GAME SUMMARY

The Minnesota Vikings (0-2) return home in search of their first win of the 2020 season in a matchup against the Tennessee Titans (2-0). Kickoff is set for noon CT at U.S. Bank Stadium. The Titans are coming off a 33-30 home win over the Jaguars. The Vikings lost 28-11 on the road against the Colts.

The Vikings 0-2 record is the first time under Head Coach Mike Zimmer the team has dropped two games to start a season.

The Vikings rushing attack has averaged 5.35 yards per carry through the first two weeks, ranking fourth in the NFL.

LB Eric Kendricks, who has led the team in tackles for five consecutive seasons, currently ranks tied for third in the NFL with 23 total tackles through Week 2.

DE Yannick Ngakoue recorded his first sack as a Vikings after being acquired via trade on August 31. Ngakoue sacked Colts QB Phillip Rivers while also forcing a fumble, his 15th forced fumble since entering the League in 2016, trailing only Cardinals LB Chandler Jones and Bears LB Khalil Mack for the most forced fumbles in the NFL in that span.

Vikings RB Dalvin Cook has found the end zone three times through the first two games, tying him for third in the NFL in rushing touchdowns this season. Cook has 16 rushing touchdowns since the start of last season, tied with Titans RB Derrick Henry for the third-most in the NFL.

STAT OF THE WEEK



RB Dalvin Cook has been successful on three rushing two-point conversions in 2020, tying an NFL record for the most rushing two-point conversions in a season. With one more conversion (rushing or receiving), Cook would tie with former Ravens TE Todd Heap who holds the record for most two-point conversions in a single season with four (all receiving) in 2003.

NORSEMAN NOTEABLES

- WR **K.J. Osborn's** 130 kick return yards are second among all rookies in the NFL in 2020, trailing only Chargers WR Joe Reed's 131 kick return yards.
- K **Dan Bailey** has made 21 consecutive field goals, tied with Kai Forbath (21 in 2016-17) for the third-longest streak in team history trailing Gary Anderson (35 in 1998) and Fuad Revez (31 in 1994-95). Bailey's 21 consecutive field goals is the longest-active streak in the NFL.

VIKINGS-TITANS CONNECTIONS

- Vikings receiver Tajaé Sharpe played for the Titans from 2016-19. He was drafted by Tennessee in the fifth round of the 2016 NFL Draft and totaled 92 receptions for 1,167 yards and eight scores in 47 games with the Titans.
- Vikings running backs coach Kennedy Polamalu spent six months on the Titans coaching staff in 2010.
- Titans tight end MyCole Pruitt was a fifth-round pick of the Vikings in 2015. He appeared in all 16 games and made three starts as a rookie. He played in two games for Minnesota in 2016 before joining Chicago. Pruitt played on game for Houston in 2017 and joined Tennessee in 2018.
- Titans fullback/running back Khari Blasingame signed with the Vikings as an undrafted free agent in 2019. Tennessee signed Blasingame off Minnesota's practice squad in November.
- Titans tight ends coach Todd Downing coached Vikings tight ends in 2018. Downing, a native of Eden Prairie native, began his coaching career in Minnesota as a Vikings intern and coaching assistant (2001-02) and followed as a football systems analyst (2003-04) and offensive quality control coach (2005).
- Titans defensive lineman Jeffery Simmons' brother, Dylan Bradley, signed with the Vikings as a rookie free agent in 2017. Bradley spent that season on the Vikings practice squad.

PROFESSIONAL CONNECTIONS

- Vikings P Britton Colquitt and Titans P Brett Kern competed for the Broncos punting job in 2009. Kern won the gig but was released by Denver after six games and immediately claimed by Tennessee. Colquitt returned to Denver in December 2009 and first played for the Broncos in 2010.
- Minnesota QB Kirk Cousins and Tennessee LB Will Compton were teammates in Washington, overlapping from 2013-17.
- Vikings defensive backs coach Daronte Jones and backup Titans QB Logan Woodside overlapped with the Bengals.
- Minnesota Special Teams Coordinator Marwan Maalouf overlapped with Tennessee QB Ryan Tannehill, RB Senorise Perry and G/C Jamil Douglas with the Miami Dolphins.
- Vikings Co-Defensive Coordinator Adam Zimmer was assistant linebackers coach of the Chiefs in 2010 when Titans Head Coach Mike Vrabel played linebacker in Kansas City.
- Titans CB Johnathan Joseph played for Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer (then Bengals defensive coordinator) in Cincinnati from 2008-10 and for Offensive Coordinator Gary Kubiak (then Texans head coach) in Houston from 2011-13.
- Vikings backup QB Sean Mannion teamed with Titans G Rodger Saffold III while they were with the Rams, overlapping from 2015-18.

LOCAL CONNECTIONS

- Vikings safety Harrison Smith grew up in Knoxville, Tennessee. He won 2006 Gatorade Player of the Year and Tennessee Mr. Football Back of the Year in Class 3A honors during his final season at Knoxville Catholic High School.
- Vikings punter Britton Colquitt also is from Knoxville. He punted collegiately at the University of Tennessee after earning All-State honors in his junior and senior.
- Vikings Senior Defensive Assistant Dom Capers served as defensive backs coach at the University of Tennessee from 1980-81.
- Titans safety Amani Hooker is from Minneapolis. He played at Park Center High School and was First-Team All-State and a finalist for Minnesota's Mr. Football Award in 2015.
- Titans cornerback Chris Jackson was born in Minneapolis.

VIKINGS-TITANS SERIES NOTES

- The Vikings have won six of the last seven games against the Titans.
- Minnesota owns a two-game win streak against Tennessee, defeating the Titans in 2016 (25-16) and in 2012 (30-7).
- LB Eric Kendricks scored his first career touchdown, returning an interception 77 yards, in the 2016 season opener at Tennessee (9/11/16). He also posted seven tackles, including 1.0 tackle for loss, against the Titans en route to winning NFC Defensive Player of the Week.
- In 2004, RB Mewelde Moore earned NFL Offensive Rookie of the Week after rushing for 138 yards on 20 attempts in Minnesota's 20-3 win over Tennessee (10/24/20).

- TE *Kyle Rudolph* hauled in four passes for 23 yards, including a 15-yard touchdown grab that helped seal a 30-7 win over Tennessee on October 7, 2012. The touchdown reception was Rudolph's seventh of his career.
- In his most recent game against Tennessee on November 24, 2019, as a member of the Jaguars, DE *Yannick Ngakoue* registered two tackles, 1.0 sack, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and one pass defended. Ngakoue recorded a strip-sack on Titans QB Ryan Tannehill and then recovered his own forced fumble.

Since entering the NFL, Ngakoué ranks 12th with 38.5 career sacks and is tied for third with 15 career forced fumbles.

BE THE CHANGE



In June 2020, the Minnesota Vikings and the Wilf family announced a \$5 million donation to social justice causes throughout the United States. Following the announcement, the team's social justice committee held a series of meetings to determine how to actively engage the community through player involvement and financial donations during the 2020 season. **On September 8, the team announced nearly \$1 million will go toward the expansion or launch of multiple initiatives in one of three areas of focus: 1) voter education and registration; 2) educational curriculum on racism and Black history; and 3) law enforcement and criminal justice reform.**



VOTER EDUCATION AND REGISTRATION AWARENESS

Working together with the Office of the Secretary of State, the Vikings are using the team's platform to encourage fans to register and safely participate in the electoral process. The Vikings will launch a series of player-led voting content and make it easy for fans to find voting information via [Vikings.com/bethechange](https://vikings.com/bethechange). The team will also help provide personal protective equipment (PPE) for polling workers throughout Minnesota. Additionally, the team has hosted voter educational sessions with the entire Vikings staff and players/coaches in conjunction with Rock the Vote and Secretary of State Steve Simon with the goal of having 100% of the organization registered to vote in the November election.

ALL SQUARE

The Vikings will further expand the team's commitment to [All Square](#), a local nonprofit social enterprise that invests in the minds and lives of formerly incarcerated individuals. Centered on a craft grilled cheese restaurant, professional development institute, and forthcoming civil rights law firm, All Square's mission is to ensure that those impacted by the criminal justice system have the support and opportunities they deserve to become our country's future leaders, business owners, legal practitioners and entrepreneurs. The Vikings engagement will focus on All Square's Fellow & Fellow Alum Fund.

GEORGE FLOYD MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

In June, the Vikings created the George Floyd Legacy Scholarship with a \$125,000 endowment that will generate approximately \$5,000 annually to benefit African American graduating seniors in Minneapolis-St. Paul who are pursuing post-secondary education. The inaugural recipient, Mimi Kol-Balfour, was selected following her essay submission and was informed last week via videoconference by Vikings Owner/President Mark Wilf, General Manager Rick Spielman, running backs Alexander Mattison and Ameer Abdullah, and linebackers Anthony Barr and Eric Kendricks. Kol-Balfour is a graduate of Southwest High School who will be attending Barnard College this fall.

CRITICAL CONVERSATIONS

In partnership with [RISE \(Ross Initiative in Sports for Equality\)](#), the Vikings will host a series of Critical Conversation sessions with Minnesota High School athletic programs to help address issues of race and injustice. Vikings safety Anthony Harris and linebacker Anthony Barr spoke in August to a group of high school coaches to discuss the importance of having these conversations in a team environment. The program with RISE will further formalize the discussions and provide statewide access for Minnesota athletic programs to engage on these important issues.



306: BLACK HISTORY CURRICULUM EXPANSION

In 2016, with a focus on integrating Black history into mainstream U.S. history and developing courses devoted to the African American experience, the Vikings became the first NFL team to partner with Everfi in an effort to bring a [306 Black History](#) curriculum to Minnesota students. The interactive course informs and inspires today's students through history's most important stories of Black women and men who overcame obstacles through grit, strength, creativity and intellect. The digital curriculum incorporates videos from Vikings Legends, provides direct source materials and allows students to explore and reflect on key themes of Black history. Now in its fifth year, the program has since been replicated by the NFL in many markets. In 2020, the Vikings will expand the curriculum from 12 to 24 schools and reach thousands of students.

PROJECT SUCCESS

In 2019, the Vikings partnered with [Project Success](#), a Minneapolis-based organization focused on helping kids develop life-skills, support and confidence so they are more successful and engaged during high school and more prepared for life after graduation. The two organizations took 50 students of color from Minneapolis, along with Vikings running backs CJ Ham and Ameer Abdullah and safety Anthony Harris, to Washington, DC, for a special experience that included a visit to the National Museum of African American History & Culture. The trip was to be replicated in 2020, but due to COVID-19, this year's plan will be a day-long virtual experience and the Vikings and Project Success plan to return to DC in 2021.

VIKINGS SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

The Minnesota Vikings Social Justice Committee consists loosely of 10 members and any player or coach is free to join the meetings. Co-Defensive Coordinator/Defensive Line Coach Andre Patterson has been part of the group, meeting regularly with Eric Kendricks, Anthony Barr, Alexander Mattison, Kirk Cousins, Kyle Rudolph, Ameer Abdullah, Adam Thielen, Anthony Harris and Harrison Smith on social justice initiatives.

Throughout the year, player-driven efforts strive to create meaningful dialogue and change in the community on issues related to building unity, hope and positive community relationships. The Vikings approach includes spending time with young people at schools, community organizations and juvenile detention centers and dedicating financial resources to organizations that work for positive change.

Over the previous two seasons, the Wilf family has made a \$500,000 commitment to the Social Justice Committee (\$250,000 each year). Those dollars were directed toward scholarships for low-income students, school supplies, legal aid for disadvantaged and underrepresented populations and law enforcement relations.

VIKINGS IN THE COMMUNITY



WILF FAMILY SURPASSES \$5 MILLION IN DONATIONS TO COVID-19 CAUSES

The Wilf family, owners of the Minnesota Vikings, have surpassed \$5 million in donations to COVID-19-related causes after their \$1 million contribution to United Way Worldwide, one of six national charitable organizations recommended by the NFL as part of its Draft-A-Thon fundraising campaign tied to this year's NFL Draft.

Through the Wilf Family Foundations and the Minnesota Vikings, the \$5 million in donations and commitments since the pandemic arose have been contributed in New York, New Jersey, Minnesota, across the United States and in Israel. These donations have supported health care workers, the elderly, food banks, social service organizations and Jewish philanthropic causes.

JEFFERSON DONATES FACE MASKS

Justin Jefferson teamed with Genies and Bella + Canvas to donate 10,000 masks to Children's Minnesota in June.

HUNTER, COOK DONATE MADDEN CHECKS

Danielle Hunter and Dalvin Cook announced in April that they each would donate their royalty checks from EA Sports for appearing in "Madden 20" to North Memorial Health Foundation so that doctors, nurses and other healthcare workers could purchase personal protective equipment.

THIELN FOUNDATION DONATES \$25K

Adam Thielen and his wife, Caitlin, through the Thielen Foundation, donated \$25,000 to Second Harvest Heartland to help ensure that young people in local communities have the nutrition they need during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Thielen Foundation also partnered with KFAN 100.3-FM and iHeart Radio-Minneapolis in April for a Minnesota Covid Relief Virtual Radiothon that ran from 6 in the morning to 6:30 in the evening, raising more than \$280,000 for The Salvation Army, Second Harvest Heartland, M Health Fairview and MN Disaster Recovery Fund for Coronavirus.

BARR PROVIDES EMERGENCY GRANTS

Through his Raise The Barr foundation (which focuses on helping single parents complete their postsecondary education), the Anthony Barr offered \$500 emergency grants to any current or former Raise The Barr scholarship recipients. In March, all 34 recipients who applied received the grant for a commitment of \$17,000 from the foundation.

UDOH DELIVERS FOR HEALTH CARE WORKERS

In May, Olisaemeka Udoh donated and delivered 500 meals to workers at Cape Fear Valley Medical Center in his hometown of Fayetteville, North Carolina.

He also made a donation to Second Harvest Food Bank to help families in North Carolina.

RUDOLPH LAUNCHES 'MEAL PLAN'

Kyle Rudolph and his wife Jordan made a personal donation to Second Harvest Heartland in March that provided 82,000 meals to Minnesotans who are being hit hardest by repercussions of the COVID-19 pandemic and school cancellations.

Rudolph also set a goal of raising \$200,000 for Second Harvest Heartland, which will provide 600,000 meals for local families. He set up the Rudy's Meal Plan campaign and encouraged whoever is able to join them in supporting the nonprofit.

Throughout the offseason, the tight end organized food drives for communities hardest hit by the pandemic and store closings in Minneapolis.

KENDRICKS DONATES PAINTING PROCEEDS

In March, Eric Kendricks announced that he would create paintings and sell them on Instagram, with the proceeds going to food banks in the city of the person who bought the painting.

Kendricks listed each painting at \$1,000, and then matched that price, with a total of \$2,000 going to each food bank.

- The 38-foot, Winnebago truck is a zero-waste vehicle with energy star rated appliances and built-in solar panels.
- The kitchen is designed to hold 10 food preparation professionals, while the rear portion of the vehicle features an experiential room showcasing an 80-inch monitor that can display educational videos and nutritional information.
- Meals are served from June to December on a biweekly basis at schools, summer education programs, youth enrichment centers and other locations where childhood food insecurity is prevalent.
- Funds are raised by selling a separate full menu of food truck entrees twice a week at local food truck festivals, Vikings home games, training camp and other team events, as well as to the lunch crowd in downtown Minneapolis; 100 percent of the profits go back to distributing healthy meals to youth.
