LAST GAME RECAP

Carolina 28, Tampa Bay 21 - 10/18/09

TAMPA – Despite holding an early lead over division-rival Carolina, Tampa Bay fell short of its first win of the season as the Panthers scored the game winning touchdown with 29 seconds remaining in the game. Following a Panthers' three-and-out on the first drive of the game, Tampa Bay drove 59 yards in five plays to take a 7-0 lead on RB Carnell Williams' 20-yard touchdown run. After a Tampa Bay missed field goal at the end of the first quarter, Carolina drove 67 yards to tie the game on a RB DeAngelo Williams' 20-yard touchdown run. On the ensuing drive, QB Josh Johnson fumbled inside Buccaneers territory and Carolina recovered. Two plays later, RB Jonathan Stewart was heading toward the end zone when S Tanard Jackson forced a fumble and Tampa Bay recovered. The teams would remain tied at 7-7 until early in the third quarter. On the first play from scrimmage of the second half, Johnson was picked off by LB Thomas Davis in Tampa Bay territory. Five plays later, QB Jake Delhomme hit TE Jeff King on a one-yard touchdown pass for a 14-7 Panthers' lead. Carolina drove 60 yards in six plays on its next drive to take a two-touchdown lead on Stewart's 26-yard touchdown run. On the ensuing kickoff, rookie WR Sammie Stroughter, who was replacing the injured KR Clifton Smith, raced 97 yards for a touchdown, trimming the Panthers' lead to 21-14. The 97-yard return tied for the longest kickoff return in team history and was just the third kickoff return for a touchdown in team history. Jackson picked off a Delhomme pass and returned it 26 yards for a touchdown to tie the game at 21-21 with 8:33 left in the game. Carolina earned the victory on the ensuing possession as they ground out a 16-play, 80-yard drive that consumed 8:04 off the clock as Williams ran in from one yard out for a 28-21 lead. Tampa Bay got the ball back with 29 seconds left in the game, but could not pull off the comeback.

BUCCANEERS VS. PATRIOTS

LAST MEETING



New England 28, Tampa Bay 0 (Dec. 17, 2005)
FOXBOROUGH – In their first meeting in Foxborough since 2000, the Buccaneers were shut out for the first time since 1999 by the two-time defending Super Bowl champion New England Patriots. Tampa Bay WR Ike Hilliard led the team with five catches for 50 yards, surpassing 400 career receptions in the contest while DE Simeon Rice recorded his 10th sack of the season, marking the eighth time overall and fifth consecutive season, Rice has recorded at least 10 sacks, tying him for fifth-most in NFL history in both categories. Tampa Bay surrendered a touchdown on the opening drive of the game for the first time all season as the Patriots took a 7-0 lead on a QB Tom Brady to T Tom Ashworth one-yard touchdown pass. New England's second scoring drive in the second quarter was aided by two 15-yard penalties on the Buccaneers as the Patriots extended their lead to 14-0 on a three-yard RB Corey Dillon touchdown run. On Tampa Bay's next possession with less than two minutes remaining before halftime, Patriots LB Willie McGinest forced and recovered a QB Chris Simms fumble inside Tampa Bay territory. Three plays later, Brady found WR David Givens on a 16-yard touchdown pass with 27 seconds remaining in the half for a 21-0 lead. After a scoreless third quarter, New England pushed its lead to 28-0 early in the fourth quarter as Brady found Dillon for his third touchdown pass of the day from two yards out.

SERIES HIGHLIGHTS



After taking a 14-7 halftime advantage, the Buccaneers were outscored by the Patriots 24-0 falling 31-14 in their inaugural season (12/12/76)... Bucs took 14-0 lead before falling 32-14 to Patriots (10/27/85)... With 6:15 left in the fourth quarter, Bucs QB Steve Spurrier was intercepted by LB Sam Hunt who returned it 68 yards for a touchdown and a 21-14 Patriots lead... WR Mark Carrier caught 15-yard touchdown pass from QB Vinny Testaverde with 2:09 left sending the game into OT (12/11/88)... Patriots K Jason Stauder kicks 27-yard field goal in OT for 10-7 Patriots win... Bucs outgain the Patriots 343 yards to 168 yards while picking up five sacks in a dominating 27-7 victory (11/16/97)... FB Mike Alstott paced the team with 16 rushes for 91 yards and a touchdown while also adding three receptions for 35 yards... The Buccaneers sacked Patriots' QB Drew Bledsoe six times and outrushed the Patriots 140 yards to 88 yards in a 21-16 victory (9/3/00)

AGAINST THE OPPOSITION

DT Chris Hovan: As a member of the Minnesota Vikings, recorded his first career sack and a season-high eight tackles at New England (9/10/00)... Sacked QB Tom Brady twice and tallied a career-high nine tackles at New England (11/24/02).

QB Byron Leftwich: As a member of the Jacksonville Jaguars, threw for 288 on 21 completions and one touchdown pass (12/14/03).

TE Kellen Winslow: As a member of the Cleveland Browns, caught four passes for 49 yards, including a 14-yard touchdown pass from Derek Anderson (10/7/07).

- Buccaneers Defensive Coordinator **Jim Bates** served on Bill Belichick's coaching staff with the Cleveland Browns from 1991-93 and again in 1995. Bates was linebackers coach in 1991, defensive ends coach in 1992-93 and secondary coach in 1995, all while Belichick was Head Coach.
- Patriots WR **Joey Galloway** spent five seasons with the Buccaneers (2004-08), finishing fourth in receiving yards (3,912), third in receiving TDs (28), and ninth in receptions (248) in Buccaneers history.
- Bucs Assistant Head Coach/Wide Receivers **Richard Mann** coached served on Bill Belichick's coaching staff with the Cleveland Browns as a wide receivers coach from 1991-93.
- Bucs Associate Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator **Rich Bisaccia** graduated from New Fairfield High School in Connecticut.
- Bucs Offensive Line Coach **Pete Mangurian** served as the Patriots' Tight Ends Coach under Belichick from 2005-08.
- Bucs Running Backs Coach **Steve Logan** spent two seasons (2007-08) as the offensive coordinator at Boston College before joining the Buccaneers.
- Bucs Assistant Offensive Line Coach **Chris Mosely** spent his first year in coaching (2007) as a graduate assistant at Boston College.
- Bucs DT **Chris Hovan** started 43 games at Boston College and was named an All-American following his senior season.
- Bucs T **Jeremy Trueblood** played collegiately at Boston College, making 36 starts.
- Patriots S **Brandon Meriweather** is from Apopka, Florida attending Apopka High School. He also played collegiately at the University of Miami.
- Patriots Head Athletic Trainer **Jim Whalen** served as the Director of Rehabilitation for the Bucs from 2000-01.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR



- **CB Ronde Barber**
 - With 183 games played, Barber is one game shy of passing Paul Gruber (183 from 1988-99) for the third-most games played in club history.
- **WR Antonio Bryant**
 - Bryant (27 receiving TDs) is three touchdowns shy of 30 career receiving touchdowns.
 - With 98 total NFL games played, Bryant is just two shy of reaching 100 career games played.
- **WR Michael Clayton**
 - Clayton has 2,860 receiving yards with the Buccaneers and needs 83 more yards to surpass Bruce Hill (2,942 yards from 1987-91) for eighth on the Buccaneers all-time receiving yards list.
 - Clayton can also reach the 3,000-yard receiving mark with 140 more receiving yards.
- **RB Earnest Graham**
 - Graham has 14 rushing touchdowns with the Buccaneers and needs one more to tie Lars Tate (15 from 1988-89) for the seventh most rushing touchdowns in team history.
- **RB Clifton Smith**
 - Smith has 1,467 kickoff return yards with the Buccaneers and needs 45 more yards to move past Gary Anderson (1,511 from 1990-93) for sixth place in team history.
 - Smith also has 439 punt return yards with the Buccaneers and needs 201 more to pass Bobby Futrell (639 from 1986-90) for sixth-most punt return yards in team history.
- **RB Derrick Ward**
 - Ward has 1,885 career rushing yards and can reach 2,000 rushing yards with 115 more yards.
- **RB Carnell Williams**
 - Williams has 16 rushing touchdowns with the Buccaneers and needs one more to pass Ricky Bell (16 from 1977-81) for the sixth-most rushing touchdowns in team history.
- **TE Kellen Winslow**
 - With 2,745 career receiving yards, Winslow is 255 yards shy of reaching the 3,000 yards receiving milestone.
- **DE/DT Jimmy Wilkerson**
 - With 94 total NFL games played, Wilkerson is just six shy of reaching 100 career games played.



RAHEEM MORRIS



Raheem Morris was named the eighth head coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on January 17, 2009.

Morris is currently in his second stint with Tampa Bay, spending the previous two seasons as the Buccaneers defensive backs coach after also serving on the Buccaneers defensive coaching staff from 2002-2005. In between stints in Tampa Bay, he spent 2006 as Kansas State's defensive coordinator. Morris has quickly risen through the Buccaneers coaching ranks during his time with the team, serving as defensive quality control coach in 2002, defensive assistant in 2003 and assistant defensive backs coach from 2004-2005 before taking over as defensive backs coach in 2007. During his first stint with the club, Morris worked closely with former Bucs defensive backs coach and current Steelers head coach Mike Tomlin in the development of one of the NFL's top secondaries.

Morris has helped shape one of the NFL's best defenses over the past decade. Since 1996, the Buccaneers defense has produced 36 Pro Bowlers, the most in the NFL, and finished as the NFL's top-ranked defense two times (2002 and 2005). The past 13 seasons have also seen the Buccaneers defense rank in the Top 10 on 11 occasions and in the Top 5 eight times.

In Morris' final season as the defensive backs coach in 2008, Tampa Bay's defense finished the year ranked fourth in the NFL against the pass. It marked the fifth time in six seasons with Morris on the staff that the Buccaneers defense ranked in the Top 5 in pass defense. The leader of Morris' defensive backs, CB Ronde Barber, was selected to his fifth career Pro Bowl in 2008 while surpassing the 100-tackle plateau for the fifth time in his career, ranking fifth on the team with 100 tackles. Barber also tied for the team lead with four interceptions while ranking first with 16 passes defended on the season. Starting opposite of Barber for the second consecutive season was Phillip Buchanon. The former first-round pick flourished in his two seasons with Morris having set career highs in tackles and passes defended in 2007, only to surpass those totals with a career-high 69 tackles and 12 passes defended in 2008. His two interceptions in 2008 ranked tied for fourth on the team. In his first season with Morris, rookie CB Aqib Talib tied for the team lead with four interceptions while also tying for the lead among all NFL rookies in that category despite only starting two games.

Without much fanfare, Morris has developed arguably

the best trio of safeties in the NFL. Starters Tanard Jackson and Jermaine Phillips have performed at a Pro Bowl level the previous two seasons while second-year S Sabby Piscitelli was prominently featured in the rotation last season after missing much of 2007 because of injury. Phillips, who missed five contests in 2008 because of injury, was again the most physical presence on the Buccaneers defense while posting 86 tackles to rank fifth on the team and three interceptions to rank third. Jackson built on his impressive 2007 rookie campaign to reaffirm his status as one of the cornerstones of the Buccaneers future. His career-high 102 tackles ranked fourth on the team and he is the only defender in Buccaneers history to start the first 32 games to begin his career. Jackson was the only Buccaneers defender to record a statistic in every defensive category in 2008 and also ranked third on the team with 18 special teams tackles. Piscitelli saw significant action in his second season, playing in 15 games with five starts and totaling 59 tackles and two interceptions.

After Tampa Bay fell to 19th in the NFL in pass defense in 2006, Morris led a resurgence in his return in 2007 as he guided the Buccaneers pass defense to the league's top ranking en route to the NFC South division title. The Buccaneers secondary helped limit opposing quarterbacks to a 76.2 rating in 2007 to rank eighth in the NFL after ranking 29th in 2006. Under his direction, five different players in the secondary intercepted a pass in 2007 and Phillips had a Pro Bowl-caliber season, leading the team with a career-high four interceptions and ranking tied for third with 120 tackles. Jackson made a seamless transition to safety from cornerback and had one of the most impressive rookie campaigns in team history as he became the first rookie on defense to start on opening day for the Buccaneers since 1996. Jackson was also the first Buccaneers rookie on defense since 1996 (Regan Upshaw) to start all 16 games. For the fifth time in his career, and third time under Morris, Barber recorded a statistic in every defensive category in 2007. After taking over as a full time starter in Week 4, Buchanon ranked second on the team with three interceptions while recording a then career-high 63 tackles in his first season with Morris.

In his lone season with Kansas State in 2006, Morris coordinated a defense that displayed improvement in several statistical categories from the previous season, including total defense, scoring defense and pass defense. Morris oversaw a Wildcat defense that included seven players who received conference recognition, including two first-team All-Big 12 honorees and one second-team selection.





During his six seasons in Tampa Bay, the Bucs have finished ranked in the Top 5 in the NFL in total defense every year except 2008 (ranked ninth), including No. 1 rankings in 2002 and 2005. Additionally, the defense finished as the top-ranked pass defense on three occasions (2002, 2004 and 2007) and never ranked lower than sixth with Morris on the staff.

In 2002, his first season as a coach in the NFL, Morris helped guide the Buccaneers top-ranked defense as they captured the franchise's first world title in Super Bowl XXXVII.

Morris joined Tampa Bay after spending the 2000 and 2001 seasons as defensive backs coach at Hofstra University. He also spent time in the fall of 2001 with the New York Jets serving a defensive minority internship.

Morris began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at Hofstra in 1998, where he was responsible for coaching the offensive scout team, developing scouting reports and handling video breakdown and computer input and analysis. He then landed at Cornell University as defensive backs coach and special teams assistant for the 1999 season.

Morris has focused his community efforts on education and promoting the importance of academics amongst Bay area youth. Recently, Morris started his "Be the Ultimate Character Student" (BUCS) program, an education initiative for Hillsborough and Pinellas County students. Following each Buccaneers home game, Morris will host a video podcast to air in middle and high schools as well as on Buccaneers.com that will address education, leadership, determination and character. He also spoke at a rally at Middleton High School in Tampa to encourage students to study and prepare for the FCAT in March 2009. Along with CB Ronde Barber, he participated in the grand opening of the First Tee Learning Center at Tampa's Rogers Park Golf Course in March 2009. In May 2009, Morris was a guest speaker and presented awards to Hillsborough County teachers at the annual SERVE awards, which pay tribute to public school teachers for excellence in the classroom. In addition, he hosted a group of students from Madison Middle School for a private tour of One Buccaneer Place as a reward for positive behavior and improved performance in the classroom in May 2009.

Morris served as a celebrity guest at the Alstott Celebrity Outdoor Weekend in April 2009 to benefit the Children's Cancer Center, and was a celebrity guest at the fourth Annual Dick Vitale Gala to benefit the V Foundation for cancer research in May 2009. He also

participated in the Barrett Ruud-Pewter Report Charity Golf Tournament in May 2009 to benefit the American Heart Association, and the ninth Annual Derrick Brooks Celebrity Golf Classic in June 2009 to benefit Derrick Brooks Charities. This past June, he served as the keynote speaker at the Lauren's First and Goal Football Camp at the University of South Florida, which raised funds for Pediatric Brain Tumor research. Morris filmed a PSA in 2009 for Project Pressure, a campaign that aims to reduce high blood pressure throughout the community by increasing Blood Pressure awareness and Cardiovascular Risk awareness.

Morris played collegiately as a safety at Hofstra from 1994-1997, and received his bachelor of science degree in physical education. Morris, who hails from Irvington, New Jersey, was presented the Key to the City in his hometown during "Raheem Morris Day" on June 5, 2009.

IN THE CLASSROOM



This season, Buccaneers first-year head coach **Raheem Morris** has started his "Be the Ultimate Character Student" (BUCS) program. The program is an initiative designed to teach students lessons on education and athletics as they relate to leadership, determination and character. Morris will record video podcasts on Monday following each home game, utilizing his own experiences during the 2009 season to relate messages about perseverance, integrity, commitment and, ultimately, the importance of making the most of one's educational opportunities.

On Tuesday mornings the video podcast will air in middle and high schools in Hillsborough and Pinellas County School Districts as well as on Buccaneers.com. Teachers can choose to display the podcast on the monitors in their classrooms and work Morris' message into their day's curriculum. On the weeks during the Buccaneers' away games, schools will work on their own character education curriculum, which will be reinforced by Coach Morris' character-building message.

Morris knows the importance of education: "Growing up as a young man, education was so much more important in my parents' eyes than sports was, and that was a big part of who I am today," said Morris, who wasn't allowed to participate in varsity sports until he had improved his grades to the level set by his father. "We want these kids to have the ability to realize their full potential as students and be committed to it. I think it's a great opportunity to reach them and we're really fired up about it."





BILL BELICHICK



Bill Belichick was hired by Chairman and CEO Robert Kraft on Jan. 27, 2000 and is in his 35th season as an NFL coach and his 10th season as Patriots head coach. Through nine seasons, Belichick has delivered three Super Bowl championships, four conference titles, six division crowns and 14 playoff victories. Belichick directed the Patriots to victories in Super Bowls XXXVI (2001), XXXVIII (2003) and XXXIX (2004), and in 2007 he became the first NFL head coach to guide his team to a 16-0 regular season.

Prior to joining the Patriots, Belichick spent five seasons (1991-95) with the Cleveland Browns. Belichick's first head coaching opportunity came with the Browns following the 1990 season, when his defensive efforts with the New York Giants helped claim a second Super Bowl title in five years.

Belichick began his coaching career after graduating from Wesleyan University and accepted a staff assistant position with the Baltimore Colts in 1975. At the age of 23, he was named special assistant to Head Coach Ted Marchibroda. In 1976, Belichick joined Rick Forzano's staff with the Detroit Lions and in two seasons in Detroit assisted with the special teams, tight ends and receivers. In 1978, Denver Broncos Head Coach Red Miller hired Belichick as the assistant special teams coach and assistant to defensive coordinator Joe Collier. In 1979, Belichick joined Ray Perkins' staff with the New York Giants as a defensive assistant and special teams coach, launching a 12-year tenure with the Giants. After the 1980 campaign, he drew the added responsibility of coaching the Giants linebackers. While continuing to coach the linebackers, in 1983 his role with the defensive unit increased. He was named defensive coordinator in 1985, a position he held for the next six seasons.

- Head Coach Raheem Morris is facing the New England Patriots and Patriots Head Coach Bill Belichick for the first time.

- Belichick is 2-1 all-time in the regular season against the Buccaneers, earning a win while Head Coach of the Browns 22-6 (9/10/95) and another as Patriots Head Coach 28-0 (12/17/05). The Buccaneers defeated Belichick and the Patriots 21-16 on September 3, 2000.

TAKING FLIGHT

The 2009 Buccaneers will spend a lot more time in the air than they did last year.

In 2008, Tampa Bay traveled just under 16,000 miles in order to attend their 10 road games in the preseason and regular season. That was a fairly conservative travel plan; only 10 teams had fewer combined miles during the season.

This year, the Bucs are slated to travel 23,018 miles to get to their games, including a “home” contest played in London. That trip overseas and a Week 15 cross-country jaunt to Seattle are largely responsible for the Buccaneers ranking sixth among the league’s 32 teams in terms of miles to be traveled this fall.

The hosting Seahawks won’t feel sorry for the Buccaneers. Just as it was in 2008, Seattle is at the top of the travel list, expected to log 29,054 miles in 2009. The Seahawks will travel more miles this year than Indianapolis, Pittsburgh and Cleveland combined.

The Buccaneers just missed joining the group of five teams that will “travel around the world” in 2009. It takes 25,000 miles to circumnavigate the globe, something the Seahawks, 49ers, Chargers, Cardinals and Raiders will do.

The total distance traveled by all teams will be 578,912 miles. This is 18,128 fewer miles than last year, when teams traveled a total of 597,040 miles.

OFF TO LONDON

For the first time in team history, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers will travel overseas to play in a regular season game. This week, the Buccaneers will take part in the NFL’s International Series when they host the New England Patriots in the United Kingdom during Week 7. The game will be played on Sunday, October 25 at Wembley Stadium in London with kickoff set for 1:00 p.m. ET on CBS.

“The Tampa Bay Buccaneers organization is extremely excited and honored to be chosen to participate in the NFL International Series,” said Buccaneers Co-Chairman Joel Glazer. “We look forward to being part of the NFL’s global outreach and playing our great game in front of Buccaneers fans overseas.”

The contest will mark the third consecutive year of an NFL regular-season game at London’s Wembley Stadium and just the fourth time the NFL has played a regular season contest outside of the United States. On October 26, 2008 the New Orleans Saints defeated the San Diego Chargers 37-32 before a crowd of 83,226. The International Series began on October 28, 2007, when the New York Giants defeated the Miami Dolphins 13-10 en route to a victory in Super Bowl XLII. The only other regular season game played outside the US was in Mexico City at Estadio Azteca on October 2, 2005 when the Arizona Cardinals defeated the San Francisco 49ers 31-14 in front of a crowd of 103,467.

The only other time the Buccaneers played overseas was a preseason game against the N.Y. Jets on August 2, 2003 for the American Bowl in Tokyo, Japan. The Bucs defeated the Jets 30-14 in that game.



THE ROAD AHEAD



This season, the Buccaneers have the fifth-toughest schedule in the league, according to the NFL's annual kickoff release. Tampa Bay's 2009 opponents had a combined mark of 148-107-1 last year, for a winning percentage of .580. Only Miami (.594), Carolina (.592), New England (.590) and Atlanta (.588) face tougher schedules this fall, and only by slim margins.

Of the Bucs' 16 games this fall, only three will be against teams that finished below .500 last year, Buffalo, Green Bay and Seattle. The Packers and Seahawks were division champs in 2007.

Seven of the Bucs' 16 games will come against teams that were in the playoffs last January. No team will face more 2008 postseason participants, though nine others also face seven such foes.

Residence in the NFC South or AFC East is the key factor in the equation. The worst record among the eight teams in those two divisions was 7-9 (Buffalo), so intra-divisional play will force the Bucs, Patriots, Falcons, et al, to play at least six games against foes with good 2008 marks.

Additionally, the teams in the NFC South and AFC East will face each other this year, doubling the impact of those divisions' successes in 2008. As a contrast, every team in the NFC East finished at .500 or better last year, but their interconference matchup is with the AFC West, in which no team finished better than .500 last year.

STRENGTH OF THE SOUTH



Over the previous seven seasons, one could argue that the toughest division in the NFL is the NFC South. Since realignment in 2002, the NFC South is one of two divisions in the NFC and is one of only three divisions in the NFL to have every team earn a division championship. The NFC West and the AFC West are the only other divisions to have all four teams earn a division championship since realignment. The NFC South has also been represented a league-best five times in a Conference Championship Game, tied with the NFC East. The NFC South has been led by the Buccaneers, who have won three division crowns in seven years.

In 2008, the NFC South again showed its overall strength as it finished as one of only three divisions in the league to have three of its four teams with a record of 9-7 or better (also AFC East and NFC East) and is one of two divisions to have all of its teams at 8-8 or better (also NFC East). The NFC South also finished with a remarkable 27-5 overall home record last season, the best combined home winning percentage by a division in NFL history (.844), with the next best division last season, the NFC East, holding an 23-9 record at home. The South was also a near perfect 11-1 at home when facing other South division opponents in 2008. The Bucs contributed significantly to that mark as they finished 6-2 at home, winning their first six games at Raymond James Stadium last year.

A DECADE OF WINNING



Over the last 11 years, the Buccaneers have the sixth-best overall record in the NFC, with an 87-79 regular season mark since 1999. Only the Philadelphia Eagles, Green Bay Packers, N.Y. Giants, Seattle Seahawks and Minnesota Vikings rank ahead of the Buccaneers. In addition, only the Eagles, with seven, made more playoff appearances in that span than the Buccaneers' six (the Giants and the Seattle Seahawks also had six). At home at Raymond James Stadium, Tampa Bay very nearly had the NFC's best mark over the past decade. Minnesota tops the list at 56-27, while the Buccaneers are tied for fourth with a 52-31 record.

IN THE (RED) ZONE



Through the first six games this season, both the Buccaneers offense and defense has been strong in the red zone. Tampa Bay's offense has scored a touchdown 61.5 percent (8-13) of the time it has been inside the 20-yard line, tied for eighth-best in the NFL and fourth-best in the NFC. Meanwhile, the Buccaneers defense has surrendered a touchdown inside the 20-yard line 50.0 percent (8-16) of the time, tied for 13th-best in the NFL and tied for sixth-best in the NFC.

UNDRAFTED ≠ UNWANTED

When it comes to finding value the Buccaneers have had a knack at knowing where to look. Though highly touted first round picks generally gain the most hype, undrafted finds can make for the best story. Tampa Bay is currently home to 13 players who originally entered the league as undrafted rookie free agents and have totaled 343 games played, including 72 starts among them. The group includes standout performers such as RB **Earnest Graham**, CB **Elbert Mack**, T **Donald Penn** and RB/KR **Clifton Smith**. The team also has another seven undrafted players on their practice squad.

Graham has been the quintessential rags to riches story. As an undrafted free agent out of Florida in 2003, Graham fought his way into playing time thanks to his attitude and hard work. In his first three seasons with the Buccaneers, Graham mainly played special teams and rushed for a total of 52 times for 215 yards. When opportunity struck during 2007, Graham ran with it, accumulating 222 rushes for 898 yards and 10 touchdowns. Since the 2007 season, Graham has rushed 362 times for 1,486 yards and 14 touchdowns. He has also recorded 75 receptions for 510 yards since that time.

Following Graham's footsteps has been RB/KR Clifton Smith. After spending the first seven weeks of the 2008 season on the team's practice squad, Smith blazed onto the scene, earning Pro Bowl honors as a return specialist in his rookie year. In his short career, Smith is already eighth all-time for kickoff return yards in team history (1,322), is the only Buccaneer to return a punt and kickoff for a touchdown in the same season and was just the second Buccaneer ever selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie (also RB Warrick Dunn in 1997).

Despite leading the NCAA in interceptions with eight his senior year at Troy, Mack was overshadowed by Trojans teammate and fellow cornerback Leodis McKelvin. McKelvin eventually was selected in the first round (11th overall) of the 2008 draft by the Buffalo Bills while Mack went undrafted, signing with Tampa Bay. Since joining the Buccaneers, Mack has taken over the nickelback spot while also seeing time on special teams.

Perhaps the biggest find for the Buccaneers has been starting left tackle Donald Penn, who played his college ball at Utah State. Penn originally entered the league in 2006 as an undrafted free agent of the Minnesota Vikings. After spending the first three weeks on the

Vikings practice squad, the Buccaneers signed him to their active roster, where he was inactive for the final 13 games of the season. In 2007, Penn saw his first NFL action and hasn't looked back, playing in 36 consecutive games and starting in 32 consecutive games.

The Tampa Bay Buccaneers added a big target to their offense this offseason acquiring TE **Kellen Winslow** from the Cleveland Browns. Winslow, the son of San Diego Chargers Hall of Fame tight end Kellen Winslow, was originally drafted by the Browns with the sixth overall pick in the 2004 NFL Draft and since that time has shown he is one of the most dangerous tight end receiving threats in the league.

2009 Highlights:

- Led or tied for the team lead in receptions in five of first six games.
- First on team in receptions (29).
- First on team in receiving yards (286).
- First on team in receiving touchdowns (4).

In Week 5 at Philadelphia Winslow had his best game as a Buccaneer, recording a nine-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter and another nine-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter, tying his career-high for receiving touchdowns (first set on November 6, 2008 while with Cleveland against the Denver Broncos). Winslow also recorded the fifth 100-yard receiving game of his career, and first as a Buccaneer, totaling a team-high nine receptions for 102 yards and two touchdowns. His nine receptions were the most in a game by a Buccaneer this season and also marked the second-best single-game performance by a tight end in team history. The club



record for most receptions by a tight end in a single game belongs to Jackie Harris, who had 10 receptions (for 122 yards) at Green Bay (11/26/95).

Winslow tied for the team lead with five receptions, for 30 yards and a touchdown in his first outing for the Buccaneers against the Dallas Cowboys (9/13) in Week 1. In Week 2 at Buffalo (9/20), Winslow again tied for a team-high with seven receptions for a team and game-high 90 yards receiving, including a 42-yard touchdown reception. Winslow's 42-yard reception was the second-longest of his career. In Week 3 against the N.Y. Giants, Winslow again led the team with three receptions.

Among NFL tight ends, Winslow currently ranks second in touchdowns (4), fifth in receptions (29) and ninth in receiving yards (286).

After his rookie and sophomore campaigns were cut short due to injury, Winslow shined in 2006 starting every game. Winslow led all NFL tight ends with a career-high 89 receptions, a mark which tied Hall of Famer Ozzie Newsome's franchise single-season record.

In 2007, he looked to surpass his 875-yard, three-touchdown '06 season and did just that, earning Pro Bowl honors. Winslow led all NFL tight ends with a 13.5 yards per reception average, tallying 82 receptions for 1,106 yards and a career-high five touchdowns. His 1,106 receiving yards also set a single-season mark for a tight end in Browns history.

In 2008, Winslow battled injuries and despite appearing in 10 games with eight starts, finished with 43 receptions for 428 yards and three touchdowns. Winslow had one of his best outings against Denver, recording 10 receptions for 111 yards and two touchdowns.

The Buccaneers continue to look for big things from the former University of Miami star, who earned the John Mackey Award, given to the nation's premier tight end in 2003. The 6-4, 240 Winslow is paired along with The Sporting News' 2008 Comeback Player of the Year WR Antonio Bryant, WR Michael Clayton and fellow tight ends Jerramy Stevens and John Gilmore, and the Buccaneers look to have one of the top passing threats in football. Add in the Bucs notable backfield of Earnest Graham, Derrick Ward, Carnell Williams and Clifton Smith and Tampa Bay may be looking at its most offensive firepower in some time.

WHEN OPPORTUNITY KNOCKS

When DE/DT **Jimmy Wilkerson** became a free agent following the 2007 season to little fanfare, the Buccaneers quietly felt like they found another talent that just needed an opportunity. A little over a year later, Wilkerson has proven to be quite a value as he has moved into a full-time starter role. This season, Wilkerson has a team-leading 5.0 sacks and also leads all defensive lineman and is sixth on the team in tackles with 28 to go with one TFL, 12 quarterback pressures, one pass defended and three forced fumbles.

Since joining the Buccaneers in 2008, Wilkerson has played in every game, accumulating one sack in every 2.2 games played (10 in 22 games) as opposed to one sack in 72 total games while with the Kansas City Chiefs. He has also recorded five sacks in six starts with the Buccaneers compared to no sacks in

five starts for Kansas City.

In just 22 games with the Buccaneers, Wilkerson has amassed 56 tackles, 10.0 sacks, three passes defended and four forced fumbles while also setting single-game career-highs in tackles (7 against Carolina, 10/18/09) and sacks (3.0 at Philadelphia, 10/11/09). In his first five years in the NFL with the Chiefs, Wilkerson totaled 97 tackles, one sack, six passes defended and one fumble recovery.

Below is a breakdown of Wilkerson's single-game highlights in 2009:

- In Week 3 against the N.Y. Giants, posted a then career-high six tackles along with one quarterback pressure.
- In Week 4 at Washington (10/4) recorded his second sack of the season on the third play of the game, forcing a fumble to set up a Buccaneers touchdown and tied a then career-high six tackles.
- In Week 5 had a career day at Philadelphia (10/11) recording career-high three sacks (previously two sacks at Detroit on November 23, 2008) and tying then career-high six tackles (also against N.Y. Giants, 9/27).
- On second sack of the day, also forced a fumble, the third of his career and the second time in as many weeks forced a fumble on a sack.
- Became first Buccaneer to record three sacks in a game since Simeon Rice against New Orleans (12/19/04).
- In Week 6 against Carolina (10/18) set new career-high with seven tackles also adding two QBP.

RUUD AWAKENING

After consecutive Pro Bowl worthy seasons, LB **Barrett Ruud** has quickly proven he is one of the best middle linebackers in the NFL. As the quarterback of the Buccaneers defense, Ruud is looked upon to lead a defensive unit that has finished in the top 10 of overall defense in the NFL for 12 of the last 13 seasons.

In the 2009 season opener against Dallas (9/13), Ruud started where he left off, tying for a team high with eight tackles. In Week 2 at Buffalo (9/20) Ruud did one better, recording a team and





career-high 20 tackles. The 20-tackle performance also tied for the sixth-most tackles in a single game in team history.

- At Washington (10/4) in Week 4, again led the team in tackles with 11 while also adding a quarterback pressure.
- In Week 5 at Philadelphia (10/11) had a team-high 14 tackles.
- In Week 6 against Carolina (10/18) finished with 14 tackles, three passes defended and the first interception of the season and the fifth of his career.

Through six games, Ruud leads the team with 86 tackles and also has one quarterback pressure, one interception and three passes defended. He has led the team in tackles every game this season.

In his first full season as the starter at middle linebacker in 2007, Ruud quickly established himself as a dependable presence at the core of the Tampa defense and 2008 was no different. Below is a breakdown of Ruud's 2008 season:

- Finished with a team-leading 178 tackles including four TFL, 3.0 sacks, two interceptions, one fumble recovery and seven passes defended.

- His 178 tackles were also the eighth-most in a single season in team history.
- Led or tied for the team lead in tackles in 12 of the 16 games played during the 2008 season.
- Recorded an interception in back-to-back games (Week 3 at Chicago and Week 4 vs. Green Bay), tying for fourth on the team in interceptions and recorded his first career sack against Green Bay.
- In Week 9 at Kansas City, tied a career high with 18 tackles while also recording his second career sack on the games first play.
- In Week 11 vs. Minnesota (11/16), added his third sack of the season to go with eight tackles.

In 2007, Ruud ranked as the team's leading tackler with 169 stops, and posted double-digit tackles in nine of his 15 contests played. In 36 career starts, including 15 last season, Ruud has averaged 10.92 tackles per contest (393 total tackles in his starts).

The fifth-year linebacker from Nebraska repeatedly displayed his big-play ability, earning NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for his performance against the New Orleans Saints (9/16/07) in Week 2. In the contest against Tampa Bay's division rivals, Ruud led the team with 16 tackles, along with recording two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery against the Saints. It marked the second consecutive week that Ruud recovered a fumble, following Ruud's season-opening performance at Seattle (9/9/07), where he totaled 12 tackles and one fumble recovery.

Ruud totaled 15 tackles vs. St. Louis (9/23/07) and recorded his first career interception. The fourth-quarter interception marked his third straight contest with a takeaway. He added eight tackles, one pass defended and his third forced fumble of the year at Carolina in the final game of September. Ruud was named the NFC Defensive Player of the Month for the first month of the season, becoming just the fourth defensive player in team history to receive the honor.

Ruud started the month of October where he left off the previous month, notching 16 tackles at Indianapolis (10/7/07) and posting a career-high 18 stops against Tennessee (10/14/07). He added 15 tackles against Jacksonville (10/28/07). Ruud led the team with nine tackles against Atlanta (12/16/07) and had a team-high eight stops at San Francisco (12/23/07).



THE NEW LB CREW



This season, the Buccaneers have two new starters at the outside linebacker positions. Anchored by standout middle linebacker Barrett Ruud, linebackers **Geno Hayes** and **Quincy Black** have stepped into starting roles and have performed admirably for the team. With Ruud leading the team in tackles (86), Hayes is second on the team with 49 tackles while Black is fourth on the team with 34 tackles. Collectively the group has 169 of the team's 463 total tackles this season (36.5%). Hayes and Black have also made their presence felt behind the line of scrimmage where Hayes has a team-leading four tackles for loss and Black is fifth on the team with two TFLs. Black also has one sack with three quarterback pressures to Hayes' six quarterback pressures.

WORTH THE PICK



Joining the Buccaneers with the lofty expectations that accompany the highest cornerback ever selected in the NFL Draft by the team (20th overall in 2008), CB **Aqib Talib** lived up to the hype in his rookie season and has now taken on the vigors of a starting role.

In Week 4 at Washington (10/4), Talib arguably had his best game as a pro, tying the Buccaneers single-game record with three interceptions while also recording five tackles and three passes defended. It marked Talib's first multi-interception game of his career as he recorded his first interception of the season in the first quarter and followed it up with his second in the second quarter and third in the fourth quarter. With his interceptions, Talib became just the second player in Buccaneers history to record three interceptions in a game, joining CB Ronde Barber, who has accomplished the feat twice. Barber had three interceptions at New Orleans (12/4/05) and at New Orleans (12/23/01).

Of Stroughter's 13 receptions this season, 10 have been for first downs with seven of those coming on third downs and one on a fourth down.

Stroughter shined in Week 6 against Carolina (10/18). In the first quarter, Stroughter recorded a career-long 29-yard reception on the team's opening drive. Stroughter's reception came on a third-and-long and helped the Buccaneers set up their first score. Stroughter finished the day tying his career high with three receptions for a career and team-high 65 yards receiving.

Additionally, veterans CB Ronde Barber and G Davin Joseph have chipped in on special teams. Barber blocked the first PAT of his career in Week 4 at Washington (10/4/09) and has now notched a blocked PAT, blocked punt (12/2/01 at Cincinnati) and blocked field goal (10/19/03 vs. San Francisco) during his career becoming the first player in team history to record such a feat.

PASS PROTECTOR



One of the 'biggest' components to the success of the Buccaneers offensive line has been starting left tackle **Donald Penn**. Penn, who was signed off of the Minnesota Vikings practice squad in 2006, has grown into one of the most dependable left tackles in the league. Since his first action during the 2007 season, Penn has played in 37 consecutive games with 33 consecutive starts, the third-longest current consecutive starts streak on the team.

Through the first five games this year, Penn has faced off against top rushers such as Cowboys LB DeMarcus Ware, Bills DE Aaron Schobel, Giants DE Osi Umenyiora, Redskins DE Andre Carter and LB/DE Brian Orakpo, Eagles Trent Coles and Panthers Julius Peppers, giving up just two sacks to the bunch.

When asked about Penn's performance after the Washington Game in Week 4, Head Coach Raheem Morris said, "He's really been a big time force over there on the left side. That's the first Donald Penn question that I have gotten all year and that's what offensive linemen are supposed to be, invisible and that's what he's been, invisible."

In Week 5 at Philadelphia (10/11), Penn recorded a rare feat for an offensive lineman, marking the first reception of his career off of a deflected pass, running 15 yards for a first down.

Penn originally entered the league with the Vikings as an undrafted free agent on May 5, 2006 after starting 44 consecutive games at both tackle positions during his career at Utah State.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN



RB **Carnell "Cadillac" Williams** is back, again. As many doubted his return to the playing field after sustaining a season-ending knee injury in Carolina (9/30) in 2007, Williams kept working and hoping to once again return to the field that he had been so successful on. After spending the first nine weeks of the 2008 season on the Physically Unable to Perform list, that hard work paid off when he appeared in his first game in nearly 14 months, carrying the ball 16 times at Detroit (11/23) in Week 12. Unfortunately for Williams, after completing a 28-yard run, his longest run of the season in the 2008 season finale against Oakland, he tore the patellar tendon in his other knee.

Williams once again dedicated himself to making it back to the game, which some predicted he wouldn't be able to do, and succeeded through a grueling offseason of rehabilitation. Now, there seems to be no holding him back as Williams returned to the playing field as a starter in Week 1 against Dallas (9/13). In the opener, Williams put up 97 yards rushing and one touchdown on 13 carries (7.5 avg.) including a 35-yard run, his longest since October 15, 2006 when he had a 38-yard run against the Cincinnati Bengals. The game marked the first time Williams has had three or more rushes of 10 yards since October 8, 2006 when he had five at New Orleans. His 97 rushing yards were the most for Williams since November 19, 2006 against Washington when he rushed 27 times for 122 yards (4.5 avg.) and his touchdown in the second quarter moved him into a tie for seventh place for most rushing touchdowns in team history with RB Lars Tate (15 touchdowns from 1988-89).

In Week 2 at Buffalo (9/20), Williams showed another aspect to his game, registering a career-high seven receptions for another career-high 56 yards receiving and his first career receiving touchdown. His seven receptions also tied for a team and game-high. In Week 4 at Washington (10/4), Williams totaled 99 yards of offense. He led the team in rushing yards for the second time this season, totaling 77 yards on 16 attempts (4.8 avg.) and also adding four receptions, tied for tops on the team, for 22 yards.



In Week 6 against Carolina (10/18), Williams finished with 77 yards on 16 carries (4.8 avg.) and a touchdown while also marking the second time this season he has had three or more rushes of 10 yards. Williams' touchdown run came on the team's opening drive and was his second of the season and the 16th of his career, tying him with RB Ricky Bell (16 from 1977-81) for the sixth-most rushing touchdowns in team history.

This season, Williams has led the team in rushing in three of the first six games and leads the Buccaneers rushing attack with 276 yards and two touchdowns on 64 carries. He is also second on the team with 15 receptions for 89 yards and one touchdown.

Williams currently ranks seventh in the NFC in rushing yards per attempt with a minimum of 50 attempts.

Before sustaining his second knee injury in the 2008 season finale, Williams had been quieting critics. In Week 13 against New Orleans (11/30), Williams scored his first touchdown since September 23, 2007 vs. St. Louis on an eight-yard touchdown run. With the touchdown run, Williams once again started his ascent up the Buccaneers record books, at the time moving him into sole possession of 10th place for

most rushing touchdowns in Buccaneers history. In Williams' third game back at Carolina (12/8) in Week 14 he returned to the field where the injury occurred and scored his second touchdown of the season and the 12th of his career in the third quarter. In the team's season finale Williams recorded the 13th touchdown of his career on a nine-yard run in the second quarter and the 14th touchdown of his career in the fourth quarter on an eight-yard touchdown run, tying him for the team lead with four rushing touchdowns on the season. Williams moved into a then tie with Earnest Graham (14 from 2004-08) for the eighth most rushing touchdowns in team history surpassing Doug Williams (13 from 1978-82). It was the first time since 12/9/07 at Houston that a Buccaneers running back scored two touchdowns in a game. The last time Williams recorded two touchdowns in a game was vs. New Orleans (9/16/07). In the third quarter, Williams also recorded a career high 25-yard pass reception from QB Jeff Garcia on his way to a single game career high 37 yards receiving on five receptions, tying another career high. Williams finished the day with 12 rushes for 78 yards (6.5 avg.) including a 28-yard run, his longest of the season.

RUN LIKE THE WIND



This offseason, the "Wind" blew into Tampa Bay as the Buccaneers added another offensive weapon by signing one of the most highly prized free agents on the market in running back **Derrick Ward**.

In his first action with the Buccaneers, Ward teamed up with Carnell Williams to help lead the team to 174 yards on 31 carries against Dallas (9/13). For his part, Ward carried the ball 12 times for 62 yards (5.2 avg.) and a touchdown, the sixth of his career. He also recorded two receptions for 21 yards. In Week 5 at Philadelphia (10/11), Ward recorded a 28-yard run, his longest run with the Buccaneers. Since 2008, Ward has the seventh-most runs of 10-plus yards (39), including the highest percentage of 10-plus runs (18.1) in the NFL.

The Buccaneers continue to showcase Ward's talents using a committee approach along with Earnest Graham, Carnell Williams and Clifton Smith. As a former member of the N.Y. Giants backfield coined "Earth (Brandon Jacobs), Wind (Ward) and Fire (Ahmad Bradshaw)," Ward is no stranger to a running back-by-committee approach. In 2007, Ward paired with Jacobs to help lead the N.Y. Giants to a 17-14 Super Bowl XLII victory over the New England Patriots. While Jacobs led the team with 1,009 yards, Ward compiled 602 yards rushing and three rushing touchdowns on 125 carries in just eight games to go along with 179 receiving yards and one receiving touchdown.

The following season, Ward rushed for a career-high 1,025 yards on 182 carries (5.6 avg.) joining Jacobs (1,089 rushing yards) as only the fourth pair of running back teammates to each rush for more than 1,000 yards in the same season in NFL history. The 2006 Atlanta Falcons had two 1,000 yard rushers, running back Warrick Dunn (1,140) and quarterback Michael Vick (1,039).

With his 5.6 yards per carry in 2008, Ward also became just the seventh running back in NFL history to possess that high of an average while running for at least 1,000 yards. His yards per carry also led the league and was the 10th-highest mark in NFL history.

Ward, who played at Fresno State before transferring to Ottawa University in Kansas, is in his sixth NFL season. Ward was drafted in the seventh round of the 2004 NFL Draft by the New York Jets and was signed off their practice squad by the Giants on October 13, 2004.

MANY HAPPY RETURNS



Undrafted rookie RB **Clifton Smith** patiently waited to prove he could play in the NFL, working on the Buccaneers practice squad for the first seven weeks of the 2008 season. After finishing with nine games on the active roster, not only did Smith show he belonged, but he firmly entrenched his name in the Buccaneers record book while also earning a Pro Bowl selection and Player of the Week (Week 9) and Player of the Month (November) honors.

In just his second year as a pro, Smith is already climbing the Buccaneers kickoff return yard chart. With 101 return yards in Week 1 against Dallas (9/13) and 111 kickoff return yards in Week 2 at Buffalo (9/20), Smith moved into 10th place for most kickoff return yards in team history. In Week 3 against the N.Y. Giants, Week 4 at Washington (10/4) and Week 6 against Carolina (10/18), Smith continued his climb surpassing Karl Williams (1,227 from 1996-03), George Ragsdale (1,298 from 1977-79) and Donnie Elder (1,457 from 1988-89) for seventh place. Smith now has 1,467 kickoff return yards with the Buccaneers and needs 45 more yards to move past Gary Anderson (1,511 from 1990-93) for sixth place in team history.

In his rookie season last year out of Fresno State, Smith became the first Buccaneers kick returner ever selected to the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl and just the second rookie in team history to make the annual all-star game, joining Warrick Dunn in 1997. Smith also became just the third undrafted rookie free agent since 1970 to make the Pro Bowl, joining Everson Walls (1981) and Rufus Porter (1988).

In his second NFL game, Smith helped spark the Buccaneers comeback win over Kansas City (11/2) in Week 9, by recording just the second kickoff return for a touchdown in franchise history with 2:01 left in the first half. The 97-yard return was also the longest in team history and Smith's first touchdown of his career as he finished the afternoon with a single game team record 259 total return yards (232 kickoff return and 27 punt return). The

first and only other kickoff return for a touchdown in Bucs history occurred in 2007 by Micheal Spurlock against Atlanta (12/16/07). Spurlock scored the first kickoff return for a touchdown in franchise history with a 90-yard touchdown on the team's 1,865th return. Smith's touchdown came on Tampa Bay's 34th kickoff return since that first touchdown in 2007 by Spurlock. In Week 12 at Detroit (11/23), his fourth game as a pro, Smith recorded the first punt return for a touchdown of his career on a 70-yard return in the third quarter, becoming the first player in Buccaneers history to return both a kickoff and a punt for a touchdown, with both occurring this season. Smith's punt return for a touchdown was the first by a Buccaneer since December 19, 2004 when WR Joey Galloway returned a punt 59 yards for a touchdown against New Orleans. He also became just the sixth player in franchise history to return a punt for a touchdown and his score marked just the 10th punt return for a touchdown in team history. In Week 16 vs. San Diego Smith recorded a 72-yard kickoff return, the fifth-longest in team history, giving Smith two for the top five kickoff returns in team history.

Below is a look at Smith's 2008 numbers:

- 992 kickoff return yards on 36 total attempts for a 27.6 return average, fifth-best in the league.
- His 992 kickoff return yards was the fourth highest yardage total in team history.
- 23 punt returns for 324 yards for the second-best average in the league (14.1 avg.).
- Both his kickoff and punt return averages marked the third-best single-season return averages in team history.
- Helped the team to a 24.8 collective kickoff return average, setting a new single-season team record.
- Finished the year with 15 kickoff returns of 25-plus yards (KC- 28, 36, 97t, 26; MIN- 25; DET- 28, 49, 27; NO- 34; CAR- 25, 28; SD- 72, 30, 27; OAK- 30) to go with punt returns of 70t and 42 yards despite playing in just nine games.
- Was the only player in the NFL last season to return both a kickoff and a punt for a touchdown and is the first player in Buccaneers history to accomplish the feat.

ON THE RECEIVING END



After re-signing with the team in the offseason, Buccaneers sixth-year WR **Michael Clayton** started the 2009 season in strong fashion. Clayton, who is regarded as one of the best blocking receivers in the league, finished the season opener against Dallas (9/13) tied for a team-high with five catches for a team-high 93 yards (18.6 avg.), including a long of 47 yards. His 93 yards receiving was the most since his record-breaking rookie season when he had 145 yards receiving on nine catches at San Diego (12/12/04).

With his 47-yard reception at the end of the second quarter, Clayton moved into 10th on the Buccaneers all-time receiving yards list, surpassing Courtney Hawkins (2,744 yards from 1992-96). In Week 5 at Philadelphia (10/11), Clayton surpassed Lawrence Dawsey (2,842 yards from 1991-95) for ninth on the Buccaneers all-time receiving yards list. Clayton finished the day with three receptions for 25 yards receiving. He now has 2,851 career receiving yards with the Buccaneers.

YOUNG GUN



In his first career start, second-year QB **Josh Johnson** threw his first career touchdown pass on the first offensive possession of the day. The touchdown was an eight-yard pass to WR Antonio Bryant. With the start at Washington (10/4/09) in Week 4, Johnson (23 years, 142 days old) became the youngest quarterback to make his first start for the Buccaneers since Shaun King (22 years, 191 days old) on December 6, 1999 against Minnesota (a 24-17 win). Johnson finished 13-of-22 passing for 106 yards with one touchdown and one interception to go with 41 yards rushing on seven carries (5.9 avg.). In Week 3 against the N.Y. Giants (9/27), Johnson made his first appearance at quarterback and in Week 2 at Buffalo (9/20), Johnson made his NFL debut, seeing snaps at wide receiver.

Below are single-game highlights of Johnson's 2009 season:

- In Week 5 at Philadelphia (10/11), Johnson finished a late second-quarter drive 4-for-4 passing for 75 yards, including a nine-yard touchdown pass to TE Kellen Winslow to culminate the drive. He finished the afternoon 26-of-50 for 240 yards passing with two touchdowns and three interceptions, all career-highs. He also had 40 yards rushing on five attempts (8.0 avg.) in the game.
- In Week 6 against Carolina (10/18), Johnson finished second on the team with 45 yards rushing on eight carries to go with 11-of-17 passing for 147 yards and one interception.

Johnson, a fifth-round pick (160th overall) by the Buccaneers in the 2008 NFL Draft, played his collegiate ball at the University of San Diego. While with the Toreros, Johnson set career USD passing records for touchdown passes (113), completions (724), attempts (1,065) and passing yards (9,699). Johnson also owns the NCAA FCS record for passing efficiency (176.68 rating) while playing in 41 games with 34 starts for the Toreros. Johnson also rushed for 1,864 yards and 19 touchdowns during his collegiate career. In all, Johnson totaled 11,563 yards of total offense in college.

During his senior season in 2007, Johnson accumulated 43 passing touchdowns and just one interception on 206-of-301 pass attempts for 2,988 yards. Last season, Johnson spent the entire year on the Buccaneers active roster but was inactive for all 16 contests.

GOLDEN GRAHAM



Last season, RB **Earnest Graham** was on pace to have a career year before being derailed by an injury in Week 11 vs. Minnesota. Playing in 10 games, Graham finished with 132 carries for 563 yards (4.3 avg.) and tied for a team-high with four rushing touchdowns.

Below are highlights from Graham's 2008 season:

- On only 10 carries at New Orleans (9/7) in Week 1, Graham rushed for 91 yards (9.1 avg) while also making three receptions for 27 yards. In the third quarter, he recorded a new then career long 46-yard rush to set up K Matt Bryant's second field goal of the game. The rush was also the longest by a Buccaneer since 2005 at the time.
- In Week 2 against Atlanta (9/14), Graham's inspired play continued as he ran the ball 15 times for 116 yards (7.7 avg.) and a touchdown. Along the way Graham raised his own bar by again recording a new career long with a 68-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter to seal the game. The rush was the longest by a Buc in 2008 and was the longest run by a Buccaneer since September 11, 2005 at Minnesota when RB Carnell Williams had a 71-yard run. It also marked the seventh-longest run in team history and the fifth-longest touchdown run in team history.

- In Week 4 vs. Green Bay (9/28), Graham recorded his fifth career 100-yard rushing day, carrying the ball 20 times for 111 yards (5.6 avg.) and a touchdown. He again showed his big play potential with a 47-yard run late in the fourth quarter setting up his game clinching one-yard touchdown run.
- Graham became the third back in team history with three runs of 40 or more yards in the same season.

- Despite playing in just 10 games, Graham also tied for the most rushes of 45-plus yards in the NFL during the 2008 season with three.
- In Week 6 vs. Carolina, Graham replaced the injured Byron Storer at fullback in the first quarter helping to pave the way for RB Warrick Dunn's 115-yard rushing game. Despite playing fullback for most of the game, Graham recorded the longest reception of his career in the second quarter when he caught a 24-yard pass from QB Jeff Garcia. Graham also caught a 23-yard pass in the third quarter that set up his third rushing touchdown of the season. It marked the 13th rushing touchdown of his career, tying Doug Williams (13 rushing touchdowns from 1978-82) for eighth all-time in Tampa Bay's history.
- In Week 7 vs. Seattle, Graham passed Williams' mark when he scored his fourth rushing touchdown of the season and the 14th of his career.
- In Week 9 at Kansas City, Graham attempted and completed his first career pass to TE Alex Smith for a three-yard touchdown. It was the third touchdown pass by a running back in team history with last time coming at Green Bay (12/2/84) by James Wilder. The first touchdown pass in team history was thrown by RB Louis Carter against Seattle on Oct. 17, 1976.

Graham's 10 rushing touchdowns during the 2007 season ranked tied for the third-highest single season total in team history.

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE

Tampa Bay's defense ranked in the Top 10 in total defense for nine consecutive seasons from 1997-2005, then the longest streak in the league and tied for the second-longest streak in the NFL since 1970.

After a down year in 2006, the Buccaneers returned to form in 2007, ranking second in the NFL in total defense and first in pass defense, marking the fourth time in team history they led the league in that category. Last season, the Buccaneers again finished in the top 10 in total defense, marking the 11th time in the past 12 seasons. Since 1996, Tampa Bay ranks second in the league in fewest yards allowed.

Even though the team lost its long-time defensive orchestrator, Monte Kiffin, Tampa Bay has reloaded with another defensive guru in Jim Bates, who has nearly four decades of overall coaching experience and is widely regarded as one of the league's top defensive minds. Under Bates, the Bucs will look to continue their tradition of strong defense. Bates has eight years of experience leading NFL defenses, serving as assistant head coach/defense for the Denver Broncos (2007) and as defensive coordinator for the Green Bay Packers (2005), Miami Dolphins (2000-2004) and Atlanta Falcons (1994). He also was the Dolphins' interim head coach for the final seven games of the 2004 season and was Assistant Head Coach/Defensive Line for Dallas (1998-99).

He has guided defenses that have ranked among the NFL's top 10 in overall yards allowed during six of his eight years leading a defense. A total of 12 players have earned 23 Pro Bowl honors under Bates during his 16 years as a coach in the NFL.

Last season, the Buccaneers recorded 30 takeaways (22 interceptions, eight fumble recoveries), while turning the ball over 26 times (13 and 13). That plus-4 turnover ratio helped Tampa Bay become one of the NFL's best takeaway/giveaway teams of the past decade. Since 1999, the Buccaneers have posted a turnover differential of plus-53. The Buccaneers are also one of only two NFC teams to rank in the top 5 of turnover margin during this span.

With the return the talented S **Tanard Jackson** to the starting lineup, the Buccaneers defense returned to one of its calling cards, scoring on defense. In his second game of the season in the Week 6 matchup against Carolina, Jackson picked off a QB Jake Delhomme pass and returned it 26 yards for a touchdown to tie the game in the fourth quarter. It marked Jackson's first interception of the season and first career touchdown. Coupled with WR Sammie Stroughter's 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown against Carolina, the Buccaneers have picked up where they left off in 2008 when they had one of the most successful seasons in team history in return touchdowns.

MAKING A SPLASH



In his first season as an full time starter, third-year S **Sabby Piscitelli** is showing early signs of success and has continued to show he knows how to make a "splash" play on defense.

In Week 2 at Buffalo (9/20), Piscitelli had a career game, recording a career-high nine tackles along with a 72-yard fumble return late in the second quarter, the third-longest in team history and the longest non-scoring fumble return in team history. The play led to a Buccaneers touchdown, cutting the Bills lead to 20-14. Piscitelli now has the third-longest fumble return and third-longest interception return (84 yards vs. Oakland, 12/28/08) in team history, with both marking the longest non-scoring fumble and interception returns in team history.

Piscitelli currently ranks third on the team in tackles with 40 including one tackle for loss to go along with one interception, one pass defended and one fumble recovery.

After missing most of the 2007 season due to injury, Piscitelli made his presence known in Week 2 of the 2008 season against Atlanta (9/14), recording his first career interception and his first career forced fumble on special teams. He finished with 59 tackles, including one TFL, on the season with eight passes defended. In Week 9 at Kansas City, Piscitelli earned his first career start tying his then career high with eight tackles and one pass defended.

2009 NFL DRAFT



The Buccaneers made six selections in the 2009 NFL Draft. Below is a look at the new members of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

QB **Josh Freeman** was selected in the first round (17th overall) of the 2009 NFL Draft by the Buccaneers. Freeman was the highest quarterback selected by the Buccaneers, since Trent Dilfer was selected in the first round (sixth overall) of the 1994 NFL Draft. He is the first-ever quarterback drafted in the first round out of Kansas State and just the fifth Wildcat overall to be selected in the first round. Freeman started 32-of-35 games during his three collegiate years, collecting 8,078 yards passing, which shattered the previous school career-record of 6,208 yards by Lynn Dickey (1968-70). His 680 pass completions also broke Dickey's old KSU all-time mark of 501. Freeman set the KSU career record for touchdown passes, after throwing for 44 touchdowns. He also ran for 20 touchdowns, which ranks tied for ninth in school history. In 2007, he was an All-Big 12 Conference honorable mention.

DT **Roy Miller** was selected in the third round (81st overall) of the 2009 NFL Draft. Miller was the highest defensive tackle selected by the Buccaneers, since Anthony McFarland, from Louisiana State, was selected in the first round (15th overall) in the 1999 NFL Draft. He is the sixth defensive tackle selected by the Buccaneers in the past 10 seasons. Miller played in 49 career games with 19 starts at the University of Texas, where he recorded 138 tackles, 10 sacks, six passes defended, one forced fumble, and one fumble recovery. In 2008, he was named Fiesta Bowl Defensive MVP in Texas' victory over Ohio State with three tackles, one tackle for loss, and one sack. He was also tabbed first-team All-Big 12 by the league's coaches.

DE **Kyle Moore** was selected in the fourth round (117th overall) of the 2009 NFL Draft. Moore was the second defensive end selected by the Buccaneers in the previous three seasons. Buccaneers

DE Gaines Adams was selected in the first round (fourth overall) in the 2007 NFL Draft. Moore started 24 games during his career at the University of Southern California, recording 76 tackles with seven sacks, two interceptions, eight passes defended, one forced fumble, and one fumble recovery. In his senior season, Moore was named the squad's Most Inspirational Player, and also received an honorable mention in the All-Pac 10 Conference.

T **Xavier Fulton**, who will spend the season on Injured Reserve, was selected in the fifth round (155th overall) of the 2009 NFL Draft. Fulton was the seventh tackled drafted by the Buccaneers in the past 10 seasons. In 2006, the Buccaneers drafted T Jeremy Trueblood in the second round (59th overall). Fulton was the first player selected from the University of Illinois by the Buccaneers since FB Jameel Cook was selected in the sixth round (174th overall) of the 2001 NFL Draft. The team also continued the trend of drafting at least one offensive lineman every year for the past 16 years. Fulton earned second-team All-Big Ten Conference honors in 2007 and 2008.

CB **E.J. Biggers**, who will spend the season on Injured Reserve, was selected in the seventh round (217th overall) of the 2009 NFL Draft. Biggers was the ninth cornerback taken by the Buccaneers in the past 10 seasons. Last year, the Buccaneers selected CB Aqib Talib in the first round (20th overall) in the NFL Draft. Biggers was the first player from Western Michigan University ever to be drafted by the Buccaneers. In 2008, Biggers gained Second-Team All-MAC honors after starting all 13 games. At WMU, had a streak of interceptions in three straight games (Temple, Ohio, and Northern Illinois).

WR **Sammie Stroughter** was selected in the seventh round (233rd overall) of the 2009 NFL Draft. Stroughter was the 12th wide receiver taken by the Buccaneers in the past 10 seasons. In 2008, Stroughter was named to the Pac-10 First Team. He finished third at Oregon State University for career receptions (164) and yards (2,653). He set the school record for punt returns (127) and yards (1,235) and scored a school record three punts for touchdowns. His 4,299 career all-purpose yards ranks fourth all time at OSU.

The Buccaneers have secured a total of 10 draft picks in the 2010 NFL Draft after sending DE Gaines Adams to Chicago for a 2010 second-round draft choice. The reshaping of Tampa Bay's roster will continue in 2010 with the Bucs' 10 picks following a 2009 NFL Draft in which the Buccaneers had six selections.

The Buccaneers began compiling 2010 draft picks before the 2008 season when they sent DE Marques Douglas to Baltimore for a 2009 seventh-round pick (233rd overall, WR Sammie Stroughter) and a 2010 seventh-round pick. The Bucs continued to stockpile picks this April after trading TE Alex Smith to the New England Patriots for a fifth-round selection on April 30, 2009. Tampa Bay added one more selection after trading QB Luke McCown to Jacksonville on September 5, 2009 in exchange for a conditional draft pick in 2010.

Add in the team auditorium, media work room and studio, a remarkably-equipped team dining room and countless other features and you have, hands down, the best facility in the NFL.

"The new facility gives our players, coaches and staff an unparalleled environment in which to work," said Buccaneers Co-Chairman Joel Glazer.

The signature of the facility is its spectacular entrance, which is adorned with the world's largest football. The sleek steel-and-glass construct is five stories tall, point to point, and angles against the main building as if it were on a tee, ready to start the game.

The two-story main building stretches away to both sides of the football, fronted by appealing walls of glass that call to mind the most notable exterior feature of Raymond James Stadium. Inside, the building is state-of-the-art in every way, from the rehabilitation pools in the training room to fully-integrated video equipment in every meeting room and coach's office. It is, simply, the ideal place to build a championship football team.





PLAYOFF EXPERIENCE



The Buccaneers' seven playoff appearances from 1997-08 are tied for the third-most in the NFL and their six postseason berths since 1999 are also tied for third-best in the league. The franchise advanced to the postseason just three times in the previous 19 years (1976-1994) prior to the purchase of the team by the Glazer Family.

On special teams, S **Will Allen** will bear the captains "C."

"I'm very proud of our captains," said Tampa Bay Buccaneers head coach **Raheem Morris**. "When you're voting on captains, you pick the guys who have been doing the right things. The right things on and off the field. The right things with the media. The right things in the classroom. To be named a captain, you need to earn the respect of your teammates."

BUC SHOTS



Below are accomplishments and milestones reached throughout the season.

DALLAS (9/13): CB Ronde Barber recorded the 24th sack of his career on the opening drive of the game... His 24 career sacks are the most all-time in the NFL among cornerbacks and the most in the NFL among active defensive backs... With his start, Barber has started in 152 consecutive games... It is the most consecutive starts at cornerback in the NFL among current players... Barber also has the third-most consecutive games started among all active players... RB Carnell Williams scored his 15th career rushing touchdown in the second quarter, giving the Buccaneers a 7-6 lead... With the score, Williams moved into a tie for seventh place for most rushing touchdowns in team history with RB Lars Tate (15 touchdowns from 1988-89)... Williams finished with 13 carries for 97 yards (7.5 avg) and one touchdown, including a 35-yard run, his longest since October 15, 2006 when he had a 38-yard run against the Cincinnati Bengals... With a 47-yard reception at the end of the second quarter, WR Michael Clayton moved into 10th on the Buccaneers all-time receiving yards list... Clayton finished the day with five receptions for 93 yards and now has 2,799 receiving yards with the Buccaneers, surpassing Courtney Hawkins (2,744 yards from 1992-96)... RB Derrick Ward scored his first touchdown with the Buccaneers and the sixth of his career in the fourth quarter... Ward finished the afternoon with 12 carries for 62 yards (5.2 avg.) and one touchdown along with two catches for 21 yards... TE Kellen Winslow scored his first touchdown with the Buccaneers and the 12th of his career in the fourth quarter... Winslow finished the afternoon with five catches for 30 yards and one touchdown and one rush for seven yards... Buccaneers third-year LB Quincy Black made his first career start... Rookies C Jonathan Compas, DT Roy Miller and WR Sammie Stroughter and first-year players DT Dre Moore and CB Kyle Arrington played in their first career NFL games.

AT BUFFALO (9/20): S Sabby Piscitelli recorded a 72-yard fumble return late in the second quarter, the third-longest in team history and the longest non-scoring fumble return in team history... The play led to a Buccaneers touchdown, cutting the Bills lead to 20-14... Piscitelli now has the third-longest fumble return and third-longest interception return (84 yards) in team history, with both marking the longest non-scoring fumble and interception returns in team history... Piscitelli also recorded a career-high nine tackles to go with his first

interception of the season and third of his career... The interception also marked the Buccaneers first interception of the season... RB Carnell Williams scored his first career receiving touchdown in the second quarter on an eight-yard pass from QB Byron Leftwich... Williams finished with a career-high seven receptions for another career-high 56 yards receiving... His seven receptions also tied for a team and game-high... With his 42-yard touchdown pass to TE Kellen Winslow in the second quarter, QB Byron Leftwich surpassed 10,000 career passing yards... Leftwich finished the afternoon 26-of-50 passing for 296 yards, three touchdowns and two interceptions... The three touchdown passes tied his career-high, which was first set at Tennessee (11/20/05) while he was with the Jacksonville Jaguars... TE Kellen Winslow finished tied for a team-high seven receptions for a team and game-high 90 yards receiving, including a 42-yard touchdown reception... Winslow's 42-yard reception was the second-longest of his career... With 111 kickoff return yards, RB Clifton Smith moved into 10th place for most kickoff return yards in team history, surpassing Bobby Joe Edmonds (1,147 from 1985)... In his second career start, LB Quincy Black tied a career-high with five tackles... P Dirk Johnson recorded a 63-yard punt in third quarter, the longest punt of his career... His previous career long was 62 yards in 2004 when he was with the Philadelphia Eagles... QB Josh Johnson saw action in his first NFL game.

N.Y. GIANTS (9/27): The 30-year age difference between Head Coach Raheem Morris (33) and Giants Head Coach Tom Coughlin (63) marked just the second time in the past 10 seasons that two head coaches have faced one another with a gap of at least 30 years... The last time it happened was November 4, 2007 when Joe Gibbs (66) of the Washington Redskins faced Eric Mangini (36) of the New York Jets... With 56 kickoff return yards on two returns (28.0 avg.), RB Clifton Smith moved into ninth place for most kickoff return yards in team history, surpassing Karl Williams (1,227 from 1996-03)... Second-year player



QB Josh Johnson played in his second career game and made his first appearance at quarterback... He finished 4-of-10 for 36 yards passing and also had one rush for 15 yards... In his first start since the 2006 season, S Will Allen totaled a career-high 13 tackles... In his third career start, LB Quincy Black recorded a new career-high six tackles... LB Barrett Ruud led the team with his second-best career total of 19 tackles... DE/DT Jimmy Wilkerson recorded a new career-high with six tackles... The Buccaneers were held to five total first downs against the N.Y. Giants... It tied for the fewest offensive first downs in team history, also against Green Bay (12/1/85) and against San Diego (9/19/76)... Tampa Bay recorded 86 yards of total offense, the third-lowest single-game total in franchise history... The Buccaneers were shutout for the first time since opening day in 2006 when they fell to the Baltimore Ravens 27-0 (9/10/06).

AT WASHINGTON (10/4): CB Aqib Talib tied the Buccaneers single-game record with three interceptions, also marking the first multi-interception game of his career... Talib recorded his first interception of the season in the first quarter and followed it up with his second in the second quarter and third in the fourth quarter... With the interceptions, Talib became just the second player in Buccaneers history to record three interceptions in a game, joining CB Ronde Barber, who has accomplished the feat twice (three interceptions at New Orleans, 12/4/05 and at New Orleans, 12/23/01)... The Buccaneers forced four turnovers, the first time the team has had four or more forced turnovers since September 28, 2008 against Green Bay... After entering the game with three sacks on the year, the Buccaneers quickly added to their sack total, recording back-to-back sacks on the second and third plays of the game by DE Gaines Adams and DE/DT Jimmy Wilkerson, and another by LB Quincy Black in the second quarter... DE Gaines Adams recorded his first sack of the season and one play later, recorded his first career fumble recovery, setting up a Buccaneers touchdown... DE/DT Jimmy Wilkerson recorded his second sack of the season in the first quarter, also forcing a fumble to set up a Buccaneers touchdown... In his first career start, QB Josh Johnson threw his first career touchdown pass on the first offensive possession of the day... The touchdown was an eight-yard pass to WR Antonio Bryant... With the start, Johnson (23 years, 142 days old) became the youngest quarterback to make his first start for the Buccaneers since Shaun King (22 years, 191 days old) on December 6, 1999 against Minnesota (a 24-17 win)... Johnson finished 13-of-22 passing for 106 yards with one touchdown and one interception to go with 41 yards rushing on seven carries (5.9 avg.)... WR Antonio Bryant

scored his first receiving touchdown of the year and the 27th of his career on an eight-yard pass from QB Josh Johnson... Bryant finished tied for a team-high with four receptions for another team-high 44 yards receiving and one touchdown... The touchdown reception by WR Antonio Bryant marked the first time the Buccaneers have scored in the first quarter this season... By scoring first, it also marked the first time in the last 12 games that the Buccaneers have scored first in a game, dating back to their game at Dallas (10/26/08) last season... CB Ronde Barber blocked the first PAT of his career in the third quarter, helping the Bucs hold a 10-9 advantage... It was the first PAT blocked by the Buccaneers since DE Gaines Adams blocked an Adam Vinatieri attempt at Indianapolis (10/7/07)... Barber has now notched a blocked PAT, blocked punt (12/2/01 at Cincinnati) and blocked field goal (10/19/03 vs. San Francisco) during his career... LB Quincy Black recorded the first sack of his career in the second quarter... RB Carnell Williams led the team in rushing yards for the second time this season, totaling 77 yards on 16 attempts (4.8 avg.)... He added four receptions, tied for tops on the team, for 22 yards... With 62 kickoff return yards on two returns (31.0 avg.), RB Clifton Smith moved into eighth place for most kickoff return yards in team history, surpassing George Ragsdale (1,298 from 1977-79)... CB Elbert Mack made his first career start as Tampa Bay opened the game with three cornerbacks.

AT PHILADELPHIA (10/11): DE/DT Jimmy Wilkerson set a new career-high with three sacks... Wilkerson's previous career-high was two sacks at Detroit on November 23, 2008... He was also the first Buccaneer to record three sacks in a game since Simeon Rice against New Orleans (12/19/04)... On his second sack of the day, Wilkerson also forced a fumble, the third of his career and the second time in as many weeks he has forced a fumble on a sack... TE Kellen Winslow recorded a nine-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter and another nine-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter, tying his career-high for receiving touchdowns (first on November 6, 2008 while with Cleveland against the Denver Broncos)... Winslow also recorded the fifth 100-yard receiving game of his career, and first as a Buccaneer, totaling a team-high nine receptions for 102 yards and two touchdowns... His nine receptions were the most in a game by a Buccaneer this season and also marked the second-best single-game performance by a tight end in team history... WR Antonio Bryant recorded a season-high five catches for 62 yards, including a season-long 31-yard reception in the second quarter... QB Josh Johnson finished a late second-quarter drive 4-for-4 passing for 75 yards, including a

nine-yard touchdown pass to TE Kellen Winslow to culminate the drive... Johnson finished the afternoon 26-of-50 for 240 yards passing with two touchdowns and three interceptions, all career-highs... He also had 40 yards rushing on five attempts (8.0 avg.) in the game... RB Derrick Ward recorded a season-long 28-yard run during a Buccaneers two-minute drive finishing the afternoon with 37 yards on six carries... Rookie WR Sammie Stroughter tied his career high with three receptions... On two of his receptions, Stroughter converted third-downs into first downs... The Buccaneers recorded a successful onside kick attempt that was recovered by CB Elbert Mack... It was the first successful onside kick for Tampa Bay since December 16, 2007 against Atlanta, when Buccaneers S Calvin Pearson recovered the attempt... With an 18-yard reception in the third quarter, WR Michael Clayton surpassed Lawrence Dawsey (2,842 yards from 1991-95) for ninth on the Buccaneers all-time receiving yards list... He finished the day with three receptions for 25 yards receiving... Off a deflected pass, T Donald Penn recorded the first pass reception of his career, running 15 yards for a first down... K Shane Andrus converted the first two PATs of his career in the NFL... Late in the fourth quarter, RB Carnell Williams was tackled in the end zone for a safety... It was the first safety allowed by the Buccaneers since December 2, 2007 at New Orleans when QB Luke McCown was sacked in the end zone.

CAROLINA (10/18): With 2:17 left in the third quarter WR Sammie Stroughter, replacing an injured Clifton Smith, recorded a 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown, tying the longest kickoff return in team history (also Smith at Kansas City, 11/2/08)... The return marked the third straight year the Buccaneers have recorded a kickoff return for a touchdown... In the Buccaneers first 497 games they had zero kickoff returns for touchdowns and have since had three in the past 25 games... Stroughter finished with 142 return yards and a touchdown on three returns... In the first quarter, Stroughter also recorded a career-long 29-yard reception on the team's opening drive... The reception came on a third-and-long and helped the Buccaneers continue on a touchdown scoring drive... Stroughter finished the day tying his career high with three receptions for a career and team-high 65 yards receiving... Midway through the fourth quarter S Tanard Jackson recorded a 26-yard interception return for a touchdown tying the game at 21-21... The interception was his first of the season and the fourth of his career while the touchdown was the first of his career... On the team's opening drive, RB Carnell Williams recorded a 20-yard rushing touchdown, his second of the season and the 16th of his career tying him with RB Ricky Bell (16 from 1977-81) for the sixth-

most rushing touchdowns in team history... Williams finished the afternoon with 16 carries for 77 yards and the touchdown... In the second quarter, G Davin Joseph blocked a 52-yard field goal attempt by Panthers K John Kasay... It was the first blocked kick of Joseph's career and the first blocked field goal by the Buccaneers since December 24, 2006 when T Jeb Terry blocked a 31-yard attempt by Phil Dawson in Tampa Bay's 22-7 victory at Cleveland... After starting the third game of his career and the first since 2007, DE Stylez G. White recorded his first sack of the season and the 14th of his career... White also tied his career-high with seven tackles... LB Barrett Ruud recorded his first interception of the season and the fifth of his career in the third quarter... Playing in his 183rd game, CB Ronde Barber tied T Paul Gruber (183 from 1988-99) for the third-most games played in club history... After only their second lost fumble of the season, the Buccaneers got the ball back two plays later as S Tanard Jackson forced a fumble that was recovered by DT Ryan Sims... It was Jackson's fourth forced fumble of his career and the second fumble recovery of Sims' career... Before leaving the game with an injury, RB/KR Clifton Smith had one kickoff return for 25 yards moving him past Donnie Elder (1,457 from 1988-89) for seventh place in team history with 1,467 kickoff return yards... In his third career start, QB Josh Johnson finished second on the team with 45 yards rushing on eight carries to go with 11-of-17 passing for 147 yards and one interception... LB Quincy Black set a new career-high with seven tackles... S Sabby Piscitelli tied his career-high with nine tackles... DE/DT Jimmy Wilkerson set a new career-high with seven tackles.

Now in his 13th season with the Buccaneers, CB Ronde Barber is widely regarded as one of the NFL's most versatile cornerbacks. Below is a breakdown of some of Barber's accolades:

- Earned his fifth career Pro Bowl selection in 2008.
- Selected to AP All-Pro team five times, including three first team selections (2001, 2004-05).
- Has collected 100 or more tackles in five of his past six seasons.
- Since joining Tampa Bay, the Buccaneers defense has finished ranked in the Top 10 in the NFL in total defense in 11 of his 12 seasons and in the Top 5 on eight occasions.
- In Week 4 at Washington (10/4/09) blocked the first PAT of his career becoming first player in team history to record a blocked PAT, blocked punt (12/2/01 at Cincinnati) and blocked field goal (10/19/03 vs. San Francisco) during his career.
- In 2005, became the first cornerback in NFL history and just the seventh player all-time to record 20 career interceptions and 20 career sacks when he posted the 20th sack of his career at Carolina (12/11/05). Barber is one of only four players in NFL history to record 20 sacks and 30 interceptions.

- Barber has also evolved into a scoring threat of his own, totaling 13 career TDs (including the postsea-

son), which are the most by a defensive player in team history.

- Barber has 11 career regular season touchdowns on fumble/interception returns, second-most among active players and fourth in NFL history.
- In 2008 at Detroit (11/23) returned an interception 65 yards for a touchdown and in 2007, he returned a fumble 41 yards for a score at Atlanta (11/18) and added an interception return for a score vs. Atlanta (12/16). BACK AT IT



After missing all of the 2007 season, WR **Antonio Bryant** contributed to the 2008 Buccaneers offense in a big way re-establishing himself as one of the premier receivers in the NFL. This season, despite battling a knee injury that forced him to miss Week 2, Bryant still ranks third on the team in receiving yards (141) and receptions (12).

In Week 4 at Washington (10/4), Bryant scored his first receiving touchdown of the year and the 27th of his career on an eight-yard pass from QB Josh Johnson. Bryant finished tied for a team-high with four receptions for another team-high 44 yards receiving and one touchdown. In Week 5 at Philadelphia (10/11) Bryant recorded a season-high five catches for 62 yards, including a season-long 31-yard reception in the second quarter

In his first season with the Buccaneers in 2008, Bryant had a career year. Below is a breakdown of his 2008 season:

- Finished with a career year, leading the team with a career-high 83 receptions for a career-high 1,248 yards (15.0 avg.) and set a career-high with seven touchdowns.
- Finished ranked tied for fourth in the NFC (tied for 11th in NFL) in receptions (83) and sixth in the NFC (eighth in NFL) in receiving yards (1,248). Bryant also helped move the chains on third down, racking up 21 third-down receptions, which tied for 11th-most in the NFC (tied for 22nd in NFL).

BIG STAGE, BIG PERFORMANCE

In his third career appearance on Monday Night Football, WR **Antonio Bryant** had a game for the record books against the Carolina Panthers last season. Bryant recorded nine receptions for a career-high 200 yards and two touchdowns at Carolina in Week 14 (12/8/08). His 200 receiving yards were the second-highest single game total in franchise history, trailing only Mark Carrier's 212 yard performance at New Orleans (12/6/87). Bryant was one of three players in 2008 to record 200 yards receiving (Terrell Owens - 213 yards in Week 12 and Andre Johnson - 207 in Week 15). It was Bryant's fourth career multi-touchdown game and his first since October 9, 2005, when he was a member of the Cleveland Browns.

Bryant recorded three completions over 35 yards, including a 50-yard touchdown in the third quarter and a 52-yard reception in

the second quarter, the team's longest of the season. Bryant also saved his best for last, as he made a diving, one-handed catch in the end zone for his second touchdown of the game, late in the fourth quarter to bring it to a one possession game.

Below is a breakdown of Bryant's other single game highlights in 2008:

- In overtime victory at Chicago in Week 3, caught a team leading and career-high 10 receptions for 138 yards. At the time it was his highest receiving output since he had 170 receiving yards at Washington (12/29/02) in his rookie season with Dallas.
- In Week 7 vs. Seattle, recorded a game-high six receptions for 115 yards and one touchdown. Recorded 47-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter, his first touchdown as a Buccaneer and the longest passing play for the offense of the season at that time.
- In Week 9 at Kansas City (11/2) caught a 24-yard touchdown pass with 19 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter setting up the game-tying two-point conversion. The touchdown was the second as a member of the Buccaneers and the 21st of his career. Finished with eight receptions for 115 yards, including his 24-yard score.
- In Week 15 at Atlanta (12/14), paced Buccaneer receivers, hauling in eight receptions for 108 yards and one touchdown.
- In Week 16 vs. San Diego (12/21), recorded his third consecutive 100-yard receiving game, marking the second most consecutive games with at least 100 yards receiving by a Buccaneer in team history behind only Mark Carrier (4 in 1989). Finished with six receptions for 127 yards including a 71-yard touchdown reception, the longest play from scrimmage for the Buccaneers in 2008. It was his seventh touchdown reception of the season setting a new career high, and it marked his fourth straight game with a touchdown. Bryant also reached 5,000 career receiving yards during the course of the game.

GLAZER CHILDREN'S MUSEUM

The Glazer Family Foundation recently donated \$5 million toward the construction of a new children's museum in Tampa, scheduled to open in 2010. The new Glazer Children's Museum will be a 50,000 square foot non-profit educational and cultural facility.

It will feature a combination of permanent and traveling exhibits, comprehensive year-round programs, and special events. The Museum will offer families a safe, stimulating and playful environment where children and adults can learn about themselves, each other, and the world they live in through exploration and role-playing. Just as importantly, it will serve as an early childhood educational resource for local schools and as a program partner with local and regional family and child service providers.

"Our family is dedicated to enriching the lives of youth in the Tampa Bay area through a variety of programs and grants," said Darcie Glazer Kasewitz, Co-President of the Glazer Family Foundation. "We understand and appreciate the importance of positively shaping the lives of children, which is why we are proud to help finance the construction of this

museum for families throughout West Central Florida to enjoy."

The Glazer Children's Museum will be located along the Hillsborough River in downtown Tampa near the new Tampa Museum of Art and the Tampa Bay Performing Arts Center. A groundbreaking ceremony on March 9, 2009, involving Glazer Kasewitz, Buccaneers Co-Chairman Bryan Glazer, local officials and project supporters marked a 16-month construction and move-in process.



GIVING BACK



In 2009 the Glazer Family Foundation celebrates its 10th year of giving back to charitable and educational causes in the West Central Florida region. In May 2009, the Glazer family was honored with the prestigious Gonzmart Family Ambassador of the Year Award as part of the 26th annual National Tourism Week presented by Tampa Bay & Company. The Ambassador award was presented to the Glazer Family in recognition of their efforts to help the tourism industry in the Bay area as well as their impact on the community overall.

The Glazer family established the foundation in 1999. Since that time, the Glazer Family Foundation has given millions of dollars in programs, grants, tickets and merchandise to the Tampa Bay area. The Glazer Family Foundation aids established not-for-profit organizations that work with youth and families to help identify and create programs that support positive social and economic development within the local communities. Foundation initiatives include:

- **Grant Program:** Each year, the Foundation provides a total of \$50,000 in grant money to non-profit organizations focused on the health, safety, education and recreation of disadvantaged youth.
- **Vision Program:** Since 2006, the Foundation has donated new vision screening equipment to eight local county school systems to help ensure that children in the Tampa Bay area can learn in an environment where vision problems are no longer an obstacle.
- **Youth with Promise:** During each NFL season, the Foundation hosts 100 "Youth with Promise" at every Buccaneers home game. The youth receive this privilege based on achieving goals of incentive programs implemented by community agencies.

• **Cheering You On!:** The Glazer Family Foundation provides all pediatric patients admitted to seven local hospitals with a Tampa Bay Buccaneers stuffed teddy bear and activity book.

• **Make Reading Your Goal:** The Foundation encourages reading among youth by providing area libraries with Buccaneers bookmarks to distribute to children when they check out a book.

• **Enterprise Village:** Sponsored by the Glazer Family Foundation, the Buccaneers store at Enterprise Village allows students to learn about the free enterprise system by applying economic and personal financial concepts in a business simulation.

• **Holiday Program:** Since 2000, the Glazer Family Foundation has helped those less fortunate during the holiday season. Past events have included a holiday party for local charities and a shopping spree for victims of domestic violence.

• **Tampa Bay Sports Commission:** Following every Buccaneers season, the Foundation makes a significant donation to the Tampa Bay Sports Commission for its support of amateur athletic activities in the Tampa Bay area. To date, the Foundation has contributed a total of 883,500 to the Commission.

• **Game Day Drives:** Throughout the season, the Glazer Family Foundation sponsors numerous game day drives where volunteers collect animal supplies, books, food, school supplies, sports equipment and toys from Buccaneers fans outside Raymond James Stadium.

A SUCCESSFUL STORY



On January 16, 1995, **Malcolm Glazer** announced his purchase of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and promised a winner. Now, after more than a decade of owning what once was considered a struggling franchise; Mr. Glazer has more than delivered on his promise. The fortunes have certainly changed drastically for the Buccaneers, who have vaulted from the NFL's basement to the top of the NFL universe under the Glazer Family. The Glazer Family brought Tampa Bay the first Super Bowl title in franchise history with the club's 48-21 victory over the Oakland Raiders in Super Bowl XXXVII on January 26, 2003 in San Diego.

The Buccaneers, who following the 2002 season were making their first appearance in the NFL's championship game, also claimed the first-ever NFC South title in 2002. Tampa Bay reached the playoffs for the fourth straight time in 2002, the only team in the league to head to the postseason all four years (1999-02). The Buccaneers also claimed NFC South Division titles in 2005 and 2007 for the fifth and sixth division crowns in franchise history.

PLAYOFF PUSH



The Buccaneers' seven playoff appearances from 1997-07 are tied for the third-most in the NFL and their six postseason berths since 1999 are also tied for third-best in the league. The franchise advanced to the postseason just three times in the previous 19 years (1976-1994) prior to Glazer's team purchase.

During Glazer's watch, the Buccaneers can boast a 118-112 (.513) regular season record and five playoff wins, easily the most successful stretch in club annals. Tampa Bay also eclipsed the club record for

wins in a regular season with 12 in 2002. In fact, five of the top six single-season win totals in club history (12 in 2002, 11 in 2005, 11 in 1999, 10 in 2000 and 10 in 1997) have come with the Glazers at the helm. Tampa Bay, one of the NFL's top teams over the past several years, owns an 105-93 regular season ledger since the start of the 1997 season, a winning percentage of .530.

The 1999 campaign marked one of the most successful seasons in the club's history. Tampa Bay captured its first division title in 18 years, while posting an 11-5 regular season record and a club-record 7-1 home mark. The Buccaneers reached the NFC Championship Game for then just the second time in franchise history before losing a heartbreaker to the St. Louis Rams. Four years later, Tampa Bay defeated the Philadelphia Eagles 27-10 in the 2002 NFC Championship Game. One week later, the Glazer family would have its first world championship when the Buccaneers defeated the Oakland Raiders 48-21 in Super Bowl XXXVII.

YOUTH AT THE HELM



The Buccaneers decision to tab 33-year-old **Raheem Morris** as the eighth head coach in franchise history fit in with a league-wide hiring theme. The average age of the 11 new coaches in the NFL this year (representing just over a third of all the teams, and including two coaches who finished 2008 in interim roles), is 43.2 years old. Morris is the youngest of the crew.

Morris, in fact, is the fourth-youngest individual hired to coach an NFL team since World War II. He is one of four head coaches currently in the league who have yet to celebrate their 40th birthdays, joining Denver's Josh McDaniels (33), Pittsburgh's Mike Tomlin (37) and Cleveland's (Eric Mangini).

A DEFENSIVE MIND



Ever since Head Coach Raheem Morris joined the Buccaneers staff in 2002 as a defensive quality control coach, the team has consistently ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in total defense and pass defense. In his first season with Tampa Bay the team ranked first in overall defense and pass defense. The one year the Tampa Bay defense failed to rank in the top 10 since 2002 was in 2006 when Morris left the team to become the defensive coordinator at Kansas State. That season the Buccaneers defense ranked 17th, their worst mark since 1995. Morris returned the following year and the defense hasn't looked back since.

THE GRADUATE



For many years, Tampa Bay has continued its longstanding relationship with the NFL's Minority Fellowship Program. The Buccaneers have enjoyed repeated success working with the NFL, both with participants in the program and hiring graduates of the NFL program.

As a part of training camp coaching staffs, the fellowship coaches perform duties that mirror those of full-time NFL assistant coaches. They become working members of NFL staffs for the summer and are responsible for specific assignments, including planning and directing workouts, formulating scrimmage and preseason game strategies, breaking down videotape, and evaluating players. More than 1,300 coaches have worked in the training camps of NFL teams since the program's inception in 1987.

The program was re-named this past offseason after the man who conceived of the idea, Pro Football Hall of Fame coach **Bill Walsh**.

This year, the most recent success story of the program is new Buccaneers Head Coach Raheem Morris. Morris became just the fifth graduate of the program to be named an NFL head coach, joining Herm Edwards (former New York Jets and Kansas City Chiefs head coach), Marvin Lewis (Cincinnati Bengals), Lovie Smith (Chicago Bears) and Mike Tomlin (Pittsburgh Steelers). Morris interned with the New York Jets in 2001 while he was the defensive backs coach at Hofstra University.

Morris is in his seventh season with the Buccaneers and first as Head Coach after re-joining the team following a stint as defensive coordinator at Kansas State University in 2006. Morris, who was a defensive minority intern with the N.Y. Jets in 2001, spent his first four seasons with the Buccaneers as defensive quality control coach (2002), defensive assistant (2003) and assistant defensive backs coach (2004-05). Morris is now one of four active NFL head coaches who have graduated the minority internship

program.

"It was a great opportunity to get in, to get involved with people who were in the NFL world, to establish myself and establish some of the relationships with the people that I met with the Jets," says Morris. "If you're willing to learn, become a sponge, it's awesome. It helped my career tremendously."

BUILDING TOGETHER



Since their hires on January 17, 2009, General Manager Mark Dominik and Head Coach Raheem Morris have set out to build a team not only on the field but off of it in the community as well.

A proud supporter of the United States military, Dominik visited the United States Coast Guard's St. Petersburg Sector in March 2009 to thank troops for their efforts in the search-and-rescue mission of four missing boaters off the coast of West Florida. He is an auxiliary member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 4321 and sponsored and participated in a golf tournament at MacDill Air Force Base to aid in the renovation project for Post 4321 headquarters, which was severely damaged during a fire in October 2007. As General Manager, Dominik volunteered in the 2009 Fashion Funds the Cure fashion show, which benefits the Pediatric Cancer Foundation and recognizes girls and young women diagnosed with cancer. He also participated in events to support the Tampa Bay Sports Commission and Stetson University College of Law.



Dominik visited the United States Coast Guard Sector St. Petersburg to thank the troops for their recent efforts in the search-and-rescue mission for four missing boaters off the coast of West Florida.

The mission, which made national headlines, focused on the recovery of two former Buccaneer players, Marquis Cooper and Corey Smith, and former University of South Florida players Will Bleakley

and Nick Schuyler. Schuyler, the only survivor, was found clinging to the group's capsized vessel by the Coast Guard nearly 40 miles southwest of Clearwater on March 2.

Morris, meanwhile has focused his community efforts on education and promoting the importance of academics amongst Bay area youth. Recently, Morris started his Be the Ultimate Character Student (BUCS) program, an education initiative for Hillsborough and Pinellas County students. Following each Buccaneers home game, Morris will host a video podcast to air in middle and high schools as well as on Buccaneers.com that will address education, leadership, determination and character. He spoke at a rally at Middleton High School in Tampa to encourage students to study and prepare for the FCAT in March 2009. Along with CB Ronde Barber, he participated in the grand opening of the First Tee Learning Center at Tampa's Rogers Park Golf Course in March 2009. In May 2009, Morris was a guest speaker and presented awards to Hillsborough County teachers at the annual SERVE awards, which pay tribute to public school teachers for excellence in the classroom. In addition, he hosted a group of students from Madison Middle School for a private tour of One Buccaneer Place as a reward for positive behavior and improved performance in the classroom in May 2009.

Morris served as a celebrity guest at the Alstott Celebrity Outdoor Weekend in April 2009 to benefit the Children's Cancer Center, and was a celebrity guest at the fourth Annual Dick Vitale Gala to benefit the V Foundation for cancer research in May 2009. He also participated in the Barrett Ruud-Pewter Report Charity Golf Tournament in May 2009 to benefit the American Heart Association, and the ninth Annual Derrick Brooks Celebrity Golf Classic in June 2009 to benefit Derrick Brooks Charities. This past June, he served as the keynote speaker at the Lauren's First and Goal Football Camp at the University of South Florida, which raised funds for Pediatric Brain Tumor research. Morris filmed a PSA in 2009 for Project Pressure, a campaign that aims to reduce high blood pressure throughout the community by increasing Blood Pressure awareness and Cardiovascular Risk awareness.

Morris visited Middleton High School on the eve of this year's round of FCATs (Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test), a required statewide test that is extremely important to the academic progression of every student. The students thought they were gathering for a speech from school

Principal Carl Green, but Green surprised them instead by bringing Morris onto the stage to lead a motivational rally.

Since opening in 1998, Raymond James Stadium has drawn rave reviews as one of the best playing surfaces in the National Football League. Tampa Bay's home stadium has ranked as the top turf in the League in five of the previous six surveys, earning top honors in 1998, 2000, 2002, 2004 and 2006. In 2008, RJS was rated as having the second-best natural grass field. For the 2008 survey, the NFL Players Association polled 1,565 active players from all 32 teams.

SUPER BOWL XLIII



The Super Bowl returned to the Tampa Bay area on February 1, 2009, when Raymond James Stadium hosted the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Arizona Cardinals for Super Bowl XLIII. The game marked the fourth time that Tampa has hosted the world's premier sporting event, and second time that the game had been played at RJS. Super Bowls XVIII and XXV were played in Tampa Stadium, and Super Bowl XXXV was played at RJS.

Super Bowl XLIII - On February 1, 2009, the Pittsburgh Steelers defeated the Arizona Cardinals 27-23

in dramatic fashion before 70,774 fans at Raymond James Stadium. Santonio Holmes earned MVP honors after scoring the game winning touchdown on a six-yard pass from QB Ben Roethlisberger with 35 second left in the game. LB James Harrison also contributed to the win recording a 100-yard interception return for a touchdown, the longest scoring play in Super Bowl history. Approximately 98.7 million people watched Super Bowl XLIII, making it the most watched Super Bowl ever.

Super Bowl XXXV - On January 28, 2001, the Baltimore Ravens defeated the New York Giants 34-7 before 71,921 at Raymond James Stadium. Baltimore's LB Ray Lewis led a suffocating defense and was named MVP.

Super Bowl XXV - On January 27, 1991, the New York Giants defeated the Buffalo Bills 20-19 before 78,813 at Tampa Stadium. New York's RB Ottis Anderson rushes for 102 yards and one TD and was named MVP.

Super Bowl XVIII - On January 22, 1984, the L.A. Raiders defeated the Washington Redskins 38-9 before 72,920 at Tampa Stadium. Los Angeles' RB Marcus Allen rushed for a Super Bowl-record 191 yards and was named MVP.

HOME SWEET HOME



Since Raymond James Stadium opened in 1998, Tampa Bay owns an impressive 58-33 record in the regular season and a 2-2 mark in the playoffs. Tampa Bay's 58-33 home record since the start of the 1998 season is ninth-best in the NFL. All 95 regular season and postseason contests played at Raymond James Stadium have been sellouts.

In 2008, the Buccaneers finished 6-2 at home, winning their first six home games of the year for the first time in team history.

Over the past three seasons, the Buccaneers are 12-7 at home and have recorded a plus-21 turnover margin.

The team record for consecutive regular season home victories is eight, accomplished during the 1999-2000 seasons. Tampa Bay won its final seven home contests in 1999 and its first home game in 2000 before the streak was snapped in a 21-17 loss to the N.Y. Jets (9/24/00). The best home record in team history came in 1999 when the team finished 7-1 at Raymond James Stadium.

The Bucs have won 25 of the last 40 regular season games at RJS, outscoring opponents 857-664 in those games (609-322 in the last 25 wins).



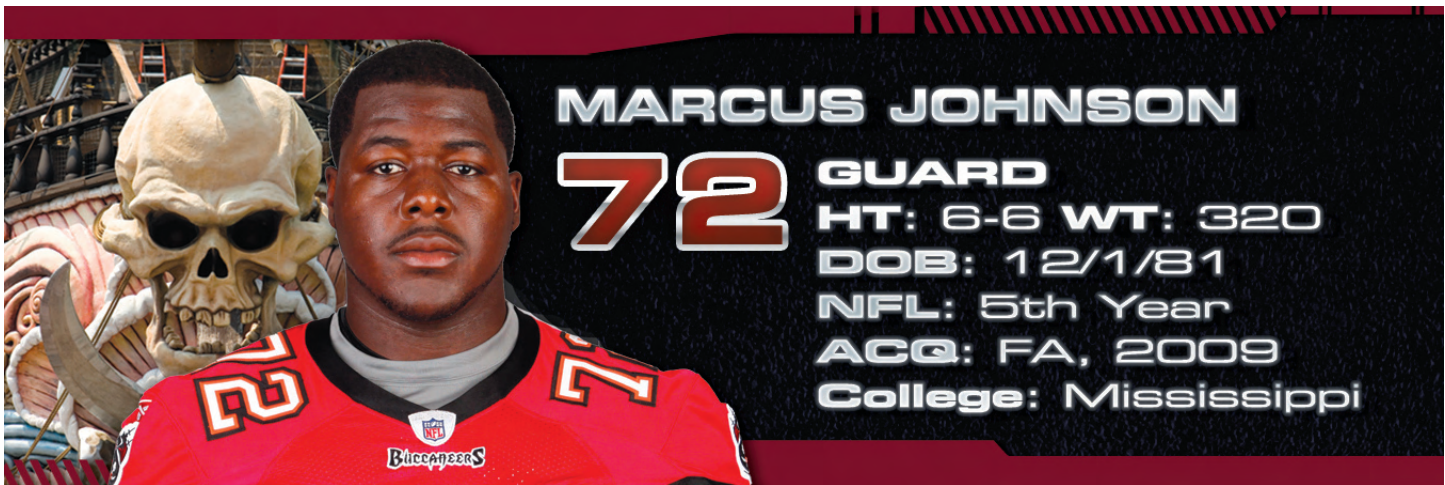
