

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CLUB HISTORY

From the 1961 Minnesota Vikings Radio, TV and Press Guide –

Twin Cities football enthusiasts began their quest for professional football some 12 years ago, and it was on January 28, 1960, that their efforts culminated with the announcement – from Miami, Florida, where the National Football League owners were in session – that Minnesota was being granted a franchise for 1961.


At the same meeting, Dallas was accepted to start play in 1960.

The franchise was granted just 10 days after E. William Boyer, president of the Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce, had made an official presentation to the league on behalf of statewide Minnesota interests.

Besides Boyer in the founding group were the following: Max Winter, promoter and restaurateur, H.P. Skoglund, president of North American Life and Casualty Company; Ole Haugrud, Duluth businessman, and the Northwest Publications, Inc., publishers of the *St. Paul Dispatch* and *Pioneer Press*, through its president, Bernard H. Ridder, Jr.

They decided to start with an original outlay of \$1 million dollars, of which the Minneapolis sources would put up \$600,000; St. Paul \$300,000, and Duluth, representing the rest of the state \$100,000.

Upon acquiring a franchise, the group hired Joe Thomas, former scout with the Los Angeles Rams, to scout the country in preparation for the 1961 draft meeting, and went on a nationwide search to find a general manager. This ended with the selection of Bert E. Rose, who was at the time the public relations director for the Rams.

HOW THE VIKINGS GOT THEIR NAME

From the 1961 Minnesota Vikings Radio, TV and Press Guide —

When Bert Rose was selected as General Manager, one of the first steps he took was to recommend to the Board of Directors that the club be nicknamed the "Vikings."

A nickname should serve a dual purpose, he said. First, it should represent an aggressive person or animal imbued with the will to win. Secondly, if possible, it is desirable to have it connote the region that the particular team represents.

"Vikings" scores well on both points. Certainly, the Nordic Vikings were a fearless race. Following many years of victories in the British Isles and France, under Erik the Red, they sailed in open boats across the North Atlantic seeking new peoples to conquer. Their entire history is punctuated with the aggressive desire and will to win.

While Minnesota is populated by the descendants of settlers from many nations, the area has a rich Nordic lore, perhaps due to the mythology of Paul Bunyan and his Blue Ox, perhaps due to the preponderance of the "sons" and "sens" in the phone book. The Vikings, too, were Nordics; hence the name represents in a large part the solid stock of people who call Minnesota their home.



The expansion Minnesota Vikings took the field in 1961 with a name that matched the region they would call home. General Manager Bert Rose (middle right) helped come up with the name, and the club was immediately embraced by the community.

MINNESOTA VIKINGS SOCIAL JUSTICE

INSPIRE CHANGE

Following the murder of George Floyd on May 25, 2020, the Minnesota Vikings and the Wilf family announced a \$5 million donation to social justice causes throughout the United States. Owners Zygi and Mark Wilf met with the team's Social Justice Committee in June 2020 and agreed that \$1 million in contributions from the fund would be determined in collaboration with Vikings players and directed toward local organizations fighting hate, racism and inequality.

"We continue to be inspired by these players as they advocate for transformational change in this very challenging moment," said Vikings Owner/President Mark Wilf. "We are proud of their efforts to use their platform in an effort to end deep-seated social injustices. Their thoughtful approach and our conversations with them have deeply moved us, certainly in large part because of our family's history and long-standing commitment to human rights, but also because of their steadfast dedication to not sit idly by when they have the ability to make a difference."

The Vikings endowed the George Floyd Legacy Scholarship with a \$125 initial establishing gift that will generate \$5,000 annually to benefit Black graduating seniors in Minneapolis-St. Paul who are pursuing post-secondary education. The team also expanded its existing commitments to All Square, a local nonprofit that invests in the minds and lives of formerly incarcerated individuals, and to Everfi, a digital platform that brings African American history curriculum to schools. Since 2016, the Vikings have partnered with Everfi, and in 2020, the partnership expanded the curriculum to 24 Minnesota schools and now reaches thousands of students.

The 2020 donations built on the Wilf's previous \$500,000 commitment to the Social Justice Committee over the previous two years, dollars that were directed toward scholarships for low-income students, school supplies, legal aid for disadvantaged and underrepresented populations and law enforcement relations.

"Our organization has shown a commitment to these causes over the last several years, but we know we need to and can do more," said Vikings Owner/Chairman Zygi Wilf. "We want this investment to support the many diverse and meaningful social justice efforts throughout our country, but it can only be one piece of our overall work toward having a sustainable impact. Our actions within our communities will be the driving force for creating profound change."

Following a series of meetings throughout the 2021 season to determine the continuation of active engagement and commitment to various social justice causes, the Minnesota Vikings Social Justice Committee and the Wilf family announced an additional \$1 million in contributions toward the expansion and/or launch of multiple initiatives in the following focus areas: 1) reducing socioeconomic disparities; 2) expanding the adoption of educational curriculum on racial equality and Black history; and 3) advocating for law enforcement reform and criminal justice reform. Social justice donations from the team and the Wilfs now total \$6.5 million since 2018.

The Vikings delivered a message of unity and change entering the 2020 season as the team came together in a call for justice. The organization believes in creating meaningful dialogue and being agents for positive, transformational and sustainable change.

PROJECT SUCCESS

Project Success, in partnership with the Vikings and Delta, recently brought 15 Minneapolis high school students to visit the historic, political and cultural center that is Washington, D.C. The group visited Howard University, the National Museum of African American History and Culture (NMAAHC) and important monuments and sites in the city.

Vikings players LB Eric Kendricks, DT Harrison Phillips, DT TY McGill and TE Irv Smith, Jr. were in attendance, as well as Vikings Legends: former FB Tony Richardson, TE Visanthe Shiancoe and TE Steve Jordan.

Each of the 15 students on the trip was surprised with a \$1,000 scholarship courtesy of Delta.



MINNESOTA VIKINGS FOUNDATION

The Minnesota Vikings Foundation advances the well-being of youth through engaging health and education initiatives. The Foundation is able to make a measurable impact in the lives who need it most by enlisting the support of Vikings players, staff, donors and the community.

The Vikings Table food truck program has been on the road since 2019. Vikings Table powered by Xcel Energy is a custom-built food truck that has served more than 30,000 free, healthy meals and nutrition education across the Greater Twin Cities. The vehicle includes an interactive experience room where youth can learn about healthy eating habits from video clips and educational materials and capture their experience in the High Energy Photo Booth.

Vikings Table partners with nonprofit organizations to help reach youth and families that are facing food insecurity. Smart Energy Snacks powered by Xcel Energy is a new addition to the program, providing healthy supplemental meal options to enjoy at home. Local companies like Land O' Lakes, Inc. and Winnebago Industries Foundation have stepped up to support our mission.

VIKINGS YOUTH FOOTBALL - GIRLS FLAG FOOTBALL

INSPIRING THE NEXT GENERATION

The Minnesota Vikings pledged \$75,000 and partnered with Minneapolis Public Schools to launch a new MPS Girls Flag Football program in May 2022. The league featured three teams from middle schools in the Minneapolis area, with its inaugural season lasting three weeks.

With this launch, the Vikings joined several NFL teams that have partnered to establish girls flag football leagues in their local areas. The team hopes to expand the initiative to schools across the state in future years and ultimately make girls flag football a sanctioned high school sport in Minnesota.

The final games of the inaugural season were played in the indoor practice field of Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center, Vikings staff and players interacted with the girls flag teams.



VIKINGS YOUTH FOOTBALL - TEACH. PLAY. GROW.

The Vikings Youth Football mission statement is to grow, support and promote youth football through fair play, health/safety and academics. Innovative programs reach youngsters through the High School Player Development 7-on-7 Tournament, youth football camps, USA Football Coaching School, equipment and field grants, the Vikings All-State Football Team, Minnesota Mr. Football, the High School Coach of the Week Program and the High School Coach of the Year. In 2018 the Vikings started hosting high school games at TCO Stadium in the Vikings Prep Spotlight series, playing five regular-season games and three state quarterfinal playoff contests since.



The Vikings connect with youth football programs across the state through clinics, camps and encouraging participation and safety. Teaching youth coaches proper techniques and how to play the game safely gives players the best chance for success and a positive experience. Growing our great game at the grass roots level has been an emphasis for the organization, resulting in expanded programs, recognition for top players and coaches and building strong community bonds in youth football.



U.S. BANK STADIUM SETS THE STANDARD



Following more than a dozen years of discussion at the state capitol and four years of design and construction, the Vikings and the Minnesota Sports Facilities Authority officially opened U.S. Bank Stadium on July 22, 2016, marking the completion of the largest construction project in state history and the celebration of a true public-private partnership that has helped reshape the East Town neighborhood in Minneapolis.

The stadium, from design to completion, was built with three key principles in mind: developing an unprecedented design, establishing a true public-private partnership and guaranteeing a best-in-class fan experience.

Unprecedented Design – Featuring the first ethylene-tetrafluoroethylene (ETFE) roof on a sports facility in the United States and the world's largest pivoting glass doors, U.S. Bank Stadium exemplifies an unprecedented design. The 60% transparent roof combined with nearly 200,000 square feet of glass throughout the building provides a true indoor-outdoor experience, giving fans the best of both worlds. The use of ETFE is now being replicated around the country (Atlanta, Los Angeles, Las Vegas), changing the game for sports facilities in the United States. With its slanted roof to shed snow, the authentic design also responds to the climate like a true Nordic structure.

Public-Private Partnership – U.S. Bank Stadium serves as a prime example of a public-private partnership that has helped reshape a community. The team/private contribution of \$609 million, a \$132 million increase from the original \$477 million commitment, covered 55% of the total \$1.1 billion cost of the publicly-owned, multi-use stadium. More than 300 Minnesota businesses contributed to the design and construction of the stadium with approximately 90% of the construction dollars going back to Minnesotans. The stadium has spurred more than \$1 billion in surrounding development in Minneapolis' East Town neighborhood, and nearly 1,000 non-Vikings events and community programs were held within the first two years.

Best-in-Class Fan Experience – The Vikings consistent focus has been on creating an unforgettable stadium experience for all fans. U.S. Bank Stadium boasts some of the closest seats and suites in the NFL amid a variety of seating options, including 6 clubs, 4 group cabins and 2 membership bars. Two of the NFL's highest-quality and best-positioned LED video boards flank the end zones, and the stadium has 2,000 televisions. A robust art collection, an interactive Vikings Voyage fan space and 1,300 Wi-Fi access points are just a few of the overall fan amenities. The stadium was also the first to open with LED sports lighting, allowing for color temperature adjustment and providing natural and more uniform light.

PUTTING MINNESOTA BUSINESSES FIRST:

- * Nearly 90% of the contract dollars went back to Minnesota companies
- * More than 300 Minnesota businesses were involved in the project, led by Minnesota-based general contractor Mortenson Construction
- * Nearly 1,500 workers were on-site at U.S. Bank Stadium at the peak of construction, and local materials were prioritized

DYNAMIC DESIGN:

- * Dallas-based HKS Architects led design of U.S. Bank Stadium
- * Four points of emphasis: climate, geography, history/quality of civic structure and technology
- * Evokes images of ice floes colliding, frozen lakes, jagged geology and traditional Nordic roof structures designed to shed snow
- * Responds to climate rather than works against it, using features such as slanted roofs and snow gutters

FANTASTIC FEATURES:

- * More than 1.75 million square feet
- * 270 feet high at its West peak, slopes down to 205 feet on East end
- * First transparent ETFE roof on a sports facility in the United State
- * Five entry gates- Legacy (West), Polaris (Northwest), Ecolab (North), East and Pentair (South)
- * Legacy Gate is signature feature, made up of 5 of the world's largest pivoting doors of 75 to 95 feet in height and 55 feet wide - doors each weigh 57,000 pounds and contain 10 smaller doors used for inclement weather when pivoting doors are closed
- * 131 suites and 9,000 club seats, including field-level suites
- * Seven levels connected by stairs, ramp, 33 escalators and 11 elevators
- * Two concourses with 360-degree circulation and six views into the bowl
- * Highest quality HD video boards located in east and west end zones, totaling 12,560 square feet
- * 2,000 HD televisions located throughout the stadium
- * Light rail station directly outside stadium and stadium is connected to Minneapolis' skyway with 10 miles of enclosed walkways
- * Accessibility for people with disabilities

DIGITAL LED/HD TECHNOLOGY SHINES

- * Highest-quality and best-positioned LED video boards in the NFL are above each end zone

- * West video board - 120' x 68' (8,160 square feet), East video board - 88' x 50' (4,400 square feet), ribbon boards - 3,000+ linear feet
- * More than 2,000 HD television displays

ART COLLECTION CAPTURES CREATIVE SPIRIT

- * More than 350 original pieces of fine art, 250 photographs and 2 concourse murals from over 40 artists - 36 from Minnesota
- * Collection spans 8 mediums and 3 themes, including celebrating the State of Minnesota, honoring Minnesota sports moments and saluting Vikings past and present
- * Artists include 3 former Vikings players - Matt Blair, Jim Marshall and Carl Eller
- * Collection and artists profiles can be viewed on Vikings.com and the Vikings Mobile App
- * An installation honoring all of the Minnesota high school football teams with their helmets on the East end of the stadium

VIKINGS VOYAGE

- * More than 10,000 square foot interactive experience includes virtual reality, RFID system and unique historic memorabilia
- * Free for fans to participate in scouting combine events including catching passes while wearing a virtual reality helmet, running drills against a player's pace, measuring jumps and tackling force
- * Nearly 10-yard projection screen showing historic Vikings footage, life-sized Purple People Eaters, suspended chrome footballs celebrating Hall of Fame WR Cris Carter's 1,000+ receptions, Bud Grant's first coaching headset and revolving displays of team history

- 1.75 million** Total square footage of the footprint of the building. U.S. Bank Stadium is twice the size of the Metrodome that once stood on the same spot.
- 5** World's largest pivoting doors on the stadium's west side, ranging in size from 75 to 95 feet high and 55 feet wide.
- 200,000** Square footage of glass used throughout the stadium, including the large glass wall on the stadium's west side that gives fans an excellent view of the downtown Minneapolis skyline.
- 240,000** Square footage of ETFE, the durable transparent material that makes up 60 percent of the stadium's roof.
- 66,202** Stadium's seating capacity for events and Vikings home games. The stadium can accommodate up to 70,000 people for larger events.
- 12,560** Combined square footage of east and west video boards.
- 2,000** High-definition televisions are spread throughout the stadium, ensuring viewing capabilities for fans at all times.
- 1,300** Wi-Fi access points scattered within the stadium. "Clam shell" access points are located within the hand rails of stadium sections connecting all fans even in the seating bowl.
- \$1.1 billion** Total cost of U.S. Bank Stadium. The Vikings contributed \$609 million - including more than \$132 million in additional funding from the original team/private \$477 million commitment. The State of Minnesota and City of Minneapolis combined to contribute \$498 million to the project.
- 41** Feet from the sidelines to the closest seats in the house, bringing fans extremely close to the action.
- 30** Months of construction from start to finish. Ground was broken on the new building on December 3, 2013, and the keys to the building were delivered from Minnesota-based Mortenson Construction on June 17, 2016, six weeks ahead of schedule.
- 272** Feet to the tallest point of the building. Standing nearly 30 stories tall, U.S. Bank Stadium peaks at the stadium's west prow.
- \$1 billion** Development in no less than 20 projects announced in the area surrounding U.S. Bank Stadium generated following the unveiling of the stadium's design.
- 1,500** Workers on site at the peak of the construction process. Nearly 8,000 construction workers contributed to the construction of U.S. Bank Stadium.
- 350** Pieces of commissioned artwork on display inside U.S. Bank Stadium, including two large murals on the north and south walls of the main concourse. In addition, 250 framed photographs are hung throughout the building.
- 40** Artists from the state of Minnesota commissioned to be a part of the stadium's high-quality art collection. Included in the collection are three former players - Matt Blair, Carl Eller and Jim Marshall - and legendary head coach Bud Grant.
- 300** Minnesota-based companies involved in the construction of U.S. Bank Stadium, led by construction manager Mortenson Construction. Approximately 90 percent of the companies that had a hand in building the new stadium were Minnesota-based.
- 33** Escalators located throughout the building, connecting fans to the seven levels of the stadium.
- 11** Elevators allowing fans to seamlessly transition between the seven levels of U.S. Bank Stadium.



U.S. BANK STADIUM TIMELINE

- May 10, 2012** Following years of discussion at the state capitol, the Minnesota State Legislature approved the bill for the Minnesota Vikings new stadium located in downtown Minneapolis. The public-private partnership that was agreed to was made official just days later when Gov. Mark Dayton signed the bill.
- May 13, 2013** Almost one year exactly after the stadium bill passed at the capitol, the Minnesota Sports Facilities Authority (MSFA), the Vikings and HKS Sports & Entertainment Group together unveiled the stadium design that featured the country's largest ETFE roof and the world's largest pivoting glass doors.
- Dec. 3, 2013** The Minnesota Sports Facilities Authority (MSFA) and the Minnesota Vikings, in partnership with Mortenson Construction and project associate Thor Construction, broke ground on the 66,860 seat, 1.7 million square-foot facility. In total, approximately 9 million work hours and 8,000 workers contributed to the project during the 30-month construction process.
- May 20, 2014** More than two years prior to the opening of U.S. Bank Stadium, the downtown Minneapolis facility was awarded Super Bowl LII. The game will mark the second time the Super Bowl will be played in Minnesota (Jan. 26, 1992). The Super Bowl is annually the most watched television program in the world.
- Sept. 17, 2015** After 21 months of construction, Mortenson Construction, the MSFA, and the Vikings celebrated the "topping out" of U.S. Bank Stadium. More than 11,000 tons of steel help make up the U.S. Bank Stadium roof, including the 989 foot-long, 1,700-ton ridge truss, which stands 214 feet above the playing field.
- July 22, 2016** Gov. Mark Dayton and Vikings Owner/President Mark Wilf officially opened U.S. Bank Stadium with a ceremonial ribbon-cutting inside the downtown facility. After 30 months of construction, the Minnesota Vikings and their fans now had their new home. More than 150,000 fans visited U.S. Bank Stadium during its opening weekend.
- August 3, 2016** The first major event was held inside U.S. Bank Stadium with an international soccer match. Chelsea FC defeated AC Milan 3-1 in front of 64,101 fans during the International Champions Cup match.
- August 28, 2016** The Vikings played their first game in their new home during a Sunday afternoon preseason contest against the San Diego Chargers broadcast nationally on FOX.
- Sept. 18, 2016** The Minnesota Vikings defeated NFC North rival Green Bay 17-14 in front of 66,813 in the first regular-season game at U.S. Bank Stadium.
- January 14, 2018** The Vikings hosted the first playoff game at U.S. Bank Stadium, and it was a game for the ages with the New Orleans Saints. The thriller ended with a 61-yard walkoff TD reception by Stefon Diggs in a 29-24 win, forever to be known as "the Minneapolis Miracle."
- February 4, 2018** The sports world watched Philadelphia top New England 41-33 in Super Bowl LII. Attendance for the game was 67,612 and featured Justin Timberlake performing at halftime. More than 103 million viewers in the United States tuned into the NBC broadcast.
- April 6-8, 2019** The NCAA Men's Basketball Final Four featured Auburn, Michigan State, Texas Tech and Virginia, with the Cavaliers taking the title 85-77 over Tech in front of a crowd of more than 72,000.

June 21, 2016 – Eagan City Council Approves Plans for Headquarters and Practice Facility

The Eagan City Council unanimously approved the Minnesota Vikings plan to move the team headquarters and training facility to a 200-acre site located off I-494 at the intersection of Dodd Road and Vikings Parkway.

August 2, 2016 – Groundbreaking

The Vikings, along with partners Twin Cities Orthopedics (TCO), the City of Eagan, Crawford Architects and Kraus-Anderson Construction Company, broke ground on the Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center and TCO Stadium.

December 22, 2016 – Crews Begin Steel Installation

The team's future home began to take shape above ground as the first steel was installed at the TCO Performance Center.

January 2017 – Walls Constructed at TCO Performance Center

With just over a year before the anticipated move-in date, the team's new headquarters began to form as walls were installed.

May 10, 2017 – Final Structural Steel Installed

Construction crews hoisted the final piece of steel into position. More than 3,500 tons of steel were used in the project, including 2,200 tons for the indoor practice facility alone.

March 5, 2018 – Vikings Staff Moves In

Just weeks after U.S. Bank Stadium and the Twin Cities hosted Super Bowl LII, the Vikings officially opened the doors to their new practice facility and headquarters, the Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center. The team held a family night event to show off its new home later that week.

March 15, 2018 – Free Agent QB Kirk Cousins Signs With Vikings

The most highly sought after free agent in the 2018 market, QB Kirk Cousins, signed with the Vikings and was introduced at a press conference in TCO Performance Center.

April 26-28, 2018 – First Draft Conducted From TCO Performance Center

The Vikings conducted the first draft from TCO Performance Center over 3 days in April. The club selected UCF defensive back Mike Hughes with its first round pick, #30 overall.

June 15, 2018 – Ribbon Cutting at TCO Performance Center

The Vikings welcomed business partners, state and local leaders and NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell for a formal ribbon-cutting ceremony at TCO Performance Center.

July 25, 2018 – First Training Camp

For the first time in the history of the Vikings franchise, the club held training camp at its facility rather than conducting camp on a college campus. The team called Bemidji State home from 1961-65 and Minnesota State, Mankato, hosted the team from 1966-2017.

September 28, 2018 – High School Football Debut

TCO Stadium was built with the intention of being a focal point of the TCO Performance Center complex and as a community resource with high school football as one of the key elements to that cause. Eagan High hosted Farmington in the first high school game at the facility in what would be a slate of five games during the season, including a trio of state quarterfinal playoff games.

January/February 2022 - General Manager Kwesi Adofo-Mensah and Head Coach Kevin O'Connell Introductions

On Thursday, Jan. 27, the Vikings introduced Kwesi Adofo-Mensah as the team's new general manager and on Thursday, Feb. 17, the club introduced Kevin O'Connell as the Vikings 10th head coach in franchise history.

May 26, 2022 - Minnesota Aurora FC Debut

On Thursday, May 26, professional women's soccer team, the Minnesota Aurora FC, which is a woman-led and community-owned club, played its first match. The team finished the inaugural regular season 11-0-1. In July, Minnesota hosted the USLW League championship for the first time at TCO Stadium.

ZYGI WILF

OWNER/CHAIRMAN

Zygi Wilf enters his 18th season as Owner/Chairman of the Minnesota Vikings in 2022 and has been instrumental in transforming the organization since the Wilf family purchased the club in 2005. During that time, Wilf and his brother Mark have focused on creating a world-class organization that consistently competes for championships, provides the best fan experience in the NFL, has a positive impact on the community and grows the game of football.

Two of the biggest organizational achievements – opening U.S. Bank Stadium in 2016 and hosting Super Bowl LII in 2018 – have come under the Wilfs' leadership. As the largest construction project in state history, the new stadium employed nearly 8,000 construction workers and has had a significant economic impact on the region. Wilf served as Honorary Co-Chair of the Minnesota Super Bowl Bid Committee and was successful in bringing Super Bowl LII to Minnesota in 2018. The facility is capable of hosting hundreds of community, national and international events each year and along with the Super Bowl has been the home of the 2019 NCAA Men's Final Four and multiple ESPN X Games.

Wilf and his brother also led the development of the Vikings new headquarters, Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center, which opened in March 2018 in Eagan, Minnesota. As the day-to-day and training camp home of the team, TCO Performance Center serves as the centerpiece of Viking Lakes, a 3 million square feet of corporate office, medical, retail, entertainment and multi-family housing. The growing campus has added four esports teams, the national headquarters of USA Curling, the northern office of the United States Tennis Association, the Omni Viking Lakes Hotel and the Viking Lakes Residences to go alongside the Minnesota Vikings Museum, team store, and Twin Cities Orthopedics Eagan and Training HAUS.

Since 2018, the Wilf family and the Vikings have donated more than \$6.5 million to social justice causes throughout the United States, including \$5 million in June 2020. Throughout their heavy involvement in business and civic endeavors, the Wilfs have been particularly dedicated to children's health issues. In February 2015, Zygi and Mark donated \$5 million to the University of Minnesota to create the Wilf Family Center. Designed to be the intellectual center of children's health care in the Midwest, the center has an impact extending far beyond the region's borders. In 2017, under the Wilfs' leadership, the Vikings

launched the Minnesota Vikings Foundation with the mission of advancing the well-being of youth through engaging health and education initiatives. In 2019, the Foundation unveiled Vikings Table, a food truck that provides free meals to underserved children in Minneapolis-St. Paul and surrounding communities. In its first six months of operation, Vikings Table served more than 4,500 meals and to date has provided more than 30,000 meals to families in need.

The journey for Wilf from avid New York Giants fan sitting in the bleachers of Yankee Stadium in the 1960s to taking over the leadership of one of the NFL's proudest franchises has been marked by bold and well-founded business decisions, commitment to family and employees, and appreciation for NFL history. Wilf was recognized in 2013 with the Fritz Pollard Alliance's Tank Younger Award in honor of his commitment to hiring and promoting minority candidates on the football and business side of the Vikings franchise. In spring 2019, the Wilf Family Foundations made a \$1 million donation to the Pro Football Hall of Fame to help the development of a Founders Exhibit that shines light on the many contributions of founders and owners of NFL franchises.

Along with his ownership of the Vikings, Wilf is a principal of Garden Homes, a nationwide leader in retail, commercial and private residential development. He was part-owner of the MLS's Nashville SC franchise and a founder of WISE (Wilf Innovative Sports & Entertainment) Ventures, an investment fund based in Manhattan focused on early and growth-stage investment opportunities in sports entertainment and real estate. In 2021, Wilf became Vice Chair and Managing Partner for Orlando City SC and the Orlando Pride.

Wilf, the son of Joseph and Elizabeth Wilf, emigrated with his parents from Europe to the United States in the early 1950s and settled in New Jersey. He attended Fairleigh Dickinson University, earning a bachelor's degree in economics, and later graduated from New York Law School in Manhattan. Wilf and his wife Aubrey have four children and nine grandchildren.

Entering his 18th season of ownership in 2022, Minnesota Vikings Owner/President Mark Wilf has led a transformation of the entire organization and has dedicated his focus to four primary areas: building a team that consistently competes for championships, providing the best-in-class fan experience, positively impacting the Minneapolis-St. Paul community and growing the game of football.

Mark, along with his brother Zygi, oversees the management and strategic planning of every department within the Vikings. He led two of the most significant initiatives in the team's history with the completion of U.S. Bank Stadium and the successful bid to bring Super Bowl LII to Minnesota, creating a lasting impact on the community and the state. The multi-use U.S. Bank Stadium opened in July 2016 and is considered to be in the upper echelon of stadiums throughout the world, having won several awards for its construction and design, operations, and sustainability initiatives. The stadium also provides one of the best fan experiences in all of sports and entertainment. As the largest construction project in state history, U.S. Bank Stadium created thousands of jobs with tremendous economic impact on the region and helped spur more than \$1 billion in surrounding development in the east side of downtown Minneapolis. The facility is capable of hosting hundreds of community, national and international events each year and has already been the home of Super Bowl LII, the 2019 NCAA Men's Final Four and multiple ESPN X Games.

Mark and Zygi also led the development of the Vikings new headquarters, Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center, which opened in March 2018 in Eagan, Minnesota. As the day-to-day and training camp home of the team, TCO Performance Center serves as the centerpiece of Viking Lakes, a 200-acre, mixed-use development that will ultimately encompass 3 million square feet of corporate office, medical, retail, entertainment and multi-family housing. Following his tenure as Chair of JFNA, Wilf was appointed Chair of the Jewish Agency for Israel's Board of Governors, a position in which he will serve until 2025. A longtime supporter of the Jewish community, Wilf and his family are among the largest benefactors of Yad Vashem, the Holocaust memorial museum in Israel.

Wilf is a principal of Garden Homes, his family's real estate firm, and a nationwide leader in retail, commercial and private residential development. In 2018, Wilf and his family launched WISE (Wilf Innovative Sports & Entertainment) Ventures, an investment fund based in Manhattan. WISE focuses on early and growth-stage investment opportunities in sports, entertainment and real estate. In 2021, Wilf became the Chairman and Governor for Orlando City SC and the Orlando Pride.

Wilf earned his bachelor's degree from Princeton University, where he served as the radio voice of Princeton Tigers football and basketball. He later graduated from the New York University School of Law before becoming a principal in the family business. Wilf currently serves on several boards, including Vanderbilt University, the NYU School of Law, the Princeton Varsity Club and he serves as a Trustee of Yeshiva University. Wilf is chair of the NFL Stadium Committee and serves on the Business Ventures Committee and Fan Engagement and Major Event Committee.

Wilf and his wife Jane, who is also heavily involved in philanthropic activities, have four children.

Leonard Wilf joins cousins Zygi and Mark Wilf with the Vikings ownership group as Vice Chairman of the team for the 18th season in 2022. Away from the Vikings, Wilf also serves as President of family-owned Garden Homes Development, a nationwide leader in retail, commercial and private residential development based in New Jersey and New York. Garden Homes celebrated its 60th year of business in 2014.

Wilf earned his bachelor's degree, Cum Laude, from Boston University. Following his undergraduate work, Wilf graduated with a law degree from Georgetown University. During his tenure at Georgetown, Wilf was editor of the Georgetown Law Review. Wilf went on to receive a Master of Law in Taxation from New York University.

In 2012, Wilf was recognized for his progressive work with charities and named to the board of the NFL Foundation and also serves on the NFL Legislative Committee. Active with several professional and civic groups, Wilf is Vice Chairman on the Board of Trustees of NYU and the NYU Law School. Wilf is former Chairman of the American Society of Yad Vashem and a Board Member of New York Presbyterian Hospital. He is an involved member of the International Council of Shopping Centers and New York Athletic Club, and Wilf was appointed a national trustee of The First Tee Program. Wilf is also active in veterans causes, having The Lincoln Awards, a concert and show which aired on the Public Broadcasting System, to honor vets.

WILF FAMILY DONATES TO PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

On March 26, 2019, the Pro Football Hall of Fame was the recipient of a \$1 million donation from the Wilf Family Foundations led by Minnesota Vikings owners Zygi Wilf, Mark Wilf and Lenny Wilf. The generous gift supports the Pro Football Hall of Fame's programming built around its important mission to "Honor the Heroes of the Game, Preserve its History, Promote its Values and Celebrate Excellence Everywhere."

The funding allowed for the creation of a special "Founders Exhibit" at the Hall of Fame. The exhibit will shine a light on the role of many founders and owners of National Football League franchises. The space highlights the impact these men and women have had on the growth of the league and the effect on communities across the country. The exhibit will cover the complete history from the start of the NFL nearly a century ago through today and will include a special component for "Women of the NFL."

"The Pro Football Hall of Fame deeply appreciates the generosity of the Wilf Family. Zygi Wilf, Mark Wilf, and Lenny Wilf are great ambassadors for this game and the impact it has on millions of fans across the country and the world," former Hall of Fame President & CEO David Baker stated. "Thanks to the support from the Wilf Family Foundations, the Hall of Fame will be able to enhance our programming that inspires generations of fans by focusing on values such as commitment, integrity, courage, respect and excellence."

Mandelbaum and his wife Karen reside in Florida and have four sons - Richard Michael, Jeffrey and Jonathan.




SCOTT LANDIS

ANDREW MILLER

CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER

Andrew Miller is entering his fourth season as Chief Operating Officer of the Minnesota Vikings after being named to the position on Aug. 12, 2019. In his role as COO, Miller works alongside Vikings ownership and executive leadership in developing the organization's vision and the strategy for all business departments.

Following the 2021 season, Miller played a key role as a member of the interview committee in the search for new football leadership, an extensive process that ultimately led to the hiring of General Manager Kwesi Adofo-Mensah and Head Coach Kevin O'Connell. The expansive search included virtual and in-person interviews with numerous candidates and significant background research before ownership and the interview committee landed on Adofo-Mensah, who was officially announced as general manager on Jan. 26, 2022. Miller subsequently continued to work closely on the hiring process that led to the selection of O'Connell, who was named head coach on Feb. 16, 2022.

In addition to participating in significant hires, Miller also implemented a return-to-work plan during the 2022 offseason that resulted in all front office staff moving back into Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center on April 11, 2022. The move brought closure to what had been more than two years of protocols that kept the vast majority of business operations staff working remotely throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.

In 2021, Miller helped guide the Vikings in welcoming fans back to U.S. Bank Stadium following a 2020 season that saw empty or near-empty venues across the country. The 2021 Vikings regular-season home opener marked the first time in more than 630 days the team had hosted fans for a regular season game, and the Vikings treated the return as a grand reopening of U.S. Bank Stadium, complete with a kickoff concert and new pre game introduction show. Throughout 2021, Miller also collaborated with the State of Minnesota to host multiple COVID-19 vaccination clinics at TCO Performance Center and at U.S. Bank Stadium prior to Vikings games, leading to more than 25,000 Minnesotans receiving vaccinations at these clinics.

In 2020, Miller was responsible for guiding the Vikings front office through the coronavirus pandemic following the office closure on March 13. Under his leadership, the Vikings formed both an Internal COVID-19 Committee and an Incident Management Team to direct safety protocols at TCO Performance Center and U.S. Bank Stadium during the 2020 season, as well as to plan for the safe office return for all staff members in 2021. Despite the challenges of working remotely, Miller kept employees focused on using the team's platform to positively impact the community via COVID-19 relief efforts and providing a best-in-class fan experience through virtual events. Miller also served as Co-Chair for the Minnesota Safe Sports Venues Task Force, consisting of executives from the Minnesota professional sports organizations and the University of Minnesota with a mission of bringing fans safely back into stadiums, arenas and ballparks.

Following the 2020 murder of George Floyd in Minneapolis, Miller led the Vikings response, engaging the team's leadership,

players, diversity and inclusion council, staff and alumni to open internal dialogue and determine the best way to use the organization's platform to influence positive change in the community. He has emphasized the Vikings commitment to eliminating racism, influencing positive reform of law enforcement, promoting racial and social equity through education and food security and building an internal culture that champions diversity and inclusion.

Miller previously served as the Executive Vice President of Business Operations for the Toronto Blue Jays from May 2016 to September 2019. In Toronto, Miller was responsible for managing all business operations of the club and Rogers Centre, with a focus on understanding and enhancing the fan experience. He worked closely with the other members of the executive leadership team on organizational strategy and championed the implementation of new business departments concentrated on fan engagement, fan services, strategy and analytics. Miller also oversaw the improvement of business-related systems and processes. He led initiatives in Toronto focused on creating a positive impact by growing the sport of baseball across Canada. Miller also led extensive work on facility renovations and capital improvements for Rogers Centre and the Blue Jays spring training facility upgrades with previous experience doing the same at the Cleveland Indians.

Prior to joining the Blue Jays, Miller spent 10 seasons with the Cleveland Indians, with the final four as Senior Vice President of Strategy & Business Analytics. He first joined the organization in 2006, serving as Baseball Operations Assistant for the 2007 season and Assistant Director of Baseball Operations for the 2008 and 2009 seasons before being promoted to assist Mark Shapiro during his transition to team President from 2010-12. Miller's highlights during his time in Cleveland include playing a lead role in the development, construction and operations of the club's Goodyear Player Development Complex in Arizona and the renovation of Progressive Field.

Before entering professional sports, Miller spent nearly seven years working in the investment banking and venture capital industries and earned a JD-MBA at Northwestern University in 2007. He graduated with a B.S. in business administration from the Haas School of Business at the University of California, Berkeley, in 1997 where he also spent four years as a left-handed pitcher for the Golden Bears baseball team.

Miller serves on the board of directors for the Minnesota Business Partnership, Minneapolis Downtown Council, the Minnesota Vikings Foundation and Teach for America Twin Cities. He also participates in CEOs Against Cancer. Miller and his wife Jill are the parents of Alana, Evan and Adley.



KWESI ADOFO-MENSAH

GENERAL MANAGER

Kwesi Adofo-Mensah (Quay-see Ah-Dough-Fo Men-Saaw), a first-time general manager in the NFL, enters his inaugural season as GM of the Vikings, bringing a variety of strong football experiences and a diverse background. Adofo-Mensah enters his 10th season in the league in 2022.

Prior to his hire by Minnesota, Adofo-Mensah worked closely with Cleveland Browns Executive Vice President of Football Operations and General Manager Andrew Berry and provided input for all roster and strategy decisions. Additionally, he assisted Berry and the football staff with overseeing and managing the day-to-day operations of the team.

Adofo-Mensah helped oversee the Browns' 2021 NFL Draft, where the team selected CB Greg Newsome II and LB Jeremiah Owusu-Koramoah, two immediate-impact rookies that landed on the NFL's All-Rookie Team. Newsome, their first-round selection (26th overall), started in 11 games and posted nine passes defended, the most by a Browns rookie since CB Denzel Ward in 2018. Owusu-Koramoah, their second-round pick (52nd overall), started in 10 games, posted 76 tackles, two forced fumbles, 1.5 sacks and three tackles for loss. Owusu-Koramoah and Cowboys LB Micah Parsons were the only two rookies in the NFL to have at least 75 tackles and two forced fumbles in 2021.

Prior to the Browns, Adofo-Mensah spent seven seasons with the San Francisco 49ers, where he first entered the NFL. During his tenure with the 49ers, Adofo-Mensah quickly advanced in the football research and development department. He joined the team as Football Research and Development Analyst (2013-15) before earning promotions to Manager of Football Research and Development in 2017 and Director of Football Research

and Development in 2018. As the lead of football research and development, Adofo-Mensah ran the team's efforts to develop and implement advanced quantitative methods for game strategy and personnel evaluation, playing a vital role in helping the 2019 NFC No. 1 playoff seed 49ers capture the conference title.

While with the 49ers, Adofo-Mensah helped the front office select three All-Pro's (LB Fred Warner, WR Deebo Samuel and TE George Kittle) and the 2019 *Associated Press* Defensive Rookie of the Year DE Nick Bosa. Warner went on to ink a long-term contract with the 49ers, making him the highest-paid inside linebacker in the NFL.

In June of 2021, Adofo-Mensah led a session at the NFL and Black College Football Hall of Fame's fourth annual Quarterback and Coaching Summit and inaugural Ozzie Newsome General Manager Forum, where he shared his personal story of his rise from a trader and portfolio manager on Wall Street to working in NFL front offices with a data-driven approach to finding talent, while providing a quantitative view to grading a quarterback's short, medium and deep ball accuracy that could be used across the league.

Adofo-Mensah began his professional career as an associate portfolio manager at Taylor Woods Capital and Vice President/ Executive Director at Credit Suisse as a commodities trader before entering the NFL in 2013. The Cherry Hill, New Jersey, native received his bachelor's degree in economics from Princeton University, where he also played basketball. After graduating from Princeton, Adofo-Mensah went on to receive his master's in economics from Stanford University.





JEFF ANDERSON

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT & CHIEF COMMUNICATIONS OFFICER

Jeff Anderson is entering his 20th season with the Vikings and his first as the team's executive vice president and chief communications officer.

In his role, Anderson leads the Vikings communications team, directing football, corporate, strategic and ancillary communications functions. He serves on the Vikings executive leadership team, acts as a team spokesperson on business matters and provides media relations guidance for ownership, executives, football personnel and players.

Prior to this latest move, Anderson served as the team's vice president of strategic & corporate communications from 2018-2021, overseeing communications plans on non-football initiatives and serving as a primary media contact for Vikings ownership. In 2018, the Vikings communications staff received the Rozelle Award, given by the Pro Football Writers of America to the NFL public relations staff that displays consistent excellence in dealings and relationships with the media.

Anderson has held a number of roles inside the organization since joining as a public relations intern in 2003. He worked closely on the organization's internal stadium team in the quest to build a new home for Vikings football, an effort that culminated with the passage of stadium legislation in May 2012. Throughout the endeavor, Anderson led media relations, external and strategic communications and grassroots development. He continued to collaborate with the Vikings stadium team during the four-year design and construction of U.S. Bank Stadium, overseeing the communications plans and driving national and international media coverage leading up to the venue's opening in July 2016.

A native of Adair, Iowa, Anderson graduated from Buena Vista University in Storm Lake, Iowa, before joining the Vikings in 2003. He currently serves on the Minneapolis Regional Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and has previously served on the boards of the East Town Business Partnership and Buena Vista's National Alumni Association. Anderson and his wife Brittany have two daughters, Ruby and Isabelle.



LESTER BAGLEY

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT - PUBLIC AFFAIRS

Lester Bagley brings more than three decades of public affairs, communications and leadership experience to his role as Vikings executive vice president of public affairs. Currently in his 18th season with the Vikings, Bagley oversees public affairs and external relations for the team.

Bagley serves on the Minnesota Vikings executive management team and works closely with team owners Zygi, Mark and Lenny Wilf as they advance the Vikings organizational goals. Bagley works with the Wilf family as they continue to build a sports, entertainment and real estate business, outside of the Vikings. Bagley has worked on several projects, including the development of the Viking Lakes campus and the acquisition of the Orlando City and Orlando Pride soccer organizations, which the Wilf family purchased in July of 2021. Bagley serves on the executive board of the Orlando soccer enterprise.

Bagley is part of the Vikings leadership team that planned and designed Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center, the state-of-the-art Vikings team headquarters, which opened in 2018. The Vikings team headquarters and practice facility occupy approximately 40 acres of the 200-acre Viking Lakes campus in Eagan, Minnesota. The vision for this broader development includes a medical office building, a sports performance center, new residences and other mixed uses to create a live-work-play destination. In October 2020, the Omni Viking Lakes Hotel, a four-star hotel and conference center, opened on the Viking Lakes campus. In addition to working on the development of the hotel, Bagley works with the hotel ownership group on promoting

events and building momentum for the broader campus.

The Vikings organization has created an outstanding fan experience at its team headquarters through Vikings Training Camp and Vikings Prep Spotlight, the program that has hosted 10 high school football games at TCO Stadium during 2018, 2019 and 2021. Bagley has played a leadership role on these programs as well as other significant community outreach programs, including working closely with the team's Social Justice Committee, the Vikings player-driven effort striving for racial justice and equity.

During his tenure at the Vikings, Bagley played a leadership role on one of the most significant accomplishments in franchise history – securing legislative and community support for the iconic U.S. Bank Stadium. The \$1.1 billion multi-purpose facility, the largest construction project in Minnesota history, has proven to be one of the finest stadiums in the world. U.S. Bank Stadium has won several awards for its construction, design and operation. Bagley also served on the executive board and played a significant role in securing and delivering a very successful Super Bowl LII at U.S. Bank Stadium, played on Feb. 4, 2018.

On behalf of the Vikings, Bagley has developed many impactful relationships in Minnesota, the NFL and throughout professional and collegiate sports. The Vikings organization enjoys excellent relationships with elected officials, media, and business, labor and community leaders. Bagley currently serves as vice chair of the Minnesota Vikings Foundation and serves on the boards of the Minnesota Chamber of

Commerce, Meet Minneapolis, the Public Affairs Council and the St. Thomas Academy Fathers' Club.

In addition, Bagley serves on the executive board of Minnesota Sports & Events, which is focused on bringing major sporting events to the Minneapolis-St. Paul market, including the Super Bowl, NCAA Men's and Women's Final Fours, the NFL Draft, X Games and other events. Bagley recently completed his term as the 2019 chair (Head Coach) of Twin Cities Dunkers, a Minneapolis-based organization of

business and civic leaders who host prominent sports figures and raise funds for youth and high school athletics.

A native of Barron, Wisconsin, Bagley attended the University of Minnesota before graduating from the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA). He served as a White House intern and studied at the University of Oxford during his undergraduate days. Bagley and his wife Wendy, who is a graduate of the College of St. Catherine, reside in Minneapolis with their sons, Michael and Charlie.



DON BECKER

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT OF REAL ESTATE AND STRATEGIC PROJECTS

Don Becker, Executive Vice President of Real Estate Development and Strategic Projects, began working with the Vikings organization in January 2007 on the new stadium initiative, working side-by-side with the Vikings ownership and executive team on identifying the best location, best design and overseeing first-class quality construction to build U.S. Bank Stadium.

Serving as Project Executive for the stadium project, Don coordinated all design and construction activities for the new stadium, which went on to be awarded the International Stadium Project of the Year by *Stadium Business* in 2017.

Becker supported the key executives working on the project financing, sales and marketing initiatives, entitlements and sponsorships, branding and signage, transportation improvements, legal agreements and other stadium-related projects. Becker worked hand-in-hand with Kevin Warren, Steve Poppen, Steve LaCroix and Lester Bagley as they managed these initiatives, and in partnering with the Minnesota Sports Facilities Authority, the State of Minnesota and the City of Minneapolis on the stadium project. Becker also worked with the executive team and ownership on the initiative to bring the Super Bowl to U.S. Bank Stadium in 2018.

After completing U.S. Bank Stadium, Becker worked with the Vikings executive team and the Wilf Family in securing the land and completing the design and construction of Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center, the practice facility and headquarters for the

Minnesota Vikings. Rob Brzezinski enters his 30th season in the NFL and 24th with the Minnesota Vikings in 2022. Brzezinski serves as Executive Vice President of Football Operations and provides the Vikings broad-based management expertise and the value of being one of the most experienced NFL executives in the modern (post-1992) Collective Bargaining Agreement era.

Brzezinski has been with teams that have finished .500 or better in 20 of his 29 previous NFL seasons and has been part of 13 playoff seasons.

The Vikings benefit from Brzezinski's extensive knowledge and

strategic salary cap management and a philosophy that has aided in the retention of core players, the addition of key free agents and the overall talent and depth of the team. As the Vikings lead contract negotiator, Brzezinski has negotiated contracts totaling more than \$1 billion, including high-profile contracts for players such as Randy Moss, Steve Hutchinson, Jared Allen, Brett Favre, Adrian Peterson and Kirk Cousins. Brzezinski joined the Vikings in 1999 as Director of Football Administration and was promoted to Vice President of Football Administration in 2001. He was elevated to his current position as Executive Vice President-Football Operations in 2014.

Brzezinski works closely with General Manager Kwesi Adofo-Mensah and Head Coach Kevin O'Connell on all football-related matters and strategic planning. Brzezinski's key responsibilities include salary cap management, negotiation of player contracts, football operations/administration and CBA compliance. Brzezinski also assisted in designing the football space in U.S. Bank Stadium and Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center.

Brzezinski has extensive NFL management experience, has worked as the top football executive and has experience in managing the business operations of an NFL franchise and, while in Minnesota, transformed a substantial salary cap deficit into a long-term competitive advantage. Brzezinski has had the privilege of working for some of the most successful and decorated head coaches in NFL history, including Don Shula, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Green.

In 2004, Brzezinski was invited to participate in the NFL-Stanford Program for Managers at the Stanford Graduate School of Business, a program to promote development of leaders within the League.

Prior to joining the Vikings, Brzezinski spent six seasons (1993-98) with Miami where he rose to Staff Counsel/Salary Cap and assisted in managing business affairs, salary cap administration, player contract negotiations, operations and legal affairs. In his tenure, the Dolphins compiled a 55-41 regular-season record and made the playoffs four times.

Brzezinski earned degrees from Nova Southeastern University in Fort Lauderdale, a Juris Doctorate in 1995 and a Bachelor of Science in education in 1992. In addition, Brzezinski is a member of the Florida Bar. Brzezinski and his wife Leah, who has earned a doctoral degree in education, have five children: Ki, Grace, Jae, Anna and Rose. The Brzezinski family, who reside in Edina, founded Arete Academy in 2014, a school in Minnesota dedicated to educating students who are twice exceptional. The family is active in the community raising awareness for adoption-related causes.

Lara Juras is in her fifth season with the Vikings after joining in 2018 as the club's Vice President of People & Culture and being promoted to her current position of Executive Vice President and Chief People & Culture Officer in 2020. With the Vikings, Juras is responsible for all human resource functions, including hiring, health and welfare benefits, professional development and workplace culture.

With an emphasis on diversity, Juras led the process to add the team's Senior Director of Diversity, Equity & Inclusion, as well as the formation of the organization's DEI Council. She has been a member of the Vikings COVID Committee since March 2020 and played a critical role in ensuring the safety and health of Vikings staff members throughout the pandemic. KARIN NELSEN

Karin Nelsen is in her seventh season with the Vikings. As Executive Vice President & Chief Legal Officer, she is responsible for managing the legal affairs of the organization and the legal department. In her role, Nelsen also plays a leadership role in the Vikings social impact work, which includes community relations, youth football, Vikings Legends and the Minnesota Vikings Foundation.

Nelsen has served as a member of the Vikings COVID Committee since March 2020, providing leadership on the development and implementation of the team's COVID-19 protocols and incident response plans. Nelsen played a key role in the club's planning to welcome fans back to U.S. Bank Stadium in 2021.

Nelsen joined the Vikings after 18 years with Cargill, Incorporated. Currently in his 10th season with the Vikings and his 17th in the NFL, John Penhollow serves as Executive Vice President & Chief Revenue Officer for the club, where he oversees all revenue-generating activities while driving vision, strategic priorities and culture for the organization. He leads the strategy, design, development, sales & execution of U.S. Bank Stadium, Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center and Vikings corporate partnerships, premium seating, ticketing sales and operations for the organization. He also oversees the organization's effort to integrate technology and infrastructure into the stadium's design to enhance the fan experience and maximize corporate revenue.

Penhollow started with the club as the Director of New Stadium Partnerships and quickly progressed to the Vice President of Corporate and Technology Partnerships. He was tasked with strategizing how

to design and sell U.S. Bank Stadium in order to elevate the club from the bottom of the NFL in all revenue categories in 2015. Through a new foundation and architecture for sponsorships, new sales materials, and strategies, he led the club into the top five in all categories by 2016. His efforts grew revenue by 333 percent, which accelerated the club's decision to build a world-class training facility.

After completing U.S. Bank Stadium, Penhollow was a key member of the executive team who worked closely with the Wilf Family to design, build and sell naming rights to Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center. He was an instrumental member of the team charged with bringing Super Bowl LII to U.S. Bank Stadium in 2018. Penhollow later served on the project team charged with the design and construction of the Omni Viking Lakes Hotel.

Prior to joining the Vikings, Penhollow was Vice President of Corporate Sales & Service for the Cleveland Browns, overseeing all aspects of revenue generation. Currently in his 24th season with the Vikings in 2022, Steve Poppen serves as the team's Executive Vice President & Chief Business Administration Officer after serving as the club's EVP and Chief Financial Officer for many years. In his role, Poppen continues to work with the accounting and finance, security, facilities and IT departments along with financing and operations of U.S. Bank Stadium and Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center. Poppen also serves as an EVP and CFO of MV Ventures, LLC, the Wilf Family's Minnesota real estate development and operations entity. MV Ventures is responsible for development and operations of the Viking Lakes campus in Eagan. Poppen also serves on the Executive Board of the Orlando City and Orlando Pride soccer clubs. Orlando City Soccer Club and Orlando Pride are Wilf-owned professional soccer teams and are members of Major League Soccer and the National Women's Soccer League.

As a project leader on the TCO Performance Center facility, Poppen was involved daily with financing, design, construction and cooperation with city, county and regional governing bodies that kept the project on track.

For several years, Poppen played a lead role in the Vikings attempts to pass new stadium legislation, an exhaustive effort that culminated with Governor Mark Dayton signing the stadium bill into law on May 14, 2012. After passage of the stadium legislation, Poppen continued to serve on the Vikings stadium team, working with the design and construction process, and was part of the executive group that negotiated the team's use agreement and development agreement, as well as other documents governing the construction and day-to-day operations of the new publicly owned facility. Poppen also oversaw the Vikings efforts to finance the more than \$600 million team/private commitment to the project. In 2013, he helped secure \$425 million in loans from the NFL and a bank syndicate led by U.S. Bank as part of the team contribution.

The passage of the stadium bill not only secured the team in Minnesota but also gave Vikings fans a premier venue to watch their team beginning in the 2016 NFL season. Along with Vikings football, the multi-purpose facility hosted Super Bowl LII in February 2018, the NCAA Men's Final Four basketball tournament in April 2019, and has been designed to host other national and international events,

including concerts, high school and amateur sports and other community events.

U.S. Bank Stadium is an elite venue and unrivaled experience in the NFL. The design features for which the Vikings fought include the most fan-friendly and most technologically advanced stadium in the League. It provides an indoor-outdoor experience that is ideal for the Greater Minneapolis/St. Paul market. The progressive architectural design is a signature element on the Minneapolis skyline.

A native of Watertown, South Dakota, Poppen spent eight years as a certified public accountant in the business assurance group of PricewaterhouseCoopers, LLP, in Kansas City before joining the Vikings. In 2006, Poppen participated in the NFL-Stanford Program for Managers at the Stanford Graduate School of Business, a program developed by the NFL to promote growth of leaders within the League.

Poppen received his bachelor's degree in accounting from Evangel University in Springfield, Missouri, in 1991. Poppen played football at Evangel, an NAIA member of the Heart of America Athletic Conference. Poppen is an active member of his community and either serves or has served on several boards and committees that have missions that are in alignment with his values and interests. Poppen's past board service includes Minnesota Adult and Teen Challenge, a faith-based drug and alcohol rehabilitation program for Minnesota adults and teens, Minneapolis Downtown Council and Downtown Improvement District, and the Minnesota State Fair Foundation. Poppen's current board service includes Twin Cities Habitat for Humanity, where he serves on its Lending Committee and Development Committee. Poppen also currently serves as an Independent Trustee of the 360 Funds Trust, a mutual fund investment trust based in Kansas City, Missouri.

KEVIN O'CONNELL

HEAD COACH

The Minnesota Vikings named Kevin O'Connell as the 10th head coach in franchise history on Feb. 16, 2022. Coming off a Super Bowl LVI victory over the Cincinnati Bengals, O'Connell joins the Vikings after serving as the offensive coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams the past two seasons.

O'Connell, who led the Rams to finish ninth in total offense (372.1 yards per game) this season, helped his unit rank second in plays of 50-plus yards (10), fourth in yards per play (5.98) and eighth in offensive touchdowns (51) in 2021. Under the guidance of O'Connell, Rams QB Matthew Stafford and WR Cooper Kupp both had career years in 2021. Stafford set the single-season team record for passing yards (4,886) and tied Kurt Warner from his 1999 MVP season for the most passing touchdowns in a season by a Rams quarterback with 41, while also winning his first playoff game in his 13th season in the NFL. Kupp, who was named 2021 NFL Offensive Player of the Year by *The Associated Press* and Super Bowl LVI MVP, had one of the best receiving seasons in NFL history, leading the NFL in receptions (145), receiving yards (1,947) and receiving touchdowns (16), earning AP First-Team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.

During the 2021 season, O'Connell's lone season with Stafford, the signal caller threw for the third-most passing yards (4,886) and second-most touchdowns (41) in the NFL, all while achieving his career-best 102.9 passer rating (in seasons with more than eight starts), the sixth-best in the NFL. Kupp's wide receiver Triple Crown in 2021, which he won after leading the NFL in receptions (145), receiving yards (1,947) and touchdowns (16), joined him with WR Jerry Rice (San Francisco 49ers, 1990), WR Sterling Sharpe (Green Bay Packers, 1992) and WR Steve Smith (Carolina Panthers, 2005) as the only players since the 1970 merger to achieve this feat. Kupp's 145 receptions and 1,947 receiving yards both ranked as the second-highest single-season totals in NFL history, trailing only Michael Thomas's 149 receptions in 2019 and Calvin Johnson's 1,964 receiving yards in 2012.

O'Connell was instrumental in aiding mid-season free agent signee WR Odell Beckham, Jr., to five receiving touchdowns in eight games played with the team, the most since his 2018 season with the New York Giants. O'Connell also helped the Rams offense tie for seventh in scoring offense (27.1 points per game) and score on 45.9% of their offensive drives, which ranked third in the NFL behind the Kansas City Chiefs (48.2) and New England Patriots (48.0).

The 2020 Rams offense featured the 10th-ranked rushing attack, posting 126.1 yards per game on the ground, behind two 600-plus rushing seasons from RB Cam Akers and RB Darrell

Henderson. Anchored by T Andrew Whitworth, the oldest offensive lineman in the NFL, the Rams offensive line only allowed 56 sacks in the two years O'Connell was in Los Angeles, which was good for the seventh-fewest among NFL clubs. The offensive line's sack rate, 4.5%, was the fifth-lowest in the NFL over the past two years. In addition to helping QB Jared Goff to his fourth consecutive season with at least 3,800 passing yards and 20 touchdowns in 2020, O'Connell prepared QB John Wolford for a win-and-in game against the Arizona Cardinals in Week 17, helping him pass for 231 yards and rush for 56 yards in his NFL debut, while leading the Rams to a 18-7 victory and a playoff berth.

Under O'Connell, Rams quarterbacks have thrown for 1,517 passing yards (third in NFL), 11 touchdowns (fourth in NFL) and a 106.4 passer rating in playoff games (second in NFL). He recently coached Stafford to a Super Bowl win, helping him post a 4-0 record in the postseason and 108.3 passer rating, which trailed only QB Josh Allen and QB Patrick Mahomes. Furthermore, the Rams' 1,186 passing yards in the 2021 playoffs were the most in NFL history, surpassing the 2011 New York Giants (1,144). O'Connell helped Kupp (478) and Beckham, Jr., (288) post a combined 766 receiving yards in the playoffs, the most by any wide receiver duo this postseason.

Prior to joining the Rams, O'Connell worked in Washington, serving as the quarterbacks coach in 2017-18 and the offensive coordinator in 2019. O'Connell coached QB Kirk Cousins in 2017, helping him throw for more than 4,000 yards and 27 touchdowns, and record a career-high 342 rushing yards and a league-leading four game-winning drives. Cousins' 4,093 passing yards marked his third-consecutive 4,000-yard passing season, helping him become the 11th quarterback in NFL history to accomplish this feat. During the 2018 season, O'Connell was tasked with getting three different quarterbacks (Josh Johnson, Colt McCoy and Mark Sanchez) up to speed following a devastating injury to starting QB Alex Smith.

In 2019, O'Connell helped guide rookie WR Terry McLaurin to 58 receptions, 919 receiving yards and seven touchdowns, the second-most receptions and third-most receiving yards and touchdowns among rookies in franchise history. O'Connell oversaw the production of three quarterbacks in 2019, specifically rookie QB Dwayne Haskins, Jr. Once Haskins, Jr., became the full-time starter in Week 9, he passed for 1,225 yards, seven touchdowns, three interceptions and an 85.5 passer rating. O'Connell also helped Vikings all-time leading rusher Adrian Peterson eclipse 1,000 scrimmage yards (1,040) at the age of 34.

Since O'Connell became an offensive coordinator in 2019, he has coached one Super Bowl MVP (Kupp), two Pro Bowlers (G Brandon Scherff and Kupp), one All-Pro (Kupp) and one PFWA All-Rookie Team member (McLaurin).

O'Connell worked on special projects with the San Francisco 49ers in 2016, where he overlapped with Vikings General Manager Kwesi Adofo-Mensah. Prior to his one year in San Francisco, O'Connell was the quarterbacks coach in Cleveland during the

Kupp is the only receiver in NFL history to accomplish this in a single season. WR Jerry Rice is the only other receiver to do this in a career, completing this in a six-year span (1985-1990).

2015 season, assisting QB Josh McCown to becoming the only player in team history to throw for 300 or more passing yards in three consecutive games. McCown also broke the single-game passing record in 2015, throwing for 457 yards against the Baltimore Ravens.

As a player, O'Connell was drafted in the third round (94th pick) of the 2008 NFL Draft by the New England Patriots out of San Diego State. He played one season for the Patriots behind QB Matt Cassel following a season-ending injury to QB Tom Brady. During the 2009 preseason, O'Connell was claimed by the Detroit Lions and was then later traded to the New York Jets for a seventh-round pick. Before his NFL career ended in 2012, O'Connell spent time with the Miami Dolphins, a second-stint with the Jets and the San Diego Chargers.

As a four-year captain at San Diego State, O'Connell finished his career after appearing in 40 games while ranking third in completions (664), fourth in passing yards (7,689) and fifth in passing touchdowns (46) in school history. The Carlsbad, California, native and his wife, Leah, have two sons, Kaden and Kolten, and a daughter, Quinn. O'Connell's father, Bill, was a longtime FBI agent, and his mother, Suzanne had a career as an educator. O'Connell has an older sister, Kelley, who is an attorney.

Matt Daniels enters his fifth season coaching in the NFL and first with the Vikings as special teams coordinator, after spending the past two seasons as the assistant special teams coach for the Dallas Cowboys. He brings six total seasons of coaching experience and eight years of playing experience, both collegiately and professionally, to Head Coach Kevin O'Connell's staff.

In 2021, Dallas' special teams unit, led by John Fassel and assisted by Daniels, finished in the top five for a consecutive year in kick return average (24.8). With Daniels' assistance, K Greg Zuerlein made 29 field goals, tying for the ninth-most in the NFL, on 35 attempts for a success rate of 82.9%. P Bryan Anger averaged 48.4 yards per punt, tying for fourth and ultimately earning him his first Pro Bowl honor. The special teams unit led the league in most special teams touchdowns, two of which were blocked punts and one where RB Tony Pollard returned a kick for 100 yards for a touchdown against Las Vegas in Week 12, the first return for a touchdown in his career.

Following the 2021 season, Rick Gosselin ranked the Dallas special teams sixth overall, averaging fifth in kick returns (24.8) and fourth (48.4) in punting.

In Daniels' first season in Dallas in 2020 the team saw instant upgrades in the special teams rankings. Dallas jumped from last in the league in kick return average (16.3) in 2019 to third (26.1) in 2020 and from 26th (5.7) in punt return average in 2019 to 13th (9.1) in 2020.

Pollard, Dallas' primary kick returner, finished fourth in the NFL with 766 kick return yards on 32 kickoffs - both career-highs. Fassel and Daniels also brought over a familiar face at kicker in 2020, as former Ram Greg Zuerlein's 34 made field goals were third-most in the NFL and tied Richie Cunningham (1997) for the most made field goals in a single season in Cowboys history. Zuerlein also tallied 135 points - tied for the second-most in a single season in club history.

Daniels and Fassel deployed one of the most aggressive and creative special teams groups with the Rams in recent years, and from 2018-19 they had the most fake kicks (eight), recorded six punt returns of 20-plus yards and finished second in the league in net punting average (43.0) in 2018. Also in 2018, LB Cory Littleton was named to the Pro Bowl as the special teams player for the NFC after blocking two punts and deflecting another.

Daniels joined the Rams after a four-year stint as a player in the NFL and a one-year graduate assistantship at the University of Colorado in 2017. He played in seven games over the course of his four-year NFL career for the St. Louis Rams (six) and San Diego Chargers (one). He also spent time on the practice squads for Jacksonville and the Chargers.

Collegiately, Daniels earned first-team All-ACC and second-team All-America honors as a senior at safety, leading Duke in tackles (126). In his final season as a Blue Devil, he finished second in the balloting for ACC Defensive Player of the Year accolades. Daniels played in 46 career games at Duke and compiled totals of 324 tackles, 13.0 tackles for loss, four interceptions, seven forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and 27 pass breakups. He was

named a team captain for the 2011 season.

As a prep at Fayette County High School in Fayetteville, Ga., Daniels was a three-time all-region pick and two-time all-county choice. Additionally, he was named Fayette County's Offensive and Defensive Player of the Year as both a junior and senior, setting the school single-game rushing record with 348 yards on 18 carries. Daniels also participated in track and field at Fayetteville and was honored with the Watkins Award, an honor presented annually to the top African-American high school student-athlete in the country.

Daniels holds a degree in public policy studies with a minor in markets & management studies from Duke. He and his wife, Tiffany, have a daughter, Yara.

Ed Donatell enters his first season with the Minnesota Vikings as defensive coordinator after spending the past three seasons as defensive coordinator for the Denver Broncos (2019-21). The veteran defensive coach brings 31 seasons of NFL experience to Head Coach Kevin O'Connell's staff.

In his 31 seasons in the NFL, Donatell has helped coach teams to 13 playoff appearances and three Super Bowl berths. He was part of the Denver's back-to-back Super Bowl championships during the 1997 (XXXII) and 1998 (XXXIII) seasons, serving as the defensive backs coach from 1995-99. Donatell has helped send 21 players to the Pro Bowl and six players earn All-Pro.

He has worked as a defensive coordinator four separate times - the Denver Broncos (2019-21), University of Washington (2008), Atlanta Falcons (2004-06) and the Green Bay Packers (2000-03).

In the past two seasons with Denver, Donatell helped the club become the first team since red zone statistics began being tracked in 1995 to lead the league in red zone defense in consecutive years (43.9% on 47-of-107 attempts). In 2020, he helped OLB Bradley Chubb and S Justin Simmons to their first Pro Bowl honors. Simmons recorded a career-high five interceptions that season and 96 total tackles, while Chubb, who missed most of the 2019 season battling a knee injury, tallied 75 sacks.

His first season as defensive coordinator for the Broncos was in 2019, where he helped the defense finish 10th in scoring defense (19.8 ppg) and 12th in total defense (337.0 ypg). OLB Von Miller was named to his eighth Pro Bowl, while Simmons earned his first All-Pro (Second Team) honor. He was one of just four players to record at least 90 tackles and four interceptions. Simmons, along with veteran defensive backs Kareem Jackson and Chris Harris, Jr., led a defensive backfield that allowed the 11th-fewest passing yards (225.6 ypg) in the league.

Prior to returning to Denver as the defensive coordinator, Donatell served as the defensive backs coach, helping his secondaries to a top-seven ranking against the pass in each of

the seven seasons, while leading the NFL in interceptions twice (2014, 2018) during that span. Chicago's 75 big passing plays (20+ yards) allowed from 2017-18 were the fewest in the NFL.

The Bears' secondary in 2018 helped the defense rank among the NFL's best in numerous categories, including scoring defense (17.7 ppg - 1st), total defense (299.7 ypg - 3rd), pass defense (219.7 ypg - 7th), yards per play (4.8 - 1st), opponent quarterback rating (72.9 - 1st), interceptions (27 - 1st) and third-down defense (34.2 ypg - 4th). The NFC North Champions featured a pair of First-Team *Associated Press* All-Pro selections on the back end in CB Kyle Fuller and S Eddie Jackson.

As defensive backs coach for San Francisco from 2011-14, Donatell helped the 49ers rank sixth against the pass (218.2 ypg) while tying for the second-most interceptions (78) in the NFL. The 49ers' Pro Bowl defensive backs - CB Carlos Rogers (2011) as well as safeties Dashon Goldson (2011-12), Donte Whitner (2012), Eric Reid (2013) and Antoine Bethea (2014) - were instrumental in limiting opponents to the second-worst quarterback rating (76.8) during that four-year span. Donatell and General Manager Kwesi Adofo-Mensah overlapped with the 49ers when Adofo-Mensah worked in the 49ers research and development department.

Before joining the 49ers, Donatell spent two seasons (2009-10) with the Broncos, coaching a secondary that included Pro Football Hall of Famer CB Champ Bailey and S Brian Dawkins. In 2009, Denver finished third in the NFL against the pass (186.3 ypg) as Bailey and Dawkins both represented the Broncos in the Pro Bowl.

Before working as the University of Washington's defensive coordinator in 2008 and as a special assistant for the New York Jets in 2007, Donatell was the Falcons' defensive coordinator from 2004-06. Atlanta's defense was one of the NFL's best in sacks and third-down percentage during that three-year period, and it featured four players who earned a total of six Pro Bowl selections.

Donatell spent four seasons as Green Bay's defensive coordinator from 2000-03, helping the Packers record an NFL-best 116 takeaways from 2001-03. Green Bay advanced to the playoffs during each of those three seasons, including the 2001 and 2002 campaigns. Green Bay won the NFC North in 2002. Donatell was part of Denver's back-to-back Super Bowl championships during the 1997 (XXXII) and 1998 (XXXIII) seasons while serving as its defensive backs coach from 1995-99.

The Broncos were seventh in the league in both passing yards per game (199.6) and passing yards per attempt (6.5) allowed en route to earning three playoff berths during Donatell's time on staff. Pro Football Hall of Fame safety Steve Atwater was named to the Pro Bowl three times (1995-96, 1998) under Donatell, and safety Tyrone Braxton was named to the Pro Bowl once (1996) with Donatell as his position coach. The Broncos ranked among the league's top 10 clubs against the pass in four of Donatell's five seasons as defensive backs coach, including during three consecutive years from 1995-97. Donatell worked as the Jets'

defensive backs coach from 1990-94, instructing Pro Football Hall of Fame safety Ronnie Lott during his final two professional seasons.

The Stow, Ohio, native was an all-conference defensive back, team captain and four-year letterwinner at Glenville State University in West Virginia, where he received his bachelor's degree in physical education before going on to earn his master's in administration from Kent State in 1981, where he got his start as a coach. He and his wife, Shari, have a daughter, Brenna, and two sons who are also football coaches – Tom (Assistant Secondary, Los Angeles Chargers) and Steve (Quality Control - Defense, Minnesota Vikings).

KRAUSE'S INTERCEPTION RECORD REMAINS UNTOUCHABLE

Vikings Legend Paul Krause set the NFL's career interception record with his 81st in 1979, a mark that has not been in jeopardy over the past four decades. The most recent player to get close was fellow Pro Football Hall of Famer Charles Woodson, who notched 65 career picks before his retirement following the 2015 season. A pair of current Vikings are among the active interception leaders with Harrison Smith and Patrick Peterson both notching 29 INTs in their careers.

MIKE PETTINE

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH

Mike Pettine (PETT-in), having worked with Head Coach Kevin O'Connell twice in his career - once when O'Connell was a player with the New York Jets and once when they both coached at Cleveland - enters his first season with the Minnesota Vikings as the assistant head coach and 20th overall in the NFL. Pettine, who spent the 2021 season as the senior defensive assistant for the Chicago Bears, brings 28 seasons of overall coaching experience to the staff, stemming in the high school, collegiate and professional ranks.

In 2021, Pettine helped get the Chicago defense back to the top 10 in total defense, finishing the season as the sixth-ranked unit, allowing only 316.7 yards per game. Under Pettine's guidance, pass rusher Robert Quinn finished second in sacks (18.5) and Roquan Smith finished fifth in the league in total tackles (163). Chicago's defense also recorded 49 sacks on the season, the fourth-most in the league.

In his final season in Green Bay, Pettine helped the Packers to the NFC Championship Game, leading a defense that ranked No. 7 in the NFL in passing yards allowed (221.2) and No. 9 in total yards allowed (334.0) in 2020. The Packers also ranked third in fewest plays allowed of 20+ yards, eighth in red zone scoring efficiency (57.7%) and tied for 10th in sacks (41). Following the season, edge rusher Za'Darius Smith and cornerback Jaire Alexander were named Second-Team All-Pro by *The Associated Press*.

In 2019, Pettine guided a defense that ranked No. 9 in points allowed (19.6 ppg), the first time the Packers had finished in the top 10 in the NFL in the category since 2010. It marked Green Bay's biggest one-year improvement in scoring defense (5.4-point decrease from 2018) since 1996 (13.1 ppg after allowing 19.6 ppg in 1995). Green Bay also ranked in the top 10 in the league in interceptions (17, tied-third), takeaways (25, tied-seventh) and opponent passer rating (81.1, sixth) in 2019. The 2019 Packers were one of only five teams in the NFL to allow fewer than 20 points per game and post 40-plus sacks and 25-plus takeaways. Green Bay's defense featured the first duo in team history (since 1982) to post 12-plus sacks each in the same season in LBs Za'Darius Smith (career-high 13.5) and Preston Smith (career-best 12.0).

In his first season with the Packers in 2018, Pettine led a defense that was tied for No. 8 in the league in sacks (44), the most by Green Bay since it posted the same number in 2013. Green Bay's defense featured 16 different players with at least a half-sack that season, the second most in team history (since 1982) behind only the 1987 campaign (strike season) in which 17 players registered a half-sack or more. Pettine guided the Packers to a No. 12 ranking in pass defense (234.5 yards per game) after the team finished No. 23 in the category in 2017. Green Bay's defense also improved to No. 9 in the league in three-and-out percentage (21.9) after checking in at No. 26 in the category in 2017 and No. 8 in the NFL in opponent red-zone scoring percentage (83.9) after ranking No. 32 in '17.

In his first season as Cleveland's head coach in 2014, Pettine led the Browns to their most victories (seven) since 2007 as they led the league in opponent passer rating (74.1) and opponent

completion percentage (57.1) and ranked No. 2 in interceptions (21). The Browns engineered four fourth-quarter comebacks on the season, including the largest road comeback in NFL history after the team rallied from a 25-point deficit at Tennessee in Week 4, scoring 26 unanswered points to defeat the Titans, 29-28.

Cleveland's defense made significant improvement in nearly every major defensive statistic in 2014, including opponent passer rating (No. 16 in 2013 to No. 1 in 2014), takeaways (tied for No. 24 to tied for No. 4), red zone defense (tied for 29 to No. 5), points allowed per game (No. 23 to No. 9) and third-down defense (31 to No. 11). After finishing the 2013 campaign with a minus-8 turnover margin, the Browns posted a plus-6 margin in Pettine's first season, the largest increase by Cleveland in 23 years.

The Browns had four players named to the Pro Bowl for the 2014 season, with S Tashaun Gipson, CB Joe Haden, T Joe Thomas and S Donte Whitner all earning selections. It marked the first time in team history that three defensive backs were selected to the Pro Bowl, and it was the first time the Browns had three defensive players named to the all-star game since 1995. Cleveland also had three players selected to the Pro Bowl in 2015, with Thomas, TE Gary Barnidge and C Alex Mack all honored. Pettine worked with both Vikings Head Coach Kevin O'Connell when O'Connell was the quarterbacks coach in 2015 and Vikings Tight Ends/Passing Game Coordinator Brian Angelichio when he was the tight ends coach.

Prior to joining the Browns, Pettine spent five seasons as a defensive coordinator in the NFL, helping his units finish in the top 10 in the league in total yards allowed and passing yards allowed in all five seasons. In 2013, he helped the Bills rank No. 2 in the league with a franchise-record 57 sacks as they were the only team in the league to have three players (DE Mario Williams, DT Kyle Williams, DT Marcell Dareus) each register 10-plus sacks. All three players and S Jairus Byrd were selected to the Pro Bowl, with Mario Williams and Byrd also earning Second-Team All-Pro honors from *AP*. Pettine also oversaw the development of LB Kiko Alonso, who was named the 2013 Defensive Rookie of the Year by the Pro Football Writers of America after leading the team with a career-high 159 tackles, two sacks and four interceptions.

Under Pettine's direction, Buffalo ranked No. 1 in the NFL in 2013 in opponent completion percentage (55.3), No. 2 in interceptions (23), No. 3 in opponent passer rating (74.9), No. 4 in passing yards allowed (204.4 ypg) and tied for No. 6 in takeaways (30). The Bills finished No. 10 in the league in total defense (333.4 ypg) in 2013 after finishing No. 22 (362.9 ypg) in 2012.

During Pettine's four seasons with the Jets (2009-12), the defense ranked No. 1 in the NFL over that span in opponent passer rating (71.0), opponent completion percentage (52.6) and passing yards allowed (186.3 ypg), No. 2 in total yards allowed (294.8 ypg) and third-down defense (34.6%), and No. 7 in points allowed (20.0 ppg) and takeaways (115).

In 2012, Pettine helped the Jets rank No. 2 in the league in passing yards allowed (189.8 ypg) and opponent completion percentage (53.8), No. 6 in yards per attempt (6.49) and No. 7

in opponent passer rating (78.2). Two members of New York's secondary were selected to the Pro Bowl (CB Antonio Cromartie, S LaRon Landry), with Landry earning Pro Bowl honors for the first time in his career.

In 2011, Pettine guided New York to a No. 3 ranking in opponent passer rating (69.6) as the Jets also finished No. 4 in the NFL in opponent completion percentage (54.2) and No. 6 in yards per attempt (6.73). The Jets were tied for No. 5 in the league with 31 takeaways, marking the third straight season under Pettine that the team forced 30-plus turnovers as the Jets joined the Packers as the only two teams in the league to do so from 2009-11.

Pettine helped the Jets rank No. 1 in the league in opponent completion percentage (50.7) and No. 3 in total yards allowed (291.5 ypg) in 2010 as New York advanced to the AFC Championship Game, highlighted by road wins at Indianapolis and New England in the playoffs. New York's defense also ranked No. 3 in the league that season in rushing yards allowed (90.9 ypg) and yards allowed per carry (3.56).

Pettine made an immediate impact in his first season with the Jets in 2009, guiding the defense to No. 1 overall rankings in total yards allowed (252.3), passing yards allowed (153.7 ypg) and points allowed (14.8 ppg). The average of 14.8 points allowed per game set a franchise single-season record, while the average of 252.3 yards allowed per game was the secondbest mark in team history (240.2 ypg in 1968). Pettine's defense gave up 10 or fewer points a league-high seven times in '09, which also set a franchise single-season record. His defense allowed a franchise-low eight passing TDs on the season, the fewest given up by an NFL team in a 16-game season to that point. The Jets also led the league in opponent passer rating (58.8) – the best mark posted by an NFL team since the 2003 Patriots (56.2) – and opponent completion percentage (51.7).

Cornerback Darrelle Revis earned All-Pro First-Team honors from AP and was selected to the Pro Bowl in 2009-11 under Pettine's guidance, the lone cornerback in the league to receive first-team All-Pro and Pro Bowl recognition in each of those seasons. Revis posted career highs in interceptions (six) and passes defended (34) in 2009, finishing as the runner-up in AP Defensive Player of the Year voting to Packers CB Charles Woodson.

Prior to joining the Jets, Pettine spent seven seasons (2002-08) with the Baltimore Ravens, serving as the outside linebackers coach for the final four seasons. He helped Baltimore's defense rank second in total yards allowed in 2008, sixth in 2007, first in 2006 and fifth in 2005. The Ravens were tied for fifth in the NFL from 2005-08 with 168 sacks, including a franchise-record 60 in '06. In 2008, LB Terrell Suggs earned Pro Bowl honors after registering eight sacks and a career-high two INTs returned to touchdowns. Suggs and LB Adalius Thomas both earned Pro Bowl recognition under Pettine's direction in 2006, with Thomas recording a career-high 11 sacks as he finished tied for third among NFL linebackers. Pettine joined the Ravens in 2002, serving as a coaching and video assistant that first season before working as a coaching assistant/quality control coach in 2003 and a defensive assistant in 2004.

Prior to joining the NFL coaching ranks, Pettine was the head coach at North Penn High School (Lansdale, Pennsylvania) from 1997-2001. He led the school to 45 wins in five seasons, including an 11-2 record in 1999. Pettine also served as the head coach at William Tennent High School (Warmminster, Pennsylvania) in 1995-96, taking over a team that had won three games total in the previous three seasons. He led the team to five wins in his

first season and a school-record nine victories in 1996. Pettine also spent two seasons coaching at the college level, serving as a defensive graduate assistant at the University of Pittsburgh in 1993-94.

Pettine began his coaching career as an assistant to his father, Mike Sr., at Central Bucks West High School in Doylestown, Pennsylvania, for five seasons (1988-92). Mike Sr., who coached 33 seasons at the school, retired after the 1999 campaign as the winningest coach in the history of Pennsylvania high school football with a career record of 326-42-4 (.882). Pettine played for his father and earned all-state honors at quarterback and defensive back.

Pettine was a two-year letterman (1986-87) as a free safety at the University of Virginia, leading the team with five interceptions in 1986 and tying the single-game school record for INTs with three vs. North Carolina State that season. He graduated with a degree in economics.

Born Sept. 25, 1966, in Doylestown, Pennsylvania, Pettine and his wife, Megan, have six children in their combined family: daughters Megan, Katie, Paige and McKenna, and sons, Ryan and Max.

The Minnesota Vikings named Wes Phillips offensive coordinator. Phillips adds 15 years of NFL coaching experience to the staff, most recently serving as pass game coordinator/tight ends coach for the Los Angeles Rams, who won Super Bowl LVI over the Cincinnati Bengals.

Phillips worked as a tight ends coach from 2013-21,, helping a player from his unit post 500-plus receiving yards in nine consecutive seasons. Phillips joins the Minnesota Vikings after spending the past three seasons with the Los Angeles Rams as the tight ends coach in 2019-20 and pass game coordinator/tight ends coach in 2021. Phillips assisted in QB Matthew Stafford's first season with the team, helping him throw for the third-most passing yards (4,886) and second-most touchdowns (41) in the NFL, all while achieving his career-best 102.9 passer rating (in seasons with more than eight starts). During his first year as pass game coordinator, WR Cooper Kupp had one of the best receiving seasons in NFL history, leading the NFL in receptions (145), receiving yards (1,947) and receiving touchdowns (16), earning AP First-Team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.

Phillips played a vital role in developing TE Tyler Higbee and TE Gerald Everett. In 2019, the first year of Phillips' tenure, Higbee set career highs in receptions (69) and receiving yards (734), while Everett recorded his first career 400-plus yard receiving season. Higbee has also posted three consecutive 500-plus receiving seasons, joining TE George Kittle and TE Dallas Goedert as the only NFC tight ends to accomplish this feat since 2019.

Prior to his time in Los Angeles, Phillips spent five seasons in Washington coaching the tight ends. In 2018, Phillips helped TE Jordan Reed lead the team in receptions (54) and receiving yards (558), both ranking in the top half of the league among tight ends, while TE Vernon Davis caught 25 passes for 367 yards, joining Pittsburgh's TEs Vance McDonald (610) and Jesse James (423) as the only tight end duo with more than 350 receiving yards. Phillips aided in the production of TE Vernon Davis in 2017, amounting to 43 receptions, 648 yards and leading Washington with a 15.1 yards per catch average. Davis' 15.1 yards per catch average ranked second in the NFL behind TE Rob Gronkowski, making him the first Washington tight end since TE Clint Didier in 1986 to rank in the top two in receiving average among tight ends.

In 2016, the Washington tight ends combined for 1,306 receiving yards and eight touchdowns, all thrown by QB Kirk Cousins. Reed (686) and Davis (583) both had 500-plus yard receiving seasons, making them one of two tight end duos in the NFL to eclipse 500 receiving yards on the year, (TE Martellus Bennett (701) and Gronkowski (540) of the New England Patriots). Reed was voted to the Pro Bowl and became the fastest tight end in NFL history to reach 200 career receptions (38 games), passing Hall of Fame TE Kellen Winslow (39 career games).

Phillips coached Reed to one of the best seasons from a tight end in franchise history in 2015, guiding him to 87 receptions, 952 receiving yards and 11 touchdowns. Reed's receptions and receiving yards are the most in a single season in franchise history

among tight ends, while his touchdowns are the second-most in franchise history behind Jerry Smith (12). In his first season in Washington, Phillips played a role in TE Niles Paul recording career highs in receptions (39) and receiving yards (507).

Phillips' first year as a tight ends coach was in 2013 with the Dallas Cowboys, coaching TE Jason Witten to a 73-reception, 851-receiving yard, eight-touchdown season and Pro Bowl berth. Prior to his time as tight ends coach, Phillips held the assistant offensive line title in 2011-12, assisting the first and second year of eventual 2010s All-Decade Team member, T Tyron Smith. Phillips got his start in 2007 with the Cowboys as a quality control/offensive assistant from 2007-10.

Before joining the Cowboys, Phillips coached the quarterbacks at Baylor in 2006 and helped QB Shawn Bell post 2,582 passing yards and 19 touchdowns, both career highs. Phillips spent the 2004-05 seasons at West Texas A&M, coaching in one of the most successful years in school history in 2005. The team posted a 10-2 record and were crowned Lone Star Conference Champions. Under the leadership of Phillips, QB Dalton Bell was named a finalist for the Harlon Hill Trophy, an award given annually to the best Division II player.

Phillips, who played quarterback, was a three-year letter winner at UTEP (1999-2001) and was part of the 2000 team that claimed a WAC title. He played in 11 games during his final year at the school, throwing for 1,839 yards and 10 touchdowns. Following his college career, he went to play for the San Diego Riptide in the AF2 Arena Football league.

Phillips is a third-generation NFL coach. His grandfather, Bum, was the head coach of the Houston Oilers (1975-80) and New Orleans Saints (1981-85) and his father, Wade, has been a head coach for the Denver Broncos (1993-94), Buffalo Bills (1998-2000) and Dallas Cowboys (2007-10). Phillips and his wife, Anna, have two daughters, Ivy and Minnie, and a son, Mac.



PHILLIPS FACT SHEET (KEEP IT IN THE FAMILY)



- The Phillips family is one of two third-generation coaching families in NFL history, the other being the Don Shula family tree.
- Excluding the 2001 NFL season, there has been a Phillips (Bum, Wade and Wes) coaching in the NFL since 1974.
- Wade (Super Bowl L) and Wes (Super Bowl LIII) have won a Super Bowl but Bum did not.
- Starting in 2022, the Phillips', Bum (6), Wade (28) and Wes (1), will have a combined 35 years of NFL coordinator experience.
- Across the three Phillips, they have coached at nine different spots in Texas: Dallas Cowboys, Houston Oilers, Houston Texans, Baylor, Houston, SMU, Texas A&M, UTEP and West Texas A&M.
- All three Phillips played college football in Texas - Bum (Stephen F. Austin - 1949-50), Wade (Houston - 1966-68), Wes (UTEP - 1998-2001).
- Bum coached at Texas Western, which is now UTEP, in 1962, the same school his grandson played college football at from 1998-2001.

Roy Anderson wrapped his second season with the Vikings staff in 2021, serving as the assistant defensive backs coach. This was Anderson's 16th overall season in the NFL.

Anderson helped S Xavier Woods play a big role on the defense in 2021, guiding Woods to three interceptions, which was tied for the team-lead. Anderson also helped S Harrison Smith garner his sixth Pro Bowl selection in 2021. Under Anderson's leadership, Smith also tied his career high in sacks with 3.0, while registering 114 tackles, seven passes defended and one interception.

In the secondary in 2020, Smith made a team-high five interceptions, tied for the most in the NFC for the season. Fellow rookie CB Cameron Dantzler tied for fourth in the NFL among rookie defensive backs with three tackles for loss, and his two interceptions tied for fifth. Dantzler was named to the PFWA's All-Rookie Team for his efforts.

Anderson previously served as the lead defensive analyst for the 2019 NCAA CFP National Champion LSU Tigers. At LSU, Anderson was on the coaching staff while Vikings first-round pick, WR Justin Jefferson, led the club offensively to an undefeated national title.

Prior to his lone season with the Tigers, Anderson spent the previous 14 years in the NFL, primarily coaching defensive backs. His most recent professional stop was with the Chicago Bears as the safeties coach in 2017-18.

While with the Bears, Anderson helped Chicago lead the NFL in scoring defense (17.7 ppg), rushing defense (80.0 ypg), yards per play (4.8), takeaways (35), interceptions (27), three-and-outs (26.8%) and 20+ yard plays (46). Anderson oversaw the development of starting safeties Eddie Jackson and Adrian Amos. Jackson earned his first career Pro Bowl nod and was named a First-Team All-Pro. Jackson also finished the season fourth in the NFL with six interceptions.

Anderson coached the safeties for four seasons with the Indianapolis Colts (2012-15), joining the staff after seven seasons (2005-11) with the Baltimore Ravens. During his final two years in Baltimore (2010-11), Anderson was the team's defensive assistant/secondary coach where he handled defensive quality control duties and also worked with the defensive backs.

While with the Colts in 2014-15, Anderson coached starting S Mike Adams, helping him earn consecutive Pro Bowls in those seasons. Under the help of Anderson, Adams was named to his first career Pro Bowl following the 2014 season after tying for the NFL lead in takeaways with seven (five interceptions, two fumble recoveries). It was his highest takeaway output in his 11 NFL seasons. Adams also posted a single-season career-high with 93 tackles and tied a career-best with 11 passes defended. In 2015, Adams ranked fourth on the team with 76 tackles and contributed with five interceptions (one returned for a touchdown). His five interceptions tied a career-high (2014) and tied for sixth in the NFL. Adams' three forced fumbles also set a new career-best.

In 2011, the Baltimore defense finished third in the NFL in total defense, second against the run and fourth against the pass on their way to an appearance in the AFC Championship

Game. S Ed Reed was announced as a Pro Bowl selection. In 2010, Reed collected a First-Team All-Pro, leading the league with eight interceptions. Reed also posted a career-high of 16 pass deflections and was rated at the fifth-best player in the NFL's Top 100 Players of 2011. In 2009, his first season as defensive assistant, Anderson worked primarily with the defensive line and helped the Ravens defense rank third in the NFL, allowing 300.5 yards per game.

Anderson originally entered the NFL with the Ravens in 2005 as a player personnel assistant, where he worked on Baltimore's NFL Draft and free agency process by evaluating players, organizing free agent tryouts and monitoring potential trade and waiver transactions.

Prior to joining the Ravens, Anderson was as a graduate assistant with LSU during the 2004 season. Anderson began his coaching career as a graduate assistant with Florida A&M University working with the quarterbacks in 2002. The following season, he served as a student assistant with Florida State University, coaching quarterbacks.

A four-year quarterback at Howard University (1997-2001), Anderson was named to the All-Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Scholar-Athlete Team in 2001.

A native of Tallahassee, Florida, Anderson graduated with a bachelor's degree in business administration from Howard and also earned his master's in sports management from Florida State in 2003. He attended Godby (Tallahassee, Florida) High School, where he participated in both football and baseball.

Brian Angelichio (an-juh-LEEK-o) joins the Minnesota Vikings as the tight ends/passing game coordinator after working with the Carolina Panthers the past two seasons. This will be the first season Angelichio will be adding passing game coordinator to his title.

During his time with the Panthers, Angelichio helped develop TEs Tommy Tremble and Ian Thomas. Tremble, a 2021 third-round pick (83rd overall) from Notre Dame, finished his rookie season catching 20 passes for 180 yards and a touchdown, a 5-yard pass from QB Sam Darnold during the Week 5 matchup against the Philadelphia Eagles.

In 2020, Thomas recorded 20 receptions for 145 yards, while helping block for RB Mike Davis, who was replacing the injured RB Christian McCaffrey. Davis posted his first career season with over 1,000 scrimmage yards.

Prior to his time with the Panthers, Angelichio coached the tight ends with Washington, spending one season with Head Coach Kevin O'Connell (offensive coordinator) in 2019. Following an injury to TE Vernon Davis, Angelichio guided TE Jeremy Sprinkle to career highs in receptions (26), receiving yards (241) and touchdowns (1).

Angelichio worked in Green Bay for three seasons (2016-18) before his one-year stint with Washington, coaching TEs Jimmy Graham, Martellus Bennett, Jared Cook and Richard Rodgers. Angelichio helped Graham to 636 receiving yards in 2018, which was the second-most on the team, trailing only WR Davante Adams. During the Packers run to the 2016 NFC Championship Game, Angelichio coached Cook (377) and Rodgers (271) to a combined 648 receiving yards, becoming one of five NFC teams with two tight ends who posted more than 250 receiving yards.

During the 2015 season as Browns tight ends coach, Angelichio helped TE Gary Barnidge to a career year, with 79 receptions for 1,043 yards and nine touchdowns. Barnidge led the Browns in receiving, and his standout numbers earned him his lone-career Pro Bowl selection. The first time Angelichio worked with O'Connell (quarterbacks coach) was in 2015 under current Vikings Assistant Head Coach Mike Pettine. While with the Browns in 2014, Angelichio assisted in TE Jordan Cameron recording 424 receiving yards, the second-most of his career.

Prior to the Browns, Angelichio coached tight ends with the Buccaneers from 2012-13. In 2013, Angelichio helped transform undrafted rookie TE Tim Wright into the Bucs' second-leading receiver, posting what would remain a career-high 54 receptions for 571 yards and five touchdowns. Wright finished the year as the only rookie tight end to surpass 500 receiving yards that season.

Before his time in the NFL, Angelichio made stops at Rutgers University, the University of Pittsburgh, SUNY-Brockport and Ithaca College. While serving as the tight ends coach at Pitt and Rutgers, six-time NFL Pro Bowl RB LeSean McCoy (Pitt) accumulated 3,365 scrimmage yards and 36 total touchdowns in 2007-08 and WR Mohamed Sanu (Rutgers) posted 1,206 receiving yards in 2011.

As a player, Angelichio was a three-year starter at outside linebacker for St. Lawrence University in Canton, New York, and

he also served as team captain for their baseball team. Angelichio later received a master's degree at Ithaca College.

Ryan Cordell joins the Minnesota Vikings after spending the past three seasons with the Cleveland Browns working as a coaching assistant.

Cordell served as interim running backs coach for the final 10 games of the 2021 season. He helped the Browns lead the NFL in rushing average with a 5.09 mark, the highest average by a Browns team since 1966. RB Nick Chubb finish second in the league in rushing yards en route to a Pro Bowl selection and being named a finalist for the FedEx NFL Ground Player of the Year. Cordell also served as the running backs coach for the East team in the 2022 East-West Shrine Bowl.

Cordell worked closely with the offensive line during his first season on the Browns coaching staff, helping the club finish third in the league in rushing with an average of 148.4 yards per game (the team's best since 1978). He also helped T Jack Conklin earn *Associated Press* First-Team All-Pro honors and G Joel Bitonio and G Wyatt Teller earn Second-Team honors. Bitonio was also selected to the Pro Bowl, while first round pick T Jedrick Willis Jr. was voted the NFL Pepsi Zero Sugar Rookie of the Week for Week 10, becoming just the fourth offensive lineman to win the award since its inception in 2002 and first since 2013.

Cordell spent five seasons (2014-18) with the San Francisco 49ers, serving as special assistant to the general manager during his final two seasons. While with the 49ers, Cordell worked with Vikings General Manager Kwesi Adofo-Mensah, Head Coach Kevin O'Connell and running backs/run game coordinator Curtis Modkins.

In 2016, Cordell was the team's football operations coordinator, assisting with internal projects across all football departments.

He served as an offensive assistant on the 49ers coaching staff in 2015, breaking down film for the offense, running the scout team, assisting all offensive coaches and assisting in the coaching

of the running back position.

Cordell originally joined the 49ers in 2014 as a salary cap intern, assisting with various roster composition and salary allocation research.

Cordell graduated from the University of Notre Dame with a bachelor's in mathematics and a master's in business administration.

Johnson, who is in his third season coaching in the NFL, joins the Vikings as the assistant quarterbacks coach for his first season with the club in 2022. Johnson's first name is pronounced juh-ROD.

Prior to joining the Vikings, Johnson spent three seasons with the Indianapolis Colts. In 2019, he served in the Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship role and spent 2020-21 as an offensive quality control coach. From 2015-18, Johnson served on the coaching staff at St. Thomas High School in Houston, Texas, where he was the assistant head coach/offensive coordinator for his final two seasons. Johnson, who played in the East-West Shrine Bowl in 2011, coached at the East-West Shrine Bowl in February of 2022.

In 2017, he participated in the Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship with the San Francisco 49ers during training camp, where he crossed paths with Vikings GM Kwesi Adofo-Mensah, who was the 49ers director of football research and development.

Johnson's NFL playing career, which started after going undrafted in the 2011 NFL Draft, included time with Dallas, Baltimore, Chicago, Seattle, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia. He also spent time with the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL and the Sacramento Mountain Lions of the UFL, where he was the No. 1 overall selection of the 2011 UFL Draft.

Collegiately, the Humble, Texas, native played in 37 career games at Texas A&M from 2006-10 and completed 650-of-1,109 passes for 8,011 yards with 67 touchdowns. Johnson was the program's all-time leader in attempts, completions, passing yards and passing touchdowns until current Vikings QB Kellen Mond broke each of those records from 2017-20.

Johnson, who was Second-Team All-Big 12 in 2009, was teammates with Rams OLB Von Miller and Titans QB Ryan Tannehill when at Texas A&M, where Tannehill was one of his top receiving targets before he transitioned to QB. During his redshirt 2006 season with the football team, Johnson also played on the basketball team for the 2006-07 season, appearing in three games.

Johnson attended Humble High School and was a three-

star recruit as an athlete in the class of 2006. His older brother, Marquis, is the Vikings assistant strength and conditioning coach, who joined the team in 2021. Johnson is married to his wife, Braidee.

Daronte Jones (duh-RAHN-tay), who was the Vikings defensive backs coach in 2020, returns to Minnesota in 2022 after serving as the defensive coordinator/defensive backs coach at LSU last season. Entering his sixth season in the NFL, Jones previously spent two years with the Cincinnati Bengals as the secondary/cornerbacks coach from 2018-19 and with the Miami Dolphins as the assistant defensive backs coach from 2016-17.

Jones became the defensive coordinator/defensive backs coach at LSU for the 2021 season, helping LB Damone Clark earn Second-Team All-America honors, be selected as a finalist for the Butkus Award and win SEC Defensive Player of the Week twice on the season.

While leading the Vikings defensive backs in 2020, the team ranked top 10 in the NFL in interception, and Jones helped S Harrison Smith tie his career high with five interceptions.

With the Bengals, Jones aided in the development of young players, including CB Darius Phillips, a late-round draft pick who led Cincinnati with four interceptions in 2019 despite only playing in eight contests.

Jones previously worked two seasons with the Miami Dolphins as an assistant defensive backs coach. In 2017, Jones helped S Reshad Jones to a team-high 122 tackles and a berth in the Pro Bowl. In his first season as a professional coach in 2016, Jones helped coach a Dolphins defense that recorded 16 interceptions, third-most in the NFL. Miami also ranked fourth in the league in third-down defense, allowing opponents to convert on only 36.15 percent of attempts.

Prior to the NFL, Jones served as defensive backs coach at the University of Wisconsin in 2015, as the Badgers led the nation with just seven passing touchdowns allowed. Wisconsin's passing defense ranked second in the Big Ten and seventh nationally, allowing 173.2 pass yards per game. From 2012-14, Jones served as the secondary coach at the University of Hawaii, adding the title of assistant head coach in 2014. Jones helped improve Hawaii's passing defense by 62.1 yards per game, as the Rainbow Warriors went from 85th nationally in 2011 to the 11th-best passing defense in 2012.

The Capital Heights, Maryland, native also had earlier coaching stops with the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian Football League in 2011 as the defensive backs coach and with UCLA in 2010 as the cornerbacks coach. Jones was named assistant head coach/defensive coordinator at Bowie State from 2005-09. His defense finished in the top three nationally in three of his five seasons.

Prior to his time at Bowie State, Jones served as defensive coordinator at two Louisiana high schools – Jeanerette (2004) and Franklin (2003). He also spent the 2002 season coaching safeties at Nicholls State after beginning his coaching career in 2001 as a graduate assistant at Lenoir-Rhyne University in North Carolina. Jones played four seasons as a defensive back at Morgan State before earning his bachelor's degree in 2001.

Ben Kotwica (cot-WEE-kuh) returns to the NFL for his 15th season and first with the Vikings as assistant special teams coach, following a brief stint as director of player development for the United States Military Academy. He previously served as the special teams coordinator for the Atlanta Falcons from 2019-20.

In 2019, the Falcons special teams units led the NFL with five fumble recoveries, which marked the most by a team in a single season since 2012 (NYG, five). Four of the five fumble recoveries led to a Falcons touchdown, including a fumble recovery for a touchdown on a kickoff against the 49ers in Week 15. The team in Week 10 signed K Younghoe Koo, who connected on 23 of 26 field goals and totaled 84 points over the final eight weeks of the season. During that span, the Falcons led the league in the most made field goals with 23.

In his last season with Washington in 2018, his special teams units led the league in kickoff touchback percentage (81.2%). Kotwica also oversaw K Dustin Hopkins, who converted 89.7% of his field goals, which ranked ninth in the NFL in 2018. In 2017, Kotwica led a kickoff unit that allowed 18.7 yards per return, the second-lowest average that season.

From 2014-20, Kotwica's kickoff return squads were at the top of the league, returning two kickoffs for touchdowns, a tie for the second-most over that span. His players were also responsible for five special teams touchdowns, which tied for fifth-most in the NFL from 2014-20.

During his lone season as the Jets special teams coordinator in 2013, Kotwica's special teams allowed 22.3 yards per kickoff return, which was 12th in the NFL. That season, he coached K Nick Folk who made 91.7% of his field goal attempts, which was tied for the 10th highest field goal percentage. Kotwica was promoted to special teams coordinator after spending four seasons (2009-12) as the Jets assistant special teams coach. The Jets accounted for 10 combined kick and punt return touchdowns during his time as an assistant in New York, tied for most in the AFC and tied for second-most in the NFL.

Kotwica got his NFL coaching start in 2007 when he joined

the Jets staff as a defense/special teams quality control coach. Before moving his way up to the NFL, Kotwica was a defensive coordinator at United States Military Academy Prep School in West Point, New York, from 2005 to 2006.

Kotwica is a decorated officer who spent eight years in the United States Army after graduating from the United States Military Academy at West Point. His military career included operations in Bosnia-Herzegovina, Korea and Iraq. Kotwica was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Aviation Branch of the Army and was selected to fly the AH-64 Apache Longbow, the world's top attack helicopter. He was an Attack Helicopter Platoon Leader in support of the 82nd Airborne Division from 1998-2001, where he was responsible for the health and welfare of 20 soldiers.

The Minnesota Vikings named Chris Kuper (pronounced coo-*per*) offensive line coach on Feb. 17, 2022. Kuper, who played eight years in the NFL, joins the Vikings staff after spending the past three seasons as the assistant offensive line coach with the Denver Broncos.

Kuper worked under long-time offensive line coach Mike Munchak while in Denver, helping the Broncos offensive line give their quarterbacks the fourth-most time to throw (2.91 seconds) in the NFL, despite being blitzed on 26.9% of their dropbacks, the 13th-most in the NFL in 2021. The Broncos offensive line also blocked for two 900-plus yard rushers, RBs Melvin Gordon III (918) and Javonte Williams (903), the first running back duo since Houston Texans RBs Arian Foster (1,224) and Ben Tate (942) in 2011 to accomplish this feat.

In 2020, Kuper coached *Associated Press* Second-Team All-Pro T Garrett Bolles and assisted the Broncos offensive line in being ranked 13th in the NFL in sacks allowed (32). Kuper coached rookie third-round (83rd overall) C Lloyd Cushenberry III in 2020, one of two rookies (T Tristian Wirfs, Tampa Bay) in the NFL to play 100% of their team's offensive snaps.

Kuper oversaw G Dalton Risner's rookie season, helping him earn Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie Team honors after playing the eighth-most snaps among first-year players in 2019. Risner, Bolles and C Connor McGovern all were 16-game starters for Denver in 2019.

Prior to his time in Denver, Kuper worked with the Miami Dolphins as the assistant offensive line coach (2017-18) under Chris Foerster (2017) and Jeremiah Washburn (2018) and as an offensive quality control assistant (2016). Kuper helped aid in the development of T Laremy Tunsil, who allowed just one sack in 2018.

The 2017 offensive line allowed 33 sacks, which was the 11th-fewest in the NFL despite using nine different offensive line combinations. Kuper took over the offensive line coaching duties in Week 7 during the 2017 season, helping the offensive line protect for the sixth-best passing offense during that span.

Kuper played eight seasons in the NFL with the Broncos, starting in 79 of his 90 games, playing both right and left guard. He was drafted in the fifth-round (161st overall) of the 2006 NFL Draft out of North Dakota. Kuper and former Vikings TE Jim Kleinsasser (1999) are the two of the last three players to be drafted out of North Dakota.

In his first seven seasons (78 starts) Kuper allowed just 12 sacks, according to STATS. He finished as the NFL's only 16-game starting guard to not allow a sack in 2008 and help the team set a club record for fewest sacks allowed (12). The Broncos also ranked third in the league in yards per rush (4.8), despite placing seven running backs on injured reserve in 2008.

In his eight-year career, Kuper was a three-time captain for the Broncos and was the recipient of the Ed Block Courage Award in 2012. A native of Anchorage, Alaska, he and his wife, Cynthia, have four children: Madeline, James, Anna and Alexandra.



GREG MANUSKY

INSIDE LINEBACKERS

Greg Manusky (muh-nuh-skee) returns to the NFL as inside linebackers coach for his 32nd year in the league and first as a coach for the Vikings in 2022. He previously served as the defensive quality control assistant for the University of Kentucky the past two seasons. The former linebacker, who played two seasons for the Vikings from 1991-93, brings 31 combined seasons of NFL experience, 19 coaching and 12 playing, to Head Coach Kevin O'Connell's staff.

During the 2021 season, Manusky helped coach the Wildcats to a 9-3 record, the fourth-best in the SEC. The Kentucky defense held its opponents to 340.8 yards of total offense. In 2020, LB Jamin Davis totaled a career-high 102 total tackles, also third-best in the SEC, and added 1.5 sacks and three interceptions - returning one for a touchdown. Davis was then picked in the first round (No. 19 overall) in the 2021 NFL Draft by the Washington Commanders.

Manusky was the defensive coordinator for the Commanders in 2019, where he coached alongside Vikings Head Coach Kevin O'Connell, who served as the offensive coordinator for the Commanders. He entered the coaching ranks full-time with the Commanders in 2001 as the team's linebackers coach. During his 19 seasons as an NFL coach, 12 different players have earned Pro Bowl selections, six of which have notched All-Pro honors.

In 2018, Manusky's unit was tied for 10th in the league in total turnovers. The team's 18 forced fumbles were tied with the Buffalo Bills for the fourth-most in the NFL and their 15 interceptions were tied for the ninth-best mark in the league. The unit was also one of the best at pressuring opposing quarterbacks and finished the season seventh in the NFL in sacks. The team was led by LB Ryan Kerrigan who finished the season with 13 sacks, which was tied for the seventh in the league. The 13 sacks was the second-most in a single season in Kerrigan's career and earned him his third-consecutive Pro Bowl selection. Kerrigan was named a Pro Bowler in all three seasons that Manusky was on the Commanders defensive staff.

In his first season as Washington's defensive coordinator in 2017, Manusky's defense produced the team's strongest season against the pass in nearly a decade. The unit ranked third in the NFL in completion percentage allowed (57.6 percent), the team's best ranking since leading the NFL in the category in 2005 (54.4), while finishing ninth in passing yards allowed per game (213.8, the team's lowest since 2009) and 10th in opponent passer rating (81.0, lowest since 2008). The group also posted 42 sacks, the franchise's most since 2000, led by Kerrigan, who earned his third Pro Bowl selection after leading Washington with 13 sacks.

The list of key contributors to the unit's performance under Manusky in 2017 spanned all positions and experience levels. Unrestricted free agent addition, LB Zach Brown, led the NFL in tackles through 15 weeks before missing the final three games of the season. Fellow free agent signing S DJ. Swearinger earned immediate captaincy status before ever playing a snap for Washington and recorded a career-high four interceptions,

tying for the team lead with CB Kendall Fuller, who emerged as one of the league's top slot corners in his second NFL season. Second-year DT Matt Ioannidis made a similar second-year jump, posting 4.5 sacks, while first-round pick DT Jonathan Allen was impressive despite being limited by injury to only five contests.

As outside linebackers coach in 2016, Manusky helped guide Kerrigan to his second career Pro Bowl selection. Kerrigan posted 11 sacks, becoming only the fifth player in team history to record multiple 10-sack seasons. Manusky's contributions were also key to LB Trent Murphy's breakout campaign in 2016, a year in which the third-year pro recorded 9.0 sacks after totaling 6.0 across his first two NFL seasons in 2014-15. Manusky's duo became the first pair to record at least 9.0 sacks each in a single season for the Commanders since Andre Carter and Brian Orakpo in 2009.

Prior to his second coaching stint in Washington, Manusky served nine seasons as the defensive coordinator of the Indianapolis Colts (2012-15), San Diego Chargers (2011) and San Francisco 49ers (2007-10). The Colts won at least eight games in all four of Manusky's seasons in Indianapolis, earning three postseason berths, including an AFC Championship appearance in 2014. The Colts recorded 10 interception returns for touchdowns during Manusky's four-year tenure, tied for second-most in the AFC and tied for fifth-most in the NFL in that time frame.

In 2014, Manusky guided a defense that helped record the team's third straight 11-5 regular season record and second consecutive AFC South Division Championship. From Weeks 4-7, the Colts only allowed one third down conversion in four straight games, marking the longest streak by an NFL team since 1970. S Mike Adams, CB Vontae Davis and LB D'Qwell Jackson earned their first career Pro Bowl selections that season.

Manusky spent the 2011 campaign as the defensive coordinator of the San Diego Chargers. Under his direction, the defense allowed an average of 224.4 net passing yards per game, and S Eric Weddle tied for the NFL lead with seven interceptions and earned a trip to the 2012 Pro Bowl. Prior to joining the Chargers, Manusky spent four seasons (2007-10) as defensive coordinator of the San Francisco 49ers. His 2009 unit did not allow a touchdown in five separate games while forcing an NFL-best 21 fumbles, allowing just 3.6 yards per rush and recording 44 sacks.

Manusky's first tenure with the Chargers lasted five seasons (2002-06), during which time he served as the linebackers coach. In the 2006 campaign, San Diego linebackers accounted for 42.5 of the team's 61 regular season sacks. That season, LB Shawne Merriman tied the Chargers' franchise record with 17 sacks, becoming the first Charger to lead the league in sacks.

Manusky started his coaching career in 2000, working as a volunteer linebackers and special teams coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers during training camp. He then joined the Commanders staff in 2001 as the team's linebackers coach, helping guide LB LaVar Arrington to his first career Pro Bowl selection.

Manusky was a linebacker and special teams standout during his 12-year NFL playing career in Washington, Minnesota

and Kansas City, recording a stretch in which he participated in 113 consecutive games. Manusky earned All-Madden Team honors in 1991 and retired from the NFL in 2000.

A native of Wyoming, Pennsylvania, Manusky attended Dallas (PA) H.S. before moving on to Colgate University, where he was a four-year letterman and an All-Colonial League selection. As a senior in 1987, Manusky was named the Colonial League's Defensive Player of the Year. He graduated with degrees in education and geology.

Manusky and his wife, Laurie, have two sons, Colton and Jake, and two daughters, Logan and Chandler.

Keenan McCardell enters his second season with the Minnesota Vikings in 2022 as wide receivers coach, bringing eight years of NFL coaching experience to the club. A two-time Pro Bowler and two-time Super Bowl champion, McCardell played 17 seasons in the NFL as a WR from 1991-2007.

Under the direction of McCardell, the wide receivers group turned in another impressive season, with new career highs. WR Justin Jefferson posted another record-setting season, finishing with the second-most receiving yards in the NFL (1,616), trailing only Rams WR Cooper Kupp who had 1,947. In Week 9 at Baltimore, Jefferson became the second-fastest wide receiver in NFL history to 2,000 career receiving yards, doing so in only 24 games. Jefferson passed Hall of Fame WRs Jerry Rice, Randy Moss and Rams WR Odell Beckham, Jr., to set the NFL record for most receiving yards in a player's first two seasons in the league with 3,016. In addition to being named to his second consecutive Pro Bowl, Jefferson was also named NFC Offensive Player of the Month for the month of November when he caught 24 passes for 464 yards and 3 touchdowns. Jefferson's 464 yards are the 3rd most in November in franchise history, trailing Moss' 473 receiving yards in 1998 and 510 in 2000.

In 2020, McCardell coached a Jacksonville receiving corps that saw WR DJ Chark become the first Jaguars player since WR Allen Robinson (2015-16) to have consecutive seasons with 5-plus receiving touchdown. WR Laviska Shenault, Jr., had the second-most catches by a Jaguars rookie (58), and he was the third rookie in team history with 600-plus yards and 5-plus touchdowns.

In 2019, the Jaguars were one of three teams in the NFL to have three wide receivers with at least 650 receiving yards. WRs Chark (1,008), Chris Conley (775) and Dede Westbrook (660) became the first trio of wide receivers in franchise history to record at least 600

receiving yards apiece. A 2019 Pro Bowler, Chark had 10 catches of 30+ yards, tied for fourth in the NFL. Chark joined former WRs Robinson (13 in 2015) and Jimmy Smith (12 in 1998) as the only Jaguars players with 10 or more such catches in a season.

In 2018, McCardell called upon his youngest Jags receivers to fill the void. Westbrook set career highs and led the team with 66 receptions, 717 receiving yards and 5 TDs. Westbrook joined Chiefs WR Tyreek Hill as the only players in the NFL with 500+ receiving yards and a punt return TD in 2018.

Despite having 5 wide receivers on Injured Reserve during the 2017 season, including Pro Bowl WR Robinson, McCardell's unit helped QB Blake Bortles achieve a career-high completion percentage. WR Keelan Cole set the team record for receiving yards by an undrafted rookie receiver (748) and ranked eighth in NFL history in the category.

Prior to Jacksonville, McCardell coached the wide receivers at Maryland from 2014-15. He oversaw the development of WR Stefan Diggs, whose 62 catches led the team and he ranked fourth in the Big Ten with 79.2 yards per game. Diggs had four games with 100+ yards and earned Second-Team All-Big Ten from the league coaches.

McCardell spent two seasons (2010-11) with Washington coaching wide receivers. In 2011, the overall unit had 346 receptions, the second-highest total in team history at the time and eclipsed the 4,000-yard mark. In 2010, his receivers set a then-franchise record for receptions in a season (349). McCardell's unit led the NFL with nine catches of 50+ yards.

McCardell played in 209 career NFL games with 168 starts, amassed 883 receptions for 11,373 yards and 63 touchdowns. McCardell played for five franchises in his 17 seasons.

McCardell played in Jacksonville from 1996-2001 and ranks second all-time in receptions (499) and yards (6,393) in Jaguars history including a career-best 94 receptions for 1,207 yards in 2000. McCardell earned his first Pro Bowl selection in 1996 after totaling a team-best 85 receptions for 1,129 yards. He had consecutive 90+ catch seasons in 2000 and 2001 and was voted No. 7 on the Jaguars All-25, by members of the local media.

McCardell joined Tampa Bay from 2002-03, played in San Diego from 2004-06 and finished in 2007 with Washington. While in San Diego, McCardell was teammates with Vikings Radio Network analyst Ben Leber.

In his debut season in Tampa in 2002, the Bucs went 12-4 in the regular season en route to a winning Super Bowl XXXVII over Oakland, catching both of Tampa Bay's scoring passes in the game. In 2003, he went to his second Pro Bowl following an 1,174-yard, 8 touchdown season on 84 catches. McCardell caught a career-best nine touchdowns in San Diego during the 2005 season.

McCardell entered the league in 1991 after being drafted by Washington in the 12th round of the NFL Draft out of the University of Nevada-Las Vegas. He spent his rookie season on Injured Reserve for a club that would win Super Bowl XXVI over Buffalo at the Metrodome in Minneapolis.

Upon finishing his playing career, McCardell began coaching by completing a Bill Walsh Minority Fellowship with the New York



In his first year with the Vikings, McCardell coached Justin Jefferson to 1,616 receiving yards, the second-most in the NFL and the second-most in franchise history, trailing Randy Moss, who posted 1,632 receiving yards in 2003.

Giants during the team's 2009 training camp. He also coached the West wide receivers in the 2010 East-West Shrine Game.

McCardell worked in broadcasting as a studio analyst for Comcast SportsNet for Washington's kickoff show in 2008 and served as a college football analyst for the Mountain West Network in 2009.

McCardell has five children: daughters Keandra, Nia and Nakeeya; and sons Keenan II and Kylan.


THE NFL'S EARLY DAYS IN MINNESOTA

As the NFL embarks on its 103rd season in 2022, a debt is owed to the forerunners of pro football in Minnesota that dates back to the roaring 20s. Early semi-pro football clubs played throughout the state, and the Twin Cities was a hotbed of football action, featuring teams as diverse as the St. Paul Ideals to the established Minneapolis Marines, who later evolved into the Minneapolis Red Jackets. The most famous team was the Duluth Eskimos, featuring Hall of Famer Ernie Nevers.

The original pro franchise in northern Minnesota, the Duluth Kelleys, derived their name from their primary sponsor and outfitter, the Kelley Hardware Store. The team floundered from 1923-25 before changing ownership when local Duluth businessman Ole Haugsrud, a 25-year-old entrepreneur, jumped at the chance to be involved in pro football ownership. Haugsrud used his high school connection from Superior, WI, to Stanford All-American fullback Ernie Nevers, the hero of the 1925 Rose Bowl, to put Duluth on the sporting map.

Haugsrud convinced Nevers, who was pitching for the St. Louis Browns, to leave pro baseball behind and compete in pro football to push NY Yankees star Red Grange as the biggest box-office draw in the fledgling NFL. Haugsrud knew to market his team around its star, renaming the team Ernie Nevers' Duluth Eskimos. The other NFL owners, eager to get fans in the stands of their growing game, were happy to schedule the Eskimos but not as excited to travel to Duluth. Thus, the Eskimos were designated as a "road team", traveling to such locales as Canton, Providence, Hartford and New York. The Eskimos took to the rails, traveling feverishly and playing 29 games in just under 17 weeks, including games in 5 cities in just 8 days.

The appeal of Nevers, who was playing for an unheard-of salary of \$50,000 for the 1926 and '27 campaigns, helped the home teams draw crowds they had previously only dreamed of. Ultimately, the \$3,000-\$4,000 paydays the Eskimos were taking in from games was not enough to keep the team afloat. After the 1927 season, Nevers returned to Stanford as an assistant coach, the team suspended operations and remained dormant until Haugsrud sold his franchise to East Coast investors who wanted teams in larger population centers. As part of his sale agreement, Haugsrud had a stipulation in the deal that if an NFL franchise returned to Minnesota that he would have first rights to buy into the team. Haugsrud did not let the NFL owners forget the agreement, and in 1960 purchased 10 percent of the expansion Vikings for \$60,000. Haugsrud was a Vikings director until his death in 1976.

The Minnesota Vikings named Curtis Modkins running backs/run game coordinator on Feb. 16, 2022. Modkins, a 27-year coaching veteran, has spent the past four seasons with the Denver Broncos as the team's running backs coach.

Modkins has been with seven previous teams since his start in the NFL in 2008, primarily serving as a running backs coach but has offensive coordinator experience with the Buffalo Bills (2010-12) and San Francisco 49ers (2016), the same 49ers staff that Vikings General Manager Kwesi Adofo-Mensah and Head Coach Kevin O'Connell worked on 2016. Modkins has worked with two NFL Pro Bowlers, RB Phillip Lindsay (2018) and RB C.J. Spiller (2012), and four 1,000-yard rushers, Lindsay (Denver, 2018-19), RB Jordan Howard (Chicago, 2017), Reggie Bush (Lions, 2013) and Spiller (Bills, 2012).

During the 2021 season, Modkins helped guide RB Melvin Gordon III (918) and rookie RB Javonte Williams (903) to 900-plus-yard seasons, becoming the first running back duo since Houston Texans RBs Arian Foster (1,224) and Ben Tate (942) in 2011 to accomplish this feat. Additionally, Gordon III and Williams both scored two touchdowns against Detroit in Week 14, becoming just the third running back duo in Broncos history to post two touchdowns in the same game, the first since RBs Gene Mingo and Al Frazier against the Oakland Raiders in 1962. Williams, a 2021 PFWA All-Rookie Team member, posted 1,129 scrimmage yards in 2021, becoming just the seventh rookie in team history to finish the season with at least 1,000 scrimmage yards.

Led by Gordon III and Lindsay, the Broncos nearly rushed for 2,000 yards in 2020, while Gordon's 4.59 rushing average ranked fourth in the AFC. Under Modkins, Lindsay rushed for 1,011 yards in 2019 and 1,037 in 2018, making him the first undrafted player in NFL history to top the 1,000-yard mark in consecutive seasons to start their career. In 2019, Lindsay became the first undrafted offensive player to record consecutive 1,000 rushing yard seasons. In 2018, he also became the first undrafted offensive player to reach the pro bowl.

Before helping Howard to 1,122 rushing season with the Bears in 2017, Modkins was an offensive coordinator/run game coordinator for the 49ers (2016), helping RB Carlos Hyde to 988 rushing yards on the year. Hyde also finished averaging 76.0 rushing yards per game, which is a career high. Modkins helped QB Colin Kaepernick to a 90.7 passer rating in his 11 starts, highlighted by throwing 16 touchdowns to only four interceptions in 2016.

As the run game coordinator/running backs coach for the Lions in 2013-15, Modkins oversaw the production of Bush and RB Joique Bell, helping the two to become the first backfield in NFL history to each register 500 rushing yards and 500 receiving yards in the same season in 2013. In his final season in Detroit, Modkins guided rookie RB Ameer Abdullah to a career-best 597 rushing yards.

While working as the Bills offensive coordinator (2010-12), Modkins directed a unit in which QB Ryan Fitzpatrick topped 3,000 passing yards each season and WR Steve Johnson reached the 1,000-yard mark in each campaign. With Spiller earning his

first Pro Bowl selection in 2012 after running for 1,244 yards, the Bills featured a 3,000-yard passer, a 1,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard receiver for the first time in 10 seasons.

Modkins began his NFL coaching career with the Kansas City Chiefs in 2008 and then moved to the Arizona Cardinals in 2009 before becoming the Bills offensive coordinator.

Modkins spent 13 years working at the collegiate level before making his way to the NFL, spending time as the running backs coach (2003-07) and defensive backs coach (2002) with Georgia Tech, cornerbacks coach with the University of New Mexico (1998-2001) and tight ends coach (1997) and secondary coach with TCU.

A native of Marlin, Texas, Modkins played football at TCU (1989-92) and finished his career with the third-most rushing yards in school history (2,763).

Derron Montgomery enters his first season in the NFL as an offensive quality control assistant with the Vikings in 2022, after previously serving as a senior offensive analyst for the University of Arizona. He brings nine seasons of coaching experience to Head Coach Kevin O'Connell's staff.

While with Arizona in 2021, Montgomery helped WR Stanley Berryhill III finish second in the Pac-12 in receptions (83) and fourth in receiving yards (744), ultimately earning him First-Team All-Pac-12 (all-purpose) honors and an honorable mention as a wide receiver.

Prior to his time with the Wildcats, Montgomery spent time at the University of Georgia as the assistant director of player development from 2018-20.

Montgomery served as an assistant head coach with Abilene Christian, working with the fullbacks and tight ends from 2016-17 after his time as the offensive coordinator for New Mexico Highlands in 2016.

In his time with Michigan as the wide receivers coach in 2015, he helped Michigan to a 10-3 overall record and a postseason Citrus Bowl victory over Florida. Montgomery assisted passing game coordinator Jedd Fisch in running position meetings, rotations and subs in game, and he recruited the Texas and South Florida areas. He also helped WRs Jehu Chesson and Amara Darboh both top 50 catches for more than 700 yards. Chesson was named to the All-Big Ten First Team by the coaches, and won the Bo Schembechler MVP award.

Montgomery began his coaching career as a student assistant coach at Abilene Christian from 2010-12 and then served as an intern coaching assistant for Miami (2012-13) before serving as the assistant wide receivers coach for Miami from 2013-14. While with Miami, he helped WR Phillip Dorsett lead the ACC in receiving touchdowns (10) and receiving yards per reception (24.2) in 2014. WR Allen Burns had a career-high 62 reception for 1,162 receiving yards and six touchdowns in 2013. His 1,162 receiving yards were fourth-best in the ACC. Montgomery helped Miami to consecutive postseason bowl appearances in 2013 (Athletic Bowl) and 2014 (Independence Bowl).

Montgomery has worked briefly with the Cleveland Browns

and Baltimore Ravens in his career. In July 2014 and 2015, he was a training camp volunteer with the Browns, where he crossed paths with then Head Coach Mike Pettine and then quarterbacks coach Kevin O'Connell. From January to February in 2012, he worked with the Baltimore Ravens as a postseason volunteer, where he assisted Wilbert Montgomery, his father and Ravens running backs coach, with postseason evaluation and scouting reports of NFL prospects. Wilbert Montgomery played nine seasons in the NFL, eight with the Eagles and one with the Detroit Lions, and is second all-time in Eagles rushing yards (6,538) and touchdowns (45).

The Garland, Texas, native played wide receiver at Iowa State from 2006-09 before his playing career ended due to an injury in 2009. He then transferred to Abilene Christian where he obtained his bachelor's in criminal justice in 2011. Montgomery also has his master's in arts and liberal studies from the University of Miami.

Chris O'Hara begins his first season as a position coach and first with the Vikings in 2022, serving as the club's quarterbacks coach. O'Hara brings 13 seasons of overall coaching experience and eight seasons in the NFL. He most recently served as the offensive assistant during the 2021 season for the Los Angeles Rams, who won Super Bowl LVII. .

O'Hara assisted in QB Matthew Stafford's first season with the team, helping him throw for the third-most passing yards (4,886) and second-most touchdowns (41) in the NFL, all while achieving his career-best 102.9 passer rating (in seasons with

more than eight starts). In his first year as offensive assistant, O'Hara had a hand in helping WR Cooper Kupp have one of the best receiving seasons in NFL history, leading the NFL in receptions (145), receiving yards (1,947) and receiving touchdowns (16), earning AP First-Team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.

O'Hara spent the 2020 season with the Jacksonville Jaguars after spending the previous three seasons working with Jay Gruden in Washington (2017-19) as an offensive quality control coach.

Prior to his stint in Washington, O'Hara worked as an offensive

coaching associate with the Jaguars from 2014-16. In 2015, the Jaguars' offense accounted for 35 TD passes, shattering the previous team record of 28 set in 2007.

Before entering the NFL ranks, O'Hara spent three seasons coaching on the defensive side of the ball at the University of Miami from 2011-13, including one season as a graduate assistant and two as a student assistant. In his final season with the Hurricanes, O'Hara helped Miami finish third in the ACC with 27 takeaways.

Prior to working at Miami, O'Hara spent two seasons at Temple University, serving as a student assistant with the school's football team.

A native of Swoyersville, Pennsylvania, O'Hara graduated from the University of Miami in December 2012 with a degree in sports administration. He and his wife Cynthia married in 2019 and have a son, Lincoln.

The Minnesota Vikings named Justin Rascati assistant offensive line coach on Feb. 17, 2021, after he spent the past three seasons with the Denver Broncos as an offensive quality control assistant.

After spending his first two seasons in Denver assisting offensive line coach Mike Munchak and newly hired Vikings offensive line coach Chris Kuper, Rascati worked more with the team's quarterbacks in 2021.

In his role working with the quarterbacks, Rascati aided in QB Teddy Bridgewater recording 3,052 passing yards, 18 touchdowns and a 94.9 passer rating.

While with Denver in 2020, the offensive line used five different combinations and featured steady improvement throughout the year. The unit, which included Second-Team All-Pro T Garett Bolles, tied for fourth in the NFL in sacks allowed (19) and sacks allowed per game (1.5) through the final 14 weeks of the season.

With the Broncos in 2019, Rascati assisted an offensive line that included three players who started all 16 games (Bolles, C Connor McGovern & G Dalton Risner). He was part of an offensive staff that helped RB Phillip Lindsay rush for more than 1,000 yards.

Prior to his jump to the NFL, Rascati was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach for the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga, helping the team to a three-win improvement from 2017 (3-8) to 2018 (6-5).

Rascati coordinated the offense for Tennessee Tech in 2016 following two seasons as wide receivers coach and passing game coordinator for the University of Tennessee-Martin. He began his collegiate coaching career as quarterbacks coach for Weber State University from 2012-13 following two seasons (2010-11) as offensive coordinator for Kentucky Country Day School in Louisville, Kentucky.

Chris Rumph enters his first season with the Minnesota Vikings and third overall in the NFL as defensive line coach after spending the 2021 season as the defensive line coach for the Chicago Bears. Rumph brings two-plus decades of coaching experience, including 18 in the collegiate ranks and two in the NFL.

During his college coaching career, he worked with 25 NFL draft picks, including three first-round selections (DE Gaines Adams, DT Taven Bryan, DT Malcom Brown).

In the 2021 season, Rumph's second in the NFL, Chicago registered 49 sacks on the season, fourth-most in the league. Additionally, Chicago's defense limited opponents to a third-down conversion rate of 42.1%, which ranked second in the NFL behind the Buffalo Bills (40.7%).

He entered the professional coaching ranks as outside linebackers coach for the Houston Texans in 2020.

Prior to joining the 2020 Texans staff, Rumph spent two seasons as the co-defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at the University of Tennessee. In 2018, his first season with the team, the Vols defense was one of the most improved in the FBS, jumping 74 spots in run defense with opponents rushing for nearly 100 fewer yards per game than in 2017. Under the guidance of Rumph, 2020 NFL Draft pick Darrell Taylor emerged as a standout player in 2018, leading the Vols in both sacks (8.0), tackles for loss (11.0), forced fumbles (3) and fumble recoveries (2) en route to Team MVP honors. Taylor earned Bednarik National Player of the Week, Walter Camp National Defensive Player of the Week and SEC Defensive Player of the Week honors after his four-sack performance in the win over No. 12 Kentucky. Taylor's four-sack effort was only the third in Tennessee history. Additionally, Taylor recorded 3.0 sacks and two forced fumbles to go along with six tackles at Georgia. He was one of two Power-5 players with multiple three-sack games in 2018.

He served as the defensive line coach for the University of Florida in 2015 before being promoted to co-defensive coordinator prior to the 2017 season, and served as full-time defensive coordinator for the final four games of the season after Randy Shannon was promoted to interim head coach. Under Rumph's direction in 2016, Florida ranked fifth in the SEC in rushing defense (114.5 ypg) and finished fourth in the conference in sacks with 31. The 2015 Gators team was one of the nation's best at getting to the quarterback, registering 40 sacks, which ranked fifth nationally and tied for the sixth highest in school history. During his tenure in Gainesville, Rumph produced a host of talent along the defensive line, including five NFL draft picks - Taven Bryan (2018), Caleb Brantley (2017), Joey Ivie (2017), Alex McCalister (2016) and Jonathan Bullard (2016).

Before heading to Florida, Rumph spent one season at Texas as the program's assistant head coach for defense/defensive line. Under Rumph's mentorship, the Longhorns had one of the nation's top defensive lines and ranked 12th in the country with 40 sacks. Texas finished the season ranked 26th in the FBS in total defense (348.5 ypg). The Longhorns 2014 defense was led by DT Malcom Brown, who was a consensus All-American and

a finalist for the Nagurski and Outland Trophies. Brown was selected in the first round of the 2015 NFL Draft by the New England Patriots. Fellow DT Hassan Ridgeway also had a big season for the Longhorns, ranking second on the team with 6.0 sacks - which also ranked second among defensive tackles in the Big 12 - and 11 tackles for loss. Ridgeway was a fourth-round pick by the Indianapolis Colts in the 2016 NFL Draft.

Rumph spent three seasons as defensive line coach for Nick Saban at Alabama from 2011-13 and was part of the Crimson Tide's back-to-back BCS national championship teams in 2011 and 2012. During his time in Tuscaloosa, Rumph also coached Vikings defensive lineman Dalvin Tomlinson in 2013, prior to him being selected in the 2017 NFL Draft.

Alabama ranked fifth nationally in total defense (286.5 yards per game) in 2013 and seventh in rush defense (106.2 yards per game). Defensive end Ed Stinson earned All-SEC Second-Team accolades for the Tide.

The Crimson Tide featured the country's top-ranked scoring, total and rushing defense in 2012, allowing just 10.9 points per game, 250.0 yards per game and 76.4 yards rushing per game. Alabama's stifling defense saved its best performance for last as the Tide shut out top-ranked LSU in the national title game by a score of 21-0. Alabama surrendered just five first downs and allowed LSU to cross the 50-yard line just once the entire game. Alabama's 2011 defense was one of the most dominant in the history of college football.

The Crimson Tide allowed just 8.2 points per game and gave up 183.6 total yards per contest, the fewest by an FBS team in records dating to 1996. Alabama also led the country in passing defense (111.5 ypg) and rushing defense (72.2 ypg).

The 2011 team featured five players along the defensive line that would end up being drafted by NFL teams: NT Josh Chapman, DE Quinton Dial, DT Jesse Williams, DE Jeffrey Pagan and DE Ed Stinson. Chapman earned All-SEC Second-Team honors that season. In total, Rumph coached six NFL Draft picks on the defensive line during his three-year stint with the Crimson Tide.

Rumph was hired as Clemson's defensive line coach in 2006, serving in the role until 2009 when he focused solely on the Tigers' defensive ends. The Tigers ranked among the top 25 nationally in scoring defense and total defense during each of Rumph's five seasons at Clemson. In 2010, Rumph coached unanimous All-American defensive end Da'Quan Bowers, who led the nation in sacks (15.5) and was tied for first in tackles-for-loss (26.0). He won both the Nagurski Trophy as the nation's top defensive player, and the Hendricks Award as the nation's top defensive end, and was a second-round pick in the 2011 NFL Draft by Tampa Bay.

In Rumph's first year with the Tigers, he worked with defensive end Gaines Adams, who was the fourth overall selection in the 2007 draft by Tampa Bay after receiving unanimous All-America honors as a senior. Adams tallied 12.5 sacks to rank fourth in the nation. In his five-year career at Clemson, Rumph coached nine NFL draft picks and four All-ACC selections.

Rumph served as the outside linebackers coach at Memphis from 2003-05, helping lead the Tigers to three consecutive bowl games, including a pair of bowl victories in 2003 and 2005. Memphis won 24 games during his three seasons on staff.

The Memphis defense ranked 23rd in the nation in turnover margin in 2005 when the Tigers posted a 7-5 record. The defensive unit allowed just 125.6 yards per game on the ground, first in Conference USA and 27th in the nation. Two of Rumph's players, Tim Goodwell and Carlton Baker, were the top two tacklers on the defense. Goodwell led the team in tackles with 102 and Baker had 88, including a team best five sacks.

In 2004, Goodwell and fellow linebackers Carlton Baker and Quinton McCrary were three of the top four tacklers on the team, accounting for 284 of the team's total tackles. Rumph's linebackers also logged 10 of the team's 23 sacks in 2004 as Memphis started the year 5-1 and was ranked in the top 25 of *The Associated Press* poll, the first top-25 ranking in the history of the program.

During Rumph's first year at Memphis in 2003, the Tigers finished the year ranked ninth in the nation in total defense, while linebacker Coot Terry was named to the All-Conference USA team.

Rumph served as South Carolina State's defensive backs coach in 2002 after a five-year stint as head coach at Calhoun County High School in his hometown of St. Matthews, South Carolina, from 1997-2001. Rumph also worked as a graduate assistant coach at the University of South Carolina in the spring of 1997 prior to being named the head coach at Calhoun County High.

Rumph was a four-year letterwinner at the University of South Carolina, where he starred as a linebacker for the Gamecocks under head coaches Sparky Woods and Brad Scott, totaling 141 career tackles. Rumph helped lead USC to its first bowl victory in the 1995 Carquest Bowl. He earned his bachelor's degree from South Carolina in 1994. He and his wife Kila are the proud parents of two sons, Christopher and Elijah. Christopher was drafted in the fourth round (118th overall) of the 2021 NFL

Draft by the Los Angeles Chargers and played in all 16 games this past year.



Sam Siefkes (pronounced seef-kiss) enters his second season with the Vikings as an assistant linebackers coach after working as a defensive quality control/assistant linebackers coach in 2021. He assisted the day-to-day operations for the defensive staff and worked with the linebacker unit in 2021. Siefkes previously served as the defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at Wofford College (2018-20).

In 2021, Siefkes helped oversee a linebackers unit led by LB Eric Kendricks, who finished the season with 143 tackles, 5.0 sacks and two interceptions. With LB Anthony Barr missing several games in 2021, Siefkes assisted with LB Nick Vigil's role, overseeing his 12 starts, in which he tallied 85 tackles and a pick-six.

Siefkes spent his third year at Wofford preparing the defense for its Spring 2021 slate as the 2020 season was postponed due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

During the 2019 season, the Terriers defense was ranked 20th in the nation in total defense as the team won the Southern Conference Championship for the third straight season and competed in the NCAA FCS Playoffs for the fourth consecutive year. Among Southern Conference schools, the defense ranked first in total defense, first in rushing defense and second in scoring defense.

In his first season at Wofford, Siefkes' defense was ranked first in the Southern Conference in total defense, scoring defense, passing defense and rushing defense. Nationally, the squad was 12th in total defense and eighth in scoring defense. The team posted a 9-4 overall record and won the Southern Conference Championship. In the NCAA FCS Playoffs, the Terriers advanced to the second round.

Prior to Wofford, Siefkes spent two seasons as the defensive coordinator at UW-Platteville. The defense allowed only 18.9 points per game and posted three shutouts in 2017, and he helped lead UW-Platteville to an 8-3 record and a playoff appearance in 2016.

In 2015, Siefkes served as a graduate assistant defensive

coach for the Wisconsin Badgers. While with the Badgers, he worked directly with former defensive coordinator and current Baylor head coach Dave Aranda and the defensive line during practice and team meetings.

Siefkes also worked at Florida International University in 2014 and his alma mater, Wisconsin-La Crosse, from 2012-14. Siefkes coached defensive backs, linebackers, and specialists while with UW-LaCrosse.

In addition to coaching, Siefkes has experience in strength and conditioning with the Air Force Academy. He received a Bachelor's of Science in Exercise and Sports Science from the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse and a Master's of Science in Educational Leadership and Policy Analysis (Intercollegiate Athletic Administration) from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

He and his wife, Carrissa, were married in July of 2020.

Mike Smith joins as the Vikings as outside linebackers/pass rush specialist after spending the past three seasons with the Green Bay Packers. He brings nine previous years of coaching experience to Minnesota. Smith worked with Assistant Head Coach Mike Pettine, while he was the defensive coordinator in Green Bay (2019-20) and for the New York Jets (2010-12). Vikings Head Coach Kevin O'Connell played quarterback for the Jets from 2009-11, overlapping with Smith and Pettine.

During the 2021 season, Smith coached LBs Rashan Gary

and Preston Smith to nine-plus sack seasons, becoming the second linebacker duo in team history to accomplish this feat. The other duo was Smith and LB Za'Darius Smith in 2019. The Packers were also one of two teams to have two linebackers to record nine-plus sacks in 2021; the other was Arizona Cardinals LBs Chandler Jones (10.5) and Markus Golden (11.0).

Smith's unit again led the Packers' pass rush effort in 2020. Z. Smith was named to the Pro Bowl for the second-straight season after tying for fourth in the NFL with 12.5

sacks. He became the first Packers defender to earn a Pro Bowl selection in consecutive years since LB Clay Matthews in 2014-15. Additionally, Z. Smith earned *Associated Press* Second-Team All-Pro honors for the first time in his career, becoming the first Packers LB to be named All-Pro since Matthews in 2012.

In his first two years playing under Smith (2019-20), Z. Smith posted 26.0 sacks, the most by a player in his first two seasons with the Packers and tied for third in the NFL over that span. Smith also oversaw the development of second-year LB Gary in 2020. Despite only starting four games, Gary finished second on the team with 5.0 sacks and tied for second on the team with 11 quarterback hits during the regular season.

In his first season with the Packers, Smith oversaw the most productive pass-rushing duo in the NFL. Z. Smith (13.5) and P. Smith (12.0) both posted career-high sack totals as they became the first duo in team history (since 1982) to post 12-plus sacks each in the same season and the first duo in NFL history to both register 12-plus sacks in their first season as teammates.

In 2018, Smith tutored LB Dee Ford, who tied for second among NFL linebackers with a career-high 13 sacks on his way to earning Pro Bowl recognition for the first time in his career. Ford was also tied for the league lead (DE J.J. Watt) with a career-best seven forced fumbles, tied for the second most in a season in franchise history behind only LB Derrick Thomas (eight in 1992). Smith also coached veteran LB Justin Houston in 2018, helping him register nine sacks and five forced fumbles in 12 games of action. Ford and Houston became the first Kansas City duo to both register five-plus forced fumbles in the same season since DEs Jared Allen and Tamba Hali accomplished the feat in 2006. Ford and Houston joined Broncos LBs Von Miller and Bradley Chubb as the only teammate duo in the NFL in 2018 to both register nine-plus sacks on the season. The defensive line also helped the Chiefs rank No. 1 in the league in takeaways (33, fifth in red-zone defense (49.1 percent) and tied for sixth in TDs allowed (34).

Prior to his arrival in Kansas City, Smith coached at his alma mater, Texas Tech, for three seasons (2013-15). He served as the co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach in 2015 after working as the interim defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach in 2014. Under his guidance in 2014, junior LB Pete Robertson led the Big 12 and was tied for seventh in the country with 12 sacks on his way to earning AP First-Team All-Big 12 honors. Smith served as the co-defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach in his first season with the Red Raiders in 2013, helping the defense nearly double its takeaways total from the previous season.

Smith worked the previous three seasons for the New York Jets, coaching the outside linebackers in 2012 and serving as a coaching intern in 2010-11. In 2012, he was part of a staff that helped the Jets rank second in the league in passing yards allowed (189.8 ypg) and opponent completion percentage (53.8) and seventh in opponent passer rating (78.2). Smith helped tutor LB Aaron Maybin in 2011, who led the Jets with 6.0 sacks and four forced fumbles in only 13 games of action. Smith was part of a defensive staff that helped New York rank third in the league in total defense (291.5 ypg), run defense (90.9 ypg) and yards allowed per carry (3.56) in 2010 as the Jets advanced to the AFC Championship Game.

Smith's coaching career began in 2009, when he served as the linebackers coach at the University of Hawai'i, where he helped LB Blake Soares post a team-high 107 tackles (58 solo) on his way to earning First-Team All-Western Athletic Conference

honors.

Smith was a four-year letterwinner as a linebacker at Texas Tech, where he was named team MVP and captain as a senior in 2004. At the time of his graduation, he was one of just five Texas Tech players to have appeared in 50-plus career games. He was tied for the team lead with 83 tackles as a senior, earning All-Big 12 honorable mention as he helped lead the Red Raiders to an 8-4 overall record and an upset win over No. 4-ranked California.

Smith was drafted by the Baltimore Ravens in the seventh round (No. 234 overall) of the 2005 NFL Draft and went on to play from 2005-07 for the Ravens before his career was cut short due to injuries in 2008.

Born Sept. 2, 1981, in Lubbock, Texas, Smith earned a degree in communication studies at Texas Tech. He and his wife, Emily, have two daughters, Kennedy and Finley, and a son, Weston.

Sorrentino joins the Vikings staff as the assistant wide receivers coach after spending the past three seasons with Northern Illinois, most recently serving as the passing game coordinator/wide receivers coach. Sorrentino has 17 years of coaching experience, including four in the NFL with the Jacksonville Jaguars (2013-16).

In 2021, Sorrentino helped coach NIU to a 9-5 record, beating Kent State 41-23 in the MAC Championship Game. Additionally, he coached WR Trayvon Rudolph to a 2021 All-MAC Second-Team honor, aiding him to 49 receptions, 877 yards and seven touchdowns. Rudolph also recorded 309 receiving yards in a single game against Kent State in 2021, shattering the school's previous record of 266 set by WR Sam Hurd in 2005.

Sorrentino, who was NIU's tight ends and fullbacks coach in 2019, moved to wide receivers coach in 2020. He mentored WR Tyrice Richie to a breakout season in 2020. Richie earned All-MAC honors after leading the team with 597 yards receiving on 53 receptions with four touchdowns in just six games.

In 2019, Huskies tight ends accounted for 34% of NIU's receiving yardage. TE Daniel Crawford led the way with 37 receptions for 443 yards and two touchdowns, while TE Mitchell Brinkman tallied 445 yards on 34 catches, including three touchdowns.

Prior to his time at NIU, Sorrentino spent the 2018 season as the director of football operations at Florida Atlantic.

In addition to working at FAU and Minnesota, Sorrentino had stops at the University of Miami (2011), Tennessee (2017), and his alma mater, The College of New Jersey (2007 & 2012). While with Minnesota, Sorrentino coached QB Adam Weber to a career year, aiding him in posting 2,679 passing yards, 20 touchdowns and nine interceptions.

Sorrentino spent four years in the NFL with the Jacksonville Jaguars (2013-16) where he worked with the wide receivers. Under Sorrentino's tutelage, Jaguars WR Marqise Lee posted career highs in receptions (63), receiving yards (851) and receiving touchdowns (3) in 2016. WR Allen Robinson earned his first Pro Bowl recognition in 2015 with 1,400 yards receiving and 14 touchdowns. Also in 2015, WR Allen Hurns became the youngest undrafted player since the

1970 NFL merger to post 1,000-plus receiving yards and 10-plus receiving touchdowns in a single season.

Prior to moving into the collegiate and professional coaching ranks, Sorrentino began his coaching career in the New Jersey prep ranks with stints at Montville Township High School (2008), West Essex High School (2006) and Morristown Beard High School (2005).

He and wife, Kara, have three children - a daughter, Marea, and two sons, Anthony, Jr. and Luca.

A'lique Terry (uh-LEEK) joins the Vikings as the assistant defensive line coach for his first season in the NFL, after spending the 2021 season as an assistant coach for the University of Hawai'i. Terry, a former offensive lineman at Wake Forest, brings four years of coaching experience to Head Coach Kevin O'Connell's staff.

During the 2021 season at Hawai'i, Terry helped the Rainbow Warriors finish fourth in the Mountain West Conference. QB Chevan Cordeiro threw for 2,793 yards and 17 touchdowns in 11 games played. S Khouiry Bethley had a career-high 73 solo tackles and added five interceptions, three forced fumbles and one fumble recovery on the season.

Prior to his time with Hawai'i, Terry served as a graduate assistant for the offensive line at the University of Oregon. Terry joined the Oregon program before the 2019 season and helped the Ducks to a Pac-12 Conference Championship, Rose Bowl title and 12-2 overall record. Oregon's offensive line was one of four finalists for the Joe Moore Award, which honors the nation's most outstanding offensive unit in college football.

During his first season at Oregon, Terry helped coach three players who earned All-America honors, including 2019 Outland Trophy winner T Penei Sewell. Sewell joined QB Marcus Mariota (2014) and RB LaMichael James (2010) as the only Oregon players to be unanimous First-Team All-Americans.

G Shane Lemieux and T Calvin Throckmorton also claimed All-America accolades with Terry's help. Lemieux earned first-team honors from *Sports Illustrated*, while Throckmorton was a second-team pick on three different teams (FWAA, CBS Sports, Phil Steele). He was also a second-team academic All-American.

Oregon's offensive line dominated the Pac-12's award for the league's offensive lineman of the week in 2019. An Oregon player earned the honor in eight of the 12 weeks that Oregon played. No other Pac-12 team won the award more than two times. Sewell won the award a league-high four times, while Throckmorton and Lemieux each won it twice. The trio of Ducks were the only multi-

week award winners during the 2019 season.

Four Ducks offensive linemen moved on to the NFL following the 2019 season with Lemieux and C Jake Hanson both selected in the 2020 NFL Draft. The New York Jets picked Lemieux in the fifth round (No. 150 overall) and the Green Bay Packers selected Hanson in the sixth round (No. 208 overall). Throckmorton signed a free agent deal with the New Orleans Saints, while T Brady Aiello did the same with the Minnesota Vikings.

Terry spent the 2018 season at Wake Forest as the quality control coach for the offensive line and running backs after playing four seasons for the Demon Deacons. The former offensive lineman helped the school to a pair of bowl games (2016 Military Bowl and 2017 Belk Bowl) and earned the starting nod at center in his first career game as a true freshman.

The former offensive lineman came out of Hialeah High School in Florida as one of the top 25 prospects in Dade County by the *Miami Herald*. He served as team captain in both his junior and senior years, helping the Thoroughbreds to nearly 3,800 yards of total offense in 2013. Terry was selected to the Miami-Dade vs. Team Florida All-Star game and attended Al Golden's Football Camps at the University of Miami, where he won the DL MVP award.

The Miami, Florida, native earned his a bachelor's in communications with a minor in entrepreneurship and business.


He also served as the Director of Athletic Training and Program Development, Spark Athletic, in Kuwait City, Kuwait during that time span.

RYAN GRIGSON

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

After originally joining the Vikings staff in a senior personnel role in February of 2022, Ryan Grigson was promoted to senior vice president of player personnel following the 2022 NFL Draft. Grigson adds 23 years of front office experience to the Vikings personnel staff, serving most recently as a senior football advisor with the Cleveland Browns and most notably as the Indianapolis Colts general manager from 2012-16.

While with Cleveland, he worked with Executive Vice President of Football Operations and General Manager Andrew Berry and the rest of the senior football staff, including Vikings General Manager Kwesi Adofo-Mensah, to contribute to all roster and strategic football decisions. Additionally, Grigson provided valuable counsel and trusted insight to Berry as a second-year general manager.

During his time with the Colts, Grigson rebuilt the roster, taking them to three consecutive playoff appearances, winning two AFC South titles and guiding them to an overall 52-34 record. His initial 2012 draft class, consisting of QB Andrew Luck, WR T.Y. Hilton and others, gained more yards from scrimmage than any rookie class in modern NFL history. Grigson inherited a roster that went 2-14 the year prior to him becoming general manager and led the Colts to an 11-5 record in 2012, earning *Sporting News* NFL Executive of the Year and Pro Football Writers of America NFL Executive of the Year. The nine-win turnaround was the third largest improvement in league history, and the Colts did not register a losing season during his tenure. In 2015, the Colts broke a 43-year-old NFL record after winning their 16th consecutive divisional game, a standard set by the only perfect team in the NFL modern era, the 1972 Miami Dolphins.

In his tenure as general manager, he served on multiple committees, including the National Football Scouting Board of

Directors, NIC Combine Review Committee, College Relations Advisory Committee, NFL General Manager Advisory Committee and the Bill Walsh NFL Minority Coaching Fellowship Advisory Council.

The Highland, Indiana, native spent the 2017 season in Cleveland as the club's senior personnel executive before making the move to Seattle's personnel department during the 2018 offseason. During his time in Seattle, the Seahawks posted consecutive postseason berths.

Grigson spent the 2004-11 seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles, rising in rank from western regional scout to director of college scouting before becoming director of player personnel in his final two seasons. During that span, the Eagles advanced to the postseason five times, highlighted by a trip to Super Bowl XXXIX.

Before his tenure with the Eagles, he spent five seasons with the St. Louis Rams as a national scout (1999-00) and area scout (2002-03), during which the Rams won Super Bowl XXXIV and advanced to Super Bowl XXXVI. He also has experience in the Canadian Football League and Arena Football League as a scout and assistant coach. He also spent time coaching at the collegiate level as an offensive line coach at McPherson College in 1998.

Grigson was drafted in the sixth round of the 1995 NFL Draft out of Purdue by the Cincinnati Bengals and played two seasons in the NFL and one in the CFL. His brother, Dru, is the director of player personnel for the Arizona Cardinals and signed as a rookie free agent with the Minnesota Vikings in 2003. Grigson and his wife Cynthia have six children.



DEMETRIUS WASHINGTON

VICE PRESIDENT OF FOOTBALL OPERATIONS

Demetrius Washington is entering his first season with the Vikings as Vice President of Football Operations. In his role, he will help manage football operations, while contributing to the executive team in decision-making. Washington, who spent the past seven seasons in the San Francisco 49ers football research and development department, brings nine total seasons of NFL experience to the Vikings front office.

In his previous role as manager of football research and development for the 49ers from 2020-21, Washington managed and oversaw the department's efforts in optimization and process improvement and developed predictive and statistical analysis for player evaluation, acquisition and strategy.

Prior to his role as manager of football research and development, he served as the 49ers analyst for the football research and development department from 2015-20, where he worked alongside Adofo-Mensah.

Washington got his start in the NFL as a game charter intern

for the Cleveland Browns from 2013-15, where he assisted the scouting and personnel department in gathering information, charted non-box score play information by breaking down game film and performed weekly data entry.

Washington received his bachelor's in business administration with an emphasis in finance from the University of Central Arkansas in 2011. He earned his master's of business administration with an emphasis in finance and analytics from the University of Missouri in 2014.



RYAN MONNENS

DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Ryan Monnens begins his 21st season in the Vikings scouting department in 2022 and his first as Director of Player Personnel, after spending the 2021 season as co-director of player personnel.

Monnens spent eight seasons as the Director of Pro Scouting after eight seasons as a pro scout and three seasons as a pro personnel assistant. He joined the Vikings as an intern in 1998 and spent the following three seasons in public relations with the club.

Monnens played wide receiver at St. John's University in

Collegeville, Minnesota, from 1995-97 under legendary coach John Gagliardi, the all-time winningest coach in college football history. During his tenure at St. John's, the Johnnies won the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title in 1995 and '96, advanced to the NCAA playoffs, and posted a 25-6-1 record.

A Minnesota native, Monnens grew up in Richmond and attended Rocori High School. Monnens earned his bachelor's degree from St. John's in 1998. Monnens resides in Excelsior with his wife Krissy and their daughter, Olivia.



CHISOM OPARA

ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Chisom Opara enters his first season as assistant director of player personnel with the Vikings in 2022 and fifth overall, after spending the 2021 season as a national scout. Opara has a wealth of experience in NFL personnel, having worked in Cleveland from 2005-17, climbing to Director of Player Personnel.

Opara joined the Browns after spending the 2004 season as a player personnel assistant with the Baltimore Ravens, where he served as an in-house scout and prepared special teams scouting reports, as well as scouted local colleges.

Opara originally signed with Baltimore as an undrafted free agent wide receiver in 2003 and went to training camp with

the team before being waived at the end of camp. Opara went back to school and graduated from Princeton in 2004 with a bachelor of arts in politics.

Opara played collegiately as a wide receiver at Princeton and finished his career second in all-time receiving yards (2,198) and third in receptions (154). A native of Baltimore, he served as team captain his senior year and was second-team All-Ivy League.

Opara is married to Megan and the couple has a daughter, Brooklyn Emiko Opara.



JAMAAL STEPHENSON

SENIOR PERSONNEL EXECUTIVE

Jamaal Stephenson enters his 21st season with the Vikings in 2022 and enters his first as senior personnel executive, after spending the 2021 season as Vikings co-director of player personnel.

In Stephenson's tenure, 16 Vikings rookies have earned All-Rookie accolades and two, RB Adrian Peterson and WR Percy Harvin, have been named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year. In 2020, WR Justin Jefferson had a record-shattering rookie season that earned him Second-Team *Associated Press* All-Pro honors, the first Vikings rookie position player to make the AP squad since Randy Moss in 1998.

In 2014 Teddy Bridgewater earned Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year in fan voting. Since 2007, the Vikings have sent five rookie players to the Pro Bowl in their debut season: Justin Jefferson (2020), Cordarrelle Patterson (2013), Matt Kalil (2012) Blair Walsh (2012), Percy Harvin (2009) and Adrian Peterson (2007).

In 2009, Stephenson was promoted to assistant director of college scouting after originally joining the club in 2002 as a college scout. Stephenson took over the Vikings college scouting department for the 2014 season.

Stephenson was recognized by the Fritz Pollard Alliance with the NFC Scout of the Year award for the 2012 season, presented during the 2013 Scouting Combine in Indianapolis.

Stephenson joined the Vikings in 2002 after spending two years with the Houston Texans as a college administrator.

Prior to joining the Texans, Stephenson spent one year as a scouting assistant for the Washington Commanders. His duties included evaluations and producing scouting reports. In the spring of 1998, Stephenson coached defensive backs as a graduate assistant at UMass.

Stephenson is a native of Goldsboro, North Carolina. He was a two-time All-Ivy League honoree at Brown as a DB, and was also awarded the team's "Unsung Hero" Award. He earned his bachelor's in organizational behavior management in 1997, and his master's in sport management from Massachusetts in 1999. In 2003, Stephenson was selected to Brown's All-Decade Football Team for the 1990's. He was honored as part of the 125-year anniversary celebration of football at Brown University.

Stephenson and his wife Emily have two sons, Noah and Julian, and a daughter, Gabrielle.



CHRIS BLANCO

DIRECTOR OF PRO PERSONNEL

Chris Blanco enters his second season with the Vikings and first as the Director of Pro Personnel after serving as the assistant director of pro scouting from 2021-22. In 2022, Blanco was selected to attend the NFL Front Office Accelerator at the NFL Spring League Meetings in Atlanta and the Ozzie Newsome General Manager Forum in Los Angeles.

Previously, Blanco spent nine seasons with the Houston Texans as a pro scout from 2017-19, player personnel scout from 2014-19, and pro player personnel assistant from 2012-14. In his various roles with the Texans, he made roster recommendations to the general manager as a both a pro and college scout; evaluated NFL players, college prospects and players from other professional leagues; handled advance scouting for Texans opponents; used his legal experience to work with the NFL-NFLPA Collective Bargaining Agreement and negotiate post-

draft free agent contracts; and helped develop younger scouts. During his tenure with Houston, the Texans won the AFC South Division five times (2012, 2015-16, 2018-19).

Blanco was a two-year starter at cornerback at Dartmouth College from 2003-07, where he earned his bachelor of arts in sociology in 2007. In addition to playing football for the Big Green, Blanco also was a member of the Dartmouth boxing team.

Blanco earned his juris doctorate from The University of Iowa College of Law where he was recognized with the Dean's Award for Academic Excellence, co-founded the Sports Law Society, worked as a recruiting assistant for the Hawkeyes football team, and won the 2012 Iowa Golden Gloves.

Blanco is a native of La Mirada, California, and currently resides in St. Paul.



MIKE SHOLITON

DIRECTOR OF COLLEGE SCOUTING

Mike Sholiton returns for his 19th season with the Vikings in 2022 and his second season as Director of College Scouting.

Sholiton is in his second stint in the NFL after working as an intern with the scouting, video and community relations departments of the St. Louis Rams from 1997-2000. He was a member of the 1999 Rams staff when the team won Super Bowl XXXIV over Tennessee. While working with the Rams scouting department, Sholiton maintained draft boards and collected scouting reports while evaluating and profiling draft eligible seniors for the 1999 Draft.

Sholiton came to the Vikings after four seasons with Fresno State, where he served as football operations coordinator for the Bulldogs. During his tenure with Fresno State, the team climbed

the national charts and posted one of the most successful stints in school history. The Bulldogs went 36-18 in his four seasons with the program and played in four straight bowl games, including wins over Georgia Tech and UCLA in the 2002 and 2003 Silicon Valley Football Classics, respectively.

A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Sholiton was a four-year letterwinner as a receiver and punt returner at Washington University in St. Louis. He earned his bachelor's degree in marketing in 2000 and went on to earn a master's in kinesiology from Fresno State in 2001. Sholiton and his wife Ashley have a son, Brett, and daughter, Bonnie. The family resides in San Antonio.



PAT ROBERTS

ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF COLLEGE SCOUTING

In his 10th season with the Vikings in 2022, Pat Roberts enters his second season as assistant director of college scouting for the Vikings.

Roberts spent the past eight seasons with the Vikings as a national scout, coming to the club after eight seasons with the Cleveland Browns from 2005-12. He originally entered the NFL in 1998 with Chicago and served in a variety of roles with the team. Roberts began with Cleveland as a national scout from 2005-08 before advancing to director of college scouting in 2009 and on to senior national scout from 2010-12.

Roberts was an in-house scout for Chicago in 1998 and spent 1999-2003 as the Bears' Northeast Area Scout before moving to

the Southeast Area in 2004. Prior to joining the Bears, Roberts served briefly as the head strength coach and offensive line coach for Division III Millsaps College in Jackson, Mississippi. His coaching career began at his alma mater, DePauw University in Indiana, where he coached running backs in 1995 and offensive line in 1996-97. Roberts was an offensive guard from 1991-94 while earning a degree in exercise science in 1995. He went on to get a master's degree in exercise science from Indiana State in 1998.

Roberts and his wife Allison have a daughter, Sophia, and son, Ryder.



IMARJAYE ALBURY

PRO SCOUT

Imarjaye Albury Sr. (EE-mar-jay ALL-bree) enters his third season with Vikings in 2022 and first as pro scout after spending the past two seasons in Minnesota as assistant defensive line coach.

Prior to arriving in Minnesota, Albury spent the 2018 and 2019 seasons as a defensive graduate assistant at the University of Arkansas, where he worked primarily with the defensive line. In addition to assisting the defensive line coach and defensive staff in game-planning and practice management, he aided in recruiting for the Southeastern Conference program. While at Arkansas, he coached and tutored defensive lineman Armon Watts, who was selected by the Vikings in the sixth round of the 2019 NFL Draft following a seven-sack season in 2018.

Before joining the Razorbacks, Albury worked with NAIA-member Ave Maria University in Florida, during the spring of 2018, leading the defensive line through winter and spring conditioning and assisting in recruiting.

Albury began his coaching career in 2017 at NCAA Division III Cortland State University in Cortland, New York, working as the defensive line and special teams coach. Under his tutelage, the Red Dragons recorded 31 sacks as a team in 2017, second-most in the Empire 8 Conference, while Albury's special teams unit

also led the conference with six field goal blocks. Albury was responsible for recruiting New York, New Jersey and Florida.

Albury's coaching career also included brief stints with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Football League, where he served as a guest coach during the team's 2019 training camp, and Western Carolina, where he briefly was on staff as the defensive ends coach before being hired by the Vikings.

As a player, Albury spent one season at West Virginia in 2012 before transferring to Florida International, where he was a three-year starter along the defensive line for the Panthers. Albury finished with 76 career tackles, 5.5 tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks over 36 game appearances at FIU, serving as a team captain and earning the program's Defensive MVP award in 2016. After participating in the 2017 NFLPA Collegiate Bowl, Albury would briefly spend time at both the Green Bay Packers and Los Angeles Chargers 2017 rookie minicamps before jumping into the coaching ranks.

Albury attended Miami Northwestern High School, the same high school as former Vikings QB Teddy Bridgewater. Albury and his wife Brittany have a son, Imarjaye Jr., who goes by "Junior," and daughter, Jordyn.



DONOVAN JACKSON

PRO SCOUT

Donovan Jackson begins his first season with the Vikings as a pro scout, marking his sixth season in the NFL. Jackson has experience in coaching and personnel departments throughout professional and collegiate ranks. Jackson spent the 2021 season with the Green Bay Packers as a scouting assistant. Responsible for evaluations and grading of players, Jackson also assisted in the transition of newly signed players into the team's infrastructure. He ran all offensive and defensive line drills during free agent workouts.

Jackson was a four-time graduate of the Bill Walsh NFL Minority Coaching Fellowship, primarily working with offensive lines. Established in 1987, the program provides yearly NFL offseason and training camp positions to minority coaches and exposes talented minority college coaches to the methods and philosophies of summer NFL training camps. Jackson held this title with the Chicago Bears (2020), Miami Dolphins (2019), Los Angeles Chargers (2017) and New York Jets (2016). While focusing on coaching development and offensive line play, Jackson inputted data, created drawings for installations, prepared scout team cards, produced film cut-ups and scouting report templates and scouted defensive opponents.

Jackson served as an offensive line assistant/analyst at LSU in 2018, winning nine regular season games and making a Fiesta Bowl appearance. In 2015, Jackson was the offensive line coach/run game coordinator at Savannah State University where the Tigers ranked in the top five in the MEAC in rushing and sacks allowed. Jackson helped produce three all-conference linemen. Jackson began his collegiate coaching career at Norfolk State as an offensive line assistant in 2014.

Jackson also spent eight seasons working within the high school level.

The Winston-Salem, North Carolina, native was a four-year starter on the offensive and defensive lines at Norfolk State (2003-07) and was a team captain during the junior and senior years. After college, Jackson played on the professional level in the Arena League with the Laredo Lobos (2007) and Chicago Rush (2008). Jackson earned his bachelor's degree in psychology from Norfolk State in 2007 and his master's in physical education from North Carolina A&T State University in 2012.

NATIONAL SCOUT

Sean Gustus returns to the Vikings in 2022 serving as a national scout for his sixth season in Minnesota, after spending the past five seasons as a college scout/area, where he worked in the Southeast region of the country.

Gustus is an experienced scout who came to the Vikings from the Rams, where he scouted the same region. Prior to his five years with the Rams, Gustus worked on the scouting staff of the Philadelphia Eagles for eight seasons. Gustus got his first experience in scouting with the New England Patriots in 2002

During his tenure with the Rams, the team, known as "The Greatest Show on Turf," fielded one of the most potent offensive attacks in the history of the NFL. In 2001, St. Louis posted a 14-2 regular-season mark and returned to play in Super Bowl XXXVI against New England. PLAYER PERSONNEL CONSULTANT

Through his career as a player, coach and administrator in the National Football League, Paul Wiggin has been closely linked with the success of several teams.

In his role as a Vikings personnel consultant, Wiggin works with the department that is responsible for the evaluation of NFL players and advance scouting of opponents.

Wiggin first joined the Vikings in 1985 as defensive line coach in Bud Grant's final season as head coach. Wiggin coached the Vikings linemen from '85-'91 under Grant and Ring of Honor Head Coach Jerry Burns. He oversaw a line that featured future Hall of Fame DE Chris Doleman and All-Pro DT Keith Millard, who posted 21 and 18 sacks, respectively in 1989, earning Millard NFL Defensive Player of the Year.

Wiggin's career included head coaching jobs at his alma mater, Stanford, from 1980-83 on a team that included John Elway and Darrin Nelson. From 1975-'77 Wiggin was head coach of

the Kansas City Chiefs. His coaching career started in 1968 with the San Francisco 49ers defensive line.

As a standout DE for the Cleveland Browns from 1957-'67, Wiggin never missed a game, playing in 146 straight. He earned Pro Bowl starts in 1965 and '67 and was named to the Browns all-time team. In 2008, he was inducted as a Cleveland Browns Legend, honoring the top players in franchise history. A two-time All-American at Stanford, Wiggin was inducted to the College Football Hall of Fame in 2005. He has bachelor's and master's degrees from Stanford.

A native of Modesto, California, Wiggin attended Manteca Union High. He and his wife, Carolyn, have three children and eight grandchildren.



BUD GRANT

CONSULTANT

Bud Grant holds a prominent place in the history of the Vikings franchise but also in the state of Minnesota. An icon of the sport and the team, Grant and the Vikings were synonymous for his 18 seasons as head coach of the club.

Grant retired as the winningest head coach in team history following the 1985 season, capping a career that would be honored with enshrinement into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1994, making him the first person inducted into Canton and the Canadian Football Hall of Fame (1983). Grant's place among the giants of the game is marked by an NFL career regular-season record of 158-96-5, winning 11 division titles and making 12 playoff berths in his 18 seasons leading the Vikings, capped with four Super Bowl berths. Grant won 290 total games in the NFL and CFL. Adding to his many honors throughout his career, the City of Minneapolis re-named a street adjacent to the new Vikings stadium as Bud Grant Way on Dec. 1, 2014, and Grant was honored by the State of Minnesota when Sept. 2, 1984, was declared Bud Grant Day. Grant's CFL coaching legend was immortalized in 2014 when a statue of him was unveiled at Winnipeg's new football stadium.

Grant's coaching career began in the CFL in 1957 with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. Grant moved to the sideline for 10 seasons (1957-66) immediately after retiring as a player for the Blue Bombers from 1953-56 where he played both ways as a WR/DB and was a Western Conference All-Star three times. As a coach in Canada, Grant led Winnipeg to the Grey Cup six times, winning the title four times - 1958, '59, '61, '62.

During a playoff game against Saskatchewan, Grant snared five INTs to set a pro football record for a game. He entered pro

football as a 1st-round draft pick with the Philadelphia Eagles where he played for two seasons in 1951-52, ranking 2nd in the NFL in receiving in 1952. Grant had a 203-yard receiving day against the Dallas Texans in 1952 that still ranks as the 4th-best day in Eagles history. He was the 2nd-leading receiver in the NFL in 1952 before moving on to Winnipeg for the final four seasons of his pro football playing career.

Despite his many connections to Minnesota, Grant is a native of Superior, WI and graduate of Superior High. Upon graduation in 1945 he enlisted in the Navy and spent his basic training at Great Lakes Naval Station in Chicago where he played on a base football team coached by fellow Hall of Famer Paul Brown. Grant enrolled at the University of Minnesota where he would be a three-sport standout in football, basketball and baseball, garnering nine total varsity letters with the Gophers. He twice earned All-Big Ten honors in football (1948, '49), was recognized as the team MVP and captain in both football and basketball for the Gophers, earning team MVP in basketball in 1948 and football in 1949. In 1950, Grant was honored as the Minnesota Athlete of the Half Century. He was sought after as a pro athlete, being drafted in the 1st round of the 1950 NFL draft, #14 overall, by the Philadelphia Eagles and also by the NBA's Minneapolis Lakers. He won a pair of NBA titles with the Lakers in 1950 and '51 before turning to football where he played in 1951 and '52 for the Eagles.

The Grant family is prominent in Minnesota in many areas. The matriarch of the Grant family, Bud's wife of 59 years, Pat, passed in the spring of 2009.

2017 - Washington

- Had every pass attempt for Washington, becoming the first player in the team's 86-season history to record every passing attempt for Washington in a season.
- Led Washington in rushing TDs (4) for the second time in his career (5 in 2015), becoming the first Washington QB to lead the team in rushing TDs in multiple seasons since Norm Snead tied for the team lead in 1961 and 1962.

- Earned NFC Offensive Player of the Month honors for November, posting an NFL-high 362.0 yards per game with an 8:0 TD-to-INT ratio in three games. The honor was the second of his career, joining LB Wilber Marshall as the only players in team history to win multiple Player of the Month awards.
- With an INT on his 21st pass attempt vs. Pittsburgh (9/12), snapped a streak of 252 consecutive regular-season pass attempts at FedEx Field without an INT, dating back to Week 1 of the 2015 season. The streak – which extended to 298 consecutive attempts when including postseason play – was the longest streak of consecutive home pass attempts without an INT in team history. It also ended the streak of consecutive games with a TD pass at 17, including postseason play, the second-longest in team history (23, Sonny Jurgensen).
- Completed 28-of-46 passes vs. Dallas (9/18), snapping a streak of nine consecutive regular-season games with a completion percentage of 65.0% or better, dating back to 2015, tied for the second-longest in the NFL since 1960, trailing only Joe Montana (10 in 1989).
- Completed 38-of-56 passes for 458 yards with two TDs and one INT in a tie against Cincinnati (10/30) in London. His 38 completions set a then team record, surpassing the previous mark of 33 set by Cousins (vs. Tampa Bay, 10/25/15) and Jason Campbell (at Dallas, 11/18/07). His career-high 458 passing yards were the second-most in a single game in team history, trailing only Brad Johnson's 471-yard performance at San Francisco (12/26/99).
- Completed 21 of 30 passes for 375 yards and tied his season high with three TD passes in a win vs. Green Bay (11/20), earning NFC Offensive Player of the Week and FedEx Air Player of the Week honors.
- Completed 41-of-53 passes for 449 yards with three TDs on Thanksgiving Day at Dallas (11/24), breaking his own single-game team record with the 41 completions and also tying Mark Brunell's team record for most pass attempts in a game without an INT. Also claimed sole possession of the most career 400-yard passing games in team history with his third career 400-yard effort, passing Sonny Jurgensen and Mark Rypien (two each). The only player in team history to record multiple 400-yard passing games in a season.
- Threw 36 consecutive pass attempts without an INT until his 37th and final attempt of the game at Arizona (12/4), snapping a streak of 187 consecutive pass attempts without an INT, dating back to Week 8 vs. Cincinnati in London, the second-longest streak in Commanders history.

- Eclipsed 4,000 yards on the season with 234 passing yards at Philadelphia (12/11), becoming the 1st player in team history with multiple 4,000-yard passing seasons (2015 and 2016).
- Set career highs in rushing yards (30) and rushing TDs (2) in a win at Chicago (12/24). Also threw a TD pass in his 18th consecutive road game, tying Joe Theismann for the longest streak of road games with a passing TD (18 from 1982-85). Became the second quarterback in NFL history to record 4,000 passing yards and four rushing TDs in consecutive seasons (Aaron Rodgers, 2008-09).

2015 - Washington

- Started all 16 games and one postseason game after being named the starter in late August.
- Set single-season team records (which he would surpass or match in 2016) for attempts (543), completions (379), passing yards (4,166) and 300-yard passing games (7).
- Shared PFWA Co-Most Improved Player honors with Panthers CB Josh Norman
- Twice earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors (Weeks 7 and 10) and was named NFC Offensive Player of the Month in December.
- His 29 passing TDs on the season tied Joe Theismann (29 in 1983) for the second-most in a season in team history.
- Became the first player in team history to throw a TD in all 16 games in a season since the adoption of the 16-game schedule in 1978 and was one of only two NFL QBs to throw a TD pass in all 16 regular-season games in 2015 (Russell Wilson).
- Became the first Washington QB to lead the NFL in completion percentage since Sonny Jurgensen in 1970.
- Completed 74.7% of pass attempts in home games, the highest home completion % in a season in NFL history, surpassing Jim Harbaugh's 74.3% with the Colts in 1997.
- Recorded 31 completions on 46 attempts for 290 yards with one TD vs. Philadelphia (10/4) in addition to scoring his first career rushing TD while engineering a 15-play, 90-yard drive culminating with a 4-yard TD pass to Pierre Garçon to complete his first fourth-quarter comeback victory as a starter.
- Completed 21-of-32 passes for 219 yards with one TD and one INT at Atlanta (10/11), forcing OT with a 4-play, 46-yard drive in 24 seconds to set up a game-tying FG.
- According to the Elias Sports Bureau, became the first player to throw game-winning TDs in the final 30 seconds of game twice in a month since Drew Bledsoe in December 2005.
- Completed 33 of 40 passes for 317 yards and three TDs and also rushed three times for 15 yards with one TD in the largest comeback win (24 points) in team history vs. Tampa Bay (10/25). Earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors for his performance, as his career-high 33 completions tied Jason Campbell's franchise record at Dallas (11/18/07). Also became the first Commanders QB to record at least three passing TDs and at least one rushing TD in a single game since Trent Green vs. Arizona (11/22/98).
- Completed 20 of 25 passes for 324 yards with a career-high four TDs for a perfect passer rating of 158.3 in a 47-14 rout vs. New Orleans (11/15). Earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors, as his perfect passer rating was the Redskins first among QBs with at least 20 attempts in records available dating back to 1950. Also became the first Redskins QB to pass for 300+ yards and post a rating of at least 150.0 in a game since Pro Football Hall of Famer Sammy Baugh (10/31/48).
- Tied his career high with four passing TDs and added a 13-yard rushing TD in a win vs. Buffalo (12/20), his sixth consecutive game with a passer rating of 100.0 or better, the longest streak by a Washington QB in records available back to 1960. NFC Offensive Player of the Month for December.
- Finished regular season with 232 straight pass attempts at home without an INT dating back to Week 1, the longest home streak in team history according to the Elias Sports Bureau.
- Completed 31-of-46 passes for 365 yards with four TDs for 120.3 in a division-clinching win at Philadelphia (12/26).
- Completed 12-of-15 passes for 176 yards with three TDs for a passer rating of 155.1 in regular-season finale at Dallas (1/3/16) before exiting in the 2nd quarter and became the first player in team history to throw three TDs in the 1st quarter of a game.
- Completed 29-of-46 passes for 329 yards with one passing TD and one rushing TD in his first postseason start in NFC Wild Card Round vs. Green Bay (1/10/16). Became the first Washington QB to throw for a TD and run for a TD in a postseason game and tied Todd Collins' franchise record for completions in a postseason game (29, NFC Wild Card round at Seattle on Jan. 5, 2008).

2014 - Washington

- Appeared in six games with five starts and totaled 1,710 yards, 10 TDs and nine INTs on 126-of-204 passing.
- Entered in relief vs. Jacksonville (9/14) and completed 22-of-33 for 250 yards with two TDs and a 109.4 passer rating, completing his first 12 passes.
- Started at Philadelphia (9/21) and completed 30-of-48 passes for 427 yards with three TDs and a passer rating of 103.4, marking the first 400-yard passing day of his career and the first by a Washington QB since Donovan McNabb threw for 426 yards vs. Houston (9/19/10). Earned FedEx Air Player of the Week honors for his performance at Philadelphia.

2013 - Washington

- Appeared in five games, starting the final three of the season. Compiled 854 yards, four TDs and seven INTs on 81-for-155 passing on the season.
- Started at Atlanta (12/15), completing 29 of 45 passes for 381 yards and three TDs, all career highs at the time. Became the first Washington QB in the Super Bowl era to throw for 300 yards in each of his opening two career starts, according to Elias.

2012 - Washington

- Played in three regular-season games with one start and saw his first postseason action.
- Saw his first career game action vs. Atlanta (10/7), entering in relief of the injured Griffin III in the 3rd quarter and completing 5-of-9 passes for 111 yards with one TD and two INTs, throwing the first TD pass of his career by finding Santana Moss for a 77-yard TD.
- Led the first 4th-quarter comeback of his career, replacing Griffin III in the final two minutes of a win vs. Baltimore (12/9), leading an eight-point 4th-quarter comeback by connecting with Pierre Garçon on an 11-yard TD and then converted the game-tying 2-point conversion on a QB draw, marking the first time in team history that Washington had scored a 2-point conversion to send a game to overtime.
- Made his first career start in a win at Cleveland (12/16), completing 26-of-37 passes for 329 yards with two TDs, giving him his first

300-yard passing performance; won Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Week.

- Completed 3 of 10 passes for 31 yards in relief of an injured Robert Griffin III in the NFC Wild Card round vs. SEA (1/6/13).

College - Michigan State

- Appeared in 45 games, starting 39 of final 40, completing 723 of 1,128 passes (64.1%) for 9,131 yards, 66 TDs and 30 INTs.
- Gained 9,004 yards on 1,239 plays, an average of 7.3 yards per snap and 200.1 yards per game.
- Graduated as MSU record-holder with 66 career TD passes, topping the previous mark of 61 by Jeff Smoker (2000-03).
- Exited Michigan State ranking 10th on the Big Ten Conference all-time TD passes list (66).
- His 25 TD passes in 2011 broke the old school season record of 22 by Drew Stanton in 2005.
- Set school record for career pass completions (723).
- His 34 completions vs. Notre Dame in 2011 were one shy of Smoker's single-game record (35 vs. Ohio State in 2003).
- One of seven players in school history to complete at least 60% of his passes for MSU, as his pass completion percentage of 64.1 was second in school history and tied for seventh in Big Ten history.
- Established an MSU career-record with a 146.1 pass efficiency rating, topping the old mark of 142.3 by Gene Click (1946-49).
- Broke school record with 9,004 yards of career total offense.
- Was only the second player in Spartans history to be named team captain as a sophomore and the first since 1949.
- Set the school record with 26 games throwing for 200+ yards.
- As of 2011, was one of only 16 players in MSU history to earn Academic All-Big Ten Conference honors in all four seasons.

Prep - Holland Christian

- Attended Holland Christian H.S., where he lettered in football, baseball and basketball.
- Earned All-Ottawa-Kent Conference honors as a QB for the football team, as a pitcher for the baseball squad and as a shooting guard for the basketball team.
- Was a 3-star prospect by Rivals.com.
- Finished prep career completing 198-of-366 passes for 3,204 yards, 40 TDs and 18 INTs in 16 games.
- In 2006, earned All-State and Academic All-State Honorable Mention by Michigan High School Football Coaches Association, as he went on to set 35 school game, season and career records en route to garnering Area Player of the Year accolades.
- That season, he completed 130 of 231 passes (56.3%) for 2,088 yards, 28 TDs and 10 INTs as a senior, leading the Maroons to the playoffs for the first time in school history.



- A First-Team AP All-Pro selection, his third career All-Pro honor (2011 at KR, 2013 at CB), and earned PFWA All-NFL honors.
- Led the team with five solo tackles and added one PD and his first career forced fumble at St. Louis (12/6).
- Had three tackles, an INT that he returned 72 yards and one PD in NFC Championship Game at Carolina (1/24/16).

2014 - Arizona

- Signed a five-year contract extension during training camp, started all 16 games for the fourth consecutive season and totaled 46 tackles, three INTs, eight PDs, 1.0 sack and one QB hit.
- His three INTs tied for second on the team.
- Earned fourth-straight Pro Bowl selection overall and third at CB.
- Recorded two INTs in the fourth quarter on back-to-back possessions vs. St. Louis (11/9), returning the second one 30 yards for his first career INT return TD. It marked his second career multi-INT game, and he became sixth player in franchise history with multiple INTs in each of his first four seasons. He also added two tackles and one pass defended to be named NFC Defensive Player of the Week for the second time in his career.

2013 - Arizona

- Chosen by his teammates as a team captain for the first time in his career; started all 16 games for the third straight season.
- Selected to the Pro Bowl for third straight year and was named First-Team AP All-Pro at CB, his second career All-Pro honor after being named as a kick returner in 2011.
- Tied for second on the team with three INTs, recorded a team-leading and career-high 30 passes defended.
- Served as team's top punt returner.
- Also saw action on offense throughout the season, catching six passes for 54 yards, running for 21 yards on four carries and completing a 17-yard pass.
- Had four solo tackles and one pass defended vs. Detroit (9/15) and helped limit Calvin Johnson to just two catches for 20 yards in the second half. Also played five snaps on offense, catching a 17-yard pass in the third quarter and later in the quarter completed a 17-yard pass to Kerry Taylor on a reverse pass play. It marked his first career pass attempt and, according to the Elias Sports Bureau, made him the first NFL defender to catch a pass and complete a pass in the same game since the 1970 merger.

2012 - Arizona

- Started all 16 games for the second straight season, leading the team and finishing fourth in the NFL with seven INTs.
- Selected to the Pro Bowl as a CB, joining Hall of Famer Rod Woodson as the only players in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl as both a defender and kick returner.
- Totaled 59 tackles, a team-high 17 passes defended and one FR and also had 51 punt returns for 426 yards (8.4 avg.) and three catches for 11 yards and two carries for 13 yards on offense.
- Recovered a fumble by Legedu Naanee and returned it 60 yards in the fourth quarter vs. Miami (9/30), the first fumble recovery of his career.
- Recorded an INT in fourth-straight game vs. Detroit (12/16), picking off Matthew Stafford in the second quarter to set up a go-ahead TD to become the first Cardinals player with an INT in four straight games since Aeneas Williams in 1994.

2011 - Arizona

- Started all 16 games at CB and had a record-setting season returning punts, with four TDs and 699 yards on 44 returns.
- Tied the NFL single-season record and set the franchise all-time record with four punt return TDs.
- Established an NFL rookie record with 699 punt return yards, which is also a franchise single-season record and ranks as the second-highest single-season total in NFL history (Desmond Howard, 875, 1996).
- Led the league with four PR TDs and 699 yards and ranked second with a 15.9 average.
- Selected to the Pro Bowl as a kick returner, becoming the 1st Cardinals rookie since Anquan Boldin (2003) to earn Pro Bowl honors; joined Johnny Bailey (1992) and Vai Sikahema (1986-87) as the only players in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl as a kick returner.
- Named to the AP All-Pro team as a kick returner, the only rookie named to the team.
- Blocked two FGs, helping the Cardinals lead the NFL with five blocked FGs on the season.

College - LSU

- Played in 39 games (30 starts) and totaled 135 tackles, seven INTs, 22 PDs in three seasons before entering the Draft as a junior.
- One of the nation's most decorated collegiate players in 2010, winning both the Bednarik Award (nation's top defender) and the Thorpe Award (nation's top defensive back).
- An unanimous All-American selection as a junior in 2010 and earned SEC Defensive Player of the Year and Special Teams Player of the Year honors from the league's coaches.
- All-SEC First-Team selection as a CB and return specialist.
- A defensive captain, started all 13 games at RCB and totaled 42 tackles, four INTs and six PD.
- A 2009 All-SEC Second-Team choice by the league's coaches and media and co-recipient of the team's most outstanding defensive player during his sophomore season.
- Earned Second-Team All-American honors from the *Sporting News* and started all 13 games at RCB and tallied a career-high 52 tackles, two INTs (one of which he returned for a TD) and 13 PDs.
- Played 13 games as a freshman in '08, starting the final four contests of the season, including a bowl win over Georgia Tech, and totaled 41 tackles, one INT, three PD.

Prep - Blanche Ely

- Named the *USA TODAY* Defensive Player of the Year as a senior in 2007 at Blanche Ely (Pompano Beach, FL) High School and was named to the *PARADE* All-America team and the *USA TODAY* All-America Team.
- Played in the U.S. Army All-American Bowl and was one of six finalists for the U.S. Army Player of the Year Award.
- Totaled 21 tackles and five INTs as a senior, adding 733 yards rushing and 11 TDs on offense.
- As a junior, earned All-Broward County First-team and 5A All-State Second-Team honors after totaling seven INTs and 37 tackles.
- Scored six TDs as a junior, three on KR, two as a WR and one on the ground as a RB.



VIKINGS LORE

FRANCHISE FOUNDED – Minnesota was granted an NFL franchise at the league owners' meetings in Miami on Jan. 28, 1960. The team began play in 1961. The founding group consisted of Max Winter, E. William Boyer, H.P. Skoglund, Ole Haugsrud and Bernard H. Ridder, Jr.

ROSE NAMED GENERAL MANAGER – In August 1960, former Los Angeles Rams Public Relations Director Bert Rose was named the team's first General Manager.

TEAM NICKNAMED – In one of his first moves with the team, Bert Rose recommended the nickname "Vikings" to the Board of Directors. The name was selected because it represented both an aggressive person with the will to win and the Nordic tradition in the upper Midwest.

FIRST COLLEGE DRAFT – On Dec. 27, 1960, RB Tommy Mason of Tulane was taken with the 1st overall choice and the first-ever draft pick utilized by the Vikings. Also selected that year were QB Fran Tarkenton (3rd round) and DB Ed Sharrockman (5th round).

FIRST HEAD COACH – Norm Van Brocklin was selected as the first head coach in franchise history on Jan. 18, 1961. He retired as a player in 1960 after 12 seasons in the NFL as a Hall of Fame QB who led Philadelphia to the NFL title in his final season on the field in 1960. Known as "The Dutchman" his tenacious style was infamous as a player and coach.

EXPANSION DRAFT – Following the 1960 season, the Vikings were allowed to select 3 players from the roster of each team after each team was allowed to protect 30 of their 38 players. Dallas, a 1960 expansion team, was exempt from this process. Among the future Vikings stalwarts selected in the Jan. 26, 1961 Expansion Draft were OL Gady Alderman (Detroit) and RB Hugh McElhenny (San Francisco).

ASSIGNED CONFERENCE – On April 12, 1961, the NFL assigned the Vikings to the Western Conference. Minnesota joined Baltimore, Chicago, Detroit, Green Bay, Los Angeles and San Francisco in the conference.

TRAINING CAMP OPENS IN BEMIDJI – The fledgling Vikings opened their debut training camp on the campus of Bemidji State University on July 7, 1961.

FIRST GAME – In the first game in franchise history, the Vikings played the Dallas Cowboys in a preseason game in Sioux Falls, SD, on Aug. 5, 1961. The Cowboys defeated the Vikings, 38-13.

FIRST HOME GAME – The Minnesota Vikings played the Los Angeles Rams in preseason action at Metropolitan Stadium in Bloomington, MN, on Sept. 10, 1961, the team's first game in the Twin Cities. The Rams defeated the Vikings, 21-17.

FIRST REGULAR-SEASON GAME – In a stunning upset, the Vikings defeated the Chicago Bears, 37-13, at Metropolitan Stadium in the Vikings' first NFL regular-season game on Sept. 17, 1961. Kicker Mike Mercer scored the first points in team history with a 12-yard field goal. Bob Schnelker scored the team's first touchdown on a 14-yard pass from Fran Tarkenton. In his NFL debut Tarkenton came off the bench to complete 17-of-23 passes for 250 yards and 4 touchdowns.

FIRST PRO BOWLERS – On Jan. 14, 1962, RB Hugh McElhenny and WR Jerry Reichow became the first Vikings to compete in the Pro Bowl. They were part of the Western Conference All-Stars who beat the Eastern Conference squad, 31-30, at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

FIRST ALL-PRO – In 1963 RB Tommy Mason, who was the team's first ever draft choice, was the first Vikings player to earn All-Pro recognition. He was a consensus pick after rushing for 763 yards and 7 TDs on 166 carries (4.6 avg.).

FLATLEY HONORED – Rookie WR Paul Flatley capped an impressive debut season by earning NFL Rookie of the Year honors from AP and UPI. Flatley hauled in 51 passes for 867 yards and 4 TDs on the season.

FINKS HIRED – On Sept. 11, 1964, Jim Finks was named the team's second general manager, succeeding Bert Rose, who resigned in June, 1964. Finks previously had served as general manager for Calgary of the Canadian Football League for 7 years.

FIRST WINNING SEASON – Minnesota won its final 3 regular-season games in 1964 to achieve

the first winning season in team history with an 8-5-1 record. The Vikings tied for 2nd in the NFL Western Conference behind the Baltimore Colts.

MET EXPANDED – A new grandstand was constructed on the east side of Metropolitan Stadium that increased capacity from 41,200 to 47,200. The new seats were formally dedicated on Aug. 20, 1965, when Minnesota played Philadelphia in a preseason game.

NFL RE-ALIGNED – On Dec. 2, 1966, Minnesota, Chicago, Detroit and Green Bay were chosen to make up the newly-formed Central Division of the Western Conference of the NFL.

VAN BROCKLIN RESIGNS – After compiling a 29-51-4 record while leading the Vikings in their first six years of existence, Head Coach Norm Van Brocklin resigned in Feb. 11, 1967. His best season was 1964, when he led the team to a tie for 2nd place in the NFL Western Conference with an 8-5-1 record.

TARKENTON TRADED – On March 7, 1967, QB Fran Tarkenton is traded to the NY Giants for a 1st and 2nd-round choice in 1967, a 1st-round choice in '68 and a 2nd-round choice in '69. With the picks Minnesota selected Clinton Jones and Bob Grim in '67, Norm Yary in '68 and Ed White in '69.

GRANT NAMED HEAD COACH – Bud Grant was named the 2nd head coach in Vikings history on March 10, 1967. He came to Minnesota after leading the Winnipeg Blue Bombers to 4 Grey Cup titles in 10 years as head coach.

FIRST DIVISION TITLE – On Dec. 15, 1968, the Vikings defeated the Philadelphia Eagles, 24-17, at Franklin Field then retired to the dressing room to listen to the Chicago-Green Bay game on the radio. Minnesota needed the Bears to lose to clinch the Vikings' 1st Division title. Chicago tried to rally from a 28-10 4th quarter deficit but eventually fell 28-17.

FIRST PLAYOFF GAME – On Dec. 22, 1968, in the first playoff game in franchise history, the Colts defeated the Vikings, 24-14, in the Western Conference Championship Game at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium. Minnesota trailed 21-0 in the 4th quarter. The Vikings rallied but fell short.

SECOND DIVISION TITLE – On Nov. 27, 1969, the Vikings shut out Detroit, 27-0, at Tiger Stadium to clinch the franchise's 2nd division title. The victory over the Lions was the 10th of a 12-game win streak, the longest in the NFL in 35 years. Minnesota finished the season with the NFL's best record (12-2) of '69.

FIRST PLAYOFF WIN – On Dec. 27, 1969, in the 1st playoff game in Minnesota, the Vikings came back to defeat the LA Rams, 23-20, in the Western Conference Championship. Minnesota overcame deficits of 17-7 at half and 20-14 in the 4th quarter for the 1st postseason win.

FIRST NFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – The Vikings defeated the Browns, 27-7, in the NFL Championship Game on Jan. 4, 1970, at Metropolitan Stadium. Minnesota became the 1st modern NFL expansion team to win an NFL Championship Game. The Vikings dominated the game, leading 27-0 at one point.

FIRST SUPER BOWL – On Jan. 11, 1970, the Vikings lost to Kansas City, 23-7, in Super Bowl IV

at Tulane Stadium in New Orleans. Not only was the game the 1st Super Bowl in franchise history, but it was the 1st Super Bowl played by a modern expansion team.

AFI-NFL MERGER LEADS TO RE-ALIGNMENT – In January 1970 the modern NFL was divided into the American Conference (AFC) and National Conference (NFC) with an Eastern, Central and Western Division in each Conference. Minnesota is assigned to the NFC Central with foes Chicago, Detroit and Green Bay.

THIRD DIVISION TITLE – On Dec. 5, 1970, the Vikings defeated the Bears, 16-13, at Metropolitan Stadium to clinch their 3rd straight division title. Minnesota hosted San Francisco in a divisional playoff game but lost, 17-14. For the 2nd consecutive season, the Vikings had the league's best record with a 12-2 mark.

FOURTH DIVISION TITLE – On Dec. 11, 1971, the Vikings defeated the Lions, 29-10, at Metropolitan Stadium to clinch their 4th-straight division title. Minnesota finished the year with an 11-3 mark, which tied Dallas for the league's best record in '71. The Vikings lost to the eventual Super Bowl champion Cowboys, 20-12, in a divisional playoff game at Metropolitan Stadium.

PAGE NAMED NFL'S MVP – In 1971 Alan Page became the first defensive player to be named the Most Valuable Player of the National Football League by the Associated Press. Page headed a Vikings defense that held opponents to fewer than 10 points a game to lead the league in scoring defense for the 3rd consecutive year.

VIKINGS RE-ACQUIRE TARKENTON – On January 27, 1972 the Vikings traded Norm Snead, Bob Grim, Vince Clements and a 1st-round choice in '72 and '73 to the NY Giants for Fran Tarkenton.

BOYER DIES – On February 19, 1973 E. William Boyer passed away. He was one of the prime forces in the drive to bring an NFL franchise to Minnesota. Boyer was president of the Vikings from 1960-64 and sat on the Board of Directors for the first 12 years of the team's existence. He was replaced on the team's Board of Directors by his son-in-law Jack Steele.

FIFTH DIVISION TITLE – The Vikings began the '73 season with 9 straight victories and clinched the NFC Central championship before they even lost a game. Minnesota clinched the division crown by defeating Detroit, 28-7, at Metropolitan Stadium on Nov. 11, 1973. The Vikings finished with a 12-2 mark, which tied for the best record in the league that year.

SECOND SUPER BOWL – On Jan. 13, 1974, the Vikings played in the 2nd Super Bowl in franchise history against the Miami Dolphins at Rice Stadium in Houston, TX. The Dolphins prevailed, 24-7. Minnesota earned the trip to Super Bowl VIII by defeating Dallas, 27-10, in the NFC Championship game.

FINKS RESIGNS – After the 1973 season, Executive Vice President and General Manager Jim Finks resigned. Under Finks, who was hired in 1964, the Vikings won 5 division titles and appeared in 2 Super Bowls. He also hired Bud Grant as head coach in '67.

SIXTH DIVISION TITLE – On Dec. 1, 1974, the Vikings clinched the NFC Central crown by

defeating the Saints, 29-9, at Metropolitan Stadium, while the Packers lost, 36-14, at Philadelphia. Minnesota tied for the best record in the NFC with a 10-4 mark.

THIRD SUPER BOWL – The Vikings played in their 2nd straight Super Bowl, losing to the Pittsburgh Steelers, 16-6, at Tulane Stadium in New Orleans on Jan. 12, 1975. Minnesota earned a trip to Super Bowl IX by defeating the Los Angeles Rams, 14-10, at Metropolitan Stadium on Dec. 29, 1974.

FRONT OFFICE CHANGES – In the spring of 1975, Max Winter, one of the team's founders and its president since 1965, took over active management of the franchise. In addition, Mike Lynn, who was hired as an assistant to the president on Aug. 15, 1974, was named the team's general manager.

SEVENTH DIVISION TITLE – The Vikings clinched their 3rd straight NFC Central title and their 7th division championship in 8 years on Thanksgiving Day Nov. 27, 1975, when the Lions lost to the Rams, 20-0. Minnesota won 10 consecutive games to start the season and finished the year with the best record (12-2) in the NFL. The Vikings were upset, 17-14, in the divisional playoffs at Metropolitan Stadium on Dec. 28, 1975, when the Dallas Cowboys scored on a last minute 50-yard touchdown pass.

TARKENTON NAMED LEAGUE MVP – Quarterback Fran Tarkenton was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player for 1975 after leading the Vikings to the league's best record (12-2). He led the NFC and finished 2nd in the NFL in passing with a 91.7 rating. He completed 273-of-425 passes for 2,994 yards and 25 TDs with 13 INTs.

HAUGSRUD DIES – Ole Haugsrud passed away on March 13, 1976. He was one of the prime forces in the drive to bring an NFL franchise to Minnesota. Haugsrud sat on the Board of Directors for 16 years of the team's existence. He was replaced on the team's Board of Directors by his widow Margaret Haugsrud.

EIGHTH DIVISION TITLE – The Vikings clinched their 4th consecutive NFC Central championship and their 8th division title in 9 years by defeating the Packers, 17-10, at Milwaukee County Stadium on Nov. 21, 1976. Minnesota finished the season with the best record in the NFC at 11-2-1.

FOURTH SUPER BOWL – The Vikings played in their 3rd Super Bowl in 4 years against the Oakland Raiders at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, CA, on Jan. 9, 1977. Minnesota lost, 32-14. The Vikings earned a trip to Super Bowl XI by defeating the Rams, 24-13, at Metropolitan Stadium on Dec. 26, 1976, in what ended up being the last Vikings playoff game at the Met.

KAPLAN NAMED TO BOARD – In 1977 team attorney Sheldon Kaplan was named to the Vikings Board of Directors. He replaced Bernard H. Ridder, Jr., who was one of the team's 5 founders.

NINTH DIVISION TITLE – The Vikings clinched the NFC Central crown on the season's final weekend by defeating the Lions, 30-21, in Detroit on Dec. 17, 1977. Minnesota wrapped up its 5th straight NFC Central title and its 9th division crown in 10 seasons.

FOURTH NFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – On Jan. 1, 1978 the Vikings played Dallas in their 4th NFC Championship Game in 5 years at Texas Stadium. Minnesota lost 23-6 to the Super Bowl champs.

CHANGES ON BOARD – John Skoglund and Vi-

king General Manager Mike Lynn were named to the team's Board of Directors replacing Margaret Haugsrud and H.P. Skoglund, who was one of the team's founders and passed away on November 5, 1977. Haugsrud joined the board in 1976, replacing her husband Ole, who passed away.

TENTH DIVISION TITLE – Despite losing in the regular-season finale to the Raiders, 27-20, on Dec. 17, 1978, at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum, the Vikings captured the NFC Central title when the Packers, who played at the same time as Minnesota, lost to the Rams, 31-14, at the LA Coliseum. It was the Vikings' 6th straight NFC Central crown and their 10th division championship in 11 years.

METRODOME GROUND BREAKING – In December, 1979, ground was broken for construction of the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome in downtown Minneapolis. The stadium, designed to house both the Vikings and Twins, was scheduled to open in April, 1982.

11TH DIVISION TITLE – Minnesota clinched its 7th NFC Central title in 8 years by defeating the Browns, 28-23, at Met Stadium on Dec. 14, 1980. It also was the Vikings' 11th division title in 13 seasons. Minnesota lost to the NFC Champion Eagles, 31-16, at Veterans Stadium on Jan. 3, 1981 in the divisional playoffs.

WINTER PARK OPENS – On May 15, 1981, the Vikings moved into a new facility in Eden Prairie that houses the team's offices, locker room and practice fields. The complex was named "Winter Park" after Max Winter, one of the Vikings founders who served as the team's president from 1965-87.

FAREWELL MET – On Dec. 20, 1981, the Vikings hosted the Chiefs in Minnesota's final game at Metropolitan Stadium. The Vikings lost, 10-6. The final points at the stadium were scored on a 33-yard field goal by Minnesota kicker Rick Danmeier. The last Vikings touchdown at Met Stadium was scored on a 6-yard run by Ted Brown against Green Bay on Nov. 29, 1981.

METRODOME OPENS – The Vikings played their 1st game at the Metrodome in a preseason matchup against Seattle on Aug. 21, 1982. Minnesota prevailed, 7-3. The 1st touchdown in the new facility was scored by Joe Senner on an 11-yard pass from Tommy Kramer. The 1st regular-season game in the Metrodome was the 1982 opener on September 12, when the Vikings defeated Tampa Bay, 17-10. Rickey Young scored the 1st regular-season touchdown in the facility on a 3-yard run in the 2nd quarter.

12TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – In a strike-shortened 9-game 1982 season, the Vikings won 3-of-their-last-4 regular-season games to earn a post-season berth.

FIRST DOME PLAYOFF GAME – On Jan. 9, 1983, the Vikings defeated Atlanta, 30-24, in a 1st-round game that was the 1st playoff matchup in the Metrodome. Minnesota lost to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Redskins, 21-7, in the NFC semi-finals at RFK Stadium on Jan. 15, 1983.

GRANT RETIRES – On Jan. 27, 1984, Bud Grant retired as Head Coach of the Vikings. In 17 seasons Grant led Minnesota to 12 playoff appearances, 11 division titles and 4 Super Bowls. His career regular-season record was 151-87-5 (632).

STECKEL HIRED – Les Steckel, who was an offensive assistant with the Vikings for 5 seasons, was named the 3rd head coach in franchise history on Jan. 29, 1984. Steckel, who came to

the Vikings in 1979 after working as an assistant with the 49ers, was the youngest head coach in the NFL in '84 at age 38.

GRANT RETURNS – On Dec. 18, 1984, Bud Grant was re-hired as head coach. He replaced Les Steckel who guided the team in 1984 after Grant retired following the 1983 season.

GRANT RE-RETIRES – On Jan. 6, 1986 following the 1985 season, Bud Grant retired as head coach of the Vikings. He originally retired after the 1983 season but returned in '85. At the time of his retirement he was the 6th winningest coach in NFL history with 168 career wins, including playoffs. In 18 seasons he led the team to a 158-96-5 regular-season record.

BURNS HIRED – Longtime Vikings assistant coach Jerry Burns was named the 4th head coach in team history on Jan. 6, 1986. He served as the Vikings offensive coordinator from 1968-85, when the team won 11 division titles and played in 4 Super Bowls.

TARKENTON ENSHRINED – On Aug. 2, 1986, Fran Tarkenton became the 1st player who spent the majority of his career with the Vikings to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He retired following the 1978 season with then NFL career records for passing yards (47,003), completions (3,686) and touchdown passes (342). He led the team to 6 NFC Central titles, 4 NFC Championship Games and 3 Super Bowls.

13TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – Despite a strike replacement unit that saddled the Vikings with 3 losses, the team made the playoffs as a wild-card entrant with an 8-7 record in 1987. It was the team's 1st postseason appearance under Jerry Burns.

FIFTH NFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – The Vikings played the Redskins in the NFC Championship Game on Jan. 17, 1988, at RFK Stadium. Trailing 17-10, the Vikings drove to the Redskins' 6-yard line with a little over a minute left in the game but failed to get the ball into the end zone. Minnesota upset New Orleans, 44-10, at the Superdome and San Francisco, 36-24, at Candlestick Park in the first 2 rounds of the playoffs to earn a trip to the conference title game.

BOARD ADDS MEMBERS – Four people were added to the Vikings Board of Directors in 1988. Joining Max Winter, John Skoglund, Jack Steele, Sheldon Kaplan and Mike Lynn were Wheelock Whitney, Jaye Dyer, Irwin Jacobs and Carl Pohlad.

PAGE INSHRINED – On July 30, 1988, Alan Page became the 2nd player who spent the majority of his career with the Vikings to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Drafted by Minnesota in the 1st round in 1967, Page spent the Pro Bowl 9 times. In 1971 he became the 1st defensive player to be named the NFL's Most Valuable Player by Associated Press. Page played on teams that won 10 NFC Central titles and played in 4 Super Bowls.

14TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – The Vikings won 6-of-their-last-7 games in 1988 to earn a wild-card berth into the playoffs. Minnesota finished with an 11-5 record then defeated the Rams, 26-17, on December 26 in a first-round playoff game at the Metrodome. The Vikings fell the following week to eventual Super Bowl winner San Francisco at Candlestick Park.

REMAINING FOUNDER LEAVES BOARD – In 1989, Max Winter, the last of the original 5 Vikings' founders on the team's Board of Directors, left the board. He also served as the team's president from 1965-87. He was replaced on the board by Gerald Schwalbach.

WALKER ACQUIRED – On Oct. 12, 1989, the Vikings acquired Herschel Walker from Dallas for Issiac Holt, David Howard, Darrin Nelson, Jesse Solomon, Alex Stewart, a 1st-round choice in 1992, conditional 1st-round choices in 1990 and '91, conditional 2nd-round choices in 1990, '91 and '92, and a conditional 3rd-round choice in 1992. The final result of the trade gave the Vikings Walker, a 3rd (Mike Jones), 5th (Reggie Thornton) and 10th-round choice (Pat Nungie) in 1990 and a 3rd-round choice in 1991 (Jake Reed), while Dallas received all 5 players, a 1st, 2nd and 6th-round choice in 1990, a 1st and 2nd-round choice in 1991 and a 1st, 2nd and 3rd-round choice in 1992.

12TH DIVISION TITLE – The Vikings captured their 12th division title since 1968 by defeating the Cincinnati Bengals, 29-21, at the Metrodome in a Monday night game on Christmas Day in

1989. It also was Minnesota's 15th postseason appearance in the past 22 years. The Vikings finished the season with a 10-6 record but lost to eventual Super Bowl Champion San Francisco 41-13, at Candlestick Park in the divisional playoffs on Jan. 6, 1990.

HEADRICK NAMED TEAM PRESIDENT – On Jan. 1, 1991, Roger Headrick became president and CEO of the Vikings. He replaced Mike Lynn as the person in charge of day-to-day operations of the club. In addition Headrick and Philip Maas replaced Jack Steele and Sheldon Kaplan on the board of directors.

BURNS RETIRES – On Dec. 3, 1991, Jerry Burns announced his retirement effective at the end of the season. In 6 seasons as Head Coach of the Vikings, Burns compiled a career record of 52-43 (.547). He also led Minnesota to 3 playoff appearances, including a division title and an NFC Championship Game.

CHANGES ON BOARD – On Dec. 16, 1991, the team's ownership structure was reorganized. Irwin Jacobs and Carl Pohlad sold their shares to a group consisting of Vikings President/CEO Roger Headrick, John Skoglund, Jaye Dyer, Philip Maas, Mike Lynn, Wheelock Whitney, James Binger, Bud Grossman, Elizabeth MacMillan and Carol Sperry.

GREEN NAMED HEAD COACH – On Jan. 10, 1992, Dennis Green was named the 5th Head Coach in team history. He came to Minnesota after turning around a struggling Stanford University football program as head coach there from 1989-91.

13TH DIVISION TITLE – On Dec. 20, 1992 the Vikings defeated the Steelers, 6-3, at Three Rivers Stadium to earn the franchise's 13th division title. It also was Minnesota's 16th playoff season since 1968. Dennis Green also posted the most victories (11) and the 1st division title by a 1st-year head coach in team history.

17TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – In 1993, for the first time since 1974, the Vikings won their final 3 regular-season games to earn a Wild-Card playoff berth. It was the team's 17th postseason appearance since 1968. Minnesota lost to the Giants, 17-10, in Giants Stadium in a first-round playoff game on Jan. 9, 1994.

MOON ACQUIRED – On April 14, 1994 the Vikings traded a 4th-round draft choice in 1994 and a 3rd-round draft choice in 1995 to the Houston Oilers for quarterback Warren Moon, who has thrown for more yardage and touchdowns as a professional than any other player. He set team season records for passing yards (4,264) in '94 and for completions (377) and touchdown passes (33) in '95.

GRANT ENSHRINED – On July 30, 1994, Bud Grant was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He coached the Vikings from 1967-83 then again in '85. During his tenure Minnesota made the playoffs 12 times, won 11 division titles and played in 4 Super Bowls. Grant was the first person to be elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame and the Canadian Football League Hall of Fame.

14TH DIVISION TITLE – On the final day of the 1994 regular season, the Vikings defeated the 49ers, 21-14, in a Monday night game to earn their 2nd NFC Central title in 3 seasons and their 3rd straight playoff berth. It also was Minnesota's 14th division title and 18th postseason appearance since 1968. Dennis Green became only the 7th NFL coach to lead his team to the playoffs in his first 3 seasons.

FINKS ENSHRINED – Former Vikings General Manager Jim Finks was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 29, 1995. During his decade with Minnesota, the team won 5 division titles and appeared in 2 Super Bowls. Finks passed away on May 8, 1994, and was inducted posthumously, represented by his family.

WINTER PASSES AWAY – Max Winter, who served as the owner and President of the Vikings from 1965-87, passed away on July 26, 1996. He was one of the prime forces bringing an NFL franchise to Minnesota and was a big factor in the building of the Metrodome and attracting Super Bowl XXVI to the Twin Cities.

19TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – On Dec. 15, 1996, the Vikings defeated the Buccaneers, 21-10, in the Metrodome. After a Washington loss to Arizona later that day, Minnesota was guaranteed a playoff berth for the 19th time since 1968

and the 4th in 5 seasons under Dennis Green.

The Vikings lost, 40-15, at Dallas in a first-round game on Dec. 28, 1996.

20TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – On Dec. 21, 1997, the Vikings beat the Colts in the regular season finale to reach the playoffs for the 20th time in team history and the 5th time in 6 seasons under Dennis Green. The Vikings went on the road and came back from 16 points down to defeat the NY Giants 23-22 at the Meadowlands on Dec. 27, 1997. It was the biggest comeback win in team playoff history and the 5th biggest postseason comeback in NFL history. The following week the Vikings lost, 38-22, to the San Francisco 49ers at 3Com Park in the Divisional Playoffs on Jan. 3, 1998.

KRAUSE ENSHRINED – On Aug. 1, 1998, Paul Krause was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Krause played free safety with the Vikings from 1968-79 and the Redskins from 1964-67. He holds the NFL record for career interceptions with 81. Krause was selected to 8 Pro Bowls in his 15-year career.

BOARD AGREES TO SELL – On July 3, 1998, The Minnesota Vikings 10 owners voted unanimously to accept the bid of Texas businessman B.J. "Red" McCombs to purchase the Vikings.

NFL APPROVES MCCOMBS – On July 28, 1998, the NFL owners unanimously approved Red McCombs' purchase of the Vikings, finalizing the change of ownership from the 10 previous owners to sole ownership by McCombs.

GREEN CONTRACT EXTENDED – Head Coach Dennis Green received a 3-year contract extension on September 5, the day before the 1998 opener vs. Tampa Bay.

VIKINGS 15 WINS BEST IN TEAM HISTORY – The Vikings won their 15th NFC Central Division title in 1998 and became only the 3rd team in NFL history to go 15-1 through the regular season with their 26-16 win at Tennessee in the regular season finale. The Vikings also established a new NFL scoring record with 556 points, breaking the mark of 541 set by the 1983 Redskins.

SIXTH NFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – The Vikings hosted Atlanta in the 6th NFC Championship game in franchise history with a berth in Super Bowl XXXIII on the line. The teams played to a 27-27 deadlock during regulation, forcing the game into overtime where the Falcons claimed a 30-27 win. It was the first NFC Championship game played in the Metrodome.

22ND PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – The Vikings turned their 1999 season around, winning eight of the final 10 games to finish 10-6 and host a 1st-round playoff game vs. Dallas. Robert Smith set a team post-season record with 140 rushing yards in the 27-10 win over the Cowboys. The Vikings led 49-37 to eventual Super Bowl XXXIV champion St. Louis in the Divisional Round at the TVA Dome.

CARTER NAMED MAN OF THE YEAR – Cris Carter was honored as the first recipient of the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award for civic involvement, charity work and displaying high character on January 29, 2000, in a ceremony during Super Bowl week in Atlanta. The award was re-named after Payton, a Hall of Fame running back who died in 1999.

SMITH BREAKS TEAM RUSHING RECORD – Robert Smith surpassed Chuck Foreman's 20-year-old career rushing record in the team's 28-16 win at Chicago (10/15/00). Smith ended his career with 6,818 yards. He also established a new team record with 1,521 rushing yards on the season and held the team record with 29 career 100-yard games at the time of his retirement.

40TH ANNIVERSARY TEAM ANNOUNCED – The Vikings celebrated their 40th season of NFL football in 2000, highlighted by a luncheon on November 30 to introduce the Vikings 40th Anniversary Team. That night the Vikings topped Detroit 24-17 and Cris Carter caught his 1,000th pass on a 4-yard TD from Daunte Culpepper. Carter was only the 2nd player in NFL history to record 1,000 career receptions.

16TH DIVISION TITLE – The Vikings overcame every critic's expectations in 2000 to post an 11-5 regular-season record, win the franchise's 16th NFC Central title and made the 23rd playoff appearance in team history, ending in the 7th NFL Championship game at Giants Stadium.

YARF ENSHRINED – On August 4, 2001, Ron Yarf was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of



Orlando Thomas (42) and the Vikings defense was opportunistic in forcing turnovers under Dennis Green.

Fame. Yarf played 14 seasons with Minnesota and played in 4 Super Bowls and 7 Pro Bowls during his career.

TICE REPLACES GREEN – On January 4, 2002, Mike Tice replaced Dennis Green on the sideline for the Vikings. Tice coached the 2001 regular season finale at Baltimore. Green assembled a 97-62 regular season record at the helm of the Vikings. Green led the team to 4 NFC Central Division titles and twice played in the NFC Championship game.

TICE NAMED HEAD COACH – On January 10, 2002 Mike Tice was named the 6th Head Coach in Vikings history. Tice is the 3rd of the 6 Vikings Head Coaches to be promoted from within the team's coaching ranks but is the 1st Head Coach to have played for the Vikings.

NFL RE-ALIGNS – The 2002 season marked the re-alignment of the NFL as the League expanded to 32 teams when the Houston Texans joined as an expansion franchise. The NFL re-aligned into 8 divisions of 4 teams each. The Vikings moved into the newly-formed NFC North after years in the NFC Central.

VIKINGS LEAD NFL IN RUSHING – The 2002 Vikings led the NFL in rushing for the first time in team history with 2,507 yards for the season, an average of 156.7 yards per game. The team also established an NFL mark by becoming the 1st team to make a successful 2-point conversion to win a game when Daunte Culpepper scored on a 2-point run with :05 remaining in the game to give the Vikings a 32-31 win at New Orleans on December 15, 2002. Culpepper proved to be a dangerous runner himself in 2002, setting team records for attempts (106), yards (609) and rushing TDs (10) by a QB.

VIKINGS OFFENSE RANKS #1 – The 2003 Vikings became the 1st squad in franchise history to finish the season with the #1 ranked offense in the NFL, averaging 393.4 yards per game and scoring an average of 26.0 points per game.

ELLER ENSHRINED – On August 8, 2004, Carl Eller was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Eller, the Vikings career sacks leader, was a member of the vaunted Purple People Eaters defense.

WILF FAMILY TAKES OWNERSHIP – An investment group led by brothers Zygmunt and Mark Wilf were unanimously approved as the new owners of the Vikings by their fellow NFL owners on May 25, 2005. The Wilfs, owners of a real estate development company in New Jersey, took ownership in mid-June from former owner Red McCombs, who had owned the club since 1998. Joining the Wilfs ownership group is cousin Leonard Wilf, Reggie Fowler, David Mandelbaum and Alan Landis.

CHILDRESS TAKES THE HELM – The Vikings named Brad Childress the 7th head coach in

the history of the franchise on January 6, 2006. Childress comes to the Vikings after seven seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles, spending the 2002-05 seasons as offensive coordinator.

VIKINGS UNVEIL NEW UNIFORMS – The franchise made the most dramatic change to its uniforms in the history of the team during the 2006 offseason. The team unveiled the new uniforms before an enthusiastic crowd at Mall of America on April 27, 2006.

VIKINGS SEND 4 LINEMEN TO PRO BOWL – The 2006 Vikings strong play along the defensive and offensive lines was recognized league-wide as C Matt Birk, G Steve Hutchinson, DT Kevin Williams and DT Pat Williams all earned Pro Bowl honors.

ROOKIE RUNS TO RECORDS – In only his 5th NFL game, rookie RB Adrian Peterson broke the team record for rushing yards in a game with 224 at Chicago (10/14/07). Three weeks later he topped that by setting the NFL single-game rushing record with 296 yards vs. San Diego (11/4/07). He went on to lead the NFC in rushing with 1,341 yards, was named All-Pro, NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year, started in the Pro Bowl and took home game MVP honors.

SOLID 7 EARN PRO BOWL TRIPS – The Vikings sent 7 players to Hawaii for the Pro Bowl, the most to earn the honor since the 2000 season. The team was represented by C Matt Birk, G Steve Hutchinson, S Darren Sharper, FB Tony Richardson, DT Kevin Williams, DT Pat Williams and RB Adrian Peterson.

BLOCKBUSTER TRADE LANDS ALLEN – The Vikings struck a deal with Kansas City to trade 2007 NFL sack leader DE Jared Allen to the club for the Vikings 1st-round (#17) pick in the 2008 Draft, a pair of 3rd-round picks in 2008 and a swap of 6th-round choices.

ZIMMERMAN ENSHRINED – On Aug. 2, 2008, T Gary Zimmerman was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Zimmerman started all 108 games he played for the Vikings.

VIKINGS CLAIM FIRST NFC NORTH TITLE – The Vikings rattle off 9 wins in their last 12 games of 2008 to capture their 1st division title since 2000 and the team's 1st NFC North Championship since the NFC Central was realigned in 2002.

PETERSON LEADS NFL IN RUSHING – Second-year RB Adrian Peterson set a team record with 1,760 yards rushing to become the 1st-ever Viking to lead the NFL in rushing. Peterson broke the 100-yard barrier 10 times during the season.

RUSHING DEFENSE DYNASTY – The Vikings become the first defense since the 1970 merger to rank No. 1 in the NFL against the run for 3 straight years. Minnesota gave up just 76.9 yards per game to lead the league.

VIKINGS LOSE FOUNDING FATHER – One of the Vikings original stockholders and most-ardent supporters, Don McNeely passed away in March of 2009. In addition to his role in helping build the Vikings tradition, McNeely was revered as one of Minnesota's great philanthropists. McNeely was an ardent supporter of the arts and also donated large gifts to the Minnesota State Fair, St. John's University, the Warner Nature Center and the Como Conservatory.

MC DANIEL ENSHRINED – G Randall McDaniel was inducted in the Pro Football Hall of Fame on August 8, 2009. McDaniel started 12 consecutive Pro Bowls (1989-2000), 202 consecutive games and missed only 2 games his entire career after being a 1st-round pick by the Vikings in 1988.

FAVRE SIGNS WITH VIKINGS – A long-time nemesis, Brett Favre signed with the Vikings on August 18, 2009. Favre went on to have the best statistical season of his career, throwing for 4,202 yards, 33 TDs and 7 INTs with a 107.2 passer rating, while also setting the NFL record for consecutive games started, a mark formerly held by Vikings legend Jim Marshall.

BACK-TO-BACK DIVISION TITLES – The Vikings finished the regular season with a 12-4 mark to capture its 2nd consecutive NFC North title. It marked the first time Minnesota achieved the feat since 1977-78.

HARVIN NAMED ROOKIE OF THE YEAR – Rookie WR/KR Percy Harvin burst on the scene and earned Associated Press Offensive Rookie of the Year and was also named Pro Football Weekly/PFWA Offensive Rookie of the Year and Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year. Harvin set team records with 2,081 all-purpose yards and 2 TDs on kick

returns, while sharing the NFL rookie lead with 60 receptions for 790 yards. He earned a Pro Bowl berth as a return man.

10 VIKINGS EARN PRO BOWL BERTHS – The Vikings led the NFL and tied a team record with 10 players earning Pro Bowl honors. The unit featured 4 players who made their 1st Pro Bowl-Heath Farwell, Bryant McKinnie, Sidney Rice and Percy Harvin. They were joined by Brett Favre, Steve Hutchinson, Adrian Peterson, Jared Allen, Kevin Williams and Antoine Winfield.

EIGHTH NFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – The Vikings traveled to New Orleans in the 8th NFC Championship game in franchise history for a chance to play in Super Bowl XLIV in South Florida. The teams played to a 28-28 tie in regulation, forcing the game into OT where the Saints hit a 40-yard FG in the extra period to claim a 31-28 victory.

RANDLE ENSHRINED – DT John Randle was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on August 7, 2010 following a 14-year career, including 11 years as a Vikings (1990-2000). He was named to NFL Team of the Decade for the 1990s and led or tied for the team lead in sacks 9 times in his 11 Vikings seasons.

FRAZIER REPLACES CHILDRESS – Defensive Coordinator/Asst. Head Coach Leslie Frazier took over coaching the team after 10 games in 2010 when Brad Childress was replaced. Frazier won his 1st game as Interim Head Coach on 11/28/10 at Washington.

ROOF COLLAPSE CAUSES CHAOTIC 2010 – Heavy snows and inclement weather caused the Metrodome roof to collapse in the early morning hours of December 12, 2010, forcing the final 2 home games of the 2010 season to be moved from the facility. The Vikings played host to the NY Giants in Detroit at Ford Field on 12/13 and the club's final home game was played at the University of Minnesota's TCF Bank Stadium, a Monday Night Football contest against Chicago on 12/20. The team had a road game against Philadelphia postponed due to weather from Sunday night, 12/26, to Tuesday night, 12/28.

50 GREATEST VIKINGS CAPS 50TH SEASON – Vikings legends reunited for a celebration of the storied history of the Vikings' franchise during a weekend of activities leading up to the Monday Night Football game versus Chicago on December 20, 2010. The team unveiled the 50 greatest Vikings and they were introduced to fans at halftime of the snowy game at TCF Bank Stadium. The snowy atmosphere was fitting and marked the first outdoor home game for the Vikings since the 1981 Met Stadium finale on 12/20/81, 30 years to the day.

FRAZIER NAMED HEAD COACH – After serving as Interim Head Coach for the final 6 games of the 2010 season, Leslie Frazier was named the Head Coach on Monday, January 3, 2011, the day after the 2010 regular season finale. Frazier posted a 3-3 mark in the interim role.

MADIEU WILLIAMS NAMED NFL MAN OF THE YEAR – On Feb. 6, 2011 Vikings 5 Madieu Williams became only the 2nd Vikings player, joining Cris Carter, to earn Walter Payton Man of the Year honors from the NFL.

ALLEN BREAKS TEAM SACK RECORD – DE Jared Allen had one of the best seasons for a pass rusher in NFL history in 2011. Recording 22.0 sacks, Allen broke Chris Doleman's team record of 21.0 sacks in a season and fell just .5 sack short of the NFL's single-season sack record.

SPIELMAN NAMED GENERAL MANAGER – On January 3, 2012, Rick Spielman was named the team's General Manager. He had previously been the Vikings Vice President of Player Personnel from 2006-2011.

DOLEMAN ENSHRINED – DE Chris Doleman was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 3, 2012 following a 15-year career, including 10 as a Viking. His 150.5 sacks was 4th all-time in the NFL at the time of his retirement.

NEW STADIUM DEAL APPROVED – In May 2012, a bill for a new Minnesota Vikings stadium was passed through the Minnesota legislature and signed by Governor Mark Dayton. Funded by the Vikings, the State of Minnesota, and the City of Minneapolis, the new stadium will be located on the current Metrodome site. Ground was broke for the stadium in December of 2013.

PETERSON POSTS EPIC SEASON – Adrian Peterson had a season for the ages, coming back from a severe knee injury at the end of 2012 to set a franchise record and post the 2nd-best rushing season in NFL history with 2,097 yards. Peterson broke Robert Smith's Vikings career rushing mark in the 1st game of the season. Peterson went on to become only the 3rd Vikings player to earn Associated Press MVP honors for his efforts along with AP Offensive Player of the Year, 1st-Team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.

TURNAROUND EARNS PLAYOFF BERTH – The Vikings rebounded from a 3-13 mark in 2012 to go 10-6 and earn a Wild Card Playoff berth in 2013, the biggest single-season win improvement in team history at 7-8.

CARTER ENSHRINED – WR Cris Carter was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 4, 2013. Carter holds the Vikings career receptions, yards and TDs records. Carter was a 4-time All-Pro and 8-time Pro Bowler during his 16 NFL seasons.

VIKINGS HOST REGULAR SEASON HOME GAME IN LONDON – The Vikings played the 1st regular season game in a franchise history outside of the United States in a 34-27 win over Pittsburgh at London's Wembley Stadium in the International Series on September 29, 2013. The Vikings had previously played a preseason game at Wembley in 1983 against the St. Louis Cardinals.

ROOKIE CORDARRELLE PATTERSON SETS UNBREAKABLE RECORD – In only his 7th career game, rookie WR/KR Cordarrelle Patterson tied an NFL record for the longest play in league history and set the mark for longest KO return with his 109-yard TD vs. Green Bay on Oct. 27, 2013. The only other 109-yard play came in 2007 against the Vikings at Mall of America Field when Antonio Carmartie returned a Vikings missed FG 109 yards for a score.

GROUNDING BREAK ON NEW STADIUM – Vikings ownership and management, state leaders and elected officials joined together to officially break ground on the new stadium building project on December 3, 2013.

ALL MALL OF AMERICA FIELD TEAM – Fan voting on Vikings.com selected a 27-member team and head coach of Vikings alumni that played most of their careers with the club at Mall of America Field at HHF Metrodome.

LAST GAME IN THE DOME – After calling Mall of America Field at HHF Metrodome home for 32 seasons, the Vikings played the final game in the stadium in the 2013 season finale. Minnesota topped Detroit 14-13 to send the stadium out on a winning note.

ZIMMER HIRED AS 9TH COACH IN TEAM HISTORY

— Cincinnati Bengals defensive coordinator Mike Zimmer was hired as the 9th coach in Vikings history on January 15, 2014. The veteran defensive coach comes to Minnesota with 20 seasons of NFL experience under his belt and a Super Bowl victory with Dallas.

MINNESOTA AWARDED SUPER BOWL LII AT NEW STADIUM IN 2018 — Minnesota's bid for Super Bowl LII was successful when selected on May 20, 2014 as the host community for the world-renowned event. The game itself will be played at the New Minnesota Stadium but the entire greater Twin Cities metro area will accommodate the week long festivities.

VIKINGS RETURN TO OUTDOOR FOOTBALL — On August 8, 2014 in a preseason game vs. Oakland, the Vikings returned to the elements playing home games outdoors for the first time since 1981 for 2 seasons at TCF Bank Stadium on the campus of the University of the Minnesota while U.S. Bank Stadium was being constructed.

ZIMMER ERA BEGINS WITH WIN — On September 7, 2014, Head Coach Mike Zimmer won his first game in dominating fashion beating the St. Louis Rams 34-6 on the road in the season opener.

BUD GRANT WAY UNVEILED — At an unveiling ceremony on December 1, 2014, the Vikings and the city of Minneapolis honored former Head Coach Bud Grant with a street named in his honor outside of the new Minnesota Stadium.

TINGELHOFF ENSHRINED — Mick Tingelhoff was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on August 8, 2015. Tingelhoff played in 240 consecutive games and didn't miss a game in his 17-year career. Tingelhoff was a 7-time All-League selection and was named to 6 consecutive Pro Bowls. As a part of Tingelhoff's enshrinement, the Vikings played the Steelers in the Hall of Fame Game on August 9, the 4th time the Vikings have participated in the Hall of Fame Game.

ZIMMER CAPTURES 1ST NFC NORTH TITLE — The Vikings closed the 2015 regular season with 3 straight wins, including a 20-13 victory over the Packers at Lambeau Field in the finale on Jan. 3, 2016. The road win secured Minnesota's 1st NFC North title since 2009 and 1st playoff appearance since 2012.

ADRIAN PETERSON WINS RUSHING TITLE — For the 3rd time in his career, Adrian Peterson lead the NFL in rushing yards running for 1,485 yards in 2015.

COLDEST GAME IN FRANCHISE HISTORY — The Vikings hosted the Seattle Seahawks on Jan. 10, 2016, in the Wildcard Round of the playoffs in the coldest game in franchise history. The temperature at kickoff was minus 6 degrees Fahrenheit with a wind chill of negative 25 with a capacity crowd at TCF Bank Stadium in the last outdoor game played in Minnesota.

U.S. BANK STADIUM OPENS — Erected at the site of the Metrodome, U.S. Bank Stadium opened it's doors in July 2016. Luke Bryan and Metallica concerts and an international soccer match between Chelsea and AC Milan were the

opening events in the new stadium.

BREAKING GROUND IN EAGAN — The Vikings broke ground on their new training facility - the Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center - in Eagan on August 2. The facility will open in spring 2018 as the Vikings headquarters for football and business operations.

U.S. BANK STADIUM OPENS FOR PLAY — The Vikings hosted the San Diego Chargers in a preseason contest played on Aug. 28, 2016 and the Green Bay Packers in the first regular season game at U.S. Bank Stadium in a primetime game on Sunday Night Football on Sept. 18, 2016, a 17-14 Vikings win to kick off the home slate. Kyle Rudolph scored the 1st Vikings TD on a pass from Sam Bradford.

NINTH NFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME BERTH

— The Vikings overcame key injuries early in the season to notch a 13-3 regular season and advance to the NFC Championship Game, earning the 2nd NFC North title and 2nd playoff berth in head coach Mike Zimmer's 4 seasons. The Vikings hosted New Orleans for an NFC Divisional Round playoff, the 1st playoff game at U.S. Bank Stadium.

MINNESOTA HOSTS SUPER BOWL LII — The state hosted the Super Bowl for the 2nd time, 26 years after playing host to Super Bowl XXVI at the Metrodome. Philadelphia topped New England 41-33 to claim the Lombardi Trophy. Justin Timberlake performed at halftime and Pink sang the national anthem.

TWIN CITIES ORTHOPEDICS PERFORMANCE CENTER OPENS — State of the art TCO Performance Center opened as the new daily home of the Minnesota Vikings in Eagan. The facility features 4 outdoor practice fields, an indoor field and TCO Stadium field. The facility opened for business on March 5, 2018 and houses all football and business functions for the team.

COUSINS SIGNS AS TOP FREE AGENT — The Vikings signed coveted free agent QB Kirk Cousins to a blockbuster deal on the first day of free agency in 2018, luring the former Washington signal-caller to take the helm of the Vikings offense.

VIKINGS MUSEUM OPENS — As part of the TCO Performance Center complex, the team opened the Minnesota Vikings Museum, an interactive look at the history of the team

NEW TRAINING CAMP TRADITION — The Vikings signed the 2018 training camp at TCO Performance Center, a first for the club after holding training camps on-campus at Bemidji (1961-65) and Mankato (1966-2017).

MOSS ENSHRINED — WR Randy Moss was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 4, 2018. Moss was Rookie of the Year in 1998, ranks 2nd in team history for catches, yards and receiving TDs. Earned 3 All-Pro and 5 Pro Bowl honors with the Vikings in 8 seasons.

JORDAN HONORED — TE Steve Jordan was inducted into the Vikings Ring of Honor on Oct. 24, 2019 at halftime of the Thursday Night Football win over Washington at U.S. Bank Stadium. The 3rd-leading receiver in team history, Jordan went to 6 straight Pro Bowls in his career.

UNSETTLED OFFSEASON — The spring of 2020 was one of the most unprecedented in the history of the nation as the Coronavirus pandemic forced businesses to close, travel to shut down and social distancing became the norm. The Vikings were unable to hold a normal offseason with players and coaches working on-site. The 2020 Draft was de remotely and the club's offseason meetings were done by video conference.

SOCIAL JUSTICE AWARENESS RISES — The aftermath of George Floyd's death in Minneapolis led to protests in the Twin Cities and across the world calling for reform and renewed emphasis on social justice. The Vikings leaned on their player-led Social Justice Committee and support from ownership to help navigate the emotional times. The team announced a \$5 million donation from the Wilf family for social justice initiatives in Minnesota and across the country and a scholarship funded in Floyd's name for African American students going on to post-secondary education.

HUTCHINSON INDUCTED — G Steve Hutchinson was slated for inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on August 8, 2020 but ceremonies were postponed until 2021. Hutchinson played for the Vikings 2006-11, helping Adrian Peterson set the NFL record with 296 rushing yards against San Diego in 2007. Hutchinson was a 7-time AP All-Pro honoree, was selected to the 2000's Team of the Decade.

COVIDS ALTERS PLANS — The 2020 NFL offseason program became a virtual experience with meetings taking place remotely. The preseason was cancelled and crowds for home games were eliminated or severely limited. The Vikings opened their 60th season of play to an empty U.S. Bank Stadium when hosting Green Bay in the season opener. The Vikings were unable to welcome fans to home games in 2020 and had severely limited crowds in only 4 road games - at Indianapolis, Houston, Tampa Bay and New Orleans, drawing a season-high 16,031 at Tampa.

WILLIAMS RECOGNIZED — DT Kevin Williams was named to the Vikings Ring of Honor in 2021, making him only the 3rd DT in team history to reach the Ring. A 1st-round pick in 2003 (#9 overall), Williams played 11 seasons with the Vikings, earning 6 Pro Bowl berths and 5 times was a 1st-Team Associated Press All-Pro.

LEADERSHIP CHANGES — The team hired Kwesi Adofo-Mensah as General Manager and Kevin O'Connell as Head Coach entering the 2022 season. Both enter their first seasons in the roles, replacing Rick Spielman and Mike Zimmer respectively.



U.S. Bank Stadium's state-of-the-art features have attracted top national events. The stadium hosted Super Bowl LII 2018, the X Games for several years and the NCAA Men's Final Four in 2019.

Norm Van Brocklin - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 18, 1961...The former quarterback had retired from the NFL following the 1960 season after 12 professional seasons with the Los Angeles Rams (1949-57) and Philadelphia Eagles (1958-60)...“The Dutchman” led the Eagles to the NFL crown in 1960 and was the League MVP... Set an NFL record with 554 passing yards in the 1951 season opener...Threw for 23,611 yards and 173 TDs in his NFL career and played in 10 Pro Bowls...Inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1971...Coached 84 games with the Vikings with a 29-51-4 record...Went on to coach the Atlanta Falcons from 1968-73...Born March 15, 1926, in Eagle Butte, SD...Died May 2, 1983...Attended Oregon where he was an All-American.

Bud Grant - Named Vikings Head Coach on March 10, 1967...Came to Minnesota following a successful coaching career in the Canadian Football League with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers, leading the team to 4 Grey Cup championships and playing in the game 6 times...Coached the Vikings in 281 total games, retiring after the 1983 season only to be coaxed back to coach the team again in 1985 before retiring for good...Led Vikings to Super Bowl IV, VIII, IX and XI...Won 11 Central Division titles and made 12 appearances in the playoffs...Member of both the CFL and Pro Football Halls of Fame...Inducted into Vikings Ring of Honor in 1998...Born May 20, 1927 in Superior, WI...Resides in Bloomington, MN...An avid outdoorsman who travels the world hunting and fishing.

Les Steckel - Named Head Coach on January 29, 1984...Coached the Vikings for the 1984 season, finishing 3-13...Served as an offensive assistant with the Vikings 1979-83...Came to Minnesota in 1979 after working on the San Francisco 49ers staff...Was the youngest Head Coach in the NFL in 1984 at age 38...Born July 1, 1946, in Whitehall, PA...Began his playing career at Kansas as a walk-on, playing 4 seasons for the Jayhawks as a running back...Worked for Senator Robert Kennedy’s campaign as a volunteer following his 1968 graduation...Joined the Marine Corps and served as an infantry Lieutenant, seeing combat in Vietnam...Left the service in 1972 and began his coaching career in Colorado, working with the Buffaloes from 1972-76, the US Naval Academy in 1977 and the 49ers in 1978.

Jerry Burns - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 6, 1986...Served as Vikings offensive coordinator from 1968-85, guiding the team to 4 Super Bowl berths and 11 Central Division titles...Served as Vikings Head Coach 6 seasons, 1986-91...Coached the team in 101 total games, going 52-43 in the regular season and 3-3 in the playoffs...Led the Vikings to the NFC Championship game in 1987, earning upset wins at New Orleans and San Francisco along the way before falling to the Redskins 17-10 in Washington...Won the NFC Central in 1989...Coached in 6 Super Bowls, 4 as Vikings offensive coordinator and 2 as the Green Bay Packers’ defensive backs coach in Super Bowls I and II...Played QB for Michigan on the 1950 Rose Bowl team...Began his coaching career in 1951 at University of Hawaii...Head Coach at the University of Iowa from 1961-65...Inducted into Vikings Ring of Honor in 2005...Born January 24, 1927...Resides in Eden Prairie, MN.

Dennis Green - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 10, 1992...Came to Minnesota after reviving the Stanford University football program, serving as Head Coach from 1989-91, the only Vikings Head Coach to come directly from the college ranks...Coached 171 total games in 10 seasons with the Vikings, leading the team to 4 Central Division titles and the NFC Championship game twice...Vikings made the playoffs 8 of Green’s 10 seasons and the 1998 club set the NFL single-season scoring record at 556 points, averaging 34.8 points per game...An advocate of community involvement, Green initiated Community Tuesdays, which had players active in the Twin Cities on their day off, a concept that spread to the entire National Football League...Born February 17, 1949 in Harrisburg, PA...Died July 21, 2016...Named NFL Coach of the Year in 1992 by the Washington Touchdown Club and in 1998 by Sports Illustrated and the Maxwell Club...Inducted into Vikings Ring of Honor in 2018.

Mike Tice - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 10, 2002 after serving as the team’s coach for the final regular season game of the 2001 season...Became the 1st Vikings player to go on and serve as Head Coach...Enjoyed a 14-year NFL playing career as a TE, including 1992-93, ’95 with the Vikings...Played in 177 career games with Seattle, Washington and Minnesota...Originally signed by Seattle as a rookie free agent QB in 1981...Born February 2, 1959, in Bayshore, NY...Began coaching career with Minnesota Vikings as TE coach in 1996...Coached offensive line from 1997-2001 and added title of Assistant Head Coach in 2001.

Brad Childress - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 6, 2006...Led Vikings to consecutive NFC North titles in 2008-09...Won first game with Vikings over Washington on Monday Night Football...Joined the Vikings after 7 seasons with Philadelphia, working from 2002-05 as the Eagles’ offensive coordinator...Helped guide Eagles to Super Bowl XXXIX...Coached at University of Wisconsin from 1991-98...Got first taste of NFL coaching with Indianapolis Colts in 1985...Started coaching career at University of Illinois from 1978-84...Born June 27, 1956 and raised in Aurora, IL.

Leslie Frazier - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 3, 2011 after serving as Interim Head Coach for final 6 games of 2010 season, going 3-3...Finished 21-32-1 as Head Coach in the regular season...Made his 1st and only playoff appearance as Vikings head coach in 2012 after going 10-6...Led the biggest single-season turnaround in team history and finished tied for 3rd in Coach of the Year voting in 2012...Won 1st game as interim coach at Washington (11/28/10)...Vikings Defensive Coordinator

2007-10...Played for Division rival Chicago from 1981-86, starting at CB on Bears Super Bowl XX championship team...Entered NFL as assistant coach with Philadelphia in 1999...Began coaching career in 1988 at tiny Trinity College in suburban Chicago, starting the football program from the ground up as the 1st coach in program history...Part of Super Bowl winner with Chicago as a player and Indianapolis as an assistant coach...Born April 3, 1959 in Columbus, MS.

Mike Zimmer - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 15, 2014...Posted 74 wins, including playoffs, in 8 seasons as head coach, advancing to 2017 NFC Championship Game after a 13-3 regular season...Earned 2015 and 2017 NFC North Division titles and led team to 5 playoff games...Vikings ranked #1 in NFL total defense in 2017...Served as a defensive coordinator for the previous 14 seasons for Cincinnati (2008-13), Atlanta (2007) and Dallas (2000-06)...Part of 13 playoff teams in his NFL tenure and teams that have won 9 Division titles...Coached Cowboys DBs when team won Super Bowl XXX over Pittsburgh...Had a top-7 defense 4 of his final 5 seasons with Cincinnati...Before moving to the NFL ranks with Dallas in 1994 he spent 15 seasons coaching at the collegiate level where he spent his final 5 seasons as defensive coordinator at Washington State from 1989-93...Was at Weber State from 1981-88 serving as defensive coordinator from 1983-88...Entered the coaching profession at Missouri where he served as an assistant from 1979-80...Played QB and then later LB at Illinois State...Wife, Vikki, passed in 2009...Born June 5, 1956 in Peoria, IL.

Kevin O'Connell - Named 10th Vikings Head Coach on February 16, 2022...Joined Vikings from Super Bowl LVI champion LA Rams, where he served as Offensive Coordinator in 2020 and '21 and was OC in Washington in 2019...Helped Rams WR Cooper Kupp earn 2021 NFL Offensive Player of the Year and Super Bowl MVP Honors...Began coaching career with Cleveland in 2015...Coached in San Francisco ('16) and Washington ('17-19)...Was a 3rd-round draft pick by New England in 2008, going on to play for NY Jets from 2009-11 when the Jets went to consecutive AFC title games in 2009 and '10...Played QB at San Diego State from 2004-07...Born May 25, 1985 in Nashville, TN.

VIKINGS SUPER BOWL SEASONS

1969 - Super Bowl IV vs. Kansas City at Tulane Stadium, New Orleans

The Vikings advanced to the first Super Bowl in franchise history by capping a 12-2 regular season with playoff wins over the LA Rams in the Western Conference Championship at Met Stadium on December 27 and topping the Cleveland Browns the following week in the final NFL Championship game in league history at the Met. The games were the first playoff wins in franchise history and came in Bud Grant's 3rd season as head coach. The 1969 season was the last under the AFL-NFL format before the rival leagues RB merged for the 1970 campaign as the NFL and adopted the AFC and NFC conferences and re-alignment.

The team was spearheaded by QB Fran Tarkenton, who was back with the club for the 2nd season as the starter following a 1972 trade that brought the scramble back from New York. Tarkenton got a new weapon in NFL Rookie of the Year RB Chuck Foreman and Page was recognized as the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year for the 2nd time in 3 seasons (1971, '73).

VIKINGS SUPER BOWL SEASONS

1974 - Super Bowl IX vs. Pittsburgh at Tulane Stadium, New Orleans

The Vikings notched consecutive Super Bowl berths in 1973 and 1974, advancing with a 10-4 regular season mark to the NFC Playoffs in '74 with an offense that ranked #3 in the NFL and a defense ranked #10. Having both units in the top 10 was the 1st time achieving the feat in franchise history and the offense didn't reach #3 again until 1994. The Vikings hosted both the Divisional Round game vs. St. Louis and the NFC title game against Los Angeles at the Met, grinding out a 14-10 win in the game. The game was broadcast on NBC with Curt Gowdy, Al DeRogatis and Don Meredith on the call for an estimated audience of 42.4 million. The Grambling Band led a tribute to Duke Ellington at half.

1976 - Super Bowl XI vs. Oakland at Rose Bowl, Pasadena

The Vikings celebrated America's Bicentennial with the 3rd Super Bowl appearance in 4 seasons, advancing to Super Bowl XI against Oakland, playing the 1st Super Bowl at the venerable Rose Bowl. The '76 NFC title made the Vikings the 1st team to play in 4 Super Bowls and the berth was the 4th in 8 seasons for the club. The Vikings 24-13 NFC title game win included one of the most memorable plays in team history when Bobby Bryant returned a blocked Rams FG 90 yards to open the scoring. The Rams cut the lead to 17-13 before a Sammy Johnson TD run put the game away in the 4th quarter of what would be the last home NFC Championship game for the Vikings until the 1998 season. The offense gained a pair of valuable playmakers that set the tone for the season by trading for Ahmad Rashad and drafting Sammy White, who went on to be the NFL's Rookie of the Year.





HOMES OF THE VIKINGS



The Vikings played their home games for 21 seasons (1961-81) at Metropolitan Stadium and for 32 seasons (1982-2013) at Mall of America Field at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome. The Vikings then moved outdoors to the campus of the University of Minnesota for 2 seasons (2014-15) while U.S. Bank Stadium was being constructed. Ground breaking for the new facility took place in December 2013 and the Vikings played the 1st game there in the 2016 preseason opener on August 28 vs. San Diego. U.S. Bank Stadium hosted Super Bowl LII and the 2019 NCAA Men's Final Four.

The Vikings have called four stadiums "home" in their 62-season history: Metropolitan Stadium in Bloomington, Mall of America Field at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome in Minneapolis, TCF Bank Stadium on the campus of the University of Minnesota and U.S. Bank Stadium, located on the same site as the Metrodome in Minneapolis. On Sept. 10, 1961, the Vikings played their first-ever home game, a 21-17 preseason loss to the L.A. Rams at Metropolitan Stadium. Over 21 seasons the Vikings compiled a 97-59-4 record, including playoffs, at Met Stadium and possessed one of the most dominant home field advantages in professional football. On Dec. 20, 1981, the Vikings played the last game at the Met, a 10-6 loss to the Kansas City Chiefs. Capacity of the Met was 48,446 in the stadium's final year. The Vikings played their last season in the Metrodome in 2013 after the passage of a new stadium bill. The new Vikings stadium, U.S. Bank Stadium, was built on the Metrodome site with the Vikings beginning their home games on the University of Minnesota's campus at TCF Bank Stadium from 2014-15.

The Vikings moved indoors in 1982 to the Metrodome in downtown Minneapolis. Seating capacity for the Metrodome was 64,134. In 32 seasons at the Metrodome the Vikings owned a 168-92 record, which includes a 6-4 mark in NFL playoff action. The 2013 season marked 32nd campaign in the Metrodome, 11 seasons longer than the Vikings played at Metropolitan Stadium. The Metrodome had been host to many marquee sporting events, including Super Bowl XXVI, the 1987 and 1991 World Series, the 1985 Major League Baseball All-Star Game, the 1992 and 2001 NCAA Final Four basketball tournaments and the 1998 NFC Championship Game. The Metrodome also hosted NCAA Men's Basketball Regionals in 2000, 2003 and 2005.

During their two-year stay at TCF Bank Stadium, which has a capacity of 54,000, the Vikings had an 11-5 regular season record, giving them the highest win percentage all-time among teams in a temporary stadium and became the only team to secure a playoff berth while playing in a temporary stadium. The final game played at TCF Bank Stadium, a Wild Card Playoff game vs. Seattle (1/10/16) was the coldest game in Vikings history and the 3rd-coldest game in NFL history with a kickoff temperature of minus-6 Fahrenheit.

U.S. Bank Stadium hosted the first regular season game on Sept. 18, 2016 in prime time matchup vs. Green Bay, a 17-14 Vikings win. Vikings TE Kyle Rudolph scored the 1st TD for the club in their new home on a pass from Sam Bradford against the Packers. The 1st playoff game in the stadium was one for the ages, a 29-24 win over New Orleans in the Divisional Round with the winning TD coming on a 61-yard pass to Stefon Diggs on the final play of the game. The Packers game on 12/23/19 drew a record home crowd of 67,157.



VIKINGS TRAINING CAMP TRADITION

Since 2018, the Minnesota Vikings have held their summer Training Camp at Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center in Eagan. Prior to that, the Vikings spent the previous 52 years on the campus of Minnesota State Mankato after hosting camp at Bemidji State from 1961-65.

The state-of-the-art TCO Performance Center features four grass outdoor fields, an indoor field and an artificial surface field at TCO Stadium. The new facility and camp can accommodate 5,000 fans daily. The 2022 camp will mark the beginning of the team's 62nd season.



Since 2018, the Vikings have held training camp at TCO Performance Center after spending their summers on the campus of Bemidji State University (1961-65) and Minnesota State University (1966-2017).

VOICES OF THE VIKINGS



Entering his 21st season in 2022 as the Vikings radio play-by-play voice is KFAN radio morning personality Paul Allen. Joining Allen as the color commentator is former Vikings LB and coach Pete Berich.

Allen's run started when he became the Vikings Internet webcast play-by-play voice during the 2000 season, and called one Vikings game during the 2001 season. Since that game, he has become the "Voice of the Vikings."

Berich returns for his 17th season with the broadcast in 2022 and brings a decade of NFL experience from the field and sideline. A seventh-round draft pick by the Vikings in 1994, Berich overcame the odds and played for the team from 1995-2000. A standout special teamer, Berich parlayed his knowledge of the game into a coaching job with the team from 2002-05.

Entering his seventh season as part of the Vikings Radio Network broadcast, former Vikings LB Ben Leber reports on the game from the sideline and joins the head coach and players in the postgame segment. Leber played for the Vikings from 2006-10 and has been a regular contributor to KFAN and VEN.

KFAN-FM (100.3) and KTLK-AM (1130 AM) serve as the flagship stations for the Minnesota Vikings Radio Network, which includes outlets in five states.

3. A social/interactive area features an 86-inch touchscreen.
4. A stand-up area features three vertical screens that can be combined.

THE VIKINGS GJALLARHORN TRADITION

In Norse myth, the god Heimdallr serves as watchman for the other gods. He sits by the bridge over the river Gjoll at the end of the world. If hostile giants approach the bridge, Heimdallr sounds his horn.
