MATCHUP PREVIEW

The **Denver Broncos (7-2)** return home on a league-lead-tying six-game win streak to battle their divisional rival the **Las Vegas Raiders (2-6)** on *Thursday Night Football* at Empower Field at Mile High (6:15 p.m. MST, Prime Video). This is the first time the foes have faced each other this season after the Broncos won both contests last year.



Thursday also marks the second primetime game this season for the Broncos and the first Thursday night game in Denver since 2022.

HOME COOKING

The Broncos own the longest active home winning streak in the NFL with nine straight wins at Empower Field at Mile High dating back to Week 8 of last season. This marks the club's longest home winning streak since 2014-15, when it logged 11 straight wins in Denver.

The Broncos also own an overall league-high-tying six-game win streak, the longest by the club since 2015 (7 games).

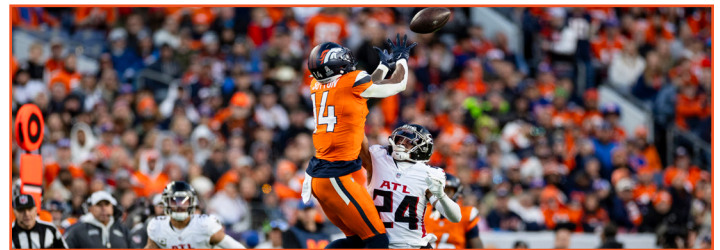

Cornerback Pat Surtain II was named the top defensive player in the NFL in 2024 when he was named the Associated Press Defensive Player of the Year. He became just the seventh cornerback in league history—and first since 2019—to be named the top defensive player of the season.

Additionally, he became just the second player in team history to earn the honor, joining Pro Football Hall of Fame linebacker Randy Gradishar, who was named Defensive Player of the Year in 1978.

On the season, he started all 16 games played and totaled 45 tackles (34 solo), four interceptions (132 yds., 1 TD), 11 passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. Additionally, he allowed the fewest passing yards (306) and second-lowest passer rating when targeted (59.1) among cornerbacks with at least 375 coverage snaps per *NextGen Stats*.

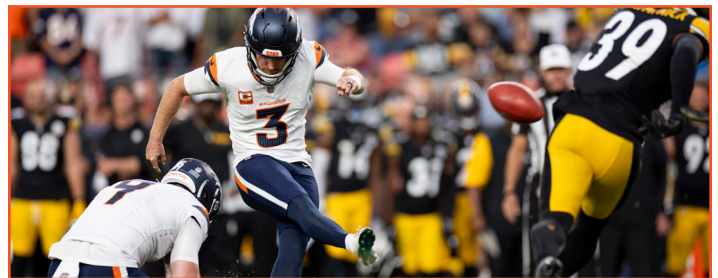
