was on the field finishing in the game and the defense doesn’t have to go out and defend in a two-minute situation. That’s gigantic. For us to be able to win crunch time is really the other side of the ball getting it done. Whether it’s the offense staying on the field or the defense getting a big stop and giving the offense the ball back with a chance to win the game at some point in time, we want to complement each other. And it’s not about stats. The one stat that counts is the one that says that we have more points than our opponent when the game is finished. You can say one side of the ball played great, but one side of the ball does not play great if the other side doesn’t give them a chance to do so. Last week, maybe our offense had the numbers, but our defense played really well in many situations to put the offense in position to do what they did. And that’s what team is all about.”

How refreshing was it to see the secondary play so well after the scrutiny it faced following the San Diego game? “It’s always good to see guys play well. Even San Diego, with the numbers what they were, there were a lot of good plays that were made. So you take each play and you look at it for what it is. There were a lot of good plays out there in this game, but I guarantee you there are a few plays that the secondary or the defense would like to say, ‘We could have played that one better.’ We’ll always stand on that. Our guys did a really nice job of maintaining their level of play in the face of some criticism. I can’t think of a better way to say it. They came under scrutiny a little bit because of the statistics, and maybe they felt like they had something to prove. But they’re going to have something to prove next week, too. Just like everybody is. That’s the challenge you face every week in this league.”

How rare is a player like DE Trevor Pryce, who is both an inside and rush-in type of player? “It’s rare. Trevor’s got a lot of versatility as a player. He can line up over an offensive guard. He can line up with a tackle. He can line up over tight end and be equally effective in the run and the pass. Trevor’s done a great job against the run. We know Trevor can rush the passer, and he had tremendous pressure in this game, especially off the edge. But he was good inside against the run, too. He was pushing and knocking back defensive [players]. The defensive line was knocking the offensive line back, and he had a big part of that. He’s a pretty well-rounded player, especially for a guy who’s been around for as long as he has.”



What goes through your mind at the end of a lopsided game knowing that you have to greet the other coach afterwards? “Coaches in this league do a great job. I’ve known Eric [Mangini] for a long time, along with a lot of guys on that staff. But it’s a competitive league, and those guys are trying to do everything they can to win, and we’re trying to do everything we can to win. When it’s all said and done, you respect the effort that their coach and their team put in. Really, that’s all you can acknowledge. It’s, ‘Good luck next week and good game.’ We had a conversation before the game about different things. He shared some thoughts, and you try to share some thoughts back. But that’s more friend-to-friend than it is opponent-to-opponent. Afterwards, there’s not really much to say. You’re both moving on to your team.”

Players talk about matching up with other good players, but as a coach, how does it feel to be facing a coach like Bill Belichick who has won three Super Bowls? “The good thing about this game is that the coaches won’t be lining up and teeing off on each other during this game. I don’t think anybody would pay to see that right now. I’d like to say that I think I’d have the edge, though. In a hamburger drill, I think I’d have the edge. Coach may not think that. We’ve got great respect, obviously, for everything that’s been accomplished up there by their coaches and their team. There’s no more competitive group to go against than those guys. They’re edgy and they’re battlers, and so are we. So, it’s going to be a great matchup.”

Are you glad that the two toughest places to play on the road, San Diego and Foxborough, are early in the schedule this year? “I don’t know. I haven’t thought about it. It’s exciting to go play in places like that. That’s what this league is all about. Whether it’s going late in the year to Tennessee in the playoffs or Pittsburgh or wherever it is, that’s exciting. You can’t wait to go play in Gillette Stadium. You just can’t wait. We’re excited about it, the same as we were excited about San Diego. Like we’ve said, the buses will pull in right on time, and we’ll be there and we’ll be ready to play.”

We all know Brendon Ayanbadejo’s reputation as a special teams ace, but what is he bringing to the table as a linebacker? “That’s a great question. Brendon has been, obviously, one of the dominant special teams players in the league for the last six or seven years. Now he’s becoming a real asset, defensively, to us. He’s basically on the field for all of our sub-packages. Our passing situations, when people put three wide receivers on the field, he’s out there. He matches up because of his speed. He’s playing all of the packages well. He’s got the complete array of calls. He knows them all, and he’s played really well. He got the interception in this last game. He just plays really fast. He told me something last week that kind of bothered me. He told me that playing special teams is really great, but playing defense is better. I didn’t appreciate that too much. *(laughter)* But, he’s having a ball. He’s a football player. He loves to play. It’s not too often that you’ll find a really good special teams player, when he gets his chance on defense or offense, that doesn’t play well.”

With the preseason, which obviously doesn’t count, you have won seven games in a row. Are you happy with that momentum going into New England? “Winning is always good. We’d rather win and correct and try to get better than lose and try to get better. But it doesn’t really change. Whether you win or lose, you come out of the game... You play the game as well as you can, one play to the next, and then you basically look up and see what the score is, because if you’re watching the score throughout the whole game, I think you’re taking your focus [off] what’s important, and that’s playing this play. That’s how you have the impact, the most positive impact you can have, on a game in terms of win or loss, is not thinking about winning or losing. But it’s a lot more fun to win. We’re happy with the fact that we’ve won every game so far. We say we expect to win every game. We’re playing a game, and we expect to win it. But how do you win it? You play every play as well as you can.”

Was it good to get TE L.J. Smith back in the mix? “Yeah, he’s wanted to play, and he’s worked hard to do it. When he came off after catching that pass, a few guys were checking out his hamstring to make sure he was all right *(laughter)* – having fun with him because that’s how we do it – have a thick skin. He laughed, but it’s good to have him back. He’s a guy that can be a force for us. He can play as a wide receiver. He can play as a tight end. He’s a really versatile guy and can play special teams. He’s going to be important for us.”

Is there a conversation about not letting other teams take advantage of you, but not putting your team in a bad situation? “That’s a great point. You channel your emotions in a way that benefits the team. There’s a way to physically get after an opponent the right way. Our guys have done a great job of that this year. I think we have. A lot of people have been frustrated by the fact that our guys have done that and they retaliated, and they’ve gotten flagged so far this year. That’s not something we ever want to do. Sometimes it happens, but we’d prefer that those fouls get called on the opponent than on us, if we had our choice.”

How has rookie LB/DE Paul Kruger been doing on special teams? “Paul has been practicing with special teams from the day he got here, just like he’s practicing with defense. He’s doing a good job. He works really hard. At some point in time, he’s going to be really important to us. He’s going to be up and active and playing in a game. Until that time, he’s important to us for what he’s doing in practice. Paul has a great future. He works really hard at it, and he’s a good football player.”

Is there a certain mentality you have to have to play on the road? “That’s a good question. It seems like that gets asked every time we play a road game. I don’t have a profound answer for you other than the fact that you go in there and you don’t worry about any of that stuff. The idea is to play the way we play. There’s nothing better than all of the sudden the crowd is up, and they’re [cheering] with their hands up, and you see them standing up. Then all of the sudden, we do something and it all stops and goes silent. There’s nothing better than a stadium that’s three-quarters empty at the start of the fourth quarter. Those are the things that you try to get accomplished. But how you do that, I think you focus back in on yourself, pulling out the very best play you can at this time, from one play to the next, and then see what happens.”

After a game, does it feel like everything went in warp speed? “Yes it does. You kind of take a breath and say, ‘Ok, what just happened?’ That’s why the press conference is so tough after the game because you’re not sure what happened. That’s why I watch those [TV] shows at night to figure out what actually did happen.” *(laughter)*

Do you have a favorite show? “Am I allowed to say? *(laughter)* I don’t want to get in trouble.”

At 27-3, is it easy to decide when to call it off and go to your bench players? “I think I know where you’re going with the question. You can always have that discussion about when should you do that. I think back to that Houston vs. Buffalo... Was it Houston and Buffalo way back when? I guarantee you when you’re a coach standing on the sideline, that goes through your mind. Joe went out there for the one play that series and threw a touchdown pass. Then it’s 34 [points] and you feel a little better about it. We’re not afraid to put anybody out there. Troy Smith can go out there and win for us. All of our guys can. At the same time, I’ve got Ray [Lewis] on the sideline when we took him out,



and he's telling me he doesn't want to be out. He wants to be out there playing. So, guys want to play, and you can't always be thinking... We don't have enough players. It's not like college where we've got 80 guys and we can put the whole 'twos' in there and keep the 'ones' safe from injury. You just have a certain number of players, and guys are going to be out there playing anyway. You try to be smart with guys who have injuries and things like that, and do the best you can with it."

Are you comfortable with QB Joe Flacco being compared to Patriots QB Tom Brady this week? "I couldn't care less. Someone can write an article, and it's interesting to read, but it doesn't have anything to do with us. So we don't care. We probably won't read it. It doesn't matter."

How much of QB Joe Flacco's numbers are system-related, or is it just him taking another large step this year? "You want to go from last year to this year basically. If we're playing better in some facet of the game, it's because everything has gotten better related to that aspect of the game. So, if you want to talk about the passing game, Joe – everything he's done between last year and this year – through the offseason, through training camp, has helped make him that better. But it's not just Joe; it's the offensive line, it's the receivers, it's the tight ends, it's the scheme. Maybe we've cleaned up a couple things protection-wise or route-wise and made them better through offseason study. It's the defense putting us in a position where we feel like we can go ahead and throw the ball a little bit and do some things better than we did last year. So, you can never say it's one thing, because there is no way to know what value each thing has. But, everything together is combined to make us a little better in that area."

Where has Flacco taken the biggest step from last year? "I think he sees things better. He's quicker with the ball versus pressure. He's got a better understanding of how it all ties together with the protection and the routes. He knows how to get guys lined up. I mean, there are a thousand things that Joe does better than he did a year ago. And they are all little things, and it's incremental, how much better he does. But there are a lot of things, when you watch the tape. Cam [Cameron] and Hue [Jackson] are the quarterback experts. So, we'll watch the tape [and say], 'He's got to do this better with his release, he's got to do this better with his cadence, he's got to do this better with his recognition,' and those are things he'll work on this week. So, it's just kind of pushing... Hopefully, every single day we get a little bit better in everything we do and become a better team. And that's what our guys talk about every day. How can each guy get a little bit better to make us a better team?"

Do you admire the Patriots having the success they have even with a lot of personnel turnover? "Yeah, you've got to admire everything about what the Patriots have done and what Bill Belichick has done there, and really, the whole organization. They've got tremendous coaches. Scott O'Brien on special teams, Dean Pees on defense, I mean their whole staff is just top notch. So, they've been able to have success and sustain it for a long number of years, and we'll keep trying to make that not happen for them, at least when we play them. That's the competitiveness of the NFL. But we respect them, and we're excited to play them."

But with the changing faces they still manage to stay very consistent... "Right. Well, that's the nature of the NFL. You look at the teams that have done that: I think the Eagles are another example of that. The Giants have become an example of that. Nobody to the extent that the Patriots have done it, for sure, and that's something we aspire to. So, that's the idea."

What is your opinion of the defense pitching the ball around a lot after making an interception? "I like it when it gets pitched into our hands and it's not on the ground, and we're moving the ball down the field. When it's not, then I'm not too happy about it. I know that's maybe ducking for cover, but it's like anything else. You can't just play the game scared. You've got to be willing to attack people. And when we get an interception, our idea is to score. That's our first thought. Not at the expense of losing possession of the ball, so guys have to make good decisions. Now, we may have certain guys that are allowed to pitch it and certain guys that aren't, certain guys you're allowed to pitch to and certain guys you aren't. Guys earn the right to make those kinds of decisions. And Dawan [Landry] is definitely one of those guys, as would be Ed [Reed] and Ray [Lewis] and some of those other guys. Good football players should be able to make wise decisions in the heat of battle. And we count on our guys to do that, and we trust them to do that. If they stop doing that, then they lose a little bit of leeway."

You're at the half-way point of getting CB Samari Rolle back, who is on the PUP list. Are you optimistic that Week 6 he'll be able to possibly join the team? "That's a good question. We haven't had a conversation about that for a few weeks, with the medical staff. I don't have any new information on that. It's something we need to find out."

Is CB/RS Chris Carr's running style on bringing back kicks cautious to hold onto the ball, or is that just his style? It seems like he just doesn't bust loose. I hear people say that on the street. How are you impressed by how he runs? "I hope he's cautious to hold onto the ball. That's the No. 1 idea, is to protect the football. But, we want it to be aggressive ball security. We want guys to hit it north and south. We're looking to get the return game sprung. We need to block as well as we can. It's going to happen. We're getting better all the time. I'd love to be standing up here with a bunch of big returns under our belt and be bragging about it, but we haven't been able to do that yet. So yeah, Chris is responsible for that, but all the guys blocking, all the guys coaching, we're all a part of that. We've got to get that done."

So, is special teams coaching and all the learning and technique that goes into it, similar to trying to put an offensive line together and it just takes time for it to mesh? "The thing about special teams that's a little different is that it's so diverse. You look at... Basically, there are six phases. You've got 66 starting positions. Offensive line, you've got five. Maybe six, or maybe seven in Cam's offense. You never know. But, there are 66 positions on special teams. So, there are a couple of phases that could be doing very well, and a phase or two that's struggling, and we're like, 'Special teams is struggling.' I think we've been solid in our return game, but we haven't busted anything yet, and we want to bust some stuff. Our coverage has been really excellent, but we gave up one against San Diego. Whenever you have some lapse somewhere, it's like, 'Special teams is struggling.' I think we know enough to understand that's not the case. I think our special teams have played well, and they've been very aggressive, and they've played really hard. As far as making those plays, those turnovers, those game-busting plays, we haven't seen that yet, and we need to see that. Nobody wants to see it more than those guys out there playing. But we don't want to start chasing that at the expense of playing good, fundamental football. You've got to let those plays happen when they happen."
