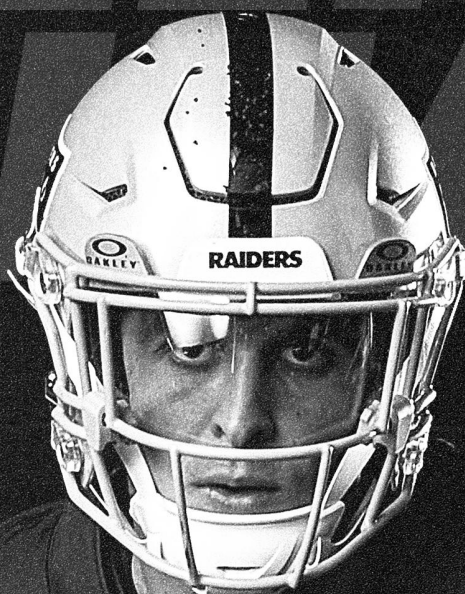

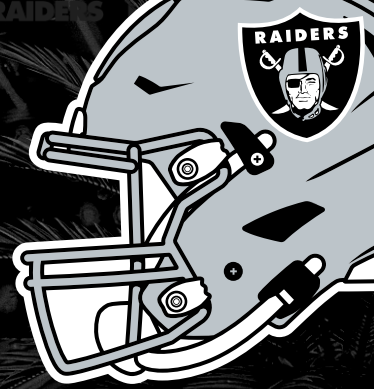

2026 OPPONENTS

Alongside the traditional six games against their AFC West opponents, the Raiders will face the AFC East (Patriots, Bills, Dolphins, and Jets) and the NFC West (Seahawks, Rams, 49ers and Cardinals). The schedule is rounded out by the same-place finishers in the AFC North, AFC South and NFC South. Those teams — the Browns, Titans and Saints — finished fourth in their division.

KLINT KUBIAK

Klint Kubiak was named Head Coach of the Las Vegas Raiders on Feb. 9, 2026, joining the Silver and Black after serving as the offensive coordinator for the Seattle Seahawks' 2025 championship campaign. Kubiak, whose father, Gary, was an NFL quarterback and long-time head coach for the Houston Texans and Denver Broncos, enters his 13th season in the NFL and 17th overall in the professional and collegiate coaching ranks.

In 2025, Kubiak was instrumental in helping lead the Seahawks to a 14-3 record, an NFC West Division title, and a Super Bowl LX victory. In his lone season in Seattle, he guided an offense that ranked third in the NFL in scoring (28.4 points per game), eighth in total offense (351.4 yards per game), eighth in passing (236.5 yards per game) and sixth in average yards per play (5.9 yards per play). The Seahawks' offense set franchise records for most points scored in a single season (483) and largest point differential (+191), while also ranking first in the league in most 30-point halves (5), most games with 30+ points including playoffs (9), and most games with 35+ points including playoffs (7).

Under Kubiak's tutelage, QB Sam Darnold was named to his second career Pro Bowl after completing 67.7 percent of his passes for 4,048 yards, 25 touchdowns and 14 interceptions. His 67.7 completion percentage was the seventh-best mark in the NFL and the highest rate in a single season of his career. WR Jaxon Smith-Njigba had 119 catches for a league-high 1,793 yards to go along with 10 touchdowns, earning first-team All-Pro honors and being named the NFL's Offensive Player of the Year. The Seattle rushing attack also excelled under Kubiak, improving from the 28th-best rushing offense in the NFL in 2024 (95.7 rush yards per game) to the 10th best run game in the league last season (123.3 avg.). RB Kenneth Walker III rushed for 1,027 yards and five touchdowns while RB Zach Charbonnet recorded 12 rushing touchdowns (tied 6th-most in the NFL) and career highs in carries (184) and yards (730).

In 2024, Kubiak served as the offensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints where he utilized three starting quarterbacks due to injuries. Starter Derek Carr was limited to 10 games, with backups Spencer Rattler and Jake Haener starting the remaining seven games. WR Chris Olave recorded 32 receptions for 400 yards in only eight games. Kubiak relied on RB Alvin Kamara, who set a career high with 950 yards on 228 carries, the second most of his career, while adding six rushing touchdowns. Kamara also led the team in receptions (68) for 543 yards, second most on the team, with two touchdowns.

As the San Francisco 49ers offensive passing game specialist in 2023, Kubiak played a pivotal role in the passing game of the 49ers. San Francisco finished the regular season ranked second in the NFL in total offense (398.4 avg.), including fourth in net passing yards per game (257.9). They finished first in the league in red zone touchdown percentage (67.2), fourth in third down conversion percentage (47.5) and were tied for the sixth-fewest turnovers in the NFL. Pro Bowl QB Brock Purdy completed 308 of 444 (69.4 percent) passes for 4,280 yards with 21 touchdowns and 11 interceptions for a league-best 113.0 passer rating, and an NFL-best 123.8 in the fourth quarter. Including Purdy, five offensive 49ers were selected to the Pro Bowl and four as Associated Press All-Pros (TE George Kittle, FB Kyle Juszczyk, RB Christian McCaffrey and T Trent Williams).

In 2022, Kubiak served as offensive passing game coordinator/quarterbacks coach for the Denver Broncos, after coaching three seasons with the Minnesota Vikings (2019-21), the first two seasons as quarterbacks coach and one year as offensive coordinator. In 2021, the Vikings offense finished 12th in the NFL in total offense (362.8 avg.) and 11th in net passing yards per game (249.3), while tying for the fewest interceptions (7) and total giveaways (13). WR Justin Jefferson finished with 108 receptions for 1,616 yards with 10 touchdowns, finishing ranked in the top 10 in all three major receiving categories, earning AP All-Pro honors. QB Kirk Cousins added the third season of his career with 4,000-or-more passing yards and 30-or-more touchdown passes, as he was named to his third Pro Bowl. Pro Bowl RB Dalvin Cook carried 249 times for 1,259 yards with six touchdowns and caught 34 passes for 224 yards. Under Kubiak's tutelage in 2020, Cousins passed for 4,265 yards with 35 touchdowns, a 67.6 completion percentage and 105.0 passer rating, while the Vikings ranked fourth in the NFL in total offense. Cousins became the first Vikings signal-caller to record a 100+ passer rating in consecutive seasons (105.0), his second highest of his career behind his 107.4 in 2019, which also came with Kubiak's tutoring. Working with Kubiak in 2019, Cousins also posted 3,602 passing yards and 26 touchdowns with only six interceptions, as he was named to the Pro Bowl. During his tenure on the Vikings offensive staff from 2019-21, Cousins started all 47 games, passing for at least 26 touchdowns and a 100.0 passer rating each season. Under Kubiak's guidance over the three seasons, Cousins ranked fourth in the NFL in passer rating (105.0), fifth in touchdown passes (94), sixth in passing yards (12,089) and seventh in completion percentage (67.6).

Kubiak served as offensive assistant/quarterbacks coach in his first coaching stint with the Broncos from 2016-18. In 2018, he helped Denver QB Case Keenum throw for 18 touchdowns and a career-high 3,890 yards. Kubiak started his NFL coaching career with the Vikings as a quality control/assistant wide receivers coach from 2013-14. In addition to his NFL experience, Kubiak coached four years at the collegiate level with Texas A&M and Kansas. He served as an offensive quality control coach (2010-11) and graduate assistant/inside wide receivers coach (2012) for Texas A&M, earning his master's degree in human resource development. Kubiak coached wide receivers for the Jayhawks in 2015.

Kubiak was a four-year letterman at Colorado State. He played safety for the Rams and was named a team captain as a senior, while earning an invitation to play in the East-West Shrine Game. He is the oldest son of Gary Kubiak, who played quarterback for the Denver Broncos for nine seasons (1983-91), was a long-time NFL assistant coach, the Houston Texans head coach (2006-13), and Super Bowl 50-winning head coach for the Broncos (2015-16). He has two brothers, Klay, the San Francisco 49ers offensive coordinator, and Klein, who serves as a national scout/special projects for the Dallas Cowboys.

MIKE LAFLEUR

Mike LaFleur was named Arizona's head coach on February 2, 2026. The 39-year old LaFleur joined the Cardinals after spending the past three seasons (2023-25) as the offensive coordinator with the Los Angeles Rams. A Mount Pleasant, MI native, LaFleur has 12 years of experience in the NFL with the Rams (2023-25), Jets (2021-22), 49ers (2017-20), Falcons (2015-16) and Browns (2014).

LOS ANGELES: LaFleur spent the past three seasons (2023-25) as the offensive coordinator with the Los Angeles Rams, the most recent of which saw the franchise earn a spot in the NFC Championship Game. In his three seasons as Rams offensive coordinator, Los Angeles featured one of the NFL's top offenses, ranking 5th in passing yards per game (244.9), first downs per game (21.4) and offensive TDs (144), 6th in total yards per game (361.8) and offensive points per game (24.4).

Under LaFleur, three different Rams offensive players combined for four All-Pro selections: WR Puka Nacua twice (2023 & 2025), QB Matthew Stafford once (2025) and RB Kyren Williams once (2023). The Rams offense also combined for five Pro Bowl selections over the past three seasons: Nacua twice (2023 & 2025), Stafford twice (2023 & 2025) and Williams once (2023).

Stafford excelled under LaFleur the past three seasons, ranking 2nd in passing yards (12,434), 3rd in passing TDs (90) and 4th in completions (1,054) during that span. He threw for 3,500+ yards and 20+ TDs in all three seasons. After leading the league in passing yards (4,707) and touchdown passes (46) for the first time in his career in 2025, Stafford earned NFL MVP honors for the first time. At 37 years old, Stafford became the oldest player in NFL history to win his first-ever MVP award and became the first Rams player to win the honor since RB Marshall Faulk in 2000.

In 2025, the Rams led the NFL in total offense (394.6 ypg) and passing offense (268.1 ypg) while also ranking 7th in rushing offense (7). Los Angeles also led the league in points scored (518), total TDs (65) and passing TDs (46). The Rams had a league-leading 396 first downs, with an NFL-high 236 coming in the passing game. L.A. also finished the 2025 campaign tied for the league lead in fewest sacks allowed (23) while also committing the fewest penalties in the NFL (75).

Under LaFleur's guidance in 2024, the Rams finished 10th in passing yards per game (227.5) and 15th in offensive yards per game (331.4). During his first season in Los Angeles in 2023, the Rams finished the season 7th in yards per game (359.3) and yards per play (5.6), 11th in rushing yards per game (120.3), 10th in passing yards per game (239.0), and 8th in first downs per game (20.6), third down conversion rate (42%), and points scored per game (23.7). WR Puka Nacua finished the regular season establishing then NFL single-season records for receptions (105) and receiving yards (1,486) by a rookie. RB Kyren Williams earned second-team All-Pro honors that season after rushing for 1,144 yards and 12 TDs on just 228 carries (5.0 avg.).

OTHER NFL EXPERIENCE: Prior to working with the Rams, he served as the offensive coordinator for the New York Jets for two seasons (2021-22). In 2022, WR Garrett Wilson became the first rookie in Jets history and one of 23 players in NFL history to finish his debut season with 1,000+ receiving yards. Under the guidance of LaFleur, the Jets offense posted a league-best 41 explosive plays by rookies. Despite numerous injuries at the quarterback position, New York finished the 2022 season ranked 15th in passing yards per game (219.0) and 14th in receiving yards (4,040), yards per reception (11.3) and yards after the catch (1,850).

In his first season as offensive coordinator in 2021, LaFleur worked with four different quarterbacks that threw for more than 290 yards in a game, becoming the first team in NFL history to accomplish that feat. LaFleur oversaw one of the NFL's youngest offenses that year as the Jets became just the second team since 1970 with a rookie leader in passing, rushing and receiving yards. LaFleur's offense also featured a rookie wide receiver, Elijah Moore, that finished in the top 10 among rookies in receiving yards in 2021. It marked the fourth consecutive season a rookie in LaFleur's offense finished the year atop the league's rookie rankings in receiving yards.

Before joining the Jets, LaFleur coached four seasons (2017-20) with the 49ers where he spent the final three years as San Francisco's passing game coordinator after working with wide receivers in 2017. In those three years as the passing game coordinator, the 49ers offense finished 10th in scoring (24.9 ppg) and 9th in total offense (370.6 ypg) as TE George Kittle set a then NFL record for tight ends with 1,377 receiving yards in 2019 and became a two-time All-Pro selection (2018-19).

In 2019, LaFleur assisted the 49ers in reaching Super Bowl LIV working with an offense that featured 13 different players with at least one TD catch that season, tied for the most in a single-season in NFL history. QB Jimmy Garoppolo ranked 5th in yards per attempt (7.6), 6th in completion percentage (67.5%), and 10th in passer rating (98.6) during LaFleur's three seasons (2018-20) coordinating the 49ers passing game.



Prior to his time in SF, LaFleur worked with the Falcons as an offensive assistant, first helping with the tight ends in 2015 and then with wide receivers in 2016. He began his NFL coaching career as an offensive intern with the Browns in 2014, assisting Cleveland's offensive line. During his time with Atlanta's wide receivers in 2016, WR Julio Jones finished second in the league in receiving yards (1,409) and averaged 17.0 yards per catch, the fourth-best average in the league. Falcons wide receivers had 3,226 receiving yards, the second-most in the NFL that season, which helped Atlanta advance to Super Bowl LI.

COLLEGE COACHING CAREER: Prior to joining the NFL coaching ranks, LaFleur spent five seasons coaching at the collegiate level, beginning his career at his alma mater, Elmhurst College, in 2009. He also served as an offensive coordinator at Saint Joseph's College (2010-12) and at Davidson College (2013).

ELMHURST COLLEGE: LaFleur played collegiately as a safety at Elmhurst, beginning his college career as a quarterback before switching positions in his final year. He was the starting quarterback for the Bluejays as a sophomore in 2006 and served as a team captain while playing safety as a senior in 2008. Following his playing career, LaFleur joined the coaching staff at Elmhurst in 2009, serving as an offensive assistant working with the quarterbacks.

PERSONAL: LaFleur attended Mount Pleasant (MI) High School where he was a two-sport athlete who played quarterback and ran track for the Oilers. His father, Denny, won a National Championship as a player at Central Michigan in 1974 and left as the program's all-time leader in career tackles. His dad then went on to become an assistant coach at Central Michigan. LaFleur's mother, Kristi, was a cheerleader at Central Michigan and serves as a track and competitive cheer coach at Mount Pleasant High School, where she is a member of the school's Hall of Fame.

He and his wife, Lauren, have two children – daughter, Addison and son, Wes. A former track and field standout at Mount Pleasant High School, Lauren is also a member of the school's Hall of Fame.

COMMITMENT TO EXCELLENCE

The Raiders - who began play in the American Football League in 1960 - are in their 67th year of professional football competition, including the last 56 as a member of the National Football League. In seven memorable decades - the 1960s, '70s, '80s, '90s, 2000s, 2010s and 2020s - the Raiders have been dominant in professional football since Al Davis first pledged in 1963 to build the finest organization in pro sports.

During these decades of dominance, the Raiders have won an AFL championship, four American Football Conference championships, and three World Championships of Professional Football, participated in five Super Bowls, played in 14 championship games, won or tied for 17 division championships, had 23 playoff seasons, finished 38 seasons at .500 or better and played in 45 postseason games.

Pro football's dynamic organization placed first in the AFC West in 2000, 2001 and 2002 despite playing among the toughest schedules in the NFL in each of those seasons. With their appearance in Super Bowl XXXVII, the Raiders became the first NFL team to have had a season end in the Super Bowl in four different decades.

The Raiders are the only team to have been in Super Bowls in the '60s, the '70s, the '80s and the 2000s. The Silver and Black are the only AFC team - and one of just two NFL teams - to have a season that advanced to the conference championship game in the '60s, the '70s, the '80s, the '90s and the 2000s.

The Raiders are one of only three original AFL teams to have captured three World Championships of Professional Football with Super Bowl victories. The Raiders are one of only five AFC teams to have won more than one Super Bowl since 1980. In their five Super Bowl appearances, the Raiders have been led by four head coaches and started four quarterbacks.

Since 1963, when Al Davis first took over the failing Oakland franchise that had struggled to win only nine of 42 league games in the initial three seasons of the new AFL and pledged to build the finest organization in sports, the Raiders have dominated professional football in terms of consistent victory. During the memorable 65 years in Oakland, Los Angeles and now Las Vegas, the Raiders have won 512 league games, tied 11 and lost 494. "Commitment to Excellence" has never been an idle phrase to those who have proudly represented the Raiders organization as shown by their domination of pro football.

Thirty of the great players who proudly wore the Silver and Black, as well as Owner-Leader Al Davis and legendary Head Coach John Madden, have been enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The Raiders have also produced six Coaches of the Year. In addition, 102 Pro Bowl players have earned 286 Pro Bowl selections representing the Silver and Black.

Another innovation came to professional football in 1970 - Monday Night Football. The Raiders' domination of this prime-time television series has seen the Silver and Black build a 43-33-1 record in Monday night play. The Raiders won 12 games at home to begin this series and are 21-10-0 at home in the 55 years of Monday Night Football.

Through the seven decades of pro football competition, the Raiders have had the greatest players, the greatest coaches, the greatest plays and participated in the greatest games in the annals of professional sports. Challengers to Raider domination of professional football will arise as they have in the '60s, '70s, '80s, '90s and the new millennium. The Raider organization will continue to meet these challenges.

In addition, the Raiders are proud to contribute to community engagement, youth initiatives, multicultural awareness, and global outreach. The Raiders played in Oakland from their inception through 1982, relocated to Los Angeles in 1983, moved back to Oakland in 1995, and made Las Vegas home in 2020.

The Raiders base training and business operations in Henderson, Nevada at Intermountain Health Performance Center and play home games at Allegiant Stadium, a fully enclosed, state-of-the-art facility located adjacent to the world-famous Las Vegas Strip. The Raiders maintain an international presence and communicate with the worldwide Raider Nation through the team's official website and social media channels.

JOHN SPYTEK, WHO BECAME THE SIXTH GENERAL MANAGER IN THE HISTORY OF THE LAS VEGAS RAIDERS WHEN NAMED TO HIS POST BY OWNER MARK DAVIS ON JAN. 24, 2025, ENTERS HIS SECOND SEASON WITH THE SILVER AND BLACK.

SPYTEK IS IN HIS 24TH YEAR IN THE NFL, JOINING THE RAIDERS AFTER SPENDING THE PREVIOUS NINE SEASONS WITH THE TAMPA BAY BUCCANEERS, WHERE HE SERVED AS THE ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER (2023-24), VICE PRESIDENT OF PLAYER PERSONNEL (2021-22) AND DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL (2016-20).

SPYTEK AND HIS PERSONNEL STAFF CONTINUED TO CONSTRUCT THE RAIDERS ROSTER THIS PAST OFFSEASON. HIS SECOND DRAFT AT THE HELM, HEADLINED BY NO. 1 OVERALL SELECTION QB FERNANDO MENDOZA, YIELDED 10 TOTAL DRAFT PICKS, INCLUDING FIVE PICKS IN THE TOP 101 SLOTS OF THE ANNUAL SELECTION MEETING. MENDOZA, WHO LED INDIANA TO A NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP AND AN UNDEFEATED 16-0 RECORD IN 2025, BECAME THE FIFTH HEISMAN TROPHY WINNER TO BE DRAFTED BY THE RAIDERS AND JUST THE SECOND PLAYER SELECTED FIRST OVERALL IN FRANCHISE HISTORY.

THE RAIDERS' DRAFT WAS ALSO HIGHLIGHTED BY FIVE DRAFT DAY TRADES, WITH FOUR OF THOSE TRANSACTIONS COMING ON THE DRAFT'S THIRD DAY, AND LAS VEGAS CONCLUDED THE PROCEEDINGS WITH POTENTIAL HIGH-LEVEL CONTRIBUTORS AND INCREASED DEPTH AND COMPETITION THROUGHOUT THE ROSTER.

THE RAIDERS MADE A SPLASH IN THE EARLY FREE AGENCY PERIOD EARLIER IN THE SPRING, ADDING EIGHT UNRESTRICTED FREE AGENTS IN THE FIRST WEEK OF THE LEAGUE YEAR, AND HELPING BOLSTER THE ROSTER ON OFFENSE, DEFENSE, AND SPECIAL TEAMS. THE RAIDERS SIGNED C TYLER LINDERBAUM, WIDELY REGARDED AS THE TOP OFFENSIVE LINEMAN ON THE FREE AGENT MARKET, WHILE ADDING WR JALEN NAILOR, DE KWITY PAYE, AND LINEBACKERS NAKOBE DEAN AND QUAY WALKER, WHO PROJECT TO IMPACT THE MIDDLE OF THE DEFENSE IMMEDIATELY.

IN HIS FIRST OFFSEASON WITH THE RAIDERS, SPYTEK STRATEGICALLY SUPPLEMENTED THE ROSTER WITH KEY ADDITIONS THROUGH TRADE, FREE AGENCY, AND THE DRAFT. AFTER SECURING A LONG-TERM CONTRACT EXTENSION WITH DE MAXX CROSBY, SPYTEK AND HIS STAFF MADE 11 SELECTIONS IN THE 2025 NFL DRAFT, MARKING THE MOST BY THE RAIDERS SINCE 2007. HEADLINING THE DRAFT HAUL IN THE FIRST ROUND WAS RB ASHTON JEANTY, A DYNAMIC BALLCARRIER AND RECORD-SETTING HEISMAN TROPHY CANDIDATE AT BOISE STATE. SPYTEK ALSO CONDUCTED A PAIR OF DAY 2 TRADES, MOVING BACK TWICE IN THE SECOND ROUND AND COLLECTING TWO ADDITIONAL THIRD-ROUND PICKS IN THE PROCESS.

IN TAMPA BAY, SPYTEK HELPED DRAFT FOUR PLAYERS WHO EARNED PFWA ALL-ROOKIE TEAM HONORS (CB VERNON HARGREAVES, LB DEVIN WHITE, T TRISTAN WIRFS AND RB BUCKY IRVING) AND FIVE PLAYERS WHO WERE SELECTED TO A COMBINED NINE PRO BOWLS AND THREE AP ALL-PRO SELECTIONS (WR CHRIS GODWIN, DT VITA VEA, WHITE, WIRFS AND S ANTONIE WINFIELD JR.). HE WAS ALSO INTEGRAL IN THE SIGNINGS OF KEY FREE AGENTS C RYAN JENSEN, LB SHAO BARRETT, DT NDAMUKONG SUH, QB TOM BRADY AND QB BAKER MAYFIELD, WHILE HELPING TRADE FOR DE JASON PIERRE-PAUL AND TE ROB GRONKOWSKI. THE BUCCANEERS WERE THE ONLY TEAM IN THE NFL TO HAVE MULTIPLE DRAFT PICKS SELECTED TO THE ALL-ROOKIE TEAM IN CONSECUTIVE SEASONS FROM 2019-20. IN 2021, TAMPA BAY WAS ABLE TO RETURN ALL 22 STARTERS FROM THE SUPER BOWL LV CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM, BECOMING THE FIRST TO DO SO IN THE SALARY CAP ERA.

DURING HIS TIME IN TAMPA BAY, THE BUCCANEERS SECURED FIVE PLAYOFF APPEARANCES, SIX PLAYOFF VICTORIES, FOUR NFC SOUTH DIVISION TITLES AND A SUPER BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP. THE TEAM'S SIX PLAYOFF WINS SINCE 2016 ARE THE SEVENTH-MOST IN THE NFL DURING THAT SPAN.

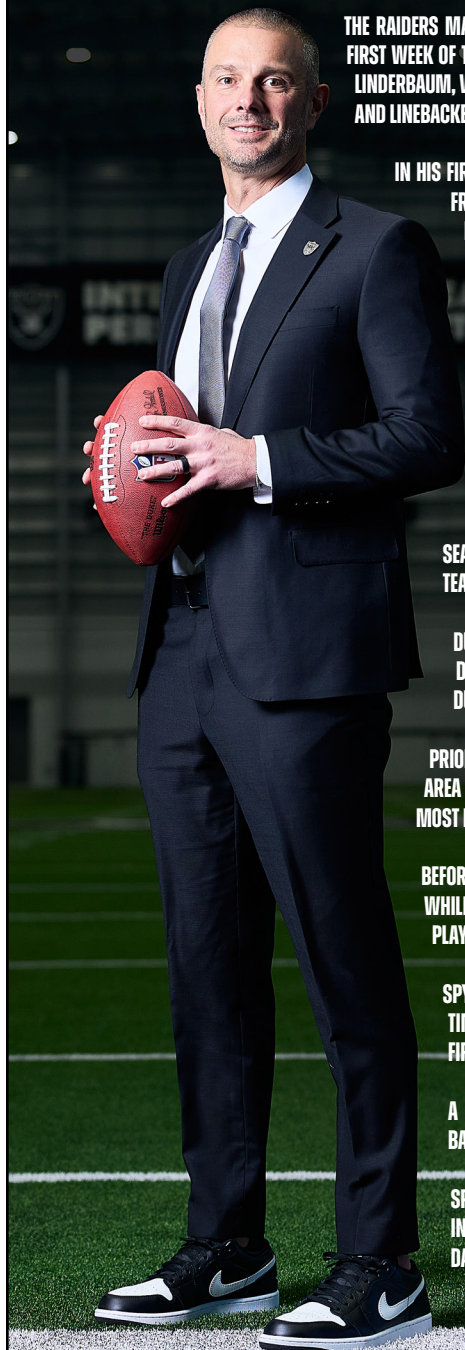
PRIOR TO JOINING THE BUCCANEERS, SPYTEK SPENT THREE SEASONS WITH THE DENVER BRONCOS, WHERE HE WORKED AS A SOUTHWEST AREA SCOUT IN 2013 AND AS A NATIONAL SCOUT FROM 2014-15. THE BRONCOS' 37 REGULAR SEASON AND 42 OVERALL WINS WERE THE MOST IN THE NFL OVER THAT THREE-YEAR SPAN, CULMINATING IN A SUPER BOWL 50 VICTORY FOLLOWING THE 2015 SEASON.

BEFORE JOINING THE BRONCOS, SPYTEK SPENT THREE SEASONS (2010-12) AS THE CLEVELAND BROWNS' DIRECTOR OF COLLEGE SCOUTING. WHILE WITH THE BROWNS, SPYTEK ASSISTED IN DRAFTING SIX PLAYERS WHO EARNED PFW/PFWA ALL-ROOKIE TEAM HONORS AND FIVE PLAYERS WHO WERE SELECTED TO A PRO BOWL.

SPYTEK BEGAN HIS PLAYER PERSONNEL CAREER WORKING AS AN INTERN WITH THE PHILADELPHIA EAGLES IN 2005, EARNING A FULL-TIME COLLEGE SCOUTING ASSISTANT POSITION IN 2006 AND SPENDING THREE YEARS AS A COLLEGE/PRO SCOUT FROM 2007-09. HIS FIRST JOB IN THE NFL WAS AS AN OPERATIONS INTERN WITH THE DETROIT LIONS IN 2004.

A NATIVE OF PEWAUKEE, WISC., SPYTEK PLAYED LINEBACKER AT THE UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN FROM 1999-2002, EARNING A BACHELOR'S DEGREE IN GENERAL STUDIES AND A MASTER'S IN SPORTS MANAGEMENT.

SPYTEK AND HIS WIFE, KRISTEN, ARE PARENTS TO JACK AND THOMAS. TOGETHER, THEY CO-FOUNDED THE NATIONAL CMV FOUNDATION IN 2014 TO EDUCATE FAMILIES ABOUT CONGENITAL CMV, A VIRUS THAT ULTIMATELY CLAIMED THE LIFE OF THEIR 21-MONTH-OLD DAUGHTER, EVELYN, IN 2014.

- With five punts of 60+ yards in 2026, Cole would become one of seven punters in the NFL since 2000 to record 75 punts of 60+ yards.
- With 10 punts of 60+ yards in 2026, Cole would notch his fifth career season with at least 10 punts of 60+ yards, passing Johnny Hekker (4) for the second most seasons with 10 punts of 60+ yards in the NFL since 2000 – only trailing Shane Lechler (6).

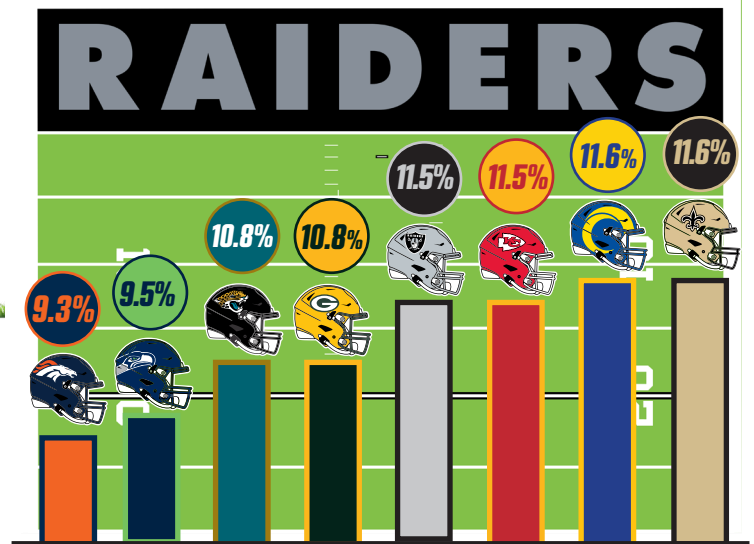

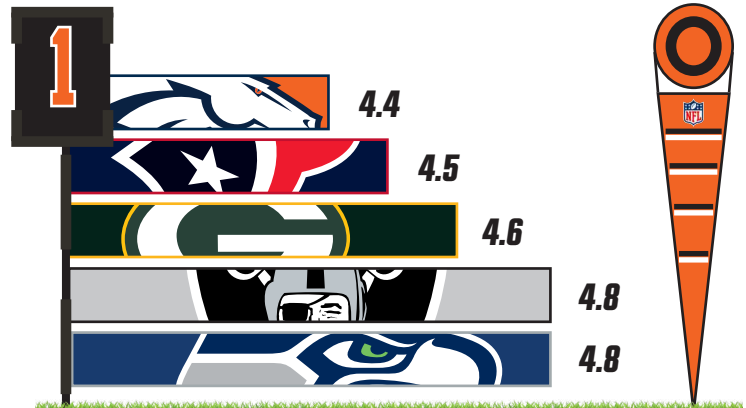

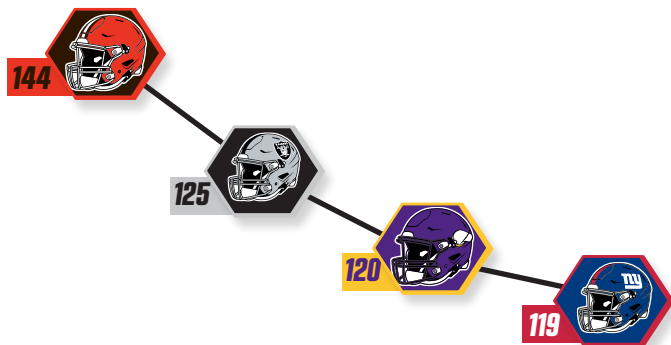
YARDS PER PLAY ALLOWED ON FIRST DOWN

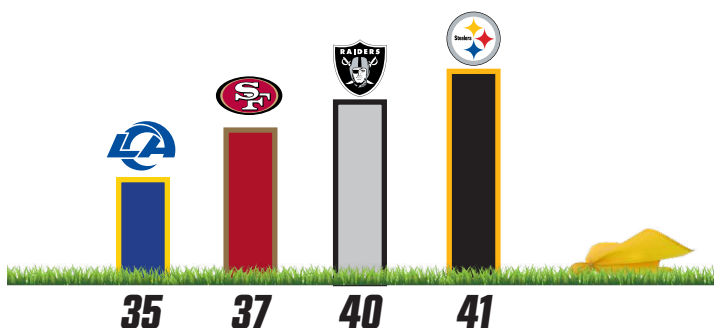
NEGATIVE PLAYS FORCED - 2025

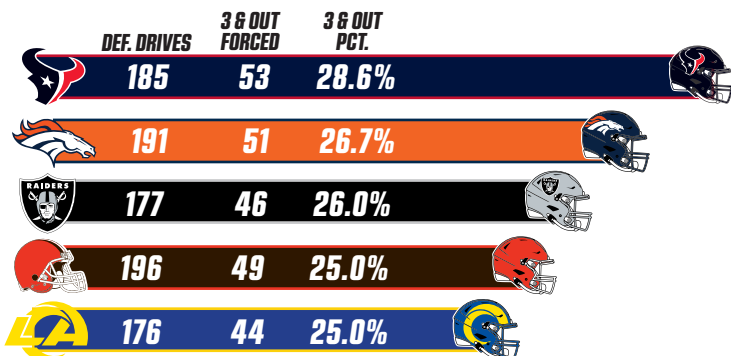

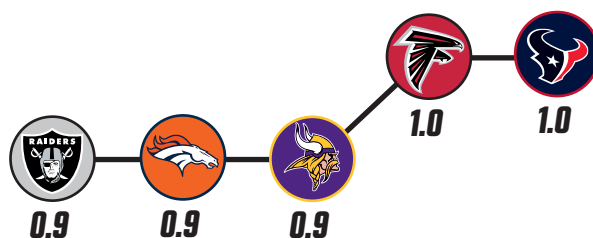

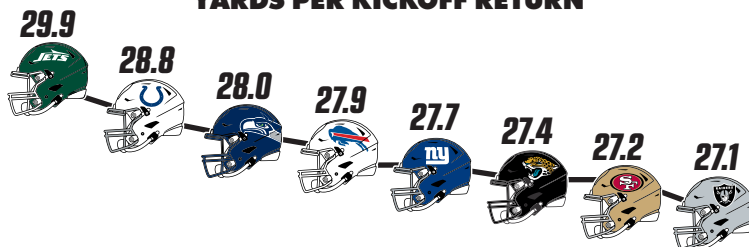
YARDS ALLOWED BEFORE CONTACT PER CARRY

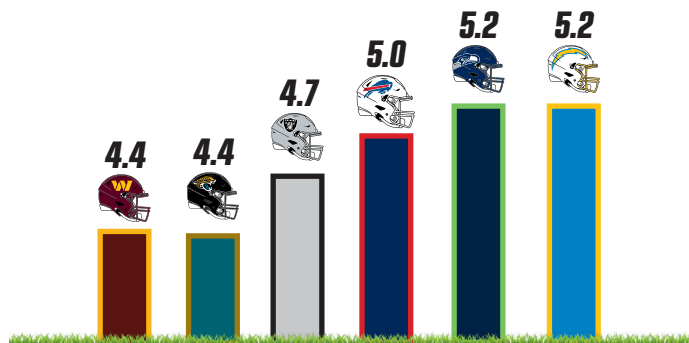

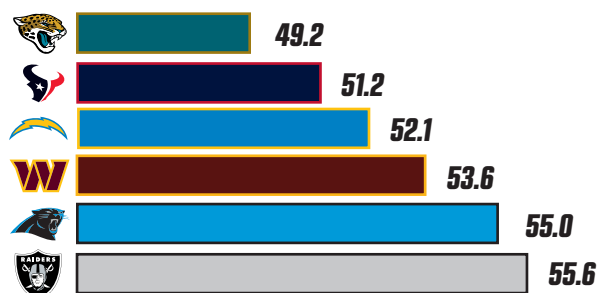
