NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (4-2) at TAMPA BAY BUCCANEERS (0-6)

Sunday, Oct. 25, 2009 ★ Wembley Stadium (84,000) ★ 1:00 p.m. EDT

The NFL's International Series of regular-season games returns to the United Kingdom this Sunday when Tampa Bay hosts New England. The contest will mark the third consecutive year of an NFL regular-season game at London's Wembley Stadium. On October 26, 2008 the New Orleans Saints defeated the San Diego Chargers 37-32 before a crowd of 83,226. The International Series began on October 28, 2007 when the New York Giants defeated the Miami Dolphins, 13-10.



Said Patriots Chairman and CEO Robert Kraft, "We are proud to be selected by the NFL to be featured in this year's international game. I am sure our trip to the United Kingdom will prove to be an unforgettable experience for our players and coaches, as well as the many fans that will travel to the game. I know that the UK is home to some of our most passionate Patriots fans and we look forward to the experience."

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast to a regional audience by CBS and can be seen in Boston on **WBZ-TV Channel 4**. **Jim Nantz** will handle play-by-play duties with **Phil Simms** providing color.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience by **Westwood One**. **Kevin Kugler** and **Mark Malone** will call the game. **Scott Graham** will host the pregame and halftime shows.

RADIO: 98.5 FM, The Sports Hub, is the flagship station for the **Patriots Radio Network**. A complete listing of the network's 36 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 33rd season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 26th season as a tandem.

NFL INTERNATIONAL SERIES QUICK FACTS

The Patriots-Buccaneers game will be the fifth regular-season game played outside of the US. The first was in Mexico City in 2005 when the Cardinals hosted the 49ers. The NFL played games in London in 2007 (Giants-Dolphins) and 2008 (Chargers-Saints). Last season Buffalo hosted Miami in a game played in Toronto.

This week's game will be the third regular-season game played outside of North America and the 12th game in London overall. There have been nine NFL preseason games played in London. The first preseason game ever played in London was a 1983 preseason game between Minnesota and the St. Louis Cardinals. There have been eight games played in London as part of the NFL's American Bowl preseason contests, which began in 1986.

The Patriots have traveled internationally for three preseason games:

- The Patriots lost to Pittsburgh, 30-14, in Montreal in 1990
- The Patriots lost to Cleveland, 12-9, in Toronto in 1993
- The Patriots defeated Dallas, 21-3, in Mexico City in 1998

AFL LEGACY GAMES

This season marks the 50th anniversary for the American Football League (AFL), of which the Patriots were an original member. The Boston Patriots, who hosted the AFL's first regular season game on Sept. 9, 1960 at Boston University Field, were featured in the NFL's first "AFL Legacy Game" on the opening weekend of the 2009 season on Sept. 14, 2009, when the Patriots hosted the Buffalo Bills at Gillette Stadium on Monday Night Football. It was the first of four "AFL Legacy Games" in which the Patriots will appear this season (at Den, vs. Ten and at Mia). The Patriots will wear red and white "throwback" uniforms in those games, replicating the uniforms worn by the 1963 team that claimed the franchise's first division title and competed in the franchise's first league championship game. Patriots coaches will also wear apparel featuring the Pat Patriot logo.

GAMEDAY PROGRAM DESIGN

The original "Pat Patriot" was born in 1960 when newspaper cartoonist Phil Bissell was assigned to sketch a reaction upon the announcement that Boston's American Football League team would be called the Patriots. From his original "Pat" cartoon, Bissell became forever linked with the franchise that wore a copy based off of his original figure on its helmets from 1961 to 1992. Bissell, a resident of Rockport, Mass., also contributed stylized "Pat Patriot" cartoons to the covers of over 50 Patriots game programs throughout the team's AFL seasons from 1960-69. In recognition of the Patriots 50th anniversary, Bissell has been commissioned to create the covers of this season's *Patriots GameDay* magazines in the same style of those early covers.



50TH ANNIVERSARY AFL EXHIBIT

The Hall at Patriot Place presented by Raytheon is a monument to 50 years of Patriots history. In recognition of both the Patriots' 50th anniversary and the 50th anniversary of the AFL, The Hall is featuring a special exhibit throughout the 2009 season of game-worn jerseys, helmets and other memorabilia from the AFL era. PATRIOTS VS. BUCCANEERS

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Buccaneers will meet this week for the first time since the 2005 season when New England shutout the Buccaneers 28-0 in a home victory.

Head coach Bill Belichick's first game as head coach of the Patriots came against Tampa Bay on Sept. 3, 2000. Tampa Bay claimed a 21-16 victory in that game, but the Patriots have won four of the six total games in the series, which dates back



to 1976, the first year of existence for the Buccaneers franchise. New England won the first three games in the series from 1976-88. Tampa Bay claimed the next two meetings, before the Patriots shutout victory in the last meeting between the two teams in 2005.

The Patriots beat the Buccaneers in 1988 and then went 17 years before their next

win against the Buccaneers in 2005.

The 17-year victory gap is the second longest for the Patriots, trailing only a 33-year win drought against the Washington Redskins.

PATRIOTS VS. THE NFC

The Patriots have been successful against NFC teams in recent seasons, compiling a 29-4 (.879) regular-season record in the conference since 2001. Including the post-season, the Patriots are 32-5 (.865) against the NFC with a 3-1 Super Bowl record since 2001. During that time span, the Patriots have finished 4-0 against the NFC four times, including the last three seasons (2006-08). The Patriots have won 16 consecutive games against the NFC with the last loss coming in Week 2 of the 2005 season when Carolina beat the Patriots, 27-17 (9/18/05).

The Patriots are 1-0 so far in 2009 against the NFC following a 26-10 win over Atlanta on Sept. 27 at Gillette stadium.

PATRIOTS VS. NFC SOUTH

The Patriots play each of the teams from the NFC South this season as part of the NFL's schedule rotation that was implemented in 2002. New England lost its first game against the division, dropping a 27-17 decision at Carolina in Week Two in 2005. Following that loss, the Patriots have not lost to an NFC team. The Patriots hold an all-time mark of 20-13 (including postseason) against the four teams that make up the NFC South.

BRADY VS. TAMPA BAY

Tom Brady is 1-0 against Tampa Bay. In his only meeting against Tampa Bay (12/17/05), Brady led his team to a 28-0 victory by completing 20-of-31 pass attempts for 258 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions for a QB rating of 112.8.

Brady owns a 25-4 record against NFC opponents in the regular-season.

Tampa Bay came into the game with a 9-4 record, but the Patriots jumped out to a 7-0 lead on their first possession of the game and never looked back. With the victory, New England clinched its third consecutive AFC East title, winning its division for the fourth time in the last five years and for the sixth time in the 12 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994.

New England's defense controlled the game, recording seven sacks of Bucs signal caller Chris Simms while holding Tampa to just 30 total rushing yards. The Patriots did not allow the Bucs to penetrate deeper than New England's 33-yard line as they never mounted a serious scoring chance.

LAST MEETING: (continued)

On offense, Tom Brady threw for three touchdowns and compiled a 122.8 passer rating, completing 20 of 31 passes for 258 yards. David Givens led New England's receiving corps with a career-high 137 yards on six catches, including a touchdown, while Corey Dillon scored a rushing touchdown and also added a receiving score.

The Patriots produced their most complete game of the season, recording a 28-0 shutout over the Buccaneers in Foxborough.

THIS WEEK IN PATRIOTS HISTORY

October 21-26

Oct. 22, 1961-Larry Garron tore off the longest run from scrimmage in team history, scampering 85 yards for a touchdown as the Boston Patriots won at Buffalo, 52-21. The Patriots' 52 points that day stand as the third highest total in team history.

Oct. 25, 1984 - Hall of Fame receiver Raymond Berry is named the head coach of the Patriots, replacing Ron Meyer. Berry, a former Patriots assistant coach, became the team's ninth head coach.

Oct. 24, 2004 -The Patriots defeat the New York Jets 13-7 at Gillette Stadium, recording their 21st consecutive overall victory – a mark that stands as the all-time pro football record including regular-season and playoff games. New England lost its next game, ending the streak.

Oct. 21, 2007-Tom Brady throws a franchise-record six touchdown passes in a 49-28 win over the Dolphins. His 158.3 passer rating in the game is the first perfect rating in Patriots history.

INFREQUENT FOES

The Patriots and Buccaneers have met just six times in regular-season play. The Patriots' six games against Tampa Bay are the fewest against any team that entered the league prior to the most recent era of expansion, which began with the entry of Jacksonville and Carolina to the NFL in 1995.

The New England Patriots set team records for points in a game (59) and total net yards (619) in a 59-0 victory against the Tennessee Titans in snowy conditions at Gillette Stadium. The Patriots 59-point victory ties the largest margin of victory by any team since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, equaling the L.A. Rams' 59-point win over Atlanta on Dec. 4, 1976 (59-0).

QB Tom Brady completed 29-of-34 pass attempts for 380 yards with six touchdown passes, wide receivers Wes Welker (10-150-2 TDs) and Randy Moss (8-129-3 TDs) both went over 100 yards receiving, and RB Laurence Maroney added 123 yards rushing on the ground.

Brady had 345 yards passing in the first half alone, and set an NFL record with five touchdown passes in the second quarter. New England built a 45-0 halftime lead, the largest halftime lead in NFL history.

On defense, New England forced five turnovers and limited Tennessee to nine first downs and minus-seven yards passing. Tennessee is the first team since the merger to finish a game with negative passing yards. The Titans had two completions in the entire game, one for 15 yards and one for negative 22 yards.

New England led 10-0 in the first quarter behind a 45-yard touchdown run by Maroney and a 33-yard field goal by PK Stephen Gostkowski. Then, Brady had a historic second quarter with five touchdown passes. He had touchdown passes of 40 and 28 yards to Moss, 38 yards to Kevin Faulk and 30 and five yards to Welker.

New England forced three turnovers on Tennessee's first three drives in the second quarter and converted the turnovers into touchdowns for a 31-0 lead. The Patriots added two more touchdowns in the final five minutes of the half for a 45-0 halftime lead.

Brady opened the second half with a nine-play, 65-yard drive that ended with his sixth touchdown pass, a nine-yard touchdown to Moss for a 52-0 lead. Brady was replaced by backup QB Brian Hoyer on the next series. Hoyer completed his first five passes on a drive that ended with a one-yard touchdown run by Hoyer for a 59-0 lead.

The Patriots improved to 11-0 all-time in games in Foxborough in the snow and 10-0 in snow under Belichick.

NEW ENGLAND SETS RECORD WITH 59 POINTS

The Patriots' 59 points against the Titans set a new team record. The previous team best was 56 points scored at Buffalo on Nov. 18, 2007 (56-10) and against the N.Y. Jets on Sept. 9, 1979 (56-3). New England has now scored 50 or more points eight times in team history, including three times since Bill Belichick became coach of the Patriots in 2000.

7TH SHUTOUT IN BELICHICK ERA

The Patriots shut out Tennessee, recording their first shutout of the season and their first since downing the Buffalo Bills 13-0 in the 2008 season finale. The shutout was the seventh for the Patriots since Bill Belichick became head coach in 2000. New England had three shutouts in 2003, one in 2005, one in 2006 and one in 2008.

45-0 HALFTIME LEAD IS LARGEST EVER

New England's 45-0 halftime lead against the Titans was the largest halftime lead in NFL history. The previous largest halftime lead was 42 points, when Green Bay held a 49-7 lead vs. Tampa Bay on October 2, 1983.

PATRIOTS SCORE 45 IN FIRST HALF

The Patriots' 45 first half points are the most points in any half in franchise history. The previous best was 42 points in the first half at Miami on October 21, 2007. The 45-0 halftime margin is the largest in team history, besting the 42-7 halftime lead at Miami on October 21, 2007.

35-POINT SECOND QUARTER

The Patriots' 35 second quarter points are the most points that the Patriots have scored in a single quarter in team history, besting the 28 points the team scored in the second quarter at Miami on October 21, 2007.

BRADY GOES OVER 300 IN FIRST HALF

Tom Brady had 345 yards passing in the first half, setting a Patriots record for most passing yards in a half. His previous best was when he had 291 yards passing in the first half at Miami on October 21, 2007. Brady finished the game with 380 yards passing and now has 25 career 300-yard passing games. His 300-yard game total is second in New England history to Drew Bledsoe, who has 26 300-yard games. It was the second 300 yard game of the 2009 season for Brady. He passed for 378 yards in the season-opener vs. Buffalo (9/14).

BRADY THROWS FIVE TDS IN 2ND QT

Tom Brady's five touchdowns in the second quarter are the highest in a single quarter in NFL history. His five touchdowns tie the most in Brady's career in a single half. Brady also had five touchdowns in the first half at Miami on Oct. 21, 2007.

BRADY THROWS FOR SIX TOUCHDOWNS

Tom Brady tied a career high with six touchdown passes. He also had six scoring passes on October 21, 2007 at Miami. Brady has thrown for five touchdowns in a game two times and has had four touchdowns in a game seven times.

MARONEY GOES OVER 100 YARDS

Laurence Maroney registered his fifth career regular-season 100-yard game after finishing with 123 yards rushing. It is the second 100-yard game of the 2009 season for New England. Fred Taylor had a 105-yard rushing performance vs. Atlanta (9/27).

MARONEY SCORES ON A 45-TD RUN

RB Laurence Maroney's 45-yard touchdown run in the first quarter was the third longest run of his career. He had a career-best 59-yard touchdown run and a 51-yard run vs. Miami (12/23/07). It is the longest Patriots run since Lamont Jordan had a 49-yard touchdown at Oakland on December 14, 2008.

WELKER GOES OVER 100 YARDS

Wes Welker registered his first 100-yard receiving game of the 2009 season (the ninth 100-yard performance of his NFL career), finishing the game with 10 catches for 150 yards. Welker has had six or more receptions in 18 of his last 20 regular-season games.

PATS DEFENSE HOLDS TITANS TO -7 PASSING

The New England defense became the first to hold a team to negative passing yards since the merger. Tennessee completed just two pass attempts for negative seven yards.

ROBERT KRAFT NEWS & NOTES

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In 15 seasons of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won eight division titles, five conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships. The Patriots have made five Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than three berths.

SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season-ticket base stands at a capped total of 61,759 and more than 50,000 fans are on a waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 165 consecutive home games (dating back to the 1994 regular-season opener).

SUCCESS STORY

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have been one of the NFL's elite franchises. Over the first 15-plus years of Kraft's ownership, the Patriots own the NFL's highest winning percentage and have won more Super Bowl titles, more conference championships and more playoff games than any other NFL team.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. Belichick spent 20 years as an assistant coach in the NFL and this is his 15th season as a head coach. According to the Elias Sports Bureau he is the only man in NFL history to serve 20 or more seasons as an assistant coach and at least 15 seasons as a head coach. Over a 100-game span from 2003-08, Belichick directed the team to an 82-18 record, marking the best 100-game span for any team in NFL history. In the 2007 season, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in the NFL's 88-year history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. He has led the Patriots to the Super Bowl four times in the last eight seasons and has produced six division championships in the last eight seasons, including five straight from 2003-07. Belichick's Patriots teams own the all-time NFL records for consecutive total victories (21 from 2003-04), consecutive regular-season victories (21 from 2006-08) and consecutive playoff victories (10 from 2001-05). Belichick owns the second best postseason record in NFL history (15-4) and is the winningest NFL head coach since 2001 (115-36). From 2003-04, he directed the Patriots to back-to-back Super Bowl titles while posting consecutive 17-win campaigns. Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of five Super Bowl championship teams. His overall record of 120-47 with the Patriots gives him the most victories and the best winning percentage of any head coach in franchise history.

ELITE COMPANY

Bill Belichick is one of nine NFL head coaches to win three or more championships since the league began postseason play in 1933. With the Patriots' victory in Super Bowl XXXIX, Belichick joined an exclusive club in which each of the eight other members has been enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

BELICHICK WINS 100th REGULAR-SEASON GAME WITH PATRIOTS

The Patriots' victory over Oakland on Dec. 14, 2008 was Bill Belichick's 100th regular-season victory as Patriots head coach. His 100th victory came in his 142nd regular-season game as head coach, and only three NFL coaches have won their 100th game with a team in fewer tries – Oakland's John Madden (136 games), Miami's Don Shula (137) and Cleveland's Paul Brown (138).

Coach Belichick has recorded 157 career wins and is one of 17 coaches in NFL history to win 150 or more games. Belichick owns a career winning percentage of .630, which is tied with Curly Lambeau (.630) for third, behind Don Shula (.666) and George Halas (.682).

WELKER NAMED TO PRO BOWL SQUAD

Wes Welker was named to his first career Pro Bowl after the 2008 season and is the fifth Patriots wide receiver to earn Pro Bowl honors since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, joining Randy Moss (2007), Troy Brown (2001), Terry Glenn (1999) and Stanley Morgan (1979-80 and 1986-87). 100-catch seasons and is the first player to achieve the feat with the Patriots.

WELKER'S ROUTE TO THE NFL

Despite being named the Oklahoma football player of the year by both the *USA Today* and the *Daily Oklahoman*, Wes Welker's only scholarship offer came from Texas Tech, and only after a player that committed to Texas Tech backed out.

"I was thinking I'd get a scholarship somewhere," Welker said. "When it didn't happen when it was supposed to I was pretty hurt by it."

Welker had an impressive collegiate career, accumulating 259 receptions and eight punts returned for touchdowns. He even won a national award as the best special teams player in the country. Despite those accolades, he was passed over in the 2004 NFL draft and signed with San Diego as a free agent. He made the team, then was cut after the first game.

He signed with Miami soon after and was used just on special teams. He caught New England's eye with a 71-yard punt return on Monday Night Football in a game against the Patriots. He was acquired by the Patriots in a trade with Miami in 2007.

MEMBER OF 2000/2000 CLUB FOR THE 2000s

Kevin Faulk is one of just 13 NFL players this decade to total at least 2,000 rushing yards and at least 2,000 receiving yards, and is one of only six players to have at least 2,000 rushing yards and at least 3,000 receiving yards. Faulk has totaled 3,018 rushing yards and 3,358 receiving yards since 2000, joining an exclusive list of elite players who have achieved the feat. Faulk is one of just seven players who reached the milestone with just one team. In the 1990s, there were 13 players who achieved the 2000/2000 milestone; 22 players did it in the 1980s; nine players achieved the feat in the 1970s.

PATRIOTS ELECT FIVE SEASON CAPTAINS

The New England Patriots announced their 2009 captains prior to the start of the regular-season. Quarterback Tom Brady and WR Randy Moss will serve as offensive captains. Nose tackle Vince Wilfork and LB Jerod Mayo will serve as defensive captains. Wide receiver Sam Aiken will serve as special teams captain. The Patriots' 2009 captains were elected by their teammates.

On offense, Brady will serve as an offensive captain for the eighth straight season, having first been elected in 2002. Moss, in his third season with the Patriots after joining the team via trade in April 2007, will serve as a Patriots captain for the second straight season.

On defense, Wilfork is a captain for the second straight season, while Mayo will serve as a captain for the first time. He joined the Patriots as a first-round pick in 2008 and earned the AP Defensive Rookie of the Year award.

Aiken will serve as the Patriots' special teams captain for the first time. A special teams standout, Aiken has accumulated 71 special teams tackles during his six NFL seasons, entering the 2009 season.

"He's smart, well prepared," Bill Belichick said. "He understands. He's got a real good understanding of football. Not just his role but where other people have to be. That's what you really want in a defensive signal-caller, someone that understands how it all works."

"It's been a long road," Guyton said. "I have come far. I've achieved some things here. I'm happy. I'm enjoying it. But I don't look back as much, just always forward."

MATT LIGHT AND HIS FOUNDATION

The Light Foundation, a nonprofit founded in 2001 by Matt Light, held its signature fundraising event on Tuesday, September 29 at Addieville East Farm in Mapleville, RI.

The Shoot-Out, now in its 5th year, offers participants the opportunity to match their shooting skills against Light, his teammates, and a host of local and national celebrities. Proceeds from the one-of-a-kind event benefit the Light Foundation, a youth-based organization that strives to install honesty, accountability and responsibility in young people through unique outdoor learning experiences that include a character development football camp, a financial literacy program offered at area schools and academic scholarships. In the eight years since the organization was founded, it has raised over \$1.2 million to support these programs.

Light says he wanted to develop a unique high-profile charity event that would raise funds and exposure for his foundation, and his love of the outdoors naturally came into play.



DOMINATING DEFENSE

The Patriots posted its seventh shutout in the Belichick era with the 59-0 win over Tennessee. New England had 3 shutouts in 2003, one in 2005, 2006 and 2008. The 2009 Patriots defense has not allowed more than 20 points in game so far in 2009. (Buffalo and Baltimore scored on defensive touchdowns)

PATRIOTS FORCE TURNOVERS

The second-year promising young talent was born in 1985, when another Slater in The City of Angels was named to his second of seven Pro Bowls. Matthew's father, Jackie Slater, a Hall of Fame offensive tackle, spent his entire career with the Rams organization in LA. LIKE FATHER LIKE SON, PART 2

CB Shawn Springs has always been a speedster. No doubt, the gift of fast feet was a hereditary gift from his father, Ron Springs, an 8-year NFL running back for the Dallas Cowboys and Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Ron, who tallied over 2500 rushing and 2200 receiving yards in his career, became ill in 1990 with type 2 Diabetes. By 2004, Shawn was a respected NFL veteran, but he was willing to give up his career and offered to donate his kidney to his father, who needed a transplant. Ron declined, saying in a 2005 *Washington Post* article, "I think that was a tremendous gesture, and it just justifies the fact that he's a loving son. But I couldn't have let him do that, because I always prayed and wanted him to be a professional athlete, so I would not have shortened his career by no means necessary."

MOSS ON PACE FOR 1,000 YARDS

Randy Moss has recorded a 1,000-yard receiving season nine times in his 11-year career. Moss can join Jerry Rice (14) as the only players in NFL history with 10 seasons with 1,000 receiving yards with a 1,000 yard season in 2009. Moss currently has 496 receiving yards, which puts him on pace for 1,323 receiving yards.

BRADY ON PACE FOR 4,516 PASSING YARDS

Tom Brady currently has 1,724 passing yards through six games, putting him on pace for 4,597 passing yards. That mark would tie Drew Bledsoe for seven seasons of 3,000 or more yards and give Brady his third season with over 4,000 passing yards. Bledsoe and Brady are tied with two 4,000 yard seasons.

BRADY WAS THERE FOR "THE CATCH"

In the 2003 AFC Divisional Playoff Game against Tennessee on January 10, 2004, QB Tom Brady threw for 201 yards and one touchdown, leading the Patriots to a narrow 17-14 victory en route to their second Super Bowl. That wasn't the first time Brady has seen a major playoff game come down to the wire on a game played on January 10. A native of the Bay area, Brady was at Candlestick Park for the 1982 NFC Championship game between the 49ers and Cowboys, as a four-year-old fan, witnessing Dwight Clark's "The Catch" from Joe Montana. According to Gary Myers' book *The Catch*, Brady wept after the play. Said Brady, "Not because I was happy or excited, but because everybody stood up and I couldn't see!" While Brady has been recognized for his stellar credentials, he said Montana, "was and will always be the greatest quarterback ever to play."

SANDERS EARNED HIS REPUTATION AS A HARD WORKER

James Sanders has earned the reputation as one of the Patriots' hardest workers. Said Bill Belichick on Sanders, "I think he's very professional. You would like to have 53 players like James on your team in terms of his work ethic, his toughness, and being a teammate. He's a high-character player."

BRANDON MCGOWAN IS A WELCOMED ADDITION

Brandon McGowan puts literally everything he has into making big tackles. Said McGowan, "I don't really care about my body and I'll expose my body to some messed-up positions to make a play." And expose he has; McGowan has fought his way back from three season-ending injuries in four years in Chicago. The University of Maine standout, who is one of three active players (Stephen Cooper, SD; Lofa Tatupu, SEA) to come out of the Football Championship Subdivision school, signed with the Patriots in May and forced a game-changing fumble off of Falcons' running back Michael Turner on September 27th. He also recovered a fumble at Denver that helped position the Patriots for a field goal.

FREE AGENTS MAKE AN IMPACT

Fourteen players on the New England 53-man roster entered the NFL as rookie free agents. Two that came to the Patriots as rookie free agents are making an impact on the defense. Mike Wright came to New England as a rookie free agent in 2005. He registered his first career two-sack game, dropping Joe Flacco twice for total losses of 17 yards vs. Baltimore (10-4). His two sacks pushed his 2009 total to 3.0, a single-season career high. Gary Guyton came to New England as a rookie free agent in 2007. He is second on the team with the team with 37 total tackles and is on pace to finished the season with 99 tackles.

Said Bill Belichick about players coming to the Patriots as a free agents, "I think Mike's similar to some of the other players that would fall into that category. Players like Gary Guyton and guys like that who weren't high picks that came in at a pretty early point — Pierre Woods, [Brian] Hoyer —came in and showed that they belonged, both physically and athletically from a football standpoint, recognizing things, reacting, kind of knowing what to do."

TOUGH AT HOME

The Patriots own an overall record of 55-12 (.821) at Gillette Stadium. Since their state-of-the-art facility opened at the beginning of the 2002 season, the Patriots own the NFL's best record at home. Now in their seventh season at Gillette Stadium, the Patriots have finished three seasons undefeated at home since the stadium opened (2003, 2004 and 2007) and own a perfect 7-0 playoff record at the venue.

STEPHEN NEAL TAKES A DIFFERENT ROUTE TO THE NFL

Guard Stephen Neal knows how to use his 6'4", 305-pound frame. He has used it to gain leverage and overpower defensive linemen since 2001. The three-time Super Bowl Champion arrived in Foxborough with two NCAA titles of his own, except the only padding he saw was on the matted floors. A championship wrestler at Cal-State Bakersfield, he compiled a 151-10 record, winning titles his junior and senior year, including a title win over NCAA wrestling and UFC heavyweight champion Brock Lesnar. In 1999, Neal won the Dan Hodge Award, known as the Heisman Trophy of wrestling.

Neal is one of only two active NFL players that did not play football in college before turning pro. The other is San Diego Chargers tight end Antonio Gates, a basketball star at Kent State. Gates led the Golden Flashes to the Elite Eight in 2002, averaging 21 points in his senior season.

PATRIOTS SET TEAM RECORD WITH 619 YARDS

The Patriots set a franchise record with 619 total net yards against Tennessee (10-18). The 619-yard performance was the fifth highest single-game total by an NFL team since the 1970 merger and was the ninth 600-yard game by an NFL team since 1970. The Patriots are the 6th team since 1990 to register 600 or more yards of total offense.

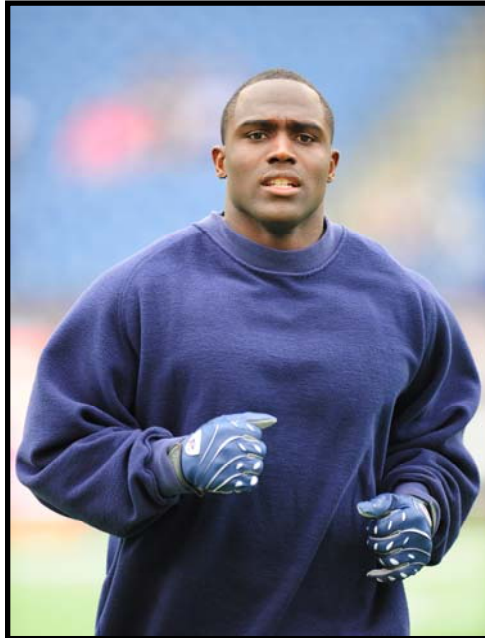
