MATCHUP PREVIEW

After clinching a berth in the 2025 NFL Playoffs in Week 15, the **Denver Broncos (12-2)** finish off their two-game home stand as they face the **Jacksonville Jaguars (10-4)** on Sunday at Empower Field at Mile High (2:05 p.m. MST, FOX). The first meeting between the clubs since 2022, the Broncos lead the all-time regular-season series 7-6.



The Broncos also look to win their 13th game of the season, which would be the most by the club since 2013 (13 wins).

BRONCOS RACKING UP THE WINS

The Broncos have the longest active winning streak in the NFL with 11 straight wins dating back to Week 4 against Cincinnati. This marks the club's longest winning streak in a single season since 2012, when it logged 11 straight wins.

The Broncos also own the longest active home winning streak in the NFL with 12 consecutive victories at Empower Field at Mile High.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR VS. JAGUARS

TEAM (7-6 all-time record vs. Jacksonville; 3-3 at home)

* - Needs a win to improve to 8-6 overall and 4-3 at home in the all-time series against the Jaguars.

TEAM (11 straight wins)

* - Needs a win on Sunday to win 12 consecutive games in a single season for the first time since 1998 (13 games).

TEAM (12 straight home wins)

* - Needs a win on Sunday to win 13 straight home games for the first time since 2012-13 (13 games).

TEAM (12-2 record in first 14 games)

* - Needs a win on Sunday to start the season with a 13-2 record for the first time since 1998.

OLB NIK BONITTO (12.5 sacks in 2025)

* - Needs one sack to become the second player in team history to reach 13.5 sacks in back-to-back seasons, joining DE Simon Fletcher (1991-93).

RB RJ HARVEY (10 touchdowns in 2025)

* - Needs one touchdown to take sole possession for the third-most touchdowns by a rookie running back in team history.

QB BO NIX (23 passing touchdowns in 2025)

* - Needs two passing touchdowns to become the fourth quarterback in NFL history to back for 25 touchdowns in each of his first two seasons.

WR COURTLAND SUTTON (886 receiving yards in 2025)

* - Needs 114 receiving yards to become the first Bronco since Emmanuel Sanders (2014-16) and Demaryius Thomas (2012-16) to reach 1,000 receiving yards in back-to-back seasons.

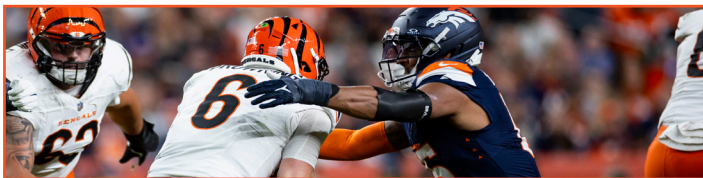

'MARVELOUS' MARV AN ALL-PRO AGAIN

In his second season in the NFL, wide receiver Marvin Mims Jr. earned his second All-Pro honor by the Associated Press as a returner. He became the fourth Bronco in team history to be named an All-Pro by the AP as a returner and the first Bronco since wide receiver Rick Upchurch to be named an All-Pro as a returner in consecutive seasons.

Additionally, Mims became just the second player in team history to be named All-Pro by the AP in each of his first two NFL seasons, joining tackle Ryan Clady (2008-09).

MIMS BACK IN ORLANDO



Selected by the Broncos in the second round (63rd overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft, wide receiver Marvin Mims Jr. posted impressive numbers as a returner in his second season in the NFL. He totaled 26 punt returns for 408 yards (15.7 avg.) and seven kickoff returns for 194 yards (27.7 avg.).

Mims' efforts in 2024 earned him his second consecutive Pro Bowl selection. He became the third Bronco to receive a Pro Bowl nod as a return specialist and the second player in team history to be named to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two seasons.

MIMS SHOWS EXPLOSIVENESS ON RETURNS



Since his rookie campaign in 2023, wide receiver Marvin Mims Jr. has been one of the best kick returners in the NFL, averaging 16.1 yards per punt return and 26.8 yards per kickoff return. His 16.1 yards per punt return is the highest in team history among players with at least 10 returns while his 26.8 kickoff return average is the third highest among Broncos with at least 15 returns.

In Week 14 against Las Vegas, wide receiver Marvin Mims Jr. recorded his first career punt return touchdown and second career return score after bringing back a punt 48 yards to the end zone. Mims became just the fourth Bronco to record at least one punt return touchdown and

one kickoff return touchdown within his first three seasons.

Additionally, his punt return score was the first by a Bronco since Diontae Spencer (83 yards) in 2020 and is just the seventh punt return score by a Bronco since 2010.

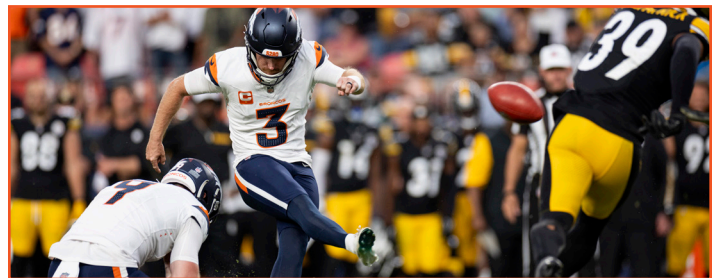
REACHING 1,000
